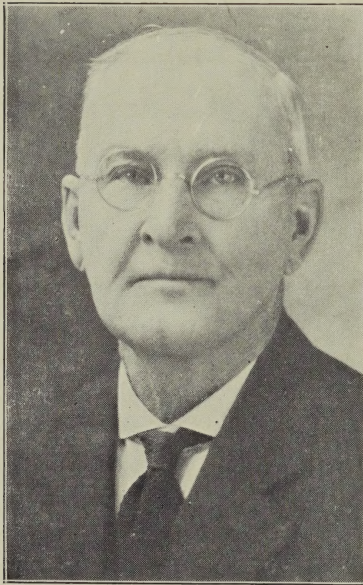

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING, 1939

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L. S.]

To the inhabitants of the Town of Wolfeboro qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Brewster Memorial Hall in said Town on the second Tuesday of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Town Clerk, two Auditors, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year, one Selectman for three years, one Library Trustee and one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, Town Constable, and one Water Commissioner for three years.

ARTICLE 2. To elect one or more Highway Agents, or instruct the Selectmen to appoint one Highway Agent.

ARTICLE 3. To choose all other Town Officers and Agents.

ARTICLE 4. To hear the report of the Committee appointed to select a location for a park and take action regarding same.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to allow professional baseball and basketball games to be played in the afternoon or evening on the Lord's Day.

ARTICLE 6. To see what action the Town will take regarding the management of its sewage system and any other matters pertaining to the same.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell any property taken by tax title or otherwise.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town wishes to continue the Office of Superintendent of Water Works and if so to see at what salary.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to lay out zone one and zone two and adopt zoning regulations as per Chapter 42 of the Public Laws.

Zone one, to be a business district and described as follows: Starting at the corner of Main and Center Streets and extending in a northerly direction to Libby Street, taking in all property to the shores of Lake Winnepesaukee in this area, thence from No. Main and Libby Streets to the corner of Libby and Mill Streets, thence following an air line to Factory Street, and Center Street meaning along the shore of Back Bay and what formerly was Back Bay, thence to the corner of So. Main and Center Streets.

Zone two, Residential District, both sides of South Main from So. Main and Center Streets to the Brewster Farm and all property extending to Lake Winnepesaukee in a westerly direction and from Libby Street to Forest Road on No. Main Street and all property to Lake Winnepesaukee in a westerly direction.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will approve and adopt the recommendations of the Budget Committee and raise and appropriate the various sums contained in their report for the purposes specified, which include the following special appropriations:

