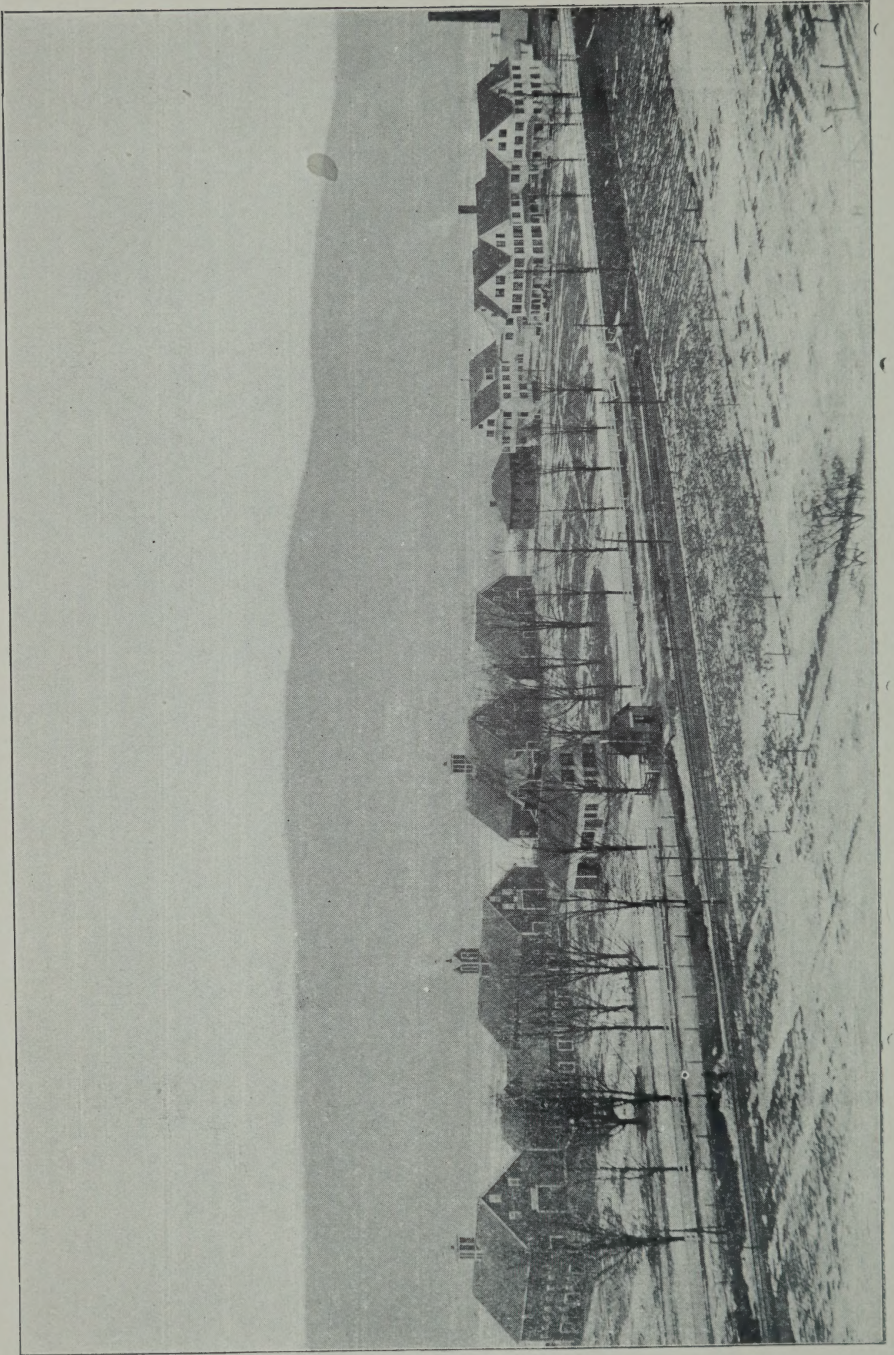

Commissioners' Report

To the Citizens of Grafton County:

We herewith submit our report of the affairs of the County for the year ending December 31, 1911, together with the reports of the Sheriff, Solicitor, Clerk of the Court, Jailer, Treasurer and Auditors, and the Superintendent, Physician and Chaplain of the County Farm.

