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TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Jaffrey, in the County of Cheshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Union Hall on School Street in said Town, on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, (polls to remain open until six o'clock in the afternoon) to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, and all other necessary Town Officers.

2. To hear all reports, except that of the Budget Committee, and act thereon.

3. To hear the report of the Budget Committee, and to raise such sums of money as may be required for the support of the poor, building and repairing highways and bridges, fire department, Memorial Day, street lights, and all other Town Charges.

4. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

5. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to arrange for the installation of a street light on the road leading from the Old Meeting House to the home of Paul Harling and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$23.50 to pay for the electric service for one year, as petitioned for by Katherine J. Hammar and others.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$925.34 upon condition that the State will contribute the sum of \$3,701.37 for Town Road Aid upon class V highways.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of 447.00 (1/100th of 1% of the valuation of the Town) to the Monadnock Region Association of Southern New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, and by other means, calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in co-operation with the other thirty seven towns of the Monadnock Region.

8. To see if the Town will vote to purchase the surveys and property records of the late Arthur S. Buss, raise and appropriate money to pay for same, or act in any way relating thereto.

9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate with the New Hampshire Gas and Electric Company to sell to them a lot on the easterly side of SLAB City Road to be used as a transformer and regulator substation.

10. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following article: The Town of Jaffrey will accept from the Conant Cemetery Association the Conant Cemetery in Jaffrey, together with such trust funds as are held by said Association for perpetual care of certain lots in said cemetery and will hold and control said cemetery as a town cemetery according to the provisions of law. The care, protection and preservation of the Conant Cemetery, the sale of lots and the control of the expenditure of [all funds on said Conant Cemetery shall be vested in a Cemetery Commission. Said Commission shall be composed of three members, to be appointed by the Moderator for terms of three years, the first such Commission to be appointed for respective terms of one, two and three years and thereafter for full terms of three years. The sum of \$1,000.00 is raised and appropriated for the care of the Conant Cemetery for the ensuing year.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to the Elliot Community Hospital of Keene, the sum of \$155.20 being this town's proportionate share of said Hospital's deficit for the year 1949.

12. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Planning Board to consider the Town and School long range building needs and report thereon, to raise and appropriate a sum of money for necessary expenses.

13. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and transfer from its unencumbered surplus, any sum of money to the Town Hall Capital Reserve Fund.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be set aside and added to the Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of erecting a Town Hall at some future time as the Town may direct.

15. To see if the Town will vote to transfer \$10,000 from its unencumbered surplus to the School District, thereby reducing the amount to be raised for School purposes by that amount, provided the School District votes to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for school building purposes and appropriates \$10,000 for that purpose.

16. To see if the Town will vote to accept in trust the following sums of money:

\$100.00 from Phoebe Roith

\$100.00 from Arland B. and Lydia L. Hunt

\$100.00 from Frank V. and Edith L. Wright

\$100.00 from Daniel C. and Abbie E. Lynch

\$100.00 from Georgiana P. Yeatman and Mildred W. Mulford

The income from such funds to be used for the care of their respective lots in the Cutter Cemetery.

To vote by ballot on the following question:

"Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be accepted in this town?"

ABSTRACT OF BUSINESS TRANSACTED AT THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

March 8, 1949

Art. 1. Officers Elected. Town Clerk, George H. Duncan; Selectman for three years, J. Oren Belletete; Town Treasurer, Eugene F. Boynton; Highway Agent, Henry J. Belletete; Chief of Police, Hubert Boynton; Highway Agent, Henry J. Belletete; Chief of Police, Hubert F. O'Neil; Chief Engineer, Fire Department, Philip C. Tremblay; Over-seer of the Poor, Hubert F. O'Neil; Water Commissioner, three years, James B. Perry; Tax Collector, Hubert F. O'Neil; Commissioner of Humiston Park, three years, Homer J. Belletete; Trustee of Trust Funds, three years, James B. Perry; Member of Budget Committee, three years, Alfred S. Despres; Auditors, Harry J. O'Brien, George W. McInnes, Lewis S. Record, Jr. It was voted that all remaining town officers be ap-pointed by the selectmen pointed by the selectmen.

