TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Harrisville in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Wells Memorial School in said Harrisville on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next at three of the clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money on the credit of the Town in anticipation of taxes.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Ninety-four Dollars (\$294.00) as its fair share of the operating cost of the Elliot Community Hospital.

5. To see if the Town will vote to accept One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) received from Mrs. Walter Luoma for the care of the Walter Luoma cemetery lot.

6. To see if the Town will authorize and instruct the Selectmen to appoint a Town Forest Committee consisting of three members and whose duties shall be the management of lands which shall be designated by the Town or Selectmen as "Town Forest Lands."

7. To see if the Town will vote to close subject to gates and bars the following Town Roads:

a. The road leading from the residence of John Priest to the Nelson Town Line from a point fifty (50) feet beyond the present entrance to the residence of Bacon to the Nelson Town line.

b. The road leading from Hendersonville Inc., formerly Camp Marienfeld to the Nelson Town Line from a point fifty (50) feet beyond the present entrance to Hendersonville to the Nelson Town Line.

8. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the following Town Roads:

a. On school house hill in Chesham that road which was turned over to the Town from the State as a result of new construction. b. On the road from Chesham to Harrisville all road which was turned over to the Town from the State as a result of new construction.

9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw from the Capital Reserve Fund a sum necessary to trade the present Town Truck, if in their estimation an emergency arises during the ensuing year whereby any further expenditures on the present truck would be economically unwise. Any new purchase to be put out to bid with the Selectmen authorized to accept that bid which in their estimation is in the best interest of the Town.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars to be placed in a sinking fund for the replacement of major Town owned Bridges under Provisions of the Capital Reserve Act of 1943, Chapter 160 as amended.

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a used grader for a price of Four Thousand, Five Hundred (\$4,500) Dollars. This amount to be raised thus: withdraw Three Thousand (\$3,000.00) Dollars from the Capital Reserve and raise One Thousand, Five Hundred (\$1,500.00) Dollars by taxes in 1960.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars to be used to plow two skating areas in Harrisville, one area to be located on Lake Nubaunsit in Harrisville and the other on Russell Reservoir in Chesham.

13. To see what action the Town will take in regard to polution of the Nubanusit River from the dam at Lake Nubaunsit to the entrance of Lake Skatutahkee.

14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the playing of Beano within the Township.

15. To hear reports of Agents, Committees, or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

16. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

This year we were again blessed with a spring like day. Meeting called to order 1:12 p.m. by Moderator Ralph B. Bemis. Warrant read and polls opened for voting by Australian Ballot.

Business meeting called to order at 3:10 p.m.

Art. 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. Ballot clerks: John Priest, Jessie Hope, Jennie Main and Rita Rathburn.

Police Officers: Leo Dion, qualified, Robert A. Walker, qualified, Frank Bates Jr., Sterling Chamberlain.

Trustee of Trust Funds for 3 Years: John N. Clark.

Fire Wards: John J. Colony, Jr., Robert A. Wilker, William F. Bemis, Leo P. Dion, Ralph J. Clark, Justin B. Chamberlain, William D. McNulty, all qualified.

Surveyors of Wood and Lumber: John Priest, William P. House, both qualified.

Fence Viewers: John Priest, Ralph B. Bemis, both qualified.

Library Trustee for 3 Years: Guy W. Thayer.

Chesham Beach Committee: John Oja, Roy Williams, Francis F. Parker.

At this time on motion of John Marnell there was a moment of silence out of respect for Harold W. Pope former Selectman.

Art. 2 A motion to take up Art. 2 after Art. 10 passed.

Art. 3 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money on the credit of the town in anticipation of taxes. A motion to accept as printed passed.

Art. 4 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Eighty Five Dollars as its fair share of the operating cost of the Elliot Community Hospital. A motion to accept as printed passed.

Art. 5 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1500.00) to be placed in a sinking fund for the replacement of road equipment under provisions of the Capital Reserve Act of 1943, Chapter 160 as amended. A motion to accept as printed passed.

Art. 6 A motion to lay this article on the table-till after supper passed.

Art. 7 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) to widen and improve the upper end of Halpin Hill. A motion to accept as printed passed. Art. 8 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) for the dedication of the Sunset Beach. This money to be used with funds already donated for this purpose.

A motion made to accept as printed and to combine this with an Old Home Day passed.

Art. 9 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Seventy Five Dollars (\$175.00) to cover its share of Memorial Day Services with the Coutts-Croteau Legion Post of Marlboro, N. H.

