Inaugural Address.

DELIVERED BY THE MAYOR, HON. ELI J. KING

To the Honorable City Council of Berlin:

I assure you that it is with a great deal of pleasure that I take this opportunity for the fifth time to address you on the affairs connected with our city.

I want to thank the people of this wonderful little city for their expression of confidence in me, and I wish to assure them at this time that I will do everything in my power to warrant and be worthy of that trust.

Finances

The finances of this city are in wonderful shape. A great deal of money has been expended during the past few years, and the results of these expenditures may be easily discerned by anyone who wishes to take the trouble of examining our several public improvements. In view of the work that has been done during the past years, it will not be necessary this year to expend a great deal of money, but there are some certain works that must necessarily be done in order to maintain what has already been accomplished and to keep in shape our streets and public buildings.

Department of Public Works

Although I had hoped that it might be possible for this city to build a mile of cement road every year, I am forced to the position that we ought to forego that expenditure this year. Therefore I recommend that the city does not continue its cement road on the Milan road this coming year. There are certain necessary things that should be done this year, including the completion of School and Champlain streets from Mason to Merrimac. Pleasant street extension should be completed this year, and Second avenue from Jolbert to Laurel avenue; also Clarke street. A part of the city that should receive attention and that is greatly in need of public improvements is that part known as Cascade. We have neglected the people in that locality too long, and I recommend that considerable work be done this year towards making streets and sidewalks and laying sewers.

Public Schools

Some criticism has been expressed by reason of the fact that in our City Report the report on the new High School building was not complete. I wish to state that the reason for this is because the schoolhouse at the time the report went to press was not finished. A great many contracts have not as yet been completed and fully paid for; consequently it is an impossibility to have a full report on the new city High School. The City Report for the coming year, however, will contain a full and itemised report of all receipts and expenditures in completing this school. The new school has been of great benefit to this city, and all our schoolsrs are now housed in commodious and healthful quarters; and our schools now compare favorably with any in New England.

Fire Depaartment

This department is in good condition and has demonstrated to the city during the past year its efficiency. The new fire alarm system has been installed and now gives to the city an independent fire alarm of its own which is of great benefit to us. It is true that the city needs a new motor-driven fire pumper, but I believe that we should forego that apparatus for the coming year unless it becomes obvious that we cannot get along without it.

Water System for City

Some preliminary work has been done towards acquiring the Berlin Water System by the City of Berlin. I believe that the city should own its own water system and the sooner this matter is accomplished the better for the citizens of this city. In view of the fact, however, that interest rates are so high at the present time; and in view of the fact that the physical valuation of the Berlin Water Company is deteriorating very rapidly, I would advise that nothing further be done thos year towards completing this project, but that the city wait for some more favorable time before completing its plans for acquiring its water system.

Conclusion

I would recommend that for the coming year the budget system be carried out faithfully. I realize that sometimes it is almost impossible to carry out a budget for every department; but if we start out with that idea in mind, it may be possible for every department to so conduct its business as to be prepared for any emergency that may result in a greater expenditure of money than planned for that period.

I believe that the system of bookkeeping and of keeping the

Mayor's office open continually, which was installed last year, resulted in a closer relationship between the Mayor and the heads of his departments; and although it takes a great deal more time, I believe that the good resulting from such a system is well worth the time and I shall continue during the present year the same system as was carried out during the past year.

I wish to thank each and every one of you councilmen who gave me such hearty support during the past administration, and I welcome the new men and ask them to be prepared and ready to assume their responsibilities and to give to the citizens who elected them the best that is in them; and I trust that our relations during the coming year will be cordial and helpful to all of us.

AN ORDINANCE revising section 7, page 75 of the City Ordinances relative to the erection of signs on the principal streets of the City of Berlin.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Berlin as fol-

It shall not be lawful to build upon the front walls of any building, any portico, porch, bay window, balcony, or any other projection over the sidewalk or street, excepting electric signs may be erected on the front walls of any building in the City of Berlin, providing this sign is fastened to the building and does not project out over four (4) feet from same, and not less than twelve (12) feet from the sidewalk, providing a permit has first been obtained from the Building Inspector and the work done under his supervision.

In the Year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-

AN ORDINANCE in relation to the parking of vehicles on certain streets in the business district of the City of Berlin.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Berlin as follows:

Section 1. Between the hours of 8:00 a. m., and 12:00 a. m.; 2:00 p. m., and 6:00 p. m.; and 8:00 p. m., and 10:00 p. m., no vehicle shall stop more than thirty minutes at a time on Main street between Success street and the railway crossing on Glen avenue; on Mason street between Oak street and the easterly end of the easterly bridge across the Androscoggin river; and on Green street between Green square and the underpass under the Grand Trunk

Railway; and in Green square; and on Exchange street between Green square and Pleasant street extension; and on Mechanic street between Pleasant and Main streets; and on the easterly side of Pleasant street between the railroad crossing on the Brown Company branch and Exchange street.

Section 2. Section 1 shall not apply to vehicles owned by physicians resident in the city of Berlin, nor to commercial vehicles engaged in the business of loading or unloading.

Section 3. No vehicle shall stand within the intersection of any street, nor within fifteen feet of a fire hydrant, nor within thirty feet of a street curb corner, nor within twelve feet of a city standpipe.

Section 4. No vehicle shall stop or stand within thirty feet either side of the center point of the front wall of a fire station, theatre, or moving picture house, except to let off or take on passengers, or to receive or deliver goods or merchandise.

Section 5. Except as provided in Section 7, unless in an emergency or to allow another vehicle to cross its path, no vehicle shall stop in any public street except close to the curb line.

Section 6. When a horse-drawn vehicle is backed up to the curb the horse or horses shall be turned so as to stand as near parallel with the sidewalk as possible, and headed in the general direction of traffic for the side of the street on which the vehicle is standing.

Section 7. In approaching or passing a street railway car which has been stopped to take on or let off passengers, the driver of every vehicle shall bring said vehicle to a full stop.

Section 8. No vehicle incapable of being turned without backing shall be turned about in any portions of the streets designated in Section 1.

Section 9. No horse or vehicle shall be driven, backed, or allowed to stand on any sidewalk without a permit from the Superintendent of Streets.

Section 10. The word "vehicle" herein used shall include horses hitched to vehicles, and motor vehicles of all kinds.

Section 11. Any violation of the foregoing ordinance shall be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars; and it shall be the duty of the police officers of said city to enforce said ordinance.

Section 12. An ordinance in relation to the inspection of teams on the business streets of the city of Berlin, passed May 1st, 1900, is hereby repealed.

Section 13. This ordinance shall take effect when passed and

promulgated according to law. Passed May 1st, 1923.



To his Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin, N. H.

Gentlemen:

We have the honor to submit the thirteenth annual report of this department giving a digest of the work accomplished during 1923.

We wish to call to your attention the low death rate (9.1 per 1000), the excellent work done by the baby clinics and the prenatal nurse. The increase in the activities of the laboratory, the cleaning up of herds through the tuberculin testing, and the gratifying interest of the public shown in the response to the Schick test.

In view of the demonstrated work of the prenatal and infant work we would recommend that another nurse be added to the staff in order that all such service may be directed by the city. We also wish you in the near future to consider the centralization of authority by the taking over of the tuberculosis work which has been so well started, and the need demonstrated by the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association.

Report of Health Officer.

Berlin, N. H., January 1, 1924.

To the Board of Health of the City of Berlin, N. H. Gentlemen:

I herewith have the honor to submit the thirteenth annual report of the Health Department, covering the activities of the past year.

During the year the health of the community has been very good, the adjusted death rate being even lower than that of the previous year. The infant mortality rate has increased slightly during this period.

VITAL STATISTICS

Vital statistics pertain to the events which have to do with the origin, continuation, and termination of the lives of the inhabitants of a community. The commonly included statistics are births, marriages, and deaths, the occurrence of disease, and conditions attending these events.

POPULATION

Using the United States Census Bureau's estimate of 11,780 for 1910 and 16,104 for 1920, the estimated population of the city for July 1, 1923, is placed at 17,366. Table I. shows the population by wards and for the entire city from 1920 to 1923.

DEATHS

During the year there were 167 deaths in the city, eight of which were non-residents. This gives a crude death rate of 9.6 per 1,000. Throwing out the deaths of non-residents the adjusted rate for the city is 9.1 per 1,000.

Table II. shows the number of deaths and the deaths per 1,000 for the wards. Ward 1 is the only ward in which there is an increase in the death rate.

During the year there were 102 deaths among native whites and 57 among foreign born whites. There were also 49 deaths under one year of age during 1923.

Table IV. shows the chief causes of death in the city. In looking over this table we find that results are being accomplished in the reduction of death in young people, but the deaths from such diseases as heart disease, pneumonia and apoplexy still claim large numbers among the older age groups.

BIRTHS

There were 527 births during 1923 giving a birth rate of 30.3 per 1,000 which is a slight decrease over that of the previous year. Ward 4 was the only ward in the city showing an increased birth rate for 1923 of 7.7 per 1,000 births.

INFANT MORTALITY

The infant mortality rate has increased slightly over that of the previous year, being 93 per 1,000 for 1923.

The writer feels that the results obtained in the three baby clinics should be incorporated in this report to show the lowering of the infant mortality among those babies which are under supervision of the nurses attached to these clinics. The rate in this group was 60 per 1,000, which is over 30 per 1,000 less than for

babies not under supervision.

There were 1,422 children in attendance at these clinics during the year and 228 new babies admitted for the same period. The nurses on this work made a total of 3578 home visits. The average gain per baby for the three clinics was 3.8 pounds.

Table VII. shows the infant mortality of the city by wards for 1923. Wards 3 and 4 both had a decrease in the infant mortality.

Table VIII. shows the deaths under five years by age, cause, and nativity of parents. From this table we find that 67 per cent. of the deaths under one year took place during the first month of life.

One of the ways of reducing the percentage is thru the education of the expectant mother. The underlying factor of infant mortality is infancy itself, that period at which the flame of life is feeblest.

Some of the chief specific causes of infant mortality are artificial feeding, hot weather, dirty milk, lack of prenatal care, poor housing, lack of cleanliness. The causes are multiple and complex and include social and economic factors.

Prevention of infant mortality depends upon attacking the problem at its root. Malformations and accidents of birth are little affected by treatment. Mortality from tuberculosis, syphilis, acute respiratory diseases and acute contagious diseases can be reduced to a great extent by proper sanitation and medical treatment. A great reduction can be invoked through proper feeding and care for gastro-intestinal disorders and marasnus.

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STILLBIRTHS

There were 39 stillbirths for the period of this report, which is an increase of 21 over last year. As there might well be some question as to the value of a prenatal nurse, it is gratifying to state that of 94 prenatal cases under observation there were only two stillbirths, one of which was due to an accident to the mother.

COMMUNICABLE DISEASES

The past year has been a very good one so far as communicable diseases have been concerned, as the city has been practically free from diseases of this nature. Table IX, shows the communicable diseases by years for the last ten years.

TUBERCULOSIS

There were 14 clinics held in Berlin during 1923 with an attendance of 205 patients. There were 20 cases arrested, and eight suspicious cases discharged for this period. There were eight deaths from tuberculosis, four of which were clinic cases.