Art. 2. Reports. The report of the Committee on Veterans' Memorial was presented as follows and the Committee discharged: "Polls concerning the erection of World War Two Monument designed by Viggo Brandt-Erichsen were conducted by both veterans' organizations. Both favored the erection of said monument through some means other than taxation. In addition, letters of inquiry were sent to the families and next of kin of the boys who gave their lives in World War II to determine what they favored. The replies unanimously favored Mr. Brandt-Erichsen's Monument. Erection and sponsorship has been turned over to a committee of citizens.

The Committee feels that the sentiment of their fellow veterans concerning the most proper and fitting type of memorial is so varied and uncertain at this time that no definite conclusions can be reached. The committee feels that those who entertain various ideas can best bring those ideas to the fore and receive action on them by individual or group sponsorship in the Town Warrant.

Art. 4. Borrowing Money. It was voted to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxation.

Art. 5. Town Road Aid. It was voted that the sum of 936.72 be raised and appropriated for Town Road Aid on Class V roads, on condition that the State contribute 33,731.02.

Art. 6. Capital Reserve. (In Budget).

Art. 7. Capital Reserve. It was voted to transfer \$10,000. from surplus to the capital reserve fund for construction of a town hall.

Art. 8. Sewer Assessments. It was voted that a committee consisting of the Health Officer, Chairman of the Water Commissioners, one selectman and two other citizens appointed by the selectmen make a thorough study of the question of sewer assessments, and recommend some fair, workable system to an adjournment of this meeting. The Moderator reported the membership of this Committee to be Kauko Walkonen, James B. Perry, Jason C. Sawyer, Henry J. Belletete and George P. Duncan.

Art. 9. Discontinuance of Highway. It was voted that the Town discontinue subject to gates and bars that portion of the highway leading from the summer residence of Gertrude Hanson to the Toupin Farm, so-called owned by George P. Duncan, from high water mark on the northerly side of the reservoir created by Jaffrey Reservoir Corporation to highwater mark on the southerly side of said reservoir, provided that said Reservoir Corporation shall agree to construct and maintain said gates and provide for the reasonable reconstruction of the highway from the residence of W. B. McSkimmon past the property of H. H. Faxon.

Art. 10. Reappraisal by Tax Commission. It was voted to pass over the article.

Art. 11. Audit by State Tax Commission. It was voted to pass over the article.

Art. 12. Appropriation for Elliott Community Hospital. It was voted to pass over the article.

Art. 13. Lights on Howard Hill Road. It was voted to raise and appropriate \$117.50 for five new street lights on Howard Hill Road from the Leonard Martin driveway to the Sawyer Farm owned by A. M. Deschenes.

Art. 14. Old Burying Ground Fund. The following motion was adopted: That the Town accept the sum of \$903.75, the same being the net proceeds from the sale of the Willa Cather lot, the E. Granville Crabtree lot and the Elizabeth VanDeman lot in the Old Burying Ground, as well as the sum of \$336.25 from George and Eleanor Austermann and the heirs of the late Edmond C. Shattuck, making a total of \$1,240., said sum to be invested by the Trustees of Trust Funds and identified as the "Willa Cather Fund", the income from which is to be used for the perpetual care of the Old Burying Ground as follows: primarily for the general care of the area in which said named lots are located in the southwest corner of the cemetery and bounded generally by stone walls on the south and west, the tomb on the north and the main entrance driveway on the east; that additions to said fund may be made by those interested in the proper maintenance of the Willa Cather grave and that general area; that after reasonable care has been given to the area and the lots particularly mentioned, as well as the lots of future contributors to the fund, any remaining balance may be used for the care of the rest of the Old Burying Ground.