We have to report, that extensive repairs and improvements which have been in contemplation for several years, have been made during the year.

Two large new boilers have been installed in place of the two old ones. The small boiler has been removed from the jail and the heating system has been connected with the new boilers. The buildings are now all heated from one central heating plant.

These changes, with the necessary equipment cost \$5,000.

A new laundry has been built and equipped with modern machinery and is operated by electricity. This cost \$2,500.

A broad stairway has been built in the hospital, connecting the two floor, which adds much to the convenience in caring for patients and the hospital is in good condition.

A section of the coal and wood shed has been removed and the building has been thoroughly repaired.

A new wood shed has been built in the yard on the East side of the railroad.

The cold storage building has been improved by the addition of a meat cutting room.

A storage shed has been built in connection with one of the barns for housing of farm machinery and a milk room has been added to the reamery.

The management of Superintendent and Mrs. Phillips has been very satisfactory and the property of the County is in excellent condition.

About \$1,700 has been expended in re-indexing the records during the year. This work is progressing satisfactorily and will be completed this year.

The large expenditure of money for these improvements and considerably increased Court expenses have caused a decrease in our surplus of \$4,451.04.

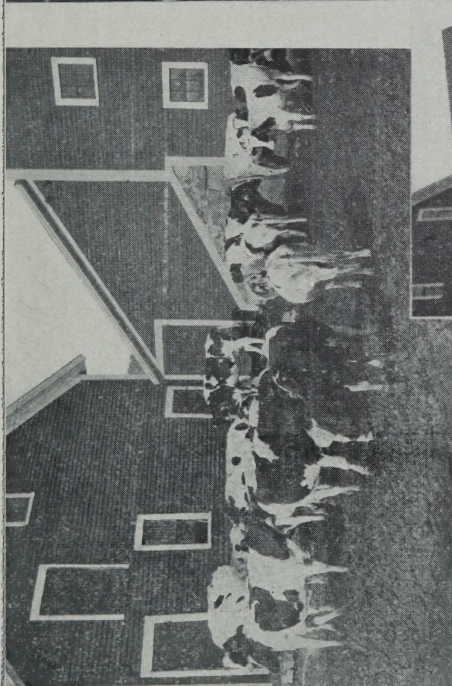
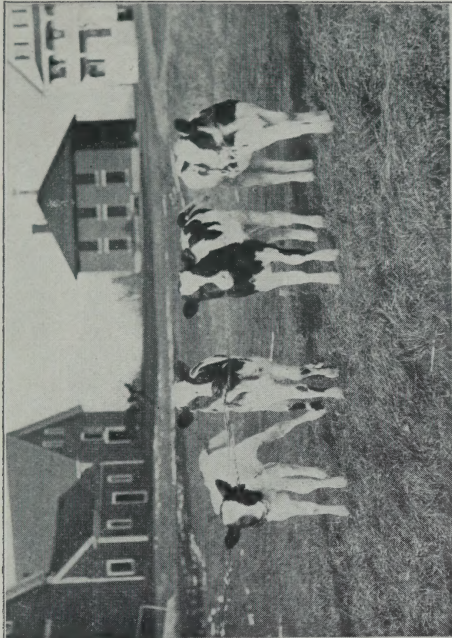
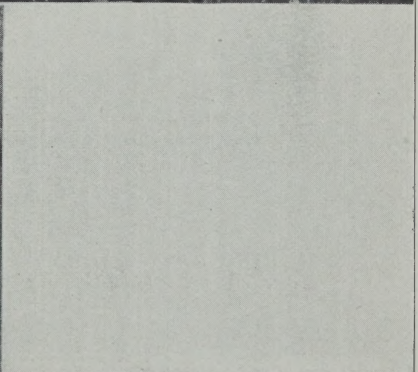
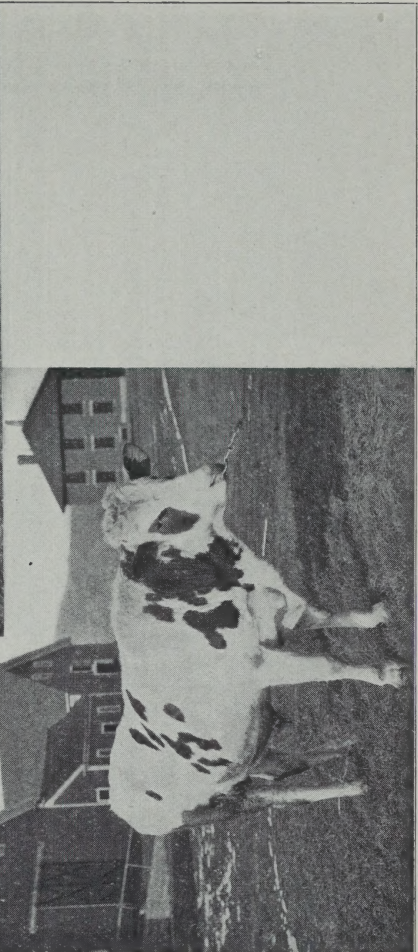

