INAUGURAL ADDRESS

OF MAYOR JARED ALONZO GREENE, MARCH 25, 1902,

Gentlemen of the Council:

For a second time it is my proud privilege to stand before you as the unanimous choice of our people for mayor.

I fully appreciate the high honor and am not unmindful of the many responsibilities accompanying the exalted distinction.

The cycle of time has brought the closing year of the first decade of the existence of Laconia as a city. During the year just passed our community has met with an irreparable loss by the death of several prominent and progressive citizens. The state has been forever deprived of the valuable advice and agreeable companionship of our highly respected first mayor and ex-governor, while the nation has been called upon to mourn the tragic fate of a martyred president.

Notwithstanding these deeply lamented and sadly unfortunate occurrences, our country enjoys the blessings of peace and prosperity, our state continues to be most excellently and satisfactorily governed and our city pursues the even tenor of its way with much to be thankful for and more prospectively.

The continued good health of our people is a matter for much congratulation. Our various industries continue their fairly satisfactory progress while our bankers and merchants find nothing upon which to base complaint. I make bold to venture the assertion that Laconia will experience marked and pronounced improvement and advancement during the coming year. Already your mayor has been importuned regarding the number of skilled mechanics, teams and laborers our city can furnish to work on the construction and grounds of the new state institution which will, in the near future, grandly ornament our northern suburb. Our electric road is about to be improved and extended and several important manufacturing concerns are considering our advantages with a view of location.

The Fair association will place before the people next fall an exhibition on a scale of grandeur never before attempted in a community of our size, thus calling the attention of outsiders to Laconia, as well as furnishing agreeable, profitable, instructive amusement and recreation to our own citizens.

A most valuable addition to our city from an artistic and educational standpoint is the imposing and welcome public library now rapidly approaching completion. Its value and benefits to both old and young cannot be overestimated. The widening of Church street, the removal of the North church and the erection of a soldiers' monument on the lot tendered by the B. & M. R. R. company would greatly enhance the beauty and increase the attractiveness of the library and surroundings, but just how this much desired result can be obtained, is a question as vet unanswered, a problem as yet unsolved. That this public improvement is inevitable no one will attempt to deny, still, the prosecution of the matter under its present status would necessarily produce a long train of complications far-reaching in effect and uncertain in results. I hesitate about offering any suggestions or making any recommendations.

Our finances for the year just passed, show a healthy condition. We have not only confined our disbursements

to the appropriation, but have effected settlements of several law suits, and have liquidated old bills to the amount of over two thousand dollars. Through the careful, energetic and persistent efforts of the former city solicitor, the Gold street law suits have been decided in our favor. We have also paid for the Main street bridge and reduced our bonded debt three thousand dollars without extra appropriations.

In this connection I will take the liberty of affirming that the so-called sewer debt is not a burdensome incumberance, but rather a most valuable investment of a permanent character, the material benefit of which we are receiving year after year.

The system is of much greater value than its cost, is the property, or assets, of the city and well represents the outlay. The life of the sewers will long out last the life of the bonds. Ever since Laconia assumed the dignity of a city, there has been carried on the books, what purports to be an available asset in the shape of the "Gilford tax list." I have looked into this matter and find the account worthless. I do not consider it good business policy to carry meaningless figures on the books, or to allow old bills to remain unpaid at the end of the year for the sake of making a favorable showing. I recommend that the account be charged off.

That there exists a pressing need for a new central fire station no one will deny, and you will be called upon to immediately consider this matter. I have inspected the present building and, to say the least, it does not meet the requirements of the department. Our city has the best equipment procurable with the means at command and the highest efficiency of service that is obtainable with our yearly appropriation. Consideration for public safety and well-being demands a modern up-to-date structure, in which to house a portion of the men, the horses, machines and fire extinguishing pharaphernalia.

I have given myself the pleasure of making extended visits to our schools and I pronounce them inferior to none. I unhesitatingly affirm that, with our proficient and painstaking instructors and our bright, intelligent children, we should furnish to all, the comforts, safety and necessities of a well lighted, thoroughly ventilated school building, equipped with modern sanitary arrangements.

With this object in view a new building for the accommodation of the little folks now attending the Chase block and the People's church schools, as well as for the wee tots who will see the inside of a schoolroom for the first time this fall, seems an absolute necessity and should receive your careful consideration. The amount now paid for rentals would go far towards payment of interests on the cost of the schoolhouse now needed, and I recommend its construction so as to be ready for occupancy next fall.

A reliable and faithful standing army is the best conservator of the peace of a nation. In like manner is a thorough and proficient police force the best safeguard and protection against wrong doing. It is far preferable to prevent crime than to punish criminals. Our city has become almost immune from major crimes because of the most excellent discernment and judgment of our commissioners, the stern but well merited justice meted out by our police judge and the well-known watchfulness and faithfulness of our chief and his officers, which facts are noted among the professional criminal class, who very considerately avoid our city.

Agreeable to my suggestion last year the so-called Folsom park property has been deeded back to its original owner. There was no unpleasantness manifested by anyone interested in the matter. The council felt that it would be injudicious to comply with the terms imposed and Mr. Folsom, thoroughly understanding the

situation, received his property in the same friendly spirit that it was tendered. Laconia is fortunate in being in the very centre of a vast natural park, whose magnitude and grandeur is not exceeded in the known world.

I desire to thank the councilmen most heartily whose term of office expires today, for their universal kindness towards me during the past year. In all our deliberations the utmost harmony prevailed, the minority always accepting the decision of the majority gracefully, pleasantly and philosophically. This is as it should be and I part with you, gentlemen, officially, with feelings of deep regret. To the new members I extend hearty and kindly greetings and the right hand of friendship.

In conclusion, gentlemen of the council, I can but believe that the experience of the old members during the past year will lend added knowledge to our work in the year to come, which will re-act to the benefit of all; and that every energy will be directed so as to conduce to the well-being of our people and the prosperity of our city.

When bills are certified to as above, and left with the city clerk not later than Thursday, at 12 o'clock m., preceding the last Monday of each month, they will be audited by the committee on accounts and claims, and if approved by them and allowed by the council, will be ready for payment on the following Wednesday, at the office of the city treasurer.

Meetings of the committee on accounts and claims are held on the Friday preceding the last Monday of each month, at 7.30 o'clock p. m., at the city clerk's office.

ORDINANCES.