Art. 15. Town Horse Sheds. It was voted that the so-called "Hearse House" located at the entrance to the Old Burying Ground be removed and either used elsewhere or sold on such terms as the selectmen may determine and that the ground on which it stands be devoted to cemetery purposes. The following motion was offered, laid on the table and referred to the following committee appointed by the Moderator: Eleanor S. Austermann, Carl C. Spofford, Joseph B. Eldridge: "That the Town accept gratuitous title to those old horse sheds owned by Helen E. Shattuck and Edith McCoy, which are a part of the group near the Old Town House in Jaffrey Center for the purpose of removal and disposal by the selectmen, as well as those of any other owner or owners to which the Town may become entitled by gift or reversion, and that the land on which they stand be enclosed within the Old Burying Ground for cemetery purposes," said Committee to report at an adjournment of this meeting.

Art. 16. Disposal of Water Works Land on Mt. Monadnock. It was voted that the Water Commissioners and Selectmen constitute a special committee to confer with the State Forestry and Recreation Department, investigate their proposition and report their recommendation to an adjournment of this meeting.

Art. 17. Old Home Week. It was voted to pass over the article.

Art. 18. Encroachments on Highways. The following motion was adopted: Whereas in times past without proper authorization various acts have been committed and structures erected within the limits of highways; and Whereas, such acts have resulted in an infringement upon the rights of the public and the Town; and Whereas, such uses adverse to the interests of the Town seem in recent years to have increased despite the efforts of the selectmen to keep our roads free from them; Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, that the selectmen are hereby instructed to investigate all such private encroachments, actual and potential, upon the rights of the Town, and in their judgment after such investigation either order the removal of the same or cause same to be removed, all at no expense to the Town; and Be It Further Resolved, That after proper warning, the selectmen be instructed to prosecute any further infringement upon town property through appropriate court action.

Art. 19. Planning Board. It was voted that the town establish a Planning Board of seven members, with duties set forth in section 3 to 15, inclusive of chapter 53 of the Revised Laws, to make a study of the town's development and report to town meeting appropriate recommendations for the promotion and maintenance of the town's best development, the board members to consist of one selectman and six other citizens appointed by the selectmen, as provided in chapter 53, Revised Laws.

The meeting voted to adjourn to the third Tuesday of May, 1949, at 7:30 p. m.

ABSTRACT OF BUSINESS TRANSACTED AT THE ADJUORNED TOWN MEETING

May 17, 1949

Art. 8. Sewer Assessments. The following rules were adopted:

1. That one-half the cost of the sewer, including the installation thereof and including the cost and installation of the tank, if any, shall be paid by the town.

2. That the other half of such cost shall be assessed against the abuttors on a front-foot basis, payable in five equal installments, at the same time as real estate taxes are payable, without interest if paid when due, but with interest at 6% per annum after due-date.

3. That in cases as it may be determined by the Selectmen that the abuttor cannot, within the foreseable future, be benefitted by said sewer, by reason (a) of its being on a higher elevation than the dwelling or other construction now occupied or may be expected to occupy; (b) By reason of the abuttor's land not being now or in the foreseable future suitable for construction; (c) By reason of the premises being adequately served by a town sewer already in place; (d) By reason of a portion of the line being installed merely for the purpose of necessary outfall or discharge without the purpose of benefitting abuttors who are not indeed benefitted; (e) For other good and sufficient reasons the selectmen shall eliminate the linear footage determined not to be improved by such sewer, and shall not assess the abuttor on the basis of that footage, but shall divide the half-cost by the remaining linear footage to determine the amount to be assessed against each abuttor.

4. That when an abuttor desires to connect into a sewer, he shall pay the cost of construction to the street line, and shall pay in advance a connection charge of \$50.00, and the town shall pay the cost of construction from the street line to the sewer line, and small make the connection, and all such construction shall be under the supervision of the Sewer Commission.

5. That when a non-abuttor desires to connect into a sewer, he shall pay the cost of construction to the street line, and shall pay in advance a connection charge of \$100.00, and the town shall pay the cost of construction from the street line to the sewer line, and all such construction shall be under the direction of the Sewer Commission.