SELECTMEN OF TOWNS AND OVERSEERS OF THE POOR

Your attention is called to the following extracts from the laws of 1903

CHAPTER 42, SECTION 1

SECTION 1. Any town or county furnishing any assistance to any person within six years preceding his death shall be entitled to recover from the estate of such person the sum or sums paid out for such assistance, the said claim to be a preferred claim against his said estate after the payment of funeral charges, expense of last sickness and expenses of administration. provided he leaves no widow or minor children living at his decease.

CHAPTER 106, SECTION 1, as amended

"SECTION 1. No town shall be liable for the support of any person unless he, or the person under whom he derives his settlement shall have wholly gained a settlement therein during the ten years preceding the last date of application for support; provided that no person having a settlement in any town in this state upon arriving at the age of seventy years shall lose that settlement on account of being exempt by law from paying a poll tax, if he still resides in said town."

CHAPTER 110, SECTION 1, last clause

"IX. Any person of the age of twenty-one years who shall have resided in any town in this state, and, being taxed for his poll for seven years in succession, shall have paid all taxes legally assessed on his poll and estate during that term, and any un

married woman of the age of twenty-one years who shall have resided in any town in this state seven years in succession, shall have paid all taxes legally assessed on her estate during that term, shall thereby gain a settlement in such town." Also to Chapter 67 of the laws of 1903, Chapter 84 of the Public Statutes, Chapters 1 and 71 of the laws of 1907, relating to paupers, and the following from Chapter 110, Public Statutes, relating to "assistance to persons in quarantine."

SECTION 1. Whenever any person or family is placed in quarantine by a board of health, to protect the public against small pox, scarlet fever, diphtheria or any other dangerous, infectious or contagious diseases, it shall be the duty of said board to assist such person or family while in quarantine in such manner as in the judgement of the board may be deemed wise and necessary.

SECTION 2. All expenses thus incurred, or such part thereof, as the board may determine, shall be deemed a legitimate expenditure for the protection of the public health and shall be charged to the account of incidental expenses, but not to any indigent pauper account, nor shall such expenditure be construed to mean a public aid to the person or persons so quarantined and assisted unless such person or persons are already paupers as defined by the Public Statutes.

HORACE F. HOYT, ETNA, N. H.:—Dorchester, Enfield, Canaan, Grafton, Hanover, Lebanon, Lyme, Orford, Orange-

Piermont, and present their bills to the commissioners at Lebanon on the third Tuesday in April and the third Tuesday in October.

ARTHUR C. CLOUGH, North Haverhill. N. H.:—Bethlehem, Bath, Easton, Franconia, Haverhill, Landaff, Littleton, Lisbon, Lyman, Livermore, Monroe, Warren, and present their bills to the commissioners of Woodsville the third Tuesday in March and the third Tuesday in September.

