WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the inhabitants of the Town of Tilton, in the County of Belknap, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby, notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday the 14th day of March next at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Town Clerk, and Town Treasurer for a term of one year, one Selectman for a term of three years, one Road Agent for the ensuing year, one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years, two Auditors for the ensuing year, and one Member of the Park Commission for a term of two years.
- 2. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day expense.
- 3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of Cemeteries.
- 4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of Hospitals.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$110.22, to obtain Town Road Aid, the State to appropriate the sum of \$734.81.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for Civilian Defense.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the use of the Winnisquam Fire Department.
- 8. To see what action the Town will take in regard to care of Trees and raise money for same.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for new equipment.

- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for oiling streets.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$405.94 which is 1/100 to 1% of the assessed valuation of the Town, to the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for use of controlling white pine Blister Rust, in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation Commission.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,750.00 for the Tilton-Northfield Recreation Council, a similar article is included in the Northfield Warrant.
- 14. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to request the State Tax Commission to revaluate all real estate property in the Town on the basis of true market value.
- 15. To see if the Town will assume the upkeep of two street lights near the Winnisquam House, previously paid for by the Winnisquam House, and raise money for same.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on early paid taxes as follows: two percent discount if Tax Bill is paid within thirty days from date of bill.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any property acquired by Tax Deed.
- 18. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for all purposes for the year ensuing.
- 19. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the reports of its officers and agents.

- 20. To choose any other officers and agents for the ensuing year.
- 21. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 22. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The polls shall be closed not earlier than 6:00 o'clock in the evening. The business meeting will be held at 8:00 o'clock in the evening.

REPORT OF THE TILTON-NORTHFIELD RECREATION COUNCIL

The Tilton-Northfield Recreation program approaches its fifth anniversary under the able direction of Charles Stebbins, Tilton native. Mr. Stebbins is 24 years of age, a graduate of Boston College and now teaches in the Franklin schools. His personal interest in recreation is evidenced by his assistance with the Franklin recreation program last summer and the fact that he has been one of the outstanding players of the Laconia Lakers for eight years.

During the past year our usually very successful swimming program was supervised by Robert Selvin and Irene Plourde and provided 2200 swims in 42 trips to Northfield Pond for the youngsters of Tilton-Northfield.

Baseball Little League showed the addition of another team sponsored by the Lions Club, the other four being sponsored by Arwood Corporation, Arthur S. Brown & Co., Rotary and J. P. Stevens. Tennis and archery were also continued this year.

The outdoor winter program was off to a quick start with ski bus trips made possible by early snow; these trips, however, are limited to ten because of finances. An average of 35 skiers use this facility on each trip. The skating program, usually subject to the vagaries of the weather, improved only after it became possible to put a jeep on the ice to remove the early snow cover. If the Recreation Council had its own pump, flooding of the pond could be done more often, thereby maintaining a smoother skating surface. Considering the amount of money we have to spend on a skating program, Tilton-Northfield is fortunate to have the skating rink it has.

Mondays and Wednesdays at the Center show an average attendance of 50; with 70 to 80 attending the social on Friday evening and about 70 on Saturday evening. The trampoline is a favorite attraction, followed by boxing, ping pong and weight lifting. More indoor sports equipment is sorely needed and any such contributions would be greatly appreciated, plus any contribution of used skiis and skates.

The Recreation Council is especially grateful to the following for the assistance rendered during the year: the Little League sponsors as listed above, the baseball managers, the American Legion, Tilton School, the Fire Department and all other individuals and organizations that gave willingly.

After five years of Recreation, the Council feels that Recreation has become an integral part of the town, is happy to be a part of it and is pleased when it hears favorable comment on the program.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE HALL MEMORIAL LIBRARY ASSOCIATION

During the past year, monthly purchases of new books have stocked our library shelves with much of the best of modern fiction and non-fiction. Within the past year, this committee has availed itself of facilities offered through the New Hampshire State Library Purchasing Department, enabling the Hall Memorial Library to receive a discount approximately 10% greater than was otherwise obtainable in buying books.

The Hall Memorial Library, in cooperation with the pub-

lic Libraries of Franklin, Bristol, Canterbury and Belmont, has been awarded a thousand dollar grant from the New Hampshire State Library, under the Shieling Trust. This is to be used for the purchase of books that might be more expensive than the Trustees of local libraries would usually feel justified in buying.

It should be mentioned that several valuable additions to our Library have been placed on the Memorial Shelf. Among these is a twelve volume set, the Metropolitan Seminar in Art, presented by a local Art Discussion Group in memory of Mrs. Charles E. Tilton.

The Board of Trustees would like to take this opportunity to thank the New Hampshire State Library for their assistance during the past year. We would also express our appreciation to the Friends of the Library for their whole-hearted support.

During the year there were 134 new, and 225 repeat cases under nursing service and 56 new and 143 repeat cases under Health and Welfare.

Twenty-six trips were made with patients during the year to hospitals, clinics and Doctors.

