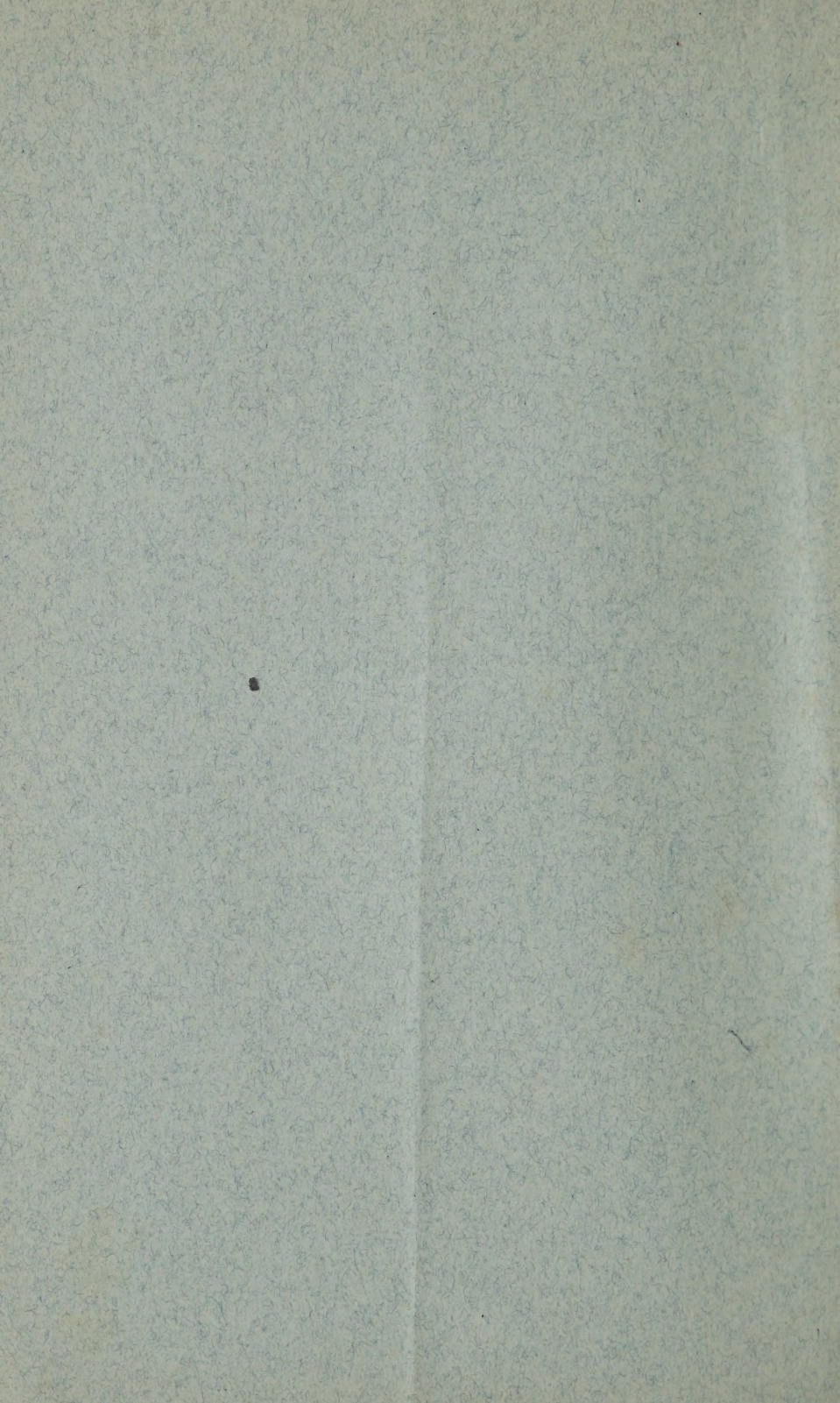

## School Report.

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We take pleasure in again announcing to the people of the district that the schools are generally in a prosperous condition.

It has been our purpose to employ good teachers, but it is unreasonable to suppose that a committee who hires twenty teachers in a year will, in every case, engage those who will give perfect satisfaction.

The procuring and distribution of books, has rendered the duties of the chairman unusually laborious, yet we have the satisfaction of seeing the district tolerably well supplied, consequently the burden on the town for the present year will be comparatively light.

Considerable sickness has prevailed in the schools throughout the district during the past year. From this cause, two schools in particular, were nearly broken up, and of course did not receive their due proportion of the public money. In ordinary circumstances this money would have been held over for their benefit the present year. But considering there might be a change in the school system and a necessity of settling up all our affairs as a town district, the funds on hand have been applied to paying the debt against the district.

