



OTIS R. ROWELL

On June 10, 1965 the town lost one of its active citizens in the passing of Otis R. Rowell. A lifelong resident of Newton he was always interested in all civic affairs as well as the social life of the town.

Otis R. Rowell was born in Newton on May 4, 1899, the son of Elbridge B. and Nellie M. (Kelly) Rowell, and attended the local schools.

At the time of his death he was serving the town as Supervisor of the Check List, Trustee of Trust Funds, and Treasurer of the Newton School District, elective offices which he had held since 1937-1946-1941 respectively.

He was employed for many years in Amesbury, Massachusetts, and in Exeter, N. H., during World War II until health forced his retirement.

He was a member of Twilight Lodge #68; New Hamp-

shire Grand Lodge IOOF; Harmony Encampment #51 (Amesbury, Mass.); Starlight Rebekah #27; the Jr. OUAM; and the Newton Volunteer Fire Company.

NEWTON TOWN REPORT

REPORT OF TOWN MEETING, MARCH 10, 1965

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Clifford R. Bryer, at 8:00 p.m.

Article 1: The results of balloting on Tuesday, March 9, 1965, for Town Officers, were read by the Moderator.

In view of the 27 Articles in the Warrant, the Moderator requested the cooperation of the voters in keeping the discussions from becoming unnecessarily lengthy.

Article 2: Fred H. Cust made a motion "to raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same." This motion was seconded by Ellery F. Atwood.

Roland D. Estabrook offered an amendment to the motion, correcting the total Estimated Expenditures of 1965 to \$180,069.64, the School Tax item should have read \$135,254.00. (\$21,416.00 less than the figure printed on page 14a of the Town Report)

This amendment was carried, also the main motion.

Article 3: Mr. Cust moved to accept the reports of Town Officers, and his motion was seconded.

Mr. Estabrook noted several errors in the reports as they appear in the Town Report, as well as in the listing of the Town Officers for the previous year.

An amendment to the motion was made by Howard L. Bowen, that these corrections be made as noted, was carried. The original motion was then carried, as amended.

Article 4: On a motion by Mr. Cust, it was voted to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 5: On a motion by Mr. Cust, it was voted to "authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired by Tax Collector's Deed or through Old Age Assistance; or any other property of the Town not used for public purposes."

Article 6: Wallace B. Nyberg moved "to authorize the re-assessment of all property within the Town of Newton by the New Hampshire State Tax Commission." The motion was seconded by Mr. Atwood. Following a time of discussion, the vote was by means of a paper ballot and the check list. The moderator appointed Mr. Atwood and Richard J. Busch as tellers to sort the ballots. the Moderator then counted 37 yes votes and 103 no votes. The motion was lost.

Article 7: No action was required on this article because of the action on Article 6.

Article 8: Mr. Atwood moved "to create a standing committee to carry on studies of the street lighting situations in the Town and recommend such changes as the committee deems necessary to the Selectmen . . . members appointed by the Moderator to serve terms not to exceed five years." This motion was seconded by Mr. Bowen. After some discussion, Mr. Atwood and Mr. Bowen withdrew the motion and the second. On a motion by Mr. Nyberg, it was voted to refer this item to the Planning Board.

Article 9: On a motion by Mr. Cust, it was voted "to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$227.00 as Newton's contribution to the annual budget of the Seacoast Regional Development Association."

Kenneth A. Field, Jr. related the history of the SRDA and its efforts to keep the Portsmouth Naval Ship Yard and Pease Air Base open. He also noted that this is the only agency which the Federal Government will recognize regarding these two installations.

Article 10: Mr. Nyberg moved to "authorize the Selectmen to use the proceeds from the sale of the Rowe's Corner School building, in conjunction with whatever monies are available . . . , for the purpose of installing toilets, running water, and a kitchen in the lower hall of the Town Hall; and to authorize the Selectmen to enter into any and all agreements necessary to accomplish such installations."

This motion was seconded. After debate, Mr. Atwood offered an amendment to the motion. "this Article be put over to the next regular town meeting and in the interim, the Select Body be directed to provide the town with plans and specifications for modern plumbing and a modern kitchen, septic tank, water supply, and costs of the same at the next regular Town Meeting." This amendment was carried. The main motion, as amended, was carried with a vote of 65 yes and 10 no.

