Town Warrant

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Kingston in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Kingston on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act up the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$315.10, and the State will contribute \$2,100.66 for Class V highways, under the provisions of the T.R.A. so-called.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to continue the permanent construction of the New Boston Road..
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to continue the permanent construction of the Wadleigh Point Road.
- 6. On petition of Guy Amburg and others to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 to improve and extend the tarvia surface in part on the Cheney Mill road to the Danville line.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$3,000.00 plus interest to install a forced hot air heating system in the Town Hall. The above

sum and interest to be covered by a note extending over a period of four years payable one quarter annually.

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$2,000.00 plus interest to replace the existing wooden bridge located on the road leading to Great Pond Park crossing the Cheney Mill Pond outlet. The above sum and interest to be covered by a note extending over a period of four years payable one quarter annually.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$6,600.00 and the State will contribute the sum of \$4,400.00 for the expense of replacing the present wooden bridge located on the Little River Road at the lower end of Little River near the residence of H. H. Chick, with a cement bridge. The above sum of \$6,600.00 plus interest to be covered by a note extending over a period of four years payable one quarter annually.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$230.70 to purchase a fire-proof cabinet for the purpose of protecting the past and present records in the possession of the Town Clerk.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$200.00 for the purpose of spraying shade trees on Town property.
- 12. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow sums of money not exceeding \$15,000.00 in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current year and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town negotiable notes, the aforesaid notes to be paid during the current year from taxes collected during the year.
- 13. Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the revised Laws of the State of New Hampshire relating to playing games of Beano be adopted in this Town? (This article to be voted on by ballot.)

- 14. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to dispose of the following Town property at Public Auction or Private Sale; land and existing buildings situated on the southerly side on the Hunt Road bounded by land formerly of Primrose and Ezekiel Webster and Highway containing five acres more or less and formerly owned by Ferdinand Purlieus.
- 15. Vote to see if the Town will accept the Auditors' Report and the Town reports as printed.
- 16. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Report of Town Meeting, March 11, 1952

At 9:30 A.M. the Polls were declared open by the Moderator who read the Warrant. Voted that Polls be kept open until seven o'clock. After the polls were declared closed, the officers sorted ballots until eight o'clock when the meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Arthur P. Tucker who stated that as long as the Selectmen had not accepted his resignation and had ruled that he was still Moderator he would carry on.

Prayer was offered by Rev. Wendell Irvine.

The following was then quoted by J. Edward Stevens: Citizens of Kingston, it is a privilege to say these few words on behalf of your former Selectman, the late Vernon Lewis. Mr. Lewis worked hard and unceasingly for the Town. That, I know. The last work he did was for the Town. At our budget meeting he gave a three hour report of the town business. It can be truthfully said that Mr. Lewis did his best under all conditions. No man could do more.

Everyone stood one minute in silent prayer, in memory of the late Vernon Lewis.

Article 2. Motion made and seconded that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$83,135.18. Amendment made that appropriation be raised \$200.00. Amendment carried. Voted that \$83,335.18 be raised and appropriated.

Article 3. Voted that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$312.47 and the State will contribute \$2,083.12 for Class 5 Highways, under the provisions of the T. R. A. so called.

Article 4. Voted that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to continue the permanent construction of the New Boston Road.

Article 5. Voted that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to continue the permanent construction of Wadleigh Point Road.

- Article 6. Voted that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 to improve and extend the tarvia in part on the Cheney Mill Road to the Danville line in 1952.
- Article 7. Motion made and seconded that \$1,000.00 be raised and appropriated to continue permanent construction of the Shore Road. Motion not carried. Motion made and seconded that \$500.00 be raised and appropriated. Motion was carried.
- Article 8. Finance Committee recommends that a committee be appointed by the Moderator consisting of the Selectmen and two others to make further study and draft an article for the next Annual Town Warrant. This was made as a motion and seconded. Motion was carried.
- Article 9. Motion made that the unexpended balance of \$607.35 of the Fire Dept. appropriation of 1951 be applied to Article 9, the Town to raise and appropriate the balance of \$142.65. This motion was declared not legal according to law.

Voted that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 to plaster and finish the new Fire Station.

- Article 10. Voted that the town have a street light installed near the Wood Heel Shop on the Newton Junction Road and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- Article 11. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$622.00 to purchase a new Good Roads Model 701 Snow Plow with Moldboard Assembly for the Town Truck.
- Article 12. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$425.00 to purchase a new Model DD Highway Power Sander for the Town Truck.
- Article 13. Motion made and seconded that we do not adopt this article. Motion carried.

