

#### TOWN MEETING WARRANT

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:—

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall and Police Court Room, in the Town Building, on the 12th day of March next, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:—

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for the term of three years, a Town Treasurer, an Auditor, a Collector of Taxes, an Overseer of the Poor, an Agent to prosecute violations of the liquor law, three members of the Board of the Public Library, each for the term of three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds, a Constable and two Road Agents.

ARTICLE 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the laying out, construction and repairing of highways and bridges, for officers' salaries, for town officers' expenses, for town building maintenance, for election and registration expenses, for Memorial Day, for Municipal Court expenses, for the Police Department, for the health department, for vital statistics, for the Community House, for advertising purposes, for miscellaneous expenses, for street lighting, for the Littleton Hospital, for the public library, for town poor, for band concerts, for cemeteries, for damages and legal expenses, for payment of the town debt and interest, for the Community Nurse, for the skating rink, and for all other town charges.

ARTICLE 3. To see what action the Town will take for the purpose of securing State Aid for construction of highways in this Town under the provisions of an act to provide State Aid and for the expenditure of other public monies in the construction of highways throughout the State in accordance with Chapter 17 of the Laws of New Hampshire for 1935, or any amendments thereto, or an allotment for expenditure of funds upon its Town highways.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen of the Town to apply for, accept and use, monies provided by the Federal Government, or State of New Hampshire, for public works, relief unemployment, or otherwise, and do all things required by the Federal Government, or State of New Hampshire, to obtain the same.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will authorize its Board of Selectmen to borrow monies, from time to time, for current indebtedness of the Town, for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1940, and to be paid therefrom; all loans to be submitted to bids and secured from the lowest bidder.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and direct its Board of Selectmen to appoint a committee to investigate, and report at the Town Meeting in March 1941, on the method and cost of the following projects:

1. To take care of the sewage in the Ammonoosuc River, particularly below the Cottage Street bridge, provide additional fire protection from the River, and any other matter related thereto.

2. To protect the farms on the Ammonoosuc River, below the village, from floods or other water damage.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Board of Selectmen, to borrow money in the name of and upon the credit of the Town, to be used by the Littleton Water & Light Commissioners, in the enlargement and extension of the electric light plant and facilities of said Town, and to provide for the payment of the same.

ARTICLE 9½. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 10. To choose any other necessary Town officers for the year ensuing and to choose or elect any agents or committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under this warrant.

ARTICLE 11. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

We are faced with the need for funds with which to install a grounded system and also to revamp the Lafayette Avenue Sub-station.

As shown by the financial statement we turned back during

the year to the Town in surplus earnings \$40,000.00.

There have been several electric line extensions and two water lines repaired and enlarged.

\*By operating the Apthorp Hydro Station we saved on demand the difference between 830 KW and 503 KW which amounted to \$4,905.00, so, in reality we produced 1,193,340 KwH of electricity for \$3,797.41 or, in other words at .00318 per KwH instead of .00728.

Explained by the following equation:

Cost of operation \$2,574.72 4% depreciation 6,117.69

Total \$8,692.41 Less saving on demand 4,905.00

Total \$3,787.41 divided by 1,193,340 KwH generated equals .00317 per KwH actual cost to generate.

Statistics on next page show that the total resident enrollment has been quite stable during the past decade. The average number is 694 and the enrollment this year to date is 692. During that same period the high school enrollment (resident) has definitely increased. The average number has been 219 and the present enrollment is 232. This is an increase of about one third over the number of pupils enrolled when the present high school building was erected. With a stable total enrollment and an increased high school enrollment, you have a consequent decrease in the number of elementary pupils. The average number of pupils in the elementary grades (I-VIII) for the past ten years has been 475 and the number this year is 460. The town's population and the school population have been quite stable during the past decade and will doubtless remain so during the next few years. The high school enrollment will be larger next year than the present high peak and will doubtless be larger for three or four years but will then decrease somewhat unless the number of pupils in the elementary grades increases in the meantime.

