TOWN WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Salem, in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town house, in said town, on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at twelve (12:00) of the clock noon, to act upon the following subjects:

- Art. 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 2. Shall the provisions of chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing of games of beano be adopted in this town?
- Art. 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for the same.
- Art. 4. To see if the town will vote to raise any more money for the repairs of highways than the law requires.
- Art. 5. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen, and pass on any vote relating thereto.
 - Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to authorize

the town treasurer to hire, with the approval of the selectmen, such sums of money as may be needed for general purposes in anticipation of taxes.

- Art. 7. To see what action the town will take relative to lighting the streets, and raise money for the same.
- Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money not to exceed seven thousand dollars (\$7,000), for the purpose of providing police officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money not to exceed seven thousand dollars \$7,000), for the maintenance of the fire department for the ensuing year.
- Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), or any part thereof, for snow removal and general highway expenses for the year 1950.
- Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of eight hundred one dollars and eighty-two cents (\$801.82), and apply for State Aid for Class V Highways.
- Art. 12. To see if the town will raise the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), or any part thereof, to provide a sinking fund for permanent improvements as provided in Chapter 160 of the Public Acts of the 1943 Legislature. Said fund shall be invested by the Trustees of the Trust Fund until expended as provided in said Act. Said money shall be expended by the selectmen for any or all of the purposes

named in the 1944 warrant. Further said money shall be expended to give the greatest possible employment to returned service men in the process of adjustment to civil life.

- Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200), or any part thereof, to maintain and improve the town Common and the Public Square near Pine Grove Cemetery.
- Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of twenty five hundred dollars (\$2,500), or any part thereof, to defray the expenses of equipment for the town office and for expenses of moving to new location.
- Art. 15. To see what action the town will take relative to allowing a discount on taxes.
- Art. 16. By request of library trustees. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500), or any part thereof, above the amount required by law, for the support of the Salem Free Public Library for the year 1950.
- Art. 17. By request of library trustees. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500), or any part thereof, for new tile flooring in library building.
- Art. 18. By request of cemetery trustees. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000), to be expended in the care of walks, drives and vacant lots in Pine Grove Cemetery.

- Art. 19. By request of Ernest W. Young Post, American Legion, and Salem Memorial Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of four hundred and fifty dollars (\$450), or any part thereof, for use of the above Veterans' Organizations, to be expended in the observance of Memorial Day in the year 1950.
- Art. 20. By request of the 200th Anniversary Committee. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000), or any part thereof, to help defray the expenses of the anniversary celebration.
- Art. 21. By request of the Selectmen for the State Highway Department. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000), to build a four lane road from the brook near the Salem Coca Cola Bottling Co. to the square at Salem Depot.
- Art. 22. By request of the Memorial Auditorium Committee. To see if the town will vote to expend the trust funds received from the Veteran's Servicemen's Fund Commission for the purpose of completing and equipping shower rooms and other facilities in the Woodbury High School Auditorium for public use as a Memorial to the War Veterans, to be known as the War Veterans Memorial Auditorium.
- Art. 23. By request of Guy L. Ackerman. To see if the town will vote to gravel and tar Howard St., from where it now ends, to Taylor St. and raise money for the same.
 - Art. 24. By request of Earl E. Gordon. To see if

the town will vote to gravel and tar Central St. from the property of Earl E. Gordon to Main St., a distance of about two hundred and fifty feet, and raise money for the same.

- Art. 25. By request of Ernest Lane and others. To see if the town will vote to gravel and tar the road leading from Policy Street past the pumping station to the old Rockingham Road and raise money for the same.
- Art. 26. By request of Arthur Wilson. To see if the town will vote to continue the gravel and tar road from the residence of Arthur Wilson on Wheeler Ave. to Bridge Street and raise money for the same.
- Art. 27. By request of Henry Lacourse Jr. To see if the town will vote to gravel and tar the road from the Atkinson line at Providence Hill to the tar road near the residence of E. Dietel and raise money for the same.
- Art. 28. By request of Anna M. Noyes and others. To see if the town will vote to gravel and tar Pattee Road from where it now ends to Messer Avenue and raise money for the same.
- Art. 29. By request of John W. Parker. To see if the town will vote to gravel and tar the road leading from the Linus Chase place to the residence of Frank Powers on the Derry Road, and raise money for the same.
- Art. 30. By request of Kelly Dahood. To see if the town will vote to gravel and tar Brady Avenue

from where the road now ends to the Lowell Road and raise money for the same.

- Art. 31. By request of Henry Pendergast. To see if the town will vote to extend the water main from Cluff's Crossing to the residence of Henry J. Pendergast and raise money for the same.
- Art. 32. By request of Anna M. Noyes and others. To see if the town will vote to extend its water main from South Broadway up Pattee Road to Lawrence Road, and raise the sum of seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$7,500) for the same.
- Art. 33. By request of the North Salem Fire Department. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to purchase a new piece of fire apparatus for Station No. 3 of North Salem.
- Art. 34. By request of the Selectmen. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to deed the Tracy lot, adjoining the Woodbury High School lot, to the Salem School District, reserving a right of way forty feet wide on the west side of lot to be used as a roadway to the athletic field.
- Art. 35. By request of Emde Cloutier. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell a strip of land from the Fire Station lot, approximately four feet wide by fifty-seven feet long, to said Emde Cloutier and issue deed for the same.
- Art. 36. By request of Salem Gas Dealers Association. To see if the town will vote to prohibit any gas station from opening within five hundred yards of one another in the center of the town.

