THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Weare in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Weare School Gymnasium in said Town on Tuesday, the sixth day of March, next at 10 of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To see if the Town of Weare will vote to take action to have two sessions for the annual Town meeting in this town, the first session for choice of Town Officers elected by an official ballot and other action required to be inserted on said official ballot and the second session, on a date set by the selectmen, for transaction of other business.

NOTE: It is the intention of the Board of Selectmen to move that the remaining articles be taken up at an adjourned session of this meeting at March 8 at 7 p.m.

3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

4. To make provisions for the collection of taxes.

5. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow on behalf of the Town in anticipation of taxes; said loans to be payable from taxes from the year of 1973 and to issue notes therefore in the name of the Town at such rate of interest and payable at such time and place within one year as the Selectmen may decide.

6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of highways and bridges and take any other action in relation thereto.

7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the general expenses of the Highway Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,932.80 to be used with the sum of \$12,885.30 to be furnished by the State for Class IV and Class V construction, reconstruction and Betterment Aid or to take any other action in relation thereto.

9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for new equipment for the Highway Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

10. To see if the Town will vote to designate all roads in the Town, other than Class I and Class II highways, as scenic roads pursuant to RSA 253, as amended. (by petition)

11. To see if the Town will designate Duck Pond Road as a scenic road under the provisions of RSA 235, as amended. (by petition)

12. To see if the Town will vote to designate Mt. Dearborn Road from the Deering Road to Hodgdon Road a scenic road pursuant to RSA 253, as amended. (by petition)

13. To see if the Town will vote to designate Saw Mill Road, so-called, from the Deering Road to Mt. Dearborn Road a scenic road pursuant to RSA 253, as amended. (by petition)

14. To see if the Town will vote to designate Maplewold Road from Mt. William Pond to Mt. Dearborn Road a scenic road pursuant to RSA 253, as amended. (by petition)

15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Police Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

16. To see if the Town of Weare will vote to adopt as an ordinance of the town the following: "No person shall allow their dog to run at large off the owner's premises unless the same is under their immediate control. Any person found in violation of this ordinance shall be fined not less than \$10.00 and not more than \$25.00", or to take any other action in relation thereto.

17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of a Police Cruiser, 40% of the cost to be furnished by the Federal Government under the National Highway Safety Act or to take any other action in relation thereto.
18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of police radios for the Police Department, or to take any other action in relation thereto.
19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Fire Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.
20. To see if the Town will vote to accept and maintain as part of the Weare Fire Department the new fire house built by the people in the vicinity of Lake Horace. (by petition)
21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries or to take any other action in relation thereto.
22. To see if the Town will vote to accept Pine Grove Cemetery as a part of the town cemetery system and the Pine Grove Cemetery Trust Funds to be added to the Town Cemetery Trust Funds or to take any other action in relation thereto.
23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Band Concerts or to take any other action in relation thereto.
24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Public Library or to take any other action in relation thereto.
25. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day or to take any other action in relation thereto.
26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the Water Safety Program or to take any other action in relation thereto.
27. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$383.00 for the Concord Hospital or to take any other action in relation thereto.
28. To see if the Town will vote to encourage its women to be checked annually for cancer at a free clinic to be sponsored by the American Cancer Society each year. (by petition)
29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for a Community Nursing Service or to take any other action in relation thereto.
30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of \$19,416.95 to pay the long-term notes on

the fire truck purchased in 1972 in full or to take any other action in relation thereto.

31. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$3,000.00 for new equipment in the town office and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 or to take any other action in relation thereto.

32. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$16,616.05 for restoration of the Weare Town Hall on a carry-over basis and maintenance and repair of the town office and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 or to take any other action in relation thereto.

33. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the tramp house, so-called, presently located behind the Town Hall. (by petition)

34. To see if the Town of Weare will vote to authorize the Selectmen to deed to Mr. and Mrs. Robert Pepin land taken from them by tax deed dated September 9, 1972 in consideration of payment of \$998.71 or to take any other action in relation thereto.

35. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the Conservation Commission, the whole or any part of money so appropriated to be placed in the Conservation Fund established by vote of Town meeting in 1971, to accumulate from year to year and money may be expended from said fund by the Conservation Commission for conservation purposes according to Chapter 36A, RSA.

36. To see whether or not the Town will adopt as an ordinance for the town of Weare, an ordinance entitled

“WASTE FROM
ANY NEW HAMPSHIRE CITY OR TOWN
OTHER THAN WEARE”

as recommended by the Conservation Commission:

1. Definition. “Waste matter” means garbage, refuse, solid or liquid waste, ashes, rubbish, industrial and commercial waste, and all other refuse of every description, whether loose, in containers, compacted, baled, bundled, or otherwise.

2. Prohibition. No municipality, person, firm, corporation or other legal entity shall deposit or cause or permit to be deposited, any waste matter as herein defined, in any structure or on any land within the Town of Weare or in the territorial waters of the Town of Weare, which waste matter originated in any New Hampshire city or town other than the Town of Weare.

This section shall not apply to the Weare town dump restricted to refuse from the Town of Weare only, by ordinance adopted March, 1972; and this section is not intended to prevent consideration by the Town of participation in regional disposal facilities according to state law.

3. Exception. Nothing herein shall prohibit the transportation of waste matter into the town for use as a raw material for the production of new commodities which are not waste matter as defined.

4. Penalty. Whoever shall violate the provisions of section 2 shall be liable to punishment by fine of not less than \$50.00 for each offense, to be enforced by complaint of one or more of the Selectmen, and each day that such waste is permitted to remain unlawfully in this Town shall constitute a separate offense.

37. To see if the Town will vote to amend the existing Dump Ordinance (Article 29, 1972 Town Meeting) by adding the following. . .and dumped from vehicles bearing an authorized Town of Weare Dump sticker which shall be issued to any resident upon payment of a fee to be determined by the Selectmen. (by petition)

38. To see if the Town will vote to direct the Selectmen to start work on the tax map required by RSA 31, as amended and raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 initially for this purpose, with any balance to be carried over to the following year. (by petition)

39. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 for use by the Weare Planning Board. Portions of this sum being planned for ongoing programs, no fiscal year restrictions on the expenditure of them are included herein. (by petition)

40. To see if the Town will vote to express its option to establish the size of the Weare Planning Board to be five members. (by petition)

41. To see if the Town will vote to establish the Weare Planning Board as the Weare Board of Adjustment to act upon any and all matters that may require the services of a Board of Adjustment. (by petition)

42. To see if the Town will vote to establish as an ordinance of the Town of Weare the following:

YEAR-ROUND DWELLING MINIMUM

All year-round dwellings hereinafter constructed or located within the Town of Weare shall have a minimum of 420 square feet. When such dwelling has more than 2 permanent occupants there shall be an additional minimum of 80 square feet for each additional permanent occupant. (by petition)

43. To see if the Town will vote to establish as an ordinance of the Town of Weare the following:

ROAD TURN-AROUND

Any dead-end road, regardless of classification or ownership, that is hereinafter constructed or extended and that serves two or more separate residences or mobile homes shall be equipped with a turn-around roadway at the closed end with a minimum radius of 75 feet maintained from the center to the outside of the right-of-way. Any private driveway that services an individual residence is exempted from this ordinance. (by petition)

44. To see if the Town will vote to establish as an ordinance of the Town of Weare the following:

CONSTRUCTION PERMIT

1. PURPOSE

A. In order to enable the proper listing of all improvements to Real Property in the Town Inventory, this Ordinance is hereby adopted for the Town of Weare; effective upon acceptance at Town Meeting.

B. The listing of any improvement to Real Property will permit the Board of Selectmen of the Town to properly assess such an improvement for tax purposes when appropriate.

C. The issuance of a Construction Permit will enable the enforcement of State Statutes and Town Ordinances relative to such improvements by Town Officials empowered to enforce the same.

2. METHOD

A. Prior to the construction of any improvement to Real Property, except as exempted in this Ordinance, the owner, lessee or agent of either of the same shall make application in duplicate to the Board of Selectmen for a Construction Permit on the form available for this purpose from the Selectmen.

