In view of the fact that hostilities have ceased, this will be the final publication of names of Service Men and Women.

A familiar face is missing at this Town Meeting. A man whom all the community had come to love has passed to the great beyond and we pause on this day to honor his memory. Dr. Henry O. Smith, better known to most of us as "Doctor Harry" was born in the Town of Hudson on December 18, 1864, and started the practice of medicine here in 1888 continuing to serve the people of this and surrounding towns until his death on May 14, 1945, a total of fifty-seven years. We all mourn his passing and will miss his kindly counsel at Town Meeting. He served the Town in various capacities as a public-spirited citizen being a member of the School Board for 24 years. Trustee of the Public Library from 1893 to 1945, Trustee of the Trust Funds, Member of the Foster Fund Committee since its inception, Member of the Board of Health, representative to the State Constitutional Convention in 1930, Chairman of the local committee on Public Safety during World War I and Chairman of the Emergency Medical Service of Civilian Defense during World War II. He was also Chairman of the Bi-Centennial Celebration in 1933. In 1938, the citizens gave to him a Testimonial Dinner in appreciation of fifty years of faithful service to the Town. He also found time to write a book on the Town called "The Early Story of Hudson", copies of which may be found in the Hills Memorial Library, an institution to which he gave much of his time and energy.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hudson in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Junior High School in said Hudson on Tuesday, the 12th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing for which purpose the polls will be open from 10 A.M. until 6 P.M. unless a later closing hour is voted by the Town.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to accept numerous bequests as Trust Funds, the income to be used for the perpetual care of the various cemetery lots.

4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to pledge the credit of the Town in anticipation of taxes.

5. To see if the Town will vote to pay the Health Officer a salary of \$200.00 per annum in lieu of the present hourly rate of sixty cents and raise and appropriate money for the same.

6. To see if the Town will vote to pay the Building Inspector a salary of \$200.00 per annum in lieu of the present system which entitles him to the permit fees only, which hereafter shall be remitted to the Town and raise and appropriate money for the same.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred and Fifty Dollars, (\$150.00) for the purpose of erecting a bronze plaque on the exterior of the Veterans' Memorial Hall, said plaque to read as follows: "VETER-ANS' MEMORIAL HALL, HUDSON, N. H." 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) to increase the Capital Reserve Fund for new equipment for the Highway Department.

9. To see if the Town will vote to accept Philbrick Street, so called, dedicated to public use on a plan of land dated April, 1916 and recorded at the office of the Registry of Deeds.

10. If the Town votes in the affirmative on the preceding article to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) to repair and improve same upon petition of Orin P. Moody and others.

11. To see if the Town will vote to accept Charles Street, so called, dedicated to public use on a plan of land dated May, 1925 and recorded at the office of the Registry of Deeds.

12. If the Town votes in the affirmative on the preceding article to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) to repair and improve same upon petition of Charles Lefebvre and others.

 To see if the Town will vote to accept Clement Street, so called dedicated to public use on a plan of land dated May, 1925 and recorded at the office of the Registry of Deeds.

14. If the Town votes in the affirmative on the preceding article to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) to repair and improve same upon petition of Joseph Roy and others.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) to repair and improve Ridge Avenue at Pine Ridge, so called, upon petition of Thomas Dionne and others.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) to repair, improve and tar the Melendy Road, so called from Central Street to the Pelham Road upon petition of Charles Lefebvre and others.

17. To see if the Town will designate the Selectmen as agents of the Town for the purchase of a truck for the Highway

Department in the event it becomes necessary before the next annual town meeting, payment to be made out of the Capital Reserve Fund of the Town, as voted by the Town Meeting of March 14, 1944.

18. Whereas Harry J. Connell has requested that he be relieved from further duties as Chief of Police and whereas the Town of Hudson appreciates his faithful and honorable services to said Town for the past thirty years it is hereby VOTED: "That as evidence of its appreciation, the sum of \$2,000.00 is hereby raised and appropriated for the purpose of paying to said Harry J. Connell, a salary for the year 1946. Said salary to be paid in twelve equal monthly payments, during which time he shall remain upon the Police Department payroll".

19. To see if the Town will vote to install a street light at the corner of A. and D. streets and raise and appropriate money for the same upon petition of Rose Rodier and others.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) to repair and improve D. Street at Brookside Park, so called, upon petition of Rose Rodier and others.

