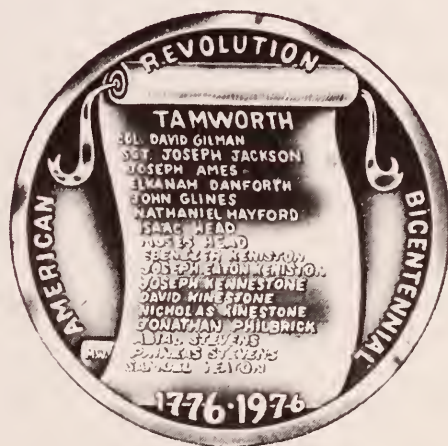

To the Inhabitants of the Town of TAMWORTH in the (L.S.) County of CARROLL in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at THE KENNETH A. BRETT SCHOOL in said TAMWORTH on Tuesday, the second day of March, next at TEN of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE No. 1. To Choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

The meeting will be in two parts.

I. In order that the following articles may be legally voted on by Non-Partisan ballot, you are hereby notified that the polls will be open for this purpose at 10:00 of the clock on said Tuesday, March 2.

II. The Meeting will reconvene at 7 P.M. on March 2, next to see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the following purposes and to transact any other business which may legally come before this Meeting.

ARTICLE No. 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of 2,000.00 dollars which would be the normal appropriation for the Tamworth Rescue Squad. If these funds are approved they would be used to help defray the building costs of a one bay (18'x60') building addition to the Tamworth Central Fire Station. If this article is approved, the members of the Tamworth Rescue Squad will take over the burden of operational expenses of the Tamworth Rescue Squad for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE No. 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw the sum of 8,500.00 dollars from the Tamworth Central Fire Station Capital Reserve

Fund and to pay same over to Treasurer of the Tamworth Fire Dept. said funds to be used for the purpose of constructing and adding a bay for the Tamworth Rescue Squad and the Tamworth Police Dept. to the Tamworth Central Fire Station. This article to be passed over if the preceding two articles No. 13 & No. 14 are not approved.

ARTICLE No. 38. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of 2000.00 dollars to be used to purchase a copier machine for Town Office.

ARTICLE No. 39. To see if the Town will vote to continue a special committee to be known as a regional refuse disposal planning committee, consisting of three members appointed by the Moderator. The committee of Tamworth will join with neighboring towns' refuse disposal planning committees to form a regional refuse disposal planning board. The board will study the advisability of establishing a regional refuse disposal district, ways for organization, operation and control of such a district, and the methods of selecting, constructing, maintaining and operating a refuse disposal facility to serve the needs of the district. Said Board or Committee shall report their findings and give their recommendations to the Selectmen of each and every Town involved on or before January 15, 1977.

“This Article is in accordance with State enabling legislation Re-Regional Refuse Disposal Districts-Chapter 53-B:1 through 11 and future Amendments as proposed by the State Legislature.”

ARTICLE No. 40. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of 200.00 dollars to defray expenses of

the Towns three member refuse disposal committee.

To see if the Town will authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local assistance act of 1972 for use as setoffs against budget appropriations for the following priority purposes and in amounts indicated or take any other action hereon.

ARTICLE No. 42. To see if the Town will vote to close the Township of Tamworth to deer hunting by non-residents who are not tax payers of the Town.

ARTICLE No. 43. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following sign ordinance Chapter 31, section 39, N.H. RSA 1955.

No sign or billboard shall be erected or replaced which advertises any commercial enterprise which is not located in the Town of Tamworth.

It shall be the duty of the Board of Selectmen, and the Board is hereby given power and authority to enforce the provisions of this ordinance if so voted.

Whoever shall violate this ordinance may be fined not exceeding \$100.00 for the use of the Town if so voted.

ARTICLE No. 44. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the New Hampshire Housing Commission to sponsor housing assistance to low income families and the elderly within the Town of Tamworth. Consent of the governing body of Tamworth must be given for each and every project RSA 204-A:9. Whereas, RSA 204-A:9 provides that in a municipality where there is no local housing authority operating, the Commission shall not operate without the consent of the governing body of a municipality.

ARTICLE No. 45. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make pre-application, and application for and to accept, and expend on behalf of the Town, any or all

grants including grants from the Community development act of 1974 which may be forthcoming from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

ARTICLE No. 46. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, contract for, accept and expend aid relative to Federal Disaster Funds and Federal and State Crime Commission funds.

New equipment bought this year includes one air pack with extra tank, hose, protective gear, quick release air pack holders and two Plectron receivers.

Again this year chimney fires were our most numerous calls. More people are burning wood to heat their homes and chimneys should be checked regularly.

The total Fire Department appropriations including maintenance budget, dry hydrant program, forest fires or equipment, capital reserve trust fund for a new truck, and trust fund for fire station addition totaled \$17,500.00

The Fire Department does not directly effect the daily lives of everyone therefore it is difficult for some to justify the need for new equipment and better facilities.

During the past several years we have been striving to make the dept. an organization ready to serve the community with fire protection in the forms of knowledgeable firefighters and modern well equipped fire apparatus. The training of present members and a campaign to obtain more members are the first step toward our goal of a better organization. The new apparatus the taxpayers of Tamworth have purchased and the money voted and set aside for future purchases is still another step forward. The biggest single step toward our goal is the support of the people.