Art. 15. Town Horse Sheds. The committee appointed at the previous meeting reported as follows: I. The members of this committee have consulted with all the owners of the horse sheds. They all are agreeable to giving up their title if the sheds are to be restored as a historical monument. II. The owners of a majority of the sheds are unwilling that the cost of restoration or maintenance thereafter shall ever become a charge upon the town or supervision thereof a burden on its officials. III. Suggestions have been made to the committee that necessary funds for such restoration and maintenance could and should be raised by popular subscription. IV. Therefore, the committee recommends that action under Article 15 be indefinitely postponed.

The report was accepted, the committee discharged and the motion was taken from the table and indefinitely postponed.

It was voted that a committee of four, consisting of Carlos T. Pierce, chairman; George B. Farnham, Delcie D. Bean, Sr., and Margaret G. Blaine, acting in accordance with the report just accepted, shall receive such funds as may be forthcoming by private subscription for the reconstruction and maintenance of all the horse sheds near the Old Town House in Jaffrey Center as a historical monument; said committee may authorize any organized civic group or society to see to such reconstruction and maintenance, or sponsor the same; and that if they shall fail to interest any such civil groups or society, the committee be authorized to proceed toward these objectives themselves.

Art. 16. Land on Monadnock Mountain. The committee appointed to investigate reported that in its opinion it is inexpedient to dispose of the land at the present time; the report was adopted and the committee discharged.

The meeting then adjourned at 9:15 p.m. A true abstract. Attest:

B. Administrative Policy

There has been an increasing consciousness that the demands for school health services were not being adequately met. To correct this it was decided to employ a school nurse more nearly full time instead of half time. Miss Langille this year spends full time in Jaffrey except for two days per month when she is working in the Rindge School. This has already resulted in the detection of a number of obscure correctible defects of highly serious nature and in a marked improvement in the rate of correction of common defects.

The 1949 legislature changed the law regarding tuition rates so that a district sending high school pupils to schools outside the district is liable for the total average per pupil current cost in that school. In line with this change in the state law the rate of tuition in Conant High school has been raised from \$125 per pupil in 1949-50 to \$200 in 1950-51. It may be of interest to observe that the state average per high school pupil cost for 1948-49 was \$233.70 whereas the comparable figure for Jaffrey was \$237.42.

The following teachers have demonstrated their interest in continuing their professional improvement: Mr. Robert Lewis by attendance at Boston University Summer School and Saturday courses; Mr. Chamberlain by attendance at Keene T. C. summer school; Mr. Smith by attendance at Boston University Summer School; Mr. Craig by attendance at Keene Summer School and extension courses during the school year; Miss Cutter at Keene T. C. summer school and Miss Lynch at Keene T. C. extension courses. No vacancies occurred during the school year 1948-49, but resignations at the end of the year, together with the need of one additional teacher because of over-crowding at the grade school necessitated procurring seven teachers and one school nurse before the opening of schools in September, 1949.

In spite of this large turn over, there has been no noticeable disturbance of the school program and teacher morale is good.

B. Programs and Methods

One of the most important subjects of study offered in our schools is that of reading and it is the most difficult to teach.

In order to help teachers obtain higher skill in this tremendously vital area, all teachers of the Supervisory Union worked for five full school days (November 7-11) under highly expert leaders from Boston University. The activity was officially called a Workshop, and it truly was. Drs. Durrell, Murphy and Sullivan gave as fine a course as could possibly be desired. There wasn't a dull moment from start to finish, and all teachers have reported a very helpful experience.

The teachers paid one-fourth of the total cost of the course and the school districts shared in meeting the balance of the expense.

PART III. SCHOOL PLANT

Last year's report listed sixteen items under this heading that were receiving consideration. Because of the loss of the expected State Aid of \$17,000 few of these things have been accomplished.

The most significant improvement has been the installation of the fifty-two new desks and chairs in the Assembly room at the High School.