21. To see if the Town will vote to increase the salary of the Town Treasurer in the amount of \$50.00 annually and raise and appropriate money for the same, upon petition of Blanche C. Fuller and others.

22. To see if the Town will vote to ratify the agreement made in 1945 between the Selectmen and Joseph A. Fuller, Harry D. Sanders and Carl Leaor as follows: "Beginning May lst, said employees shall be granted Saturday as a day off with pay, this to continue in effect until Nov. 1st., when thereafter Saturday afternoon shall constitute a half day off with pay and to further see if the Town will vote to increase the hourly rate of all employees of the Highway Department in the Amount of ten cents (10c) per hour, and raise and appropriate money for the same upon petition of Joseph A. Fuller and others.

23. To see if the Town will vote to install a street light on Highland Street between Gloria Avenue and Buswell Street and raise and appropriate money for the same upon petition of David S. Selvis and others.

24. To see if the Town will vote to request the State Tax Commission to reassess the Real Estate within said Town for the year 1946 and raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 to cover the cost of same, upon petition of Eugene H. Pariseau and others.

25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding one one-hundredth of one percent (1/100 of 1%) of the assessed valuation based on the assessment of 1945 for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town, together with other towns in the Merrimack Valley Region Association, the sum of \$200.00.

26. To see if the Town will elect to approve of the inclusion of its officers and employees in the Employees Retirement System of the State of New Hampshire, which system is provided for by chapter 27-A of the Revised Laws, as inserted by chapter 183 of the Laws of 1945 and any subsequent amendments thereto.

27. If the town votes in the affirmative on the preceding article, to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred and Fifty Dollars, (\$450.00) for the purpose of providing funds for the town's contribution to said retirement system for the coming year.

28. To see if the Town will vote to install a hydrant at the corner of A and E Streets adjacent to the homes of Charles Covey and Lucille O'Neil and raise and appropriate money for the same upon petition of Theodore A. Lindquist and others.

29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars, (\$300.00) to repair and gravel the Barret's Hill Road, northerly from the residence of Erwin Cross to Glover's Corner, upon petition of Alfred P. Flemming and others. 30. To see if the Town will vote to pay the Chief of Police a salary of Twenty-One Hundred Dollars, (\$2,100.00) per annum and raise and appropriate money for the same.

31. To see if the Town will vote to install two (2) hydrants on the Lowell Road, South of the Convent of the Presentation of Mary and raise and appropriate money for the same, upon petition of Edward A. Dichard and others.

Given under our hands and seal, this 23rd day of February in the year of our Lord Nineteen hundred and forty-six.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual audit and examination of the accounts of the Town of Hudson which was made by the Division of Municipal Accounting of the State Tax Commission in accordance with the vote of the town. This audit covered the period from September 1st, 1944 to August 20th, 1945. The report, however, has been made in two sections, the first covering the fiscal year ended December 31, 1944, and the second the period from January 1st to August 20th, 1945.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Road Agent and Trustees of Trust Funds.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Revised Balance Sheet—December 31, 1944:

Minor changes were made in the balance sheet of December 31, 1944, as originally made out, which are reflected in the revised balance sheet. These changes were occasioned by small differences in the amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes at the close of the fiscal year.

Decrease of Surplus:

The Net Surplus decreased during the year ended December 31, 1944, by \$310.80. Gains in Surplus resulting from bonds retired, a net budget surplus for the year, and other lesser items, were more than offset by losses in Surplus due to use of cash surplus to reduce the amount of the tax levy of 1944 and the transfer of a substantial amount of unredeemed taxes to tax deeds. The change in financial condition of the town during the year may be summarized as follows:

That a loss in Net Surplus of only \$310.80 was sustained despite the fact that assets were reduced during the year by the amount of \$11,642.81, is indicative of sound financial planning and management on the part of the town officials.

As indicated by the budget summary, a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$4,126.16, plus an actual over estimated revenues of \$3,369.22, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$7,495.38.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were

examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source and totals of receipts and expenditures verified.

TAX ACCOUNTS

The tax warrants of Collector Baker for the levies of 1945, 1944, 1943, 1942 and 1941, were audited.

Examination was also made of the tax sale accounts. Summary statements showing the activity in the tax sale accounts during the fiscal year ended December 31, 1944, and from January 1, 1945, to August 20, 1945.