To plan wisely for efficient work in the high school during the next few years is a problem. Two rooms in the high school building are used for pupils in grades seven and eight. The other rooms have 245 pupil chairs and desks. This year the enrollment in the high school is 265—with a present actual

membership of 257. Next year's ninth grade will be the largest ever, making the total number in high school probably 25-30 more than this year. In one study room unsatisfactory chairs should be replaced with good chairs and tables, or chairs and desks. In addition one room previously used for classes in mechanical drawing and music must be equipped with pupil desks. In this way all of the high school pupils can be comfortably seated. The work in mechanical drawing will have to be very limited and given in the shop and all music groups will have to meet in the auditorium. This plan seems to be the only one without building construction. It may mean that the woodworking course offered to the eleventh grade boys will again have to be discontinued.

With any increased enrollment additional teacher time is needed. At present the pupil load is larger than it should be per teacher. In the high school you have eleven full time teachers besides the headmaster. This year you have Mr. Bennett four afternoons a week in the woodworking shop. The time Mr. Bennett and Headmaster Nelson give to classroom teaching equals the time requirement of the St. Rose of Lima and Apthorp pupils in woodworking and home economics classes. Thus you have eleven teachers to provide all of the classroom instruction for a total enrollment of 349 pupils in six grades. With the expected increase of next year one teacher should be added to the staff as some of the larger classes will have to be divided into two groups.

The alternative to equipping with pupil desks the room now used for mechanical drawing and music as a study room is to provide additional rooms elsewhere. In the reports of the last four years I have presented for your consideration the construction of an annex to the Kilburn building. This annex could be built and equipped probably for \$10,000.00 or less. It would provide a basement shop to house a part of the mechanic arts department and enable you to offer some courses not now possible in that department. It would provide a room

for the seventh grade now in the high school building, thereby giving the high school pupils an additional room, and would provide for the Kilburn pupils a small auditorium with a seating capacity for about one hundred persons for assemblies and special programs. It would solve the housing problem in the high school building for an indefinite period.

At present you have the problem of a crowded high school building. You can use every available space for seating and still have the building full with the possible necessity of having to withdraw from your offering one or more of the courses in woodworking. You can provide additional rooms at the Kilburn building. You can, of course, refuse to accept any non-resident pupils, thereby reducing your enrollment by 30 or 35 pupils. This last course, however, is not one I can recommend.

The trend in recent years among the high school pupils has been towards the selection of the practical arts subjects. This year you are offering three years of woodworking in the senior high school. Sixty-six boys are enrolled in these classes. In the four years of home economics 95 girls are enrolled. The commercial groups have 70 pupils. With the desire for these subjects so marked on the part of pupils and parents the elimination of any seems to be of doubtful wisdom. Yet it is not advisable to plan for shop work without adequate space for good results.

Two years of the work in home economics this year, as last, are meeting the requirements of the George-Deen Act for federal vocational aid. The school district received last year \$364.66 from the federal government. The subject matter standards of the federal aided courses are practically the same as those of our own state program but the time standards are slightly greater and more teacher time is required for the supervision of home projects. The high school headmaster was unable to arrange his schedule this year to provide for

subsidizing more classes on the federal plan. With additional teacher time this might be possible next year and would bring some additional revenue to the district.

The expenditure of about \$300.00 would enable you to purchase the equipment to offer one course in crafts. One of your teachers has taken summer courses to teach some of the crafts. Outlines for these courses have been presented by the State Board of Education. This would be a valuable offering for those seniors who have had three years of woodworking. It would doubtless prove a very popular subject.

The report of the medical inspection and of remedial health work follows: The work for health improvement has been of about the same nature for several years and has been very successfully carried out. A more thorough physical examination of all pupils and much more classroom work in physical education should be planned for future years. This phase of public school work has lagged behind in most school systems. At present only a few periods a week can be devoted to physical education in the form of gymnasium and out-of-door classes. I hesitate to urge a more extensive program at this time, in view of the increased budget.

