TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

**To the Inhabitants of the Town of Francestown in the
County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote
in Town Affairs:**

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Frances-
town on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next at ten of the
clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the budget, as submitted by the Selectmen or make any alterations in the same and raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to finance the same as finally adopted.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred dollars (\$400.00) to widen and resurface that portion of the Todd Road, leading from the Pleasant Pond Road to the Town Dump or take any action relating thereto.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred seventy-five dollars (\$175.00) to repair the brick work on the rear of the Library.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) to replace the furnace in the Library or take any action relating thereto.
7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow a sufficient sum of money to pay current expenses, in anticipation of taxes.
8. To see if the Town will vote to continue the Town Road Advisory Committee.
9. To see if the Town will vote to close subject to gates and bars, No. 67 from its junction with No. 82 south to the Turnpike.
10. To see if the Town will vote to close subject to gates and bars, No. 89 from west of the house of William Otterson to the land of Dr. Harold Case.

11. To see if the Town will vote to close subject to gates and bars, the Peter King Road No. 76 from its junction with No. 78 near Clarence Farrar's house to its junction with No. 74.

12. To see if the Town will vote to amend Section 3 of the Zoning Ordinance by inserting after the sentence, without first obtaining a permit, to be issued by the Board of Selectmen, the following; for which they shall collect and pay to the Town Treasurer the sum of two dollars (\$2.00). So that as amended Section 3, shall read as follows: Within said Zones no person or persons shall erect or place a building for the use of human habitation, permanent or temporary, or for a commercial enterprise, without first obtaining a permit to be issued by the Board of Selectmen, for which they shall collect and pay to the Town Treasurer, the sum of two dollars (\$2.00). The Board of Selectmen, when granting or denying this permit, shall consider the preservation of the attractiveness of the Town, its desirability as a place in which to live and do business, the safeguarding of health, welfare, morals, convenience and safety of its citizens and an orderly growth in the future.

13. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Cemetery Trustees to make a chart of the Cemetery, showing the location of occupied and unoccupied lots, and raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to pay for the same.

14. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Boys Club to practice basketball in the Town Hall, with the provision that no one over sixteen years of age shall participate, and all practice sessions shall be under proper supervision.

15. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, and Committees heretofore chosen and take action on the same.

16. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual audit and examination of the accounts of the Town of Francestown for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1952, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Library Treasurer and Trustees of Trust Funds.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: Dec. 31, 1951-Dec. 31, 1952:
 (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1951 and December 31, 1952, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein the financial condition of the Town changed from a Surplus of \$203.15 to a Net Debt of \$3,972.70 during the year 1952.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues:
(Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1952, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$606.66, less a net revenue surplus of \$537.75, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$68.91.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1952, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1952, is indicated in Exhibit F.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Tax Collector's Records:

More attention should be given by the Collector to the matter of accuracy in the tax accounts and records. This applies particularly to:

(1) The certainty that every tax which is received is properly entered in the cash book.

(2) That every tax which is received and entered in the cash book is posted to the proper account in the warrant book.

Considerable time which the auditors spend could be saved if the tax accounting was improved. A resultant saving to the Town in the cost of the annual audit would also be effected.

Uncollected and Unredeemed Taxes—Prior Years:

In our report of last year's audit the recommendation was made that the lists of uncollected and unredeemed taxes on tax warrants and tax sale accounts extending back over a period of ten or more years be carefully gone over by the Selectmen and Tax Collector. It was further recommended that abatement be

made of such accounts as seemed to be uncollectible and that tax deeds be issued to the Town by the Collector in cases where the two year redemption period had elapsed.

It is noted that all uncollected taxes on the warrants of 1949 and prior years were either collected or abated in 1952. Attention should be given to the matter of unredeemed taxes this year.

Conclusion:

With exceptions as noted herein the accounts of all town officials were found in good condition and the accounting procedure was in accordance with prescribed methods.

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual town report.

The annual card party, in charge of Mrs. McAdam and Mrs. William Basset, netted \$147.45. The Improvement Society stretched the Doll Fund collected Labor Day (the doll given by Prof. E. B. Hill as usual) to \$75. These two sums greatly helped the book account.

From the State Library we borrowed this year 353 books; the Bookmobile leaves about 75 books every two or three months.

There have been at least 313 individuals who have used the Library during the year. Many books are shared and exchanged without record, and there have been visitors from as far away as Texas asking for information about their ancestors. Australia is a new continent to provide us with visitors.