B. Using the legal description of the Real Property as the address, an abbreviated format sufficing; this form shall describe the planned improvement in plain language. Statements shall be included as to the dates of actions necessitated by State Statutes and any existing Town Ordinances. (In example: Application for a septic system to the New Hampshire Board of Water Pollution Control – 1 July 1972; Percolation Test completed – 2 August 1972; state Board approval of percolation test and septic system installation – 12 August 1972). A \$5.00 filing fee shall accompany the application.

C. Upon receipt of an application, the Board of Selectmen shall verify the accuracy of the statements made on the application. In the event of ambiguities or incorrect data on the application, the Selectmen shall reject the application and return it to the submitter by ordinary mail, stating the reason(s) for the rejection and citing the steps needed to correct the application. The applicant may then submit a new application showing the correct data without any additional fee.

D. When an accurate application is received by the Selectmen, they will endorse the same with an approval, returning the original to the applicant by ordinary mail and retaining the second copy for town purposes. This endorsed application will constitute the Construction Permit. The Selectmen shall issue all approvals no later than 30 calendar days from receipt of the accurate application. Compliance with existing Statutes and Ordinances relevant to the application shall be prima facie evidence of entitlement of the applicant to a Construction Permit. This Permit cannot otherwise be withheld.

3. EXEMPTIONS

A. Exempted from the provisions of this Ordinance are: Improvements with a value of less than \$100.00; except that an improvement cannot deliberately be broken down into small parts for the purpose of Ordinance contravention.

B. Further exempted are: repairs of any nature where the original configuration of the improvement has not changed. Included in these but not limiting them thereby, are; painting and decorating; re-roofing a building; replacing windows, floors, siding; re-arranging interior partitions or replacing doors.

C. Also exempted are: installation of fences; timbering operations; contouring farm land currently in use for that purpose or clearing streams and waterways.

D. Further exempted are any and all improvements that would not affect the assessed value of the Real Property for tax purposes when such an improvement is instituted.

E. Any improvement in existence or already started on the date of approval of this Ordinance is exempted as well.

4. COMPLIANCE

A. It shall be unlawful for any person to institute the construction of any Real Property improvement unless exempted as above, without first applying for and being issued a Construction Permit.

B. The applicant shall have 2 calendar years from date of approval of the Construction Permit to complete the improvement shown within it. The applicant may renew the expiration date of the Construction Permit by application to the Selectmen. This may be done for one or more 2 year periods when completion within any 2

year period is impractical. The Selectmen shall renew such permits routinely. No additional fee shall be charged for this.

C. The applicant shall notify the Board of Selectmen of the completion of the construction. The Selectmen may inspect the improvement to verify its compliance with any applicable Statutes and Ordinances. Upon satisfaction that the improvement is in compliance with the application for the same, the Selectmen will endorse an approval in the appropriate part of the Permit. The entry of the improvement in the Town Inventory and/or the property card of the parcel of Real Property as of the approval date shall constitute the legal record of approval.

D. Any person who commences the physical construction of any improvement to Real Property, other than preliminary work such as surveying, building plot location, septic system percolation testing, or well location without first obtaining a Construction Permit shall be in violation of this Ordinance and shall be fined not more than \$50.00. Each day of active work on such an improvement without prior permit shall constitute a separate offense. No Construction Permit shall subsequently be issued by the Board of Selectmen until the appropriate fines and subsequent costs are paid to the Town of Weare. (by petition) 45. To see if the Town will vote to establish as an ordinance of the Town of Weare the following:

SUB-DIVISION REGULATIONS

1. PURPOSE

A. These sub-division regulations are established upon acceptance of them at Town Meeting of the Town of Weare so as to establish an orderly pattern for the growth of the Town of Weare through sound land use.

B. These regulations are not intended to be unduly restrictive to the establishment of any sub-division that will meet the requirement of rational growth for the Town of Weare on land that is suitable for the intended purpose.

C. There are no rights, privileges or discretionary powers reserved by the Weare Planning Board except as stated herein and as stipulated in the New Hampshire Revised Statutes, as appropriate.

2. GENERAL

A. A sub-division is defined as any parcel of land that is divided into 2 or more adjoining pieces and offered for sale or lease.

B. The offering for sale of any individual piece of property, regardless of size and regardless that it may be part of a larger parcel, does not come within the scope or purpose of these regulations.

C. The state definition of Class V roads is, "Class V highways shall consist of all other traveled highways which the town has the duty to maintain regularly and shall be known as town roads." The minimum standards established for Class V roads that may be constructed in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance are as follows:

1. The deeded right-of-way shall have a minimum of 50 feet.
2. The maintained road surface shall have a minimum of 24 feet.
3. The maintained road surface shall be stabilized and maintained in such condition.
4. Adequate culverting shall be provided when the roadway covers any drainage course.
5. A minimum grade of 1% shall be maintained where practical to permit adequate drainage.
6. A maximum grade of 9% shall be maintained unless the topography precludes such a minimum from a practical point of view. The maximum grade shall not exceed 12% under any circumstances.
7. The maintained road surface shall be crowned $\frac{1}{4}$ inch to the foot from the centerline of the road.
8. All curves shall be adequately banked for the radius of the curvature and the intended legal vehicular speed.
9. All curves shall have a minimum radius of 500 feet from the center to the outside of the right-of-way except when such a curve is a corner within the limits of the sub-division. In that event, the minimum radius shall be 75 feet from the center to the outside of the right-of-way.
10. All bridges, causeways and deep fills on such a road shall have adequate railings and supports for the safety of the users of the roadway.

D. The state definition of Class VI roads is, "Class VI highways shall consist of all other existing public ways, and shall include all highways discontinued as open highways and made subject to gates and bars, and all highways which have not been maintained and repaired by the town in suitable condition for travel thereon for five successive years or more." The minimum standards established for Class VI roads that may be constructed in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance are as follows:

1. The deeded or utilized right-of-way shall have a minimum of 50 feet.
2. The maintained road surface shall be stabilized and maintained in such condition with a minimum of 18 feet.
3. Adequate culverting shall be provided when the roadway covers any drainage course.

4. A minimum grade of 1% shall be maintained where practical to permit adequate drainage.

5. The maximum grade shall not exceed 12%.

6. The maintained road surface shall be crowned ¼ inch to the foot from the centerline of the roadway.

7. All curves shall be adequately banked for the radius of curvature and the intended vehicular speed.

8. All curves shall have a minimum radius of 75 feet maintained from the center to the outside edge of the right-of-way.

9. Adequate railings and supports shall be provided at all points where needed for the safety of the users of the roadway.

E. All sub-dividers must obtain a surety bond from a bonding company licensed in New Hampshire to ensure their compliance with the provisions of this ordinance with respect to road construction. Upon acceptance of the completed roads by the Town, the sub-divider may apply to the Board of Selectmen for release from such a surety bond.

3. REGULATIONS

A. The Town of Weare has the responsibility to ensure fire and police protection to all inhabitants and property of the town. Therefore, to enable the town to perform these functions, all private roads planned for use in any sub-division shall meet the purposes of Class VI highways as defined by the State of New Hampshire, and be constructed in accordance with the minimum standards of construction established in this ordinance. It is clearly to be understood that any and all Class VI highway so constructed or utilized for any sub-division shall remain private roads with the maintenance, culverting, snow removal and resurfacing or restabilizing as required the responsibility of the owner of the roads so as to remain in accordance with the herein established standards of Class VI highways in order for the Town of Weare to have ingress and egress for purposes of fire protection and for police purposes.

B. Any roads that are constructed or altered with the intention of transferring title of same to the Town of Weare shall meet the purposes of Class V highways as defined by the State of New Hampshire. Any roads previously constructed as Class VI highways for private retention in a sub-division, or prior ungraded roads must be upgraded to Class V status as established herein prior to offering the same to the Town of Weare for acceptance as Public Ways.

C. It will be the duty of the Town Road Agent to verify that any road meets the classification claimed by the sub-divider. In the event that road classification cannot amicably be agreed upon by the sub-divider and the Town Road Agent, the services of an appropriate

competent individual in the New Hampshire Highway Department may be solicited to resolve the problem of road classification. The determination by such a State Employee will be final. Any costs incurred in such an adjudication will be met by the sub-divider.