Considerable attention has wisely been focussed on the teaching of safety in the public schools in recent years. A bulletin on safety education was published by the State Board of Education a year ago. This is used as a guide in all of the elementary grades and in some high school classes. Safety readers are used in the elementary grades. Safety is associated

with the teaching of nearly all subjects in these grades. A safety patrol is being organized in the Kilburn School for the benefit of those pupils on their way to and from school. A special automobile drivers' course is offered each year to high school pupils who have reached the age of sixteen. The school is indebted to many townspeople who have assisted in making this course worthwhile. It is especially indebted to the police department for the interest shown in the protection of school pupils.

During the past two years a new program in English for high schools has been published by the State Board of Education. A program in social science will soon be printed. Work has begun in re-writing the entire elementary program. These programs serve as guides in most of the school systems of the state. In most subjects the courses outlined by the State Board are of recent date, are sanely progressive, and are the result of the work done by many persons teaching in the state in cooperation with representatives of the State Board of Education.

But few changes have occurred in the teaching staff in the last four or five years. A fairly stable teaching staff is one of the fundamentals of good schools. The progressive salary schedule you adopted several years ago has been an important factor in securing and retaining good teachers. vour teachers have attended summer school each year. Last summer six were at summer school, twelve in 1938, and ten in 1937. All of your teachers are earnest and devoted to their work. This year Miss Ruth Canty replaced Miss Hanson as teacher of English in the high school. Miss Canty has had several years of experience and excellent training for this work. She is proving a valuable member of the staff. Mr. Kermit Bennett was engaged for part time work in woodworking. His employment has made it possible to offer the course in woodworking to the boys in the senior and junior classes this year.

Mrs. Mary E. Smith generously bequeathed to the school district the sum of \$200.00 for the mechanic arts department. This sum has been expended for the purchase of a new shaper and for new vises. The money has been a definite help in equipping this department for the increased number of boys in the woodworking classes.

Last summer new drinking fountains and lavatories were placed in the Kilburn and Apthorp buildings. A new water pipe was laid from the high school building to the Kilburn building to increase the pressure. A new sink was placed in the home economics kitchen, new window shades were purchased for two rooms in the Kilburn building, new doors were bought for the Apthorp building, some necessary work was done on the roof of the high school building, and other minor repairs were made.

The school year closing last June showed a net deficit of The appropriation the previous \$2.273.00. March \$64,000.00 was not sufficient to meet the needs. The deficit this year will be reduced to about \$1,600.00. At the last district meeting \$65,000.00 was appropriated for the current year. That amount with the receipts from sources other than taxation was enough for this year's needs and for some reduction in the deficit. It would be enough for next year's needs and for further reduction in the deficit if no additional teacher time and no additional seating equipment were needed. At least \$1,500.00 should be allowed for these new requirements. An appropriation of \$66,500.00 should be made if all the needs of next year are to be provided and the budget is to be approximately balanced. The town budget committee has approved of this amount.

Tables showing costs in Littleton for the past fourteen years, and showing costs in Littleton in comparison with the median costs in the state for the past five years are included in this report. These tables show that the costs here are

not high in comparison. Your school property has been maintained in good condition. You offer a varied course of study in your high school. Your bonds on the high school building have been reduced to \$48,000.00. Your only other indebtedness is the current deficit mentioned above.

In conclusion I wish to express my appreciation for your helpful consideration of all school problems.

### Headmaster's Report

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The wholesome interest of parents and townspeople, together with the sincere cooperation of our school board, teaching staff, and student body, have made this, my second annual report to you, a pleasant duty.

### REGISTRATION

In your own report of registration statistics for the current year you have set forth that our high school is experiencing a record enrollment which results in a high teaching load and crowded conditions in several departments. While these facts are serious in themselves, they become all the more so when our best and most conservative estimates point to an enrollment for next September which will increase even the present total by 25 or 30 pupils. In view of this it would seem prudent to make plans as early as possible to meet the situation, and I would emphasize the necessity of consideration of the following:

- 1. The teaching staff should be increased by one full time teacher. Our present teaching load is considerably above the average of the state, and any increase would seriously handicap if not jeopardize efficient instruction.
- 2. The purchase of additional pupil desks seems unavoidable. With nearly twenty pupils without satisfactory accommodations at present, a pupil increase would forbid any temporary arrangements in this line.
- 3. More classroom and home room space is necessary. By installing twenty more pupil desks in our study hall, Room 6, and replacing the drawing tables in Room 1 with similar

equipment, the situation would be greatly relieved. A rearrangement of the shop equipment with the addition of more work benches will to some extent ease the over-crowded condition in this department. This has already been started and will be completed in the near future.