At the present time there are approximately 170 cases under observation of the tuberculosis nurse and the writer feels confident that there are many more cases that have not been reported and have not been discovered. It is the duty of the medical profession and also the head of the house where a case of this disease exists, to notify the health officials.

MEASLES

There were only two cases of measles reported to this office during the year. Without doubt there were more cases of this disease than the above, but due to the fact that in a great many cases no doctor is called, consequently no notification of the case is given. This is contrary to law. If a person has knowledge of a communicable disease existing in a household, he is required to report it to the health authorities.

SCARLET FEVER

We have twelve cases of scarlet fever for this period, which is a slight increase over that of the previous year. All were mild, with no fatalities.

DIPHTHERIA

This year saw a large decrease in these cases and there were only three cases and no deaths.

The last of the year slips were passed out to the school children of the city to take home to their parents, explaining the Schick Test for determining the susceptibility to diphtheria. The response to the questionnaire was very gratifying, as about 200 have already asked to have the test given their children.

DIVISION OF LABORATORIES

Table XI, shows the pathological work performed in the laboratory for 1923.

MILK SUPPLY

In view of the fact that there is no pasteurized milk sold in the city of Berlin, the writer has long felt that the milk sold should come from tuberculin tested cows. With this in mind, practically all herds in Milan supplying milk to this city have been tested and found to be satisfactory. Also those herds located on Cates' Hill were tested and on the first test 69 out of 140 were found to be positive reactors and were killed. The second test gave a clean test, in that no reactors were found.

I feel that there should be an ordinance requiring that all milk sold in this city should come from tuberculin tested cows. At the present time there are still over 300 head of cattle to be tested in the spring.

WATER SUPPLY

The reservoir supply has been satisfactory during the year, but due to a shortage it was necessary to pump from the river off and on throughout the summer.

Before this took place two Wallace and Tiernan Chlorinators

were installed and the water treated with liquid chlorine to sterilize it. From a bacteriological standpoint it was satisfactory but due to a large amount of organic matter in the water it was necessary to dose the water heavily with chlorine as a susequent result occasionally there was a slight taste to the water.

Two points at which the chlorinators are installed and the location of the intakes are far from satisfactory and if it is necessary to use them each summer as an auxiliary supply, installation should be above the mills, eliminating the danger of industrial wastes entering the supply.

RECOMMENDATIONS

I would like to make the following recommendations before closing:—

- 1. The introduction of another nurse to do prenatal and infant hygiene work.
- 2. The passage of an ordinance requiring the tuberculin testing of all cows supplying milk to the City of Berlin.
- 3. The passage of an ordinance prohibiting the keeping of cows in the compact part of town.
- 4. The installation above the mills of the intakes for the auxilliary supply of water.

CONCLUSIONS

In closing I wish to extend my hearty thanks for the cooperation and support given me by the City Government, the Board of Health, individuals, organizations during the past year.

Gentlemen:—I have the honor of submiting herewith the annual report of the Fire Department of the City of Berlin for the year ending December 31, 1923.

During the year 1923, there were 70 bell alarms, 180 still alarms and 13 false alarms. No alarms were received from out of town points during that period. In addition to this, I personally inspected 1120 buildings and yards, ordering clean ups and changes where necessary. October 7th to 13th was observed as Fire Prevention Week and proved very successful. I would recommend that the City observe this week each year as it is of great benefit to the Department and to the City in general. I desire to express my sincere thanks to the Mayor and Council, the Superintendent of Schools and to the citizens who gave their hearty cooperation in the matter.

During the year 3000 feet of hose was purchased. I would recommend that 2500 feet be purchased each year to take care of old hose which we are obliged to discard. I would also recommend that a triple combination be purchased. This, I feel, is a real necessity and I hope to see the same added to our Department.

Report of the City Solicitor.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin: I submit herewith my report to you as City Solicitor for the year 1923 up to the time of my resignation, January 1, 1924.

I investigated during the past year a large number of claims against the city, water and sewer damages, and out of that number none have been reported on favorably for payment; so far, only two suits have been brought against the city and are now pending in court. Several condemnation proceedings were brought through this department and out of this number only one has appealed—namely, the Woolworth Company—said appeal now pending in said court.

The dispute between the City Council and the Board of Police Commissioners, with reference to parking regulations was submitted to the superior court and transferred to the law court for a decision. This case has been printed, entered, and in shape for the new solicitor to brief and argue. A decision ought to be rendered before the summer season.

A petition to the Public Service Commission requesting the Grand Trunk to change their underpass on Green street, was brought by me just before my resignation, and this matter ought to be disposed of within the next thirty days.

It was with regret that I was obliged to hand in my resignation, but the work of this department has so increased within the last few years that it takes a great deal of time and interferes greatly with a lawyer's private business.

I wish to suggest to you that the same salary is now paid to your solicitor as was paid to him several years ago when there was very little work to be done. The salary at this time is entirely inadequate, and ought to be at least \$1,200 a year.

Report of Police Commission

To His Excellency, the Governor of the State of New Hampshire, and to His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin:

In accordance with the provisions of Chapter 160 of the Session Laws of 1905, we herewith submit our annual report commencing Deember 31st, 1922, and ending December 31st, 1923.

Since our last report there have been no marked changes. Some of the officers have resigned, and others have been appointed.

The personnel of the police force is of a high standard. Everybody is satisfied that they are diligent, industrious and attentive to duty. We have had only one complaint against an officer, which, after hearing, was dismissed.

The traffic regulations which were formulated by the Police Commission were objected to by the Mayor and City Council, and a petition was filed by them in the superior court, to have the regulations set aside. The judge, however, made no ruling one way or the other, and the case is now on its way to the supreme court.

At our annual meeting, Joseph G. Blais was chosen chairman, and Edmund Sulliyan, clerk.

For property of the police dpartment reference is made to the City Marshal's report, which is hereto annexed.

APPROPRIATIONS

The matter of appropriations embraces so many things that it is difficult to get at an accurate estimate. It takes about \$30,000.00 to run the police department and pay the ordinary expenses.

As shown by last year's report, the expense for running the police department was \$32,776.07. We do not see how it can be run for a less amount this year. In addition to this, the department is in need of a card system, which will cost between four and five hundred dollars to install, and also a patrol and ambulance combined, which will cost, as near as can be estimated, from four to five thousand dollars.

POLICE COMMISSIONERS

The Police Commissioners are appointed by the Governor, one

each year, for the period of three years, with a salary of three hundred and fifty dollars (350.00) a year, to be divided as the Board may determine.

The term of each of the incumbents is as follows:

Edmund Sullivan, term expires Sept. 1, 1925.

Charles L. Sanborn, term expired Sept. 1, 1923, but holds over. Joseph G. Blais, term expires Sept. 1, 1924.

BEATS

Main Street—from Ste. Anne's Church to and including Glen Avenue— is under constant surveillance.

Exchange Street, including Grand Trunk Railway Station and Pleasant Street, between Green and Mason Streets, are under constant surveillance of some officer.

Main Street, for a short distance above, opposite and below the Brown Company's store, is patrolled during the entire day until eleven p. m.

Mason Street, on the East Side, and in the vicinity of the Boston & Maine Railroad Station, is patrolled from twelve o'clock, noon, to eleven p. m.

High Street is patrolled during the early part of the evening.

Gentlemen:—I herewith submit my report as Overseer of the City Poor for the year ending January 31, 1924, which shows the appropriation overdrawn \$879.84. This was unavoidable as the conditions during the year were unusual in Berlin.

I do not desire to make particular comment on the situation further than to state that the City has been obliged to support three deserted families, also one family consisting of mother and six children, caused by the death of the father.

The enforcement of the Eighteenth Amendment has added two more families for support, one for two months, and the other has received aid for six months, and is receiving aid at this time.

I have investigated the cases coming to my attention and have given aid where it seemed needed. I would recommend that this department be given for 1924 at least \$1,800.00.

Report of City Engineer.

Berlin, N. H., January 31, 1924.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin: Gentlemen:

I respectfully submit herewith a report of the Engineering Department of the city for the year ending January 31, 1924.

I will endeavor to give a brief outline of the work carried on by this department during the past year.

OFFICE: A large map of the city five by eight feet, scale 200 feet to the inch was made showing every house lot in the city, and such additions as the Forbush Park, Blais Park, Paine Park, Liberty Park, Pleasant View Park, Green Park, Nibroc Park, Holt Terrace, Smith lots, Lambert lots, DiGullio lots and Mason lots. This map will replace the one made by Mr. Bryant in 1907.

The sewer book has been revised and rebound and many of the old sewer locations corrected. All new work located and shown in a manner that no trouble should be experienced in locating pipes in the future.

Maps and descriptions were furnished for the condemnation proceedings against the Berlin National Bank on Green Square, Costello lot on Pleasant street, Cates Hill road, John Goebel land on Willow street, and for the discontinuing of a part of Sessions street.

Plans and descriptions of land bought by the City from the following were furnished: Rosenfield to City; A. M. Stahl to City; Plante to City. This land was bought for sidewalk and highway purposes.

Estimates, plans and specifications were furnished for all construction work carried on by the Public Works Department. A cross-section and plan was made for the School Board of the old high school lot. Plans and specifications for the sidewalk and artificial stone curbing on the new senior high school lot.

On October 30, 1923, the City Council voted to employ Sawyer and Bean, hydraulic engineers, of Lewiston, Maine, to make an appraisal of the Berlin Water System. Since that time I have been working in conjunction with Sawyer and Bean and have collected most of the data required by them for this appraisal. I

have taken measurements of Success Pond and its tributaries, as a source of future supply. I have made a complete survey of all reservoirs of the Water Company, measured all mains from reservoirs to city, tested water pressure in various parts of city and furnished Sawyer and Ban with such plans and maps as they required.

Sawyer and Bean expect to make a report in the near future and I earnestly hope that the Mayor and City Council see fit to accept their report and take possession of the Water Company at once.

The Berlin Water Company, has given the city access to their plans, files and books.

Lines and grades were furnished for, and the following improvements supervised:

CEMETERY: The new cemetery has been graded and seeded down, with the terraces sodded and about fifty additional lots staked out.

SEWERS: Six thousand one hundred and thirty-two lineal feet of the tile sewer pipe was laid on the various streets of the city. This pipe ranged in size from six inches to twenty inches.

CONCRETE WALLS: Concrete retaining walls containing four hundred and fifty cubic yards were built on the following streets: Pleasant street extension, School street, Grafton street, Maple street, Prospect street.

CONCRETE SIDEWALKS: Six thousand two hundred and twenty-five square yards of concrete sidewalk was built on the following streets: Main street, High street, School street, Strafford street, Grafton street.

CONCRETE CURB: Eighteen hundred lineal feet of concrete curbing were built on the following streets: Sweden street, First avenue, Church street.

BITUMINOUS CONCRETE: Eighteen thousand five hundred and seventy-seven square yards of bituminous concrete pavements were built on the following streets: Pleasant street extension, Clarke street, School street, Seventh street, Church street, Champlain street, Strafford street.

WATER-BOUND MACADAM: A small section of water-bound macadam was put in at the end of High street.

No concrete road was built this year, but plans are made to complete the state road to Milan line during the coming summer.

A more complete list showing yardage and cost of above jobs will be found in the report of the Public Works Department.

It is a pleasure to look over the above jobs and to note that

in every case the job is a complete unit of permanent work.

