

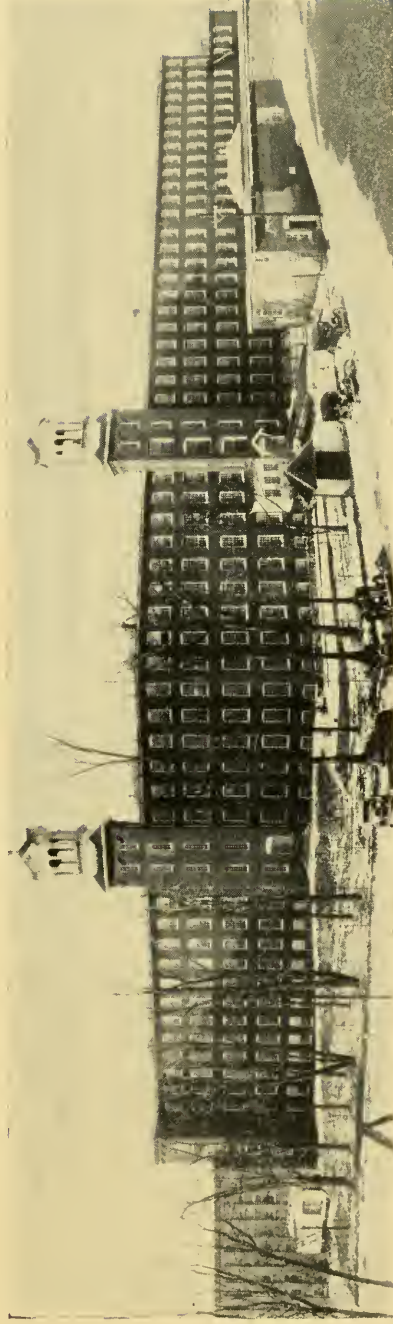

TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Allenstown in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

[L. S.]

You are hereby notified to meet at the Fire Station in said Allenstown on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To hear and act upon the report of the Town Budget Committee.

4. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes.

5. To see if the town will vote to give a two per cent discount on all taxes paid on or before July first.

6. To see if the town will vote to petition the state tax commission to have an audit made by the division of municipal accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

7. Whereas, a new road has been constructed with federal funds, and is open to public travel, through the Bear Brook Reservation and whereas due to this new road a certain section of a town road is no longer necessary for public travel;

To see if the town will vote to discontinue as a public highway a certain section of a town road in the Bear Brook Reservation described as follows; That part of the so-called Short Falls road beginning at Ela's corner, so-called, at the intersection with the Allenstown-Deerfield road and continuing northerly about 77½ rods which is a point near the intersection of said road with the road which leads directly to Route No. 28 and a road to Short Falls.

8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed the sum of Seven Hundred (\$700.00) Dollars for the removal of rubbish which will be placed on the side-walks of the streets every Saturday, and to give the Selectmen authority to put the job of removal up for bids, to make necessary contracts, and to supervise the removal of the same.

9. To see if the town will vote to give the Allentown, N. H. Police Chief one day off every week with pay.

10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred (\$300.00) Dollars for continuing the control of white pine blister rust in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation Department, thereby receiving the usual State aid.

11. (By Petition) To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Hundred (\$800.00) Dollars to finish the sidewalk on Granite Street as far as the late Eugene Lauzier residence.

12. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to purchase a new fire truck with a suitable pump for the Allentown Fire Department, and to see if the town in order to purchase the same will authorize the Selectmen to borrow on four serial notes a sum not to exceed Four Thousand (\$4,000.00) Dollars, said notes to be in the sum of One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars each and payable in one, two, three, and four years respectively from date of issue, said notes to be payable exclusively from funds to be raised by taxation.

13. (By Petition) To see if the town will vote to pay the men and trucks employed by it, at the same hourly rate as now paid by the State of New Hampshire.

14. (By Petition) To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars to reconstruct and oil Reserve Street.

15. (By Petition) To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred (\$300.00) Dollars to oil Letendre Avenue.