#### **CURRICULUM**

The major change in the curriculum for this year is the extension of the mechanic arts course into a third year in woodworking.

In my first annual report made a year ago, I commended the fact that Littleton High School had the "core curriculum" with only English and U. S. Constitutional History as compulsory subjects. This I repeat, but I wish to emphasize that this type of curriculum places unquestioned responsibility on the parents, the pupil and his advisers to choose his course wisely. In an endeavor to meet this a series of guidance meetings was held last May with members of the various eighth grades who planned to enter our school in September. During the summer I enjoyed over a hundred calls at the homes of pupils most of which were in reference to choice of subjects. While these meetings and conferences were undoubtedly of benefit, the fact that too many pupils decide too late that they have enrolled in the wrong course, necessitates continued and increasing efforts in educational guidance. The interest and large enrollment in the home economics, commercial, and mechanic arts courses are gratifying.

#### DAILY TIME-TABLE

This is nearly identical with that in use last year and seems to provide for conservation and efficiency in time.

#### TEACHING STAFF

The satisfactory functioning of all school activities under the crowded conditions of the present year is a more convincing tribute than words to the value of a well trained staff of experienced teachers. Not only as teachers in the class room, but as leaders in extra curricular activities, each is giving to our high school an unselfish and abundant share of energy and time. All of the important permanent functions, and many of the special functions of school life, are organized and directed by teacher committees.

### APPROVAL AND CERTIFICATE PRIVILEGE

Secondary schools of our state are approved when they measure up to certain standards such as properly trained teachers, acceptable curriculum, standard class periods, required length of school year, adequate equipment, satisfactory attendance record, etc.

Littleton High School has, and has had for many years, full state approval. Our school likewise enjoys the certificate privilege of the New England Entrance Certificate Board. This privilege allows graduates to enter all colleges that are members of the Board without taking entrance examinations provided the headmaster of the qualifying high school will grant the certificate. Such a certificate is issued to a pupil who has maintained a high grade of work in his school subjects. The colleges belonging to this Board are: Amherst, Bates, Brown, Bowdoin, Boston University, Clark, Colby, Massachusetts Agricultural, Middlebury, Tufts, Wesleyan, Williams and Worcester Polytechnic. The school also has college entrance certificate privileges with Dartmouth College and New Hampshire University.

#### SCHOLARSHIP AND REPORT CARDS

It is most important that all pupils do well in their school subjects, but it is absolutely necessary that those going on with their formal education after high school should select their subjects intelligently, and should maintain a consistently high grade in them. Too many times a failure to recognize this truth has proven costly in shattered ambitions as well as in money.

To better acquaint the parents with the grade of work and the school citizenship traits of their children, a new and more comprehensive report card was adopted this year.

#### **ATTENDANCE**

Regular and prompt attendance is an important essential in all public schools. How well Littleton High School measured up to this detail is shown in the following table.

It is pleasing to note that our record of tardiness is much better than the state average. When one remembers the severe epidemic of colds which was prevalent for several weeks last winter, our attendance record too becomes a creditable one. That our school should improve its last year's average is forecast by the record made during the first half of the current year. It is as follows:

At this time I would express my personal appreciation for the splendid cooperation given the school by the great majority of parents and pupils in observing the attendance regulations, and in returning the written absence excuses for our files.