Miscellaneous work such as street lines and grades for those wishing to build walls or fences on the street line, foundation grades given to those building homes, also street names and house numbers were handled by this department.

In closing I wish to thank the Mayor and City Council officials and residents of the City for their hearty cooperation during the past year.

Report of Library Trustees.

February 1st, 1924.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin:

Gentlemen:—The Board of Trustees of the Berlin Free Public Library herewith submit their thirty-first annual report, together with the Treasurer's statement and the Librarian's report.

During the past year your trustees have underaken a new policy which, they trust, will greatly increase the service which the library is able to render to the public.

We have decided to keep abreast with the latest published fiction for which there is a great demand. In order to supply the rush for the latest books we have instituted a penny-a-day library of duplicates, so that if a subscriber does not wish to wait for a popular novel, with sixteen or seventeen names on its reserve list, he may obtain it sooner by paying one cent a day for the book. There is no book on this list which is not also on the free list.

We find that the demand for non-fiction that is new is likewise very great. New books on business methods, musical topics, travel, penology, biography, etc., do not rest on the shelves a day. They are in constant circulation.

We hope through the increased appropriation for which we are asking, to be able to supply the best new books and the standard works in all lines which are of especial interest to the people of Berlin. It is also our intention to increase the reference library to the size and quality which is considered sufficient for a population of 18,000. We hope also to round out our collection of classical literature in French as well as in English.

Our budget also provides for finishing and repairing the inside of the building which was constructed in 1904. Parts of the walls were not even finished or plastered. The weather and proximity to the river is causing the mortar to crumble between the bricks. Unless repairs are made immediately the building cannot be used much longer as a library. It is planned to use an unfinished room in the basement in which a large hole has been left to facilitate thawing out the water pipes. These pipes should be moved where they will not freeze. Varnish and paint are needed throughout the building, but especially in the children's room, which should

be cheerful and bright.

In April we had the misfortune of losing our librarian, who had served the community so faithfully for two years. Miss Ethel Goss left for the West to act as superintendent of a training school for nurses. On July 1st, Mrs. Maxwell Ganter began her term in this position with an enthusiasm and energy which promises well for the future. She is seconded by an able and devoted staff to which has recently been added Miss Katherine Gothreau.

Librarian's Report.

To the Board of Trustees of the Berlin Public Library:

The 31st annual report of the Librarian of the Free Public Library is herewith submitted.

The Trustees of the Berlin Public Library and the people of Berlin have cause to be encouraged in the condition of their library.

For the past few years the library has been progressing very slowly, due to lack of sufficient funds with which to purchase the necessary books in the desired quantity to keep abreast of the times.

During the first months of the past year the circulation showed a decrease of 946 volumes over last year. During September, October and November the circulation has increased 707 volumes over the same months of the previous year, making a total increase of 239 volumes in spite of the very poor showing the first part of the year, and the closing of the library for one week for cleaning.

This sudden increase in circulation and the reviving of certain branches of work, which for a long time had been closed, necessitated adding a new member to our staff.

We are planning to double the circulation and increase the efficiency of the library during the coming year, and to that end the staff is working diligently, not only during the hours open to the public, but mornings when the library is closed. We hope to enlarge the French library, to give a course of lectures and book reviews in the early spring and to cooperate more closely with the grade schools.

Many repairs must be made upon the building and many worn out standard books replaced. The books in the children's room are in a very dirty and worn condition. The demand and need for new children's books is very great. During children's book week more children patronized the library than ever before. The largest attendance was 340 in one afternoon, compared with 195 last year. The children were entertained each afternoon by a "Story Hour" conducted by teachers from the grade schools and experimental school. A phonograph was loaned by the "Steady Music Company." On Monday following the children's book week

197 children borrowed books. This was a banner day in the history of the juvenile department.

We have been obliged to restrict the lending of magazines. People who were not careful to return them in time caused inconvenience to those wishing to use them in the reading room.

We owe a large debt of gratitude to several citizens of Berlin for gifts of books. Mrs. Gordon Wightman gives one book each month to the library. Mrs. A. M. Stahl has donated 65 books during the past few months. Mrs. Frank Bailey, Rev. E. D. Mackey, Mr. Crawford Henning, Mr. Richard Coombs and Mr. John Powers have contributed generously to our shelves.



Report of the Superintendent

To the Board of Education:

I herewith submit my third annual report as Superintendent of the Berlin City Schools:

Recognizing the necessity of keeping our patrons informed of conditions and policies of the schools we have made a special effort in this report to put it in such form that it will convey a maximum amount of information regarding the schools to the community at large.

The organization and accomplishments in the schools during the past year have been effected very vitally by the burning of the old high school building in March. This necessitated a shift of grades all over the city and has cramped us for room.

For the rest of the year 1922-1923 we attempted to carry on the junior high school work in the four upper rooms of the Marston school building, the seventh grade attending during the morning and the eighth grade during the afternoon. While we managed to finish the year in this way it was not at all satisfactory to have the junior high school separated and in such close quarters. In opening the new year we felt it was advisable to run the senior high school from 7.45 to 12.40 and the junior high school from 1.00 to 5.00 in the new high school building. This plan is much more satisfactory than last year's, but the time for each school is too restricted for the best type of work. With the accomodations available, however, I would recommend that we continue as we are until the new junior high school building can be made available.

The buildings all over the city are in first class condition. Several alterations were made in the Cates Hill building, a well was dug and the water was piped into the building. There is still a real need for some improvement in the Burgess and Cole school grounds. The problem of the Burgess school has been discussed sufficiently in the meetings of the Board so that I need not deal with it here. It seems however that the Cole school should have enough soil put over the lot to cover the outcropping rocks and make it more safe as a children's playground.

I wish to call your attention once more to the condition at the

Cascade. We have at the present time in the neighborhood of eighty children living in the Cascade district. Until the past two years the Gorham school has had ample accomodations for the Berlin pupils, but they are gradually becoming so crowded that each year more of the Cascade children have had to be transported to Berlin. During the past year the Gorham school, by runing double session in the primary grades, has been able to take care of the four lower grades. We, in turn, have paid for the transportation of all the fifth and sixth grade children living at the Cascade and taken care of them in the Berlin schools. It is needless to call your attention to the unsatisfactory character of half-day sessions. Within a very short time it will be necessary for us to make some preparation to accomodate all of the Cascade group. A three or four room building will be a necessity in the near future.

The following figures were prepared shortly after the fire in the old high school and illustrate our need for a junior high school:

You will note that, allowing thirty-five children per room, the seating capacity of all grade buildings at the present time is over 300 less than the number of pupils enrolled. You will note, too, the estimated yearly increases based upon the experience of the past five years. A building that is ready for occupancy by the first of next year should accomodate not only the seventh and eighth grades, but also the sixth grades. This will relieve congestion in the grade buildings. If our enrollment increases as it has in the past it will be only a short time until it will be necessary to move the ninth grade pupils who are now in the senior high school back into junior high. This in turn will so crowd the junior high school that the sixth grades will have to be provided for by additional grade buildings. However, this will bring us to an organization which seems to be most desirable: a senior high school taking care of grades X, XI and XII and a junior high school taking care of grades VII, VIII and IX.

I invite your careful consideration of the following tables and graphs illustrating different phases of our school work:

These two studies made in February 1922 and in February 1924 are designed to show (1) the large number of cases of overageness in the schools and (2) the effect of the reclassification which has been going on gradually for the past two years and which we hope to continue until we have approached at least a normal age condition. The first table shows 221 children retarded one year, that is, one year over-age; 86 children two years over-age, etc. Figuring on a per capita cost of \$103.00 per year, every additional year that a child must remain in school adds

that much to our expeditures. If our grades were made to fit the average child we should have, normally, as many children underage as there are over-age. What we hope to accomplish by reclassification is to reduce the over-ageness wherever possible and to counter-balance the over-ageness with an equivalent under-ageness.

The first table shows excess over-ageness of 968 years; the second table shows excess over-ageness of 744 years. In other words, since February 1922 we have reduced the years of overageness by 224. Considering the per capita cost is over \$100.00 per year, this represents a substantial saving to the city.

Reduction of over-ageness is desirable if it is accomplished without (1) driving out the over-age pupils by insisting upon too high standards, or (2) promoting pupils who are not really capable of doing the succeeding grade work. Since the figures in Tables I and II deal almost entirely with children within the compulsory education age, it is not possible to drive them out by insisting upon too high standards of work. That we have not reduced the standard demanded of children is shown by the following charts illustrating the work done:



The first spelling tests were given in the Berlin schools in the fall of 1921. These showed a low spelling accomplishment and measures were taken to correct the difficulty. By spring our pupils had improved greatly but still were below the standard for the country at large

The second chart above shows the condition last year. The first tests given in 1922 indicated a very low score in the fourth grade and a gradual approach to the standard, ending at approximately standard work in the eighth grade. In other words, each grade was a little nearer standard than the preceding one, which indicates better than normal progress. During the period between September and February when the second test was given the following notice was sent out to the teachers which I am giving in full because it indicates the type of work that the supervisory force can give in assisting the teachers to solve their difficulties.

February 20, 1923.

We are sending you with this notice a graph showing results of the recent spelling test. Needless to say we are immensely pleased with the progress that has been made.

A year ago our grades were from a half-year to three years below the standard. The last test shows the median of the eighth grade far above, the seventh very near and the other grades close enough so that the accomplishment of standard work is within reach. We have made more than two years advance in one.

These results seem to be due to three factors:

First-We analyzed the spelling problem.

Second—We studied and improved our technique.

Third—Pupils and teachers alike have worked intelligently and industriously toward a definite goal.

There is no doubt that the problem in some rooms is more difficult than in others. The following material has been brought together in an effort to shed additional light on it:

A. Words to Teach:

1. Grade lists as given in the Aldine Speller.

CITY OF BERLIN

- 2. Special words peculiar to Berlin, as "shift", etc.
- 3. Words related to subjects of the grade.
- Individual lists for each pupil from errors in daily work.

B. Presentation: (Well handled by Berlin teachers).

- Appeal to as many senses as possible to deepen, the impression and to reach each type of child.
 - (A) Have the appearance as a whole first presented to the child.
 - (B) Careful pronunciation by teacher and then by pupil.
 - (C) Have children spell words alond as a class. Individually in cases of special difficulty or inattention.
 - (D) Have children write words.

(This is not a complete presentation but suggestive of essential steps).

- 2. Devices for emphasizing the above points will be needed for difficult words and for pupils having special difficulties, for example:
 - (A) Calling attention to the special peculiarity of word as the second a in grammar.
 - (B) Simple memory devices as "There is gain in bargain".
 - (C) Closing eyes when spelling word to deepen visual impression.
 - (D) Arouse interest in work through meaning, use derivation, etc.
 - (E) Drill on pronunciation of word.

C. Some Causes of Poor Spelling:

- 1. Inattention or fatigue.
- 2. Failure of pupil to see or hear accurately.
- Failure to center attention on peculiar difficulty of word
- 4. Mis-pronunciation of word by pupil or teacher.
- 5. Failure of teacher to appeal to all the sensesinvolved.
- 6. Insufficient or untimely review.
- The attempt to teach words which have no real meaning to the pupil.


(The above list will be useful in analyzing the difficulties of

individual pupils).

