

You are hereby notified to meet at the hall in the Massabesic Lake Inn in said town on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

First. To bring in your ballots for:

Town clerk for the ensuing year,
One selectman for three years,
Tax collector for ensuing year,
Town treasurer for ensuing year,
Highway agent for ensuing year,
One library trustee for three years,
One cemetery trustee for three years,
One trust fund trustee for three years,
Three auditors for the ensuing year.

At 12:30 o'clock P. M. the meeting will be open for the following articles:

Second. To choose all other necessary town officers.

Third. To see if the town will vote to incur debt for temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.

Fourth. To hear the report of the budget committee and act thereon.

Fifth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$900.00 for town officers' salaries.

Sixth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 for town officers' expenses.

Seventh. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for election and registration.

Eighth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for expense of municipal court.

Ninth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$60.00 for rent of hall.

Tenth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for police department.

Eleventh. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,625.00 for maintenance of summer roads, \$400.00 for snow removal, \$100.00 for tarring Reed street and \$200.00 for bridges.

Twelfth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$953.00 for street lights.

Thirteenth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for library.

Fourteenth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$100.00 for forest fire department, \$25.00 to be used for new equipment.

Fifteenth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$15.00 for Health Department including vital statistics.

Sixteenth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for old age assistance.

Seventeenth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for Memorial Day.

Eighteenth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for town poor.

Ninetcenth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$100.00 for aid of soldiers' families.

Twentieth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$447.49 for Class V roads (town's share).

Twenty-first. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for interest on temporary loans.

Twenty-second. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,512.00 for the state tax of 1939.

Twenty-third. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,613.04 for county tax of 1939.

Twenty-fourth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$245.00 for hydrants.

Twenty-fifth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$22.75 for general expense of highway department.

Twenty-sixth. To see if the town will use the income of the H. B. Burnham fund for schools or library.

Twenty-seventh. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for repair of tractor.

The teaching staff of the Auburn Schools remain the

same as for the previous year.

Weekly instruction and supervision of music has now been introduced in the Auburn schools. Mr. Norwood Hinkle, Harvard A. B. and A. M., has charge of this new venture. Both he and Mrs. Hinkle are in charge of music teaching in the schools of the other towns of Union Number 10. The results which have been accomplished in music introduction by Mr. Hinkle seem certain to bear out the statement that pupils and teachers are deriving a great deal of benefit and enjoyment.

With the extension of the music course it was necessary to add books and as a result new music books have been

introduced in the Auburn Schools.

New arithmetic books have been purchased for some grades but more modern arithmetics should replace those

now being used in some cases.

The teachers have been furnished with language text-books and workbooks for each grade but such material should be placed in the hands of each pupil. The ability of a pupil to express himself clearly in both written and oral form is a fundamental aim of education. Less pupil and teach time will be lost and greater efficiency attained if the necessity of dictation on the part of the teacher and copying by the pupil is eliminated. The time devoted to such endeavor may well be spent in actual teaching or preparation in the respective cases.

It is most essential that the beginning pupil be taught to read correctly. In order to do this a modern and widely adopted system of reading should be installed in the primary grades during the next few years. Only by careful planning and guidance on the part of the teacher and a gradual introduction to reading can a pupil be taught correctly.

During the current year the form of report card has been changed and the new cards appear to have been met with approval. A more efficient system of office records has

been installed.

Each pupil in grades 2 through 8 has been given a standard mental test this year. Grade 1 pupils will be given a similar test in the near future. These test results serve a very useful purpose to the teacher in guiding the progress

of a pupil.

May I say in conclusion that I appreciate the co-operation of the school board, parents, teachers, and pupils during the past few months. It will continue to be my purpose to work for the best educational advantages possible for the Auburn youth.

STATE AUDIT

The highest tax rate was \$4.12 per hundred in the year 1929, and the lowest, \$2.88 in 1932. The rate was higher than the average rate for the State in every years except 1935.

Uncollected taxes were approximately \$5,000 more on January 31, 1938, than they were on January 31, 1929. Included in the uncollected taxes of \$7,647.66, on January 31, 1938, however, was a balance due from the Manchester

Water Works of \$2,829.30.

Schedules B, C, D and E, are comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures for the years 1937, 1936, 1935 and 1934. A net unexpended balance is indicated for the year 1937, while there appear to have been net overdrafts of appropriations in the years 1936, 1935 and 1934.

Due to the fact that in the years 1934 and 1935 a lump sum was appropriated for "Town Charges" and the revenue and credit items were not deducted in the process of making the tax rate, an analysis of "Town Charges" showing the different items of receipts and expenditures coming un-

der this heading, is included.

Selectmen and Treasurer: The vouchers drawn by the Selectmen were compared with supporting invoices and and payrolls and with the corresponding entries in the Receipts and Payments Book. Selectmen's Orders were compared with the Treasurer's checks and entries in the The Treasurer's Cash Book. The Treasurer's receipts were checked by source insofar as possible. The Treasurer's Cash Book balance as of January 18, 1939, amounting to \$2,536.85, was in agreement with the reconciled balance of this date. (Schedule F) Outstanding Selectmen's Orders on the same date (Orders for which no Treasurer's checks had been made out) were as follows:

Summarized Statements of the salary and expense accounts of the Selectmen for the fiscal year to date of audit will be found in Schedules J, K, and L.

It is recommended that the form of accounting sheets for "Class A" towns be used by the Selectmen in place of the form for "Class B" towns now in use.

All supporting bills should either be attached to the Vouchers or filed in numerical order with the Voucher number indicated on each bill. It is not necessary to have the bills receipted as the cancelled checks answer this pur-

pose.

The practice of having the Town Treasurer countersign the Selectmen's Orders and using them in place of separate checks which the Treasurer now draws, is recommended. The name of the bank where checks are payable would of course have to be stamped or printed on the Orders.

Tax Collector: The accounts of the Tax Collector for the tax levies of 1937 and 1938 were audited and the warrants balanced. (Schedule G.) Verification notices were sent to all property taxpayers whose names appeared on the delinquent lists for these years and to a number of the delinquent poll tax payers.

Town Clerk: The Motor Vehicle Permit and Dog License accounts of the Town Clerk were found to be correct. (Schedule H.)

Road Agents: It is recommended that all road agents' payrolls be turned over to the Selectmen as soon as signatures of employees are obtained thereon. If the road agents desire to retain copies, payrolls can be made up in duplicate.

It is also recommended that in cases where materials and supplies are included on payrolls, itemized bills for these

should be attached to payrolls.

Overseer of the Poor: The accounts of the overseer of the poor were examined and audited. Payments made by the Town Treasurer to the Overseer were listed and totalled, as were also all welfare payments made by the overseer. Receipted bills covering such payments were produced by him. (Schedule I.)

General: The practice of including numerous unexpended balances for maintenance appropriations as liabil-

ity items in the balance sheet each year should be discontinued. Such balances should lapse into the general funds of the town

Only the balance of the school appropriations, joint state and town highway construction balances, unpaid State or County taxes, and balances of uncompleted highway or other construction appropriations, should be included in the balance sheet as appropriation liabilities.

No irregularities or shortages were discovered as a re-

sult of our audit.

It is recommended that this report be included in your annual printed report.