TOWN CLERK

The accounts of Town Clerk John E. Baker were examined and audited. All funds received by the Town Clerk on account of the issuance of motor vehicle permits and dog licenses were properly accounted for through remittances to the Treasurer or cash on hand.

TOWN OFFICERS' SURETY BONDS

The surety bonds of the town officers were examined and found to be satisfactory as to form and amount.

TRUST FUNDS

Securities representing the invested principal and bank books representing the principal and unexpended income of the trust funds were examined.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Tax Deeds:

During the year 1944 all unredeemed taxes from sales on account of the levy of 1941 and previous years were removed from the books, either through redemptions, property deeded to the town or abatements. This is in line with the policy recommended by the Tax Commission of taking tax deeds after the redemption period has expired rather than to let unredeemed taxes accumulate over a period of years.

Conclusion:

The accounts and records of all town officials were found in good condition and the accounting procedure conformed to the uniform system prescribed by this Division.

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual town report. This letter of transmittal should be included in its entirety but the inclusion of Exhibits and Schedules is optional.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Hudson for their assistance during the course of the audit.

I have also kept in constant contact with conditions at the Town Dump, making at least one visit a week. Have had papers and refuse burned so to prevent the possibility of fire. IN THE MATTER OF THE TOWN DUMP, CITIZENS ARE REQUESTED TO USE JUDGMENT WHEN DEPOSITING MATERIAL THERE BEING CAREFUL TO DUMP AS FAR BACK AS POSSIBLE IN ORDER THAT OTHERS MAY HAVE EASY ACCESS TO IT.

I have also collected milk samples twice a year and water samples every three months. This is being done at the present time by the Hudson Water Co., every month. (Water only)

I am attaching herewith copy of an ordinance passed on January 21, 1946, which makes it necessary for those living in the compact part of the Town to obtain a permit before keeping hens, fowls, etc. PLEASE READ THIS ORDINANCE.

It is also unlawful to keep pigs in the compact part of the Town unless you get a permit.

NUISANCES ARISING FROM BACK YARD FARMS

By GILMAN K. CROWELL Director of Division of Food and Chemistry, State of New Hampshire

During the last few years there has been a great tendency for town and city families to raise both hens and swine on their own property for personal consumption. Little thought was given by local officials as to whether or not these back yard farms would become unsightly or develop into nuisances, since this practice was advocated by the federal government and generally accepted by the public as a wartime necessity. Now that hostilities have ceased and our possibility of receiving more meat looks brighter, the general public does not want these establishments to continue, especially when located as they are in the compact part of the community.

Are such establishments to be construed as health nuisances? From our nuisance file it would certainly seem that the public wants them to be called such. What, then, are the objections to a pig pen or hen yard located in the compact part of a community? They are very likely to be unsightly, noisy and odoriferous. The very reason that they are unsightly does not brand them as health nuisances. The fact that these establishments are noisy is a matter which can be remedied only through civil action, — petitioning the court for a restraining injunction, unless the town has a by-law to this effect. There is still a question whether or not odor by itself can be construed as a health menace. Usually, objectionable odors arise from decomposed and putrid matter. If this is the case, then the conditions causing this odor might be termed a nuisance under the health laws.

The discharges from a privy, toilet, sink-drain, cesspool, or septic tank flowing over the land could definitely be classified as a health menace, since such a condition would offer a breeding place for flies as well as offer an excellent possibility for the contamination of private wells through seepage. Also garbage, dead animals, manure, filthy pig pens, improperly cared for hen yards and dumps would constitute a health menace since they offer a breeding place for flies and rodents, these being the causative agent for the spreading of a great many diseases.

Unsightly conditions are not always health menaces. It is this department's contention that these back yard farms are in the majority of cases nothing more than unsightly and cannot be classified as public health nuisances. It seems that in order to rid our towns and cities of these undesirable establishments some sort of local zoning rules or ordinances must be considered. Such ordinances are within the powers of towns under chapter 51, sections 50-71, Revised Laws; also chapter 53, sections 14, 26 and 31, Revised Laws. These should be considered now so that both cities and towns will not become unsightly in the eyes of ourselves and our out-of-state visitors.