Tamworth is very lucky to have a volunteer and I emphasize the word volunteer, Fire Department, with so many citizen firefighters willing and able to donate their time and effort to the betterment of fire protection in Tamworth. The total number of volunteer hours for the year 1974 was no less than 1698 with 2798 miles of travel with personal cars. These hours and miles were spent in training, firefighting, and general maintenance of buildings and equipment. Not everyone is able to give their time as some of us are, but all of us find personal satisfaction in knowing we are contributing our voluntary efforts to the betterment of our community at no expense to the community.

I believe a paid department loses that personal touch

of doing something for pride and satisfaction rather than a paycheck. To quote a well known phrase, "We may not be Number One but, We Try Harder". Keep your volunteers by supporting them, not only at town meeting but by showing them you believe in them and appreciate what they are doing for Tamworth.

## 1975 REPORT OF THE TAMWORTH CONSERVATION COMMISSION

On the day of the 1975 Town Meeting the Conservation Commission gave out questionnaires as to use of natural resources in the town, for the purpose of seeking opinion as guidance in its plans for the future. 400 were given out and 234 returned. Space doesn't permit a summary of replies here, but they will be available at the 1976 Town Meeting.

The Conservation Commission has acquired a footpath right of way over Marion Taylor's land to reach its property on the back side of Jackman Pond and plans to have a trail here to make this area more accessible.

The Commission wrote the State Highway Department to protest the extensive cutting on Route 113A by Swift River, without prior notice to the Conservation Commission so that it and the public would have a chance to express an opinion as to the necessity of such cutting.

In May, the Lakes Region Planning Commission asked the Conservation Commission for a list, in order of priority, of the three most important areas of technical aid the Town needs from the Planning Commission. Of the subjects listed for aid, our top choices were: Developing a Master Plan; flood control; developing a current use map.

Scott Aspinall was appointed to the Commission in June to replace Florence Damon, who resigned.

Conservation Commission members inspected the bridge across Moore's Pond marsh, found no sufficient grounds for objection to it, and so notified the State Special Board on Dredge and Fill. A member of the Commission attended the first hearing in Concord on this bridge.

A member of the Commission visited the Duck Pond on Hemenway State Forest with the Forest Ranger for this area to discuss with him plans of the state to protect the dike by cutting some trees near it and by maintaining a lower water level in the pond as it has been raised considerably by beaver.

The Conservation Commission, in cooperation with the

Garden Club, has again sponsored a student at Bear Brook Conservation Camp. Rick Austin, the student selected, has since attended a Commission meeting and given a good report on his study.

On May 7th, The Tamworth Community Nurse Association in co-operation with Mr. Edward Jensen, Program Co-Ordinator for Special Health Services, N.H. State Department of Public Health, sponsored an Adult Health Screen Program at the Kenneth A. Brett School. Approximately 100 people were checked by a physician, dentists, nurses, dietitians and laboratory technicians for evidence which might lead to glaucoma, diabetes, hypertension, oral cancer and dietary problems.

This screening was carried out with 100 percent volunteer help, with no cost to the town or individuals.

Two weeks later, 13 persons were rechecked and referred to their own physicians.

During October the Nursing Association sponsored a series of informal discussions for mothers and fathers on "You and Your Child During His First Year", conducted by Dr. William Turtle, resident of Tamworth, a leading Boston pediatrician and author of "Dr. Turtle's Babies".

In December Miss Margaret King, Benjamin English and I spoke to the Sandwich Town Club about the functions and management of our Nursing Service.

Through the kindness of our residents who donated new clothing, food, games, stationery, sundries, etc. and their time, we were once again able to remember the shut-ins and the lonely for Christmas. Gifts were delivered to 28 individuals and 2 families.

In March Mrs. Ethel Mykland of Sandwich started her office duties with our agency. She is sent to us and paid by the Community Action Program and Council on Aging. Under this program, the employee can work 18 hours per week for a non-profit organization. Mrs. Mykland is in our office Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 9AM-3PM.

My thanks to Mrs. Margaret Damon RN, who covered the service during my vacation.

## ANNUAL REPORT TAMWORTH OUTING CLUB

The Tamworth Outing Club offers many varied events throughout the year to provide for the recreational interests of the children and adults of Tamworth.

January brings the ski program for the children, and this year it is well underway with one hundred plus children in the Kenneth A. Brett School participating in the Thursday afternoon ski instruction at Mt. Whittier. The Outing Club has issued forty pairs of skis and poles to the school children at a very nominal cost. We have seventy school-aged children participating in the season pass program either at Mt. Whittier or Mt. Cranmore, the cost of which 20 percent is being contributed by the TOC, and the other 80 percent by each passholder.

Spring turns to thoughts of fishing and baseball. The Fishing Derby for children 16 years old and under is held in May with awards going to the lucky winners.

The Tamworth Little League Baseball Team under the direction of Ed Mallett and Roger Schipellite defeated West Ossipee's entry in the M.O.S.T. Little League to win that championship. In addition, five players and two alternates were named to the M.O.S.T. All Star Team from Tamworth.

Kevin Brothers coached the B Team which consisted of 20 plus children challenging their way up.

The Babe Ruth Team coached by Dana Steele played a 10 game season and are looking forward to next year.