- Art. 37. By request of Salem Board of Trade. To see if the town will vote to request all persons laying out new streets in the town to register the name of said street with the town clerk to avoid duplication.
- Art. 38. By request of Salem Board of Trade. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to install an additional traffic light in front of the Salem Depot Post Office syncronized with the one in the southwest corner of the square, in order to stop traffic going south before it reaches the square and thus give more space for the flow of traffic off Main Street.
 - Art. 39. By request of Guy Palermo. To see if the town will vote to install one street light on Salem Street at the residence of Mary Palermo and raise money for the same.
- Art. 40. By request of David D. Webb. To see if the town will vote to install one street light on Merrill Avenue opposite his residence and raise money for the same.
- Art. 41. By request of Emile Laliberte and others. To see if the town will vote to install four street lights on Pond Street and raise money for the same.
- Art. 42. By request of Spurgeon W. Smith. To see if the town will vote to install two street lights on Ann Avenue, one at each end of the street, and raise money for the same.
- Art. 43. By request of the Water Commissioners and others. To see if the town will vote to install two

street lights on the pumping station road and raise money for the same.

- Art. 44. By request of Burton Weinhold and others. To see if the town will vote to install one street light at the corner of Senter Street and Messer. Avenue and raise money for the same.
- Art. 45. By request of William Muse and others. To see if the town will vote to install street lights on Policy Road, between Hall's Crossing and the residence of Charles W. Lilley, and raise money for the same.
- Art. 46. By request of Joseph Martin. To see if the town will vote to accept the road leading from Liberty Street to the residence of Leo Dufault at Captain's Pond, approximately sixteen hundred feet.
- Art. 47. By request of David D. Webb. To see if the town will vote to accept approximately three hundred feet of new road on Merrill Avenue.
- Art. 48. By request of Charles A. Menut. To see if the town will vote to accept Maple Place as a public highway for a distance of approximately three hundred feet from Main Street.
- Art. 49. By request of Harold Nutter. To see if the town will vote to accept the road at Millville Lake leading from the residence of Arnold Leriche to the camp of Arthur Marden, thence to Seubert's grove, thence from Marden's camp to Marden's field, past the residence of Harold Nutter.
- Art. 50. By request of Walter Stickney. To see if the town will vote to accept Lishner Avenue, a

distance of five hundred feet, leading from the North Salem Road into Dolphin Park at Wheeler Reservoir.

- Art. 51. By request of Joseph Sevigny. To see if the town will vote to accept Westchester Street, leading from So. Broadway towards Granite Ave., approximately six hundred feet.
- Art. 52. By request of Howard McClary, Minott Brown and others. To see if the town will vote to accept Center Street beginning at Lawrence Road and running to the Spicket river, a distance of approximately four hundred and fifty feet.
- Art. 53. By request of Anna M. Noyes. To see if the town will vote to accept Messer Avenue from Pattee Road to Senter Street, a distance of approximately four hundred feet.
- Art. 54. By request of Anna M. Noyes. To see if the town will vote to accept Rosewood Avenue from Pattee Road to Senter Street, a distance of approximately five hundred feet.

- Art. 59. By request of Mrs. Myrtie Fitzgerald. To see if the town will vote to accept one hundred dollars from Mrs. Myrtie Fitzgerald as a perpetual fund, the interest to be expended in the care of the Myrtie Fitzgerald lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.
- Art. 60. By request of William Henning. To see if the town will vote to accept one hundred dollars from William Henning as a perpetual fund, the interest to be expended in the care of the William Henning lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.
- Art. 61. By request of Clarence Whippie. To see if the town will vote to accept one hundred and fifty dollars from Clarence Whippie as a perpetual fund, the interest to be expended in the care of the Whippie-Muzzey lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.

This audit covered the period from July 30, 1948, date of the previous audit, to August 10, 1949. FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: Dec. 31, 1947-Dec. 31, 1948: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1947 and December 31, 1948, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein an increase in Net Debt of \$99,240.60 took place during the year.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

The factors which caused the change in financial condition were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—

Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and ex-

penditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1948, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D) a net revenue surplus of \$20,754.29, less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$8,342.75, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$12,411.54.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1948, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance, as of August 10, 1949, is indicated in Exhibit M.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depositary banks.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus-December 31, 1948:

A substantial improvement in the current financial position of the town was made during 1948. The balance sheet of December 31, 1948, (Exhibit A) discloses a current surplus of \$7,862.86, as com-

pared to a current deficit of \$12,896.54 as of December 31, 1947. This is indicated herewith:

It will be noted that in 1948 there was a budget surplus of \$12,411.54, as compared to a budget deficit of \$11,293.60 in 1947.

Appropriation Overdrafts:

Total overdrafts of appropriations were reduced

from \$26,411.94 in 1947 to \$18,415.66 in 1948; unexpended balances of appropriations increased from \$2,625.78 to \$10,072.91, with a resulting decrease in the net overdraft of appropriations from \$23,786.16 to \$8,342.75.

Although, as noted, a decrease was made in the appropriation overdrafts, it is believed that a substantial reduction in such overdrafts could still be effected through better budgetary planning and concontrol.