All applications for aid should be immediately reported to the Commissioners as under the laws of 1903 no bill will be paid for more than ten days' support previous to the proper affidavit being received. Affidavit blanks will be supplied by the Commissioners upon request.

In accordance with chapter 30, Section 1, Public statutes, the Superintendent of the County Farm, shall make up his report to January 1, annually and also Section 2 of said Chapter requires that the Superintendent's report shall contain in addition a list of paupers actually supported at the Farm and the number of weeks each was supported, also a statement of the average cost per week for each pauper with an explanation of the basis upon which said calculations were made, the whole number of persons

supported and partially supported for the year ending Dec. 31, 1911, was 99.

The number of weeks board is ascertained by taking the number of days, between the day of admittance and the day of departure of each individual, and dividing that number by seven, which gives the number of weeks each individual has been supported.

The whole cost of supporting paupers at the Farm for the year ending Dec. 31, 1911, is \$14,119.49. This sum divided by the whole number of weeks furnished, viz: 5183 weeks gives \$2.72 as the price per week.

The foregoing shows a total of eighty-five matters of a criminal nature that have been before the Superior Court during the current year. This does not include matters which have been finally disposed of in Police and Justice Courts.

There have been before the Superior Court during the year, four actions of a civil or quasi-civil nature, and the disposition of the same has been as follows:—

- 1 Solicitor v Brown & a, a petition for injunction under nuisance act, entered at April Term, 1909, was dismissed at January Term 1911.
- 2 State v Spiritous Liquors, a libel to condem liquors, entered at May Term, 1911. Liquor has been forfeited and turned over to County Commissioners, in accordance with order
- 3 State v Frank A Vannah, debt on recognizance for forfeited bail, entered at September Term, 1911, is still on docket.
- 4 State v Slot Machine, a libel to condem a slot machine as a gambling device, entered at September Term, 1911, slot machine has been decreed forfeited to County and ordered to be sold if it can be sold for lawful purpose or destroyed if it cannot be so sold.

By the provisions of Public Statutes, c. 17, s. 8, county solicitors are required in their annual reports to make "such recommendations as in their judgment the public good requires."

The solicitor deems this an opportune time to recommend an amendment of Public Statutes, c. 248, s. 3. This section, which relates to the jurisdiction of justices of the peace, on its face purports to give justices of the peace final jurisdiction subject to appeal in criminal cases where the punishment is by fine not exceeding twenty dollars, or by imprisonment not exceeding six months, or by both, but the supreme court has declared that under the constitution a justice of the peace has no jurisdiction to impose a fine exceeding ten dollars upon a plea of not guilty. Very often cases are brought before justices of the peace and police courts for offenses against the police of towns (P. S. c. 264) where the circumstances demand a penalty in excess of a ten dollar fine but are not sufficiently flagrant to require a jail sentence. The limits of fines under this chapter is twenty dollars, ten dollars more than a justice of the peace can impose constitutionally if the respondent pleads not guilty. The offense of keeping an unlicensed dog (Laws 1891, c. 60, s. 8) is punished by a fixed fine of fifteen dollars, five dollars more than a justice can constitutionally impose if the respondent pleads not guilty. A first offense of selling liquor is punished by a fine of not less than twenty-five dollars and not more than one hundred dollars, and by a jail sentence (Laws 1911, c. 193, s. 2.) There are other offenses that might be named which come within the peculiar cognizance of police and justice courts in which the fines exceed the power of the magistrate to impose, and the magistrate is consequently required to hold the respondent for the grand jury, but the foregoing are very common instances. All offenses of this grade, comprising drunks, simple assaults and other simple matters ought to come within the final jurisdiction of the police and justice courts even though the justice may consider the offense too

flagrant for a ten dollar fine. The only way such cases should be prosecuted in the superior court is by appeal from a police or justice court, not by indictment of the grand jury.

The solicitor therefore recommends that in the coming constitutional convention such action be taken as will permit the increase of the jurisdiction of justices of the peace and police courts in criminal matters to permit the imposition of final sentence in all cases where the fine does not exceed twenty-five dollars.