CITY OF LACONIA.—In the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and two.

An Ordinance in amendment of "An ordinance in amendment of an ordinance" passed June 26, 1894, entitled "An ordinance fixing the salary and compensation of certain officers" passed May 3, 1897.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Laconia, as follows:

That section 2 of an ordinance in amendment of an ordinance passed June 26, 1894, entitled "An ordinance fixing the salary and compensation of certain officers," which was passed May 3, 1897, be amended so that said section shall read as follows:

Section 2. That section 2 of said ordinance be amended by striking out the entire section and inserting in place thereof the following: That the Board of Health shall be paid the sum of two hundred dollars per annum in full for the services of the entire Board, which sum shall be divided among the members of the Board as follows: The member from Laconia proper, one hundred and twenty-five dollars, the member from Lakeport, so called, fifty dollars, and the member from the Weirs, so called, twenty-five dollars.

CITY OF LACONIA.—In the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and two.

An Ordinance for the licensing of cabmen, hack drivers, and any and all persons carrying passengers for hire in said city.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Laconia, as follows:

That no person shall drive or conduct any cab, hack, wagon, carriage, or other vehicle, as owner thereof, for the carriage or transportation of passengers for hire in or upon any street, public way, wharf or square in said city, unless a license in writing shall first be obtained from the Mayor and City Council.

- 2. Every person shall pay for such license, for the use of the city, the sum of one dollar in full for the conveyance or conveyances used by him for the purposes aforesaid. Such license shall extend for the term of one year from the date thereof, and shall be forfeited upon conviction of any improper or unlawful conduct by the licensee or his servant in the management of said conveyance or conveyances.
- 3. The violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by fine, not exceeding ten dollars.
- 4. It shall be the duty of the City Marshal to see that the provisions of this Ordinance are enforced.

CONTRACT

BETWEEN THE CITY OF LACONIA AND THE LACONIA ELECTRIC LIGHTING COMPANY MODIFYING THE CONTRACT OF APRIL 1, 1899.

This agreement made this 28th day of July, 1902, between the City of Laconia, a municipal corporation situated in the county of Belknap and state of New Hampshire, acting by its Mayor, J. A. Greene, and Warren L. Thompson, Cleophas L. Fecteau, John H. B. Clow, standing committee of the City Council of said City of Laconia on lighting streets, said Mayor and Committee being agents of said city duly authorized by vote of said City Council to make and execute a contract for and in behalf of it for the furnishing of the street lighting as hereinafter mentioned, of the first part, and the Laconia Electric Lighting Company, a corporation duly established by law and having its place of business at said Laconia, of the second part,

WITNESSETH, The said party of the first part for the consideration hereinafter mentioned agrees for itself, its successors and assigns, that the contract hereinbefore entered into by the said City of Laconia and the Laconia Electric Lighting Company on the first day of April, 1899, for the lighting of streets of said city may be and is hereby modified and amended by striking out of said contract the following clause, to wit, "not less than five (5) 16 candle power incandescent lights at one dollar (\$1.00) per month each; not less than two (2) 25 candle power incandescent lights at one dollar and fifty cents (\$1.50) per month each; and not less than three (3) 32 candle power incandescent lights at two dollars (\$2.00)

per month each," and to substitute in place thereof the following:—"Not less than ten (10) 25 candle power incandescent lights at one dollar and fifty cents (\$1.50) per month each." So that said contract as amended shall read in relation to incandescent lighting as follows:

"And the said party of the second part, for the further consideration hereinafter mentioned, agrees for itself, its successors and assigns, at its own expense, to provide and maintain in the public streets, squares, alleys and lanes in said city at such points in said city as the Mayor and standing committee on lighting streets may designate, the following incandescent lights, and at the specified prices, viz: not less than ten (10) 25 candle power incandescent lights at one dollar and fifty cents (\$1.50) per month each. And the said party of the second part further covenants and agrees that it will furnish incandescent electric lighting for the city offices in Masonic Temple, said city furnishing all lamp renewals, without making any charge therefor to said city during the term of this contract."

SCHOOL DEPARTMENT.

REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION.

To the Citizens of Laconia:

Instead of appealing for more school houses, as for many years past, the Board of Education congratulates itself and all the citizens upon the completion of two four-room school buildings, one at each end of the city, amply sufficient for the present needs of all pupils. For the schoolhouse at Lakeport a most excellent site was already at hand. The building at the Laconia end of the city was needed for the children of the ever growing section near Jewett and Pine hills. The Board of Education feels that that the place selected, at the corner of Batchelder and Pine streets, is a most excellent one, lying, as it does, between the Gilford avenue and Bowman street schools and on land so high that its light and air can never be cut of by adjoining buildings. It is hoped that all citizens who have not already done so will visit one of these new schoolhouses, and that all will read the more detailed description contained in Mr. Blaisdell's report. It may be added that where new seats were necessary they are of such a style that the height of both desk and seat can be varied to suit the individual pupil.

In the old buildings no changes have been made, except the addition recently of two new radiators to the upper rooms of the Harvard street schoolhouse; it is believed that with their aid not only will these rooms

have plenty of heat but the amount of coal needed for this building will be lessened.

It was thought best in the fall to make temporary arrangements while waiting for the new buildings, as it was not known at just what time they would be completed. Quarters were hired, therefore, at Lakeport, for two schools, while the two schools formerly in the People's church were accommodated in the High school building and extra sessions for the primary pupils were held in the Bowman street schoolhouse. These arrangements were, of course, more or less unsatisfactory, but it was hoped at the time that the inconvenience would last for only a month or two.

It can be easily seen that for this financial year little saving in rent was possible, as no change was made before the summer vacation, and two rooms had to be hired at Lakeport from September until February. The fuel problem has also been a troublesome one. At this time the bins are usually filled with enough coal to last the remainder of the season, but this year wood and coal are being bought from day to day in small quantities at high prices. Several of the schools were fortunate in having several tons of hard coal left from last year's supply. In considering the expenses for another year it must be remembered also that the heating of the new buildings will be much more expensive than that of the old stove-heated rooms.

