## REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD.

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Comparing the work of the past year with that of previous years, we are able to report commendable progress. Of the ten teachers employed, five have had previous experience and four have been in the service of the district the entire year. We have endeavored to retain continuously the services of desirable teachers, for we believe that better results are obtained.

The registers show a large percentage of tardiness and days of absence. We think to blame the parents for the irregular attendance, and if they wish to elevate our schools, they must insist upon their children attending school every day, and in that way children will learn.

We have placed Supplementary reading books in all the schools, which we consider useful and instructive. The Milne arithmetic was ordered last year, and they were to be paid for this year, which makes our bill for books \$73.92. Our text-books now are modern books.

We have used \$31.36 of the school money in repairing the Bog schoolhouse, and we would suggest that a sufficient sum be raised to shingle the Wood Hill schoolhouse and to make such other repairs as economy may suggest.

We wish to express our gratitude to all who have assisted us in any way in the discharge of our duties.

### BOW MILLS.

This school, for the past two years, was taught by Miss Florence N. Adams of Manchester. She is a teacher of experience and capability.

Miss Adams gave such good satisfaction the first year that she was employed again for the second. The school made good improvement under her instruction.

## WOOD HILL.

Spring term was taught by Mrs. Clara J. Little of Manchester, who is a teacher of much experience. She worked faithfully among her pupils, and advancement was made.

Fall term was taught by Miss Grace G. Knight, a graduate of the seminary at Exeter. Miss Knight is a modern teacher. Her school closed showing that good results had been accomplished.

## NORTH BOW.

Spring and fall terms were taught by Miss Sarah E. Perkins of Dunbarton. The examination at the close of the spring term showed that both teacher and pupils had done their work well. The fall term was closed prematurely owing to the illness of the teacher. The parents desire that she may return in the spring to complete her work.

## RIVER ROAD.

The spring term was taught by Miss Mabelle Farnum of Concord. Fair progress was made in most of the studies, and general satisfaction was given.

The fall term was taught by Miss Jennie Young of Manchester. This was Miss Young's first experience at teaching. She labored hard for the good of the school, with excellent results.

## WHITE.

Both terms were taught by Mrs. W. P. Dow. Mrs. Dow has taught many schools in this and other towns, and in this school has sustained her former reputation as a first-class teacher.

## SOUTH BOW.

Spring term taught by Miss Jessie G. Colby of this town. This was her first attempt. The scholars made good improvement under her charge, and the school appeared well at the close. Fall term taught by Miss Mabel D. Lantry of Hooksett. This was her first experience in teaching. She seemed to have the good will of her scholars, and we consider that the term was a very profitable one.

## BOG DISTRICT.

Spring and fall terms taught by Miss Lillian C. Rainey of Hooksett. This was her first attempt at teaching. She labored hard for the best interest of the school, and succeeded far beyond our expectations, and we can truly say that the school was a perfect success.