D. Any dead-end road developed as part of a sub-division, regardless of its classification shall be equipped with a turn-around roadway at the closed end with a minimum radius of 75 feet maintained from the center to the outside edge of the right-of-way.

E. This ordinance refers only to roads that are developed as part of a sub-division. There is no intent to prevent any land owner or lessee from constructing any kind of temporary or permanent road that he may desire for his own private purposes except as otherwise may be provided in law.

F. The problem of sanitary waste disposal and the obtaining of fresh water has been recognized by the state, and minimum standards and separation of these functions stipulated in the appropriate statutes. In order to prevent cross-pollution of adjoining properties in a sub-division, the minimum lot size of any parcel of land in a sub-division and suitable for sanitary waste disposal shall be one acre. Further, each parcel shall have a minimum road frontage of 100 feet, as measured in a straight line.

4. PROCEDURES

A. Any individual who intends to sub-divide any land shall prepare a plat for the sub-division. This plat shall show the boundaries of the individual lots, any roads to be constructed annotated by classification, any ponds and permanent waterways within and also within 1000 feet of the planned sub-division and all of the other information required by the Register of Deeds of Hillsborough County. This plat may be a preliminary one and so-marked. If preliminary, two copies of the plat shall be submitted to the Weare Planning Board. If the plat meets the requirements of these regulations and all of the pertinent state statutes, the Weare Planning Board will annotate an approval on one copy of the plat and return it to the sub-divider within 30 days of its receipt by the board. Any minor revisions to the plat are discretionary with the sub-divider and need not be reported to the Weare Planning Board at this time.

B. The filing of a preliminary plat by a sub-divider is discretionary on his part. Accordingly, a plat may be submitted to the Weare Planning Board as a final plat, although no preliminary plat was ever so-submitted. A final plat, whether an original submission, or whether a final version of a preliminary plat as revised, shall be prepared in accordance with the standards previously stated herein and shall be submitted to the Weare Planning Board in 3 copies. If this final plat

meets the requirements of these regulations and all of the pertinent state statutes, the Weare Planning Board will annotate an approval on 2 copies of the same. One copy will be sent to the Register of Deeds of Hillsborough County for informational purposes only. The second copy will be returned to the originator within 30 days of its receipt by the Board. The developer may then submit this approved copy of the plat to the Register of Deeds of Hillsborough County for recording.

5. ADJUSTMENTS & EXCEPTIONS

A. It is a possibility that the intended land use in a sub-division may fall within the spirit and intent of these regulations and yet fall short of meeting them. Further, strict conformity to these regulations could cause undue hardship or injustice to the established owner of the land.

B. In an event, such as above, the developer may prepare a preliminary plat of the intended sub-division and submit the same and all supporting documents at a public hearing that will be held by the Weare Planning Board sitting and acting as a Board of Adjustment as defined in the Statutes of the State of New Hampshire.

C. Within 30 days of such a hearing, the Weare Planning Board will publish its findings and decision to the request for exception.

D. All expenses, including advertising and publishing, connected with such a hearing shall be met by the petitioner.

6. ENFORCEMENT

A. It shall be unlawful for any individual to offer for sale any parcel of land within an unapproved sub-division.

B. The fine for such an unlawful act shall not exceed \$500.00 for each violation.

C. The Weare Planning Board may not approve any subsequent plat submitted for approval until such assessed fine and any subsequent costs have been paid to the Town of Weare.

D. At the request of the Weare Planning Board, the Board of Selectmen shall expeditiously obtain an injunction to prevent a sub-divider from violating the provisions of this ordinance. The costs involved are to be borne by the sub-divider. (by petition)

46. To see if the Town will vote to establish as an ordinance of the Town of Weare the following:

BUILDING HEIGHT LIMITATION

All buildings hereinafter constructed, located or altered within the Town of Weare shall be limited to two stories and attic above ground level. (by petition)

47. To see if the Town will vote to establish as an ordinance of the Town of Weare the following:

MOBILE HOME INVENTORY

1. Mobile homes entering mobile home courts or parks shall be registered by the park owner with the Town Clerk within seven days of arrival in order to be properly entered on the town tax records.

2. Mobile home park owners shall supply a listing of all mobile homes and the owners of the same to the Town Clerk not later than 15 April each year as of 1 April of the same year. (by petition)

48. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to re-appraise the Town. (by petition)

49. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and direct the Selectmen to appoint a standing committee to study the desirability of establishing one or more historic districts in the Town and to propose the establishment of specific districts, if found desirable, pursuant to RSA 31, at the 1974 town meeting, the committee to consist of one selectman, one historical society member, one junior historical society member, one conservation commission member, one planning board member and two members-at-large. (by petition)

50. To see if the Town will vote that any mobile home hereafter located or relocated in a mobile home park shall be at least 150 feet from any other mobile home in such park. (by petition)

51. To see if the Town will vote that, in order to protect its inhabitants' safety and its own economic viability, all dwellings, including mobile homes, hereafter constructed, located or relocated within the Town shall be at least 500 feet from any other dwelling, except that to avoid excessive hardship to an individual the Selectmen may, after a public hearing, reduce such distance. Mobile homes located in authorized mobile home parks are exempted from this ordinance. (by petition)

52. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

RECORD OF TOWN MEETING — March 7, 1972

The Moderator read the following paragraphs from Chapter 524 of the Laws of the Legislature of 1971:

40:4-a. Secret Ballot. At any meeting of a town with a population of more than 500, five voters may make a request in writing prior to a vote by voice vote or division vote that the vote be taken by secret written ballot. Upon receiving such a request, the Moderator shall conduct the vote by secret "yes-no" ballot. At any meeting of a town of a population 500 or less, three voters may request secret balloting as provided herein.

40:4-b. Questioning a Vote. When any vote, other than by ballot, declared by the Moderator or other officer presiding shall, immediately and before any other business is begun, be questioned in writing or orally by seven or more of the voters present, the Moderator or other officer presiding shall retake the vote by secret "yes-no" ballot.

Voted to dispense with the reading of the entire Warrant at this time. Each article will be read before any action is taken on it.

ARTICLE 2: To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Finance Committee recommendation: \$35,700. A motion was made and seconded to accept the Finance Committee recommendation. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 3: To make provisions for the collection of taxes.

A motion was made and seconded that provision for the collection of taxes be left with the Selectmen. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 4: To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow on behalf of the Town in anticipation of taxes; said loans to be payable from taxes from the year of 1972 and to issue notes therefore in the name of the Town at such rate of interest and payable at such time and place within one year as the Selectmen may decide.

A motion was made and seconded that this article be accepted as read. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 5: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of highways and bridges and take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation: \$25,000 – \$15,000 for winter roads; \$10,000 for summer roads. Motion made and seconded to accept Finance Committee recommendation. After some discussion as to why the appropriation was the same as the previous year and an explanation by Eldon Townes of the gasoline tax rebate now in effect, the vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 6: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for general expenses of the Highway Department.

Finance Committee recommendation: \$10,000. A motion was made and seconded to accept the Finance Committee recommendation. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 7: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,952.96 to be used with the sum of \$13,019.75 to be furnished by the State for Class IV and Class V construction, reconstruction and Betterment Aid.

Finance Committee recommendation: \$1,952.56. A motion was made and seconded to accept the Finance Committee recommendation. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 8: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Police Department.

Finance Committee recommendation: \$7,000. A motion was made and seconded to accept the Finance Committee recommendation. After a short discussion, the vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 9: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Fire Department.

Finance Committee Recommendation: \$5,500. A motion was made and seconded to accept the Finance Committee recommendation. The vote was affirmative.

At this time, Mrs. Iola Tenney asked the meeting for a vote of appreciation for the service given the Weare Fire Department by Gerald H. Hight over the past 40 years. All in attendance at the meeting responded with a standing ovation for Mr. Hight.