This year, as Mr. Blaisdell tells you in his report, we have been able to buy what was absolutely necessary for daily use, but no more. Every business man or householder knows that, if necessary, expenses can be kept down for a few months or for a year at lower than the normal, but that if this method is kept up for year after year the plant or the estate inevitably loses in value, so that the loss is much more than the temporary gain. It is trusted that the old appropriation of \$23,000 will be

restored to us, as it is none too much for the proper management of the schools, if their work and equipment are to improve rather than to deteriorate. The tax-payers can feel sure that under the watchful eye of Mr. Blaisdell every dollar will be expended to the best advantage.

The reports of the superintendent of schools and of the principal of the High school follow and will be found of interest to all.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

To the Board of Education:

With this my sixth annual report I have the satisfaction to announce what is by far the most important item in the school history of the city for the year, the completion and occupancy of two model, 4-room, brick school buildings. The Batchelder street house fills a long felt want inasmuch as it furnishes us accommodations whereas before we have had only rented quarters. building was first used Monday, Jan. 19, 1903. Washington street house takes the place of a 2-room building formerly occupying the same lot and was opened for the schools Monday, Feb. 2nd, 1903. The ninth grade from Mechanic street and the pupils from School street occupy rooms in the building. By this arrangement the new house is fully occupied and by a transfer of the Pear street school to Mechanic street, two unsanitary buildings are given up, and the children at Lakeport are taken care of in the two four-room buildings, the one on the East side and the other on the West side of the river.

These two new buildings are identical in every respect, having been built from the same plans. They are designed to meet modern ideas of school house architecture in which a study has been made of light effects, heating, ventilation and sanitation. In these respects our new school houses are fully up to the best standard requirements and only need to be seen by those familiar with school architecture to be appreciated. They are substantial while not elaborate and honest material entered into their construction.

I think it desirable that fewer changes take place during the year to come. Fully one-third of our teachers are new to us and can not do as good work from the very nature of the case as the teachers who have been longer with us. We have lost teachers whose places it has been hard to fill.

The school work, as a whole, throughout the city has been satisfactory, and whatever failure there may have been to reach the standard to which I aspire, I attribute to inexperience and other causes more or less incident to natural reasons consequent to the many changes in the teaching force. It seems best that a teacher should know her pupils, their parents and have some general knowledge of the locality in which she works. Good teaching and kindly relations between pupils and teachers are the prime essentials in the life of a school.

The schools have faults of course, and plenty of them. But there are none more desirous to remedy them than the teachers and school officials. Just and kindly criticism from those who maintain the schools is welcomed because it is helpful. Schools need to be supervised from all points of view and their administration based upon the knowledge thus obtained. Pupils see from one point of view, teachers and superintendent from another, the Board of Education perhaps from another, and the parents and general public from still another; and due attention should be given in administering them to the observations and experience of all these parties, for they are all interested ones and have a right to have their opinions given proper consideration.

The schools have been given all the ordinary supplies necessary and no niggardly course has been pursued in the purchase of material used for the conduct of our work. This has been true of all the commonly used articles, but quite an outlay might well be made in the purchase of more reference books, maps, etc. But notwithstanding this, infinitely more depends upon the teacher than all books or charts. It is not sufficient for pupils to be brought into contact with the mere instruments of knowledge, but the more vital educational influence springs from the personality of the teacher and it is absolutely necessary that this personality be present and that it be of just the right kind.

HIGH SCHOOL.

The Legislature of New Hampshire in session in 1901 passed an act relating to High schools. Section I, is as follows: "Any town not maintaining a High school or school of corresponding grade, shall pay for the tuition of any child, who with parents or guardian resides in said town, and who attends a High school or Academy in the same or another town or city in this state, and the parent or guardian of such child shall notify the school board of the district in which he resides of the High school or Academy which he has determined to attend." There are five other sections in this act, stating the requirements

of the approved High school and the obligation of every town to furnish free High school privileges to every boy or girl in the state free of expense to the pupil and at the expense of the town or city in which he or she resides. This compels every town to maintain a High school of at least a four year course or to pay the tuition of all its pupils of High school grade elsewhere in a similar school. This makes the High school a necessity and not a luxury.

Our city maintains a High school approved by the Department of Public Instruction of the state and meets our own needs and also has come to be freely patronized by the people of the surrounding towns. Yet only a beginning has been made which I think bids fair to become quite a feature. Pupils graduating from our grammar schools pass easily into the work of the High school and unless they are of low grade scholarship find no trouble in doing the work required. Pupils coming from the common schools of the neighboring towns are in many instances taking a year's work in our ninth grades preparatory to the High school course as it is impossible for them to pass the entrance examinations for the High school. Our tuition pupils are nearly always deficient in music and drawing and nearly as bad off in Botany and English. Their work has been ungraded and hence very uneven and while they may be very good in one or two subjects are so deficient in others that it becomes very doubtful about their doing the required grade of work in the High school. We have always advised such pupils to take up their work in such of our grammar grades as seem best for them and many are now doing so intending to enter the High school when prepared.

Our High school is doing a good work and while it is not as large as I might wish, it is graduating somewhat larger classes from year to year. The reports that come to me from the colleges at which our graduates to the

number of eight are pursuing their education are gratifying to us and if I were at liberty to give them to the public, they would be a conclusive proof that the training given here is of a substantial nature.

The report of Principal E. W. Butterfield deserves a careful reading.

I wish to call attention also to the reports of Miss Nelson, Mr. Osgood and Mr. Scott, who are doing all they can for the interest of the schools in their respective fields. I have no doubt the latter finds himself embarassed by lack of help as it is now necessary for one officer to cover the work of the entire city, which I regard a matter of difficulty and were it not for the efficiency of officer Jas. B. Fernald I fear our truancy service would become impaired.

Before closing my report I beg leave to make the following suggestions.

That a barge be purchased or other covered vehicle for the comfortable transportation of the six or eight children of the Oaks school district instead of opening the school there again. Children in such numbers should be properly provided for so that they may be both safe and protected from the weather both in summer and winter, especially as many of them are small.

Mechanic street and Gilford avenue school buildings should each receive a coat of paint, and some repairs should be made upon the interior of the High school building in the nature of varnishing, etc., as nothing of this kind has ever been done since it was built seventeen years ago. More radiator surface is needed in room 12 and the principal's office as they are both improperly heated in the colder weather. New desks should be provided for the school at The Weirs. This should certainly be attended to. Concrete walks and borders should be constructed at the new school houses as soon as the work can be done properly in the spring. Among other things.