On a motion by Mr. Field this study was referred to the Planning Board.

Article 11: On a motion by Mr. Atwood, it was voted to authorize the adoption of a new policy for the payment of salaries to the Selectmen as stated on Page 4a and 5a of the Newton Town Report for 1964.

Article 12: On a motion by Chester E. Bearce it was voted to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$300.00 for use at the Town Dump.

Article 13: On a motion by Mr. Estabrook it was voted to rescind the action taken under Article 9 at the last Town meeting and instead sell the 1940 Chevrolet Tank Truck back to the Newton Volunteer Fire Company for the sum of one dollar.

Article 14: Mr. Atwood moved to purchase and equip a new Class A combination pumper fire truck, to authorize the Selectmen to execute any and all contracts or agreements necessary and proper or advisable in connection with the purchase and equipping of such fire truck and authorize the Selectmen to issue bonds or notes in an amount not to exceed \$16,000.00 for the purpose of financing such purchasing and equipping.

After discussion the vote was 83 yes and 46 no, with 129 votes cast. This article lacked the two-thirds majority required.

On a motion by Mr. Atwood it was voted to adjourn this meeting at 11:00, to reassemble tomorrow night after the annual School District Meeting.

The Moderator asked if the meeting would reconsider Article 14. The show of hands was favorable.

On a motion by Mr. Estabrook, it was voted that we delete Article 14 in its entirety and place in its stead as Article 14, "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) which shall be placed into a Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of a future purchase and equipping of a piece of fire apparatus. said Capital Reserve Fund to be held in trust by the Trustees of the Trust Funds until such time as the Town does vote to purchase and equip said fire apparatus.

Article 15: David H. Beebe moved to authorize and empower the Town Planning Board to approve or disapprove, in its discretion, plats showing new streets or widening thereof, or parks, and upon adoption of this article it shall be the duty of the Town Clerk to file with the Registry of Deeds of the county of Rockingham a certificate or note showing that said Planning Board has been so authorized, giving the date of authorization, as provided in Sections 19-29 inclusive, Chapter 36 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955. This motion was seconded.

Mr. Atwood offered an amendment, "In view of the fact that changes are imminent in our building code and the question of a right of way has risen with a large developer, I move that this Article be considered after Article 17 has been completed." The vote on this amendment was negative.

The vote on the main motion was affirmative.

Meeting adjourned at 11:25; to reconvene tomorrow night after the annual School District Meeting.

MARCH 11, 1965

Meeting was called to order at 8:30 by the Moderator.

Article 16: On a motion by Mr. Atwood, it was voted to amend Article 1, Section 2, of the Building Code and Safety Ordinance as follows:

1. To delete the word "sideline" and insert the word "centerline" in its stead. 2. To delete the words "forty-five" and insert the words "sixty-five" in their stead. 3. To delete the entire last part of the paragraph beginning with the words "or such distance . . ."

Article 17: On a motion by Christopher D. Sherrill, it was voted to "amend Article I, Section 5, of the Building Code and Safety Ordinance as follows: 1. To delete the entire section and insert the sections a through e as printed on pages 7A and 7B of the Newton Town Report of 1964.

Mr. Atwood asked the Selectmen if they would hold Pilgrim Homes and/or Hilco Homes to the agreement already made. They answered in the affirmative.

Article 18: Mr. Sherrill moved "to amend Article II, section 1, of the Building Code and Safety Ordinance as follows: 1. To delete the words "ground floor" in the first sentence just before the word "area" and insert the word "living" in their stead. This motion was seconded.

Mr. Atwood moved to amend the motion to read, "600 square feet of living area on one floor." This amendment was carried.

The main motion was then considered and received a negative vote.

Article 19: On a motion by Mr. Atwood, it was voted to amend Article II, section 2, of the Building Code and Safety Ordinance as follows: 1. In the first sentence after the words "footings not less than", delete the words "eighteen inches wide and six inches deep" and insert the words "twice the thickness of the wall in width, and equal in depth to the width of the wall" in their stead.