A motion to accept as printed passed.

Art. 10 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Seventy Five Dollars (\$175.00) to be used for the purchase of a Walkie Talkie radio for the Forest Fire Department.

A motion to accept as printed except to substitute the word Harrisville for the word Forest passed.

Art. 2 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

A motion to accept the budget as printed in the Town Report except to take \$1,200.00 from the school taxes.

Amendment to take \$1000 from summer road maintenance. Amendment lost. Original motion passed.

Art. 11 To see if the Town will vote to adopt the limited zoning ordinance relating to Silver Lake and Lake Skatutahkee as proposed by the committee authorized by the votes of said Town of Harrisville at the annual meeting held March 11th, 1958.

After considerable discussion led by Mr. William P. House a motion to accept the ordinance passed.

Art. 12 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a New Hough Payloader complete with bucket and hydraulic wing at a price not to exceed Sixteen Thousand Dollars (\$16,000.00) including the present Town owned payloader. The amount to be raised as follows: Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) to be taken from the sinking fund, Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) to be raised in 1959 and the balance at the rate of Twenty Five Hundred Dollars per year for four years thereafter.

A motion to accept this article was lost. 32 no and 9 yes. A standing vote was taken. Art. 13 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) to be used for a complete overhaul of the present Town owned payloader. A motion to accept as printed passed.

A motion to recess at 5 p.m. until 6 p.m. for supper passed. Called to order at 6:07 p.m. and Art. 6 considered.

Art. 6 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25.00) to have a street light installed at the bridge near the Herbert Young residence at Lake Skatutahkee. A motion to lay this article on the table was lost. A motion to accept as printed passed.

Art. 14 To see if the Town will vote to accept a tract of land from Ralph Bemis for the sum of one dollar. This land to be used for a fire station. A motion to lay this article on the table passed.

Art. 15 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) for the purpose of constructing a new fire station. This being a contract price for the building less cement floor and chimney and to be constructed on land mentioned in Art. 14 above. A motion to lay this article on the table passed.

Art. 16 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars to be used to move the present fire station in Chesham to land mentioned in Art. 14 mentioned above. A motion to lay this article on the table passed.

Art. 17 To see if the Town will vote to accept One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) received from Mrs. Frank S. Wright for the care of the Frank S. Wright Cemetery Lot. A motion to accept passed.

Art. 18 To hear reports of Agents, Committees or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto. A motion to accept the Town Officers reports as printed passed.

A motion to accept the Selectmen's report and recommendations on the street lighting situation passed.

Art. 19 To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

The following Harrisville Beach Committee was accepted unanimously: Mary Clark, Evelyn Fisher, Edson Sundstrom, Philip Trudelle, Roland Alexander, and John Marnell. A motion to thank the Old Beach Committee passed.

A motion to have a budget committee of three (3) to work with the Selectmen. Said committee to hold a meeting at least 30 days before the Town Meeting. An amendment to have five (5) members instead of three (3) was lost. Original motion was also lost.

A motion to have the Selectmen appoint a committee or be said committee to see if some arrangement can be made with other towns to use road equipment co-operatively and report at the next Town Meeting passed.

A motion to have the Harrisville Beach Committee serve as a Committee to carry out Art. 8 and act as Old Home day Committee passed.

A motion to have the Selectmen act as a Committee to represent the Town in regards to the rates of the Public Service Co. was lost.

A motion to close the polls at 7:32 p.m. was passed.

A motion to recess at 7:33 p.m. passed.

Scope of Audit

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Library Treasurer and Trustees of Trust Funds.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balence Sheets: Dec. 31, 1958-Dec. 31, 1959: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1958 and December 31, 1959, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Surplus decreased by \$5,727.08 during 1959.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

Ananalysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures ----

Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 & A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1959, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$6,824.25, less a revenue surplus of \$2,416.99, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$4,407.26.

Summary of Reciepts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of reccipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1959, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance, as of December 31, 1959, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit G)

A statement of outstanding long term indebtedness as of December 31, 1959, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit G.

Audit Procedure

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) decreased by \$10,027.08, from \$15,631.37 to \$5,604.29 during 1959, as shown herewith:

Fewer acres were burned, suppression costs were substantially reduced and damage to woodlands held to a minimum. The record resulted from a combination of favorable weather conditions, an alert warden service and a cooperating public.

Yet, despite all this, there still persists a disturbing note.

58%, or 6 out of every 10 fires in 1959 were caused by careless smokers and debris burners.