TOWN OF HUDSON

In the Year of Our Lord One Thousand Nine Hundred and Forty-Six

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING KEEPING AND MAINTAINING HENS, CHICKENS, FOWLS, GEESE, TURKEYS, (or Other Similar Livestock)

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Selectmen for the Town of Hudson:

(1) ANY PERSON, firm or corporation who, at the time of the passage of this Ordinance, owns, keeps, or has possession of, or who maintains or controls, any hens, chickens, fowl, geese, turkeys, or other similar livestock, or any pen for the same, in the compact part of the Town of Hudson, must obtain a permit from the Board of Health of the Town of Hudson within ten (10) days after the passage of this Ordinance.

(2) ANY PERSON, firm or corporation, who, at the time of the passage of this Ordinance, was engaged in the business of raising hens, chickens, fowl, geese, turkeys, or other similar livestock, in the compact part of the Town of Hudson and desires to continue such business shall petition the Health Officer for a permit to do so, setting forth in said petition the number of such livestock on the premises as of the date of the passage of this Ordinance; however, at no time shall the person, firm or corporation have in their possession or under their control a greater number of hens, chickens, fowl, geese, turkeys, or other similar livestock, than the number so registered with the Health Officer.

(3) THE HEALTH OFFICER shall enforce such regulations for the keeping of hens, chickens, fowl, geese, turkeys, or other similar livestock, as he shall in his opinion deem necessary for the general health of the inhabitants of the Town. If such regulations are not complied with and conditions exist, such as offensive odors permeating or polluting the air of adjoining property owners, or unsightly or unsanitary conditions that may affect the public health, he may declare the same a nuisance and deny or revoke a permit for the continuance of the same.

(4) ANY PERSON, firm or corporation keeping, maintaining, or possessing hens, chickens, fowl, geese, turkeys, or other similar livestock, without a permit from the Board of Health in conformance with this Ordinance, shall be prosecuted, and if found guilty, shall be liable to a fine of Ten (\$10.00) Dollars. Each day that this Ordinance is violated shall constitute a new offense.

(5) This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

Report of the School Board

Hudson, New Hampshire January 28, 1946

During the past year we have tried at all times to hold our expenditures to a minimum and at the same time maintain the standards that are demanded in the schools at the present time. However, general costs are much higher, as would have been our fuel bill if we had not had last year's appropriation to insulate the Webster School. The new shower stalls for girls at the Junior High School are in constant use.

Many other repairs have been accomplished. The chimney at the Centre School, inside stairs at the Webster School, floor at the Junior High School Domestic Arts Room, also extra radiation was provided in the Manual Training Room.

More repairs are needed—reroofing the Centre School, a new roof on the Webster School Annex and new radiators at the Webster School.

A problem which must be faced in the future exists at the Centre School in connection with the outside appearance of the grounds. It certainly is no credit to the town and has been a source of much concern to the School Board. They have been unable to improve the grounds due to the shortage of labor but hope soon to make a start in grading and improving the location, which at the present time is somewhat of an eyesore.

We can close this report with a cheerful note. The land on the Lowell Road owned by the School District was sold in the summer of 1945 at its original cost price.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

Hudson, New Hampshire February 18, 1946

To the School Board and Citizens of the Town of Hudson:

I herewith submit my fifth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

The close of the war has had its influence on our schools. The situation regarding men teachers is much easier this year than last. Mr. Howard Libby, principal of the Junior High School for one year, resigned during the summer. We are sorry to lose him. He was replaced by Mr. Wayne S. Gray, a teacher with long experience in upper grades and Junior High work, in New Hampshire. We consider ourselves very fortunate in securing his services. Mr. Bertram Tardif, a former teacher, returned from his military service in time to begin the school year. We are very pleased to welcome him back on the force. He is doing an excellent job in manual training and also in the athletic department. Since Mrs. Ruth Meyers, left toward the end of last year, we have been without a Home Economics teacher. Mrs. Ethel Jewett, a partially gualified teacher, was with us for a time but because of family conditions, found it impossible to continue. Mrs. Coleman is carrying on the work as an ungualified substitute. While she does not meet New Hampshire requirements, she is doing a very satisfactory job as a substitute. At present we can see no prospect of securing a fully qualified teacher in that department.

