STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Lancaster qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Lancaster on the second Tuesday of March, next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Town Clerk, a Town Treasurer, One Selectman for three years, One Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, One Library Trustee for three years, Three Members of the Col. Town Spending Committee for three years, One Trustee of the Col. Town Investment Committee and all other necessary officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers' salaries, Town Officers' expenses, Election and Registration expenses, Municipal Court expenses, expenses of the Town Hall. Police Department. Fire Department, Damages and Legal expenses, Health Department including Dental Clinic, Vital Statistics, Sewer Maintenance, Town Maintenance, Street Lighting, Town Road Aid, Library, Town Poor, Old Age Assistance, Memorial Day, Parks and Playgrounds, Cemeteries, Garbage Collection, Information Booth, White Mountains Region Association, Airport, Sidewalk Construction, New Equipment, Interest on Temporary Loans, Interest on Long Term Notes, Payment on Long Term Notes and other town expenses.
- 3. To direct how money raised for the above purposes be expended.

- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money on temporary notes in anticipation of taxes, covering period from March 9, 1948 to the Annual Meeting of 1949.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any Real Estate acquired thru Tax Collector's deeds.
- 6. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectme to distribute the blank inventories at the time they examine and appraise the property to be taxed.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$2000.00 for War Veterans' Memorial.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the maintenance and development of Town Team Athletics in the Town of Lancaster.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$800.00 for the support of band concerts during the coming summer.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Town Manager Plan as provided by Chapter 55 of the Revised Laws as amended.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the powers and duties of the office of Tax Collector to the Office of Town Manager as provided by Section 16 of Chapter 55, Revised Laws as Amended by Chapter 236, Laws of 1947, said transfer to take place if and when the Office of Town Manager is established within said Town.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Citizens' Committee of seven members, to be appointed by the Moderator, who shall serve for two years, and without pay, who shall determine the compensation of the Town Manager and who shall act in an advisory capacity only to the Selectmen and the Manager on all matters concerning the af-

fairs of the Town, and who shall meet with the Selectmen and the Manager at least once each month.

- 13. To see what action the town will take in regard to retention or rejection of the parking meters.
- 14. To see what action the town will take in regards to the present zoning laws in Lancaster.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to lease or sell the Maine Central Railroad Land and Pit to the State Highway Department.
- 16. To see if the Town will ratify the action taken by the Selectmen in the sale of the Davey, Paul and Blanchard lots to David Parks.
- 17. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

Report of Public Health Nurse

(January 1947 to January 1948)

To: The Board Members of the Public Health Nursing Committee:

The supervision of the Board Members of the Nursing Committee is greatly appreciated. I wish each one of you might be able to realize how important your guidance is to the Nursing Service, and your analysis of the needs of this community.

Antipartum; Post-partum; non-comunicable, acute communicable; Tuberculosis, Crippled Children's Service; New Born; Infants; Pre-School; School, and Adults.

Special services such as:

Social Service Visits; Tuberculosis prevention; Child Health Station; Tonsil Clinic, Dental Clinics; Orthopedic centers and general School Nursing.

The Crippled Children's Service of the State Board of Health conducts four clinics per years—at the present time, at the St. Louis Hospital in Berlin, New Hampshire. The Orthopedic Therapy Center is conducted here, the third Thursday of each month by the State Department.

The New Hampshire Society for Crippled Children and Handicapped Persons assists with transportation for children to Berlin or Manchester.

The New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association supplies the Vollmer's patch tests for all school children and give one chest clinic per year for chest examination and chest X-rays.

The Tonsil Clinic work will be more difficult in the future, as the Hospital Board has decided that, in order to give clinic rates, at least five cases must be admitted. Working in the field from house to house it is difficult to have several people thinking alike for the same time. Also, in keeping with the times, the rates are higher.

The Dental Clinics are managed most efficiently by that committee. Very good work has been accomplished each and every year.

The Child Health Station is covered by a special report.

In due time a special guidance or Mental Hygiene Clinic will be available for Lancaster, through the cooperation with State Board of Health and State Board of Education.

A cost analysis has been made out each year by cooperating with the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company. Thus Lancaster's Service has the benefit of their Accounting Bureau Head.

For many years this Nursing Service has had a contract with the Nursing Service of the Insurance Company.