The appropriation accounts in which the larger overdrafts occurred were as follows:

Balance Sheet: (Elimination of Doubtful Asset Accounts)

In our audit report of last year we recommended that the following items, which have been carried as "Accounts Receivable" for several years, be eliminated from the assets in future balance sheets:

Earl L. Gordon (Former Tax Collector) \$8,237.94 Amos J. Cowan (Former Town Clerk) 871.90

This recommendation was made because it appears doubtful if anything will be realized from either of these accounts. Consequently in the balance sheet of December 31, 1948, it will be noted that neither of these accounts has been included.

Balance Sheet: (Uncollected Taxes- Previous Year)
Last year we commented on the fact that as of

December 31, 1947, there were uncollected taxes of the levies of 1938 to 1945. inclusive, amounting to \$3,001.50, which were still carried as assets in the balance sheet. These consisted for the most part of poll taxes, many of which are apparently uncollectible.

It is noted that during 1948 the only activity in these prior year's accounts consisted of collections amounting to \$42.00 and abatements of \$27.00 leaving uncollected balances, as of December 31, 1948, totaling \$2,932.50.

It is again recommended that these lists be carefully gone over by the selectmen and tax collector and abatements be made in cases where the taxes appear to be uncollectible.

Conclusion:

The accounts and records of all town officials were found in good condition and the accounting procedure, with exceptions as herein noted, conformed to the uniform methods prescribed by this Division.

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual town report. This letter of transmittal should be included in its entirety but the inclusion of Exhibits is optional.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town

of Salem for their assistance during the course of the audit.

REPORT OF MEMORIAL AUDITORIUM COMMITTEE

Since the reappointment of the Memorial Auditorium Committee at the Town Meeting of 1947, nothing specific has been accomplished by it, nor has any recommendation been made to the Town for action. However, much has transpired beyond the scope of this committee which has direct bearing upon its activities and therefore necessitated immediate action.

In October 1949, a contract was awarded by the School District for the construction of an Elementary School and an Addition to Woodbury High School. The Addition to Woodbury High School will now provide adequate space for a basketball court 42 feet wide by 74 feet long, seating space for an assembly of approximately 1,000 people, and space for showers and public toilets in the basement at southerly end.

We have been informed by the School Board that funds are not now available for certain facilities which should be included in the final structure. Upon receipt of this information, this Memorial Auditorium Committee started to consider means whereby the School Board could obtain these facilities and at the same time we could fulfill our obligation to the Town by offering a possible solution to obtaining a "Memorial Auditorium." We assumed that the Town could not possibly erect a suitable Memorial Auditorium and still keep a reasonable budget. This assumption left us with only one resort

—that of finding an auditorium already constructed. As planned, the remodeled Auditorium at Woodbury High School now comes close to answering our purpose. All that is necessary is completion of certain required work and a new name. The School Board believes that there would be no serious objection to calling the auditorium at Woodbury High School by the name "Memorial Auditorium" or some other appropriate name, and steps have been instituted to provide for that name.

In recognition of this completed addition being considered as a "Memorial Auditorium" and appropriately designated as such, this committee believes that funds should be raised to complete the building, and that it should be called a "Memorial Auditorium" with suitable bronze tablets in commemoration and recognition of the servicemen and women who gave of their efforts and in some instances their lives that this Town and our country remain free.


We think that the former "Servicemen's Fund" (now about \$6,500) held in trust by the Trustees should be used to assist in the completion of this work and that an additional \$5,000 should be raised for completion of this "Memorial Auditorium."

As it is impossible to raise funds at a Town Meeting for direct use of a School District it will be necessary to raise this additional \$5,000 at the School District Meeting. The former "Servicemen's Fund" referred to above can be diverted to the "Memorial Auditorium" at the Town Meeting. These additional funds appropriated for the express purpose of completing the "Memorial Auditorium" will provide an Auditorium-Gymnasium having adequate shower and public toilet facilities in the basement

at the southerly end near the athletic field, a wood floor suitable for basketball as well as dancing, and a floor area capable of seating 1,000 people.

We therefore recommend that the former "Servicemen's Fund" be expended in the completion of the "Memorial Auditorium," and that the School District Meeting of 1950 appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to be used for completion of the "Memorial Auditorium."

SCHOOL WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the town of Salem qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Woodbury High School in said district on the eighteenth day of March 1950, at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Article 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
- Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- Article 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- Article 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 7. To choose Agents and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

Article 9. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the district, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the Federal Works Agency, or other United States Government or State Agencies, or local or private agencies.

Article 10. To see if the district will name the new Auditorium the "War Veterans Memorial Auditorium" and authorize the School Board to take the steps necessary for installing an appropriate plaque designating the auditorium as such.

Article 11. On petition of the Memorial Committee to see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 for the purpose of securing added facilities for the War Veterans Memorial Auditorium.

Article 12. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$2,250 as a deficiency appropriation for the payment of interest on school bonds covering a period from October 15, 1949 to

April 15, 1950, this sum to be paid over to the School District during the school year 1949-50.

Article 13. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$50 for a State Audit of the School District books.

Article 14. To see if the district will vote to direct the School Board to sell the No. 7 School building, land, and property, and appropriate the funds received for the purpose of defraying some of the expenses of constructing the new school buildings; and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 15. To transact any further business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

To the Citizens of Salem:

Your school board is pleased to render its annual report regarding our school system, its maintenance and progress. The financial report showing how the school appropriation was spent will be found on other pages of this book. The board has sincerely tried to spend the money the school district appropriated to the best advantage of the system as a whole. Repairs to the various school buildings were as follows:

No. 1 school. The class rooms in this building, as well as the annex, were given a new coat of paint. The halls were not painted. We hope to do that this summer.

