THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Alexandria, in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at The Town House in said Alexandria on Tuesday, the 14th day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see how much money the town will raise for the maintenance of highways and bridges except snow work.
- 4. To see how much money the town will raise for plowing and sanding roads in winter.
- 5. To see if the town will accept Town Road Assistance and raise \$595.38 for the same.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to buy a dump truck the purchase price to be taken out of surplus.
- 7. To see if the town will raise \$400.00 for Blister Rust Control.

- 8. To see if the town will vote to raise \$57.00 for the Lakes Region Association for advertising the advantages and attractions of Alexandria.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell old tractor, plow, road machine, and other junk.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to buy one way blade plow for road grader and raise and appropriate money for same.
- 11. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to draw on surplus to balance any necessary deficiency in appropriations for the ensuing year.
- 12. To see if the town will go on record, either for or against increased State taxes, for the purpose of increasing or maintaining State services.
- 13. To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$200.00 for the care and upkeep of the cemeteries.
- 14. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of receipt of taxes.
- 15. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

Continued Teacher Shortage. One hesitates to repeat himself in these reports but it seems necessary as long as others refuse to accept the facts. The shortage of elementary teachers is as great as at any time in the past few years and will probably remain that way due to several causes: (1) Young people are not training for the elementary field of work although more have entered the colleges than for several years; (2) There will be a steady increase in the number of elementary pupils throughout the nation for several years with those under one year of age being generally the greatest single age group in Union No. 4; (3) There is a steady drain of the best qualified teachers from New Hampshire to the three New England states to the south of us and to the states beyond this area due to higher salaries, better professional opportunities, greater security through tenure laws and retirement provisions, and living conditions more attractive to our younger teachers.

Building Conditions. After the proposed painting of the two schools this summer the buildings will be in as good condition as can be expected with the possible exception of the toilet facilities at the Willow School and the heating of the latter school. The present stove is highly effective but unattractive in an otherwise pleasant room. Oil heaters of the Duo-Therm type are proving very satisfactory in Grafton and Danbury schools and lessen the work of the janitors considerably where wood fired heaters were used, and janitors certainly deserve a "bit of a break"! Alexandria people should take a bit of pride in their building program done — until this year — largely on their own pocketbook.

Tuition Costs. A new law passed by the last legislature now permits any school district to charge a tuition rate based upon total costs: "This current expense of operation shall include all costs except those made for capital outlay and debt obligations as determined annually by the state board of education." In other words to the costs of instruction may now be added operation expenses such as fuel, lights, janitor services etc. Bristol's tuition rates will be \$25.00 more next year making elementary rate \$105 and high school \$175. The elementary rate is about \$12 under the actual costs for 1948-49; the corresponding costs for pupils attending Alexandria schools is \$199 and for those attending Bristol including the transportation is \$140. In addition to this is the fact that in the last state aid formula pupils attending a rural school were figured at \$150 and those attending a graded school at \$175. No one dares say how it will be figured the next time!

With the expectation of building additional facilities in Bristol this coming school year and the additional costs of instruction and maintenance the high school tuition rate for 1951-52 will take a very material jump and will be kept close to actual costs as based on the previous year's statistics.

State Legislation. One of the marvels of the previous legislative session is the amount of state aid granted to Alexandria, a matter incidentally into which we have not dared to delve too deeply! There can be no guarantee that a comparable amount will be forthcoming year after year although in comparison with Danbury and Grafton the amount should be considerably more than received previous to this year. It is extremely unfortunate that those of us who are involved daily in educational planning including budget making can not figure more accurately the amount of aid, and what planning we do will be highly unsatisfactory and the plans equally so, being a hodge-podge of makeshift ideas and "shots in the dark" guessing.

Specifically the certainty of \$5000 aid in Bristol right at this moment would almost guarantee better educational opportunities on the high school level to pupils from Alexandria, and those from other neighboring towns. Lacking such guarantees we figure ahead "only darkly" with good hopes. In the long run educational opportunities for our children are commeasurate with costs; low per pupil costs mean low per pupil opportunities!

Uncertainties concerning the "Cooperative School Law", building aid, high school transportation and similar laws have kept us from giving these things too much serious thought and all are intimately tied up with school planning in this area but in the meantime we have the pupils and must make for them the best provisions we can.

It is doubtful if state support of education based on sound laws of financing will take place in New Hampshire until the people make their desires known in no uncertain terms. In our area the facts will speak for themselves but real efforts must be made to acquaint all political minded people in this whole area, and in the state for that matter, with the facts. Many efforts through various organizations are being made and all deserve the active support of this area in their honest endeavors. To maintain what we have requires state support on an increasing scale unless the property owner is willing to bear all the costs.