In regard to the new Little League field, at the last town meeting the Outing Club asked for assistance in completing the field. Last summer additional top soil was added, fertilized and seeded. A backstop was erected as well as the mound of dirt removed. While removing the excess earth some additional clearing took place in the outfield for safety reasons. The field should be all set to be used in the spring of '76.

The square dances have increased in popularity. The summer dances are held weekly at Staffords-in-the-Field. Dudley Laufman and Ned Behr alternate the calling

duties. Throughout the rest of the year dances are held the fourth Saturday of each month in the Tamworth Town House, these being called exclusively by Dudley.

The Ladies Singles and Doubles Tennis Tournament, part of the annual Chocorua Tennis Tournament, was sponsored by the TOC and ably run by Ellen Moot.

Our annual meeting is held the third Saturday of August. This year the meeting was again held while enjoying the view from the top of Page Hill thanks to the Ted Gallaghers.

The Trap Shoots were planned for the last two Sundays in September on Great Hill. As usual we had a good turnout of shooters and spectators. The weather was clear and warm providing a scenic place to either participate or just watch. The women shooters are beginning to provide strong competition, and more are urged to take part in next year's shoots.

The Rifle Shoot was held in October, but we failed to pick a good day. The poor weather dampened (literally) the spirits of some, however, the youthful 22 caliber shooters continued in good numbers.

The skating rink behind the Tamworth Post Office was flooded by the Firemen. This area needs to be improved, and we hope to have it done for next season.

The Brett Memorial Tree in the Village was lighted during the Christmas season, and provided much pleasure to those of us who could see it.

Usually the New England Sled Dog Club's first race of the season is in Tamworth on Lake Chocorua and scheduled for the last weekend in December. But lacking snow and sufficient ice cover on the lake by mid December, the race rescheduled and held the 10th and 11th of January; as it turned out two very cold days. The dogs and drivers had ideal conditions but the poor spectators nearly froze. To all of you who have contributed time, finances, and talent in furthering the activities, we say a big THANK YOU.

The Outing Club meets the second Thursday of each month and all are welcome to attend or offer suggestions or help. Please contact any of the committee if interested or have any questions.

## COOK MEMORIAL LIBRARY

1975 was another notable year for the Cook Memorial Library. Adults and children made 3627 visits to use the services of our library and to borrow 6447 books, magazines and records to top last year's record figures.

Our sincere thanks go to the Garden Club for the colorful and seasonal changes in our window boxes. At Christmas time they created and donated a delightful lollipop tree for the enjoyment of the children (and a few adults too!).

We are forever indebted to the faithful trio who give of their time, labor and love to the task that is always with us--weeding and cataloging. Our sincere appreciation is given to Mr. & Mrs. Bill Hidden for their gift of Lucy Blake's diaries and other historical material. We are grateful also to all those Tamworth residents and visitors for their gifts of books, paperbacks, magazines, memorials and financial contributions.

In regard to the physical plant, the trustees have had a hot water heater installed, to meet state requirements, minor repairs have been made, fire extinguishers replaced or updated, a glass door installed on a shelf of the Helen Hidden bookcase for special historical documents and a larger, more practical and workable desk has been ordered for the librarian's use.

During 1975 your library remained active in "Outreach to Carroll County Shut-Ins Program" as a storage and record center for tapes and cassette players. The librarian and/or trustees attended State Library Book Displays, District Advisory Council meetings, Bearcamp Neighborhood Libraries Meetings and monthly Library Board meetings.

Once again we sponsored a well-attended summer story hour under the able direction of Trustee Betsy Watt. The library entered a float in the 4th of July parade with our thanks again going to Ellen Eldridge of the "Friends of the Library" for the idea, the costume, decorations and most important of all--the characterization of Betsy Ross.

In October we entered into the spirit of the Tamworth Arts and Crafts Fall Festival with a very successful and enjoyable sidewalk sale of books and apples (latter donated by Trustee Alexandra Cook).

At Plymouth College your Librarian completed two more courses, "Cataloging and Classification" and "Book Selection for Adults and Young Adults". These are the fourth and fifth of eight courses required for certification in meeting minimum state qualifications for librarians.

Over the year our various displays included among others the Tamworth Teen Center's excellent exhibit of art by our own teenagers, the Brett School Tutorial-Remedial Work in Speech and Mathematics, the array and sale of Tamworth Historical Society maps and articles and, in December a Christmas showing of Willey Fromm's waxed collage of the Madonna.

One of our services to the community is a monthly calendar of events posted on the library door and at the Tamworth Post Office bulletin board. We urge all groups and clubs and committees to utilize this means of public announcement by contacting Bernard Ulitz and, thereby, eliminating conflicts in schedules and at the same time keeping residents and visitors up to date on town activities. For your convenience we also publicize new books in the Reporter Press, in Mabel Hidden's Tamworth column in the Carroll County Independent, on a list posted at the Tamworth Post Office bulletin board and a similar list at the Library.

The Cook Memorial Library has been used extensively this past year as a meeting place by many small local committees. The use of the facilities may be obtained by responsible community groups by contacting Bernard Ulitz for availability and reservation. The Library also serves as a central station for the storage of the town movie projector and speakers. Again any responsible town organization may borrow this equipment for a small maintenance fee by getting in touch with Bernard Ulitz for reservation.