16.—(By Petition) To see what action the town will take regarding water for fire protection and domestic use on Cross, Reserve, Granite and Valley Streets, and to authorize the Selectmen to contact Pembroke

Water Works and appoint a committee to work with them if found necessary.

17. (By Petition) To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred (\$400.-00) Dollars for a sewer on Notre Dame Ave beginning at the corner of said street and Granite Street and extending to the home of Ulric J. Chevrette.

18. To hear the reports of auditors, agents, committees or officers heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.

19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

To the Citizens of Allenstown:

The 1941 fire season was the worst on record in the State of New Hampshire. More fires occurred, more area was burned over, greater damage was done to our woodlands, higher losses were sustained in other real property burned and the cost of suppressing fires was greater.

There will, perhaps, never be more ideal conditions for fire than existed in 1941. A scarcity of rain left the forests in a highly inflammable condition. The accompanying high winds spread fires with almost lightning rapidity through the parched forest lands. These conditions, coupled with human carelessness, made 1941 outstanding in the state's forest fire record.

As we approach the 1942 fire season, we wonder just what may be in store for us. The woodlands are in as critical condition as they were last year, if not more so. Blown down trees still clutter sizeable acreages of our woodland areas; the increased tempo in lumbering operations due to war demands are each day, adding to the fire hazard an ever increasing number of acres of slash land; and we face the coming fire season with greatly reduced personnel, due to the shifting of men from our small communities into the armed forces of the country and into defense industries. If, however, everyone will be careful if they will follow the rules and regulations laid down for the use of fire in and around woodlands, much of our difficulties will be eliminated—our fires kept few in number with a consequent saving of expense to town and State.

There are so many possibilities for trouble this year it will require the whole hearted and patriotic cooperation of everyone concerned if we are to avoid serious difficulties. Persons hostile to the best interests of our country and subnormal individuals affected by the excitement of the times may easily cause tremendous confusion and disruption of local activities by deliberately starting fires in our woodlands. Suspicious circumstances connected with every fire should be made known to the proper authorities. Wardens and Deputies are

being instructed this year to investigate all fires carefully. Parties at fault will be held strictly responsible. With our forces weakened, it becomes more necessary for everyone to comply with regulations which have been set up to govern the use of fire in our woodlands. These are briefly as follows:

1. Secure a permit from your local forest fire warden to burn brush or other debris in or near woodlands, or where fire may be communicated to such lands, once the snow has left the ground. Violations of this requirement makes the responsible party liable

- a. To a fine not to exceed \$500.00 or imprisonment of not more than one year or both.
- b. To the town for expenses incurred by the warden in attending or extinguishing such fire.
- c. For damage to abutting owners if fire runs upon abutters' property.

2. DON'T drop or throw from any vehicle while same is upon a public highway or private way and

DON'T drop, throw or otherwise deposit on or near woodlands any lighted match, cigar, cigarette, live ashes or any other substance liable to cause a fire.

Violation of these prohibitions penalizes whoever is found guilty with a fine of not more than \$25.00.

3. DON'T fail to promptly notify your local warden of any fires you see. The 1941 fire record for Allenstown is as follows:

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Allentown:

My eighth annual report includes enrollment and organization, increasing emphasis on health and nutrition, improvement of school grounds emergency protection of school children, and suggested economy.

The report of your enumeration officer for September 1941 shows that Allentown had enrolled in school 279 children under sixteen years of age. Of this number 45 were in the Allentown Grammar School, and 203 in St. John Baptist Parochial School, twenty-six were attending Pembroke Academy and other out-of-town schools. The Academy also enrolled thirteen pupils who were over sixteen years of age, making the total number from Allentown thirty-seven.

The small enrollment in the Grammar School has made possible the elimination of a part-time teacher. However, this change reduces by one and a half hours a week the actual time given to instruction of the first and second grades.

Mrs. Eleanor H. Bailey's withdrawal from school work last June has taken from your staff a primary teacher of outstanding ability and achievement.

During the summer Mr. James J. Sampson, who served with success as principal, was released to accept a similar position in Massachusetts.