#### MISCELLANEOUS STATISTICS

Teachers are asked sometimes concerning the rating of schools. I know of no such comparative rating lists except as they exist in statistical tables of various individual school items such as attendance, enrollment, length of school year, etc. The state requires that the high school agent and state supervisors visit high schools of the state but their official visits are in a supervisory capacity and in no sense for the purpose of rating schools. Each year the ranks of all graduates of New Hampshire schools who are enrolled in the freshman year at a college are sent to the State Department of Education. From this, based entirely upon the work during the first year at college and upon no other items, our state department issues a confidential report to each high school. This report of the success of high school graduates during the first year of college comes the nearest perhaps to the hypothetical ratings in question. In these confidential reports, which are given in a code that only reveals the comparative standing of the school in question, I am happy to state that during all recent years Littleton High School has been found in the upper third of the high schools in the state. Other interesting items of comparison taken from the "1938-1939 Secondary Report" issued by the State Board of Education are given below.

#### 1939 GRADUATES

Thirty-nine pupils were graduated from our high school last June. Of this number sixteen are known to be continuing their education at this time in the following institutions: Banford School of Beauty Culture, Becker Business College, Bryant and Stratton Business College, Herring (N. Y.) High School, Kimball Union Academy, Littleton High School, Plymouth Teachers' College, Simmons College, Tilton School, University of New Hampshire and Wentworth Institute.

A real effort is being made in the school office to keep an accurate and up to date record of our graduates. This information together with other which is available should place us in a position where we could be of real assistance in educational and vocational guidance. It is our sincere desire that both graduates and business men may use this office for such a function if they believe at any time that we may be of service to them.

#### **ATHLETICS**

Athletics have an important place in the modern high school, and their value is best judged by ascertaining how well they measure up to the following objectives:

- 1. The skills and rules of the sport should be well taught.
- 2. A high type of sportsmanship and leadership should be developed.
- 3. Athletics should reach the many and not just the few.
- 4. The health and safety of all participants should be jealously guarded.

It is in harmony with this policy that athletics at Littleton High School are being directed. Suffice to say that we have had both successes and failures. The former have inspired us while the latter have served as lessons by which we can profit in the future. The following items are suggestive of progress in this field.

- 1. The payment of the outstanding athletic debt together with the adoption of a budget which has made athletics self-supporting for the current year.
- 2. An increase in membership in our athletic association from 128 last year to 154 at the end of the present half year.
- 3. The management of all major sports by pupil managers under faculty guidance.
- 4. The inauguration of an insurance for those taking part in sports. This is under the direct sponsorship of the Council of New England Secondary School Principals Association. For a nominal fee a player is insured against fractures, teeth injuries and certain x-ray work. A majority of our players have taken out this insurance.
- 5. Special physical examinations were given those who took part in football or basketball.
- 6. A continued and wholesome interest in the gymnasium and game periods conducted by Miss Tewksbury and Mr. Stonier.

Our athletic program includes teams in football, boys' and girls' basketball, boys' and girls' winter sports, baseball, and a gymnasium period per week for pupils of the junior high school together with two periods per week for a limited number of girls in the senior high school.

In order to extend the benefits of athletics to more pupils, it is hoped that a limited program of intra-mural sports may be developed in the near future.

#### OTHER SCHOOL ORGANIZATIONS

Supplementing the program of athletic activities, and offering a wide choice of selection, is the list of numerous organizations of a non-athletic type. In my report of a year ago these were mentioned in some detail, and, with the exception of the Rifle Club which was not re-organized this year, all are active and successful. Included in this list are: the orchestra, glee club and choir groups, "The Record," and the girls' athletic association.

Two new organizations have been inaugurated this year. These are a Student Council and a chapter of the National Honor Society. The former consists of the class presidents and elected representatives from the four classes in the senior high school. This council has jurisdiction in an advisory capacity over extra-curricular activities. The latter, the Littleton Chapter of the National Honor Society, is in the process of organization at this time. The society is a nation-wide organization that esteems high scholarship, sterling character and leadership. It has the approval of our State Board of Education, and has several chapters in the larger high schools of our state.

## MISCELLANEOUS ACTIVITIES AND FUNCTIONS

During the last year several important activities and functions have been held which have brought credit to the ones responsible, as well as pleasure and benefit to others. Characteristic of this group are:

The hot noon lunches served by the home economics department to approximately ninety-five pupils during the winter months.