Cook Memorial Library opens its doors to the Pre-

Schoolers on a regular basis during the school year, welcomes exhibits and displays from community clubs or societies, offers Large Print books and magazines and tapes for the visually handicapped, issues Statewide Library Cards to patrons in good standing. During 1975 we lent Brett School 843 books to add to their shelves, requested 347 books on individual requests for specific titles from the State Library through Inter-Library Loan, borrowed 2994 books from the State Bookmobile to augment our own collection, purchased or were given 344 books--to present to the children and adults of Tamworth as excellent a collection of reading material as possible.

In 1976 we are looking forward to a Bicentennial year of celebration and of contribution. We plan a permanent exhibit of reprints of old photographs and postcards of the scenes, places and faces of Tamworth down through the years. New photos of local interest and future historical value will be added to make this a continuing and up to date pictorial record of our town. Most of all we shall be working in this year of '76 to bring more and more townspeople to the library--to its use as a source of information and research or just for pleasurable leisure reading.

The library is open on Wednesday from 1:30 to 5:00 and 7:00 to 9:00 P.M. and on Saturday from 1:15 to 4:45 P.M. Our telephone number is 323-8510. We welcome your questions, your requests and your suggestions for the Cook Memorial Library is your library.

**1975 ANNUAL REPORT**  
**TAMWORTH AMERICAN REVOLUTION**  
**BICENTENNIAL COMMISSION, INC.**

The aim of the Tamworth American Revolution Bicentennial Commission has consistently been to involve the entire community in thoughtful and joyous celebration of the 200th anniversary of the nation. This purpose is being carried out through many local organizations and through committees set up for special projects. Any citizen who wants to participate has been warmly invited to do so in the way which he or she will find most rewarding. Thus we have a number of **Festival** events to celebrate the present, **Heritage** projects which commemorate the past of Tamworth and the nation, and **Horizons** projects which look to the future and attempt to improve the quality of life.

In 1975 the Bicentennial moved from planning to action. Six town-wide events marked the opening of the Bicentennial program. In May, Tamworth was recognized as a Bicentennial Community by the presentation of a flag and certificate at a large gathering at the Brett School. On the Fourth of July the Firemen's Club put on a splendid Bicentennial parade, and this was followed next day by a supper served by the United Methodist Women. That evening the Bearcamp Valley Sportsmen staged a well-attended street dance in front of the Post Office. Later in the summer the Chocorua Lake Association treated the community to a Festival of Lights. As autumn came the Tamworth Arts Council began a series of six free concerts held at Runnells Hall. Many of these events will be repeated, with variations, in 1976.

Several important projects bearing on Tamworth's historical heritage also started. The Committee on Old Houses, under the chairmanship of Lilian McGrew, is preparing a book on the building and occupancy of the town's hundred oldest houses. The Cultural Heritage Committee, under Jean Ulitz's chairmanship, is preparing a volume about the town's history based on taped interviews with long-time residents and early documents.

For its part, the Historical Society is undertaking two projects, one to re-establish one section of the town pound, another to map and rehabilitate old burying grounds. To enliven Tamworth's history for the young, the P.T.A. is sponsoring the building of a log cabin. The Arts Council has 26 of its members busily creating a Bicentennial quilt which will use an old art form to illuminate present day scenes in Tamworth. Another artistic endeavor, the Tamworth Bicentennial coin, skillfully designed by Mark Wasson, is being produced and sold by the Commemorative Coin Committee under the chairmanship of Ray Flanagan.

Several Bicentennial projects aim at making Tamworth a better and more attractive town in which to live. Under the leadership of Sheila Woodward and Dean Nixon, the Roadside Cleanup Committee staged a pick-up, clean-up campaign. Nate Hughes and his Tree Planting Committee have completed plans for planting trees to replace dying elms and maples in several highly visible roadside areas. The Scholarship Committee, Stan Coville chairman, has announced the availability of annual scholarship grants for Tamworth young people beginning in the spring of 1976. The Town Center Committee, under the chairmanship of Admiral B. J. Semmes, has completed plans for major renovation and functional improvement of the Town House (See Attachment B).

In 1975 revenues were \$3926, expenses \$3183, leaving a cash balance of \$743. In 1976 the Commission has budgeted revenues of about \$7000, expenditures of approximately \$13,500, leaving a planned deficit of \$6500 to be covered by private contributions raised through a fund campaign that will commence in the spring. The only appropriations requested from the Town for conducting the Bicentennial program in 1976 is \$5000 in public funds for the Town's share in renovation of the Town House.

In the course of 1975 we regretfully accepted the resignations of Jeffrey Brothers, Margaret King and

Elizabeth C. Wasson. Appointed to fill vacancies were Roger S. Elliott, Barbara Lloyd and Edward P. Prince.

**BICENTENNIAL COMMISSION**

One year ago, a committee consisting of B. J. Semmes, Chairman, Robert Mc. Lloyd, Vice Chairman, Robert Eastwick, John H. Finley, Jr., John B. Hidden, Sr., and Marion Spaulding, was formed to study various lasting visual and functional improvements that might be made in Tamworth through the initiative of the Bicentennial Commission. After reviewing numerous considerations it was decided that a major contribution would result if the old Town House could be made more functional and physically attractive.