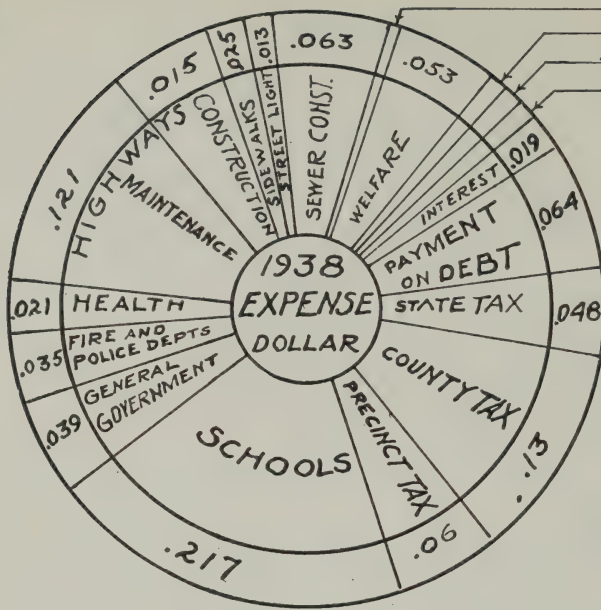

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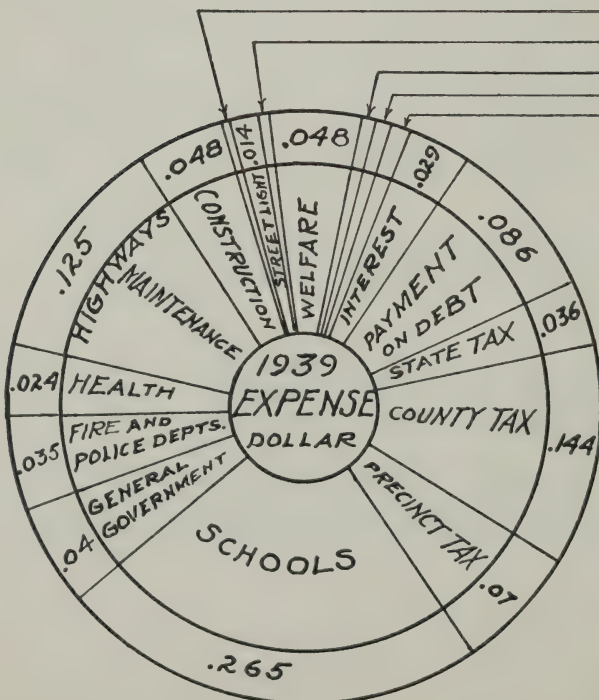