I would like to suggest that the election of teachers be held earlier in the future so that vacancies from resignation or otherwise may be filled while teachers are more easily to be found and perhaps visited at their work, rather than to have such matters drag through the summer vacation giving the committee on vacancies endless trouble oftentimes ending with unsatisfactory selections.

As purchasing agent of your board it has always been my aim to confine the school expenses if possible to the appropriation of the City Council together with the money received for tuition. I must confess that this has been no easy matter and I wish to express the hope that we may next year have our usual appropriation of \$23,000.

I wish to acknowledge my indebtedness to the Board of Education, teachers and the public in general for the uniform kindness I have enjoyed at their hands.

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL OF HIGH SCHOOL.

Mr. J. H. Blaisdell, Superintendent of Schools.

SIR:—I herewith submit this my first report as Principal of the Laconia High School. It would be unseemly for one who has been in your city for so short a time to speak with decision upon the condition of your school or to report its progress for the year.

I wish in place of such an attempt to express to you and through you to the citizens the amount and nature of the home study required for the successful prosecution of High school work. The High school attempts to train for life and its labors. For the pupil the school is the place of business just as truly as the store is for the merchant. The school work must take precedence over all other tasks and pleasures, if success is to be won, Upon graduation our young people will enter stores or offices where the day's work is from eight to ten hours. If we require much less than this in school we are not preparing them to bear the burden of their later labors. Our school day is of five hours. It is difficult to give the amount of additional home study that is needed, for this will vary with the maturity of the individual and with his method of work. For successful results each High school pupil must do some studying at his home every day. The average amount needed for the Freshman class will be two hours daily and this should increase to at least three in his Senior year.

Upon this point I hope that all parents will cooperate with the High school teachers and will feel assured that if the amount be less than two hours per day. their child is falling short of obtaining the full benefit that the High school presents. If the amount of the home study become excessive it may be due to several causes:

- (a) The lessons may be too long; and we will be on the alert to see that this is seldom the case.
- (b) The pupil may have some physical disability; and parents should be especially watchful to see that the eyes are not injured and in case of doubt to consult a trained occulist, for every school contains those whose whole school work suffers from faulty vision.
- (c) He may be in too high a class; and in this case promotion ought not to follow. Parents regard it as a great misfortune when a child fails of promotion. It is seldom so. A premature promotion is an injury to the child and a wrong to his associates. An injury to him in that lack of preparation enables him to obtain little from his year's work; a wrong to his class because all must travel at the rate of the slowest. Lack of promotion may make all succeeding work easy for the child when otherwise he would have been dragged along at the foot of his class from year to year. The natural parental desire to push the child along with all possible rapidity is not for the pupil's best interest. The question we must ask each year is: Can this pupil do well the work of the next year? and if the answer be in the negative, for his own interest and for the school's interest he should be retained.
- (d) The child does not know how to study; and here I think we have come upon the chief difficulty that confronts us, and here, too, parents and teachers must work together. We will try to teach right methods at school and the parent must oversee the home study. In this, regularity and concentration are of the greatest value. The pupil should have an allotted time for study and this should be observed with the same regularity as

the meals. This study should be whole-souled and hearty, a time when the entire world is shut out and the one aim is the mastery of the lesson. Often the pupil sits in the room with the family, he joins in the conversation from time to time, he stops to pet the cat, to read the Youth's Companion, to eat a lunch, and at bed time he thinks that he has studied three or four hours; in reality he has not worked for 20 consecutive minutes. He should have a quiet corner to himself but danger is here if he allows his mind to wander to some expected treat or occupation. The chief aim of the school is to learn to study without the mind wandering, and pupils can not acquire this power without the aid of the home.

I feel that I should mention one other cause which in many cases diminishes the value of the school experience. Some of our pupils have too many interests upon their minds. It may be that the social and athletic features of school life are made of first importance. These have their value; but they should supplement the regular school work and in no sense supplant it. Parents will do well to deny to their children participation in these pleasures unless the reports show that the school work is well done. Every teacher has the experience that comes to us from time to time. Some parent complains that his child is over-worked, but upon questioning we find that the boy has been out nearly or every evening in the week. It is no wonder that such a one feels "nervous" and depressed in school and takes no interest in his work. I doubt if a growing boy is able to do full justice to himself at school if he is out more than one evening during the week.

I wish also to take this opportunity to express my idea of the value of certain studies. Parents and pupils frequently ask me "What good does it do to study Latin, or geometry or some like study? They will never be used after graduation. We want something practical."

What studies are practical? The art and practice of sawing wood would certainly be practical, but no one advises that it be placed upon our curriculum, for sawing wood does not produce mental growth. A man might saw wood for a decade and at the end he would be fitted for no other labor.

In our childhood days we learned at school, I suppose, certain facts about South Africa. These facts we have long ago forgotten and, perhaps, it is fortunate that this is so, for much that we learned is not now true. In arithmetic we did examples in bank discount that we can not do now. Does this mean that geography and arithmetic did us no good? I think not, for while we were learning that lesson in geography, while we were forcing that answer in arithmetic, we were learning lessons in industry, self-reliance, self-control, patience and exactness. Lessons, that we have never forgotten, but are using daily. We were gaining ability for future use, not acquiring facts. We are in school not so much to gain knowledge as to gain power. Those studies, then, are practical which teach the great cardinal virtues just mentioned. If geometry teaches exactness and self reliance is it not of more value than a study that is simply interesting? As it seems to me that mathematics and the languages will produce these virtues in a superior way, I regard them as most practical studies.

I wish that we might send a greater number of our graduates to the colleges, and believe that it would be greatly to the advantage of many of our young people to consider seriously the college question. It is frequently the case that parents have a cherished purpose to give a higher education to their child, but keep the aspiration a secret for fear that "something may happen." This is unfortunate, for the teachers should know the family plans from the outset if they are to prepare for the work of the college.

Upon all of the matters outlined above, I wish that there could be more frequent consultations between parents and teachers. I am always at my office at the close of each day's session and will be glad to consider then with parents the school work and plans of our pupils. With my associates, I shall be ready to co-operate with parents in a broad education for those in our charge; for our attempt is not to teach Latin and algebra alone but to prepare for life's duties. Our aim will be that which Kipling ascribes to his teachers:

"For they taught us common sense— Tried to teach us common sense— Truth and God's Own Common Sense Which is more than knowledge."