Complaint is sometimes made that we do not have "so many weeks of schooling" as formerly. In reply we would say, if it is thought best to employ cheap teachers, the terms may be considerably lengthened. Furthermore the price of board for teachers has advanced all of one-third, within a few years. Now, also, scholars are paid for building fires, and people cleaning school houses. These extra drafts upon the school money are caused by a change of the times, rather than any particular school system.

Again, some people entertain the erroneous belief, that the salary of members of the school board is taken from the school money. A glance at the town report will convince them of their error.

As regards the two school systems, the present school board are not disposed to express a preference. The arguments in favor of the present system are these: Better teachers are generally employed; the wrangling at the old district school meetings are done away; districts may be united; it is not possible to defraud the district of school money; and and if a school house is to be built, the burden falls lighter on the many than on the few. On the other hand the advocates of the former system claim that the school houses are better cared for; that the people take more interest in the schools; much labor is now performed by the school board and paid for by the town, which under the old system was gratuitously performed by the various prudential committees.

Upon examination it is found that certain teachers have not properly filled out their registers. We call attention to Section 17, chapter 5, of the School Laws, and we hope that hereafter no teacher will receive their pay until this task is performed.

## SALMON HOLE.

This school for the entire year was taught by Miss Nellie G. Deming. Miss Deming enters the list of our first class teachers. Through three consecutive terms she has labored earnestly for the benefit of her pupils, and the progress they have made should be very gratifying to the patrons. At the last examination the scholars did much credit to themselves and their teacher. The classes in arithmetic and algebra deserve particular mention.

## WALKER HILL.

The summer term was taught by Miss Gertie Pennock. This was Miss Pennock's first experience in teaching, the school being the one where she has hitherto attended as a scholar. Nevertheless she carried the term through successfully, and has shown herself to possess the real qualities for a teacher. The winter term was taught by Mrs. F. A. Crossman. Mrs. Crossman is a graduate of the Normal school, has had much experience and bears an excellent reputation as a teacher. At first, complaints were made that she was too strict, but the patrons of this school, as usual, took no part with scholars against the teacher. As the term advanced, she was acknowledged to be just the teacher needed in this school. We visited no school where the discipline was so perfect or where the public money was more profitably expended.

## NORTH LISBON.

The summer term was taught by Miss Sadie Dexter, and it proved to be a very profitable term. Good

order was maintained and the scholars made fine improvement. The winter term was taught by F. O. Grover. Mr. Grover is a superior scholar and gave satisfaction as a teacher. Unfortunately for the school, the scholars were kept away so much by sickness, that they seemed to lose their interest, and so few attended, that at the end of ten weeks it was thought best to close the school.

#### PEARL LAKE.

The summer term was taught by Miss Blanche E. Webster. The term was cut short by the death of the teacher's father, and as the school was not visited at its close we are not able to judge of its progress. The fall term was taught by Miss Lilla D. Snow. This was Miss Snow's first term and she is quite young, on this account there appeared to be a prejudice against her. In our opinion, she did as well as a teacher could do under the circumstances. The winter term was taught by Miss Susie B. Whitney. We have employed Miss Whitney before, in a school where she gave satisfaction, and we are satisfied that she labored hard for the benefit of this school, and that those scholars who were well disposed and attended regular, made good progress in their studies.

#### GOODNOW.

The three terms of this school were taught respectively by Miss Florence J. Hildreth, Miss Sadie Dexter and Miss Mattie B. Knapp. All these teachers were competent and performed their duties faithfully, and had not sickness prevailed so extensively, it would have been a profitable year for the school.

## STREETER.

The summer term was taught by Miss Grace Little. Miss Little appears to be active and energetic, and possesses a good faculty of imparting knowledge. As far as we could learn, the people were pleased with her management of the school. The fall term was taught by Miss Florence J Hildreth. We can only repeat what we recorded in former reports regarding Miss Hildreth. We have had occasion to employ her during six terms and each time she has acquitted herself honorably. It is with reluctance we strike her name from the list of teachers. Owen W. Mills took charge of the school during the winter term.

## CENTRE.

The summer and fall terms were taught by Miss Blanche Wetherbee, the winter term by Miss Lena Young. Both of these teachers commenced their terms without any previous experience, but under their management the school has been very prosperous, and if they continue teaching, we predict for each a successful career.

## COLE.

The summer term was taught by Miss Mae Aldrich. The duties in this school are not onerous, and yet there is opportunity for one to display their qualities as a teacher, so judging we should not hesitate to employ Miss Aldrich in any school in the district. The winter term was taught by Mrs. Elgie Connery. The school as usual, was visited twice, and

each time it presented a good appearance. There were evidences of proficiency on the part of the scholars, and industry on the part of the teacher.

### GEORGEVILLE.

Miss Hannah Lehane has been the only teacher in this school for two years, and is just the teacher adapted to the school. She exercises a kind of parental authority, by which she gains the good will of her pupils and insures their ready obedience.
