To the inhabitants of the Town of Henniker, in the county of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Cogswell High School Auditorium in said Henniker on Tuesday, the eleventh of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Town meeting will be recessed for School meeting.

Polls open at 10:00 A. M. and close at 6:00 P. M.

The articles in the Warrant will be taken up at 11:00 A. M.

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To hear and act upon the reports of Town Officers, Library Trustees, Trustees of Trust Funds, and other Committees.
- 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.
- 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of highways and bridges.

- 5. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the Public Health Nursing Association, raise money for the same, or take any action relative thereto.
- 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise or appropriate to defray the expense of observing Memorial Day.
- 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate in addition to that required by Law, for the support of the Tucker Free Library.
- 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Fire Department.
- 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of maintaining hydrant service for the ensuing year.
- 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for lighting streets for the ensuing year.
- 11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes
- 12. To see what sum of money the Town will raise or appropriate to prevent the spread of white pine blister, or take any action relative thereto.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to reinsure the Town buildings and Town trucks.
- 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid Construction of Class V Roads.

- 15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Merrimack Valley Region Association.
- 16. To hear and act on the report of the Special Committee named at the last annual Town Meeting for the purpose of improving the supply and operating conditions of the Cogswell Spring Water Works. To raise and appropriate money for the same or take any action relative thereto.
- 17. To determine if the town will vote to change the name of High Street to Hall Street in memory of George W. Hall, who died as a prisoner of the Japanese in World War II.
- 18. To determine if the Town will vote to change the name of Pleasant Street to Rush Street in memory of Douglas B. Rush, who died as a prisoner of the Japanese in World War II.
- 19. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to secure the assistance of the State Tax Commission in reappraising the taxable property in the town in order to secure greater equality as between taxpayers, and to insure the assessment of all property in the town on the same standard of value, and to raise and appropriate money to pay for the same.

#### Report of Water Supply Improvement Committee

After investigating our water system and all its present sources of supply, Mr. Howard E. Bailey, consulting engineer recommended by State Board of Health, made the following report:

The Department of Health analyses show a peaty sediment in the water, with high color. However, if this sediment has accompanied the use of the water in previous years, there is a chance of improvement by the insertion of a settling basin and a renewal of some of the connections to the springs. The cost of the settling basin, having a capacity of 5,000 gallons, to be inserted in the existing line from the springs, is estimated to be \$600.00.

It does not appear that the quality of the water would be improved by trenching the hillside although some additional quantity of water might be obtained. The cost of constructing filter trenches in the hillside, having a length of 200 feet, is estimated at \$370.00.

The total cost of improving the Patterson Hill Springs Supply is estimated at \$970.00.

Also on means of increasing the supply of the pumping station, it is recommended that three or more wells be installed in a location determined by test wells, to supplement your supply at the main pumping station. This auxiliary supply would be capable of yielding about 40,000 gpd, from three  $2\frac{1}{2}$ " wells. The estimated cost of the wells and pump house would be \$5,000. If the pump station were located within 200 feet of the existing pipe line, the cost of a 6" connecting pipe would be \$800.00.

#### Conclusions and Recommendations

Based on such records as are available, supplemented by field observations, it appears that the water supply of Henniker may be improved by the following means:

- (1) Installation of an automatic electric 100 gpm centrifugal pump at the existing pumping station.

  Estimated Cost \$1,950.00
- (2) Cleaning of Patterson Hill Springs, constructing settling basin, and adding filter trenches.

  Estimated Cost \$970.00

Wishing to present some plan for additional gravity supply, your committee made a careful study of several sources and later called the engineer back to investigate and report on the so-called Gorman Brook. This report is here given in full:

Gorman Brook, lying west of Craney Hill Road, is indicated as a good source of additional water supply for the Town of Henniker. The watershed is practically uninhabited and for the most part well wooded. The main brook presents an excellent location for a diversion dam. Economical sites for storage reservoirs, however, are lacking. The location favorable for a dam site allows a reservoir of only limited capacity, which is too small to be of significance as a storage reservoir but will serve to advantage as an intake well.