We have had the usual gift of \$20 for special books, and Mrs. Harold Case gave \$15 for children's books in memory of her son, David Kirk Case.

The Library premises were much improved by the Village Cleaning Bee, and an old set of book shelves has been remodeled by William Lord to fit special needs in the Reading Room.

Two days of meetings held by the N. H. Library Association at Exeter in May were attended by the Librarian who brought home, in addition to book news, gifts for our Library from Miss Brackett, Librarian of N. H. University: a silk exhibit, a Digger Pine cone, and a book on elephants for the Children's Room.

An antique bottle with original petroleum has been given by Mr. Frank Simons of Goffstown to the historical collection; an old pottery pitcher from the Garvin Sleeper farm was given by Mr. Harold Todd of New Boston.

The books and equipment of most consequence belonging to the old Academy have been selected by the Librarian and Mrs.

Arnold Bailey for preservation in the Academy Room upstairs in the Library. The need for this room has been obvious, and money provided by the Improvement Society for the operation of the Historical Rooms was used to paint, paper and repair the corner room. This project was carried out with the cooperation of the Academy Trustees, the Improvement Society and the Library. Mr. William Bowman especially prepared a box of minerals from the Academy collection.

The Girl Scouts have been using the Mary Willard Room for their meetings and have named their troupe for Mary Willard, the town's first Librarian. Mr. Ewing's logic and ethics classes have also held their meetings at the Library.

For the Labor Day exhibit there were many beautiful costumes and objects of art lent by Prof. Robert Williams who was recently in Japan, and by Miss Rand and Mr. Mace whose loans represented the Balkans, the Far East and Italy. Paintings were lent by Mr. Simons and Mrs. Wakefield of Goffstown. Miss Ruth Whittier of Concord lent a portion of her large collection of foreign dolls. There are still on display many of the photographs of Other Days collected and mounted by Mrs. Brous, and there are recent photographs of the Daniel Webster Rock in a field now owned by Mr. Rodney Mills. From this rock Webster made a famous speech in 1840.

The Spring Book Festival was celebrated with an exhibition of the covers from the best children's books of recent years. Judy Mace arranged a May Pole with Horn Book magazines, and Tommy Bixby made an original poster illustrating "The Trolley Car Family."

TEAM WORK WILL DO THE JOB

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see if the district will vote to become a member of the Cooperative High School District No. 2 (Grades 7-12) as laid out by the State Board of Education comprising the School Districts of Francestown, Greenfield, Sharon, Peterborough, Jaffrey, Temple and Hancock, or take any necessary action relating thereto.
9. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from state equalization fund together with other income, the

school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD AND CITIZENS OF FRANCESTOWN:

I respectfully submit my sixth annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

INSTRUCTION

We are indeed fortunate in being able to retain an experienced teaching staff in the persons of Mr. Robert Piper and Miss Hazel Clement. Despite the fact that their respective rooms are completely filled, effective instruction is being carried on. The school year opened this fall with an enrollment of 35 in grades 1-4; 37 in grades 5-8. By modern standards these enrollments are considered too large to present the type of program that our present day society demands and to give the individual, the type of attention that many of the children need. When one considers that the educational program in each room must provide challenging situations for all pupils enrolled in four grades the task becomes increasingly difficult.

Some consideration was given to the advisability of recommending the establishment of a third room. The cost was estimated at approximately \$4000. This figure included salary of additional personnel; renovating an area in the basement for classroom purposes; additional equipment and operating expenses. However, in view of the consideration that may be given to the Cooperative School Plan, this action was temporarily set aside. Consequently, we will open the school year 1953-54 with an approximate enrollment in the primary room of 32 and in the upper grade room with 36.

There is little question that with decreased enrollments in each room a more effective educational program can be carried on, than at present.

We are still carrying on a complete testing program as explained last year, with the addition of the California Test of Personality. This test is administered each year to grade five youngsters. The function of the test is to reveal the degree to which each pupil is self-adjusted and socially adjusted. The teacher is thereby aided in understanding the child and his reactions to certain situations that may arise in the classroom and on the playground. This test acts as a guide for placing the pupil in activities and situations where he will become a well-rounded and adjusted individual.

A new reporting system in the form of a revised report card was introduced this fall, which we feel affords the teacher a more adequate device for reporting the growth and achievement of a child, than was previously used. All systems of reporting a child's progress in school, by use of a **Report Card** are necessarily limited. Thus we attempt to supplement the report card

by written notes, telephone conversations, and personal conferences. We are eager to have parents consult with us so that we may arrive at common understandings and do the best work possible for your children.