A motion was made and seconded to take up Article 34 out of sequence. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 34: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Ordinance; 1. **AUTHORITY AND PURPOSES:** This Ordinance is enacted pursuant to authority conferred by RSA 31:39, relating to the power of Towns to make by-laws, and all acts amendatory thereof, and to the law of the State of New Hampshire as declared by the Supreme Court of New Hampshire, for the purposes, by providing for the reasonable regulation of private dumps, motor vehicle and machinery junk yards, house trailers and mobile homes, and advertising signs and billboards, of contributing toward the advancement of public health, safety and morality, the conservation of private property values, the encouragement of the most appropriate use of land, the facilitation of adequate transportation routes, water supplies and sewerage disposal, the prevention of conditions constituting public or private nuisances and fire hazards, and the preservation and promotion of the natural resources, attractiveness, desirability as a place to live, prosperity, historical character, and general welfare of the Town of Weare, New Hampshire; and these factors shall be considered by the Board of Selectmen and such other tribunals as may be called upon to interpret and apply the provisions hereof, as guides for the exercise of discretion in the adjudication of all matters arising under this Ordinance.

2. PRIVATE DUMPS: No person or organization shall dump, leave, place nor cause to be dumped, left or placed in this Town any chemical or commercial waste matter or any animal or other substance liable to become putrid, offensive or injurious to the public health, except at the Town Dump, so-called, and in accordance with the regulations established relative to same. 3. MOTOR VEHICLE OR MACHINERY JUNK YARDS: No person or organization shall locate, establish, operate or conduct, nor allow to be located, established, operated or conducted, upon his or its property a motor vehicle or machinery junk yard as defined in Chapter 267 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated of 1955 (“267:1 Definitions. (a) The term “motor-vehicle junk yard” as used herein shall include any business and any place of storage or deposit, whether in connection with another business or not, which has stored or deposited two or more unregistered motor vehicles which are no longer intended or in condition for legal use on the public highways, or used parts of motor vehicles or old iron, metal, glass, paper, cordage, or other waste or discarded or second-hand material which has been a part, or intended to be a part, of any motor vehicle, the sum of which parts or material shall be equal in bulk to two or more motor vehicles. “Motor-vehicle junk yard” shall also include any place of business or storage or deposit of motor vehicles purchased for the purpose of dismantling the vehicles for parts or for use of the metal for scrap and where it is intended to burn material which are parts of a motor vehicle or cut up the parts thereof, (b) The term “machinery junk yard” used herein shall mean any yard or field used as a place of storage in which there is displayed to the public view, junk machinery or scrap metal that occupies an area of five hundred square feet.”), and acts amendatory thereof, unless and until:

A. The Selectmen, upon written application to them by the owner of the land upon which such motor vehicle or machinery junk yard is proposed to be located, and after a public hearing as to which fourteen (14) days notice shall have been published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area, have found the existence of such junk yard at the proposed location thereof to be consistent with the purposes of this Ordinance, and have issued a permit therefor, and B. Said junk yard be located not less than two hundred (200) feet from any public highway, play yard, school-yard, church-ground, cemetery or river, be completely fenced or otherwise screened from view from any public highway and also be maintained in accordance with applicable state statutes and other laws consistent with the purposes of this Ordinance.

A permit issued in accordance herewith shall be valid for one year from the date thereof only, shall be renewed only after re-application

therefor, and a finding by the Selectmen that the subject junk yard is being maintained in accordance with the provisions and purposes hereof, and shall be revoked by said Selectmen if the operation of said junk yard is found to be in violation of this Ordinance or inconsistent with the purposes hereof. 4. HOUSE TRAILERS AND MOBILE HOMES: No person or organization shall locate, park, keep or maintain nor allow to be located, parked, kept, or maintained upon his or its property a house trailer or mobile home except in strict compliance with the following:

A. Any person or persons upon whose property a house trailer or mobile home is desired or intended to be located, parked, kept, or maintained shall, prior to the location or parking of such house trailer or mobile home upon such property, first submit a written application for a Temporary House Trailer or Mobile Home Permit to the Selectmen, together with an application fee in the sum of Twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) which shall be applied toward the costs of the notice, hearing, and other expenses of printing copies of, and carrying out the provisions of, this Ordinance, and shall in no event be refundable. Upon receipt of any such schedule a public hearing as to same, with respect to which (1) a notice shall be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area and (2) written notice shall be mailed, via registered or certified mail, to the owners of all properties abutting or directly across any abutting street or road from the property where the subject trailer or mobile home is proposed to be located, which notices shall be published and mailed at least fourteen (14) days prior to the date of such hearing. At any such hearing the Selectmen shall take into consideration the opinions of all persons desiring to speak for or against the location of the proposed trailer or mobile home, and shall accord particular significance to the consent or objections of persons owning properties abutting on, or within sight of said property where the subject trailer or mobile home is proposed to be located. No such permit shall be issued unless the Selectmen find the location and maintenance of the particular house trailer or mobile home by the applicant at the proposed site therefor to be consistent with all applicable Purposes of this Ordinance, as set forth in Paragraph 1 hereof.

B. Upon an affirmative finding by the Selectmen as to any such application, in accordance with the provisions hereof, they shall issue a Temporary House Trailer or Mobile Home Permit to the applicant, which shall be valid for a period of forty-five (45) days and not longer, and shall expire at the end of such period unless the applicant has in the meantime caused the subject house trailer or mobile home (1) to be located on a tract of land at least thirty thousand (30,000) square feet in area and with a frontage of one hundred (100) feet or greater on a

public or access road, (2) to be serviced by an adequate sewerage disposal system situated as defined by State Statutes and approved by the Town Health Officer, (3) to be connected to a well providing running water meeting the purity requirements of the New Hampshire Department of Health and Welfare, Division of Public Health Services, and (4) has caused the exterior walls of said trailer or mobile home to be completely enclosed, except for necessary ventilating windows, at the base with continuous wall or foundation constructed of poured concrete, or cinder block, cement block, field stone or brick which has been cemented together. Upon a finding by the Selectmen, after an inspection of the subject house trailer or mobile home, that all provisions of this Ordinance have been complied with within said forty-five (45) day period, and not otherwise, they shall issue the first Annual House Trailer or Mobile home Permit to the applicant, to be valid until the following April first.

C. An Annual House Trailer or Mobile Home Permit renewal is required each year. This renewal will be issued only after an affirmative finding by the Selectmen after inspecting the subject house trailer or mobile home and the property it is situated on, that it is being maintained in accordance and purpose of the Ordinance. Any such permit shall immediately be revoked by the Selectmen in the absence of an affirmative finding hereunder, and shall not be re-issued except after full compliance with all requirements of Sub-paragraphs A and B hereof.

D. Upon the denial of an application for a Temporary House Trailer or Mobile Home Permit hereunder, no application for another such permit relative to the same property, or any other portion of a tract of land which encompasses and includes the same property, shall be eligible for consideration until after the second (2nd) anniversary of the date of original denial.

5. ADVERTISING SIGNS AND BILLBOARDS: No person or organization shall display, nor cause nor allow to be displayed, for a period longer than thirty (30) days, upon his or its property any advertising signs or billboards except such as offer the property upon which they are located for sale or rent, or advertise the local business of the owner of the property upon which they are located or his tenant; provided that neon, tubular gas, flashing, blinking, and other signs which tend to unduly distract motor vehicle drivers, and detract from the aesthetic and natural beauty of the surrounding area, are prohibited altogether.

6. ENFORCEMENT AND PENALTIES: This Ordinance shall be enforced by the Board of Selectmen, with the cooperation, advice, and assistance of the Chief of Police, Fire Chief, and Health Officer of Weare; and upon any well-founded complaint of a violation of any provision hereof the Selectmen shall mail to the alleged violator a re-

quest that such violation cease. If said request is not complied with within thirty (30) days of the date of mailing same, the Selectmen shall file in the name of the Town, a complaint against the alleged violator in the Goffstown District Court, and any person or organization there convicted of a violation of this Ordinance shall be subject to a fine of Ten dollars (\$10.00) for each day of each violation thereof. In addition, or in the alternative, the Selectmen may take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance by seeking an injunction against any violation hereof in the Superior Court of New Hampshire, or by means of other appropriate legal proceedings.

7. APPEAL—TIME TO TAKE—BURDEN OF PROOF: Any person or organization aggrieved by a ruling of the Board of Selectmen under the provisions of this Ordinance shall have a right of appeal from said decision of the Selectmen to the Superior Court, provided that said appeal be filed within thirty (30) days of the date of the decision appealed from. Upon the hearing in the Superior Court, the burden of proof shall be upon the party seeking to set aside any order or decision of the Board of Selectmen to show that the same is unreasonable or unlawful, and all findings of the Board of Selectmen upon all questions of fact properly before them shall be deemed to be prima facie lawful and reasonable; and the order or decision appealed from shall not be set aside or vacated, except for errors of law, unless the court is persuaded by the balance of probabilities on the evidence before it that said order is unjust or unreasonable.

