County Convention

Extracts from the Public Statutes of New Hampshire

The County Convention shall consist of the representatives of the towns of the County. They shall meet on the second Wednesday of each biennial session of the General Court, or other day in the same week, shall choose a chairman and clerk, and may adjourn as they see cause.

The County Convention shall, during each biennial session of the legislature, grant county taxes for its county for two years; but the taxes for each year shall be voted separately, and collected in the year for which they were voted.

The County Commissioners of each County shall publish attested copies of the proceedings of the County Conventions, with the printed reports of the County officers, for the year in which such proceedings occurred.

Proceedings of Sullivan County Convention at Concord, N. H.,
Session of Legislature 1909

Concord, Jan. 13, 1909.

First meeting of Sullivan County Convention held in Division 4, Representatives' Hall, today at the close of the morning session, for the purpose of organization.

The convention was called to order by Robert J. Merrill of Claremont. Mr. Rawson of Newport was elected chairman, and Mr. S. E. Fisk of Charlestown clerk.

Voted to adjourn subject to call of the chairman.

Second Meeting

A meeting of the Sullivan County Convention was held in room 4 at the state house, February 2, 1909, at the call of the chairman. The clerk of the convention being absent, Mr. Robert J. Merrill was chosen clerk pro tem.

House bills Nos. 28, 91 and 336, which had been referred to the delegation, were considered.

It was voted to report House bill No. 336 with the recommendation that it be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

It was voted to lay House bill No. 28 on the table until February 9, 1909.

House bill No. 91 being under consideration, it was voted to lay the bill on the table until February 9, 1909, and the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved that the chairman appoint a committee to prepare resolutions regarding the duties of the County Treasurer and the method heretofore in practice of conducting the business of the office, said committee to report one week from today.

The chairman appointed as the committee: Messrs. Fry, Penniman and Gocha.

Voted to visit the county farm on Monday, February 8, 1909.

Voted to adjourn to that date and place.

Unity, N. H., Feb. 8, 1909.

The convention met at the county farm today, and after an inspection of the buildings, stock, etc., a bountiful dinner was enjoyed, after which the following business was transacted:

The meeting was called to order by the chairman, who presented Mr. H. C. Sanders of the County Commissioners, who offered the following report and recommendations:

Voted to raise the sum of \$30,000 00 for each of the years 1909 and 1910 as recommended by the commissioners.

Voted to accept the commissioners' action in buying the Francis Quimby lot for wood to supply the County farm.

After discussion in regard to electric lighting of the buildings

Voted to raise \$2,000 00 for installing electric lights in and about the buildings independently.

Amended

That the commissioners have power to confer with Claremont or other electric power companies in regard to economy.

After a series of talks on the barn question as regard remodeling or building new

Voted to leave to the option of the County Commissioners to enlarge or build new on the appropriations already raised.

Voted to adjourn.

Resolutions passed by the Sullivan county delegation, house of representatives, Concord, Feb. 9, 1909:

Whereas, House bill No. 91 has been referred to the Sullivan county delegation, said bill providing for the reduction of the salary of the Treasurer of Sullivan county from two hundred dollars to fifty dollars per annum;

Resolved, that the present salary is not excessive for the work and responsibility of the Treasurer when he performs the duties of the office.

Resolved, that we disapprove the recent practice under which the Treasurer's accounts are kept, and his bond furnished, by the banks or officers of banks in which the county funds are deposited.

Resolved, that we do not recommend the reduction of the Treasurer's salary, provided he performs his duties; but we urge and the public should insist that in consideration for the salary, he should keep his accounts and furnish his bond independently of the banks in which he deposits his funds.

Commissioners' Report

To the Citizens of Sullivan County:

Herewith is presented the annual report of the county commissioners for the fiscal year ending Dec. 31, 1909, together with the reports of the officers of the county, as required by the laws of the state.

The management of the county farm and almshouse are still under the efficient care of Mr. and Mrs. O. A. Putnam, who have both demonstrated a peculiar fitness for the position they occupy, and have done all in their power to relieve the distresses and provide for the wants of all those committed to their charge.

The report of the Superintendent will show that the average cost of supporting the inmates at the farm the past year, has been about \$2.30 per week, which includes board, clothing and medical attendance.

The amount paid out by the commissioners for support and expenses of the poor away from the farm has been as follows:

Dependent soldiers in towns,	\$2,161 88
Paupers in towns,	9,570 62
Children in families,	849 22
Children in homes,	975 82
Miscellaneous expense for paupers and soldiers not at farm,	509 08

The county convention voted an appropriation for installing an electric lighting system at the farm.