WHERE THE TOWN DOLLAR WENT IN 1938



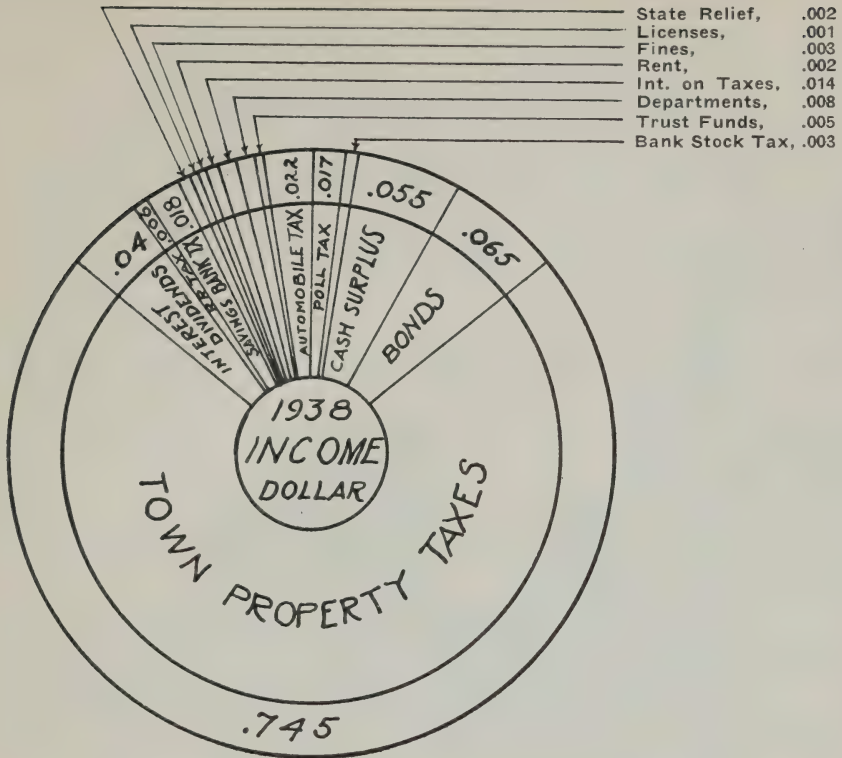

WHERE THE 1939 TOWN DOLLAR WILL GO

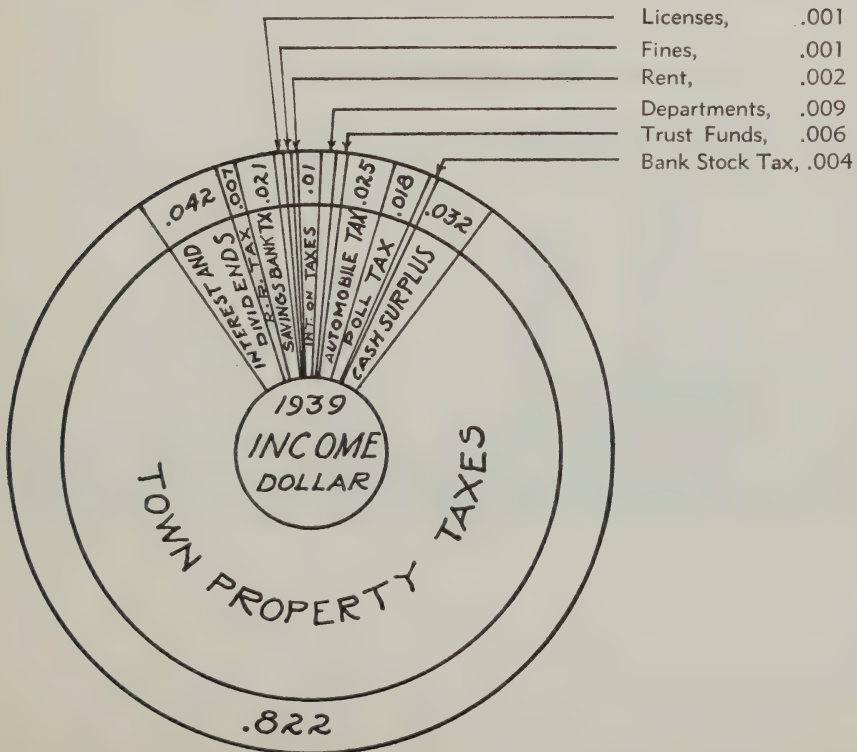

WHERE THE 1938 DOLLAR CAME FROM

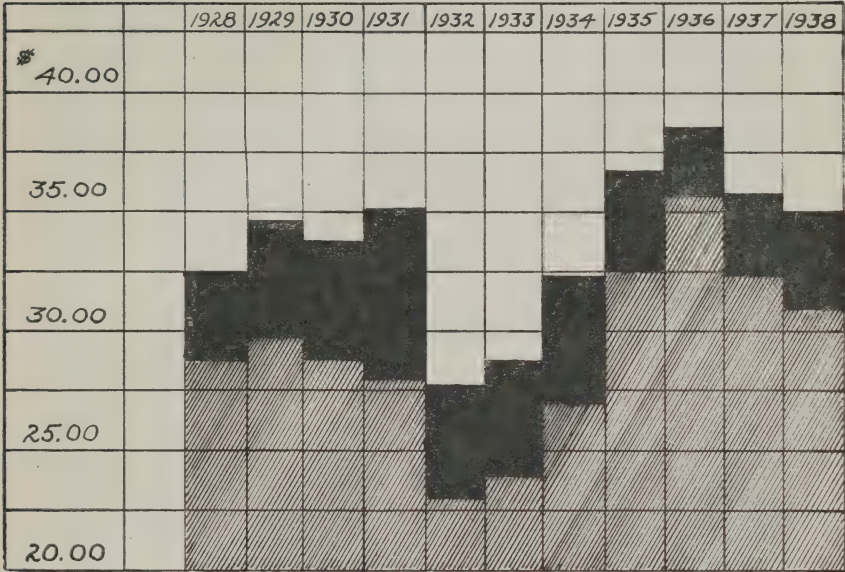


WHERE THE 1939 DOLLAR WILL COME FROM

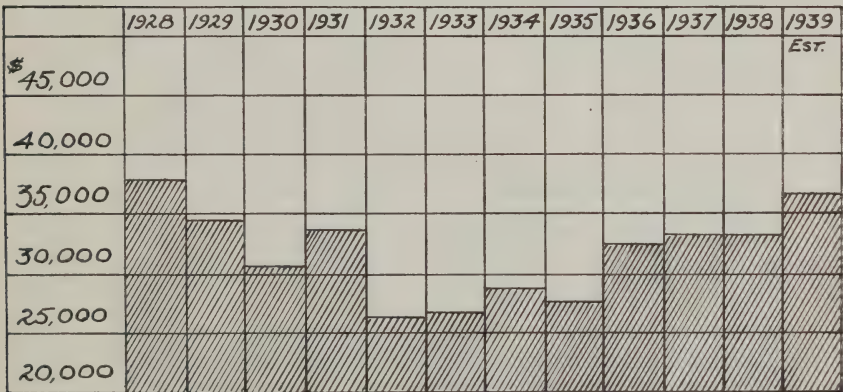


WOLFEBORO TAX RATE PER \$1,000

REPORT OF BUDGET COMMITTEE

To the Legal Voters of the Town of Wolfeboro :

Your budget committee has the honor to submit the following report and the budget for the Town of Wolfeboro, Wolfeboro Fire Precinct, Wolfeboro School District and the Wolfeboro Water Department for the fiscal year ending January 31, 1940.

