THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Danville, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, the 9th of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To hear the report of the budget committee and act thereon.
3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for same.
4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to repair the several highways and bridges.
5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money necessary to obtain State aid on either new construction or town road maintenance.
6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for snow paths.
7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Public Library.
8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used in improving the cemeteries.

9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the observance of Memorial Day.

10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money for the use of the town.

11. To see how much of the Parsonage Funds the town will vote to spend for preaching for the year ensuing.

12. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Danville:

It is with pleasure that I submit my first annual report as Superintendent of your schools.

Although I have been working with your school for a period of only two months, an endeavor will be made to present the usual interesting statistics for the school year 1941-42, as well as some facts pertaining to the present school year.

Miss Rita Tracy, a Boston University graduate in the elementary curriculum, from Belmont, Massachusetts, replaced Miss Amy Shunaman in grades five to eight, and Miss Lillian Witherell continues as teacher of the primary grades.

The town is very fortunate in having such a well managed school. During my visits there a very wholesome attitude on the part of the pupils is noticed. The rooms are attractive and neat, and lessons seem to be well prepared by the teachers, and a general atmosphere of happiness and industry prevails.

All pupils in the first and second grades have been equipped with the most modern of reading materials, which have replaced outmoded and worn books. Although the school is in good condition generally, and is functioning efficiently, there should be something done in the way of insulating the building to make for more efficient and more economical heating.

The article in the warrant asking for additional funds for this purpose should, if acted upon favorably, prove to be a great saving to the town in future years.

The Eaton School may be likened to the American School as a whole, as described in the following quotation from a recent United States Office of Education publication: "I do not consider it an overstatement to say that the United States owes much of its economical, social and political power as a nation to the organization and efficiency of its education. Though the American School was born out of the basic needs of the country, it is now the result of continuous striving for improvement".

The teachers have taken their additional part in the war effort by working on rationing programs. They as well as the pupils should be commended for taking such an active part in the War Effort. The thirty-three pupils in the higher grades have purchased, during the past five months, \$169.55 worth of war stamps. The other thirty-three children have purchased \$135.80, making a total of \$305.35, or an average of \$4.63 per pupil. The pupils have had real training in studying current events and discussing the present affairs in *Our Democracy*. Their originality has been brought out through discussions on how the war has effected our living, and by the creating of war posters and slogans. Prizes of war stamps were offered in the upper grades for the best posters made by the pupils. These four prizes were won by Dorothy Collins, Thomas Carlson, Barbara Collins, and Paul Collins, respectively.

The cost of text books and supplies is increasing. Shortages in materials are getting more noticeable. We must attempt to conserve on their use by steady effort to prevent any waste or abuse of materials.

The immediate objective of all of us is to win this war, but we must not be unmindful of the peace and world construction which must follow. We are confronted now with decisions that will determine the kind of citizens who will inherit this country of ours. We must keep constantly before us the fact that children can not delay the growing up process. "What they will be, they are now becoming."

MUSIC

To the Superintendent and, School Board of Danville:

I hereby submit a report of activity in music for the year 1941-42 as well as this present year.

The time allotment for Danville is one-half hour a week for each room. This is divided as follows: grades I-II fifteen minutes, grades III-IV fifteen minutes, grades V-VIII thirty minutes.

In Danville this year there is a large percentage of uncertain singers and non-singers which seem to run mostly (in the upper grades especially) to boys. It is a real problem to get tuneful singing under these circumstances. The first and second grades, too, seem to have come in for more than their share of non-singers while the third and fourth grades are much more fortunate. In the lower grades an effort can be made to help the child who has not found his singing voice and he will cooperate, but after the child is beyond the fourth grade he becomes too self-conscious to make any real effort to help himself.

In the first and second grades the singing is entirely by rote and serves to acquaint the child with his singing voice and to give him a repertoire of songs upon which to build note reading. Note reading begins in the third grade. We try to maintain a balance between note reading and rote singing, reading so that over a period of years songs may be learned independently with speed and accuracy, rote singing to maintain spontaneous singing, to provide songs that may be sung from memory and to give immediate pleasure.

Music appreciation or lessons in listening have been carried on with the aid of the phonograph and records. While it is impossible with the time at our disposal to carry on all phases of music education, listening seems to have become increasingly important in this age of radio.

I wish to express my appreciation to Mrs. Witherell and Miss Tracy for their fine cooperation.