This One-nurse service is a member of the National Organization of Public Health Nursing.

It is my hope to improve the Service each year.

Report of Librarian, Weeks Memorial Library

Several repairs were made during 1947. The underpinning of the front steps gave way and was replaced. A temporary hand railing was put up, as the steps are steep and often slippery in stormy weather. The floors and table tops in the two reading rooms were sanded and refinished, thus brightening up the rooms. The grandfather clock was returned to the factory after 40 years and was completely overhauled.

It was deemed wise to install an oil burner in the furnace in March and this has been most satisfactory in keeping the building evenly heated and cleaner. Lack of dust should add life to the books.

Miss Martha Brackett gave an interesting collection of pictures of the ice cakes carried from

the Israels river on to Mechanic Street at the time of the high water in 1886.

Mrs. Charles Young gave some pictures and a text of the Oberammergau Passion Play, belonging to her sister, Miss Katherine Carbee.

In June the librarian attended a two-day State Library meeting in Plymouth.

Total circulation of books, 14,339. Number of books added during year, 501. Of these, 222 were gifts.

Report of Children's Librarian

This year saw considerable growth in the Juvenile Department, 234 books having been added, with a corresponding increase in the circulation which was 7316, larger than for several years past. In consequence, more shelving was urgently needed, and a beginning was made in re-arranging furniture, so that space would be available for bookcases.

Fifty-two of the new volumes were gifts, many having been received from the Bunker and Crouch families, Mrs. A. L. Presley, Mrs. Reynold Stone and Miss Margaret Hutchins. Especially notable was "The Brownies", by Juliana Ewing, presented by the local Brownie troop; also "Children of the covered wagon", by Mary Jane Carr, and "America's stamps", by Maud and Miska Petersham, the latter two purchased with money given by the Unity Club.

Mrs. Louis Cardinal entertained the first and second grades at Story Hours; and during Book Week, Nov. 16-22, the first three grades enjoyed Story Hours through the kindness of Mrs. Cardinal. At this time posters, made by the fifth and sixth grades and representing favorite books with suitable slogans, were displayed in the Children's Room at the Library.

Prior to the Christmas holidays the librarian reviewed several of the new books for the fifth and sixth grades. Throughout the year numbers of books have been lent to teachers of all grades, in both the village and rural schools. In many instances they were used to supplement material being studied. In this work, as well as in the field of popular reading, the opportunity of borrowing from the Bookmobile was much appreciated by all, its visits always eagerly anticipated.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

State Aid

Due to the measure passed by the State Legislature last year, a large increase in the amount of money available for the local schools became available for the local schools this year. Whereas in the school year of 1946-1947 the amount received from the state was \$3,065.48, this year the total allotment was \$12,350.31. Of this \$1834.12 was rebated to the selectmen for the reduction of the tax rate and the remainder \$10,516.19 set aside for school

purposes. This enabled major improvements to be made, namely the repair of the foundation at the Grange school, and also shingling and repair of the roof at Stebbins Hill. New sets of encyclopedias were also purchased.

Enrollment

The enrollment continues to be large at both Stebbins Hill and South Lancaster. The overcrowded conditions in the village prevent the addition of any more pupils from the town district.

In November, Mrs. Elizabeth Chase, a competent experienced teacher was employed to act as a helping teacher during the forenoons in the two schools named above. This has worked out in a very satisfactory manner.

Health

The startling facts brought out by the draft board physicians concerning the physical defects of our youth is a matter that should receive the serious attention of all. The regular examinations by the school physician yearly reveals most of these defects but the great fault lies in the neglect to correct these conditions where first discovered. The cooperation of all concerned is needed if this situation is to be remedied.

When the discovery of physical defects by the examining physician are reported by the school nurse the parents should take immediate steps to have these defects corrected. The school authorities are very willing to cooperate in this. Many of these, which seem to be of minor importance when first discovered can develop into serious conditions in later life. A few of the common conditions which exist, are the eyes, defects in hearing and heart conditions due to rheumatic fever.

Conclusion

The Superintendent in closing wishes to express his appreciation of the cooperation of the School Board, the interest of the parents, and the earnest efforts of the pupils to maintain our local schools at a satisfactory level of accomplishment.