I would recommend that Room 12 be provided with some more adequate method of heating before another winter, that during the summer vacation permanent seats replace the temporary ones in Room 11, and that the corridors and part of the rooms be recalcimined. Two additions to the school equipment would add largely to our efficiency, a duplicating machine for printing examination papers and notices, and a stereopticon for the hall. This could be used almost daily for illustrating history, science and the languages. There is also an urgent need that in the near future a room be set apart for laboratory in physics.

I have found my associate teachers helpful and efficient and I wish to express to them as to all others who have the best interests of the school at heart—school officials, pupils, and citizens in general—my thanks for continued courtesy and ready co-operation.

REPORT OF MUSIC TEACHER.

Mr. J. H. Blaisdell, Superintendent of Schools:

In submitting my annual report there is nothing radically new to mention. The work has been carried on along the same lines as were followed last year. In my report last year I mentioned a plan which was being tried in the first grades on Bowman street and Gilford avenue. The results were such that I have felt warranted in adopting it in all the first grades, and the first series of charts have given place to a series of carefully arranged exercises covering the first year's work in school. A certain number of these exercises are placed on the black-board by the regular teacher and after the lesson has been sung they are erased. By so doing each day's work is absolutely new and greater independence is gained in reading new music. I should be pleased to have you visit us and judge for yourselves.

In April of last year the High school chorus sang the cantata "Ruth," assisted by five of the best soloists in our state. One press notice of the affair said "they sang with the vim of trained singers." Another said, "viewed from the benefit derived from participating in a work of the kind, to the youthful performers of the chorus and viewed as such by their friends, the performance of 'Ruth' by the High school students and assisting artists should be classed as one of the pleasant and profitable annals, musically of the current year." The patronage was not all that could be hoped for but the work was of positive benefit to the students as was proven by the manner in which they took up their music for commencement.

We are well supplied with books and that with the hearty co-operation of the regular teacher has enabled us to place ourselves on more advanced ground than we occupied one year ago.

PUBLIC LIBRARIES.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES.

To the City Council:

The trustees submit the report of the treasurer covering the receipts and expenditures of cash for the year.

The reports of the librarians herewith submitted give the usual facts and tables as to the use of the libraries and other valuable matter.

The money in the hands of the treasurer has been kept back in anticipation of the urgent need which the opening of the new building will create in expense of moving, of assorting out worn-out books which must be replaced by purchase of duplicates, the re-binding of such worn books as can be retained and the purchase of as large a number of new books as possible, together with many other incidental expenses which must necessarily occur.

The needs of the library for the coming year can not probably be entirely met from the income of the Gale estate.

It is thought that the city should appropriate at least \$1,500 for the support of the library for the coming year; for it is intended to keep the same open day and evening and the expenses for a librarian and assistant will necessarily be much larger than have been hitherto incurred; with this sum it is hoped all expenses can be met for the year.

To the Honorable Board of Trustees of the Public Library,

GENTLEMEN:—Conditions having remained the same as during the previous year in our present quarters. the usual routine work of the library has been carried on with no attempt at divergence from ordinary lines. As will be seen by referring to the statistical table, the average circulation of books has kept up fairly well, when the library's resources are considered, and it has been a matter of surprise that so many borrowers have continued to read the old books with so little complaint, as a great many of the best circulating books have had tobe discarded altogether, while some that have been kept on the shelves are in a sad state of dilapidation. Quite an amount of time is spent at each opening of the library in trying to answer the oft repeated questions, "When is the library going into the new building?" and "Are we going to have a lot of new books when the removal takes place?" When these questions have been positively answered, it is hoped that our library work will receive an impetus which will carry it up to a high standard, and the administration of library affairs will in no way be inferior to the fine building which is to be occupied. We trust that another year's report may show a steady advance upward and many marked improvements over what it has been possible to accomplish hitherto. Gifts of books have scarcely been expected while in our present unsettled state, but a few have been received which it is a pleasure to acknowledge: Lawson History of the Amerca's Cup, presented by the author, Thomas W. Lawson;

Hitchcock's Geology of New Hampshire in three volumes, presented by Julian F. Trask; the miscellaneous writings of Mary Baker Eddy, sent out by the publisher, Joseph Armstrong; a bound copy of the city report from the City Clerk, and numerous books and pamphlets from the State of New Hampshire and from the United States government.

To the Honorable Board of Trustees of the Public Libraries of Laconia.

Gentlemen:—I have the honor to submit to you my eleventh annual report as librarian of the Lakeport Public Library for the year ending Jan. 31, 1903.

As heretofore, every book belonging to the library was accounted for at the annual inventory. For the past few years, the librarian has displayed a limited number of books where the borrowers could look them over and make their own selection. This has been done because there was no complete catalogue available to the public,

as funds were not provided for printing a supplement to the catalogue. Many of the borrowers prefer to choose their books in this manner rather than select them from a printed list because they wish to examine the books before they are charged to them. Incidentally this has provided an argument in favor of open shelves. The opportunity has been given to take books without having them charged, but no loss to the library has resulted. This privilege could not safely be granted in many communities, but the patrons of this library have proved conclusively that they can be fully trusted.

A set of the works of Emanuel Swedenborg, consisting of twenty-four volumes, was donated to the library by the publishers, the only expense to the library being for transportation. The young ladies of the Thursday Club presented five books to the library after they had read them. Those were the only popular books added to the library during the year. Mr. Thomas W. Lawson sent the library a very fine history of the America's cup and the races connected with it. This will doubtless be of great interest to yachtsmen and others interested in the defense of the cup. Sixteen other books, mostly official reports, were presented to the library. No new books were purchased during the year.

No books were discarded or rebound during the year. It was expected that the books would be moved to the new library building early in the year and it was thought that the time of removal would be the fitting time to have such books as needed it rebound and such books as were not suitable for circulation discarded. A considerable number of the books are not worth moving to the new building. With this explanation, the whole number of books at the close of the year may be said to be twenty-four hundred and seventy-six. The highest accession number is now twenty-five hundred. Thus it appears that only twenty-four books have been lost or

discarded for all reasons during the eleven years since the accessioning began.

While most of the earlier borrowers have discontinued using the library because they could find no books that pleased them except such as they had previously read, fifty-three new borrowers were registered. The total number registered to date is eleven hundred and forty-seven. The fact that seventy-two borrowers who resided in some other ward of the city and therefore registered at the other library have applied to this library for books indicates the importance of providing some means by which such patrons may obtain books from the new building without going there for them.