Article 20: On a motion by Mr. Atwood, it was voted to amend Article II, section 6 of the Building Code and Safety Ordinance as follows: 1. Before the first word "all" insert "a". 2. After the end of the first paragraph, add the following paragraphs: b. Chimneys shall extend at least three feet above

the highest point where they pass through the roof of a building, and at least two feet higher than any portion of the building within ten feet. c. All attics shall have an interior means of access for fire protective purposes. d. All garages beneath or attached to a dwelling or connected by an enclosed structure shall have walls, ceilings, partitions and exitway constructed of not less than three quarter hour fire-resistant material.

Article 21. Mr. Atwood moved to amend Article VIII, Section 2 of the Building Code and Safety Ordinance as follows: 1. To insert after the word "judgment" the following words "provided all costs of said hearing shall be borne and paid for by the appellant." This motion was seconded. On a motion by Mr. Field, this article was amended to read Article VII. The main motion was carried.

Article 22: On a motion by Mr. Sherrill it was voted to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed fifty dollars for ad-dollars to provide training course expenses at the University of New Hampshire for person(s) designated by the Selectmen to enroll in the special course on Regional Development and Economic Growth.

Article 23: On a motion by Mr. Nyberg, it was voted to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed fifty dollars for administrative expenses and miscellaneous supplies for the Town Planning Board.

Article 24: On a motion by Mr. Atwood it was voted to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed ninety dollars for the building and installing of street signs on all town inter-sections.

Article 25: Mr. Sherrill made a motion to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed six hundred dollars to install fencing around the Town Dump. This motion was seconded by Mr. Field. The vote on this article was negative.

Article 26: On a motion by Mr. Beebe, seconded by Mr. Sherrill, it was voted to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed four thousand dollars for the purpose of drawing up a Master Plan for the Town, and to authorize the selectmen to execute any and all contracts or agreements necessary and proper or advisable in the development of such a Master Plan. There were 57 ballots cast, 37 yes, 20 no.

Article 27: Russell D. Estabrook moved that the Selectmen investigate the legality, etc. of forming a Board of Assessors. His motion was seconded but received a negative vote.

Meeting was adjourned at 10:45.

POLICE CHIEF'S REPORT

To the Board of Selectmen

Newton, N. H.

Gentlemen:

"Highway accidents," still considered the #1 killer, are becoming more serious each year. A simple slogan, one that is important but often thoughtlessly abused, is "Drive Carefully." During the year of 1965, there have been numerous automobile accidents, some serious and even fatalities. All of these accidents could have been prevented if a few basic precautions were taken. As these automobile accidents are increasing at an alarming percentage, it is vital that the townspeople of Newton become aware of this.

The Newton Police Department urges the citizens of the town to cooperate with them in helping to avoid these tragedies. Townspeople are cautioned to simply slow down, not to drive under emotional strain or under the influence of alcohol, and above all to live and let live.

These warnings have been repeated many times. But the policemen cannot prevent accidents alone. This appeal is made doubly strong this year. The Police Department is confident that this next year will be less of a tragic one if the townspeople heed their advice.

To the Children of Newton, N. H.

A few mistakes by a very few of you hasn't let me down. I still say Newton is tops in my book for the behavior and actions of its children. Join the scouts, youth groups, church groups, listen to your leaders, in school, listen to your teachers, and all the time, listen to your parents.

In a group — don't try to outdo the smart alec; don't do things you have been told not to do.

The Chief and Officers of this Department wish once again to thank the townspeople for the cooperation shown.

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newton in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Newton on Tuesday, the 8th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To hear the reports of Town Officers and pass any vote relating thereto.

4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired by Tax Collector's deed or through Old Age Assistance; or any other property of the Town not used for public purposes.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred, Ninety-five dollars and Fifteen cents (\$295.15) to receive One Thousand, Nine Hundred, Sixty-seven dollars and Sixty-seven cents (\$1,967.67) for Class V Roads.