Article 14. Voted that the Selectmen and Town Treasurer be authorized to borrow sums of money not exceeding \$15,000.00 in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current year, and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town negotiable notes therefor, said notes to be paid during the current year from taxes collected during the year.

Article 15. This article relative to Beano was voted by ballot—Yes 233, No. 116.

Article 17. Motion made that this article be removed from the warrant. This motion was withdrawn and the following motion was made and seconded: That all Annual Town Meetings open at 10 A.M. and that the Polls close at 7 P.M. Motion was carried.

Article 16. Motion made and seconded that Auditors' Reports and Town Reports be accepted with correction that Town Charges be \$83,335.18. Motion was carried.

Article 18. Motion made that \$400.00 be appropriated to spray shade trees. Motion declared not legal. Motion made that: Whereas, the State of New Hampshire proposes Route 125 leading from Plaistow, N. H., to Kingston, N. H., and whereas, the relocation of Route 125 will involve the taking by the State of New Hampshire the location of two fire wells in the Town of Kingston, that the Selectmen be instructed and authorized to effect a cash settlement with the State of New Hampshire for the taking of these two wells and that money received be applied to the purchase of a new tank truck for the Kingston Fire Department, providing this action shall be legal and lawful in the opinion of the Attorney General of the State of New Hampshire. This motion was seconded but after much discussion the motion was withdrawn.

Voted that the Selectmen be empowered to carry out an Ordinance declaring that it is unlawful to establish a Commercial Trailer Park in Town.

Voted to return to Article 1.

Annual Report of The Fire Department

The department has responded to twenty eight calls, four of which were out of town.

It is very gratifying to report that insured property damage has been less than one hundred dollars. All other damages have been even less. The reason for this splendid record has been the complete cooperation between the citizens of our community and fire department together with efficient and courteous service of the central telephone office and staff.

It is the duty of your fire department not only to extinguish fires with the least possible damage to property, but it is also their duty to promote and aid in fire prevention. There is every indication that we will have a very dry Spring and we have observed that there are many stands of grass that were not cut last fall. These fields constitute a menace to the community, also the cut off woodland where the tops have not been burned present a like problem. Your fire department is ready to cooperate with you in removing this undesirable condition to the extent of controling the burning of these areas whenever conditions are favorable.

First obtain a **written permit** from the fire warden. Remember a verbal permit or a permit by telephone is worthless. If you kindle a fire in the open without a proper hearth or without a written permit from the fire warden of your district you are subject to fines and imprisonment. Damages may be assessed for any damages caused by said fire to the property of another. Robert Merrick is the State Fire Warden of Kingston. He can usually be reached at W. S. Clark & Sons garage or at his home which is the first house above the garage.

We wish to express our thanks and appreciation to the Lions Club of Kingston for their gift of a ressusitator to the town of Kingston. It has already saved two lives and we feel that this equipment, so generously given to the town of Kingston has made the department more efficient in the protection of life and property of the community. Donald Clark is the officer in charge of the Rescue Squad. In case of an emergency where this equipment is needed, call the fire department as in case of fire and give details to the operator.

Again we wish to acknowledge the support of the Ladies Auxiliary. The Firemen's Association and the citizens of the town of Kingston without your cooperation and encouragement there would be no fire department in the town of Kingston.

We also wish to express our sincere thanks to Eleanor Martin and her staff at the telephone office for her helpful and efficent service in connection with the department.

Report of Building Committee

Irving W. Hersey of Durham, the architect for the original building, was hired by the building committee to supervise the construction of the addition. Willard M. March of Rochester, N. H., was the low bidder at \$40,598.00 but minor changes were necessary to bring the price down to \$38,759.30. These changes did not cheapen the construction of the building. The cost of the coat racks, movable library tables, finished hardware and electric light fixtures were taken out of the contract but it was the obligation of the contractor to install them. Mr. Hersey's fee was dropped from 6 per cent to \$2,000.00. The painting was left in the contract with \$700.00 set aside as a cash allowance. The \$41,000.00 was raised by bonds through the Day Trust Co. of Boston at 1% payable annually for ten years.

When the roofing contractor put on the shingles we discovered he was installing a lighter weight shingle than the specifications called for. The building committee met with the architect and contractor and after a survey of the addition we settled for the following cash adjustment.

Next fall we will be forced to use the auditorium as a classroom. Another two-room addition will be necessary before the first addition is paid for. With increased activity at the proposed air base it is possible that some federal help will be available. Kingston's cost of education has been high during this transition period from four to eight classrooms. When this transition is completed, Kingston could experience an increase in population of 20 per cent without noticeable costs.