It is becoming increasingly evident that no amount of work done on the present High School building will render it suitable for the number of pupils now headed in that direction. Some publicity has already been given to expected enrollment figures which indicate that within five years the enrollment at Conant High School will reach 300 students, and in another five years will exceed 400. Plans drafted during the past few years by use of Federal funds provided for a maximum enrollment of 300. Enrollments the past two years have been increasing much more rapidly than figures then available indicated.

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Jason C. Sawyer and the warrant was read by him with the return on the same.

Alfred Despres moved that Evelyn H. Ruffle serve as temporary clerk. The motion was carried.

Article 1. George Austermann moved that the Clerk be instructed to cast one ballot for Jason C. Sawyer for Moderator for the ensuing year. The Moderator turned the chair over to the Clerk. The motion was put by the Clerk and the motion was unanimously carried. The Clerk cast one ballot for Jason C. Sawyer and he was declared elected and took the oath of office in open meeting.

Article 2. George Austermann moved the Moderator be instructed to cast one ballot for Evelyn H. Ruffle for Clerk for the ensuing year. The motion was carried. The Moderator cast one ballot for Evelyn H. Ruffle for Clerk and declared her elected and took the oath in open meeting.

Article 11. Ferdinand Gordon moved that the sum of \$2,000.00 be raised and appropriated for the replacement of pupil's desks and chairs at the High School. Motion seconded and carried.

Article 12. Leon Hunt moved that the sum of \$730 be raised and appropriated for the purchase of additional folding chairs for Union Hall. Motion seconded but defeated.

Article 13. Ernest Pratt moved that the sum of \$600 be raised and appropriated for the purchase of new equipment. Mr. Pratt explained that this sum was for the home economics room and audio-visual education. Motion seconded and carried.

Carl Spofford moved that the sum of \$2,500 be raised and appropriated as a deficiency appropriation for the school year ending June 30, 1949. Mr. Spofford explained that this was a request of the Trustees of the Trust Funds. Motion seconded and carried.

Article 15. Ferdinand Gordon moved that the sum of \$1,400 be raised and appropriated for the purchase and installation of storm windows on the High School building. Motion seconded and carried.

Article 16. Homer Forcier moved that the sum of \$3,500 be raised and appropriated for the purchase and installation of lighting equipment at the high school. Motion seconded and carried.

Philip Darling moved we return to Article 11. Motion seconded and carried.

Delcie Bean Jr., moved we do not reconsider Article 11. Motion lost.

Ferdinand Gordon moved that the sum of \$1,000 in place of \$2,000 be raised and appropriated for the replacement of pupils desks and chairs at the High School. Motion seconded and carried.

Voted to adjourn at 10:20 p.m.

A general explanation of the present financial situation in Jaffrey seems to be in order. The most important single fact in connection with the current budget is the loss of the \$17,000 expected State Aid. Because of this loss of revenue the school board has faced two serious problems: (1) how to keep the schools operating at as high a standard as possible and (2) how to keep the budget within the limits of a reasonable local tax assessment. A careful examination of the budget of 1949-50 as published a year ago and repeated in column one above, together with the figures in the second column, which represent what is expected will actually be spent, shows that a total of \$5,389 has been pared from the early estimates, chiefly from the following items: item 6, \$1,729; items 7 and 8 (taken together) 765; item 9, \$1,260; item 10, \$865; item 11 \$1,660; and item 14, \$90, whereas small overdrafts are expected in items 18 (\$500) and 20 (\$247). The overdraft in item 18 is expected because of lack of sufficient Federal Funds to maintain the present rate of reimbursement on school lunches throughout the year. (A notice recently from the state office of Education indicates our reimbursements from Federal Funds for April, May and June are expected to be cut 30%). This total saving of \$5,389 together with an increase of revenue of \$2,306 cuts the additional appropriation needed to balance the budget from \$17,000 to \$9,305.

Let us look at the 1950-51 Budget.