#### Quality of water

Samples of water were secured for analysis by an engineer of the New Hampshire Department of Health, and the results are shown on the accompanying photostat, Fig. 1. Both Gorman Brook and the Goss Branch are of excellent quality and were bacterially safe at the time of collection of the sample. The color in Gorman Brook

is normal for a brook of this type but would, of course, be more noticeable than that in the present ground water supply. If Gorman Brook is to be used as a source of supply, the New Hampshire Department of Public Health would require chlorination as a final safeguard.

#### Quantity of Water

The quantity of water which may be obtained economically from Gorman Brook is somewhat limited. The average flow during the year would be about 300,000 gallons per day, but much of this runoff occurs in March and April when only a limited quantity of water may be used by the Town, the excess running to waste. During a dry year in a series of dry years, the flow in the summer months may drop to 30,000 gallons per day, based on experience elsewhere with similar streams. For the above reason, Gorman Brook should be considered as an auxiliary source of supply.

An intake dam on the brook would be at sufficient elevation to flow by gravity into the Henniker water system. This is a distinct advantage as practically every drop of water available in Gorman Brook could be used; and when the quantity is unsufficient, it may be supplemented by pumping for an hour or two from the Garland Well Field. The cost of pumping would thereby be materially reduced.

#### Main Dam

In the development of Gorman Brook, a dam could be built economically about 200 feet above the junction with the Goss Branch. This location would require a dam only about 40 feet long. The spillway would comprise the center portion of the dam and would be constructed of concrete, having an overall downstream height of about 10 feet. The crest of the dam would lie approximately at elevation 670, which would be about 40 feet above high

water in the Proctor Hill reservoir. The spillway would have a width of approximately 25 feet and would allow a flow over the dam about 24 inches deep. The capacity of the spillway would be approximately 275 cubic feet per second and would pass a severe flood without damage.

A suitable intake screen would be provided at one end of the dam with shutoff valve for controlling the flow. A blowoff would also be provided at the low point of the brook bed to drain the reservoir and to blow off the sediment. Stone rip-rap pavement would be laid on the upstream side of the dam, forming an approach apron for the spillway. A small rectangular pool on the downstream toe of the spillway would kill the velocity of the flood pouring over the spillway crest.

The dam would create a small reservoir upstream having a maximum depth of approximately 6 feet and a length of 60 feet. The volume of the reservoir is estimated at 35,000 gallons.

#### PIPE LINE

#### Location

Under this project a pipe line would be constructed, connecting the Gorman Brook dam with the water distribution system of Henniker. The pipe would be laid from the dam down the brook to the junction with Goss Brook and then around the hillside to the highway leading westerly to Gulf Road. From the point the pipe would be laid in the roadway shoulder to the existing 6-inch pipe in Gulf Road near the Carnes Spring. The length of pipe line would be approximately 5300 feet.

#### Material

A pipe line 4 inches in diameter would be of sufficient size to carry the domestic flow of Gorman Brook to the water distribution system. It is suggested however, that

a 6-inch pipe be laid to allow a future development of the water supply and to permit such fire flow as may be available in the small reservoir at the dam. The pipe line may be constructed of steel, cement-asbestos, or cast iron. The steel pipe, properly lined, would be most expensive. The cement-asbestos pipe would be the least expensive but since the remainder of the system is constructed of cast iron, there may be some prejudice against the use of cement-asbestos. The estimate has been based on the use of cement-lined cast iron pipe laid with an earth cover of 5 feet. The street pavement where disturbed would be restored to its original condition.

#### Hydraulics

The elevation of the dam on Gorman Brook has been assumed as 670, and high water in the Proctor Hill reservoir would lie at 630. There would thus be a 50-foot difference in elevation between the crest of the spillway and the Proctor Hill reservoir when full. Assuming that a 6-inch pipe were laid between the dam and the Gulf Hill Road line, a maximum flow of 260,000 gallons per day would be possible. Since the average consumption of the Town of Henniker is about 75,000 gallons per day, a 6-inch pipe would be of ample size to conduct the water from Gorman dam to the water distribution system.

#### Accessories

The pipe line would be constructed with necessary gate valves for controlling the water, a blowoff for draining the line for repairs or other purposes, an air valve at the summit to release entrained air automatically, and a chlorinator to safeguard the supply.