No. 4 school. For the first time in history this school building has flush toilets and running water. The old fashioned heating system has been supplanted with a more sightly and completely adequate gas-fired system. Thanks to the kindness and generosity of Mr. William Palmer the school committee was permitted to take water from a well on his property and to install a septic tank, also on his land.

The installation of a chain wire fence across the lot adjoining the street was an added improvement that will prevent the children from racing unchecked across the street.

No. 6 school. This building needed little attention this year. It was painted inside last year, except for the halls. Some desks were repaired and sanded and the building thoroughly cleaned. A new

boiler will be needed in this building before long. A six-foot chain wire fence across the front of the lot adjoining the street will keep the children out of the street.

No. 8 school. This building was given two coats of paint inside and out. The boiler in this building was old and reconstructed. It gave out completely in October and had to be replaced. This is an example of the emergency items that may crop up at any time.

No. 9 school. This building was thoroughly cleaned and minor repairs made. The boiler was reconverted to burn oil. Before the war an oil burner was installed but it was converted to coal during the oil shortage. The oil burner has again been installed.

Over-crowded conditions in No. 1 school and in No. 6, necessitated the opening of two additional class rooms, one in the town hall, the other in the vestry of the Pleasant Street Methodist church. We extend our thanks to the members of the board of selectmen for their co-operation in sharing the cost of installing flush tiolets in the town hall and for the inconvenience they may experience during the year. The toilets, however, are a greatly needed improvement to the building.

We also extend our thanks to the trustees and members of the Methodist church for their co-operation. Here too, the improvements provided will be appreciated by all members of the parish.

These haphazard innovations, however, are unsatisfactory and expensive. The class rooms provided, are not functional and are only stop-gaps. They

tend to make the school system a patch-work of non-integrated units.

Thanks to the foresight and courage of the citizens of Salem in appropriating money for a new school building, this hodge-podge of one-room schools will be eliminated. The new building and the addition to the Woodbury high school auditorium, will be ready for the opening of school in September. When completed, the new elementary building will be one of which the citizens of Salem can justly be proud. It will consist of ten classrooms, an auditorium and cafeteria combined, a badly needed office for the superintendent, a teachers room and a storage room. The heating system will be adequate not only to heat the new building, but Woodbury high school as well. The school committee takes this opportunity to extend its thanks to those members of the building committee who co-operated so thoroughly in deciding on building plans, in selecting the contractors and in putting up such a successful fight to bring the cost of the entire project within the amount appropriated. Our thanks go to Mr. Charles Seifert, chairman of the committee; to Mr. Earle Magoon, representing the board of selectmen: to Mr. James Sayer and Mr. Clarence Nutting who were elected to the committee at the last school district meeting. Each and every one of them contributed greatly to the development of the plans and gave unstintingly of their time until the entire proiect was set up.

Superintendent Grandy's experience as an educator, and his expert knowledge of functional school buildings and school systems was of incalculable value to the committee. Mr. Grandy also served as clerk of the committee meetings.

Our plans for the school year 1950-51 calls for housing practically all pupils of the fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grades in the new building. This will eliminate the class rooms in the townhall and the Methodist church. We hope to close No. 7 school and transport the children to the No. 6 and No. 8 schools. Any pupils in the upper four grades will be transported to the new building.

The new Woodbury auditorium will be highly appreciated by the townspeople. When completed it will accommodate any normal crowd that might meet in Salem. Adequate seating will be provided at town meetings, more people will be able to attend graduation exercises and, perhaps, more appreciated than anything else, there will be an adequate seating capacity at basketball games. Shower baths and lockers will be appreciated by our athletic teams and opponents who have been showing reluctance to play in Salem because of the lack of shower baths.

The auditorium will be available to all local organizations when not needed for school activities. It will not be available for commercial purposes.

The school committee feels that our teaching staff compares favorably with that of any other town and we extend our thanks to every member of the staff for their conscientious efforts on behalf of their pupils. We also wish to express our appreciation for the agressive interest taken in their communities by the Parent-Teachers associations in

North Salem and at Hampshire Roads. The interest shown by these two groups will be of great benefit to these two schools. To all others who have shown their interest by their suggestions and criticisms, we extend our thanks, and we promise our continued efforts to make the Salem school system as efficient and progressive as any in the state of New Hampshire.

REPORT OF THE SALEM SCHOOL BUILDING COMMITTEE

To The Citizens of Salem:

It is with pleasure that the Salem School Building Committee submits this report of progress to date on the construction of a new 10-room elementary school building and addition to Woodbury High School Auditorium.

On the evening of July 12, 1949, the elected committee consisting of Messrs: Magoon, Nutting, Sayer and Seifert met with the members of the school committee for the purpose of organization. In order to facilitate matters and prevent a duplication of effort, it was deemed advisable to combine the two groups into one committee. Organization was completed and Mr. Munro Grandy was selected to act as clerk.

During the next two months the committee devoted several meetings and innumerable hours to the work of selecting an architect and approving working drawings. Conferences were held with three architectural firms, namely: Ronald S. Simons, Manchester, N. H.; Ashton, Huntress and Pratt, Lawrence, Mass.; Hersey, Phaneuf & Snodgrass of Durham, N. H. After a careful study of the proposals presented by these firms, and a discussion of the schools built by them, the committee recommended that the firm of Ashton, Huntress & Pratt be employed.