(1) Item 1,—Salary of District Officers:—For a number of years it has been customary for the school district to elect as auditors the same individuals elected by the town as town auditors and for their salaries to be paid by the town. The 1950-51 budget carries an allowance of \$30 for auditors' salaries in anticipation of the school district paying for the auditing of its own books. Therefore the increase in total of the item from \$180 to \$210.

(2) Item 6.—Salaries of teachers:—The small increase in this item allows for no additional teachers next year, only such salary increases as are thought to be necessary to hold our present standard of efficiency.

(3) Item 10.—Other Instructional Expenses:—For several years a part of the salary of the music supervisor and for two years a part of the salary of the art supervisor have been thought of as coming from the Durant Fund. It is now believed that the music and art proprams should be regarded as regular features of the educational program and that the Durant Funds thus released should be used for some service or activity over and above the present program. Following out this thought item 10 includes \$1,500 for special instructional expenses to be paid for from the Durant Fund, the exact nature of them being still under consideration.

(4) Item 11.—Salaries of Janitors:—It is now commonly recognized that the amount of janitorial service required by our schools to maintain modern standards of cleanliness and service is greater than what two janitors can reasonably be expected to do. When the 1949-50 budget was made up a year ago it was expected that additional janitors would be employed but because of the lack of State Aid this has not been done except for some extra cleaning last summer. It is now generally felt that this need should not go another year unheeded so the 1950-51 budget includes an estimate for some additional help during the time schools are in session.

(5) Item 14.—Repairs and Replacements:—This covers the upkeep on school buildings valued in the town report at \$175,000 and on equipment valued at \$10,000. It should be kept in mind in this connection that these valuation figures are way below present day replacement costs. Even a casual glance of an interested taxpayer at this property would show that it is not being kept up. The \$5,000 requested is the least possible amount that can be expected to be needed to maintain its present condition to say nothing of making any headway towards a real improvement.

(6) Item 16.—Transportation:—This year school buses are filled to capacity and some extra trips have to be made. Next year it is almost certain that still more pupils will be needing transportation, therefore the increase in this item.

(7) Item 19.—Retirement:—The reason for the increase is due to the fact that more teachers are members of the Teacher Retirement System and the rate of contribution by the district on retirement of Janitors and other district employees has increased.

B. Report of School Nurse

Ruth S. Langille, R. N.

The four months that I have been School Nurse in Jaffrey on a full time basis has been spent in getting acquainted with the schools and their needs, the community and its facilities, the school personnel, the doctors, and as many parents and citizens as possible.

During this time vision and hearing tests have been done with the new Massachusetts vision type and the Eames type vision tests and the new pure tone individual test audiometer for the hearing. Most pupils needing glasses were fitted promptly by private means but a few were done with the help of Jaffrey Community League funds. One child was found to have sufficiently poor vision so that he is being taught Braille reading with finger tips while he still has vision to help. It is very necessary that all suspicious vision or eye strain pupils be examined promptly by specialists before the child begins to fall behind his class in reading achievement as well as other school work.

In November, December, and January immunization clinics for protection against Diphtheria, Whooping Cough, and Tetanus have been held for 108 six and seven year olds and pre-school children. This is done with three shots of the combined serums a month apart or with a single booster shot if the child was protected more than two years ago. Dr. Franklin Sterling gave the shots with Miss Elizabeth Carriel of Claremont, State Board of Health Nurse for this area assisting. The Jaffrey Community League assisted with a committee, whose members were: Mrs. Frederick Butler, chairman, Mrs. Dana Perry, Jr., Mrs. John Korpi, Mrs. Arthur Gelinas, Mrs. Lawrence Lavoilette, Mrs. Philip Darling, Mrs. John Hackler, Mrs. Walter Gentsch, and Mrs. Edward Brummer.

In these four months, 40 pupils were taken to physicians, 2 to hospitals, 2 to dentists, 28 to oculists, 1 to Mental Hygiene Child Guidance clinics, 3 to Orthopedic clinics. In the Nurse's office, 438 were checked for minor injuries or for suspected illness with 46 taken home from school with colds or other suspicious illness and 4 treated in the home. There were 283 school visits made and 105 home visits.