After carefully considering the question it was thought to be more advantageous for the county to obtain the current from the Claremont Power Company, rather than to install and maintain an independent system at the farm.

Consequently an agreement was made with the Claremont Power Company whereby the county owns the line from Claremont village to the farm, and the company furnishes the current for lights and power at regular meter rates.

The system consists of 120 inside lights conveniently located throughout the cottage, almshouse, hospital, laundry, barns, and storehouses, and five 32 candle power lights outside of buildings. This arrangement has proved very convenient and satisfactory.

Some outlay has been made in the shape of concreting, etc., at the jail and court house in Newport. At present our county buildings are in good repair and furnished with modern conveniences.

We thank the citizens of the county for their assistance and support rendered in the discharge of our various duties.

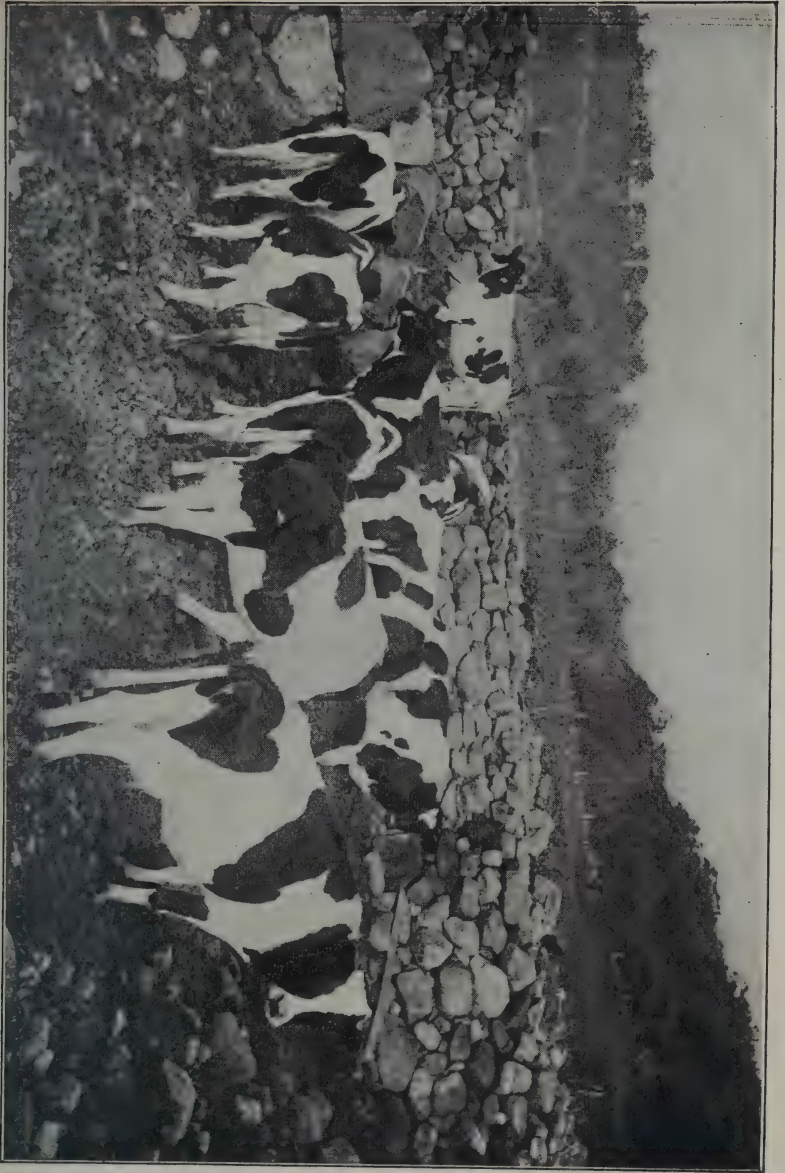

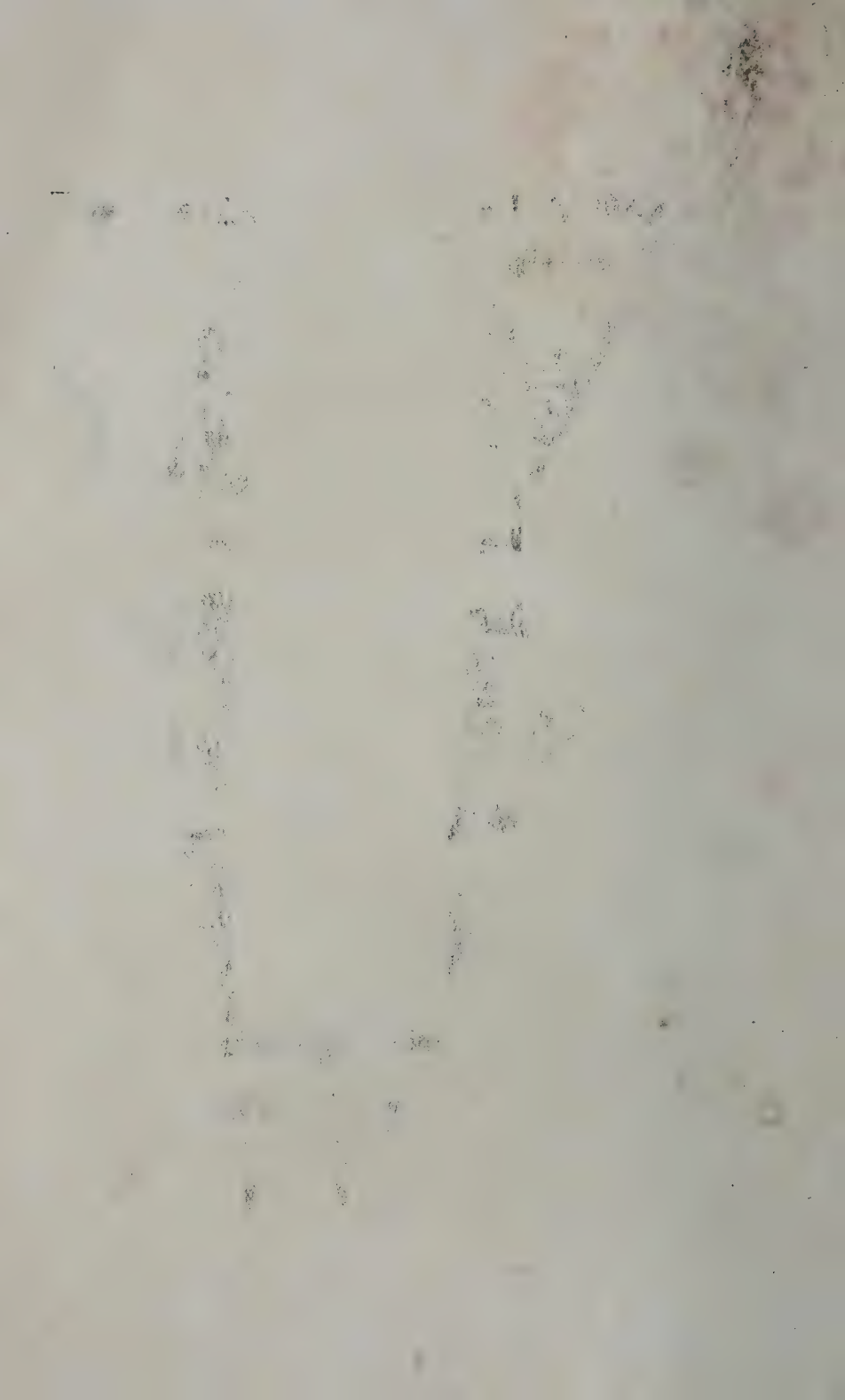

Physician's Report

To the Commissioners of Sullivan County:

In accordance with custom I herewith submit my report as Physician to Sullivan county almshouse for the year ending December 31, 1909:

There has been a very small amount of sickness among the inmates during the year, and we doubt very much if so large a number of aged and infirm people could be kept in so good a degree of health if cared for in private families. Too much cannot be said in favor of the sanitary conditions as they now prevail at the farm; the water supply is pure and abundant; the buildings are connected with an adequate sewer; the floors, household furnishings and clothing are kept scrupulously clean; and this with well cooked, wholesome food, which is always supplied in abundance, helps to bring about a general condition of good health.

This year the buildings, including the barns, have been wired and are now lighted by electricity. By thus doing away with lamps a great improvement has been made both for convenience and safety from fire.

There have been five deaths, four due to some chronic disease and one accidental. The inmates, although perhaps not always pleased with their lot, have only words of praise for the officers in charge and a general state of happiness prevails.

Solicitor's Report

From December 31, 1908, to April 1, 1909

During my unexpired term from Dec. 31, 1908, to April 1, 1909, no cases of any kind were prosecuted by me in behalf of the county, and no fines, costs or moneys belonging to the county were paid to me during this period.

At the expiration of my term of office no civil cases were pending in which the county was a party, and the criminal docket was clear of all cases so far as prosecutions are concerned.

