

#### **TOWN WARRANT**

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on property taxes paid on or before the first Saturday of July next.

4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for both fire companies.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to buy liability insurance on town labor and pay for same out of the highway department.

6. To see if the Town will vote to accept State construction or State aid on class 5 maintenance and raise money for same.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$58.00 to the Lake Region Association of New Hampshire for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town in co-operation with other towns in the Lake Region. (By Request).

8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.

9. To see how much money, if any, the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for White Pine Blister Rust Control. (By Request.)

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10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00, more or less, for Huggins Hospital. (By Request).

11. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$212.54 as Trustee under the will of P. P. Babcock and place the same in the hands of the Trustees of Trust Funds.

12. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

#### **B** Administrative Problems

The 1939 session of the legislature passed a law authorizing the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles to inspect any motor vehicle used for the purpose of transporting school children. In November of the year the Motor Vehicle Department issued a set of requirements for school buses. These new requirements necessitated the checking of many vehicles being used and caused a number of minor adjustments. On July 1, 1940, two other sets of requirements were issued which forbade the use for school transportation of many vehicles formerly used for such purpose. The problem thrown onto school boards and superintendents with these new regulations were truly serious because of the difficulty of finding vehicles that conformed to the new requirements and of finding ways of financing the purchase of these new and expensive vehicles. During the summer four new school buses were purchased in this supervisory union; one for Pittsfield, one for Wolfeboro, one for Alton and one for Tuftonboro. A good part of the superintendent's time during the summer was spent in work on the details of the thirty-five different transportation contracts in the union. About half of the vehicles used this year were not used by their present owners for school transportation last year. As no provisions were made by the Motor Vehicle Department for inspecting the vehicles used for school transportation to see whether or not they met the requirements set up by the department, much added work was thrown onto the school boards and superintendents. The total amount which will be spent for the transportation of children in this supervisory union during the year 1940-41 will be about \$19,500.

## PART IV. SCHOOL PLANT

During the summer vacation the chimney at the Parade was rebuilt but other than that no major repairing has been done since the last report. However, one accomplishment which will mean much to some of the pupils was the wiring for electricity of the Beauty Hill Schoolhouse. This was done during the Christmas vacation. All of the Barnstead schools now have the advantages and benefits of this modern convenience and, when the current is turned on at the New Durham Ridge school in the spring, every school in this supervisory union will have electricity available for light, power and heat.

# PART VI. AUXILIARY ACTIVITIES AND SPECIAL REPORTS

#### A. Report of School Nurse

Ruth S. Langille, R. N.

## To the Townspeople, School Board, and Superintendent of Schools:

Several epidemics of skin infections required almost daily supervision until overcome, both in the Fall and in the Spring. With the exception of a small measle epidemic mostly confined to High school pupils, there was little sickness in Barnstead.

The usual dental clinic could not be started until March and had to be stopped by May first due to other clinic appointments by the dentist so that only 57 of the expected 87 pupils received attention. However all the pupils are being completed this year and an increase to \$2.00 per pupil will permit more pupils to be completed. Since the 1941 clinic is not yet completed, it might be of interest to go over the statistical report of the 57 pupils receiving dental treatment last spring:

31 pupils completed: 33 with the \$1.00 allowance; 8 with parents paying the balance.

- 41 cleanings.
- 59 silver amalgam fillings.
  - 5 white porcilain front fillings.
  - 9 cement fillings.
  - 4 copper amalgam fillings.
  - 2 other fillings or treatments.
- 15 baby teeth extractions.
- 10 permanent teeth extractions. 16 with Novocain.
  - 16 with Novocain.
    - 9 with Ethyl Chloride (local)
- 145 total operations.

Very little other corrective work was accomplished. Three of the 10 pupils who needed glasses were fitted. Only one of the 25 who needed tonsil and adenoid operations was able to have it done.

The Barnstead schools had the privilege of having surplus commodities in the form of apples, oranges, grafe-fruit juice, raisins, and canned peaches left at the schools for the pupils to eat with their lunches or at recess. All pupils had this opportunity and enjoyed the fruit to their advantage as far as colds were concerned. There were noticeably less winter infections. Most of the schools made the effort to have hot lunches for the pupils during the winter months. Following will be found a statistical report of the school health work done in the Barnstead schools last year:

Some cases involving social welfare problems were followed up in co-operation with other workers. One orthopedic case was gotten under treatment by Dr. Ezra Jones and under the supervision of Mrs. Carrie Price, State Physiotherapist, who gives the prescribed exercises and massage at a center established in Farmington. A crippled girl, under treatment in Boston, was recently visited and is now able to walk and live a fairly normal life if under supervision. She is taking a commercial course to enable her to be partially self-supporting. The progress shown in this case is really remarkable.

I wish at this time to thank parents, teachers and friends of the pupils for their co-operation and encouragement in the School health program, especially the American Legion and Auxiliary which make the dental clinics possible.

## B. Hot Lunches

Again for the year 1940-41 surplus commodities are available to supplement the hot lunch program. In December 1940 the list of foods delivered included the following: 1 box grapefruit, 5 bu. apples, 26 large cans peaches, 28 lbs. raisins, 28 lbs. prunes, 55 lbs. cereal, 3 100-lb. bags potatoes, 66 cans evaporated milk, 55 lbs. rice, 8 bags white flour, 3 bags granam flour, 55 lbs. corn meal, 60 doz. eggs, 2 hams. On February 10, 1941 another similar supply of foods was obtained from the same source.

In order to help finance the hot lunch programs the American Legion ran a benefit dance and donated the proceeds, eighteen dollars, for this purpose. This sum was divided among the four schools carrying on hot lunch programs according to the number of pupils in each school receiving the lunches. The following table shows how this distribution was made.