At the end of the last school year, Miss Mary Monahan, Miss Frances Mills and Miss Alice Desprez secured much better paying positions in Massachusetts. They were excellent teachers and we were sorry to see them leave our system. Hudson cannot compete with Massachusetts cities in salaries. Others may leave for the same reason at the end of this year. We secured the services of Mrs. Marie Goddard of Nashua for the sixth grade and transferred Mrs. Ruth O'Neil to the fourth grade. Mrs. Helen Dwyer of Nashua, replaced Miss Monahan, and Miss Mary Droney of Lowell took Miss Desprez place. Under the circumstances we consider ourselves very fortunate to have been able to fill these vacancies with first class teachers. With the exception of the principalship and Domestic Arts positions, the Junior High teachers remain the same. The teacher shortage is expected to be worse rather than better next year in New Hampshire.

The outlook is bright for more Federal Aid for our noon lunch program. Mrs. Hunnewell and Mrs. Miller are continuing the work. Mrs. Lyons replaced Mrs. French. We have had to limit the number partaking of the noon lunch because facilities for accommodating every child are inadequate.

The enrollment tables for February first show a small decrease in the number of children in the Webster and Hudson Center schools. I want to especially emphasize the much needed repairs in the Hudson Center and Webster schools as outlined in the School Board's report. Because of the shortage of labor and material, we have not been able to do work that has been needed for the past two years.

Mr. Gray's excellent report, as principal of the Junior High School, merits the careful consideration of every parent and those that are interested in the Junior High School.

May I take this opportunity to express appreciation of the fine co-operation of the School Board, teachers and others who have been interested in our schools.

Report of the Principal

Hudson, New Hampshire January 28, 1946

To the Superintendent, School Board, and Citizens of Hudson:

As the Principal of Hudson Junior High School, I hereby submit some suggestions for record in the Annual Report.

For many years we have had mass instruction in the schools, but we have never had mass learning. Learning has been and always will be an individual matter. Pupils differ in their responses because of differences in their mental and emotional maturity, interests, attention spans, and rates of learning. These are conditions which we cannot change, but we can try to meet them more efficiently. Consequently, at present some are held at too slow a pace, with resulting habits of inattention and boredom, while others are forced beyond their powers and hence have been unable to master their own difficulties. These factors should be studied carefully. Then, an additional member on the teaching staff would help some pupils who might be passed by, lost in the crowd, or else regarded with indifference to be discovered and developed into individuals with distinctive and more useful personalities.

The enthusiasm among the student body for physical education warrants careful study and furtherance. The facilities are adequate, but the heating of the auditorium is a problem which hampers the usefulness of that section of the building and retards many related activities which could be offered if the danger of catching cold or worse were not ever present during the winter months.

A few pupils still interfere with a very satisfactory attendance record, but continued emphasis of regular attendance should be the aim of every parent for the best interests of the youngsters. Much class instruction is missed which cannot be given satisfactorily as "make-up". Parents of Hudson, Visit Your Schools! Come in and talk over the many problems which occur. I'm sure that you will find the teachers welcoming this opportunity, and a better coordination between home and school will produce a stronger security in these years of adjustment which are vital if your sons and daughters are to become the substantial citizens which this great nation of ours needs in the coming years.

Students, Teachers, School Board, Superintendent, School Nurse, Hot Lunch Workers, and Janitor, THANK YOU, for your helpfulness and cooperation in making Hudson Junior High School a worthwhile endeavor.

One child has books with clear type material. Two of those pupils were treated at the M.G.H. clinic in Boston, one pupil fitted to a hearing aid.

At Junior High School a tuberculine skin clinic was held— 114 pupils skin tested. 19 pupils were X-rayed and will be examined in the near future by Dr. Robert Kerr, the tuberculosis specialist.

A toxoid clinic held in December 1945, 187 school children and 11 pre-school children were immunized against diphtheria. This clinic will be repeated shortly, as all of the children desiring the toxoid were not cared for, owing to bad weather. In the fall all of Junior High and first grade pupils were given a thorough examination by Dr. John Quigley.

The audiometer test was given in October, to pupils from the third grade, through the Junior High School.

The hot lunch served at noon to Junior High and Webster School pupils is exceptionally well patronized. The milk program is carried on at all of the schools.

We have been fortunate this past year with having few contagious diseases, among our school children.

The cooperation of parents and teachers in carrying on the school health program, is greatly appreciated.