The results of the final test given in the spring of 1923 are indicated by the line for February 1923 and show a very marked improvement, with the eighth grade work considerably better than the standard for the country.

Special attention to spelling work was continued and the tests of May showed all grades except the fourth either at or above the standard line and even the fourth is approximately standard. Tests given the fall of 1923 shortly after the summer vacation showed all grades from the fourth to the sixth very near to the standard line. This is not illustrated on the chart.

READING Chart III



During the past twenty years students of education have scrutinized, more closely than ever before, practically every phase of the educational problem. The general aims of education, the aims of any specific course and the methods by which those aims are to be attained have all been redefined and scientifically studied.

Reading, one of the old traditional subjects, is undergoing a revolutionary change due to the new definition of aim. Most of the fathers and mothers of the present day received most of their training in reading by reading aloud and the emphasis was placed upon proper pronunciation, attention to punctuation marks, and in the main, the mechanical phase.

When we consider that the main function of reading is to gain ideas or information from the printed page we must come to the conclusion that training in reading should be largely training in silent reading, rather than oral. Silent reading is a necessity, oral reading is an art. Furthermore, very careful experimentation has shown that emphasis on oral reading, after the early mechanics have been mastered, tends to diminish ability in silent reading. On account of this the proportion of silent reading to oral should increase very rapidly after the third grade until practically all reading of the seventh grade is silent.


If oral reading, as an art, is to be taught in the schools the emphasis thereon should be given somewhere in the high school.


The teaching of silent reading is a new problem and the technique is rapidly being developed. If the purpose of reading is to gain knowledge from the printed page it is evident that the training in silent reading must involve (1) presentation of printed material, graded according to ability of the reader, and (2) the testing of the reader's grasp of the material read.

Further, we have learned that certain mechanical habits must be developed before good silent rading can be expected and habits come only by practice. Therefore good silent reading will involve not only the reading of graded material but the reading of a much greater volume of material than has been the custom in the past.


The first silent reading tests were given in the Berlin schools in December 1921. These tests were designed to secure data on both rate and comprehension. The outcome of the tests showed that from grades III to VIII the pupils in the Berlin schools were slower and less accurate in their reading than the children in corresponding grades in the United States. After these results had been studied a drive for better silent reading began. More books were made available for the pupils, the teachers became familiar with both the aims and methods of teaching silent reading, all manner of devices for securing additional reading from the children were invented and silent reading was given more time in the daily program. Tests have been given two and three times a year through the schools and the graph accompanying this article notes the progresss made last year. The test which we used last year has been used all over the United States until the standards are quite accurate.


The fall scores show all the five grades from IV to VIII inclusive considerably below the standard line and the spring scores show all grades above the standard.







Charts VI and VII







Charts VIII and IX





Charts X and XI







Probably no school work appeals to the average person so much as fundamental operations in arithmetic and unquestionably speed and accuracy in simple computation is a necessity.

In spite of our efforts our improvement has not been particularly satisfactory. The accompanying graphs illustrate the accomplishments of the year 1922-1923.

Tests given in the fall of 1923 showed us that the improvements of the preceding year were not lasting and that our work in all the fundamental operations was considerably below normal. For two months we have been engaged in an intensive campaign for better work in the fundamental operations. This can be accomplished only through continual, persevering drill and results cannot be accomplished in a short time. We believe that the present campaign is producing results and tests which will be given in February will give us important data on the results. This will be taken up at length in the next annual report.



The results in reasoning in arithmetic as tested by the Stone Reasoning Test, which gives data only for compartively simple reasoning, have been very satisfactory. Starting with a low score in all the grades tested in 1921, each year has shown a definite improvement toward the standard until the tests given last fall indicated standard work or better in each of the grades. This test does not take into consideration errors in the fundamental operations. We believe that the results have been attained by careful attention to clear reasoning processes in simple problems often repeated.



The writing chart illustrates the conditions in our penmanship. Our penmanship has been quite unsatisfactory and our attempts to remedy it have been somewhat unfortunate. In September, 1922, a supervisor of penmanship was secured and the Palmer Penmanship System was adopted for all the grades. The supervisor was taken ill early in the year and her work was irregular. In January the supervisor resigned.

This year, however, the work has gone steadily forward and we believe that a fine start has been made. The pennanship supervisor's report will be found further on in this report.

Until the adoption of the Palmer System no common method was used and the model writing before the pupil depended upon the penmanship of the teacher. No specific penmanship habits could be definitely fixed when the model was changing each year. Since the Palmer System is a muscular movement it will take time and constant drill before the results can be clearly seen. Our supervisor feels that considerable improvement is evident throughout the grades. In next year's report we will have more exact information to give.

TESTS AND MEASUREMENTS

In response to a number of questions that have been asked recently in regard to various phases of our school work, I am planning to send to the paper from time to time articles which may give our patrons much of the information which they desire.

One of the most common questions that has been asked has been the purpose and the work of the Research Department. Probably no movement in recent years in the educational field has given so much promise, attracted so much attention and spread so rapidly as the movement to measure accurately and judge scientifically the effectiveness of the school system.

During the past decade educators generally have come to the conclusion that by means of scientifically constructed standardized tests, such as I will later describe in detail, the progress of the pupils and the effectiveness of the teaching can be indicated, as well as the specific problems which the school system faces, and the points which must be given special attention.

A few years ago the schools could be judged only by opinion, based frequently, upon inaccurate observation. Today such opinion can be backed by exact figures and by comparison with the results attained in other places. It is possible today to say that the spelling in the fourth grade in Berlin is better than the spelling in the fourth grades in other places; that the spelling in one fourth grade is better or worse than in another fourth grade; that the spelling of any individual is better or worse than the average of his grade. The same is true of reading, of fundamental operations in arithmetic, arithmetical reasoning, writing, and, in fact, most of the common grade subjects.

This movement has gone ahead with such rapidity that many mistakes have undoubtedly been made and many false conclusions formed, but each year the tests become more accurate and applications become possible in a greater variety of situations.

It is the growing practice in colleges to require for entrance, not only information tests, but mental tests to determine the fitness of applicants for college training. In fact in some colleges the mental tests are considered much more valuable in determining the applicant's ability than his past record or entrance examination.

In the army mental tests were used very largely in determining where a man would be most effective.

These so-called "mental tests" are still in their infancy and they still have faults. These faults, however, are gradually being overcome and the intelligent use of psychological tests is undoubtedly of immense value.

Mental tests may be divided into two main types: Group tests, such as were used in the army and such as are used in colleges give a rough measure of the individual's ability to assimilate knowledge from lectures, books, etc., as ordinarly presented in the schools. They do not test all types of ability. A pupil of a mechanical turn of mind, artists and the like, might test low in the ordinary form of mental test and yet be masters in their own line.

A second form of test is the individual test. The most commonly used form is the Stamford Revision of the Binet-Simon Test. This gives quite accurate results and the mental capacity of the individual can be pretty well determined. This test requires an hour and a half to give and for accurate results must be given by a scientifically trained worker; in fact all standardized tests are of questionable value unless the one giving them has been trained to do the work properly.

None of these tests are expected to take the place of ordinary examinations given in the schools, but are of value in checking up and supplementing the teacher's judgment.

In general the questions used in standardized tests have been given to thousands and, in some cases, to millions of individuals before the standards are considered accurate. For example, in the Binet Test one of the questions asked of a three year old child is "Are you a little boy or a little girl?" This question has been asked of millions of children until it can be stated with accuracy that a normal three year old child should be able to answer the question properly.

In spelling, the thousand words most commonly used in the English language have been spelled under given conditions by millions of children until it can be definitely stated, for example, that 84 per cent of the second grade children should be able to spell "mother"; 99 per cent of the fourth grade children should be able to spell "mother"; 66 per cent of fourth grade children should be able to spell "vacation"; but 98 per cent of eight grade children should be able to spell "vacation." In all cases this is written spelling.

The value of using such tests was so evident after some preliminary work in 1921 that in September, 1922, the Board of Education of Berlin swured Mr. William Slade, Jr., of Columbia University, to take charge of this work in the Berlin schools. At the present time, with few exceptions, every pupil from the fourth to the ninth grade has been given at least one group psychological test and the supplementary tests in spelling, language, reading, addition, subtraction, multiplication, division, writing, and arithmetical reasoning. These tests are all on file, and for the period that they cover, form an enlightening school history of the individual. They have been of immense value in assisting the teacher, in classifying pupils, in determining the length of time to be given to various subjects on the daily program and in seeing, not only which individuals need help, but the specific type of help which they need.

A very important line of activity of this department has been in investigating the number of pupils who are capable of doing work at a more rapid rate than the average. It is our plan eventually to place these in special rooms and give them the special training needed.

Parents who have questions as to the progress of their children are always welcome and we not only invite, but we urge parents to meet with us and talk over and study the problems presented in their children.

I invite your attention to the reports of the departments which follow.

At the end of this report you will find a discussion of the financial situation.

PENMANSHIP REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I herewith submit my report as Supervisor of Penmauship in the Public Schools of Berlin since September 4, 1923.

This the age of utmost efficiency in everything. Until recent years the public schools were satisfied with the copy-book method of writing. Its one purpose was to secure absolute mechanical accuracy. Since then various systems have been introduced giving evidence of progress in the educational world.

Originally penmanship was one of the three fundamental subjects and as it must always occupy a very important place in the school curriculum, why should we not advance and have upto-date methods in this as well as in other subjects?

Muscular movement writing is a system that is universally found. Statistics show that over eighty per cent of the schools in the Unitd States teach the Palmer Method of Business Writing. It embodies these four essentials: legibility, rapidity, ease and endurance. Its chief aim is to improve the handwriting of the individual. It is self evident that penmanship is the most efficient vehicle of thought, and must be used in the social and

business world,

One hears occasionally that the typewriter has made the study of this subject unnecessary. It is fully recognized that it has won an important place, still this statement is misleading, as thinking educators realize that good handwriting will always be in demand. Evidence of this fact has been gathered through questionnaires that have been sent to business men.

It is interesting to note the development of penmanship in the past few years. Most systems, on being carefully examined, grade on legibility only. In the Palmer Method system the health and welfare of the pupil as well as his happiness are considered. His position is restful, his body entirely relaxed, his eyes the correct distance from his paper and his right arm resting on the large muscle of the forearm. These underlying principles are of vital importance in conserving good vision and general health.

Poor penmanship is still one of our greatest problems as it requires much time and effort to entirely do away with cramped positions and finger movement. Realizing this we are using methods and devices to encourage the pupils to use muscular movement in all written work. As stated before, the regular daily work as well as the penmanship lesson must be considered. In so far as this measures up to a certain standard, just so far is the work a success or failure. The work in general, however, shows a marked improvement. Much crdit is due the teachers who by their faithful cooperation are obtaining the good results. Many of the pupils are working for Palmer pins, which is a splendid means of creating enthusiasm.

Under the present schedule ninety minutes each week is given to the penmanship in the grades. I have a lesson each week in the first four grades and alternate weeks in grades four and six, outlining for the teachers the intervening lessons.

Many of the teachers, realizing the importance of good business writing, have taken advantage of the free correspondence course offered them. Miss Whitman and Miss Cunningham of the Junior High School have obtained their Palmer Method teachers', certificates.