The school census taken by the senior class.

The operetta given by the combined glee clubs.

The North Country Orchestra concert.

The Freshman Reception, sponsored by the seniors.

The senior play, "Spring Fever."

The football banquet given by the Littleton Rotary Club.

The Christmas party arranged by the freshmen.

The junior class Prom.

The annual Stunt Night for the benefit of the athletic association.

The benefit basketball games which yielded a net sum of \$94.20 for the benefit of a member of the girls' basketball squad who was seriously injured in a game.

A cooperative service bureau to help worthy pupils find work to do outside of school hours has been conducted this year under the direction of Mr. Glazier. It was originally planned to present an opportunity for a pupil to earn money for his athletic dues, but because of its success the bureau has been continued and is performing a real service in bringing together those people who have odd jobs to be done, and those pupils who are anxious and best fitted to do them.

To the above list, if space would permit, could be added numerous other class and club activities which were carefully planned and successfully carried out under pupil leadership and teacher guidance.

# OCCASIONS OF SPECIAL INTEREST TO TOWNSPEOPLE

All citizens of our community, and especially the parents of pupils, are cordially invited to visit our schools at any time. There are occasions, however, which we believe should be of special interest to our friends.

The activities of American Education Week which comes in November are planned primarily for this purpose.

The sole objective of the annual school exhibit which is held in June is to acquaint parents and friends with the work of the schools.

Our regular school assemblies, six of which are planned for the year, are arranged to give educational values or observance of some special occasion as well as entertainment. Typical of these assemblies are the Armistice Day assembly and the Christmas assembly of the current school year. The public activities of commencement week are always happy occasions for many outside of school.

During the present school year a committee of teachers has arranged a series of interesting evening meetings to which the public is invited. Two have been held. The first was a travel talk on "Egypt and the Nile," and the second was a panel discussion of the "Effect of the European Wars upon the United States."

### NYA

The budget allotted to our school for pupil work under the NYA is \$432.00 which is \$54.00 more than last year. Twelve pupils have qualified under this program and are receiving checks not to exceed the monthly maximum of \$6.00.

### **AWARDS**

The following awards were made during commencement week.

Pro Merito Pins—Awarded to ten members of the junior class who have an average of 85 or better during their high school career.

The George H. Tilton awards-

Twenty-five dollars for the athlete and scholar in the senior class who through effort and character has best caught and expressed the ideals and spirit of the school.

Ten dollars for the senior who has shown the greatest all around improvement in the senior year.

Ten dollars for the highest scholarship during the senior year.

Five dollars for the next to the highest scholarship in the senior year.

Ten dollars for the highest scholarship in the lower three classes.

Five dollars for the next to highest scholarship in the lower three classes.

Ten dollars for the best one-act play.

Five dollars for the next to the best one-act play.

Ten dollars for the best essay in English.

Five dollars for the next to the best essay in English.

American Legion medal—for excelling in character, honor, scholarship and courage.

Five dollars given by the American Legion Auxiliary for the girl who is most outstanding in character, scholarship, leadership, athletics and literary ability.

Scholarship Key for the senior excelling in commercial subjects.

In February of this year a senior girl was chosen to represent our school in the annual Good Citizenship Pilgrimage conducted by the Daughters of the American Revolution. This was made possible through the courtesy of the Gunthwaite Chapter of Lisbon.

## ACKNOWLEDGEMENT OF GIFTS

Departments of school wish to make grateful acknowledgement of the following gifts:

Mechanic Arts Department—from Mary E. Smith Estate, a two hundred dollar bequest for use in this department.

Social Science Department—from Dr. Montfort Haslam, a set of seventeen reference books.

To the Board of Trustees of the Littleton Public Library, the annual report of the Librarian is herewith submitted:

This year the library has completed fifty years of service. Opened to the public in January, 1890, in rented quarters in the Rounsevel Block, it was moved to the Town Building in 1895 and remained there until the present Carnegie Building was opened in March, 1906. Its book collection has increased from about 3,000 volumes to 12,000, and over a million and a quarter books have been loaned in the past fifty years.