This structure, built in 1794 not far from Ordination Rock, was the center of town religious and civic life. After the separation of Church and State in 1819, the feeling grew that the Meeting House should be returned to the Town which had paid for it with tax money. Meantime the center of the village had moved to be near the mills that had been established on the Swift River. In 1852 Francis Remick was given the contract for \$550.00 to move the Meeting House in one piece, and the present location was selected. It is said that forty yoke of oxen were used.

The Town House is currently used as a voting place, police station, town and group meeting place, teen center, crafts workshop, Boy Scout meeting place, and, on Saturday nights in winter, as a hall for square dances.

The committee, early in its efforts, investigated the feasibility of moving the Town House to a location which might be more suitable. It soon became evident that suitable land could not be obtained and that costs to move the building were excessive. The committee now proposes that the Town House remain where it is and that it be functionally modernized and its appearance improved.

The exterior would be slightly modified to restore its early, simple colonial lines, and the front of the lot would be graded and landscaped. The new first floor interior would have many functions: activity room, rest-rooms, kitchen area, entrance vestibule and stairway to the second floor. The arrangement would be such as to be suitable for town voting and for group use. The building would be completely repainted and the floor refinished. New lighting would be installed in the second floor, but the space would remain essentially as is. The existing privies in the basement (which are a disgrace) would be removed. The office of the Chief of Police would be relocated. The no-longer used and unheated-unfinished vault would be removed.

#### **Costs for the renovation of the Town House, and relocation of the office**

Costs for renovation of the Town House, and relocation of the office of the Chief of Police, are estimated as

\$35,000.00. The Town is being asked to raise \$5,000.00 through taxation; the remainder would come from private contributions. Resources are estimated as:

**SPECIAL HEALTH OFFICER REPORT**  
**1975**

In January the new Guide Book on sewerage systems was sent to me. Often there are changes in the guide book that are effective immediately. One major change concerned raised leach fields. Since Ken Stewart does many of the plans in Tamworth, I informed him of this change. Then about ten days later I was notified the ruling had reverted back to the original law as the new one was ineffective. I notified Ken of this rule.

February, as usual, allowed for little septic system construction, and I received no calls.

On March 26 I attended a meeting of the Planning Board of Tamworth with the Lakes Region Committee. The purpose of the meeting was to draw up new subdivision rules and regulations.

Also, on March 26, the sewerage at the Brett School was backing up and this was reported to me. This would be a definite health hazard to the children and the staff. I went to the school to investigate and discovered that Mr. Lamprey had been called by the janitor and was in the process of pumping out the septic tank. Because the tank was open I was able to inspect it. I found it excessively plugged and backed up into the sinks and toilets of the school. After conferring with Mr. Lamprey I learned that the tank hadn't been cleaned for about two years and that he had been called about every two years for this problem. In light of this, I informed the School Board that the tank must be pumped out each year to avoid the hard-packed build-up which, in addition to being a health-hazard, is much costlier and forces closing of the school.

April was a quiet month in which I received no calls for assistance other than minor calls on the telephone for advice.

In May I gave Ray Davis permission to repair the septic system at Bob Finley's house on Cleveland Hill. This is in accordance with new ruling allowing repairs to existing systems, with the permission of the Special Health Officer after his approval.

The sewerage system at the Brett School again showed signs of stoppage in June. Upon inspection it was discovered that the entrance to the tank was clogged with straws and paper. This was removed and the system then worked efficiently.

Also in June I checked out a water pipe at the former Charlie Chick house in Chocorua because Police Chief Watson had discovered a pipe coming out from the rear of the barn toward the river. I inspected it and found it to be just an old disconnected water line that had not been removed.

I also gave permission again to Ray Davis for repairs to an existing system, this time at the Jeffers' house in So. Tamworth.

Sherilyn Welch called me concerning the necessary approval needed to operate a day-care center at St. Andrews Church in Whittier. She received the needed approval.

In July I was asked to check Mabel Evans' house in Whittier for possible health hazards. I made two trips to the home, but could not arouse anyone. The house appeared to be closed up. I reported this, and after conferring with Chief Watson, I learned there had been a real health problem but it was corrected by town and state officials.

Ray Davis received permission in July to make repairs to an existing system near Chinook Kennels in Wonalancet.

In August I received a call from Bob Chick of Madison. He wanted information on sewerage systems and what possible repairs could be made to them to meet with state approval. I discussed various rules, regulations and repairs with him.

September and October again proved the lack of building construction in the area, as there were no calls during this period except for a call by a woman who wanted to know what could be done about sand fleas. She thought they were a health hazard and was quite worried about them. She did not realize they are quite common here in warm weather. I assured her it had nothing to do

with cleanliness and that if she sprayed around her doorways and on her floor with a flea insecticide she could control them. I reminded her they may enter on the feet of animals. She asked if the house should be fumigated and if they could catch a disease from them. I told her disease was doubtful but to check with a medical person and that I didn't see the need for fumigation.

In November I approved a septic system for Larry Grace for his property on Hackett Hill Road.