During the Christmas season 92 children in 22 families were cheered by a home visit from Santa with gifts and toys and guided by the Nurse. This was a community project planned and carried out by Conant High School juniors and aided by the Jaffrey Community League.

Clothing for several familles was procured by the combined resources of the Salvation Army, Red Cross and Poole Funds. One family was outfitted and cared for by out-of-town resources while the mother recovered from surgery. A Girl Scout Troop is being aided in getting First Aid Merit Badges in an after-school class.

As soon as Dr. Bingham returns from his Winter vacation, the dental clinic will start. The Jaffrey Woman's Club in cooperation with Dr. Shirley Dwyer, State Board of Health Dental consultant, sponsors this clinic each year. Because available funds would limit this service to a mere fifty cents a child if free and stretched over the whole school system, it is proposed that the clinic be started in the first grade with a complete job done on each pupil and only continued up through the grades as the rotation of funds permits. If parents who are able would get their children's dental work done privately and if part or all of the expense at the easy clinic rate could be paid by parents of pupils using the school clinic, this fund could be rotated to help a much larger percentage of the school population. By their honest support, parents alone will dictate how far this fund can be stretched.

During this term, in out-of-school hours, your nurse has been privileged in being able to take the Harvard-Boston University course in School and Home Relations with college credits, also college credit work on Child Growth through Reading from the angle of eliminating physical defects which retard progress in school and slow development of the whole child.

I would appreciate it if calls for the school nurse could be made at the nurses office in the Grade School building daily from 8:30 till 9:00 a. m. The principal of the building is kept informed at all times where she is working. Full time work is done in the Jaffrey Schools with the exception of the equivalent of two days time a month devoted to Rindge, which usually is scheduled for Wednesday or Thursday P. M., unless extra time is needed to complete an un-interrupted unit of work.

I find working in Jaffrey very pleasing, the people friendly and helpful and the schools growing and planning wisely for the future. The parents have been very cooperative in all matters affecting the health of their children, correcting reported physical defects promptly, keeping their children home from school with colds and other communicable diseases. Teachers and other school personnel have been very helpful. Doctors have cooperated with the school health program 100%. All community clubs have honored every request for aid, financial or otherwise, most graciously. For all this support I wish to extend my thanks in behalf of the children, who are the beneficiaries but are unable at their age to thank you all.

C. Report of Jaffrey School Building Committee

(Committee appointed under Article 10 of the 1946 School District Warrant)

A year ago this Committee indicated that it had assigned itself two main areas of investigation to be carried on during 1948:

1. The examination of the building plans and specifications to assure their educational adequacy; and

2. The continuation of the study of the proposed renovation and expansion of the High School building.

Our present report submits the following review of progress in both areas.

In the first of these the Committee has:

(a). Satisfied itself that the present blueprints and specifications are, in general, adequate as they now stand and as detailed as they can be at this stage of planning. Following their approval by the State Department of Education and Superintendent of Schools, Lester B. Badger, the Committee has given its approval of them. However, it recognizes that constant changes and developments being made in educational practices and building materials and equipment, as well as their availability, will necessitate a careful revision of plans before bids are sought. Naturally, the longer the period between the drawing of the plans and the call for bids, the greater the need for more extensive revision.

(b). Received definite assurance from the architects that the present blueprints and specifications are our property and that any desired additional copies will be furnished.

(c). Received further definite assurance that possible minor changes and alterations to plans which may have to be made at some future time when these plans are put up for bids will be made by the architects without additional expense.

(d.) Placed the approved plans and specifications on file with the Superintendent of Schools where they will always be available for the use of the School District.

As a matter of information the Committee would like to report now on its recommendation to the 1947 School District meeting that the School Board be authorized to apply for federal funds to be used for the preparation of plans and specifications. Such application was made and \$10,150.00 of Federal Works Agency Funds have been turned over to the School District, and paid to the achitects.