At this time I wish to express my appreciation to the superintendent, tachers and all who have so generously cooperated in this work.

DRAWING REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I herewith submit my report as Suprvisor of Drawing in the Berlin Public Schools. The report dates from September 4, 1923.

"Art is not a thing to be done, but the best way of doing whatever has to be done." If this is true, Art has a very vital relation to verything we do. It touches the littl things of life as well as the large things. It influences the child in the schoolroom as well as the artist in the studio. In other words, "Art is not what we do, but how we do it."

The chief aim of drawing in the public schools is not "to produce artists," but we strive:

1. To cultivate keen observation and accuracy.

2. To develop the appreciation of the beautiful which may be put to practical use in everyday problems, such as matters of dress and home furnishings.

3. To encourage individuality.

All this may be accomplished whether or not the child has artistic ability.

The outline for the primary grades involves paper folding, freehand cutting and pasting. By means of this the reading and language lessons, games and occupations are illustrated. This work helps to make the pupil skillful with his hands and encourages neatness.

With the advance of the grade, more difficult problems in paper construction are made. During the fall and spring much time is given to nature drawing. In this work careful study is made of lines, proportions and color harmony and also to the development of design from nature forms. Some time is devoted to object drawing which gives the pupils a knowledge of the principles of perspective and enables them to put them to practical use.

Drawing may be correlated in various ways with the other subjects as geography, language and reading, thus creating a greater interest and fixing the lesson more clearly in mind.

Under the present schedule forty-five minutes at least each week is given to the drawing in the grades. I give a lesson alternate weeks in each grade and outline for the teachers the intervening lessons. Owing to the interest shown by the teachers and their willing cooperation, the work is being carried on with pleasing progress.

In conclusion, I wish to express my appreciation to the superintendent and teachers for their assistance and to all others who have cooperated in the work.

EVENING SCHOOL

To Superintendent Carl M. Bair:

I submit herewith the annual report of the George E. Burgess Memorial Evning School for the year ending January 31, 1924.

The Angel Guardian, Bartlett, Brown and Marston schools were opened September 17, 1923, for the registration of night school pupils. In compliance with the state regulations sixty sessions for the study of he English language and citizenship are held in Berlin each year.

The advanced course which was outlined in the report of last year continues. This is a beginning in the continuation plan and it is our hope that it will develop into greater extension work as time goes on.

At present the total registration is just three hundred. There are sixteen teachers who are following the prescribed course with very apparent results.

It is interesting to note that the reading table in the office of the night school is being used to advantage by the pupils and that there are one hundred forty-two books in our evening school library.

In conclusion, I wish to express my appreciation to you for the many courtesies extended throughout the year. I wish also to thank the Board of Education, the teachers and substitutes for their loyal support.

MUSIC SUPERVISOR'S REPORT

To Superintendent C. M. Bair:

I herewith submit my third annual report:

The teaching of music in the grade schools has been carried along much the same as last year. I have visited the schools and

have taught some of the classes. In other rooms the grade teachers very willingly gave a demonstration lesson.

From the information thus gathered I believe increased efficiency in singing and reading can be attained. The music in the first four grades is very good. Continued improvement will be the aim the coming year.

Twenty-six pupils of the grade schools are receiving instrumental instruction. There is one studying cornet; two, drums; and twenty-three in the violin classes. They are making commendable progress and in time will be in the Junior High School orchestra. In addition to the regular singing lessons in the Junior High School there is a Girls' Glee Club and a Boys' Glee Club. The girls are learning an operetta and the boys are preparing a minstrel sketch. The operetta and sketch will be given some time in March.

An orchestra of twenty-one players has been formed in the Junior High School. They are rehearsing every week and expect to make a public appearance some time in the spring.

Forty-one students of the Junior High School are receiving instrumental instruction: twenty-seven in three violin classes, five in cornet, two in clarinet, five in drums, one in 'cello and one in contrabass.

In the Senior High School the band, orchestra, glee club, harmony, music appreciation and instrumental classes meet regularly.

The orchestra has played for the Woman's Club of Gorham and the Woman's Club of Berlin. The orchestra gave a concert at Groveton, November 23, and one in the Berlin High School assembly hall, December 19. The orchestra has played for school assemblies, at the graduating exercises and the accompaniments of the opera "The Red Ear," which the Glee Club gave last April. There were over one hundred people in this very successful production.

The band played for the "County Fair," the Elks' Flag Day," for school assemblies and other school occasions. The band has given two concerts during the year.

More than a fourth of the total enrollment, approximately one hundred and sixty-three students, are taking advantage of the music instruction offered by the school.

I have not been able to begin the teaching of voice culture, because of lack of time. Voice culture has proved to be a very popular course in some of the large high schools. It trains stu-

dents to sing solos acceptably and even to hold paid positions in choirs. I hope to begin the work this year.

MUSIC IN THE GRADES

To Superintendent C. M. Bair:

I herewith submit my report as Assistant Supervisor of Music in the Berlin Public Schools.

The tone quality of the children in the grades and Junior High School, during the last year, has been quite good and there has been a decided improvement in the sight reading and ear training.

Each class below Junior High School has a twenty or twenty-five minute lesson in music every day. One lesson each week is taught by the assistant supervisor and the other four by the regular teacher, while Junior High School has one forty-five minute period per week.

A lesson in music appreciation is given once in four weeks. More can be done along this line when we have our own records which the children can hear frequently.

Last March the first six grades of the Berlin schools presented a pageant "Midsummer Night" and in April the Girls' Glee Club of the Junior High School gave a cantata "The Gipsy Queen."

As a whole the music of the grades and Junior High School is progressing favorably.

PHYSICAL TRAINING FOR GIRLS

The aim of gymnastics primarily is health. When applied to the public schools the exercises are constructed on physiological principles.

A selection of some sort must be made—one following some definite and scientific plan. I am using the "Hartwig-Nissen System," consisting of calisthenics, rythmics and marching. This might be expressed by this synopsis:

I. Attentive

A. Educational

B. Military

C. Esthetic

II. Recreative

A. Games and Dances

B. Sports

C. Athletics

The games and races which I have introduced have been most popular with all the different grades. In fact I have noticed the boys and girls playing by themselves both in and out of school hours and on the playground at recess time.

Up to this time I have spent fifteen minutes in every room each week, giving the lessons myself but from now on I shall go every other week to each school, teaching the model lesson for the first ten minutes and the teacher giving the review. By doing this I am hoping to make physical training mean more to each individual teacher and to install what is known as "Progression."

This means not only should the exercises within each day's lesson follow each other systematically but from lesson to lesson (from week to week), the movement should progress from the simplest, step by step, to the strongest. Progression should be made as rapid as possible to accomplish the most in the shortest time, yet I never leave an exercise, dance, race or game until the class can do it as well as their degree of physical culture at the time will permit.

HIGH SCHOOL

A physical and medical examination has been filed for each girl in the physical department as well as a medical certificate required from their own doctor for basket-ball.

Required gymnasium classes for the freshmen are held three times a week. There are 93 girls enrolled in this class. In the elective class, which also has three periods per week, there are 27 girls.

The class work covers setting-up exercises, apparatus work, marching, mat work, drills, games and dancing.

ATHLETICS

There are at least 150 girls out for basket-ball practice which comes every day and part time on Tuesday and Thursday mornings (extra).

Two teams are to be picked out from every class and soon our class games will be played.

The varsity team has already played two winning games and has a full schedule.

We are hoping to organize field hockey and a baseball team to play other schools in the same manner as basket-ball.

MEDICAL INSPECTION

I herewith submit my fourth annual report as school nurse for the public schools of Berlin:

With the opening of the schools in September work was continued as in previous years. The mornings were given to medical inspection, dental clinics, special calls, etc. The afternoons are assigned to the different school buildings where health subjects are discussed, height and weight taken, individual inspection made and minor cases treated.

Special health maps and weight records (which are sent to parents) have helped considerably with malnutrition cases and in keeping the children interested in their general health.

JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL

In January 1923 the junior high school was moved into the old high school building and everything augered well for a relief from the difficulties which previously handicapped the work. The relief was short-lived, however, as during the Easter vacation the building was completely destroyed by fire. Undaunted, the teachers took up the task of "carrying on" under more difficult handicaps than has hitherto been imposed. The fire occurred three days before schools were scheduled to reopen and it speaks well for the school department to state that the opening was not delayed, and the necessary books for the junior high work were provided in ample time. All class-room work was confined to four rooms on the second floor of the Marston school and in order to give each pupil his share of attention it was necessary to operate on a two-session plan. This did not cause any great hardship to the pupil although it did make it much more difficult for the teachers. The only alternative would have been to move into the new high school building, which would have disrupted their organization near the end of the school year and possibly have rendered it impossible for them to have completed their work.

During the summer months, by collaborating with the high school officials, a program was worked out for both schools whereby a two-session plan would make it possible to house both in the new building. This plan is working out very nicely and possibly with the least interference with the high school activities. The junior high school hours are from one to five p. m. for the academic part of the work. There is no doubt but that the pupils, especially the younger ones, can do better work in the mornings. They are fresher and more willing to work. Then, too, during the winter months it is quite dark by five p. m. and it is not a good practice to have the small children going home after dark. Another disadvantage of the present hours is that it is no longer possible to keep a pupil after hours for discipline or to help him or make him do his work. It is now necessary to have the pupil report back to school the following morning and in many cases he fails to do so. Everything possible is being done to get this work done, notices are sent to the parent stating when the pupil is supposed to report and in case he fails to report, the parent is again notified to that effect. This method is working out quite well and the response of the parents shows their interest in their children's welfare. The same method has been applied to the pupils who are irregular in attendance and while it takes more of the principal's time than referring these cases to the truant officer, the results are more immediate. Nevertheless, our attendance and make-up periods are not as successful as they ought to be.

One room is used in the Marston school for the Sewing Department and is is necessary to use the shops in the Marston and Burgess schools to carry on the Manual Training work with the boys, as the High School shops are not available.

The work for this school year started with four seventh grade teachers and four eighth grade teachers. It was soon necessary to add another seventh grade teacher to the force because of additions to the grade. At the present time all five seventh grades are filled to within one or two seats of capacity. In the eighth grade conditions are more easy and the four divisions of the grade established last September are still adequate to take care of the situation. In addition to these nine class room teachers the school has the service of two men teachers for the Manual Training work and one special teacher for the girls in Domestic Arts. The music supervisor is able to give instruction in music to each class once each week.

Although a penmanship supervisor is employed in the grades for some reason the junior high school seems to be eliminated from her responsibilities. There being a decided need of unified instruction in this branch the junior high school organization developed a program whereby, through the cooperation of the individual teachers, one teacher, herself experienced and trained in penmanship, is freed from her classes a part of each period and is thus able to impart instruction in penmanship for not less than two periods per week to every class.