As usual the Toxoid Clinics were held in October, November and December. Through the courtesy of the American Legion we held it in their hall on Park Street. Fifty Triple Toxoids and twenty-nine vaccinations were given, which is a much smaller number than in previous years. The clinics are in cooperation with the State Board of Health. Dr. Archie Grevior was the attending physician and Mrs. Virginia Comstock the state preschool nurse. Assisting were Mrs. Willa Downar, R. N., Mrs. Lurline McCook, R. N., Mrs. Marjorie Robert, Mrs. Mona Hill, R. N. and Mrs. John Crawford.

A Polio Clinic was held May 19 at the Town Hall for adults and children. One hundred and eight received the protection. The district nurse assisted the school nurse at Polio Clinics at the Grammar and High Schools.

The X-ray mobile was in town two days in October. The first day it visited the local mills. The second day through the kindness of Mr. Roy Jordan, it was located in front of Jordan's Electrical Store with the admitting desk inside where 174 signed the forms for a chest x-ray.

The School Nurse, Mrs. Kay Hewitt, R. N., and the District Nurse bought, wrapped and distributed gifts for Xmas to the children of Tilton and Northfield. Money and toys were given generously by organizations and by many individuals for this purpose.

Many dinners were given again this year by the Elks, American Legion, Odd Fellows, The Salvation Army, Future Homemakers and Cub Scouts for Xmas.

REPORT OF TILTON-NORTHFIELD SCHOOL BOARD

We were pleased to hear the report of the Cooperative Study Committee, Mr. Ernest J. Decato, Chairman, Mrs. Fae W. Lockwood, Secretary, Mrs. Dorothy A. Atherton, Dr. Joel E. Nordholm, Mr. Sebastian T. Pucci, Mr. Richard A. Pucci, Mrs. Eleanor D. Prescott, Mr. Alfred R. Belair, and Mr. William C. Bayley, which showed that Tilton-Northfield had a terrific growing problem in the number of children and the need of school facilities.

The March 9, 1960 district meeting provided for a new Study Committee as follows: "A joint report shall be filed by the Cooperative Study Committee and the School Board showing (1) recommendations concerning a coperative school district and (2) recommendations for Tilton-Northfield meeting its school building requirements." The Committee includes the following: Mr. Richard A. Pucci, Chairman, Mrs. Dorothy A. Atherton, Secretary, Mrs. Dorothy N. Currier, Mr. Alfred R. Belair, Mr. Norman L. Wiggin, Mrs. Phyllis M. Yudickey, Mr. Michael Buczynski, Mr. Ernest J. Decato, and Mr. Anthony G. Gekas. We have held several main joint meetings and sub-committee meetings and look forward to finding a solution to meet the building and curricula needs for a better educational program.

We call your attention to the statistics in the annual report showing the great need for school building construction. The high School has gone beyond its capacity this year and the problem becomes obvious when it is noted that: (1) Approximately 44 pupils will graduate with the class of 1961 and approximately 80 enter Grade 7 in September, 1961 (2) Approximately 62 pupils graduate in June, 1962 and 88 will enter Grade 7 in September and (3) Approximately 41 will graduate in June, 1963 and 93 pupils will enter Grade 7 in September. There are over 100 pupils in one elementary grade to crowd the high school later.

The outstanding educational improvement to the Tilton-Northfield school system this year has been the addition of a full-time guidance director. Mr. Richard Incerto has done an admirable job in advising the pupils on curricula, college, industry, professions, business, and the armed services. He has persuaded many pupils to remain in school and secure a high school diploma.

The former office of the superintendent was used for a guidance director office and the new Union #59 office established in the Tilton business district. This office is very convenient for the five towns and follows the national tendency of taking the office out of a school building.

The school board used the money provided in the budget to purchase 125 folding chairs to replace many of the dilapidated auditorium chairs, 12 new high school desks, 20 reading chairs and 8 adult chairs for Sanborn School, 5 new typewriters for the commerce department, and a Goder incinerator disposal unit to eliminate the old outdoor incinerators which were an eyesore and a safety hazard.

We used the National Defense Education money to purchase a new 4-pupil laboratory experiment desk and for a new 10-pupil language laboratory for the foreign language department. Federal money paid one half the costs of these items and many scientific pieces of equipment were purchased for the high and elementary schools. A new science demonstration desk was purchased for the Union School.

The gymnasium floor at the high school had not been improved for fifteen years. We were glad to have a professional expert sand the floors, paint the new physical education lines, and completely resurface the floor. The floor has the appearance of a completely new floor.

The proposed 1961-62 budget shows the only outstanding increase to be in teachers' salaries. Most items show little or no increase. Teachers' salaries constitute approximately 60 per cent of the entire school budget. The only other large items are transportation, retirement, salaries of janitors, and water, light and janitors' supplies.

We continue to extend our appreciation to the Journal-Transcript for its annual efforts to secure two worthy scholarships for a Franklin and a Tilton-Northfield graduate and to build a permanent fund for scholarships.

We wish to thank the Tilton-Northfield Womens' Club for its support of the Dental Clinic through its annual wellknown and very successful Outgrown Shop.