8. EXEMPTION OF EXISTING USES — AMORTIZATION PERIOD: Nothing in this Ordinance shall be construed to prevent, restrict, or limit in any way or to any degree any use of land or buildings existing on the effective date hereof; provided that no private dump or motor vehicle or machinery junk yard as defined herein except as are maintained with respect to existing garages, service stations, or used car businesses, shall continue for more than one year after the effective date of this Ordinance.

9. SEPARABILITY CLAUSE: The invalidity of any clause, section, provision or portion of this Ordinance shall not affect the validity of any other clause, section, provision or portion hereof.

10. AMENDMENT: This Ordinance may be amended by a majority vote of any legal town meeting provided that any proposed amendment shall have been published in the warrant for the meeting at which it is to be acted upon, and further provided that at least fourteen (14) days prior to the date of such meeting, notice of any amendments to be proposed thereat shall have been published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area.

11. PUBLICATION: Upon the passage of this Ordinance and any amendments hereto, the Selectmen shall cause copies of same, setting forth the effective dates thereof, to be printed at the expense of the Town and made available to residents of the Town and other interested persons upon request, and also to be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area.

12. EFFECTIVE DATE: This Ordinance, and any amendment hereto, shall be effective upon adoption by a majority vote of any legal town meeting. (by petition)

A motion was made and seconded to dismiss Article 34. After lengthy discussion and explanation of this article, a paper ballot was taken.

Finance Committee recommendation \$1,300. A motion was made and seconded to accept the Finance Committee recommendation. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Band Concerts.

Finance Committee recommendation: \$400. A motion was made and seconded to accept the Finance Committee recommendation. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 12: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Public Library.

Finance Committee recommendation: \$2,000. A motion was made and seconded to accept the Finance Committee recommendation. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 13: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.

Finance Committee recommendation: \$300. A motion was made and seconded to accept the Finance Committee recommendation. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 14: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the Water Safety Program.

Finance Committee recommendation: \$200. A motion was made and seconded to accept the Finance Committee recommendation. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 15: To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$399.00 for the Concord Hospital.

Finance Committee recommendation: \$399. A motion was made and seconded to accept the Finance Committee recommendation. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 16: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the White Pine Blister Rust.

Finance Committee recommendation: \$150. A motion was made and seconded to accept the Finance Committee recommendation. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 17: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for Civil Defense.

Finance Committee recommendation: \$200. A motion was made and seconded to accept the Finance Committee recommendation. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 19: "To see if the Town will vote that a Planning Board be established and empowered in accordance with the Statutes of New Hampshire to act upon Planning Board duties as set forth in these statutes." And, upon acceptance of this Article by the registered voters of the Town of Weare the Selectmen of the Town of Weare shall not appoint for membership in the Weare Planning Board any person who has served in such a capacity in the Town of Weare for the five (5) years previous to the date of this Town Meeting. (by petition)

A motion was made and seconded to accept this article as read. A paper ballot was requested.

The meeting resumed and was called to order by the Moderator at 7:40 p.m. on Thursday, March 9, 1972.

ARTICLE 20: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for a Community Nursing Service.

Harold E. Thomson explained the needs and purposes of a Community Nursing Service. After some discussion, a motion was made and seconded to appropriate \$1,500.00 for this service. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 21: "A. To see if the Town will vote that the number of Trailer Parks in the Town of Weare shall be limited to no more than three (3). B. That the number of Mobile Homes in any Trailer Park shall be limited to the number of mobile home spaces approved by the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission for each respective Trailer Park as of the date of passage of this Article. C. Provided, however, that a trailer park owner may request additional spaces for his trailer park from the Selectmen of the Town of Weare. This request may be approved in part or in entirety by the Selectmen after being discussed at a public hearing at which the Selectmen MUST give substantial weight to the views and wishes expressed by the abutters and neighbors of the trailer park." (by petition)

A motion was made and seconded to accept this article. After much discussion, the vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 22: To see if the Town will vote that after present stocks of sodium chloride and/or calcium chloride are exhausted, no such salts shall be used on Town-maintained roads in the Town of Weare. (by petition)

A motion was made and seconded to dismiss this article. After lengthy discussion of the article, it was voted to dismiss the article.

ARTICLE 23: To see if the town will vote to accept Ridge View Road which leads from the South Weare Fire Station southerly past the residences of Donald Lewis, Hope Bernatos and Harold Rowell for a distance of approximately one third of a mile. (by petition)

A motion was made and seconded that this article be amended re-naming the road in honor of Scott F. Eastman. After discussion, a vote was taken on the amendment. The vote was negative. A motion was made and seconded that the article be accepted as read. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 24: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the replacement of the dam on the Piscataquog river near the Clement Toy Company. (by petition)

The Finance Committee had no recommendation due to the lack of an estimate. A motion was made and seconded to dismiss the Article. The vote was to dismiss Article 24.

ARTICLE 25: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the ordinance as proposed by the Conservation Commission regarding excavation and removal of gravel, etc., of more than 5000 cubic yards in any twelve month period.

Edward Gallagher, a member of the Conservation Commission, explained this article. After some discussion, a motion was made and seconded to accept the article. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 26: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,625.00 contingent upon receipt of a grant of matching funds by the Ford Foundation for a professional engineering and scientific study of the source, cause, and extent of sewage pollution in the center area involving the elementary school and the high school, with recommendations for correction of the problem.

A motion was made and seconded that this article be accepted. A discussion followed on the possibility of a grant from the Ford Foundation. After a question and answer period, the vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 27: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,000.00 for culverts for the Lull Road and Francetown Road.

Finance Committee recommendation: \$9,000. A motion was made and seconded to accept the Finance Committee recommendation. The vote was affirmative.

At this time, it was asked that Article 34 be reconsidered. After much discussion pro and con regarding this article, a motion was made and seconded to reconsider this article. The Moderator stated action would be taken at a later time.

ARTICLE 28: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for new equipment for the Highway Department.

Finance Committee recommendation: \$5,000. A motion was made and seconded that this recommendation be accepted. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 29: To see if the Town of Weare will vote to restrict the use of the Weare Dump to refuse from the Town of Weare only.

A motion was made and seconded to accept this article. After questions regarding fencing and signs, the vote was affirmative.

At this time, Volker Wyrenbeck announced that Weare will have to have a tax map by 1980. He would appreciate hearing from anyone who has any maps of the town which might be useful in compiling information needed for the tax map.

ARTICLE 30: To see if the Town of Weare will vote to restrict the use of the Chase Recreational Park after closing hours.

A motion was made and seconded to accept this article as read. After much discussion, the vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 31: To see if the Town of Weare will vote to have all gatherings that are policed to be at the expense and responsibility of the party in charge.

A motion was made and seconded to accept this article. An explanation of the article was given by Walter Brennan. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 33: To see if the Town will vote to change the classification of the Burnt Hill Road from VI to V.

A motion was made and seconded to dismiss this article. After discussion, the vote was to dismiss the article.

A standing ovation was given Burnham A. Davis for his years of service to the Town as Town Clerk.

A standing ovation was given Walter P. J. Brennan for his years of service to the town as Selectman.

Action was taken at this time on the motion previously made and seconded to reconsider Article 34. A paper ballot was requested.

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ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WEARE POLICE DEPARTMENT

The Weare Police Department responded to 291 complaints in 1972. This is a decrease of about 54 complaints. Motor Vehicle accidents and breaking and entering complaints was on the increase.

Most of the breaking and entering complaints are on the summer camps on Lake Horace, or summer homes in various parts of town that are closed up after Labor Day, and are visited only occasionally by their owners. These breaks occurring during the middle of the week when there is no police or patrol available.

I would strongly advise all residents who are leaving their homes for any duration of time to please notify the Dept. of the date of departure and approximate time of return; thus enabling us to deter possible breaks that might occur in their absence.