Public Hearings

The budget committee held two public hearings, notices of which were duly advertised in the Granite State News.

Town Debt

Owing to the sewer bonds of \$60,500.00 which were issued in January, 1939, the Town debt was increased from \$77,374.00 to \$137,874.00 of which \$12,222.00 will be paid this year. The sewer bonds were sold for \$100.59 per one hundred dollars at a rate of $2\frac{1}{4}\%$.

There will be no payments due on the principal of these bonds until January, 1944. The retirement payments will be \$3,000.00 January 1, 1944-1947, \$4,000.00 January 1, 1948-1958 and \$4,500.00 January 1, 1959. The reason for the deferred payment for five years is to keep our debt payments on as even a basis as possible. In 1939 we must pay \$5,222.57 on the principal of the Highway Dept. notes. In 1940, our payment will be \$1,151.29 which will retire them. We have four more years in which we must pay \$2,000.00 annually on the sewer notes issued last year. Therefore in 1944 unless new notes or bonds are issued our payments on principal of debt will be \$7,222.00 less than now. In 1944, we will commence payments on the sewer bonds. We, however, must pay \$1,361.25 interest on the sewer bonds yearly during the non-amortization

period. We have eight more years at \$2,000.00 per year to pay the Wolfeboro National Bank on the Highway notes and we have sixteen more years to pay on our refunding bonds at \$3,000.00 per year.

School Budget

The budget committee has carefully examined the costs of operating our schools and have checked each item of expenditure for last year as well as the requests for the coming year.

The crowded condition of some of the rooms should be relieved by engaging another teacher. The budget committee feels, however, that since we cannot expect any assistance this year from the Brewster Estate which will necessitate our appropriating \$3,000.00 more than last year, and owing to other normal increases, it is wise to ask the School Board to continue their operation with the present staff for this year.

The budget calls for \$36,978.00 which is \$3,578.00 more than last year. There is still \$24,000.00 outstanding on the Carpenter School bonds which are being retired at the rate of \$4,000.00 per year. This year the interest will be \$935.00 making a total of \$4,935.00 which is not for actual operation of the schools.

The budget committee recommends an appropriation of \$36,978.00 to the School Board for all school purposes.

Water Department

The Water Commissioners are to be congratulated on the fine showing they made in 1938. The budget called for collections of \$13,300.00. The actual collections, however, were \$16,474.37 which enabled the Department to repay the loan of \$3,500.00 which was borrowed from the Town last year. It became necessary for the Commission to exceed the budget as approved at the 1938 Town meeting in the amount of

\$1,413.51. This overdraft was principally caused by the necessity of laying new water intakes along Main Street in advance of the new road construction. The Commissioners with their extra burden closed the year with no outstanding bills and with a cash surplus of \$2,076.06.

If the Budget as set up for 1939 can be maintained, there will be a balance on January 31, 1940, of \$3,680.00 which will mean that it will then be possible to eliminate the hydrant tax from the Precinct, thus saving approximately 60 cents per thousand on the tax rate.

Precinct

As usual the Precinct Commissioners have operated their department within their budget. It becomes necessary for them to ask for \$500.00 more this year than last as the Bell Shop notes call for \$1,500.00 retirement this year instead of \$1,000.00 which was necessary last year. At a special Precinct meeting held in 1938 it was voted to raise and appropriate \$7,500.00 for improvements to the so-called Bell Shop. Serial notes were issued to be retired \$1,500.00 in 1939 and \$1,000.00 per year thereafter for six years. The Clark Shop notes on which we now pay \$1,000.00 per year will be retired in 1940.