Also in November a Mr. Bourne from Somerville, Mass. wrote to the selectmen concerning a pile of trash left at a camp adjacent to his home on Washington Hill Road. Chief Watson inspected it and requested I visit the place in my capacity as Special Health Officer. I wrote to the owner, a Mr. Winslow of New York, after confirming the problem, and asked that it be attended to immediately as it is unlawful and unsafe to have a trashpile left on the premises.

I received another letter from a Mrs. Achenback of Revere, Mass., requesting information about selling property in Tamworth which does not have a cesspool. I informed her unless her property was in a sub-division with a state approval, she would have to obtain a septic system approval from the state before it could be sold. I suggested she contact Ken Stewart and ask him to obtain an approval for the property if need be.

In December I approved repair to the system at the former Runny home in Chocorua, now owned by Greg Kendricks.

The kitchen sinks at the Brett School started backing up again, but the problem was corrected by the janitor when he discovered the grease trap needed cleaning. If the problem continues, the entrance to the tank will have to be opened and cleaned again.

Dear Board Members,

In my capacity as Special Health Officer of Tamworth I visited the Brett School on Wed. March 26 after being notified of the sewerage problem there. Mr. Lamprey was in the process of pumping the septic tank, so I was able to inspect it thoroughly and confer with him about the situation.

The tank was excessively plugged, causing sewerage backup into the sinks and toilets. I understand from Mr. Lamprey that it has been about two years since the tank was last cleaned, and that this problem has, in the past, occurred about every two years.

As Special Health Officer I must require the tank be pumped out every summer so as to eliminate the problem of backup, which is a very real health hazard, both to the children and to the teachers of the school. In addition to solving this health problem, Mr. Lamprey pointed out that my requirement would make it much less expensive to have the tank cleaned each year. Without the hard-packed buildup it could be removed much easier and school would not have to be forced to close at any time.

As a concerned citizen and taxpayer, may I recommend an improvement be made at the tank site? Currently, the tar has to be removed before the tank can be dug out. This is indeed costly each time. A simple tile and cover arrangement would be more suitable and less costly by far.

## THE TAMWORTH SUMMER ENRICHMENT PROGRAM

The Tamworth Summer Enrichment Program ended its eighth successful season of summer activities with a registration of 150 young people for the regular program, plus another 15 younger people who came for the pre-school session on Friday mornings. The ratio of resident children to summer children was roughly 75 / 25.

T.S.E.P. is as always, a program of activities for children ages 7-15 years, which operates on the premise that kids can have fun both learning from and participating in activities of their choosing.

The program runs three days a week for seven weeks at the Kenneth A. Brett School playground, with a number of outside trips to provide for a balanced program.

The activities have included sports, which this year showed a marked increase in interest in the tennis program and in the soccer games, an imaginative arts and crafts program, a map orientation program, puppetry, music, and outside trips. This year the trips included a nature walk to the Big Pines Natural Area, several journeys to the Squam Lakes Science Center, a trip to the Chocorua Potters, one to the Barnstormers, and for the theatrically inclined, a sojourn at the Lakes Region Playhouse for a live performance of **Cinderella**. Perhaps the highlight of the trip season was a journey to Jefferson, N.H., to view an intriguing performance of ballet staged by the Hartford Ballet.

This past year a good effort was made to separate the mountain-climbing crowd into two groups, the 3000-footers and the 4000-footers, based on ability and age of climbers. This separation insured that the climbing groups were more homogeneous in their makeup. Therefore the climbs were more enjoyable for all participants, as no one had to exert him / herself to the point of exhaustion, and also no one felt unduly held back by a slow pace. The 3000-Footers climbed South Moat, Mts. Percival and Morgan, and in the Wonalancet Range. The 4000-Footers climbed Mts.

Chocorua, Crawford, Jackson, and Boott Spur, an adjunct of Mt. Washington. There were also two overnight trips, one on Mt. Chocorua, basing at the Jim Liberty Shelter, and the other at the C.C.C. Camp on Fowler's Mill Road.

The program finished its final week with the annual picnic/swimming outing at Lower Falls on the Kancamagus, a track & field day featuring many competitive races with potatoes, eggs, peanuts, grain sacks, etc., and a final-day program, complete with a bake sale, game booths which the kids organized and ran themselves, and a puppet show, all topped off with punch and cookies.

The staff for 1975 included Bob Magruder in his first summer as Director after four years as assistant director, Connie Hughes, in her seventh year as the mentor of the popular arts and crafts program, Kay VerPlanck Hanson, in her third year, who introduced the map and compass program, Peter Ames, who worked with the sports program, in his first year, and Andrea Walker, who ran the pre-school session and helped out wherever there was a need, also in her first year.

Junior Leaders included two seasoned recruits from the summer of '74, Patty Bennett and Charlotte Kelley, plus two newcomers, Debby Anthony and Raymond Langlois, who both rapidly became acclimated to the program. Amy Merrow also helped out as a part-time junior leader. These people made the staff's life considerably more pleasant throughout the seven weeks.

Special thanks go to the volunteers, without whom the program really couldn't function effectively. To Percy Olton, who was always ready to climb anywhere, to Barbara Gribbel, who was always ready to drive anywhere, and to Billy Lincoln, who came as a morning tennis volunteer and ended up staying all day and doing everything. Others who must be mentioned include Joan Cave, Jan Dearborn, Sarah and Brian Kelley, Ron Moore, Diana Louis, Frannie Rich, Sherri Hadden, Joy Bleakney, Jesse Hughes, and Randy Remick.