Physical education is really more important for pupils of junior high age than for the older ones, as they are forming habits easily and need to be directed. Some provision has been made by the school department for caring for the grades and high school, but here again the junior high school appears to be "off the program." It devolved upon this organization to make it possible for the boys and girls attending junior high school to get their share of attention in physical education. The response was immediate and one of the manual training teachers took over the task of instructing the boys, while a History teacher and a French teacher have assumed responsibility for the girls. Money was raised by the pupils and a phonograph purchased, together with several sets of health building exercises. Today each pupil in junior high school gets one period of work in the gymnasium per week. The first third of the period is devoted to going through a series of exercises, the teacher leading and Walter Camp or some other equally famous physical instructor directing through the medium of the phonograph. The next fifteen minutes are devoted to instruction in the playing of games. as basket-ball, etc. Then in the last fifteen minutes each pupil takes a hot shower, followed by a cold one, dresses and is away to his class again. Towels are furnished and are used but once before they are sent to the school laundry where pupils delegated from the Domestic Arts Department wash and dry them daily. This has furnished a splendid opportunity to instruct the girls in the use of electrical laundry equipment and its care, at the same time impressing the necessity of cleanliness.

The social end of the school work has not been neglected. The French teacher has taken over the coaching and drilling for plays, etc. The cast is about ready for the presentation of the play "Daddy Long Legs"; one dance has been held and a number of other entertainments planned. The Girls' Glee Club, under the direction of the grade music supervisor, has a musical entertainment under way and the Boys' Glee Club is preparing a Minstrel Show.

In athletics the boys of the school maintained a football team last fall playing five games and winning four of them. Each division has a boy's and a girl's basketball team, each grade a team of each and there is a team of each that represents the school

as a whole. There are twenty hockey teams and spring will see three baseball teams developed. This large number of teams insures the opportunity for anyone who desires to participate. The school will be well represented in the various events at the carnival taking in the winter sports and a special school carnival will be held later, as was done last year.

There are a number of features of the junior high work that might well be brought to your attention. There are quite a number of pupils who have difficulty with the English language, especially Reading. To care for this group the Science teacher has organized them into a class which meets every morning at nine o'clock for an hour. In addition each teacher meets his or her pupils for special help at least three times a week. One teacher has even arranged to meet with pupils living at the upper end of town at the Brown school, thus making it very easy for every pupil to obtain plenty of assistance without much effort. The Manual Training teacher has grouped a number of the older boys of the seventh grade and is giving them instruction in practical carpentry. They have already experienced setting partitions, laying rafters, cutting in for dormer windows, etc., and will get much value from this work. The eighth grade boys have become quite proficient in mechanical drawing. It is customary for Manual Training teachers to complain that the pupil does not know what they think he should know. Instead of following the regular custom, our instructors meet their pupils two extra periods per week and at that time teach the things they want their pupils to know in order to do their work. These classes are known as classes in "Shop Mathematics." The Domestic Arts teacher operates in much the same way with her classes. The extra classes are called "Commercial Geography." This work includes study of the location of sources of material, manufactured products, means of identification and other allied matter.

Assemblies are held twice each month. The particular purpose of these assemblies is to build up an esprit de corps and to stimulate interest in certain school subjects. The mere bringing of the school together, addressing them on some subject of common interest, singing a few songs and making any necessary announcement helps much to make an improved morale and a good spirit. To make the assemblies directly related to class-room work and arouse enthusiasm over a particular school subject has been the duty of the teachers. Each teacher has to prepare a program and is expected to present material in such a way as to stimulate interest in the subject. Let me illustrate: Each Mathe-

matics teacher is required to drill each class daily in the fundamental operations. To the pupil this part of the work soon becomes routine and without interest. At a recent assembly the best ten pupils of the seventh grade were pitted against the best ten of grade eight in a speed and accuracy test. Both classes knew of the impending contest weeks ahead and so had a motive for striving. They know that there will be another mathematics assembly before the school year closes and both classes are particularly keen to win. At the recent assembly as much enthusiasm was developed by the whole school over the arithmetic contest as would in many instances be developed by a basket-ball or other game.

Spelling is not only taught by the English teacher but by every teacher, particularly those words peculiar to her subject. This insures a large amount of attention to this subject and emphasises the words that the pupil has to use. A splendid example of correlation and cooperation is illustrated in the sewing course and eight grade English. Each week the sewing teacher requires a written composition on some phase of the work taught in class, especially her commercial geography, from each pupil. These compositions are then turned over to the English teacher who notes the errors in English and grades them for the mark in composition. The sewing teacher then grades them according to the value of their subject matter. This does away with a lot of duplication and holds the pupil up to her best in all written work. There are several other instances of notable correlation of work and cooperation of teachers in the school. The history teachers are developing a system of student government. Our hours complicate the situation somewhat, as much work must be done after school hours and that is impossible for the pupils, especially during the winter months. We are hoping to find a way to do this work successfully.

The Principal holds regular conferences with the individual pupils. The pupil meets the Principal in the office and various activities of the pupil are discussed very informally. Information is at hand giving the following data: previous schooling, school success, special difficulties to school progress, parentage, nationality, birthplace, age, mental age, intelligence quotient, past illnesses, attitude toward music, amount and kind of home reading, hobbies, favorite pastime, etc. The judgment of his teachers and his own statements assist in determining his attitude toward further school work. If the pupil has the inclination to continue and his home conditions are such as would make this possible, that

matter is discussed and his aspirations for himself on leaving school considered. With all this information at hand he is advised as to what course to follow in high school.

It seems almost unnecessary to add that the Junior High School teachers are proud of their organization and of the success that has deservedly attended their efforts. The pupils also have developed a strong attachment to the school. I am proud to be its principal and as such, I am particularly proud of my teachers and pupils for the wonderful spirit and comraderie they have developed. It may be equalled elsewhere, but it cannot be surpassed. I want to take this opportunity to express my appreciation for the assistance of the Research Department. Consultations have proved of inestimable value concerning individual pupils—behavior, subject matter and methods of instruction. The teachers have come to depend on the reports of the analyses that come from this department and welcome the criticisms as they are constructive and helpful to them.

In closing, I wish to thank our Superintendent for his support and the School Board for their interest in the Berlin Junior High School. I do not feel that as much attention has been given to our Junior High School as has been given to other parts of the school system, nor has adequate recognition of the work done and its success been shown. I attribute this to force of circumstances rather than neglect and am glad of this opportunity to call your attention to our organization.

Report of Headmaster.

Berlin, N. H., February 1, 1924.

To Superintendent Carl M. Bair:

I, herewith, submit my eleventh annual report as headmaster of the Berlin Senior High School.

REGISTRATION

The total registration for the school year ending June, 1923, was 522 pupils, 246 boys and 276 girls. Table I. gives the registraion in full. The total enrollment of the Senior High School to date for the year 1923-1924 is 526 pupils, 247 boys and 279 girls, indicated in full in Table II. Twelve pupils who left school last year due to sickness and other causes have returned.

The registration of the class of 1927 for the school year 1923-1924 is as follows: From the public schools 114, left school year 1922-1923 and returned 1, repeating the year 6, from the St. Patrick's school 31, from St. Regis Academy 10, and from outside schools 8, a total of 170 pupils, 79 boys and 91 girls.

Seventy-four pupils graduated in June, 1923. Table IV. gives a full report of the activities of the members of this class since graduation. It will be seen from this table that 47 per cent. entered colleges and training schools as compared with 43 per cent. for 1922, 30 per cent. for 1921 and 26 per cent. for 1920. There are 68 pupils in the senior class that will graduate in June, 1924.

ORGANIZATION

For the school year 1923-1924 the pupils of the Junior High School have been housed in the new building due to the loss by fire of the old high school building. As a result the hours of the Senior High School had to be changed in order to meet this new situation. School for the Senior High School begins at 7:40 a. m., and closes at 12:45 p. m., giving fifteen minutes for the Senior High School pupils and teachers to close their work and leave the building so as to give time for the Junior High School to begin work at 1:00 p. m., and close at 5:00 p. m.

As a result of this change of time the school had to face and solve the problem of tardiness which always gives trouble even in a well organized school that begins work as early as 8:00 a. m. To date our records show that 261 pupils have been tardy 637

times. Since the opening of the school in September I have had personal interviews with the following number of different pupils for tardiness, 72 pupils once, 19 pupils twice, 3 pupils three times and 2 pupils four times. Also I have written 113 letters to parents and as a result have received in turn 24 written replies and 12 personal calls from the parents at my office concerning the above. It has been very gratifying to me to have received this cooperation on the part of the parents because without this help our tardiness would have easily been double what the records now show.

Another problem under the new arrangement of having two schools use the same building was that of having two teachers with their respective pupils using the same room and equipment. In order to prevent any misunderstanding on the part of the teachers concerning the condition of rooms and equipment, the head janitor inspects the building at the close of each school session and makes a daily report to the office on a prepared form stating the condition of all parts of the building as found by him at the time. As a result of this arrangement, it has been possible to keep the building and new equipment in first-class condition.

In order to provide for the seven periods of regular high school work, it was necessary to shorten the time of the class room periods. Because of the time lost by these short periods, it became necessary to give special attention more than ever before to the preparation and management of the make up schedule. This schedule provides that all the senior high school teachers return two days each week from 2:00 to 3:30 p. m., to help pupils that need special attention, those making up lost work due to absence and pupils doing unsatisfactory work because of the lack of the right kind of outside study and preparation. A system has been established at the office whereby it is possible to find out how many afternoons any one student has remained and also the number of pupils receiving attention by the different teachers over any given period of time. The result of this work for the past nineteen weeks has been put in the form of a condensed table and very interesting graphs have been plotted. This data shows in a very simple form just how much serious attention each teacher has given this matter. From these graphs a comparison of the work of the different teachers can easily be made.

I am in hopes that the new Junior High School building will be ready for occupancy next fall in order that the work of the Senior High School can be conducted as originally planned. In so doing such problems as I have outlined will be solved and the scholastic standard raised.

An honor system has been organized by the teachers of the Senior High School giving credit to all pupils that show merit in their work and conduct, both in and out of class.

MECHANIC ARTS

The machines in the machine shop have now been installed by the boys and have given them a practical experience and at the same time saved the City a considerable sum of money. The work benches, tool room cabinets and tool boards have also been constructed and organized by these boys. The following projects have been completed and will show the type of work that these boys are doing in the shops. Scientific apparatus for Brown Co., 1 4 ft. saw arbour with balance wheel and pulley, 30 music racks and standards for school orchestra, I flag staff holder for high school auditorium, 1 rock mortar complete with pestle for geology work in Science Department, 10 drawing room stools for Mechanical Drawing Department of Junior High School, 60 braces and brackets for drawing tables, I gas heating box for Woodworking Department, repairing hose nozzles for Berlin Fire Department. 10 handy anvils for household use, made from old railroad rails. 3 vise screws and nuts, 3 washing machines reconstructed from hand to motor drive. At the present time the boys are working on the following projects, bench lathe, drill press and emery grinder and also a large cast iron surface table 6 by 3 feet, for general laying out of work in the machine shop.

In the same way the boys have had the experience of installing the machines in the mill room. In this department a complete record is kept of all the projects that go through the shop. This record shows the amount of time spent, the material used and the actual cost of the project. From these records we find that the school has made a saving of \$3,400.00 based on a very conservative estimate. Besides this a saving of \$3,200.00 was made by buying our lumber by the carload. The following projects will give an idea of the type of work that is being done by the boys in the wood shop and mill room. Bulletin boards built and installed throughout the school, blackboards framed and installed in all basement classrooms, domestic science kitchen fitted with sink frames, shelves, partition, racks, etc., stage property constructed for the numerous plays, locker seats designed and built for the boys' dressing room, shower bath seats built in all the girls' showers, three dozen hurdles designed and constructed for athletic department, music stands constructed for music room, display cabinets and a large geological specimen cabinet installed in science department, a large three tier sectional platform, covering the

entire stage in the auditorium for graduation exercises. All of the mill work for the grade shops is now done by the High School classes.