Public Welfare

The marked increase in the town poor budget over the amount appropriated last year does not mean that the cost of poor relief has increased. It does mean that both the state and county have withdrawn their assistance, therefore the whole load is now on the town. The costs are divided as follows:

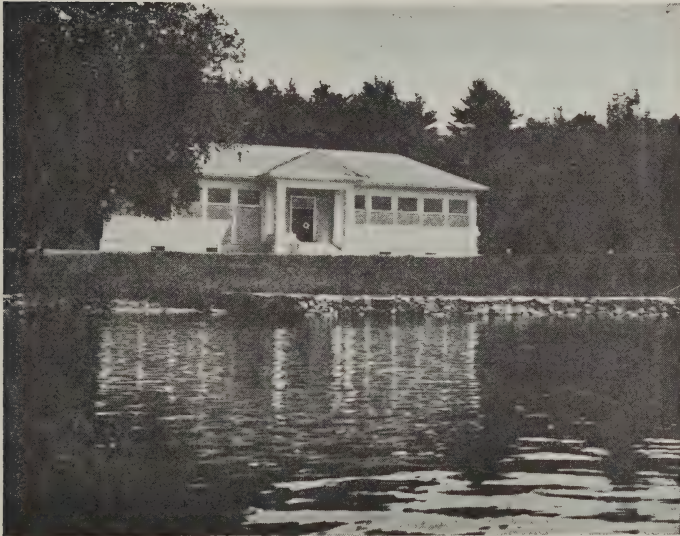

REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN

To the Board of Trustees of the Wolfeboro Town
Library:

Gentlemen:

The report of the librarian for the year ending January 30, 1939, is herewith presented.

The work of a library is more or less routine, and a report can vary but little from year to year. Beneath the surface, however, one may sense changes—a deepening of interest, a strengthening of the feeling that a public library is an essential part of the whole town system.

The improvements made on the room a year ago are proving satisfactory, and add much to the attractiveness of the library. This is the only place in town, which during the afternoons of the winter months, is open to anyone who would while an hour away.

With a patronage varying in age from that of the pre-school child to more than eighty years, there are varied demands. It is a far cry from the animal picture book to the latest discoveries in science. Many are interested in finding new ways with which to eke out the family income, for this reason new vocational books are needed. And always there is the demand for recreational reading. So the book fund must be stretched to meet these wants.

The State Book wagon in its monthly visits helps in supplying the demand for fiction and for books of current interest, although our monthly share is now limited to thirteen books. The Wolfeboro library ranks high among other libraries in the number of books borrowed from the State library.

*The circulation for the year has been 25,180 books of these classes: fiction, 15,069; non-fiction, 5,355; chil-

dren's books, 4,756. Four hundred and seven books have been added, of which 61† were contributed.

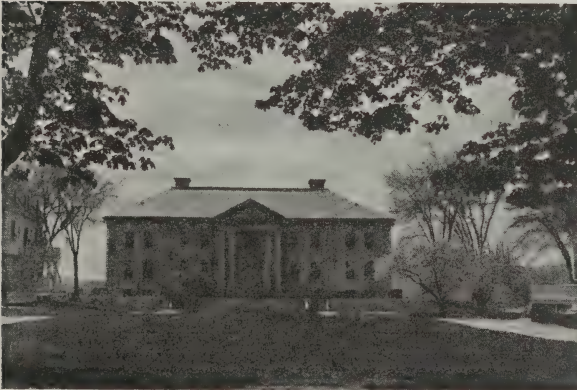

During the year several T. and A. clinics were held and ten children had their tonsils and adenoids removed, through the cooperation of Drs. Clow, Dye, Bovaird, and Luke.

Nine patients were taken to the Orthopedic Clinic at Laconia, and examined by Dr. Ezra Jones.

A Child Health Conference for babies and pre-school children, sponsored by the Division of Maternity, Infancy, and Child Hygiene Association, assisted by the local Chapter and its Volunteers, was held on June 6th and 7th at the Carpenter School. Inoculations for Diphtheria Immunization were given to 35 children. Drs. Clow, Bovaird, Dye and Luke examined 65 babies and pre-school children. They were weighed, measured, and given a complete physical examination. Number of defects found, 20; defects corrected, 8.

Two Home Hygiene classes were taught, one of adults, and one at Brewster Academy, where 13 girls received their certificates.