The number of books loaned on cards during the year was forty-seven hundred and ninety-five. This shows a decrease in circulation of more than twenty-six per cent. The number is but little more than a third of the number issued during the first year after the incorporation of the city. As the circulation was steadily growing when a fairly adequate supply of new books was provided each year, it is much to be regretted that the funds provided for the purchase of books were not sufficient for the needs of the library. It is much to be desired that the library in its new home may be able to meet every reasonable demand that may be made upon it.

The proportion of fiction circulated is very much larger than it should be and also much larger than it would be if a sufficient number of books in other classes could have been provided. In a well developed and properly administered library, not more than one-half the books circulated should be fiction. It is to be hoped that the percentage of fiction circulated will decrease rapidly in the new building. The increase in the proportion of travel and history circulated is gratifying although far below what it should be in each case.

The number of books loaned to teachers for school

use shows a gain of about one hundred and eighty per cent. This is the most pleasing feature of the work of the year. The number of books thus loaned fails to give any proper conception of the usefulness of the library to the schools. The books are loaned for the term, unless needed for the patrons of the library and they are consulted often by teachers and pupils. The only limits to the usefulness of this feature of the work has been the inability of the librarian to supply books on all the topics suggested and the limited number available on any given topic. It is to be hoped that means will be provided in the future for buying such books as may be needed for school use in sufficient numbers to meet every reasonable demand from teacher or student. It is hoped that the new building will afford opportunity for a teacher to bring her scholars to the library where books suited to their age and grade can be shown to them and the proper use of the library, particularly its reference department, can be explained to them.

As this is the last report of the librarian to his patrons, he desires to thank them for their kind forbearance and cordial co-operation with him in his efforts to make the small collection of books under his charge as useful as possible to the greatest number possible. He particularly thanks the teachers for their earnest endeavors to support him in his efforts to improve the character of the reading by the pupils of the public schools.

To you Gentlemen of the Board of Trustees, he returns hearty thanks for your support and your cheerful compliance with every suggestion for the improvement of the service of the library in so far as the means at your disposal would permit.

REPORT OF

BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS.

To the Honorable Mayor and Council:

The Board of Public Works submits herewith, for your examination, an itemized statement of the receipts and expenditures for year ending February 15, 1903, also an inventory of all property in its possession. By the fire which destroyed all of the city offices, the engineer's department suffered the loss of a large number of street surveys and plans that will embarrass the board in its work and occasion a large outlay to replace. An increased appropriation will be necessary to meet this additional expense. The amount set apart for our use in the various departments during the year were barely sufficient to meet the ordinary running expenses and prohibited the undertaking of any work toward a permanent improvement of the streets and highways which is urgently demanded and we are anxious to accomplish. The scavenger service (removal of ashes, swill, etc.) entails a large expense upon the street department and we believe this work should be placed in control of the Board of Health under a special appropriation. The winter care of streets and sidewalks consumes one-fourth of the total appropriations for highways, a necessary expenditure, but should be taken into account when considering the amount of money allotted this board. During the year, we have constructed a surface drain from the junction of Messer street and Union avenue to Irving street, and extended the drain in Valley street about five

hundred and fifty feet northward; each of these localities have given much trouble in the past, and were likely to involve the city in damage suits. Centenary avenue in Ward one has been built. For several years the sum of only five hundred dollars per year has been appropriated for the repair of concrete sidewalks; this small sum we find entirely inadequate to keep the walks in proper repair and prevent deterioration, and we deem it poor economy to continue in this way. There is also a demand for new concrete walks in various parts of the city, which should be granted. The abutters on Water street demand that this thoroughfare shall be improved and we are of the opinion that their demand is not unreasonable as the street is subject to heavy traffic at all seasons of the year and during the mud season is very bad. No lasting improvement can be made to this street, except by some good paving and the City Engineer's estimate of what we consider the most suitable is submitted herewith. Mill street should be paved or macadamized and Elm street should be macadamized from the railroad crossing to the bridge. If the electric railroad relays its tracks the coming season it will involve the street department in considerable expense as the grade in various places will be altered and streets will have to be graded to conform with the railroad grade. The paving on Church street will have to be re-coated with concrete this season. We ask your favorable consideration of these recommendations and trust your honorable body may see fit to appropriate a sum sufficient to enable this board to carry out the work as contemplated.

REPORT OF STREET COMMISSIONER.

To the Board of Public Works:

I regret to say, that owing to the destruction of a large part of the books and papers belonging to this office, by the fire of December 6th, I am unable to give you any detailed statement of the cost of work done during the year.

An iron railing has been put up on Walnut street, which finishes the work begun two years ago. Centenary avenue at The Weirs has been graded and an earth sidewalk constructed on the west side, except where the buildings project into the street.

There have been built during the year, 378 feet of 12-inch surface sewer and five catch basins on Messer street, between Irving street and Union avenue, and 550 feet of 12-inch surface sewer and five catch basins on Valley street.

The sidewalk in front of the Library building has been brought to grade. This work has already cost nearly double the amount appropriated and there still remains considerable work to be done in connection with the removal of the trees.

Bank square has been covered with gravel, and two new catch basins have been built to take the surface water. Although this work is largely temporary in character, it will I think keep this piece of street in passable shape for two years or more.

A new shed has been built at the stable on Water street, at a cost of about \$225. This was made necessary in part by the removal of the old shed to make room for the new fire station.

There is one matter to which I wish to call especial attention. There are by actual measurement 16.16 miles of concrete sidewalks and crossings in this city. Now, allowing that these walks will wear sixteen years, which is considerably more than the average, we ought to re-cover one mile every year in order to keep them up and it costs \$880 a mile to do the work, at the prices that we have paid this year. It is also a fact that at the present time there are between two and three miles of sidewalks that are breaking up so badly that they will have to be taken up and relaid if they are not re-coated at once. Any further comment on this subject seems unnecessary.

There are bills amounting to \$56.42 due the department, for labor and material furnished several individuals, that I have not been able to collect, in most cases owing to a lack of time on my part to attend to the matter.

I hand you herewith an inventory of the property and tools in the hands of the department.

To the Board of Public Works:

I submit herewith the tenth annual report of this department.