We can well be proud of our shops and the type of work that the boys are now doing. I wish to make the following recommendations. In order to take care of the large classes in the machine shop, I recommend that the old belt driven machines that are now in storage be sold and the money be used to install a few additional machines in our machine shop; that a blower system be installed in the millroom to take care of the chips and dust that are given off by the machines. This will not only save time on the part of the pupils cleaning up, but will also give protection against the inhaling of dust and dirt by both the pupils and the instructors.

DOMESTIC ARTS

All girls of the first year classes of the Senior High School are required to take household economics. This work was placed under the direction of Miss Marble who has aroused interest among the girls and whose work is highly commendable. plan is to have classes in household economics elective and open to the girls in all the other departments of the school.

The first semester has been devoted to cookery. The aim of the lessons has been to teach the girls the proper method of combining the different ingredients so as to obtain the most satisfactory results. Only one or two examples of each method being taken up. The place in the diet and the purpose of each thing made was also discussed. Special emphasis has been laid upon the varying of recipes; that is, making such changes as are necessary to be suited to the time of year and the family income. A thorough study of table service has also been taken up. The girls have had a chance to put their knowledge into actual practice, at such occasions as the athletic banquet, the luncheon served to the councilmen and their own class luncheons.

The next semester is to be devoted to sewing and millinery. The girls will be taught all the stitches, the fundamental principles of garment construction and as much as possible of dress design. The aim of the lessons is to enable the girls to satisfactorily make their own clothing and to be efficient buyers. In millinery the different stitches and processes of hat construction will be studied. Suitable shapes, materials, and colors will also be taken up.

COMMERCIAL

The aim of the commercial department is to make the work

practical and to bring the students into direct touch with the business world. The business men of the city are invited to visit the school and give talks to the commercial classes on various phases of business. During the past year the following lectures were given to the members of the senior commercial class. Mr. R. McMasters, Manager, Gregg Publishing Co., Boston, Mass.; Mr. James W. Brehaut, Principal, Bryant & Stratton Business College, Manchester, N. H.; Mr. George A.: Dickey, State Agent, Provident Life Insurance Co., Manchester, N. H.; Mr. F. J. Snyder, representative of the South-Western Publishing Co., Cincinnati, Ohio; Mr. Thomas A. Barril, Gen. Agt. Mutual Life Insurance Co., of New York, Rochester, N. H.; Mr. W. H. Gerrish, City; Mr. John Goss, City; Mr. Robertson, representative of the Bentley School of Accounting & Finance, Boston, Mass. Mr. M. H. Taylor, Cashier, Berlin National Bank, gave a series of three very interesting lectures on banks and banking. Mr. F. C. Hannah, Cashier, City National Bank, also gave an able lecture on the same subject.

The use of lantern slides and illustrated lectures, furnished by the U. S. Forestry Department, were used in connection with various subjects in economics, and while studying the subject of industries, frequent use was made of motion picture films furnished by the General Electric Co., of Schedectady, N. Y. The use of films and illustrated lectures in visualizing these subjects in economics proved to be of much interest and help to the pupils.

The latter part of last year the Commercial Club held a typewriting contest of the schools of Coos County in the auditorium of the Berlin Senior High School. The same type of enthusiasm and interest was shown by the teachers and the pupils as one would find at any athletic contest. The present plan is to make this an annual event.

At the annual meeting held on November 1, 1923, by the senior commercial pupils, the following officers of the Berlin School Bank were elected: President, C. M. Bair, Supt. of Schools; 1st Vice President, M. H. Taylor, Cashier of the Berlin National Bank; 2nd Vice President, D. W. MacLean; Treasurer and Cashier, N. H. Roberts; Board of Directors: C. M. Bair, M. H. Taylor, D. W. MacLean, Lillian Buntin, Samuel Moschovitz.

Mr. Roberts, treasurer and cashier, is under bonds to the city for the funds of the bank, and the accounts are open to the inspection of the State Bank Commission.

The work of the Berlin School Bank has been very highly commended by business men and others from all parts of the

country who have visited our high school.

SCIENCE

The work of the science department is of much higher type than ever before and the students and teachers are taking advantage of the opportunity afforded them by our laboratories and equipment. This year Mr. Thompson has taken advantage of the collective instinct of the boys and has utilized it, and is now having the boys collect and bring to school a collection of minerals that they are exhibiting in cabinets in the physics laboratory. One large cabinet is filled with rock and mineral specimens. The aim of the department is to interest the pupils in making collections of their own. Nothing contributes more to a pupil's interest and desire to learn than a hobby of collecting something, whether it be moths, postage stamps or any other material in which interest is aroused. For example, several boys have already started their own mineral collection and have bought apparatus and chemicals for analysis of same. Other cabinets containing exhibits showing the various processes in the manufacture of paper, cement, soap, baking powder, rubber, woolen and cotton fabrics, fertilizer and other common products are already on display.

A Science Club assembly was held recently in which two teams

of six pupils each, discussed the contributions of physics and chemistry to civilization. Through the generosity of the American Chemical Society, six \$20.00 prizes have been offered to high school students with a chance for a scholarship at Yale or Vassar, for the best essays on the contributions of chemistry to the different phases of life. Eight pupils have already enrolled for the contest.

SOCIAL ACTIVITIES

The following clubs and organizations have played a very important part in the make up of the social life of the school: Athletics; football, basketball, baseball, track, tennis, hockey; organization; school paper, bank, ushers, lunch room, school pianists, junior recital. Class officers, athletic association; music; band, orchestra, Glee Club, Scholastic Clubs; Societas Latina, Mechanic Arts Club, Commercial Club, Forum, Entre Nous, Polytechnical Society, Dramatic Club and Art Club.

Space will not permit a detailed report of events of these clubs for the past year but in passing I will state that they have functioned in a high degree in raising the moral and scholastic standard of the school as a whole. In order to limit the number of activities that any one pupil may participate in and thereby to encourage the interest of all the pupils in these different activities, the control has been organized under the direction of a committee made up of teachers and pupils. After a careful investigation the committee allotted a maximum number of points that any one pupil could receive in one school year. The value in points of each activity has been determined by the actual time it requires of the pupil outside his regular school work.

ASSEMBLIES

The schedule for the school assemblies has been planned for the year. They are conducted by the pupils under the direction of different social organizations of the school. Pupils take great delight in this work and always look forward with interest and pleasure to the different programs.

ATHLETICS

All the boys and girls of the first year are required to take physical training and to receive both medical and physical examination. The regular work of these classes consists of calisthenics, mat work, marching, drills, dancing and games. Corrective work for good posture is also being done along with the class room work. Our new gymnasium is practically used every period of

the day as follows: 7:45 to 12:45 p. m., by physical training classes of the Senior High School, 1:00 to 3:30 p. m., physical training classes of the Junior High School and from 3:30 to 6:00, basketball practice for the Senior High School and from 6:00 to 8:00 p. m., basketball practice for the Junior High School. Several elective classes have been started this year for those students who have decided to continue with their work in physical education.

During the year the physical training classes gave an exhibition in the auditorium showing the type of work accomplished by the students of the different classes. The following is the result of the different branches of sports for the past year.

At the present time there are 150 girls out for basketball practice and of the 248 boys in school 150 have reported for at least one sport. Through the efforts of the Athletic Department of the school an interscholastic track and field meet was held here at Berlin last May in which over 100 boys from the schools of Maine, Vermont and New Hampshire competed. The athletic meet will become permanent and will go far toward creating a friendly feeling among the schools and parents of the children of this section.

One of the great problems in running athletic contests here in Berlin is to collect money from the people who attend the games because there is no way of enclosing the field where the games are played. However, the Athletic Association had a balance in the school bank on January 1, 1924, of \$193.99 after paying for the new equipment that was needed to carry on successfully the games during the football season.

DEAN OF GIRLS

Mrs. Butterfield who has acted in the capacity of Dean of girls, has done excellent work. The organization calls for one individual conference with each junior girl and two with each senior girl during the school year. The result of these conferences are carefully filed and tabulated. The primary purpose of these conferences is to learn if the girls' work is properly adjusted but incidentally assistance is frequently given regarding

present problems or future plans.

In this work Mrs. Butterfield meets with problems of the following type. A girl may need first aid; she may need attention of the school nurse, who must be summoned; she may have been reported by a teacher as needing advice in the greater care of her body appearance; she may seem sluggish in her work, and some explanation must be found; she may need a kindly suggestion because of heedless conduct or misguided notions, or hers may be a problem which she would prefer to discuss with a mature woman rather than the Headmaster. So well has this section become organized that a great many girls return even after graduation to consult with Mrs. Butterfield.

MUSIC

The music under the direction of Mr. Goldthwaite is now well established. The high school orchestra consisting of approximately 38 pieces and the band of 31 members have made a remarkable advance. These music organizations have made the following public appearances, Teachers' Institute at Berlin, Gorham Women's Club, Berlin Women's Club, Educational Week at Groveton, N. H., Elks' Flag Day Exercises and other concerts given at the school.

The Glee Club consisting of approximately 36 members are now preparing for an opera to be given some time next term. It is very gratifying to know that there are approximately 68 pupils not including the orchestra, band or Glee Club, that are receiving instruction in music.

SCHOOL LIBRARY

The school library is now being ably handled under the direction of Miss O'Shea. The records show that there is an average of 484 pupils that come to the library each week. The library gives all the pupils in the school an opportunity to keep in touch with the latest and best type of reference books, magazines and essays. From my observation I would say that the pupils not only appreciate and enjoy their library but they are forming habits that will be of great use to them later in life.

The library is well quipped with reference books, history books and magazines. At the present time we have about 400 books of fiction on our shelves and we find that this, even with the books of fiction in the public library, is not an adequate number for the pupils. Each student in the English classes in the Senior High School has to read and make a report on six books during a year. In order to cover this work, I recommend

that we buy at least 100 new books on fiction.

JANITOR SERVICE

We have many out of town visitors including deputies of the State Department during the past year and in all cases these visitors have not only complimented Berlin upon its new building and fine equipment but upon the fine condition they have found the building. This is practically due to the first class service that has been given by the janitors of our building. They need to be congratulated upon the fine spirit and interest that they have always shown toward their work.

SCHOOL PAPER

The school paper, The Meteor, was first published in 1922. The subscription list showed at once that this publication was to receive the enthusiastic support of the students and there hasnever been an issue when nearly every student in the school was not a subscriber. At present 650 copies are printed.

The material is all contributed by the students under the efficient supervision of Mrs. Butterfield, head of the English department. This work is representative of every class and group in the school and affords much valuable practice in composition.

Much benefit is derived from reading the exchanges from other schools. At present this list numbers about seventy-five papers, extending from Eastport, Maine, to Oakland, California and Hoquian, Washington.

The business management gives the boys and girls a very valuable experience in estimating costs and receipts as well as soliciting advertisements and accounting for the funds. The paper has always been run on a business basis and on no issue has there been a deficit. The total amount of money handled for the issues of 1922-1923 was approximately \$1,100.00.