It has been our experience that kids are always ready

and willing to try new things, while at the same time still unwilling to give up familiar activities that have given pleasure in the past. Thus we have tried this year to keep a suitable blend of the old and the new, while at the same time being attuned to the needs of the T.S.E.P. participants.

We take this opportunity to extend our sincere thanks to all who helped throughout the summer, both staff and volunteers, and to all of you who supported us with money and materials when the need arose. With help like this, the program can continue to fulfill the aspirations of many Tamworth young people.

Activities in Coos, Carroll and Grafton Counties - 1975

**NOTE: The Board of Directors of Community Action requests that the following summary of Community Action activities and programs be included in your municipal report.**

**Purpose:** Community Action has greatly expanded its objectives and programs. It now serves a broad spectrum of the Tri-County community, continuing to provide significant social services and to sponsor various community-economic development programs. Community Action is largely governed by the principal that if you provide a person a fish a day, you provide for the day; if you teach him how to fish, you provide him for a lifetime.

**SOCIAL SERVICE PROGRAMS**

**Meals on Wheels and Transportation for the Elderly:** With centers in Colebrook, North Stratford, Berlin, Littleton, Whitefield, Plymouth, Lebanon, and Conway, Meals on Wheels provided over 1,610 meals per week and over 80,000 for the year to the elderly.

Transportation services are provided to the elderly including medical service vans with regularly scheduled trips to the medical centers of White River, Hanover, and Portland.

**Headstart:** With nine classrooms in Berlin, Canaan, Conway, Lebanon, Littleton, Ossipee, Plymouth, and Stratford, Headstart serves an average of 340 pre-school youngsters and their families, providing comprehensive services.

**Family Planning:** A program providing medical,

counseling, and educational services to both individuals and the community at large.

**Operation Green Thumb:** A program designed to help people lower their food costs through gardening efforts served over 5,000 people in 1975.

**Operation Help:** A fuel loan program designed to enable people to meet rising fuel bills made 144 loans at approximately \$10,000.

**Winterization:** A new service begun in the winter of 1975, providing insulation, reduction of cold infiltration, combination windows, improvement of heating facilities, through matching grants to eligible citizens.

**Manpower:** Working with Tri-County Council and County Commissioners, Community Action Manpower Programs continue to provide counseling, training, program development, and other supportive services to the Tri-County Manpower training effort.

**Vista:** Nine community Vistas (residents of the Tri-County area) are sponsored by Community Action and are providing information referral and general community outreach.

**Elderly Employment:** The Elderly Employment Program is designed to augment the income and utilize the skills of over 60 elderly residents.

**Health Screening:** A medical program developed with the Public Health Service designed to detect glaucoma, high blood pressure, diabetes, oral cancer and other maladies in adults.

## **ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMS**

As its major development, Community Action organized the Northern Community Investment Corporation which will provide up to \$5 million of stimulus for the initiation and expansion of businesses in the Tri-County area in the next 3 years. In addition, Community Action organized and supported the following:

The **Waumbek Hotel Training Program**, training and placing residents in entry and middle management hotel positions.

The **White Mountain Center for the Arts**, supporting 9 local arts councils and providing full and part-time employment for approximately 175 people plus work shops and cultural events for 25,000 people at the Festival in Jefferson alone.

**Tri-County Homes** builds low-cost homes for individuals who are eligible under Farmers Home Administration and trains area residents in home construction skills.

**N.H. Job Start** is designed to provide small loans at minimal interest to under capitalized small businesses or individuals interested in initiating their own business.

**Coos, Carroll and Grafton County Learning Centers**, located in each of the three counties, provide educational opportunities for those who wish to further their educational aims through individual courses, general high school equivalency programs, Associate of Arts degree and Bachelor degree programs through the University of N.H. and University of Vermont educational systems.

## REPORT OF RECREATION DEPARTMENT

In September the Recreation Department formed and funded by a Manpower Grant visited town organizations in order to see what unmet needs of the community it could help to fulfill. Among those visited were the Selectmen, the school principal, the community nurse, the town policeman, the PTA, the Tamworth Outing Club and several others. The Recreation Department then set to work to plan a program that would give meaningful recreation to as many elements in the town as possible.

For the young people a soccer program was set up twice a week at the K. A. Brett School. Tennis clinics on the excellent town courts were held on Thursday and Saturday afternoons. Swimming at the Red Jacket Inn and bowling replaced tennis after December 6th which was the last day that the weather permitted safe play. A group of 4-H Quilters uses the Teen Center every Saturday morning. Guitar lessons are available on a weekly basis. During the winter months we will help the PTA with the program for non-skiers on Thursday afternoons.

The Teen Center is open to the teenagers Monday through Thursday from 1:00 to 8:00 pm, Friday from 4:00 to 10:00 and Saturday from 7:00 to 10:00. The split session at Kennett High School returns the teens to Tamworth at 1:00 pm with many free hours on their hands, hence a good teen center program is a necessity. Among the activities this fall were touch football, tennis, games within the center such as ping pong, pool, table hockey, and chess, swimming once a week at the Red Jacket, monthly dances, construction of a macrame wall hanging, trips to concerts in the area, basketball at the Brett School gym, bowling, involvement in the PTA log cabin building, money raising through their slave auction, Christmas Caroling and the decorating of the Teen Center for Christmas, and the baking of goodies and decorating of a tree for a family that met with a pre-Christmas misfortune. Skating, sledding, snowshoeing, swimming and basketball will be the activities stressed during the winter months and of course a continuation of the dances.