A class in First Aid, and one in Home Hygiene are now in session. In addition to these classes, it is interesting to note that Chief Mansfield has a large class in the Fire Department now taking the First Aid training.

On the Fourth of July an Emergency First Aid Station was opened and manned by qualified First Aiders, as long as needed. On that day, too, our nurse represented the Chapter by riding in the parade as mounted aide to the Marshal.

In August the Chapter held a successful Tag Day, under the chairmanship of Mr. Carroll D. Piper, very ably assisted by Mrs. George Thibodeau, Mrs. W. J. McDonald and Miss Marr. The actual "tagging" was done by a dozen of our bright young girls, who enthusiastically did a splendid job.

During July and August "Sandy" Beach was under the competent supervision of our veteran "Bob" Swift, who has had the highest aquatic training that the Red Cross can give. Life rings were also placed at the dock at Melvin Village.

During the summer, too, 15 patients selected by our nurse, received 125 hours of "occupational therapy" from Miss Nancy Martin, a trained worker in that field.

In September came the call for Hurricane Relief, and our Chapter more than doubled its quota.

In November we conducted our annual Roll-call, under the very efficient leadership of our Roll-call Chairman, Howard C. Avery. He and his workers deserve great credit for doing well a difficult job.

At Christmas we sponsored our usual celebration for our less fortunate children, and again we have to thank "Mother" Hart and her corps of boys and girls of the DeMolay and Rainbow for the happiness they brought these "kiddies."

June 1st Mrs. Hart resigned as our Secretary, and the rest of the year Mrs. W. J. McDonald has capably

filled that office. Mrs. Hart has served us long and faithfully, and her resignation was accepted only with the deepest regret.

Whatever success may have attended our work in the community has been made possible only by the loyal cooperation of our officers and committees, and the faithful support of our citizens. To all, we extend our thanks, and venture the hope that we may continue to merit this splendid cooperation.

HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

It is my pleasure and privilege to present a report of the Health Officer for the year 1938.

No cases of contagious disease, of a type requiring quarantine, were reported during the year. No epidemics occurred in the community. The general health level has, in our opinion, never been better. Deaths of babies and children are rare indeed, and deaths due to the usual "infants' and children's" diseases have not been encountered. It is obvious that the economic level on which the people of this town live cannot be substandard.

Dental treatment and prophylaxis is given by the public spirited dentists of the town, who, be it said, also raised most of the funds to equip the dental room at the Carpenter School. Eye examinations, and the provision of lenses for school children helps in the conservation of vision. Every effort, thanks to the school nurse and the public health nurse, is made to see that no child goes uncared for. The health of pupils, both in the public schools and at Brewster Academy is adequately surveyed each year. It is gratifying to note a decided improvement over conditions of even five years back.

All school children are vaccinated for smallpox, as the law very sensibly requires. States having no compulsory vaccination do have smallpox. One state not so far from New Hampshire reported nearly two hundred cases of smallpox last year, while Massachusetts had not a single instance. Immunization clinics are held to protect children against diphtheria, to the end that this disease will find no soil on which to grow. The disease, fortunately, has not been common in the last fifty years, in Wolfeboro, but those whose memory goes back can recall the awful effects of this one scourge in the eighties, before the installation of Beech Pond water. In thirty years scarcely ten cases have been reported.

The new birth, death and marriage forms, prescribed by the State Board of Health, have been installed and are in use by all officials and physicians.

For the first time New Hampshire, last year, donated antiserum for the treatment of pneumonia. It was used promptly and efficiently by the physicians and the hospital. The mortality of the disease, and the morbidity even more, was lowered everywhere in the state. The disease, last year, did not appear to be virulent, so one can but surmise the outcome without serum treatment; however, physicians are convinced of its real value, and they are prepared to use it whenever possible in future.

The Huggins Hospital has been approved for a Lying-In hospital, and so recommended to the State Board of Health. The technique which is used in the prenatal, parturient and postnatal phases of obstetrics is a source of pride to all who use its facilities. The standard of its nursing staff is high and results prove this in "better babies and better mothers."

**ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PARKS AND
PLAYGROUNDS COMMISSION**

Wolfeboro, N. H.