Miss Ethelyn Edwards is continuing to do a very effective piece of work in providing a well rounded music program for the children, with the assistance of the teachers.

HEALTH SUPERVISION

Mrs. Louisa Murphy, R. N. is to be highly commended for her exceptionally fine work in watching and checking the health of the school children. Her report reveals the details of her work.

This year Dr. Louis Weiderhold was engaged as the school doctor and has taken an exceptional interest in our children.

The parents are to be commended for their fine cooperation and assistance in maintaining high health standards in our school.

PLAYGROUND FACILITIES

Each year we witness improvements in our playground area. When one considers what we had three years ago, and compares it with our present playground, the extent of the work done is very revealing. All of us are deeply grateful for the progress that has been made and the fine assistance that has been rendered by the Francestown Parent-Teachers Association, and interested friends of the school.

SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM

Mrs. C. Gladys St. John, assisted by Mrs. Winnifred Hoyt, who maintains the books this year, is carrying on a very efficient school lunch program. There are 63 participants in the program out of a total school enrollment of 66 and the average number of meals served is approximately 55 per day. The financial details of the program are explained in another part of the School Report. This report will reveal that the program has become self-supporting, consequently the School Board has made no budget requests for this purpose.

IMPROVEMENTS TO BUILDING

This past summer, the upper grade room and work room adjacent to it, were painted in attractive colors, lending a warm and inspiring atmosphere to these areas.

We now have adequate water pressure in the school to service all facilities at any time during the day. The two-tank and pump arrangement has been the solution to our previously unsanitary, and unsatisfactory water problem.

A new incinerator has been installed in the boiler room to take care of all waste materials except tin cans and watery garbage.

This installation has served to eliminate a fire hazard which was always present when paper materials had to be stored in the building for a period of time and also has served as a proper arrangement for the disposal of burnable garbage, thus contributing to the sanitary condition of our school.

The School Board has provided in its budget a sum of money to re-paint the entrance-way and lavatories this coming summer. When this is completed our school plant will be in excellent condition aesthetically as well as physically.

COOPERATIVE SCHOOL STUDY

The Cooperative School Study has moved along quite rapidly the past few months and when the subject is presented to you for consideration at the annual district meeting in March a goodly number of the questions that are in your minds will have been answered. Consequently I am not going to devote much space to this topic. It is hoped that we shall have all data available at the annual meeting and that a lively and constructive discussion will take place.

I wish to commend the Francestown School Board, and especially Mr. Ford Bowman, for their conscientious attendance at meetings, and the excellent service they have rendered the town throughout this study.

A brochure on the Cooperative School Study is being printed and will be in the hands of citizens prior to the Francestown School District meeting. This brochure will reveal the costs involved in setting up and operating the proposed school; Francestown's estimated share of the total costs; a proposed curriculum; a proposed method of handling transportation and other matters pertinent to the problem. The foregoing information will form a basis for our discussion.

FINANCE

The amount required to cover the school board's budget has been increased by \$1,651.78 as compared to last year's budget. This increase is reflected almost wholly in tuitions which will increase \$1,675 for the school year 1953-54. There are increases in other areas such as Auxiliary Activities, Cost of Instruction and Expenses of Administration. However, these are balanced off by decreases in Capital Outlay, Special Fund Activities, Maintenance of School Plant and Other Instructional Expenses. The total assessment required to cover the school board's budget has increased \$2,423.81. This is occasioned by the fact that the estimated income has been reduced by approximately \$800. The School Board estimates that their balance at the end of the school year 1952-53 will be \$200.

Any large balance that may occur in the School District funds is usually the result of balances in tuition brought about by a difference in the anticipated tuition pupils and those who

actually become tuition pupils. No balances can be foreseen in this item for 1952-53, since all estimated tuition pupils are presently attending high school.

STATE AID

The state aid picture remains the same as last year and it does not appear that Francestown can expect to receive any of this aid for the school year 1953-54. The wealth of the town in terms of adjusted valuation, the terms of the formula, and the number of pupils attending elementary and secondary schools determines the basis for figuring state aid.

CONCLUSION

I wish to again thank the parents, friends and organizations who have expressed a decided interest in the education of the children of Francestown for their continued support and assistance.

I also wish to express my deep appreciation to the Francestown School Board for their cooperation and assistance in promoting a sound education program.