From April 1st to December 31st, 1909, 30 criminal prosecutions were instituted for the following offenses, viz:

Twelve for violation of liquor laws, resulting in one indictment filed; one escape to parts unknown; two paid fine and costs of prosecution for first offense; one jail sentence; one trial by jury and acquittal; five searches, nothing found; and one, a woman, allowed to leave town.

Three violations of Sunday laws—all paid fine and costs.

Six assaults—two discharged; two paid fine and costs; one escape; and one bound over.

One adultery—no indictment found.

One abandonment of child.

One threatening letter—sent to federal prison at Atlanta, Ga.

Ten juvenile offenders, subject of three complaints—put under care of probation officer.

One larceny—three years at industrial school.

One bawdy house keeper—allowed to leave town.

One false pretenses—discharged.

These crimes and offenses were committed in the towns of Claremont, Acworth, Newport, Charlestown, Cornish and Unity.

One indictment was found at the May term and filed, and the docket cleared of all continued cases.

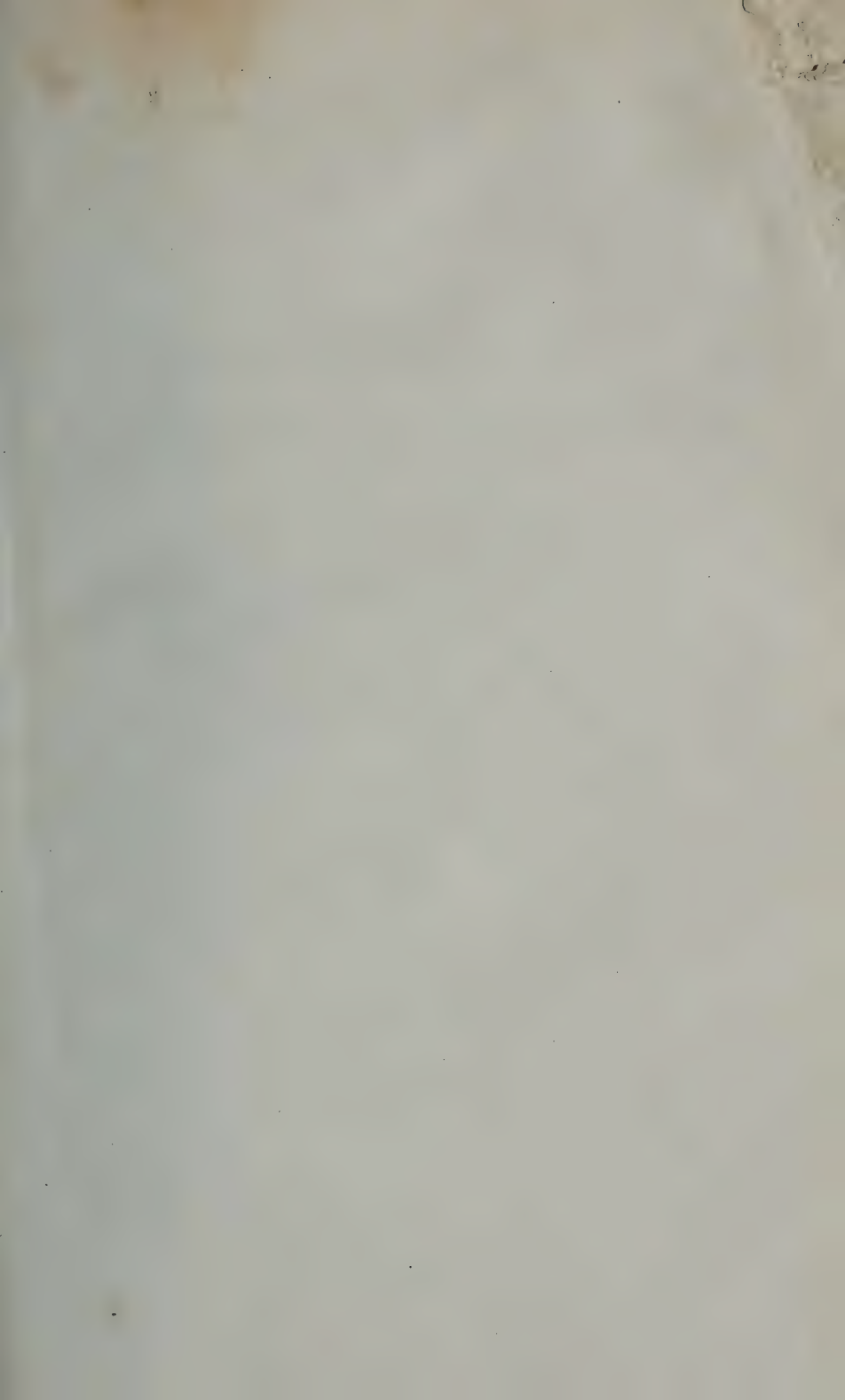
Two indictments were found at the November term. One was filed, and the other, a liquor case, tried and acquitted.