As you are aware every plan and map belonging to the office together with the card index and many other records, were destroyed by the fire of December 6th. Since that time I have done what I could with the means at my command to put the office in shape to attend to the work of the next season but there is still a large amount of work that it seems to me should be done as soon as possible, and I hope that you will be able to set apart some portion of the appropriation for this work.

While I do not wish to appear too persistent, I feel it my duty to again call your attention to the bounds for the Weirs road. It has been necessary on two occasions, during the past season, to locate the lines of a portion of that road; on both occasions I found it quite difficult to do so and it will soon be almost impossible.

The Council has furnished the office with all the instruments and supplies that are necessary with the exception of an engineer's level, which I think would soon pay for itself in the saving of time, to say nothing of the increased accuracy of the work done.

To the Board of Public Works:

I submit herewith the twelfth annual report of this department, for the year ending Feb. 15, 19c3.

There is very little to report with regard to the maintenance of the sewerage system, for the year just past. The regular work of the department has been carried on with very little trouble and the sewers are all in good condition and performing the work for which they were constructed.

In compliance with your order, the sewer on Pine street has been lowered at Gilbert's brook so that it is about a foot below the bed of the brook, and I find as I had expected, that it needs to be cleaned quite frequently to avoid a stoppage at this point.

With the exception of two flush tanks, there has been no new work done during the year and I do not know of any that is likely to be called for during the ensuing year.

There has been a large falling off in the number of house connections made during the year, which is to be much regretted.

CITY SOLICITOR'S REPORT.

To the City Council:

The city has been fortunate during the past year in escaping any very serious litigation. Only two new suits for damage have been brought against us; those of Davis and Trepannier, arising out of certain freshet conditions on Davis Place. These cases have been tried before the County Commissioners and have resulted in verdicts for the plaintiffs, but they have not been finally settled.

There is pending, in the Lake Company Tax Cases, a petition for a new trial, which I expect will be heard at an early date.

It is coming to be the practice of our city government not to lay out any new streets or make any improvements until the parties interested therein, and benefited thereby, have waived all claims to damages. Where this course can be pursued, it will save the city from much needless expense.

I wish at this time to call the attention of the city government to the necessity which exists for a codification of our municipal legislation. The city ordinances and the amendments thereto are scattered through the several reports without system or order.

Some of these ordinances have been repealed, while others have been held unconstitutional, as, for instance, the one in regard to the removal of snow from the sidewalk adjacent to his land by the owner. Such an ordinance as the one last mentioned is still upon our reports, as though it were good law, although it is not law.

This is a particularly unfortunate situation which could and should be remedied by bringing the several ordinances together into some compact form, suitable for distribution among our city officials.

Thanking the Mayor, the members of the Council and the other city officials for their kindness and consideration towards me in my official relations with them, I respectfully submit the foregoing report.

Three castings were broken on the boiler in a smashup in the railroad yard. The dollar paid for putting on the new castings appears in G. F. Dame's bill. Forty cents for freight on same appears in item to cash paid out. Subsequently the railroad paid \$13.25 damage of which \$11.85 was paid for the new castings, and the \$1.40 went into the city treasury which leaves the total net cash cost of the building and equipment \$5,986.54 or \$13.46 less than the appropriation.

The building is 62 by 52 feet. The walls are of brick resting on a puddled stone foundation. The posts and door lintels are of heavy steel, while the door columns are backed by heavy castings 2 feet wide and 12 feet high.

The building is two stories in height. The first floor is cement except over piping which is brick. The second floor is slow burning mill finish. The first floor is arranged for five pieces of apparatus, namely: One hook and ladder truck, one steam fire engine, one chemical, one hose carriage, one hose wagon, also a steamer fuel wagon.

The fifteen horse power steam boiler for heating is on this floor, also twenty-five foot trough for washing hose, a sink and closet, a hose rack between the hose carriages holding a mile of hose, and a fuel room.

The hose tower, 58 feet high, will dry one mile of hose at a time. The stable in rear of apparatus has five horse stalls, a bedding pen, iron watering trough, grooming room with iron gutter leading out of building.

The second story has a hay loft, an oat room holding a car load of oats, a battery room with copper sink, hot and cold water for electrical work and all supplies for the fire alarm telegraph.

Three of the five front rooms are used as company halls, one for sleeping room for night men, and one for the board of engineers and electric fire alarm repeater.

There are four large closets, one for each company and one for the engineers on this floor.

The two floors are connected by two flights of stairs and a sliding pole.

LEGISLATIVE ACT.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED
AND THREE.

AN ACT

To Amend Chapter 241 of the Session Laws of 1893, Entitled "An Act to Establish the City of Laconia," and Repealing Chapter 200 of the Laws of 1901, Entitled "An Act to Amend Chapter 241 of the Session Laws of 1893, Entitled An 'Act to Establish the City of Laconia.'"

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

Section 1. Strike out all of sections 2 and 3 of said chapter 241 of the Laws of 1893, as amended by section 1 of chapter 200 of the Laws of 1901, and insert in place thereof the following:

"Sect. 2. The said city of Laconia is hereby divided in six wards, which shall be constituted as follows, viz.:

"Ward No. 1 shall contain all that territory in said city included within and bounded by the following lines: Bounded westerly and southwesterly by a line commencing at a point in the center of Main street opposite the center of Lyford street, thence extending northerly through the centre of Main street to a point in said street

opposite the centre of Oak street, thence extending westerly through the center of Oak street to the center of Pleasant street, thence extending northerly through the centre of Pleasant street to the westerly side line of Main street at its junction with said Pleasant street, north of the 'Fair Grounds,' so called, thence in a straight line due west to Lake Winnesquam, thence northerly on said lake to the Meredith town line; bounded northerly by the Meredith town line from point of intersection on Lake Winnesquam to Lake Winnepesaukee; bounded easterly by the shore of Lake Winnepesaukee and the westerly boundary of Wards six and two extending from said last named point to a point on the westerly line of Ward 2, opposite the center of Lyford street at its junction with Messer street, and bounded southerly by a line extending from said last named point through the center of Lyford street to the point of beginning in the center of Main street opposite the center of Lyford street.