Miss Janet Mitchell of Hooksett was elected to the primary position. Miss Mitchell was graduated in 1941 from the four-year elementary course at Plymouth Teachers College where she did practice teaching in both the primary and grammar grades.

The position of principal was filled by the election of Mr. Richard H. Erwin of Gilmanton. Mr. Erwin was graduated in 1930 from the three-year course at Keene Teachers College. He has also taken summer courses at Yale and New Hampshire Universities. Mr. Erwin taught for two years in the Junior High School of Hudson and for five years in Gilmanton.

Beginning in September 1940 the health program for school children and the full-time services of the school nurse, Miss Adonia A. Douillette, were extended to include both the public and private school pupils. Since this has added in all over four hundred children to the number previously examined by the school nurse, the task has been tremendous. A large percentage were unvaccinated. Even more were in need of dental care. Other uncorrected physical defects were numerous, including impaired eyesight and hearing. In some cases expert diagnosis of mental as well as physical handicaps was necessary.

The school nurse has received valuable cooperation from both the public and private school teachers and officials.

Through the loan of audiometer equipment, granted by the State Board of Education, thorough and scientific tests of hearing were made in the upper grades of both schools.

At dental clinics, conducted last May and June by Doctors Baldwin and Mayo respectively, twenty-nine pupils from the public school and 169 from the parochial school were treated. Among the children from both schools 168 received complete care and were awarded dental certificates.

Through the generous cooperation of parents and teachers and the extended services of the Surplus Marketing Association and other government agencies, hot lunches were served to the pupils until the close of the school year in June and were resumed this year in November. The menu for a typical day includes,

Tuna Fish Pie with Peas and Carrots

Biscuits

Baked Honey Rice Pudding

Milk

These meals are planned and served under the efficient direction of Mrs. Benware, the teacher of domestic science. You are also fortunate in retaining through the federal community service program the assistance of Mrs. Morency in the preparation of nutritious and appetizing lunches.

A public service is being rendered by everyone who in cooperation with the school nurse and teachers is seek-

ing to make adequate diet, physical well-being and health education available to every child in your community. For not only is health the basis of the individual's well-being but, as Disraeli remarked, it is the foundation of the people's powers as a nation.

Safety on the playgrounds has also received attention. The approach to your building and the elimination of accident have been improved by removing the broken and irregular surface of the two tar walks, replacing these with a single cement lane leading to the street. The cement court directly in front of the building is used in suitable weather as the assembling place of the entire school for flag salute and other exercises.

The exposed position of the building, the lack of sufficient exits, and the fact that there are large windows on all sides have made impracticable the use of the Grammar School for an air-raid shelter. This emergency has been met by generous residents who have granted the use of an exceptionally well equipped shelter in a private home. By well organized drills the children are now able to procure overshoes and outside wraps and to reach this shelter within five minutes after an alarm. Since the group is small, it is possible to retain all pupils under the personal supervision of their teachers.

Industrial changes are responsible for a reduction in the number of pupils attending high school. A gradual increase in the average cost of instruction per pupil may be anticipated. Hence, we estimate that the total expenditure for high school education will continue at the present sum or slightly less.

In your local grammar school the reduced enrollment had increased the cost per pupil from \$87.80 to \$110.51. The median cost per elementary school pupil for the state is \$84.61.

The individual cost of instruction and the extreme scarcity of qualified teachers, particularly in the field of practical arts, suggest for serious consideration the maintenance another year of a two-teacher school. At the same time instruction in domestic science and manual training might be continued on a part-time schedule and in combination with similar classes in a neighboring school. Thus a budget reduction of \$500 to \$1000 for the maintenance of elementary schools might be anticipated.

In conclusion the Superintendent wishes to commend the type of work being done by your principal and teachers. The reduction in numbers has made possible closer attention to the needs of the individual pupils. The results of this are apparent among those children who are slow in learning or are handicapped by language difficulties.

The cooperation of the school board, local defense council and other citizens is valued and appreciated by your teachers and superintendent.