As of October 1st the Department has put into use a telephone system known as the "Blue Phone", this consists of five phones, four of which are in police officer's homes, and the fifth which is in the home of Mrs. Florence Weldon who is our Dispatcher. These phones ring simultaneously thus reducing the time element in answering your call. Please refer to this number for any and all police matters. The number is 398-2323.

In 1972 some of the much needed equipment was purchased. The items are as follows: rain-coats, traffic safety-belts, sealed beam hand spot lights for each of the men, also two 12 guage Riot Shot Guns.

Our two State Police radios have had the frequencys installed that ties us in with the Hillsboro County Sheriffs Dept., also car to car with the N.H. State Police. This proves to be a most valuable asset to our law enforcement.

Our patrol schedule consisted mainly of Fri. and Sat. nights. These being the nights showing the most activity. This patrol represents 7929 miles at a cost of \$951.48, and 685 man hours at a cost of \$1370.00. Even this amount of miles and hours has not proved to be adequate.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank the State Police, the police in adjoining towns, and the citizens of Weare who have assisted us in the protection of life and property during the last year.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WEARE FIRE DEPARTMENT

Alarms answered during 1972 was thirty-seven (37), which is higher than in past years.

Twelve building fires, one factory fire, seven chimney fires, four motor vehicle fires, one T.V. fire, eight brush and tree fires, and two false calls to fire, and two outside mutual aid calls.

In most cases, losses were quite high, and only partially covered by insurance.

Mutual-Aid-Assistance to neighboring towns was called in to help us a number of times, for equipment as well as much needed extra man power. Letters of thanks were sent to these towns for their assistance. There is no charge for this type of assistance as we have agreed to reciprocate, and we go to their aid when called by them.

Some of these fires we had this year were thought to be of suspicious origin and proved out to be. But for the most of them, they were careless and unfortunate practices and were very costly to put out.

Our new No. 4 tanker pumper, after much delay, was delivered in June. It has a 750 GPM pump, a 750 Gal. tank, heavy duty generator, booster reel, suction hoses, smoke ejector and ladders.

A great number of hours by the men has been put in to make a water tight cover for the hose bed. If one hasn't seen this new truck, it would be to their advantage to do so.

The department, through the District Fire Chief of the Forestry Division of the State of New Hampshire, was able to update the tank truck we had. The new vehicle is a surplus Army truck. The tank, piping and pumps were shifted from the old chassis to the more modern, larger one by the men in the department. Over two hundred manhours went into the changeover of this piece of equipment. It carries 3000 gallons of water and has an automatic dump system for relaying to other trucks at big fires where water supply might be unavailable, as it is in most cases.

General maintenance was done to all vehicles in the department, such as minor repairs to same. New batteries were bought for some of the trucks. One of the ones that had failed was eleven years old.

Red Network calls in Weare for the year 1972 numbered about 530.

Calls were for: Fires, 37; Rescue Calls, 87, Police Calls, 235; Information calls, 60; Power failure 6; Services, 15; Civil Defense, 4; Lost dogs, 4; Forest Fire Warden, 7; Messages delivered, 9; wrong numbers, 25; false alarms, 29; and other numerous calls.

Another new phone was installed in Chief Welch's home at no cost to the town and is covered when Mrs. Wheldon has time off. Also, one was put in at Brownie's Service Station for back-up during the day.

It is also very important to call in an emergency this number, which is 2333, for fire or rescue. State your name, the name of the road, the former owner of the property and the nature of the emergency. The calls will always be answered unless there is a mechanical failure. We now have a new Police number - 2323 - which was added last October, and will be answered by the central dispatcher or wives of policemen who have blue phones in their homes. This seems to be working out very well.

Rescue Squad members logged over nine hundred hours in rescue calls during the past year. New laws and regulations governing Rescue Squads and ambulances set up by the Federal Government and the State were in effect as of September 1, 1972. The agency has to be licensed, the vehicle has to be licensed and all members belonging to same. The rules are that two licensed attendants have to accompany the vehicle on emergency runs. All have taken revised First Aid classes. There are seventeen men who are licensed operators. This licensing

has to be renewed every September 1 and First Aid refresher courses every three years.

Brush and grass fires were at a low number due to a wet season. Several drills were held in monthly training. Fire training courses by the State Board of Education — training to be done in our town by State Instructors — are offered at no cost to the town. Application has been applied for same. These classes are to be instituted this Spring and Summer of 1973.

The Ladies Auxiliary to the Fire Department held their Strawberry Festival and Christmas Party as well as provided refreshments at the big fires for the men. Also, the Fire Department and Auxiliary ran a successful cabaret dance.

For those of you who haven't heard, the Fire Wards, with the approval of the Selectmen, decided not to sell the old No. 4 tanker at this time. We put it in service up at the Lake View Cottage Area and have six men in that area ready to go and operate same. This has been realized a few times and works out very well. The people in the area have cleared a plot of land and built a nice looking station with heater in same, and the truck is now housed in the new fire house. Many thanks to all who spearheaded this fine addition to the Town of Weare as a whole which, if accepted by petition, will be deeded to the Town on Town Meeting day.

Many thanks to Weare Firemen and all who shoveled snow off the gym roof when trusses collapsed because of weight. This could have been a disaster of untold injuries and fatalities that would have been remembered for many years to come. Thank the Lord no injuries to life or limb took place.

As a reminder, it is unlawful to burn without a permit from the Forest Fire Warden when the ground is not covered by snow. Practice fire prevention everywhere all year round. Don't leave children or your elders alone if in need of care. Keep matches away from children, practice fire safety, keep the Town of Weare fire conscious. Thanks to the citizens of Weare for all the assistance given the Weare Volunteer Fire Department in 1972.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

In New Hampshire, forest fire control is a cooperative State-town program. The Town Forest Fire Warden, appointed by the Director, Division of Resources Development upon recommendation of the Selectmen and the State's District Forest Fire Chief is responsible for fire suppression and other related duties. The State shares equally with the town in the cost of most forest fires, except illegal and careless fires, which are charged to the responsible party. The State further provides fire detection services, prevention programs, fire training for town wardens and crews, and back up equipment for fire suppression.

By authority of the State, the Town Forest Fire Warden controls all outside burning in his town except backyard cooking fires. Any person wishing to kindle a fire when the ground is not covered with snow must obtain a fire permit, free of cost, from the Town Forest Fire Warden. No permits will be issued for fires between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. unless it is raining, except for commercial purposes.

Please be careful when using fire, remember it can be an extremely useful tool when under control but once allowed to run wild it can become a disastrous and devastating force. Only you can prevent a forest fire.

REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION FOR THE YEAR 1972

1. The Town Meeting in March 1972, without dissenting vote, accepted the ordinance prepared and presented by the Conservation Commission for control and regulation of excavation and removal of gravel, etc. of more than 5000 cubic yards in any twelve month period. Recognized as a model ordinance, it provides a means of the Town protecting its own interests and those of its residents. The Selectmen are authorized to enforce the provisions of this ordinance.

2. Upon recommendation by the Conservation Commission, the Town Meeting in March 1972, without dissenting vote, appropriated \$1625 contingent upon receipt of a grant of matching funds by the Ford Foundation to the Conservation Commission, for a professional engineering and scientific study of the source, cause, and extent of sewage pollution in the center area involving the elementary and high schools, with recommendations for correction of the problem. Following this, with authorization by the Selectmen, the Conservation Commission conducted arrangements with the Ford Foundation and the Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission. The final contract for the engineering study by Anderson-Nichols & Company, Inc., approved by the Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission, was signed by the Selectmen September 9, 1972. The total cost of this engineering project was set at \$4000 of which the Town would pay \$1625 and the Ford Foundation \$2375 (59%). The complete and final engineering report, as approved by the Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission should be consulted as to further action by the Town regarding the sewage pollution problem and the possibility of building a new high school adjoining the elementary school.

3. Supplementing state law which prohibits waste dumping from out of state in New Hampshire, the Conservation Commission recommends an ordinance regarding dumping of waste in Weare from any New Hampshire city or town other than Weare.

4. In March 1971 the Town Meeting voted \$750 for the Conservation Commission for expenses and to establish a Conservation fund to accumulate from year to year. No request for additional appropriation was made in March 1972. There has been no charge to the Town for the services and administrative expenses of the Conservation Commission.