With relation to the second area of investigation concerned with the continuation of its study, the committee now recommends that the School District should hold itself in readiness to take advantage of any grants of state or federal funds for actual school building construction if such should become available as a result of legislation now pending or planned.

PART VIII. SCHOOL WARRANT SCHOOL WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Jaffrey qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Union Hall in said district on the 13th day of March 1950, at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon, to aot upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

3. To choose two Members of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to use the \$1,400 raised and appropriated under Article 15 of the warrant of the annual School District meeting of March 7, 1949, for current expenses, instead of the purchase and installation of storm windows on the high school building as then voted.

10. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to use the \$3,500 raised and appropriated under Article 16 of the warrant of the annual school district meeting of March 7, 1949, for current expenses instead of the purchase and installation of lighting equipment at the high school as then voted.

11. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to use the \$1,000, raised and appropriated under Article 10 of the warrant of the annual school district meeting of March 7, 1949, for current expenses instead of the interior painting at the grade school.

12. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate, in addition to the original appropriation for 1949-50, a sum of \$9,305 to be made available to the school district prior to July 1, 1950 in order to meet unanticipated obligations caused by lack of State Aid.

13. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$22,363.37 as a capital reserve fund for the construction, reconstruction or acquisition of school buildings, said funds to be placed in the custody of the trustees of trust funds and reserved for the construction, reconstruction or acquisition of school buildings in accordance with the Laws of 1943, Chapter 160, as amended by the Laws of 1945, Chapter 35 and Laws of 1947, Chapter 8.

14. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000 for the purchase of additional land at the rear of the Conant High School, and to authorize the school board to issue serial notes or bonds in the name and on the credit of the District in this amount in conformance with existing Statue.

15. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for the purpose of obtaining an option for five (5) years on the purchase of additional land in the rear of the Conant High School.

To see if the district will authorize the school board to make 16. contracts for periods not exceeding five (5) years upon terms and conditions to be determined by the school board.

17. To see if the District will vote to authorize the school board to engage an architect, or architects, to assist in surveying present school buildings, the preparation of plans for the construction, reconstruction or acquisition of school buildings, and raise and appropriate \$1,000 for said purpose.

18. Moved: that the Jaffrey School Board be recorded as in favor of the immediate restoration of state support of public education at least on a par with support provided in 1947 and 1948, and that the State Board of Education make whatever provision may be necessary in order that a formula for the equitable distribution of such money as may be provided, be available for the consideration of the special session of the legislature.

FOREST FIRES-OUR MOST SHAMEFUL WASTE

Everyone apparently fears fires but too many are careless with it. This is particularly true of fires in and near woodlands. Official figures show that more than 98 percent of all forest fires result from human carelessness and can be prevented. Consequently, we may say "Forest Fires are our most shameful waste".

Annual forest fire losses are tremendous and their effects far reaching. Such fires destroy the raw products of the forests, the protection forests provide for game and the supply of ground water. They upset local economies by drawing men from gainful employment and requiring the expenditure of public funds to extinguish them.

Our forest fire organization is doing a good job in keeping the size of fires small but the number of fires is increasing. In 1949 there were 100 more fires in New Hampshire than in 1948, but they burned 500 acres less. For the warden and his deputies to do the job they are capable of, they must have the cooperation of the public—YOU!

The primary objective of all fire fighters is PREVENTION—fire stoppage. This is the goal toward which your local forest fire warden and his deputies are constantly working. It can be achieved ONLY if YOU and YOU cooperate with them. It is worth YOUR effort and can be accomplished by:

- (1) Being careful with fire in or near woodland, being particularly careful with matches and cigarettes.
- (2) Securing the required written permit from the warden when the ground is not covered with snow.
- (3) Insisting that others be careful and comply with burning requirements,
- (4) Calling the warden promptly when fire is detected and aiding him to extinguish it.

Let's reduce the number of forest fires and eliminate our most shameful waste.