The record of its fiftieth year appears in the statistical summary which follows this report. There has been a healthy increase in circulation and in the number of borrowers served. More opportunities for the public to use the library have been offered by opening Friday evening and by installing a telephone. Work with the young people has continued to grow and accounts for a large part of the circulation increase.

Reference work has been greatly facilitated since we have moved the card catalog into the new case which was purchased for it this year. The addition of the latest Britannica and Americana encylopedias has also filled a great need in the reference room. As usual, classes from the High School have received instruction in the use of the library, and effort devoted to this project is well repaid in the more effective use of reference tools which high school students are now able to make, without help from the library staff. Townspeople are reminded that the library is ready to answer information requests by telephone.

While high school students use the library intensively, perhaps the most eager patrons are the younger grade school children who have just discovered the fun of reading. From the primer stage on, books from the library can provide both wholesome recreation and help in school work. Many children can come to the library; to make books available to all we loaned 322 books to the Apthorp school during the past year. There they were used in the classrooms, and 715 volumes were borrowed for home use. The extent of this work

is limited by the supply of children's books; if we had a larger and more complete collection, it would be used to great advantage.

We have been fortunate to have the services of a WPA helper during the year. This assistance has made possible many desirable activities and projects. The picture collection has been greatly enlarged and the Kilburn stereoscopic views arranged and indexed with this help.

We have turned to the State Library for books when our own did not supply the borrower's needs. A new service available there is the phonograph record collection, presented to them by the Carnegie Foundation. A number of exhibits of prints, photographs and reproductions of famous paintings have been loaned by the State Library to display here. The Littleton Library is participating in the union catalog, which is to be a list of books available for inter-library loan among New Hampshire libraries. Already a number of books located though this catalog have been borrowed from us by other libraries, thus giving us the opportunity to repay in small part the many courtesies larger libraries have extended to us in the past.

Borrowers are reminded that the postal rate for mailing books is now 1½c per pound, or 3c for the average book. This has already saved money on inter-library loans and makes possible the library's offer to mail books to townspeople outside the village who cannot come to the library conveniently, provided they will pay the return postage.

Friends have presented many books and magazines to the library during the past year. Mrs. Lawrence Gilman gave a fine edition of the Encyclopedia Britannica in memory of her husband. Mr. Fred Green presented a set of the Harvard Classics. To them and to all the others who have made gifts, we express our appreciation and thanks.

The most serious problem facing the library is to find sufficient shelving for the book collection. The old wooden shelving in the stack room is inadequate—the shelves are immovable and not the right height for many books. They both waste space and make it necessary to tip books down so that it is difficult for the public to locate the desired book because the titles cannot be seen. Temporary shelving of boxes piled one on another also has to be used, and there is not room for growth. Shelf space in the reading rooms is already cramped, and many books which should be in the stacks have to be shelved elsewhere in the building.

The original plans of the library called for a two-story steel stack in the stack room wing, which is of brick construction throughout, with fire doors shutting it off from the rest of the building. Lack of funds when the building was opened in 1906 made it necessary to build a floor at the main floor level and use the old wooden shelving which was removed from the Town Building.

The time is at hand when more shelf space is needed. We have postponed this crisis by weeding out older books, but this cannot be carried much further without impairing the book collection. A temporary expedient would be to install modern wood or steel adjustable shelving on the present floor; this would take care of the next five years' needs. However, further expansion would then be more costly. The more satisfactory solution would be the removal of the present wood floor and the installation of a two-tier steel stack, running from the basement up through the stack room, with a stairway connecting the two levels. At the present rate of growth this two-tier stack would provide adequate shelving for fifty years. If the ceiling were made fireproof, then the whole stack would be of fireproof construction and thus give better protection for the largest part of the library's invest-

ment—the book collection. A minor benefit would be the elimination of the present six-inch step into the stack room.

I urge that some action toward remedying the present shelving situation be taken as soon as possible. In closing this report I should like to thank the staff, the trustees, and the public for their courtesy and helpfulness throughout the year.