With the selection of an architect the committee immediately proceeded with the selection of a plan for a new elementary school and an addition to the Woodbury High School auditorium. Working carefully with Mr. Pratt of the firm of Ashton, Huntress & Pratt, the committee visited several recently erected schools in this section and studied several rough drawings.

On September 15th, 1949, finished plans and specifications were presented to the committee. These were gone over in detail and on the following week the committee recommended the plans be accepted, and that the architect be authorized to secure bids. On the evening of October 14th, all bids which had been received were opened and analyzed. It was found that even the three lowest bidders on the combined project were in excess of the amount appropriated at the school district meeting. In view of the fact that there were several alternate proposals in the instructions to bidders, Mr. Pratt was requested to contact the three low bidders, namely: E. D. Snyder & Son, Inc.; The Maxam Company and Leon Keyser Co., to determine whether or not a revision could be made in their bids. The following week Mr. Pratt reported that, after contacting the above mentioned contractors, the Maxam Company, taking advantage of the alternates, had agreed to construct the elementary school building and Woodbury High School addition for a total of \$201,968.00 this representing the lowest combined figure received. For this amount the Maxam Company would construct a 10-room elementary school building with cafeteria, offices, teachers room and storage space; but would eliminate all screens, grading and seeding and a change in the heating system; also an addition to Woodbury High School auditorium in accordance with the original specifications leaving out all miscellaneous partitions, equipment, and floor in the shower room basement area; finished ceiling, plastering and tile flooring in the auditorium proper; and extra paving in the yard. The committee studied this proposal very carefully, realizing that the shower room and finish in the auditorium were very essential; but, in view of the pressing need for additional class room space, felt that it would be better to leave the finishing of the shower and locker rooms and work in the auditorium to some future date. The committee recommended the acceptance of the Maxam Company's proposal and construction was started on November 1st. Work has been progressing in an orderly manner since that date, and as of February 1st was well ahead of schedule.

The committee sincerely feels that the citizens are receiving an elementary school building that they can be justly proud of and one that is costing considerably less than buildings recently constructed in this area. Although the Woodbury auditorium addition is not as complete as the committee desired, it too is one that we can be proud of. Ample space has been provided for all school assemblies, sports

events, and ample seating capacity to take care of all town functions. If at a future date funds are secured to complete the shower and locker room, place a wood floor in the auditorium, and plaster the walls and ceilings; the town will have an auditorium and gymnasium second to none.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Board of Education and Citizens of Salem:

I hereby respectfully submit my third Annual Report. This report will include supplementary staff reports from the Headmaster of Woodbury High School, the Supervisor of Music Instruction, the Supervisor of Art Instruction, and the Director of Health Services. This report will cover statistical information concerning the school year beginning July 1, 1948 and ending June 30, 1949, with additional information concerning the statistics of the schools from July 1, 1949 to December 31, 1949.

I. GENERAL INFORMATION:

A. Enrollment

The schools of Salem reached a total of 764 unrepeated registrations for 1948-49 and the trend is upward with an enrollment this year of 844.

Estimated For September 1950—903

B. Teacher Status

The teacher turnover has not been unreasonable this year. The following replacements and additions have been made: In the school year 1948-49 Mrs. Marjorie Liles replaced Mrs. Elsie Rushton at the Hose House School and Mrs. Caroline Canty and Mrs. Joyce Strempke filled vacancies at the Number Six School.

Mr. Wendell V. Davis was elected as Headmaster of Woodbury High School replacing Mr. Eugene Rourke who resigned to take a position as teacher and head of the History Department at Brockton High School, Brockton, Massachusetts. Mr. Davis was submaster and coach at Woodbury, with experience as Director of Athletics at the Tilton School for Boys in Tilton, New Hampshire. Mr. Davis is a graduate of the University of New Hampshire with a B. S. Degree and secured a Master of Education Degree from Bates College. He is to be congratulated on the progress being made at Woodbury High School under his supervision.

Mr. Foster Ball is now our Varsity Coach of Football and Basketball, as well as Director of Athletics.

Mr. James O'Connor, a teacher coach, with four years experience at Haverhill Academy, fills the position of Varsity Coach of Baseball and Junior Varsity Coach of Football and Basketball. Mr. O'Connor holds Degrees from St. John's University.

At the beginning of this school year Mrs. Lottie Bailey was added to the staff to take care of the overflow in grades 5 and 6 which were housed in the Town Hall. Mrs. Bailey comes to us with many years of successful teaching in the Arlington, Massachusetts schools, and more recently was a teacher in the Londonderry Schools.

Miss Mary Valeska replaced Mrs. Liles at the Hose House School. Miss Valeska comes to us with many years of experience as a teacher and former principal of the Londonderry Central School.

Miss Frances Jorde, a graduate of Tufts College with a major in English and Social Studies re-

placed Mrs. Dorothy Bugbee as teacher of English and Social Studies at the Woodbury High School. After receiving her Degree Miss Jorde continued her studies in Norway, and gained experience in the teaching field at Mapleton, Maine.

II. CURRICULUM

Our teaching and Program of Studies is continuing to improve, gearing the schools to the individual needs of the pupil. Definite stress is placed on the fundamental tools of learning, Reading, Writing and Arithmetic, though these are complemented by the essentials to successful living, Health, Science, Social understanding and competence in democratic living.