No civil suits in which the county is a party are pending, and no fines, costs or other moneys belonging to the county have been paid to me as the statute provides.

The difficulty of enforcing the liquor laws is notorious and conceded. This condition will continue until the preponderance of public sentiment gives its support and cooperation for their enforcement. When juries will act on their convictions unbiased by fear or favor, and when the community from which they are drawn will support and endorse that action, then and not till then can the laws hope to be enforced and vindicated.

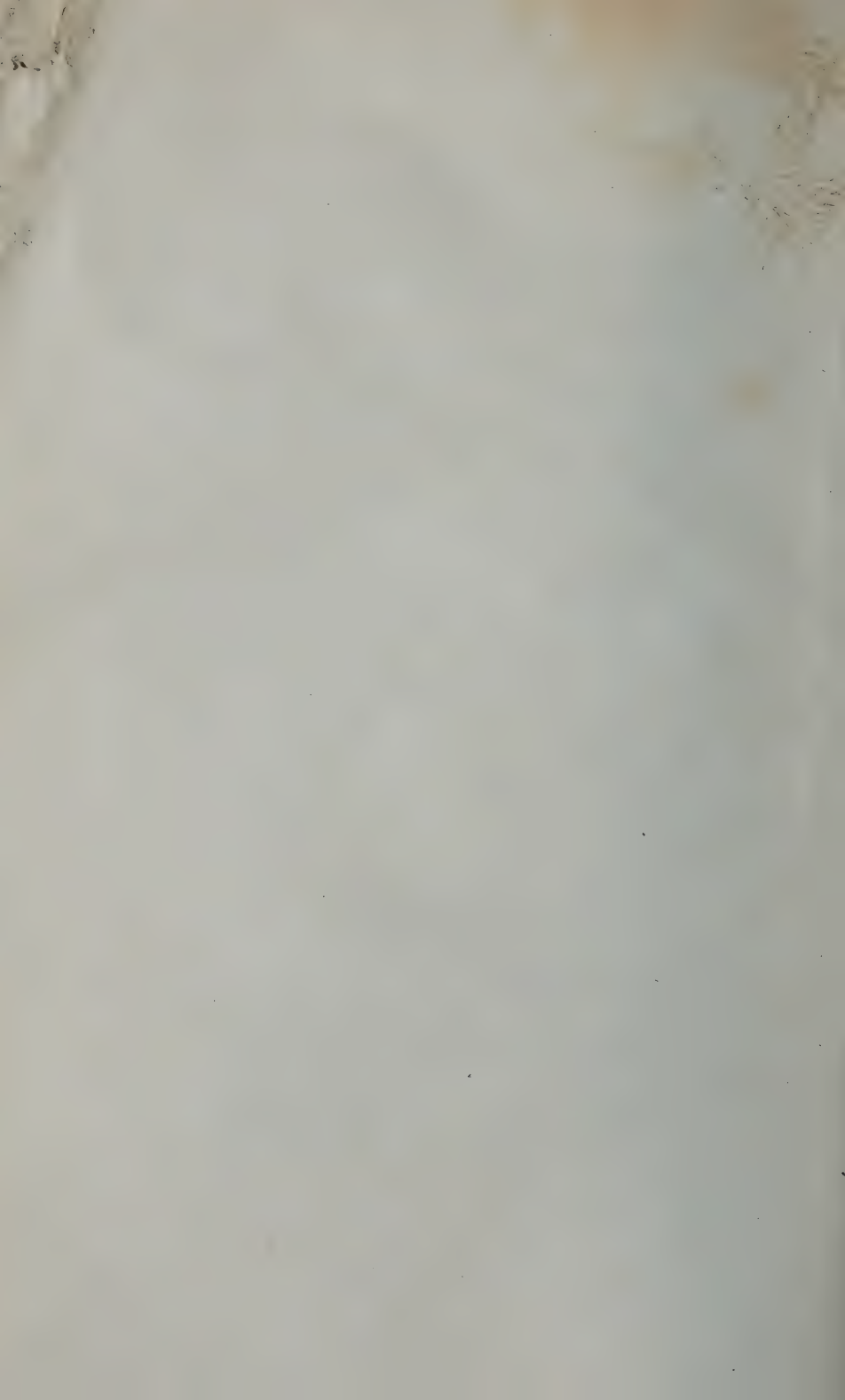