7. To see if the Town will vote (a) to purchase and equip a new Class "A" combination Pumper Fire Truck according to Specifications drawn and approved by the Fire Department; (b) to authorize the Selectmen to execute contracts or agreements necessary and proper in connection with the purchase and equipping of such Fire Truck; and (c) authorize the Selectmen to issue bonds or notes in an

amount not to exceed Sixteen Thousand, Five Hundred (\$16,500) dollars for the purpose of financing such purchase and equipment.

8. To see if the Town will vote:

- (a) to authorize the Trustees of Trust Funds to establish a common trust fund to combine Town Trust Funds for investment purposes and economic administration, said consolidation being pursuant to Chapter 31:27 NH RSA; and
- (b) to cause the Trustees to arrange for trust records to be available for public inspection at reasonable times.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed One Thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) to reshingle the cupola of the Town Hall, and to authorize the Selectmen to execute any and all contracts or agreements necessary and proper to accomplish said reshingling.

10. On the request of ten or more legal voters of Newton, to see if the Town will vote to authorize School Age Non-Profit Organizations of Newton to hold their meetings in the Town Hall at no cost to the Organization.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Four Hundred dollars (\$400.00) to install a Blue Phone Network for the Town Police Department and to authorize the Selectmen to execute any and all contracts or agreements necessary and proper for such installation.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Eight Hundred, Eighty dollars (\$880.00) to purchase a Plow Blade for the Town and authorize the Selectmen to execute any and all contracts or agreements necessary and proper for purchasing of said Plow Blade.

13. To see if the Town will vote to establish scheduled open hours at the Town Dump.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Three Hundred, Eight dollars (\$308.00)

as Newton's contribution to the annual budget of the Seacoast Regional Development Association, as authorized in the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, and revisions relating thereto, Chapter 31:4, Paragraph XIX.

15. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed One Hundred (\$100.00) for administrative and miscellaneous expenses for the Newton Planning Board.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Two Thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) to be used for reconstruction purposes on the Town Roads.

REPORT OF GALE LIBRARY TRUSTEES

Several projects of major proportion are underway at the library. All will take time to complete, but should prove an asset and provide better service to the community when completed.

The trustees voted to join with the great majority of libraries of the state in the new Library Development Program. Four districts have been formed. We are in the Exeter Area, or Southeast District.

The organizational meeting was held in Derry in March. Four meetings will be held annually. Each library participating will be represented by a delegate, chosen locally, for a three year term, and an alternate. Our board elected Mrs. Yates as its delegate and appointed Mrs. Arthur Wright as alternate. Our delegate was appointed to the Bylaws Committee.

The delegates, known as the Advisory Council, have worked to prepare for acceptance through its bylaws, planning, qualifications and card-borrowers committees, goals for member libraries to seek to attain. Five years have been allowed for attainment of them.

Goals include the adoption of written policies governing library objectives, such as fines, trustees duties, salaries, book purchases, budgets, hours open, governed by population; higher standards for library staffs, better building facilities, to include a telephone, running water and toilet facilities. A Board of Review will be established to which area problems can be taken, if considered a hardship.

State-wide borrowers cards will probably be established, for residents only, for adults above high school age. Service Centers are planned in areas large enough to meet space requirements.

Affiliated libraries will be able to continue book purchasing through the State Library, thus getting higher discount privileges.

Our first benefit from this affiliation was the gift of \$125 worth of reference books provided from federal funds

given to the state under the Library Assistance Act of Congress.

We are indebted to Mrs. Sarah K. Flynn, Troy, N. Y., a friend of Mrs. Mary (Hayford) Taylor, for the gift of 15 volumes of "The Illustrated Encyclopedia of Animal Life," as well as many other residents for gifts of books; to the Friends of the Gale Library for assistance given the librarian and the observance of National Library Week; to the Newton Garden Club for floral arrangements, with special arrangements for other library related events, and to the Newton Artists Society for exhibits.

Three book awards were made to winners of the library's summer reading contest, color movies were shown by Mrs. Rachel Sanborn, area consultant, and refreshments were served all contestants.

"Friends" were in charge of the National Library Week observance in April. Two books were awarded to Memorial School in recognition of winners of the book jacket contest in which the pupils participated. Paul Holmes, Plaistow, of the N. H. Archeological Society, showed artifacts of this area and spoke on Indian lore, and Boy Scouts Troop 91 gave Indian dances, in costume, on the last day. Refreshments were served by hostesses for this special event.