Superintendent's Report

To the School Board and Citizens of Kingston:

It is with pleasure that I submit this my third annual, report as your Superintendent of schools.

Two years ago Kingston wisely and courageously took steps to solve the problem of overcrowding in the Bakie School. By adding one teacher and two new rooms, the school district was able to maintain the high educational standards for which it has been known down through the years. The combined factors of a good school system, families with children moving into houses that formerly were childless, the availability of good building lots, nearness to Massachusetts, and nearness to sea-coast area; having contributed to the rapid growth in school population. It seems that a problem is no sooner solved than another develops. The following table will give an indication of the problem that faces your school board and Superintendent for 1953–54.

At present the 5th and 6th grades and the 7th and 8th grades are combined, but a glance at the above table will show that it would be a physical impossibility to crowd 55 pupils into one room saying nothing of what it would do to the teaching situation. Further study will indicate that grades 7 and 8 are the only two that can be combined and still kept within reasonable size. This being the case, the only solution appears to be the addition of another teacher for grade 6 and moving the combined 7th and 8th grades back into the auditorium.

TEACHERS

Mr. Eugene Haight, K.T.C. "51" as Principal to replace Mrs. Isabel Magnusson who resigned to take a much deserved rest. Mr. Haight comes to us with one years' experience in the Nashua elementary schools and is not only doing a fine job in carrying on the high educational standards established by Mrs. Magnusson, but has done much in expanding the opportunities for participation in athletics by the boys and girls of Bakie School.

Miss Rosemary Leombruno, Boston Conservatory of Music "52" to replace Miss Anne-Marie O'Shea who resigned to marry. Miss Leombruno's background in music lends itself especially well to our music group.

Mr. John Scanlan, U.N.H. 1946 with advanced work in guidance at Boston University as Director of Guidance, Supervisory Union No. 14. Mr. Scanlan holds a Special Degree in Guidance and is getting the program off to a very encouraging start.

HOT LUNCH

The hot lunch program continues to be highly successful both from the viewpoint of organization as well as pupil participation. An abundance of well prepared nourishing food is a far cry from the day when we carried cold sandwiches and hard boiled eggs. The acquisition of a larger dishwasher has been a definite improvement in the efficiency of getting the work done in a reasonable time. Here we have

a good example of how smoothly a lunch program can be run when you have close cooperation between school board, P.T.A. and teachers.

TESTING AND GUIDANCE

The testing program in grades 4-6-8 has been carried on under the supervision of John Scanlan, Director of Guidance for the Supervisory Union. Close cooperation between the teachers and Mr. Scanlan has made this program that much more meaningful. Mr. Scanlan is trained in the administration and interpretation of the tests and welcomes an opportunity to sit down with teachers and parents to discuss pupil problems. Because of this the tests have become an intergral part of the guidance program. Mr. Scanlan's report follows so I will say no more than that the program is getting off to a very fine start.

DENTAL CLINIC

Through the cooperation of Dr. Shirley Dyer of the State Department of Health, your Superintendent was able to acquire the services of a dental technician who has cleaned and fluoridized the teeth of all those children in grades 1 and 2 whose parents requested it to be done. This was done at no expense other than serving the technician with a hot lunch. It was planned that a dentist would be made available through the mobile dental unit, but demand for its services has shortened its stay in this Supervisory Union.

As part of this report, you will find a page devoted to Return of District Revenue, which shows the actual budget we are operating on for 1952-53.

Finally, I wish to express my appreciation to the school board, citizens, teachers and pupils of Kingston for their cooperation and friendliness. It has made my work in Kingston very pleasant.

Report of Music Teacher

To the Superintendent and School Board, Citizens of Kingston:

More than one hundred years ago, when music was first introduced in the public schools, the main accent in education was on the three R's.

Today, so much has been added to the elementary and secondary school curriculum; health, physical education, art, reading, arithmetic, science, thrift, character education, safety, dramatics, good citizenship, social studies and last but not least; music.

The aims of every music teacher are to obtain an appreciation and love of good music leading to the cultural development on the part of the child and to train the child in habits of concentration and thinking. We want all our children to love good music, to be intelligent when they sing or play or listen to music and we want each boy and girl to be given abundant opportunity for learning to sing or play or listen in accordance with the dictates of his inclination and capacity as an individual.

Music is primarily a group activity and is accomplished through songs, rhythms, records, games, folk dancing, rhythm bands and tonette groups of which all the children have participated in and enjoyed. We have experimented with square dancing in the first and second grades and found them to be done successfully and needless to say, the children have enjoyed them as much as their rhythm bands.