The Program offered in the elementary field shows a marked advance. The Program offered at the High School level still serves only those young men and women who are preparing for college, nursing, commerce, and other "white collar" professions. The area of vocational training is neglected due primarily to the lack of facilities and finances.

Graduates attending post-secondary schools and colleges are doing unusually well, indicating adequate preparation for post-secondary education. A. Art and Music

Equipment and material for this important phase of the curriculum has been made available. A program in both these areas parallels the regular subject field when it seems desirable and practical. A Pops Concert was presented this year by Mrs. Eva Thompson which drew its talent from all grades rather than limiting it to the junior and senior grades. The Woodbury Choristers are to be commended for their fine presentations over the radio and in public appearances.

B. Athletics and the Physical Education Program

The Physical Education Program which was so successful last year continues with the addition of the Fall Term, under the supervision of Mr. O'Connor.

Girl's field hockey and Softball were placed on a major basis with schedules arranged in both sports.

C. Other Activities

1. Milk Program

The schools are serving an average of 2100 bottles of milk a week. The Red Cross, the Salem Woman's Club, the Salvation Army, and the North Salem Parent Teacher Association have all contributed funds so that all children needing milk are served.

2. Hot Lunch Program

During the colder months a limited lunch pro-

gram is offered at the Woodbury High School, and it is hoped that with the added facilities in the new elementary school building this program will be expanded.

3. Auto Driver Training

Under the direction of Mr. T. Ernest Peltonen, Auto Driver Training will be offered to students attending High School. Mr. Peltonen became certified through attendance at a special school for instructors in Auto-Driver Training held at Keene Teachers College. An automobile was given by Mr. Arthur Shugrue for exclusive use in this course.

4. Safety

With the cooperation of the Salem Board of Trade, Safety Figurines were made available for all the schools in Salem. School traffic patrols have been organized and safety education has become an integral part of the school program.

Mr. Robert Ebert, Chief of the Salem Fire Department, in cooperation with Chief of Police Dickey and the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles, Frederick Clark, is working out a program whereby the pupils from the Number Six School in Grades 1 through 3 are adequately supervised in their journeys to and from school.

III. SCHOOL HOUSING

With the completion of the new ten-room Elementary School and the Gymnasium, pupils who have previously been housed in temporary rooms or left in overcrowded classrooms, will be able to be assigned to the new up-to-date building. A complete report of the Building Committee appears as an addenda to this report.

IV. RECOMMENDATIONS AND CONCLUSIONS

As in years past this section is presented only for your action, and only through you can those things which you deem necessary and within your town's ability, be realized. Years will pass before some are accomplished and others may never be acted upon.

A. General

I wish to take this opportunity to congratulate the citizens of Salem for the superior effort they have made in offering additional facilities for the better education of the boys and girls of Salem. Progress has been made and continues to the end that Salem's Schools are among the best in the State.

B. Future Enrollments

Census figures, School Surveys, and regional trends indicate that Salem school enrollments will continue to rise. It is difficult to estimate future increases in communities adjacent to large cities, such as Salem, especially when population migration is toward urban communities.

The above totals might be smaller in the High School, where attendance at school is not compuls-

ory. These estimated enrollments also indicate increased costs for teachers, transportation, books and supplies.

C. Unit Costs

The per-pupil cost of education in Salem has been kept below the State's average cost, even though considerable advance has been made in facilities and services offered. The following are comparisons of the State average costs and Salem's average costs for the year ending last June 30, 1949:

D. Teacher Status

This last year some of our teachers continued their professional improvement. Of the twenty-seven teachers serving us all but four have either graduated from college or attended summer school in the last four years. Mrs. Eva Merrill, Mrs. Mary Foss, Mrs. Caroline Canty, Miss Marguerite Goodwin, Mr. Davis, Mr. Ball and Mr. Kearns all attended or participated in courses for professional improvement this last year.

1. Teachers' Salaries

The School Board last year adopted a salary schedule which indicates \$100.00 yearly increments:

until maximums were reached. In view of the present salary status, increases seem to be indicated.

E. Music

With the increase in the number of pupils and rooms which our Music Supervisor has to visit, it would be well to consider that additional time be made available for Music Instruction in the elementary grades.

V. CONCLUSIONS

A. Curriculum

The Program of Studies offered is being well carried out and our graduates are doing unusually well in their college endeavors and show reasonable efficiency in adult vocational pursuits, though expansion in the vocational area should be contemplated.

B. Teaching Staff

We are fortunate to have a staff of reasonably trained and experienced teachers.

C. School Enrollments

Increasing school enrollments can be looked for in the next five years.

D. School Housing and Maintenance

Our present school houses have been kept in repair and with the new elementary building, our housing facilities should be adequate to carry the anticipated increased load.

E. Finances (Why increases in our Budgets?)

It has been shown that average school costs in relation to the rest of the State of New Hampshire have been kept low—

The School Board should be commended for their careful planning in this area. The following in my opinion are some of the reasons for the upward swing in Salem's total School Budget since 1939:

REPORT OF THE HEADMASTER

To Mr. L. Munro Grandy, Superintendent of Schools
I hereby respectfully submit my first annual report as Headmaster of Woodbury High School.

I. GENERAL PHILOSOPHY

We realize that a great part of the activities set up for high school pupils are traditional and non-functional, but we believe that the torch should be held no higher than expediency allows. The point we wish to emphasize is that there is always a wide gap between ideals and performances in secondary education and a lag between thought and action.