The Parks and Playgrounds Commission has rendered a real service to the Town of Wolfeboro by maintaining and supervising the bathing beach during the summer and the skating rinks during the winter. Due to unforeseen circumstances the ski slope project has not progressed as far as we had hoped. However, we were able to secure a ten-year lease on the Shorey pastures and have purchased the toboggan slide from the Abenaki Outing Club and intend to move it on the property and construct a suitable safe and speedy slide. The bathing beach was used to a great extent and under the supervision of Robinson Swift. Many children were taught to swim. Life saving and first aid classes were held regularly and much benefit was derived from the facilities which were available. There is need for considerable work at the beach; bushes must be cut, benches built, road repaired and the question of a bath house is still unsettled.

The ever increasing popularity of the skating rinks and the excellent condition of the ice, under the supervision of William Belanger, is a civic venture of which we may be justly proud. Many inquiries have been made by other towns and cities as to the expense

of construction and maintenance of our rinks. It has been stated by those who should know that we have the best ice of any rink in New Hampshire. A building has been purchased, moved to the rink, outfitted to meet our needs and is used as a dressing room for visiting hockey teams and has been opened several cold evenings for the comfort of those who may wish to warm themselves around the stove. The skating schedule has met with general approval and the co-operation of the general skaters and hockey players is greatly appreciated. The safety of the children has been our chief concern and we believe this has been accomplished by strict adherence to the schedule.

The question of selecting a site for the Edward Cate Park is still unsettled. Your commission has given this problem serious consideration and feels that further deliberation is necessary before any definite site should be selected.

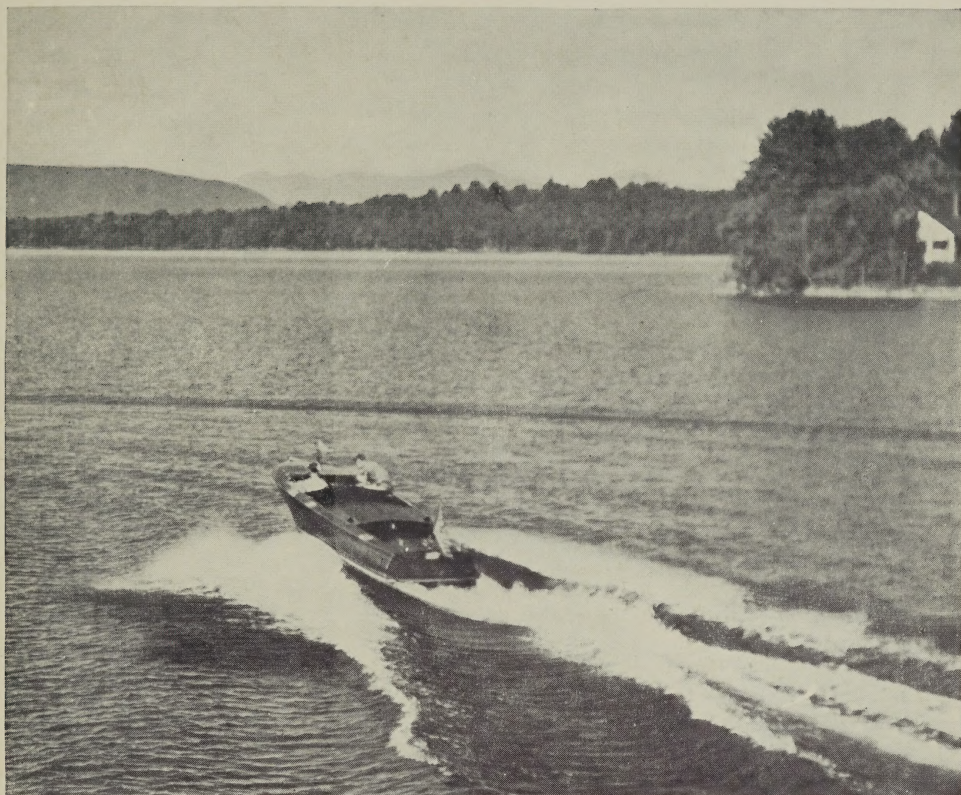