Subject to approval by the Selectmen, the Conservation Commission may receive gifts of money for its Conservation Fund or gifts or bequests of land for conservation purposes.

5. The Conservation Commission published and distributed separately a leaflet explaining aims, purposes and pending activities and interests of the Commission.

THE WEARE COMMUNITY NURSING SERVICE

The Weare Community Nursing Service was organized April 10, 1972 consisting of a community nurse, Mrs. Evelyn Reade and a Board of Directors. Members of the board are: Mr. Robert McLeod, chairman; Mrs. Margaret Wood, secretary-treasurer; Mr. James Craig, Dr. Frederick Vintinner, Mrs. Marion Sullivan.

Mrs. Marion Howard, State Public Health Nurse, worked with us in an advisory capacity organizing the nursing service. From March through December Mrs. Reade has made 138 visits, approximate mileage 1,271. These visits consisted of: Maternal and Child Health, Nursing Care, Blood Pressures, Injections, Nursing Treatments, Transportation to the Rehabilitation Center and to the Veterans Administration Hospital in Manchester, and aiding persons applying for financial assistance.

Mrs. Reade is paid \$125.00 a month plus mileage (10 cents a mile).

You are hereby notified to meet at the Weare School Gymnasium in said District on the 1st day of March 1973 at 7:30 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

1. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.

2. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, of Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

3. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

4. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the District, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or United States.

5. To see if the District will vote to appropriate a sum of money for constructing and originally equipping and furnishing an addition to the Weare Central School, and to determine whether such appropriation shall be raised by borrowing or otherwise.

6. To see if the District will vote to appropriate a sum of money for the purchase of portable classrooms and to determine whether such appropriation shall be raised by borrowing or otherwise.

7. To see if the District will vote to authorize the moderator to appoint a Building Committee composed of the School Board, one selectman, one member each of the Planning and Budget Boards, and three other Citizens, for the purpose of studying our future school construction needs and produce as a result a complete detailed plan of action to meet these requirements. This committee to be authorized by the District to engage the services of an architect to assist them in making a study and evaluation, and to determine the estimated date of need and cost of such construction. The resulting plan to be presented to the Citizens of the town for their approval at a special School District meeting to be called by the School Board, or at the next annual meeting.

8. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$1,200 for developing a school building program, such appropriation to be available to the School Board and Building Committee.

1. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.
2. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
3. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
4. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the District, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or United States.
5. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate in addition to the assessment which was voted as the 1971-72 appropriation for the support of schools, a sum of Thirteen Thousand Dollars (\$13,000) to meet the school board's budget and make a total appropriation for 1971-72 of Three Hundred Thirty-four Thousand, One hundred Thirty-four Dollars and Seventy-two Cents (\$334,134.72) this special appropriation of Thirteen Thousand Dollars (\$13,000) to be made available to the school district prior to July 1, 1972.
6. To see if the district will vote to authorize the moderator to confirm the appointment of the existing committee: the following: Peter Bechtel, Joseph Brennan, Gordon Brown, James Craig, John Downes, Roger Griswold, Joseph Lanctot, Eldon Townes, Gordon Traver to serve on a committee to work with the school board for the purpose of studying our overall school requirements and producing as a result, a complete detailed plan of action to meet these requirements. The resulting plan to be presented to the citizens of the Town for their approval at the next annual school district meeting, or if deemed necessary by the committee at a special school district meeting to be called by the board or at a recessed meeting of the regular March 1972 meeting.
7. That the Weare School Board shall be composed of a membership of five (5) members.

And, upon acceptance of the aforementioned Article by the registered voters of the Town of Weare at the Annual School District Meeting, the following procedures shall be followed to arrive at a School Board Membership of five (5) members; in accordance with pars. 197:15, 196:18, and 343:3 RSA.

a. The candidate for the Weare School Board with the largest number of votes in the 1972 School District Election shall be elected for a three year term as a member of the Weare School Board. (Thereby, the Weare School Board will have an interim membership of seven (7) members during the period from the 1972 School District Meeting through to the 1973 School District Meeting.)

b. The candidate for the Weare School Board with the largest number of votes in the 1973 School District Election shall be elected for a 3 year term. (Thereby, the Weare School Board will have the requisite membership of five (5) members for the 1973 School District Election).

c. There shall be three (3) declared school board vacancies for the 1974 School District Election to replace those School Board members whose terms expire then. These vacancies shall consist of one term each of one, two and three years.

d. For 1975, and for all subsequent years, elections shall be held to elect one or two School Board Members for 3 year terms to replace those School Board members whose terms expire that year. (Inserted by Petition)

8. To see if the district will appropriate a sum of money either for constructing and originally equipping and furnishing an addition to the Weare Central School or for constructing and originally equipping and furnishing a new high school, and to determine whether such appropriation shall be raised by borrowing or otherwise, and to take any other action relating thereto.

9. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory and contractual obligations of the District, and to authorize the application of such sums as are estimated to be received from the State Foundation Aid together with other income, the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town.

10. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

It was moved by John Downes and supported by Elizabeth Straw that the district raise and appropriate in addition to the assessment which was voted as the 1971-72 appropriation for the support of schools, a sum of Thirteen Thousand Dollars to meet the school board's budget and make a total appropriation for 1971-72 of Three Hundred Thirty-four Thousand, One Hundred Thirty-four Dollars and Seventy-two cents, this special appropriation of Thirteen Thousand Dollars to be made available to the school district prior to July 1, 1972. After much discussion, the motion carried.

ARTICLE 6. It was moved by Raymond Rogers and duly seconded by Rodman Wilson to authorize the moderator to confirm the appointment of the existing committee: the following — Peter Bechtel, Joseph Brennan, Gordon Brown, James Craig, John Downes, Roger Griswold, Joseph Lanctot, Eldon Townes, Gordon Traver to serve on a committee to work with the school board for the purpose of studying our over-all school requirements and producing as a result, a complete detailed plan of action to meet these requirements. The resulting plan to be presented to the citizens of the Town for their approval at the next annual school district meeting or, if deemed necessary by the committee at a special school district meeting to be called by the board or at a re-

cessed meeting of the regular March 1972 meeting. Vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 7. It was moved by Robert Hyman and seconded by Ruth Jones that RSA references be corrected to read 197:15 and 197:18 and that 343:3 be deleted. Motion carried.

It was moved by Raymond Rogers and seconded by Gordon Traver that the Weare School Board shall be composed of a membership of five members and election procedures be carried out in the four steps as outlined in the School Warrant. Vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 8. It was moved by Robert Hyman and seconded by Neal Kurk to dismiss this article. After much discussion motion carried.

ARTICLE 9. It was moved by James Craig and duly seconded that the school budget be read on a line-item basis. After much discussion, the motion carried. Roger Griswold read the items and the School Board and James Craig, representing the Finance Committee, answered questions. It was moved by John Downes and duly seconded that the District raise and appropriate \$383,354.03 for the support of schools, for the payment of school district officials and agents and for the payment of statutory and contractual obligations of the District, and to authorize the application of such sums as are estimated to be received from the State Foundation Aid together with other income, the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town. An amendment was offered by Neal Kurk and duly seconded that the appropriation be reduced by \$13,000. Amendment was defeated. Mr. Downes' motion proceeded and the motion carried.

ARTICLE 10. It was moved by Robert Hyman and seconded by Neal Kurk that the School Board shall be directed to list and publish in the annual Town Report, and so explain at the annual meeting, the budget in line-item form and that the previous years' budget shall likewise be shown. This to start with the 1973 Town Report and all years after that. Motion carried.

There being no further business to transact, it was moved by Ruth Jones and seconded by Joseph Lanctot that the meeting be adjourned. Motion carried.

In order that the accounts and records for the fiscal year 1972-1973 be properly audited, the following must be submitted to the auditors:

1. A copy of all contracts including teachers and any other services contracted.
2. A copy of the approved budget.
3. Itemized invoices must accompany manifests.
4. Proof of delivery for material received, such as signed invoice or signed delivery receipt.
5. List of all encumbered funds, if any, as of June 30, 1973.
6. A copy of ALL transmittal letters for money received from State or Federal sources.