Hundreds of books have been borrowed from the Bookmobile, which makes periodical visits through cooperation of the State Library.

We are grateful to Mrs. Sanborn for her valued guidance and assistance throughout the year. She is presently directing a book-weeding project and instructing assistants in a re-cataloging program, which may take as long as three years to complete.

Our appreciation also is expressed to our librarian, Mrs. Edward Hatch, for the many extra hours she spends in seeing that all the various projects are carried out and for serving the town so many years.

REPORT OF THE NEWTON PLANNING BOARD

The people of the Town of Newton, with considerable foresight and intelligence, chose to approve several articles of the 1965 Town Warrant. This action served to promote the efforts of the planning board to aid our community. The foremost tool to fill our evergrowing needs was the approval of a town Master Plan. Although action on the State level in the administration of our contract has been slow, progress is being made with our plan. This has been accomplished largely through the unselfish efforts of our consultant, Thomas Associates, working without being under official contract and your board. A community survey was made, aided immeasurably by the PTA of Newton, so that the townspeople would be able to give their views as to what sort of community we are or would like to become. While the response of our citizens was not as complete as we would have wished, the survey showed a very good percentage return of the total townsfolk. The results have been compiled and studied and our consultant's report will be submitted at our February board meeting. Land use maps, a community base map, street layout, soil conditions, a population density map and topographical preliminary maps have been submitted to the board in their early developmental stages. A soil study is being conducted also. The coming year should show a great stride in the development of about two thirds of our Master Plan. The increasing development of the surrounding areas and the rapid extension of Route 495 emphasizes the value of these studies in the future plans for Newton.

I believe the town can take pride in new dumping facilities. The improvement of these facilities, long urged by member Christopher Sherrill, was accomplished by the approval of the town of the plans of the new custodian, Chester Bearce.

The approval of the necessary funds made possible the completion of a fine job of clearing up an old problem.

The board's street sign project was beset by many difficulties. Not the least of these, was the destruction of sign posts by vandals. An appeal was made that this destruction cease and we are pleased to report it was heeded. Don Miller and his Boy Scouts assisted the board in placing many of the sign posts and we thank them for their help and their civic interest. Member Warren Merritt spent many extra hours painting signs and posts. Every member, in fact, took an active part. As soon as the difficulty of lettering the signs is overcome, we shall be pleased to see new signs on every street.

One of the most important accomplishments of your board, was the creation of a set of Subdivision Regulations, authorized by the 1965 Town Meeting. These regulations, carefully drawn up on a state approved format, should serve to protect Newton from hap-hazard growth or unscrupulous developers. Thanks to our Selectman representative, Kenneth Field, we have complete printed sets of forms and regulations for the cost of the paper alone.

It should be borne in mind that many of our present regulations will be subject to review and possible change as new facts and knowledge of the needs and desires of the townspeople become evident. This information will become available through our consultant's research, studies of the board and subsequent public hearings.

The second semester of the Seacoast Regional Plan's study program at the University of New Hampshire has recently been completed. The final semester is expected to begin in early March. Thanks again to our citizens, Newton's representation at this school has been very good. The information gained in these sessions is valuable to the understanding of the economic, social and physical problems of towns and their growth. The first two semesters dealt mainly with background material, basic local and regional economics and

studies and methods of analysis of local and regional problems. The final semester will deal with solutions and action programs in community planning.

By and large, it has been a rewarding and fruitful year for planning in Newton. Many compliments have been paid to "little" Newton for their vigorous and forward looking participation in these planning programs. I wish to thank the people of Newton for their support and interest in these programs. I am sure I speak for the entire Newton Planning Board in saying I have been proud and privileged to serve our town.

Christopher Sherrill stated that the two towns of Brentwood and Fremont had resigned from the Sanborn Cooperative Planning Board, but Kingston and Newton were going ahead with it.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:30.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Citizens of Newton:

These last few months have certainly been eventful ones. In July, Newton was assigned, by the State Board of Education, to Supervisory Union #14; in August, several new staff members were employed, including a part-time music teacher, and a full-time principal; and in September, the district voted to become part of the Sanborn Regional School District.