Bearing this in mind, and believing that a secondary education philosophy emerges from actual procedures, we would present the following ideals as a basis for a tenable philosophy which we should strive to apply to as great an extent as our actual learning situation allows:

- A. In general each child shall be educated in keeping with his capacities, limitations, and interests, looking toward the happiest adjustment he can make in life and the most constructive contribution he can bring to society.
- B. We believe that the pupil is to be regarded as an individual which interacts with his environment, and whose behavior, attitudes and habits are subject to modification through experiences. The whole child attends school, and all experiences sponsored by the school, consciously or unconsciously affect this whole organization.

- C. The construction of the curriculum of the school should be determined by the needs, interests and abilities of its students, with due regard to the peculiar advantages or limitations of the learning situation sponsored by and provided by the community.
- D. In the field of method, we should recognize that all pupils are not alike and that modification of method as well as content is indicated, depending upon the characteristics of the individual. Pupils should share in selecting, controlling and directing types of experience found in the classroom.
- E. The high school requires a staff of properly prepared teachers whose outlook upon the growth and development of pupils goes beyond subject barriers. The teacher should understand the peculiar problems of the youth of high school age, should possess deep appreciation of the aims and functions of public education and be prepared to accept responsibility for sharing in administrative problems and also in general school problems on a system wide basis.
- F. Since social competence is the basic function for which the state holds the school responsible, it is an obligation of the school to promote this ideal throughout the entire gamut of school activities.

II. CURRICULUM

With this philosophy in mind we have modified our curriculum somewhat to include an activity period each day of the week. This period makes it possible to bring out to the fullest, the values derived from assemblies, clubs, physical education, music, art, guidance, all under student leadership with proper supervision. We have continued to offer the same program of studies which includes a College Preparatory Course, a Commercial Course, a Home Economics Course, and a General Course. We have shortened the time of the periods which is comparable to most schools throughout the state.

I would like to add that in some respects, mainly in the field of industrial arts that we fall short. It is my earnest hope that in the not too distant future that we might add such a course to our curriculum in order to keep in school many boys who prefer to work with their hands.

We will offer also for the first time, a Driver Education Course, which should prove both interesting and worthwhile.

III. TESTING AND GUIDANCE

A. Testing

We feel that we offer the students one of the finest testing programs in the state. Not only do we give the Metropolitan Achievement and the Otis Aptitude tests, but we avail ourselves of the Boston University Guidance and Testing Service.

B. Guidance

- 1. The latter testing service has proved invaluable as a basis for individual conferences with juniors and seniors in order to properly guide them in their work, or in the choice of school they attend when they leave Woodbury.
- 2. We plan to continue our career days which proved so worthwhile last spring. Twenty business men and women, leaders in their respective fields came to Woodbury and gave the students of the

three upper classes valuable pointers on occupa-

3. We have associated ourselves with an Audio-Visual service which makes available to us free movies, slide films, posters, etc., which has made it possible to increase this already well-established service to the students.

IV. STATISTICS

The total enrollment for the year has been 310 with the present enrollment at 300 which is an increase of 32 or about 12% over last year's enrollment at this time.

A. Athletics

- 1. Under the able direction and inspired leadership of Mr. Foster Ball the boys athletics have had increased interest, the schedules have included more major opponents and the future looks bright for Woodbury as a power in small high school circles.
- 2. The high calibre of play for the girls under the leadership of Miss Manson has continued and more important, the addition of Field Hockey and Softball has rounded out an exceptionally fine program for the girls.
- 3. Mr. James O'Connor is continuing the Saturday morning program for Grades 5, 6, 7, and 8, and this system is already beginning to bear fruit and will be instrumental in developing better Woodbury High teams of the future.
- 4. Worthy of notice is the fine work of the cheerleading squad which enthralls the spectators at all athletic contests.
- B. The Pops Concert under the able direction of Mrs. Thompson was presented two nights during the fall and proved very popular with the students and general public.
- C. The Woodbury High Choristers also under the direction of Mrs. Thompson have performed several times in public and the reception accorded this group has been unusually fine.
- D. Dances and school parties have helped to make school life more enjoyable. Square dancing under the direction of Mrs. Billewicz has been very popular. Other activities such as the Senior Play and Dramatic Contest will be presented later in the year.

- E. The excellent hot lunch program that we have had has been continued under the supervision of Mrs. Emilio.
- F. Worthy of notice is the fine work that Mrs. Nash has done in the reorganization of the financial reports of all activities. She has given much practical experience to the students.
- G. I would like to pay tribute to the work of the Y-Teen Council which has done so much for the girls and for the school. Miss Goodwin has been an excellent liaison officer.
- H. The art program has expanded during this year and the children, under the direction of Mrs. Roth, have helped greatly in promoting many activities.
- I. This year the school has attempted to bring to the public a report of all its activities throughout the year. This excellent coverage has been handled by Mr. Peltonen.

VI. PARENTS NIGHT

During American Education Week the parents visited the school and enjoyed a fine program. Many demonstrations proved interesting and the opportunity to talk to the teachers brought out a better understanding between parents and teachers which is necessary if the best interests of the children are to be served.

VII.