Adult recreation for the fall consisted of tennis clinics twice a week, a senior citizen card group one afternoon a week, guitar lessons, pine cone and nature gathering walks, cemetery walks, a weekly craft group and swimming at the Red Jacket Inn. During the winter, adult ski days were introduced and a cross country clinic for anyone over 50 was made available. Weekly mixed volley ball in the school gym was also started. A Morris dance group was formed and the weekly craft group continued.

The Recreation Department takes this opportunity to thank everyone for their generosity and enthusiasm. None of our programs would have gotten underway without the numerous kindnesses and donations such as furniture, food, money, streamers for the dances, popcorn popper, tennis balls, bridge pads, plants, materials for the crafts, games, puzzles, the loan of chairs by the community nurse, pool and ping pong tables, pictures, the rug, and general support.

To the inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Tamworth, qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Kenneth A. Brett School on Tuesday, March 16, 1976 to act upon the articles set forth in this warrant. Articles 1 and 2, relating to an increase in the size of the School Board and method of electing additional members to the board will be acted upon at 2:00 P.M. Voting thereon will be by official ballot and checklist, if the meeting so determines, and the polls will remain open for this purpose until 7:00 P.M. and for such further time, if any, as the Moderator shall determine at the meeting. Then at 7:00 P.M. or at such later time as the Moderator may determine, the remaining articles of the warrant will be acted upon.

**ARTICLE 1.** To see if the district will vote to increase the number of members on the School Board from three to five.

**ARTICLE 2.** If the district votes to increase the number of members on the School Board, to see if the district will vote to elect at the Town Meeting in 1977, one member for the two ensuing years and one member for the three ensuing years, in addition to electing a replacement for the present School Board member whose term expires that year.

**ARTICLE 3.** To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 to be placed in a Capital Reserve Fund, to be used exclusively for new plumbing in the school.

**ARTICLE 4.** To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officers and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the district.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE TO STUDY

## A FIVE-MEMBER SCHOOL BOARD

Tamworth, February 27, 1975

In response to a motion voted at the 1974 Annual School District meeting, the Moderator appointed a committee to study the advisability of a five-member School Board in Tamworth. The members were Arlene Farnum, Chairman, Jan Dearborn, Caroline Wright, Wendell Folkins, and Stan Coville.

The committee met four times. Besides talking with various townspeople, contact was made with the staff of the N.H. School Boards Association and with a member of the Cornish, N.H. School Board. There was seldom unanimous agreement on the items listed below, and the final recommendation was voted by a 3 to 1 majority with one member undecided.

The opinions favoring a five-member Board centered around the feeling that it would reflect a more representative point of view on school matters. That with less work load and responsibility per member, it might be better able to find ways to save the Town money, such as on busing, building maintenance, and purchasing - and in general be more efficient. The idea also expressed that it would be easier to get good candidates to run for the Board because competition in campaigns would be less personal. It was also thought that more voices on the Board might get more attention when dealing with the Conway Board and the Supervisory Union. Such a Board would not necessarily have to cost the School District more money since the present total salary figure could be divided among the five members.

Finally, a contact was made to a member of the Cornish, N.H. School Board. Cornish has a population similar to that of Tamworth, and has a history of being independent in school affairs. One year ago the town voted

to switch from a three-member to a five-member School Board because it wanted more than three people directly responsible for school problems. The Cornish Board member reported that, so far, the town is very pleased with the five-member Board.

The minority committee member is in favor of a five-member School Board for Tamworth.

The ideas against Tamworth adopting a five-member Board, representing the majority of thought of the committee, focused on the opinion that the three-member Board had worked well in the past, that a five-member Board would bring us more problems in administration, and that in short, too many cooks would spoil the broth. An interview with personnel from the New Hampshire School Boards Association, which has a statewide view of the entire public school system, indicated that in their view of the present matter there appears to be no immediate need for our School Board having five members. It was also determined that a five-member Board would not increase our voting power with regard to the Supervisory Union or with Conway.

The point was made that good communications amongst Board members is essential to effective Board operation. Board members must be able to give out accurate information on a moments notice, and it would be much easier for a chairman to keep in touch with two members than with four. The majority felt that a Board member's salary should not be less than \$300 and therefore a five-member Board would cost the Town more money. They also felt it was hard enough to get three good members for the Board and that a five-member Board would make the task that much more difficult. It was mentioned that it would be harder to get full attendance at emergency Board meetings. Data was presented which showed that most towns of our size, that do not support their own high school, were operating with three-member Boards.

The majority concluded that possibly in the future, if our population swells to near 3,000, a five-member panel would be useful, but that at the present time, and based on actual **need**, the advisability of electing a five-member Board is neither fitting nor wise.

However, going along with the spirit that no five people should decide this matter, the committee unanimously voted to ask the School Board to put the issue up to the public with an article in the 1976 School District Warrant.