The new Union arrangement and the employment of these new staff members seem to be working out extremely well. It is a little early, however, to comment on the co-operative school district. Yet, if the amount of work being done by your co-operative school board and school administrators is any indication of success, Newton and Kingston should have one of the most successful units in the entire state.

School opened this year with an enrollment of 324 and with three new staff members, including a new principal. Mrs. Coula Barakitis was elected to teach music. She received her Bachelor of Music Education degree from Lowell State College. Before coming to Newton, she had teaching experience in Lexington, Billerica, and Lowell schools. Mrs. Eileen O'Malley, second grade teacher, was graduated from Boston State College and has had two years of teaching experience in the Everett elementary schools. Miss Sharon Pratt, a graduate of Plymouth State College was employed to teach grade four. Miss Pratt did her practice teaching in Plymouth, New Hampshire elementary schools. Mr. Paul Hanson earned his Bachelor and Master of Arts degrees from the University of New Hampshire and has had considerable teaching and administrative experience in elementary schools. Newton is indeed fortunate to have a principal with his qualifications.

This report would be incomplete without a few words

NEWTON TOWN REPORT

relative to the new National Elementary and Secondary School Education Act of 1965 (ESEA). This act was the first major legislation of national significance to be enacted by the 89th Congress. Keyed to "poverty" ESEA has five major provisions in it.

Title I provides funds to school districts for special programs designed to meet the needs of educationally deprived children in attendance areas with high concentration of low-income families. The amount of grant is based on the number of school age children (5-17) in low-income families in the school district as reported in the 1960 census. Newton is entitled to receive as much as \$5,406.44 towards the support of an approved project providing, of course, the school district votes to authorize the school board to accept such aid. If this is done, the Newton, Kingston, and Fremont school officials plan to sponsor a joint "Improvement in Reading" program. This program will be held at Bakie School as this seems to be most centralized.

Title II authorizes distribution of \$100 million to the states for acquisition of library resources, including textbooks and audio-visual materials. This title establishes the Supervisory Union as the acting agent rather than the district as in Title I. Our Union #14 was allotted \$6,075.00 and on December 15, 1965, we submitted a proposal to spend the entire amount in order to establish an audio-visual center in the Union with its possible location at Sanborn Seminary.

Title III provides another \$100 million for grants to local school districts for the establishment of supplementary educational centers. An extremely wide range of activities may be authorized under this title. The terms, however, require that the school authorities must cooperate with other educational and cultural interests in the community in working out projects.

Title IV provides money for regional educational research and training facilities. Grants will be awarded to institutions of higher education and the non-profit agencies to undertake programs which will benefit public schools.

Title V makes available \$25 million to strengthen State Departments of Education.

In summary then, the titles which seem to apply most directly to Newton are Titles I and II. It is with these that your school board and local school administrators will be primarily concerned.

In closing, may I say that the cooperation and understanding of your school district officials these last few months has been fully appreciated. A special thanks to your Board Chairman, Mr. John Swasey, who for the past thirteen years has been serving the district as a school board member. Through his untiring efforts, Newton can be proud of well-kept, up-to-date educational facilities staffed by a group of enthusiastic teachers.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

I am presenting herewith my annual report to the Superintendent of Schools, School Board and the Town of Newton:

The total enrollment in grades one through eight as of this writing is 326, with fifty-nine first-grade pupils being housed in the Village School. At the writing of the annual report last year, the total enrollment was 297. This is a growth of twenty-nine pupils. The growth for the last two years has been sixty-two pupils.

As the new Principal of the Newton Schools, I was pleased to find that much work had been done in the curriculum area and a general upgrading of curriculum was in progress. This upgrading is being continued, but with a concentrated effort in the area of reading. This year we made major improvements in this area by adding reading laboratory materials from Science Research Associates for grades two through eight. The new materials are aimed at improving reading skills, reading rate, and listening skills. These materials are designed to offer individualized reading instruction to students in their regular classrooms. This is — in keeping with our needs in education today — a “belt-tightening” program aimed at demanding and getting each individual’s top performance developmentally and with due regard for individual differences. These materials enable each child to start where he is and move ahead as fast and as far as his learning rate and capacity will let him — regardless of the classroom in which he may be sitting. This helps break the lock-step that has so long been an undesirable aspect of the more traditional educational practices.

