## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

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To the Inhabitants of the Town of Rumney in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Rumney Town Hall in said Rumney on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of its high-ways and bridges.

4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Library.

5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Fire Department.

6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the Cemeteries.

7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of the Common and for the daily raising and lowering of the flag.

8. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Street Lights.

9. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the LaMott-Kenneson Post, No. 76, American Legion, for Memorial Day and for other patriotic purposes.

10. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to celebrate John Stark Day (August 9, 1952).



11. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the Town Dump.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$282.64 to secure from the State \$1,884.24 to be expended for Town Road Aid.

13. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region.

14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate towards the operation of the Sceva Speare Memorial Hospital in Plymouth, N. H.

15. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or borrow, for the construction of a new bridge and approaches over Stinson Brook, to replace the so-called Winsor Bridge.

16. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the Town the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old-Age and Survivor's Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 234 of the Laws of 1951 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 to defray the town's share of the cost thereof.

17. If the foregoing article is adopted, to see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to execute on behalf of the town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the Town will designate the Town Treasurer as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.

18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer, lease, rent, sell or otherwise dispose of any real estate or mineral rights acquired by the Town at any of its tax collectors' sales and to execute the necessary papers.

19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell excessive equipment.

20. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for tarring town roads.

21. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for heating equipment for the Fire Department.

22. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for legal advice.

23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

24. To see if the Town will vote to allow a 2 per cent discount on all taxes paid with 15 days after presentation of tax bills.

25. To see if the Town will vote to have the inventory blanks distributed at the time of taking appraisal of properties.

26. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

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To the Inhabitants of the School district in the Town of Rumney qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the eighth day of March, 1952, at two o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.
9. To see if the district will vote to authorize the construction and equipping of a new elementary school building and the purchase of any land which may be necessary therefor, and to appropriate a sum not exceeding One Hundred Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$115,000) for such purpose.
10. To see if the district will vote to borrow in the name of the district by the issue of serial bonds or notes, as provided in Chapter 72, Revised Laws of

1942, and any amendments thereto, including Chapter 5 of the Session Laws of 1951, a sum not exceeding One Hundred and Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$115,000) for the purposes specified in the preceding Article, and to authorize the School Board to determine the time and place of payment and rate of interest on said bonds or notes and to do whatever may be necessary to the issuance thereof.

11. To see what action the district will take relative to increasing the insurance on the present school buildings and appropriating necessary money therefor.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS—RUMNEY

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### The Rumney School Board

My ninth annual report as your superintendent of schools is now submitted for your information and that of citizens of Rumney. The report presents a discussion of the major problems before the school district, and such statistical data as may be useful to the people of this town.

Parents are cordially invited to consult me or the teacher whenever they are puzzled or uneasy about conditions in school, and such conferences will always be welcomed. Of course, it is our hope that such conferences will seldom be necessary, but we realize that no school can be so managed that some questions should not be raised and answered. Whenever a parent feels that some question should be raised or some want made known, he should have no hesitation whatever in contacting me or his child's teacher. Uneasiness due either to actual or supposed school conditions can best be adjusted by a frank and free discussion of the issues. I have appreciated the willingness of parents to have those discussions with me, and believe that they have been profitable. We certainly have done our best to make satisfactory adjustment that would be fair both to the parents and the teachers.

The Rumney School District very wisely set up a committee of townspeople to work with the School Board in conducting a study of future school building needs in the town. Since a change in our school housing system may come about, it is wise to have preliminary studies completed as a guide in future district action. In the summer of 1951 I conferred with a representative of the United States Office of Education and discussed with him the school needs in Rumney as they now appear. A report based on that discussion has been made available to the special advisory committee. My own suggestions are here offered for whatever value they may have in community planning.

(1) It seems to me that none of our present buildings are adequate or suitable for enlarging. The district has, for several years, been spending considerable money on repairs, and we still have school buildings into which more money must be continually poured.

(2) The present school sites are all too small to be considered without considerable acreage being added. It might be possible to purchase the necessary land to enlarge the school lot at Rumney Depot. The Village School site does not lend itself well to enlargement, because of the nature of the surrounding land. It is also questionable whether a central school should be situated at the top of a steep curve over which school busses must travel in all kinds of weather. The lot at West Rumney, while it perhaps could be enlarged, is located on one edge of town and too far from the center of school population.

(3) Since we are already furnishing transportation for so many school children, it does not seem as though a centralized school would make much difference in that item of expense.

(4) Present-day thinking and recommendations on the size of a school building lot set five acres as the minimum.

(5) When a centralized school is planned for Rumney, thought ought to be given to the following items:

(a) Sufficient classrooms to allow for present and anticipated school population. If possible, classrooms should be available so that children in grades 1, 2, and 3 need not be combined with children of any other grade under a single teacher.

(b) The value of a school lunch program is becoming generally recognized especially where a large number of children are transported to school. Space for the preparation and serving of a school lunch should be considered.

(c) A new school building should provide adequate space for combined auditorium and recreational purposes. There is a growing practice throughout the

country of making schools available for more frequent community use. This policy seems sound to me, in view of the heavy financial investment made in the school construction, and the fact that the entire population should get the greatest possible return on that investment.

(d) In preparation for the demands that will be made upon them, both in school and in actual living, children should have access to much more reference reading material than is now available. For that reason, adequate space for library service may well be considered.

(e) A modern school requires large quantities of supplies both for pupils and building maintenance. Adequate storage space for textbooks, supplies and maintenance materials should not be overlooked.

At all times your superintendent is willing and anxious to help in any way that seems best. My concern is, and must always be, to give every child in your schools the opportunity which is likely to help him become a useful citizen.

Salaries throughout the state, as well as the entire country, show an upward trend. Teachers graduating from teacher training institutions are expecting higher initial salaries each year. This in turn has an affect on the salaries of experienced teachers now in service. Constantly increasing living costs and tax reductions put those who are on fixed incomes at a disadvantage. While the results of the latest salary survey in New Hampshire are not yet available, it is my belief that salaries throughout Supervisory Union No. 48 are not equal to the state average. We must all be aware of what this situation would mean if replacements became necessary.

A committee of teachers, consisting of one representative from each school district outside of Plymouth, made a study of report cards, and recommended a revised reporting system for our elementary schools. The new report cards were issued in December, covering the first 12 weeks of school. The mark-

ing system and the information given about pupils represent a cross section of desires expressed by teachers and parents whom they interviewed. We have tried to make the reports as comprehensive and informative as possible without making them too complicated. The wishes and suggestions of parents are always welcomed to help us in later changes, should they seem necessary.

While few statistics have been included in this report, it has been thought best to give a limited number. Those that are included may give people of the town information and the answers to some of their questions.

In conclusion, I wish to express my appreciation of the fine cooperation given at all times by the Rumney School Board, the loyal and efficient work of the teachers, and the friendliness of pupils in the schools.