PARENTS' NIGHT

On the evening of January 23rd over a thousand parents and pupils listened to a program conducted by the teachers and students of the different school activities. The first part of the evening was spent in the auditorium where the parents heard the school orchestra, an old fashioned spelling match, a typewriting contest, a French play and a little sketch given by the Dramatic Club. After this the parents were conducted by the student guides through the classrooms, laboratories and shop where they had the opportunity of meeting the teachers and watching their own boys working at different machines in the shops. Finally

all gathered in the gymnasum where they watched the regular work and games of the different classes in physical training, after which they were served light refreshments that were prepared by the girls of the Domestic Arts Department. It was very gratifying to note how the parents responded to this invitation as this, without question, was the largest representative group of parents that the school has had the privilege of showing about the building.

FINANCIAL REPORT

Those who have watched the progress of the city have been frequently surprised at the increasing school expenditures. The accompanying graph on per capita cost illustrates the very rapid increase in costs. Our increase has been both in gross expenditures and in per capita expenditure.

The increase in gross expenditures can be accounted for by two items (1) the increase in the cost of all items of the budget. Supplies, teachers' salaries, operation, have all shown a rapid rate of increase particularly since the war. (2) the very rapid increase in enrollment particularly in the high schools. We feel that the increased expenditures have been perfectly justified upon two grounds: That we are doing more things for the benefit of the children than we ever did before and we are doing them better than we ever did before.

The percentage of costs of the four main items of the budget are illustrated by Chart XV. In 1913 approximatey 70 per cent. of our total expenditures was paid for instruction; in the present year 60 per cent. was paid for the same work. In 1913 almost 11 per cent. was paid for control and in 1923 only 4 per cent. In other words, the proportion of our expenditures devoted to instruction and control has decreased materially. On the other hand, in 1913 13 per cent. of our expenditures was paid for operation and in the past year 18 per cent; in 1913 6.6 per cent. was paid for maintenance and auxiliary Agencies while at the present time we are spending more than 17 per cent. The increased proportion for operation is due, more than any other thing, to the support of the magnificent new high school building. The increase in auxiliaries has been largely due to the cost of new activ-

ities. In 1913 we had no research department, we had no head tax, we carried on no evening school, we spent only a very small amount for medical inspection and transportation. During the past year these items alone amounted to almost \$20,000.00, two-thirds of our total budget for 1913.

The Berlin children are provided with facilities for training unequaled in the state. We have fine buildings, a broad course of study, special attention to the development of leadership and vocational guidance, physical training, medical inspection, a teaching force which in training and experience is very unusual. These factors must be paid for and account for the increase in expenditures.


One other factor that must be kept constantly in mind is the change in the cost of living, a graph of which accompanies this report.

We believe that at the present time it would be undesirable to start new lines of activity and that the next year or two should be a period of assimilation rather than a period of expansion. Therefore our budget for the coming year shows a slight decrease from the preceding one and there is no intent to branch out into new lines of activity. On the other hand, our purpose is to stabilize and make efficient the work that is already started. We expect to make every dollar go as far as possible in this program.





The percentage of expenditures for Control and Instruction have gone steadily down since 1913. Operation, maintenance and auxiliaries require an increased percentage of the budget.


ONE ITEM IN THE INCREASED COST OF SCHOOLS Chart XVI

Pubic Works Department

Berlin, N. H., Jan 31, 1924

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin: Gentlemen:

The following is the report of the Public Works Department for the year ending January 31, 1924.

In submitting to you this report, and for the purpose of condensing same as much as possible, I shall not give you all of the many different jobs and cost of same in detail, but will state briefly some of the larger expenditures in this department during the past year.

Anyone wishing to know the cost of the differnt jobs which are not mentioned in this report will gladly be shown at any time the books kept by the Public Works Department, which shows all work that has been done and the cost of same.

All of the new work this year was carried on under the budget system, and has been completed very satisfactorily. All of the work laid out to be done has been finished, and owing to the many and urgent demands of some of the tax-payers, a large amount of the permanent work was increased to a greater extent than was formerly planned to do.

This department has spent a large amount of money this last year, but when the citizens in general look the city over and see the great amount of permanent work done this season; namely in streets, sidewalks and sewers, we think as a whole they are well satisfied.

It should be understood that there is no city in New England that costs as much to do work in as in our city, owing to the mountainous location and the solid ledge, almost invariably encountered in building our streets, sewers and sidewalks.

If the city officials will only continue this permanent work for a few years more, as they have in the past years, we will have a city to be proud of, as our streets and sidewalks, with a few exceptions, compare favorably with other New England cities at the present time.

I will mention some of the larger and most costly of the permanent jobs done this year under the budget system.

Pleasant Street Extension

One of the most necessary and best pieces of work done this year was the completion of Pleasant Street Extension. It has not only relieved the congested traffic in that district, but has added much to the appearance of our city.

The cost of this job was \$12,329.69. This cost includes a heavy fill, two concrete retaining walls with pipe railings, cement sidewalks, catch basins and drainage pipes to care for the surface water and bituminous concrete paying for the streets.

School Street

The permanent work on School street was continued again this year and was completed as far as First street. A heavy concrete wall had to be built on the east side of the street for a long distance. A large amount of grading had to be done, of which a part of same was ledge, a concrete sidewalk laid on one side of the street and tar concrete sidewalk on east side of the street. Catch basins were installed to take care of the surface water and the street paved with bitiminous concrete. The cost of this work was \$10,961.99.

Champlain Street

This was a very expensive street to build. A large amount of ledge had to be blown out before this street could be graded. Sewer and water pipes had to be relaid in some parts of this street. Two cement sidewalks were built, one from Mason to Merrimac street, and one from Stafford to Merrimac and the whole street paved with bituminous concrete paving, from Mason street, 200 feet south of Merrimack street. This work cost

Stafford Street

This street was graded and laid down with concrete bituminous paving from Burgess to Hillsboro street. It took a large amount of grading for this job, as this part of Stafford street is on a very steep grade. The reason for paving this street at this time was to keep the heavy rain storms from washing it out, causing a heavy maintenance expense to keep it passable. The cost of this job was \$3,145.71.

Clarke Street

From First avenue to Third avenue. It was planned to do this work only to the top of the hill, just beyond Second avenue. Later it was decided to finish this street to Third avenue, increasing the cost of this job about one-third.

There was a large ledge projecting out into the street, nearly one-half the width of the street for some distance. This had

to be taken out and new culverts built to take care of the surface water and a brook which crosses this street. A concrete curb was built on the south side from First avenue to Second and a big amount of grading and filling on the north side from Second avenue to Third avenue. The street was paved with bituminous concrete. This was another of our very heavy grade streets and has cost the city a lot of money to maintain it. The cost of this work was \$9.417.74.

Church Street

This was the largest and most expensive of the permanent jobs done this season. While the demand for a better street has been somewhat urgent at times, we think the property owners on this street as a whole, have been very patient, as this street is all built up with some of the best homes in the city.

It was planned before this work was started to pave this street with bituminous concrete to the top of the hill near the residence of Mr. Fred Rahmanop and the balance of the street was to be built with water-bound macadam.

After this part of the bituminous concrete was finished, the demands on the Public Works Department was so great for a permanent street, that the matter was brought up before the Mayor and Council and it was voted by the Council to continue this street with bituminous concrete as far as Portland street and down Portland to High street. To do this work a large amount of grading had to be done, sidewalks had to be rebuilt and covered in many places, catch basins and sewer pipes were laid to take care of the water and 6454.9 yards of bituminous concrete paving was laid. The distance was some over 1800 feet in length. The cost of the work was \$21,034.80.

Portland Street

This is that part of Portland street from Church to High street. A lot of ledge had to be blasted out to grade this street, water and sewer pipes had to be relaid deeper. A concrete cement sidewalk was built on each side of the street, and the street was paved with bituminous concrete, the same as Church street at a cost of \$2,761.82.

Seventh and Norway Streets

This work was done on that part of Seventh street from Main to Norway street. This was a very muddy street in wet weather, and it was decided to pave same with bituminous concrete. After this paving was finished it was decided to continue this paving up Norway street past the Lutheran church property, this was done and also some additional sidewalks built. The total cost of this work was \$4.774.21.

I will state briefly the principle maintenance accounts:

Street Maintenance

This is the largest account in this department. It includes the repairs and upkeep of all our city streets. Sweeping and cleaning as well as sprinkling and oiling, removing snow, cutting ice and sanding sidewalks, taking care of surface water, cleaning out catch basins, painting and repairing fences, guard rails and bridges. The cost of same this year amounted to \$43,990.43.

This was some increase over last year, owing to the heavy fall of snow last winter and the keeping open of all our streets so as automobiles could be used throughout the city. Each year new streets are being built in outlying districts, as well as special attention given to all of our old streets.

Road Maintenance

This is the second largest account in the general maintenance department. This includes all the repairs and maintenance of our country roads outside the city limits as well as bridges and culverts on same. Special attention and a lot of work has to be done owing to the heavy truck traffic which is fast increasing over these roads.

The cost was about the same as last year namely \$6,379.05.

Sewer Maintenance

There has been a decrease in this account this year of \$1,456.49 owing to the fact that a great deal of work has been done on our old sewers the last year or two, putting in a great many manholes, so as to get at the sewers without digging up streets in case of trouble.

We find this has been money well invested. Cost of this account this year \$2,948.65.

Garbage and Incinerator Plant

We find that the garbage collection is growing larger every year. The cost of collecting same and burning at incinerator plant was \$10,466.27, an increase of \$1,245.13 over last year.

Collection of Ashes

This account runs about the same as last year, an increase of \$69.58. This year the account amounted to \$2,448.22.

Office

This account this year shows a saving of \$903.00 over last year, due to the fact that we got along with one less man in this

department. The account is made up of the Commissioner of Public Works salary, also the salary of the bookkeeper and time-keeper and all supplies used in the office. The cost of same \$4.105.12.

Engineering

The cost of the engineering department this year was about the same as last year, namely \$3,402.72.

Patching Account

This includes the patching of Main street and all old water-bound macadam roads and streets which need a great deal of attention, to keep them in proper condition for travel. The cost of same was \$1,876.14. This is done with tar compound mixed with fine crushed rock, sand and gravel.

Tools and Equipment

This account is somewhat larger owing to the buying of the new pick-up motor sweeper, at a cost of \$6,800.00. I think this will prove a good investment for the City, as our streets can be kept clean at a much lower cost than sweeping by hand the old way.

The cost of this account amounted to \$9,693.98.

Bituminous Concrete Paving

There was laid this year 18,577 square yards of bituminous concrete paying, nearly twice as much as last year.

Making a total length of sewers laid this year of 6,337 feet. Owing to the great demand of our tax-payers for more work to be done in our city this year, the mile of concrete cement road which was to be built on the East Side trunk line was cancelled. Arrangements were made with Mr. Everett, state commissioner, to

complete this work this year, as far as Milan line. This will necessitate building about two miles, and plans for this work are now being completed in the office of the State Highway Department in Concord, N. H.

The work also to be done on the West Milan road last season was carried over for the same purpose and will be completed this season, by special agreement with Mr. Everett.

In closing, I wish to express my thanks to the Mayor, City Council, Public Works Committee, and the City Engineer for the many courtesies shown me in the performance of my duties.