We again salute the Parent-Teacher Association, the Garden Club, American Legion Whiteman-Davidson Post 49, and all service clubs, organizations and individuals for their support of the schools and the creation of gifts, awards, and prizes for pupils. The increase in scholarships by organizations and individuals is very heartening. The Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks annually grant scholarships to pupils of the area.

We appreciate suggestions from parents and citizens at all times. We know that our important task is to establish policies for the continued improvement of our schools. We are the legislative and judicial branches of the school system, and our work does not include administration. Our very important task is to continually improve the curricula along the lines of the Doctor James B. Conant Reports on the American High School and the Junior High School. We know that the building of classrooms to take care of our surplus pupils does not meet the problem, as our science, shop, home economics, commerce, agriculture, library, study hall, and school lunch needs building improvements. We shall need two additional science laboratory rooms to give our pupils the proper background. We also need courses in mechanical drawing and blueprint reading.

It is our belief that the new fence erected at the Union and Sanborn Schools this year will be a terrific asset to our schools in the improvement of safety conditions. The new heavy traffic from the state highway has increased the hazards along Park Street for children. This fence will also give relief to families of the area with a beautiful steel fence instead of decrepit falling-down fences.

Our people have always supported good schools and Tilton-Northfield stands as a leader of better schools for

the children. We welcome all constructive suggestions for continued eductional progress.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Members of the School Board:

The Tilton-Northfield School Board continued its annual list of events and developments which have marked the steady improvement of the schools and its standards with:

- 1. Operated another successful summer recreation program with Mr. James Armstrong, Director, and two assistant Directors, Miss Barbara Wheaton and Miss Cindy Emerson.
- 2. Supported the annual pre-school registration for first graders at the Legion Hall, with school vision and hearing tests.
- 3. Secured federal funds for matching aid for the equipment of the guidance director, so that completely new desks, table, typewriter, rexograph, chairs, and book cases were available with the government paying one-half of the total costs.
- 4. Secured a federal grant that will pay for the first year one-half of the guidance director's salary.
- 5. Approved the paying of a \$3800 salary for beginning teachers so that Tilton-Northfield secured some excellent teachers from Keene Teachers College, Plymouth Teachers College, the University of New Hampshire, the University of Massachusetts, and the New England Conservatory of Music.
- 6. Supported an extraordinary outdoor music festival at the Sanborn School under the direction of Mrs. Harriet Thompson, Music Director, and Mrs. Barbara Comee, Art Director.
- 7. Established a policy of salaries for physical education and the coaching of sports.

- 8. Approved a fine June Music Concert of Union and High School instrumentalists and the high school band.
- 9. Sponsored the visit of Mr. Tino Kerdijk, Director of the Surabaja School of Music, from Indonesia to the Tilton-Northfield Schools.
- 10. Approved the Art Tour of a group of seventh grade pupils to studios, art centers, and historical societies of Concord, under the direction of Mrs. Barbara Comee.
- 11. Aided the securing of a special science scholarship for Mr. William Powers, high school teacher, at the University of Wisconsin.
- 12. Sent Mr. Thardix Pisczek, Head Custodian, and Mr. Edward Florence, assistant Custodian to the three-day state convention at Plymouth Teachers College.
- 13. Established an extra position at Tilton-Northfield because of an increased pupil enrollment.
- 14. Engaged a very qualified guidance director, Mr. Richard Incerto.
- 15. Secured an office for the superintendent of schools at 238 Main Street, Tilton, with the towns of Gilford, Belmont, Gilmanton and Canterbury sharing the costs.
- 16. Erected a new steel fence at Union and Sanborn Playground.
- 17. Completely renovated the gymnasium floor of the high school.
- 18. Purchased new desks and chairs, 125 auditorium chairs, 5 typewriters, new science pupil-desk, and science apparatus at the high school.
- 19. Placed new Goder Incinerator at the Sanborn School.
- 20. Placed one of first 10-pupil foreign language laboratories at the high school.

- 21. Supervised the school lunch progam by competitive bids on goods to a financial surplus.
- 22. Introduced reading classes to Grades 7 and 8 of the high school in addition to regular english periods.
- 23. Awarded bids for oil and general school supplies to low bidders.
- 24. Supported Open House for parents at the Tilton-North-field Schools with over 500 parents attending.
- 25. Continued departmentalized instruction for Grades 5 and 6 at the Union Schools.
- 26. Approved the display of work of art pupils in the local schools at the Currier Gallery in Manchester, under the direction of Mrs. Comee.
- 27. Conducted a survey of parents for Grades 7 and 8, and found that 85 per cent of the parents preferred separate dances for Grades 7-8, and voted to direct the Principal to operate separate special dances and parties for Grades 7-8 and Grades 9-12.
- 28. Supported study of Minimum standards for Elementary Schools.
- 29. Inspected all schools for safety needs and needed psysical improvements.
- 30. Expended a great deal of time on study of needed curricula and buildings with the Study Committee to find the solution to our needs to improve education.