10%, or 1 out of every 9 fires was caused by children.

Careless, indifferent, thoughtless and independent minded individuals and failure of parents to properly supervise children and keep matches out of their reach, annually cause these unnecessary fires which cost large sums to entinguish and cause extensive damage. The elimination of these three causes of fires would radically change this picture. The rules are simple —

- 1. Before burning, secure a permit from your local forest fire warden the law requires it.
- 2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning.
- 3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.
- 4. Don't throw lighted matches, cigars and cigarettes from moving vehicles use your ash tray.
- 5. Don't burn at home Use your town dump and save yourself possible difficulty, both personal and financial.

4. To choose agents, auditors and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

5. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers, auditors and agents, for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of any sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund, together with other income, the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

6. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to enter into High School Tuition contracts with Keene High School at the rate of \$480.00 per pupil for the school year 1960-61, with Marlboro High School at the rate of \$390.00 per pupil and with other approved High Schools. 7. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Fifty dollars (\$150) to be used as matching funds for Federal Aid to science and mathematics courses, and to authorize the acceptance of such Federal Funds.

8. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Fifty (\$150) as the district share of support for Educational TV station WENH.

9. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to withdraw from the Capital Reserve Fund the sum of Three Hundred dollars (\$300), which was voted in 1958, for the improvement of the playground of Wells Memorial School.

10. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

Motion was made and voted to hold school district meeting on Friday prior to Town Meeting.

Polls were closed at 10:30 and recess called to count ballots.

The following were declared elected: (66 vote were cast) Casper Bemis, Jr., Moderator; Patricia J. Phillips, Clerk; R. L. Alexander, Treasurer; Mary Gilman, School Board Member for three years.

Meeting Adjourned at 10:45.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT TO HARRISVILLE SCHOOL DISTRICT

It is a pleasure to report to the citizens of Harrisville as Superintendent of Schools. I have visited all classrooms and talked with teachers and students, and found good instruction taking place. The object of an elementary school instruction program is to supply the foundation for which later learning is built, and it is pleasing to see the basic 3 R's taught in our school with great enthusiasm. At the same time, we are continuing to provide vital educational opportunities for all children by developing attitudes which will lead to healthy personalities, good work and study habits, high standards of skill, and cooperation with others.

I am concerned, though, with the ever increasing pupil enrollment which is seriously overcrowding the capacity of our school. It is my belief that some solution to this problem must be realistically found by all of us in the very near future if we want to give our children a full day of schooling for the entire 180 school days. Good education cannot exist in such overcrowded conditions.

May I take this opportunity to express my appreciation to the members of the school board, teachers and citizens for the splendid cooperation and help they have given me.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

TO THE CITIZENS OF HARRISVILLE:

Again I have the pleasure of reporting about Wells Memorial School, its present and future.

School opened in September 1959 with an enrollment of 83 distributed in the following grades:

> Mr. Wyman—19—Grades 7, 8 Mrs. Sabin—30—Grades 5, 6 Miss Beaudoin—16—Grades 3, 4 Mrs. Libby—18—Grades 1, 2

Again we are experiencing an overcrowding in Mrs. Sabin's room where we have an exceptionally large fifth grade.

We are indeed fortunate to have an additional teacher, Miss Joanne Beaudoin, this year. The addition of Miss Beaudoin to the staff reduces teacher load considerably.

A suitable place for Miss Beaudoin's group (grades 3 and 4) caused much confusion at the opening of school. After several changes this group was finally housed in part of the assembly hall which hampers the Hot Lunch Program.

Each time the assembly hall is used for a program it is necessary to vacate diningroom facilities, Mr. Wyman's room, and Miss Beaudoin's room. This is a time consuming project and curtails procedure. More classroom space is desirable.

This year four cadet teachers have been assigned to Wells Memorial School. Already Miss Carol Rand and Mr. Peter Kageleiry have assisted in the four upper grades. During the second semester Miss Margaret Mott and Mr. Herbert Werden will work in the upper grades. The assistance of these cadets is invaluable and improves your teachers' ability as they guide and aid these cadets in classroom techniques.

Wells Memorial School was host to a union-wide reading workshop held after school hours in September. New techniques were presented by reading authorities.

Instructionally Wells Memorial School ranks superior. Your children have many widening experiences in school and the town should be proud of the program it supports.

This year a simple Christmas operetta "When Christmas Comes" was presented by the student body. Only a limited number of students participated because there was no suitable place for rehearsals. Rehearsals had to be held in the office or halls.