#### Estimates of Cost

Estimates of cost of construction have been prepared on the basis of cost of materials plus a reasonable allowance

#### Additional Well at the Garland Site

The existing dug well on the old Garland property was carried to a depth of 22 feet, which is the reasonable limit for this type of stone-wall well with a shallow well pump. It was the opinion of the Contractor who built this well that approximately 20 feet of water-bearing gravel lies below it. If this is the case, a gravel-wall well of a depth of approximately 50 feet could be constructed, about a hundred feet upstream. This well could be equipped with a turbine type of pump with weatherproof electric motor mounted above the top of the well. In order to avoid the expense of housing the controls, the starting equipment could be mounted in the existing pumping sta-This well would be automatically operated and could be controlled from the water level in the ground and/or the pressure in the water distribution system. No supervision would be required except to inspect the equipment once per day. The pump would be automatically selfpriming and no auxiliary priming equipment would be required. The cost of this equipment, installed, is estimated at \$5,000.

#### Conclusions

The easiest and simplest system of water supply is one where the water flows by gravity directly from the dam into the water distribution system. Such a supply is generally a surface water, subject to contamination, and

may contain some color. The Gorman Brook supply is limited in quantity and should be considered as an auxiliary to the Garland Well Feld. It has the advantage of eliminating the need for pumping much of the year and the quality of the water should be excellent. A higher color may develop in the summer which may make it desirable to switch to the Garland Wells for a few weeks, taking into consideration the warmer water which occurs in surface supplies at this time of year.

The present Garland Well is limited in capacity due to the suction range of the pumps, which are of the shallow-well type. The gravel-packed well pump is not subject to this limitation and would make available practically all of the ground water at the site. In order to avoid an excessive drawndown in the well, the capacity of the pump would be limited to 100 gallons per minute. Since reliance is not placed on this pump for fire protection and it is operated automatically, the capacity may more nearly approach the average consumption of water in the town. The pump may run from 16 to 20 hours per day without undue wear, inspection being required for a few minutes daily.

#### Recommendations

It is recommended that the gravel-packed well be built at the Garland Well Field at a cost of \$5,000, based on engineering considerations. However, with an expenditure of \$25,000, the Gorman Brook supply may be made available. If there is a desire on the part of the townspeople to eliminate all possible pumping, then the Gorman Brook supply is well worth developing.

The above table shows the school statistics for the year 1945-1946. The total number of pupils registered was 237, of whom one was a tuition pupil. Another pupil residing in the district attended school in Weare. This makes a total of 237 pupils residing in the district and attending public schools.

Although the shortage in the number of teachers continued to be acute we were able to fill all the vacancies on the local staff. Fortunately we were able to retain all but one of our teachers for 1946-47. For the coming year of 1947-48 it is expected that there will be fewer teachers available than at any time since World War II started. Only about forty will graduate from teachers colleges in New Hampshire this year. Those teachers who have clung to their chosen work in 1946-47 find themselves caught between the sharp inflation in the cost of living and a salary fixed by contract so that is difficult for them to pay regular living expenses. Several districts in the state have held special meetings to raise money for the purpose of paying each of their teachers \$200-\$400 in addition to the regular salary. This enables the teacher to meet the emergency. In other places in the United States teachers have gone out on strike for higher salaries. The teachers in the Henniker schools have, however, signified their intentions to fulfill their contracts for the present year and their willingness to wait until the regular March meeting for the action of the district on their request for additional salary for the current year to enable them to meet their immediate financial obligations.

There will be for the year 1947-1948 a considerable increase in teachers' salaries. It is expected that beginners will receive \$1700-\$1800.

Many districts with low valuation and high tax rate will find the increase hard to bear, unless some relief is

received. If the proposed bill for additional State Aid is passed by the Legislature, the district may not increase its school tax rate and still pay its teachers an adequate salary. If the proposed plan had been in effect for the current year, Henniker's share would have been \$11,346.88 instead of the \$1,068.24 actually received. We hope that every citizen interested in the improvement and advancement of the educational facilities of the district will work for the passage of this State Aid bill.

Henniker has great need of a new elementary school building, or a thorough overhauling of the old one now in use. The farm shop for the agricultural course has outgrown is quarters and needs more room. The schools and teachers in Henniker above all, need a champion among the citizens of the district. They need encouragement and appreciation. To all who have in any way assisted the advancement of education in the district, we are sincerely grateful.