The following discrepancies were noted in the records for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1972.

1. Entry in Treasurer's Records for check number 1113 incorrect.
2. Entry in Treasurer's Records for check number 1436 incorrect.
3. Entry in Treasurer's Records for check number 1455B incorrect.
4. Entry in Treasurer's Records for check number 2160 incorrect.
5. Bank error of \$.07 on check number 2614.
6. Payroll manifest number 11 shows an incorrect total.
7. Payroll manifest dated June 22, 1972, signed by only three members of the School Board.
8. Check number 1531 used twice.
9. The total school lunch reimbursements from State and Federal sources have not been transferred into the school lunch account.
10. Cash discounts not taken on invoices from Burnham Bros., Central Paper Products, Concord Lumber, Hampshire Music (15%), Henderson Associates, Jones Typewriter and Westinghouse Supply Co.

We also recommend that:

1. A list of outstanding checks as of June 30 be submitted to the auditors.
2. The bank statement be reconciled as of June 30.
3. The School Board does not honor for payment any manifest received in a condition similar to one dated September 26, 1971.

The above does not include any comments on the school lunch records because we still do not have sufficient information to complete the audit of these accounts.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Weare

I herewith submit my eleventh and final annual report relative to the Weare Schools:

ENROLLMENT

The total enrollment in the Weare Schools is 469, distributed by grades as follows: (1971-72 figures are shown for comparison)

A full assessment of the prevailing educational advantages and shortcomings of the Weare Schools must be undertaken. The results, fully explained and understood by the entire community, will assist in determining the Weare educational plan of the immediate and distant future.

The citizens of Weare need to determine a solution to housing the evergrowing school population which will entail a building program. The decision can affect the educational welfare of the boys and girls of Weare for a generation or two and the taxpayers for a lifetime. With an unbiased and honest appraisal, Weare will resolve the problem and provide each boy and girl with an educational opportunity that will fully prepare him for his particular pursuits.

THE CHALLENGES AHEAD

The challenges in the immediate future are the full utilization of present facilities and construction of new facilities and the selection, retention and development of a staff which is not only capable but also dedicated to the service of the educational needs of the boys and girls of Weare.

The New Hampshire State Board of Education has developed a

program of Minimum Standards to be applied to all public elementary schools in New Hampshire with September 1, 1972 as the effective date for local schools to begin implementation of "Minimum Standards and Recommendations for New Hampshire Elementary Schools for School Approval, K – 8."

The purpose of Minimum Standards is to provide for planning, organization and establishment of a minimum standards program for public elementary education to (1) improve the quality of learning and teaching in New Hampshire, and (2) to see that each child has an equal opportunity for learning.

The goals of the State Board of Education Minimum Standards Project are to require:

1. Public elementary schools to develop a written statement of philosophy.
2. School to develop organizational patterns that best meet the needs of all children.
3. Sound administration and supervision in the elementary school.
4. A broad well-balanced elementary school curriculum.
5. Well-qualified and sufficient teaching personnel to meet adequately the needs of all children.
6. Sound in-service education programs for all teachers.
7. Good library facilities and services in all public elementary schools.
8. Good guidance and counseling services in all public elementary schools.
9. Functional modern elementary school facilities.

John J. Economopoulos, Consultant, State Department of Education Elementary School Services, states that elementary school self-evaluation is a design for the improvement of education. It is an opportunity to reveal and identify in a more objective manner the unique strengths and existing weaknesses of the elementary school program. It is a basis for (1) maintaining that which is good, (2) terminating that which is poor, (3) modifying that which can be improved, and (4) adding that which is needed. It is an effort to inform the community, the staff, and the school board about the quality of education being offered and supported in the local elementary schools. Also, it is an opportunity to make a thorough and unhurried analysis of the entire school program.

The local school philosophy should be developed cooperatively with the staff and community. It should have the formal approval and support of the local school board. This philosophy should serve as a guide to those interested in self-evaluation or comprehensive evaluation from an outside source. It should be continually studied, analyzed and improved.

The New Hampshire State Board of Education at its June 16, 1971 meeting approved as official policy the state-wide plan for staff development as recommended by the Professional Standards Board. Effective July 1, 1975, all Supervisory Unions and/or school districts are to have developed, in accordance with the adopted policy, three-year staff development plans. Supervisory Unions or school districts are expected to submit to the Office of Teacher Education and Professional Standards by July 1, 1973, a report of their progress in the creation of their continuing education programs.

Supervisory Unions or school districts are urged to utilize the resources available to them through the New Hampshire State Department of Education to provide assistance in the formation and ongoing evaluation of local staff development plans.

The Guidelines for Staff Development in New Hampshire as adopted by the State Board of Education assume that the professional development of each educator is a life-long process and is an inherent ingredient of his role as an agent for improving the quality of life in society.

The Staff Development Guidelines are based also on the assumption that continuing education is multifaceted and offers a wide variety of options for professional development. In addition, the policy centers on the notion that the most meaningful in-service education emanates from the needs as perceived and developed by educators, students, and the community in a cooperative, supportive fashion rather than generalized state-wide requirements.

The Staff Development Guidelines are process oriented, and as such, are open to change and modification based upon experience people have in development and implementation of programs.

In conclusion, the State Board of Education through the Staff Development Program is attempting to provide an atmosphere in which the function of continual professional growth of New Hampshire's educators is given a central role in the improvement of education in the State.

The Weare School District is actively engaged in a program designed to meet the State of New Hampshire Elementary School Standards and in the state directed program of Staff Development.

I wish to extend my sincere appreciation for the support and cooperation extended to me by the principal, teachers, pupils, school board and citizens of Weare as well as the loyal support of the Supervisory Union No. 19 office personnel: Howard Wagner, Assistant Superintendent of Schools; Wayne Evans, Business Administrator; and Mrs. Ruth Henk, Mrs. Harold Smith, Mrs. C.W. Schricker and Mrs. James Austin of the office staff.

As I retire in June 1973, I will remember forever the courteous, dignified and cooperative manner in which I have consistently been received in Weare, Bow, Dunbarton, Goffstown and New Boston during the last eleven years as your Superintendent of Schools.

T.B. skin tests were given to 33 members of the school staff by Miss Constance Martin, R.N.

Films on the dangers of smoking were supplied by the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association and shown to fifth and sixth grade children, and incorporated into classroom discussion and a question and answer period.

Mrs. Burton, a dental hygienist from the State Dental Bureau showed film-strips and discussed the importance of Dental hygiene to all children in the first through fourth grades. This was followed up in some of the classrooms by further discussion and distribution of materials and toothbrushes.

In November, all high school boys and girls were invited to talk and a movie on venereal diseases conducted by Mrs. Marie Ericson who is with the Bureau of Communicable Disease at the State Health Department. The program was very well attended.

The Mother-Daughter program dealing with the importance of early detection of cancer in women was held this year during school hours. Some mothers attended along with Junior and Senior high school girls and Doctor Brown was present to answer questions. In spite of personal invitations and advertising, we do not get the response to this program that it deserves.

This year we included, with their parents' permission, all fifth grade girls in our menstrual hygiene program along with girls in sixth grade. The program included a movie, instruction, and a question and answer period with distribution of appropriate literature.

All grammar school teachers were invited to attend the showing of a movie describing some of the early signs of disease likely to be noticed in the classroom. All the teachers seemed quite enthusiastic about the film and suggested a re-showing in the fall to members of the PTA.

A First-Aid course in Goffstown was made available to members of the Weare School staff and was attended by a few teachers who subsequently received their Standard and Advanced First Aid Certificates.

A pre-school vision and hearing screening program was incorporated with pre-school registration in March. This program is designed to detect hearing and vision defects in young children, and especially to detect amblyopia (lazy eye) at a time when treatment can be most effective. Several PTA members volunteered and were trained to screen children in the four through six year age group for vision and hearing defects. Fifty-six children were thus screened. One child failed the hearing screening and three children failed the vision screening. All have subsequently received appropriate follow-up care.

We greatly appreciate the cooperation of our Principal, Mr. Gordon Traver, the School Board, and the Superintendents office. They have not only recognized the needs of an adequate health department, but also have supported the requests for needed equipment, and encouraged all efforts to institute the best possible school health program.