The French program has been expanded to two more grades to include grades four through six. These classes are in the capable hands of Miss Roberta Gonthier.

Modern Math has been added to more classes and this phase of curriculum development will be completed in Sep-

tember when every child in the Newton Elementary Schools will be in the Modern Math program.

The standardized testing program has been improved by the addition of the Iowa Test of Basic Skills and the eighth grade's inclusion in a state-wide testing program utilizing the Metropolitan Achievement Test. The testing program is still in a process of improvement and should be continually revised with an eye to getting the most complete information possible to help teachers and supervisors improve instruction, to aid in the guidance of our children and to evaluate their progress.

Our athletic program was expanded to include touch football and basketball for the boys under the able coaching of Mr. Guy Mawhinney. Miss Sharon Pratt initiated and developed an excellent cheerleading squad and pep club.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank the Parent-Teachers' Association for its contribution in supplying ten basketball uniforms and the material for the cheerleaders' uniforms and for the help and interest in the children of Newton.

I sincerely thank Mr. Francis Wilson, Superintendent; the Administrative Staff; School Board; the Teaching Staff; Mrs. Verna Cronan, School Secretary; Mrs. Augusta Gibbs, School Nurse; Mr. Floyd Winter and Mr. Everett Kelly, School Custodians; Mr. Paul Morse and the bus drivers for their most helpful cooperation.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL HEALTH PROGRAM

To the Superintendent of Schools and the School Board of Newton:

I hereby submit my first annual report as School Nurse-Teacher.

The school nurse-teacher carries out a wide variety of duties. These include:

A. Health Appraisal

1. cursory Examinations

This examination includes inspection of the throat, teeth, glands, head, arms and hands of all pupils at the beginning of the school year and after each vacation period.

2. The yearly physical examination done by Francis Harris, M. D., assisted by Mrs. Augusta Gibbs, RN. In October 157 medical exams were done on pupils in grades 1 - 3 - 5 - 7 and all pupils new to the schools.

3. Vision and Hearing

All pupils are tested every year.

4. Heights and weights are checked and recorded annually.

5. Follow-Up

Unless a successful program of follow-up is carried out, all the testing and examinations are useless.

a. Parents and guardians are notified of all physical defects and assistance is offered to obtain necessary corrective care.

b. Assisting teachers in making adjustments in children's programs, seating arrangements, etc., when needed.

B. Emergency care of accidents or illness at school.

1. First aid is rendered to injured or ill pupils.

2. Parents are contacted and transportation is arranged for the child who is too ill to stay in school.

C. Communicable Disease Control

1. A Tuberculin Skin Testing Program will be held in March for grades 1 - 3 - 5 - 8 and all school personnel.

2. School personnel were given "Flu Shots" by Dr. Harris, assisted by your school nurse, in November, 1965.

D. Health Instruction

1. A program of dental health was given to the children in grade 3.

2. A personal hygiene course was presented to the girls in grades 6 - 7 - 8 - in February.
3. Health guidance is a continuous process for the school nurse and even the application of a bandaid is used as an opportunity to teach the importance and method of caring for minor wounds.

E. Attendance of Professional Meeting

Your school nurse acts as a professional representative of the school to other health organizations. She attends meeting as requested by State, Local and Regional Organizations that concern community and school health needs.

F. Pre-School Registration

Pre-school registration is held in May. At this time, the school nurse assists by taking the medical history of the children to be enrolled in the first grade in September. This helps the school nurse to become acquainted with the incoming pupils and their parents or guardians. Any disabilities they may have are noted at this time so that any necessary adjustments may be made.

I would like to thank the Superintendent of Schools. Principal. Teachers. School Personnel and Parents for their help and cooperation in my first year as your School Nurse-Teacher.

Only in a fully coordinated program of health and education is it possible for a child to reach his full educational attainment.