On February 16th the Woodbury High Athletic Banquet will be held in the school auditorium. For the first time the boys and girls will be honored together and the affair, which will be an annual one, should prove extremely popular. The banquet will be sponsored by several public-spirited organizations, namely: The Men's Club, Board of Trade, Women's Club, Junior Women's Club, Legion, Legion Auxiliary, Veterans of Foreign Wars, and Veterans of Foreign Wars Auxiliary.

VIII. CONCLUSIONS

I feel that the morale at Woodbury has increased during this past year. This morale is an important factor which enables us to keep our standards above average. A happy child makes a better citizen.

I want to thank all parents and friends who have aided us in our many various activities. I want also to say that what has been accomplished could not have been done without the help of such a fine faculty. To you and the Board of Education my sincere thanks for your guidance and assistance which have been so helpful. Lastly to the town of Salem a special appreciation for the new buildings which will provide an education for which the students should be justly proud.

ANNUAL REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

To Mr. L. Munro Grandy, Superintendent of Schools

I hereby submit my annual report as Supervisor of Music in the Salem Schools.

Music education in our schools during the past year has developed a genuine enthusiasm and love for music through vocal and appreciation courses.

The children learn to sing many attractive and worthwhile songs before any music reading is taught. During the latter part of the first year staff notation is introduced; from this grade through the eighth the pupils progress step by step easily and effectively.

Recognition of musical instruments is taught by sight and sound with the help of records and picture charts. This work begins in grade one where the children learn the violin, trumpet and piano. Each year new instruments are introduced, and at the end of the eighth year the entire symphony orchestra is completed.

Rhythm bands have been organized in Numbers 1, 4, 6 and 9 schools. The playing of the instruments gives the children a splendid opportunity for rhythm response.

In place of the annual operetta the students of Woodbury High School presented a Pop Concert on November 17 and 18. The concert was enthusias-

tically received by an audience that filled the hall both nights, and was very successful financially.

A new singing group "The Woodbury Choristers" was organized in February, 1949. There are twenty-six voices in this choir, which is a well balanced four-part singing group. The Choristers have appeared several times in Salem and once in Lawrence. They will sing in Plaistow, Atkinson and Newton in the near future.

The broadcast in June by the Girls' Glee Club, the combined Glee Clubs, and the Choristers was highly successful. Many letters and telephone calls commending the groups were received by Mr. Grandy and your music supervisor.

I would like to thank the North Salem and South Salem Parent Teacher Associations for their contributions to the music department. The North Salem group has given a Covenco Record Player and a full set of rhythm band instruments to No. 4 School. The South Salem organization has donated money for records for No. 9 School.

In closing I wish to express my thanks to you and the teachers for the hearty cooperation extended me throughout the year.

I hereby submit my report concerning the art activities and instruction in Salem.

The art program is now in its third year, and since its introduction in Salem has come a long way. With a foundation of fundamentals laid last year, the results of the effect of such a program are making their appearance in the classrooms. A similar program of fundamentals of lettering, color, design, figure drawing, clay modelling, and seasonal decorations is being continued this year in the schools.

The activities at Woodbury High School in art during the year have been decorations for the auditorium, menu covers, placemats for the tables, and posters for the Pop Concert. The teachers' room was painted by members of the Art Department. Names were lettered to be used by the office girls. Christmas pictures were painted on glass in the auditorium. In February the seventh and eighth grades were taken to view an exhibition of art at Phillips Academy called "Material and Inmaterial." A sketchery after school was organized for all those who were interested.

The Art Department sponsored the traffic signs located at the schools.

There are no new mediums being introduced in the schools this year.

A representative from the Milton Bradley Company in Springfield, Massachusetts demonstrated finger painting in May. Examples were left at the school.

In closing I wish to thank the teachers for their increased interest and splendid cooperation.

The State Dental Trailer under the direction of Dr. S. Dwyer and Miss Elsbeth O'Brien, Dental Hygienist, came to Number 6 school April 25 through 29. The Salem Women's Club sponsored the dental clinic and arranged transportation for pupils who requested it to Number 6 school, and every Third Grade child in Salem had the opportunity to have his or her teeth cleaned and four applications of Sodium Fluorine applied as a preventive measure against tooth decay at a very small cost per pupil. Fifty-nine pupils attended this dental clinic.

Parents are asked to cooperate in carrying out these helpful health suggestions offered by the State dental clinic: "A child should start going to the dentist as soon as twenty baby teeth are through the gums and should make regular, frequent visits to the dentist every year, especially through adolescense. Early treatment for dental defects before the damage to the tooth is extensive takes less time, hurts less, and costs less to correct."

On May 16, Miss Constance Martin, R. N., staff worker of the Tuberculosis Association, assisted in giving the Tuberculin Test (Vollmer) to 85 pupils, two of whom reacted postive. These were given chest X-Rays at the Manchester Clinic and were found to have healed tuberculosis infection.

On July 3, a diabetic pupil went to the Elliott P. Joslin Diabetic Camp for three weeks to enjoy the benefits of wholesome camping and at the same time to receive complete medical and diabetic care. The desire was to help this pupil learn to care for himself and to live happily with others. The three-weeks' stay at the camp was financed by Salvation Army, Red Cross, American Legion Auxiliary and Grange.

Cod Liver Oil and Clothing were distributed to many needy families.

I wish to thank the Superintendent of Schools, members of the School Board, the teaching staff, and parents, who, by their kindly assistance and cooperation, helped to make the year a success.

I also wish to express my appreciation and thanks to the many organizations for their continued financial aid and cooperation.