"Ward No. 2 shall include all that part of said city bounded westerly by a line commencing on the easterly shore of Round Bay or Lake Opechee where the present northwestly boundary of Ward 2 commences, thence southerly by the easterly shore of Round Bay or Lake Opechee and the easterly shore of the Winnepesaukee river to a point on the easterly shore of said river at the southeasterly corner of Mill street bridge, thence southeasterly by a straight line from said last mentioned point to the southwesterly corner of Locust street at its intersection with Union avenue, thence easterly along the southerly side of said Locust street to Avery street, thence in a line south seventy-six (76°) degrees east to the line between Laconia and the town of Gilford, thence easterly by the said line of Gilford extending from the last to the first mentioned bound.

"Ward No. 3 shall include all that part of said city

contained within the territory described as follows: Commencing at a point in the centre of Main street on the southerly shore of Winnipesaukee river at the bridge, thence northerly along the easterly shore of said river until it strikes the southerly line of Ward No. 1, thence westerly on line of Ward No. 1 to the center of Main street opposite the center of Lyford street, thence northerly on line of Ward No. 1 to a point in said street opposite the center of Oak street, thence westerly through the center of Oak street to a point in Pleasant street opposite the center of Oak street, thence southerly through the center of Pleasant street and through the center of Main street from its junction with said Pleasant street to the point of beginning.

"Ward No. 4 shall include all that part of said city bounded easterly by the westerly side of Ward No. 3, a portion of the westerly side of Ward No. 1, and by a line continuing from the westerly side line of Ward No. 3, in the center of Main street on the southerly shore of the Winnipesaukee river, southerly through the center of said Main street to a point in said street opposite the center of Bowman street; southerly by a line commencing at said last mentioned point and extending through the center of said Bowman street to the center of Academy street; southeasterly by a line commencing at said last mentioned point and extending southwesterly through the center of said Academy street and the 'Mile Hill' road to the Belmont town line; westerly by said Belmont town line and the shore of Lake Winnesquam, and northerly by that part of the southerly line of Ward No. 1, extending from Lake Winnesquam to a point on the westerly side line of Main street at its junction with Pleasant street north of the 'Fair Grounds,' so called.

"Ward No. 5 shall include all that part of said city lying southerly, westerly, and easterly of Wards numbers two, three and four, not embraced in said wards, the territory of said ward being the same as that formerly included in Ward number five under the original charter of said city.

"Ward No. 6 shall contain all the territory of Ward number six as constituted by the original city charter.

"Sect. 3. Wards 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5, shall each elect one representative to the General Court, and Ward 6 shall elect two such representatives, until such time as their constitutional rights shall entitle any of said wards to a greater or less number."

SECT. 2. Strike out section 8 of said chapter 241 of the Laws of 1893, as amended by section 2, chapter 200 of the Laws of 1901, and insert in place thereof the following:

"Sect. 8. Each of said Wards I, 2, 3, 4, and 5, as hereby constituted, at every state biennial election commencing with the biennial election in 1904 shall choose by ballot and plurality vote one supervisor of check-lists, and Ward 6 two such supervisors, and the city council shall also on the Wednesday next following the state biennial election in 1904, and on the Wednesday next following the state biennial election thereafter by ballot and major vote choose one supervisor of check-lists who shall hold office for the term of two years. The persons thus chosen shall constitute the board of supervisors of check-lists of all the wards of the city, and the member chosen by the city council shall be chairman of the board. All vacancies occurring in the board shall be filled by the city council.

"The existing board of supervisors as elected at the state biennial election in 1902, and the chairman of said board now holding said office by vote of the city council subsequent to said biennial election, together with three other supervisors to be chosen by the city council immediately after the passage of this act; shall hold the office and constitute the board of supervisors of check-lists for

said city until their successors are chosen as provided in this section and qualified."

SECT. 3. Strike out section 15 of said chapter 241 of the Laws of 1893, as amended by section 3 of chapter 200 of the Laws of 1901, and insert in place thereof the following:

"Sect. 15. At the annual city election on the second Tuesday of March, 1903, there shall be elected in each of said Wards 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5, by and from the qualified voters in each of said wards, one councilman to serve for two years, and two councilmen from Ward 6 to serve for two years, and these councilmen so chosen together with the four councilmen from the wards in said city as heretofore constituted, whose terms will not have expired, shall constitute the city council until the organization of the city council on the fourth Tuesday of March, 1904.

"At the annual city election on the second Tuesday of March, 1904, each of said Wards 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5 shall by and from the qualified voters of each of said wards elect one councilman to serve for two years, and two from Ward 6 to serve for the term of two years, and at each annual election thereafter, one councilman shall be chosen by and from the qualified voters of Wards 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5, and two from Ward 6, to serve for the term of two years.

"All the duties pertaining to the warning and holding of the annual city election on the second Tuesday of March, 1903, shall be performed by proper ward officers for such purpose, qualified voters in the several wards to be elected by the city council by ballot and major vote immediately after the passage of this act, and all the duties pertaining to the warning, holding, conduct, and record of said election in said wards in said city election shall be performed by the officers so chosen, the same as if said officers had been elected by the qualified voters of said wards. At said city election there shall be elected

in each of said wards all necessary ward officers, required to be elected by the qualified voters in said wards.

"Nothing in this section relating to the election of ward officers by the city council for the annual city election on the second Tuesday of March, 1903, as aforesaid, shall in any way affect the election of ward officers by the qualified voters in the several wards after the provision provided in this section, relating to said annual election on the said second Tuesday of March, 1903, has been complied with.

"The term of office of all ward officers, except supervisors of check-lists and councilmen in the wards as here-tofore constituted, shall terminate and be of no effect on and after the date of the passage of this act."

SECT. 4. Chapter 200 of the Laws of 1901 is hereby repealed, and this act shall take effect on and after its passage.

REPORT OF CITY CLERK.

To the City Council:

The fire in Masonic Temple on the early morning hours of Saturday, December 6, 1902, destroyed the city offices which included the rooms occupied by the Mayor, City Clerk, City Marshal, City Engineer, Assessors and the City Council room, which had also been used as a Police Court room.

Everything outside the safes in these offices was totally destroyed. In the office of the City Clerk, the original papers of all kinds of the Town of Laconia, and those of the City of Laconia, save the most important ones of recent date, which were in the safe, were burned.

Many of the Town Record Books, and nearly every book of record since the creation of Laconia as a city, were in safes and saved.

These books were all soaked with water, coverless, and discolored, and in some of them, codicils written on the typewriter, the printing has run together and is not legible.

All the books have been rebound except those in use in closing up the present year accounts, and will be used for reference.

New books will have to be purchased for use.
