TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Andover, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Andover on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for highways and bridges.

4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the cemeteries.

5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the town library.

7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the town health department.

8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for lighting the streets. The East Andover Light & Power Co. will provide 47 60-watt lamps for \$634.50. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate towards paying for the cement road at the east end of the town.

10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for taking care of the poor.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the police department.

12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Old Home Day.

13. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to black-top the following newly graveled roads:

- (1) Beech Hill road, 2nd application.
- (2) Chase Hill road, 2nd application.
- (3) Dyer's Crossing road, 2nd application.
- (4) Taunton Hill from Schoolhouse corner to Charles Sheldon's.
- (5) Beech Hill from corner to Theodore Hall's.
- (6) Flaghole road from John LeClair place to Salisbury North Road.
- (7) East Andover village to Charles Hazen's.

14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$665.33 to be expended upon Class V roads in the same manner as last year. If the town will raise this amount the state will contribute \$2,661.33 to make a total of \$3,326.66.

15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400 for the eradication of white pine blister rust. If the town votes to raise this amount the state will contribute additional funds.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,665.13 to apply on the town debt.

17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of a new tractor and snowplow.

18. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

19. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute locally the blank inventories at the time they examine and appraise the property to be taxed.

20. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds.

21. To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act.

22. To transact any business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens:

The most outstanding accomplishment of the past year is, of course, the reorganization of the high school for its work in the new building. The mechanic arts course which has been added is most popular with the boys. I hope that we shall soon be able to add a course in domestic arts for the girls.

The high school has increased by about 17 during the current year. On the other hand, the numbers in the elementary schools are about 35 less than last year. This loss is mostly in the East Andover Grammar School and the Village Primary, and especially the Village Grammar School. The large amount of tardiness shown by last year's Attendance Table for East Andover seems to be growing worse rather than better during the current year.

New geographies have now been furnished in most of the schools and new arithmetics in some. I have not yet felt it wise to purchase all the maps that we need.

The balance from the money appropriated for water at East Andover was re-appropriated for repairs at East Andover. Extensive repairs have been made on the East Andover building. The Village School has been repainted and a small amount of work has been done elsewhere. At the Flaghole School, the valley where the shed roof and the roof of the main building join, discharges water just in front of the outside door. This seems to have rotted the sill both of the main building and the shed. A part of these sills should be replaced next year and some provision made for keeping the water away from them.

In the budget for the coming year the School Board is asking for \$1,573.17 less than last year. The changes are as follows: for the support of high schools, an increase of \$200.00; for the payment of statutory requirements, a decrease of \$550.17; estimated income, an increase of \$1,028.00 over last year; and, under special appropriations, a decrease of \$195.00. The budget for the elementary schools has not been changed.
