## To the People of Belknap County.

---

The Commissioners, in making their annual report for the year ending May 1st, 1882, have the pleasure of presenting the citizens of the county, a very favorable financial exhibit. With an appropriation of one thousand dollars less, it will be seen by the Treasurer's report that the reduction of the county debt exceeds that of the preceeding year. Court expenses have been light compared with former years, and the expense of supporting the poor off the farm has been nearly nine hundred dollars less than last year.

Certain improvements in the buildings at the county farm, recommended by the Commissioners and approved by the county convention, have been only partially carried out, but it is the purpose of the Commissioners to complete them this year. There have been placed upon the buildings, four of "Robinson's Ventilators," which have added greatly to the health of the inmates, at an expense of about two hundred dollars. Drainage, which ought to have been made complete at first, has been sadly neglected since the construction of the buildings. The water supply was inadequate, until a well was dug and new eaves spouts procured, which has furnished a full supply of soft water for the house and barn, and it is the intention of the Commissioners to build three reservoirs, adjacent to the buildings, for fire purposes only.

Owing to the failure of parties with whom arrangements were made to fulfill their contract, the new boiler was not procured last year. A new one of the latest improved pattern, with the "Jarvis setting," will be set this



year, and it is believed that it will effect a saving in fuel of at least one-third. There being a scarcity of wood on the farm, the Commissioners purchased from Mrs. Joseph E. Mudgett the wood standing on a lot of forty acres, with the right of removing the same in ten years, paying for the lot the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars. It was estimated the amount standing at time of purchase was from seven to eight hundred cords, three-quarters of which was hard wood. We can only repeat what has heretofore been said in regard to the excellent management of Mr. and Mrs. Clark, the superintendent and matron of the county farm. We are convinced that to their good judgement, ability and experience, is to be attributed the success of the institution as regards economy, health, cleanliness, etc. We congratulate ourselves and the county that we have secured their valuable services for another year, ending May 1st, 1883.

## County Solicitor's Report.

---

*To the Citizens of Belknap County:*

It is again a pleasure to me to be able to report that the amount of criminal business, during the past year, has been small and therefore comparatively inexpensive.

At the September Term, 1881, two indictments were returned by the grand jury, one for selling beer and one for selling liquor. A fine and costs were paid in each. Pay rolls were drawn at this term amounting to \$159.16.

At the March Term, 1882, the Grand Jury returned two indictments and one certificate of insanity, — one indictment was for arson and one for embezzlement. Pay rolls were drawn for this term amounting to \$164.37.

As to the present condition of the criminal docket and the course of the criminal practice in the county during the year, I would respectfully refer to the records of the court.

I have always entertained serious doubts as to the propriety of the practice which has obtained generally, I think, through the State, in regard to criminal appeals.

This evil was deemed by His Excellency the Governor, of so great a magnitude as to demand special attention. Since the last annual message of the Governor, I have adopted a new rule concerning these cases. I now treat them like other criminal cases. When I am satisfied on an investigation, that the law has been violated, I try them. This seems to be the only just and equitable course for a prosecuting officer to pursue.