I feel that the music program in our schools, is running along very good lines, but couldn't be accomplished without the aid, help and encouragement received from the teachers, parents and students and so my sincere thanks to you all.

Guidance Director's Report

To the Superintendent of Schools, Members of the School Board and Citizens of Kingston:

It gives me great pleasure to present my first annual report as Director of Guidance.

In these first few months a good start has been made in laying the foundation for a high grade program of guidance services for the pupils in grades one through eight. Under the supervision of Mr. Ramsay and working with the help and advice of Mr. Radasch, New Hampshire State Director of Guidance, the University of New Hampshire Guidance Department, and the Boston University Guidance Department; short term and long term objectives for the program were formulated.

A survey was made during the first week in September during which time the teachers in all grades were seen and asked in what way the guidance program could best meet the needs of their pupils. After this information was tabulated and analyzed, we set up our objectives.

The first objective for these early months was to set up an individual inventory for each pupil in the 8th grade. These pupils are faced with an immediate and important choice in their planning for a career, and more than any grade these pupils need guidance immediately. An individual inventory is an inventory of the pupil's assets and liabilities in the physical, mental, social, emotional, and spiritual areas of life. Over the years, this will be a record of his or her growth in these areas as well as a very specific analytical record of his growth in the educational skills. An important part of the inventory is the results of the University of New Hampshire battery of tests covering ability, in-

terests, aptitudes, and personality. This first objective has been accomplished.

Using the inventory as a basis we are now in the process of counseling and guiding these 8th grade students in their next important step, their choice of an occupation for which they will start preparing in their four years of high school work.

In the process of the carrying through of this part of the program, 22 visits have been made to the school. Each of the 8th grade pupils has been counseled individually at least twice. Each of these students will be counseled individually at least twice more before June, or as many more times as is necessary in order that it is as certain as we can make it that he or she is making the proper choice.

It is necessary that these pupils should know what they can expect in their chosen occupation as far as the kind and amount of training necessary, personal requirements, aptitudes, special abilities required, salary, opportunities for advancement, etc. is concerned. This information will be given them. An occupational information file is being set up. At the present time information on approximately 1100 different jobs is available. This file will be expanded to cover every possible need. We will make use, too, of the facilities of the State Library in Concord, through the cooperation of Mrs. Merrick of the Kingston Library.

With the cooperation of the teachers, the University of New Hampshire tests have been given. These standardized tests compare our pupils with thousands of other pupils in the same grade in the United States. Twenty-one 8th grade students were tested on twenty-one different attributes of personality. These tests are of immeasurable value in guilding students into the proper educational and vocational fields. Thirty-three 4th grade pupils and 17 6th grade pupils were tested on ten attributes of personality and growth in twenty-six educational skills. The attributes scores are valuable in diagnosing for the guidance of these pupils and the

growth in the educational skills scores are of great value in aiding the teacher to see those skills in which the pupil needs more help. Six individual tests were given to pupils upon whom certain specific information was needed so that factors which were slowing down their progress might be brought to light and rectified.

A chart is being set up which will show the types of job opportunities in the Kingston Area, the immediate vicinity of Kingston, Exeter, Haverhill, etc. the not too-distant areas, Portsmouth, Somersworth, etc. the distant areas, of the state and other states. Before the year is completed the 8th grade students will be given a short intensive course in "Choosing A Career". In other words, they will be given every possible aid so that they will be pointed toward the position for which their abilities, aptitudes, and personality fit them.

A follow-up study of our graduates and drop-outs will be made in order to evaluate the success of our school training and guidance program. When the 8th grade students have been properly served by the guidance program an individual inventory will be set up for each pupil in each grade, starting with the first. This inventory will follow the child from grade to grade. At present our testing program starts in at the 4th grade. We would like to extend this down to the first grade.

A very important part of any guidance program is the help which a counselor can give to those pupils who are not adjusting well to the school and who are not making the progress of which they are capable. Through tests and counseling interviews, it is very often possible to find the reason for the pupil's poor progress and to help him or her, so that they may be happier in school and able to take advantage of its benefits. The success other guidance programs have had in this particular area have been quite remarkable. Six Kingston students are being helped in this way.

An adult education course in the training of children

and the proper handling of their problems has been given in February and another will follow in the spring, if there is a call. When school closes in June, the facilities of the guidance office will be available to out-of-school members of the community. It is hoped that many adults will take advantage of its testing, counseling, and consultation services.

I feel that we have made an excellent start and look forward to great accomplishments in the remainder of this year and next.
