#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the town of Langdon in the county of Sullivan in said state, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Langdon on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Art. 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing, one Selectman for three years.

Art. 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

Art. 3. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for support of Highways and Bridges, and appropriate the same.

Art. 4. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for State aid Construction, and make appropriation of the same.

Art.5. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for State aid Highway maintenance and make appropriation of the same.

Art. 6. To see what sum of money Town will raise for trunk line maintenance.

Art. 7. To see if the Town will accept the sum of one hundred dollars from the estate of Mrs. Melissa Smith, the

interest to be used for care of Asa Smith lot, in the North Cemetery.

Art. 8. To elect a Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years.

Art. 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise money for eradication of the white pine blister rust.

Art. 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticpation of taxes, for the ensuing year.

Art. 11. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Art. 12. To allow accounts.

#### Report of School Board and Superintendent of Schools

The reports of the superintendent of schools and the treasurer of the school district are offered for careful study, along with the recommendations of the school board for the next year of school.

It is the purpose of the board, (and we believe that the board can show that it has fulfilled its purpose,) to recommend nothing except what seems essential for the continuation of the schools at their present efficiency or to improve, where improvement seems possible.

The great scarcity of girls willing to teach in rural towns makes the problem of securing adequate teaching a very serious one. It is planned to maintain schools of equal or better grade during the year to come, and the school board desires to state its appreciation of the faithful and loyal service offered the town by the present teaching force which constantly attempts improvement.

More community interest is needed in the schools, and a greater co-operation on the part of the parents.

The placing of standardized tests in the schools gives the board an opportunity to discover the actual standing of the grades in comparison with the schools all over the country, and to insist that such scholars as are mentally able to be up to grade shall not be permitted to fall below, and thus cause a repetition of teaching with the expense that goes with it.

Tardiness and non-attendance still remain with us to a degree. It is sincerely hoped that the parents will do all possible to root out the evil habit of tardy attendance, and to see to it that children have every possible opportunity to secure in the few years in which they attend school a proper education fitting them for the many years that are to follow.

Eight short years are, at the best, a meager opportunity to secure material on which to build a life lasting three score and ten.

#### Report of the Superintendent of Schools to the Langdon School Board

#### Gentlemen:

The superintendent desires to express the satisfaction he feels at the exceedingly wise step taken by the Board in replacing the unsafe heating equipment at the Village School with a modern heating unit. The present arrangement of heating offers to the children of Langdon almost perfect comfort and cannot be exceeded in its usefulness and practicality by an equipment even in the modern city schools. The step was an exceedingly progressive one, the results most satisfactory.

The continued remodeling and cleaning and painting of the school-house added much to its pleasantness.

We suggest that the next progressive step might well be the installation of chemical toilets to replace the old style earth closets which are neither modern nor sanitary.

The enrollment during the past year was 55. No children failed of being absent or tardy, and there were 315 cases of tardiness. This is not a good record. More parents should understand that almost all business firms who hire help ask for the school record of the child, as regards punctuality.

We believe that a large bell should be placed on the school house, and rung at stated time before school opens in the morning. This would cure much of the tardiness now due to 'slow clocks."

During the year the superintendent visited 99 times, the members of the school board 12 times, or more than twice the required number. Fifty-two citizens visited the schools.

Langdon received \$1,789.83 from the state-aid fund for the use of the schools. The appropriation by the town was \$1,805.00

We regret that we are forced to report one prosecution of a parent for not schooling his child. One child is excused from attendance because of ill-health, on certificate of his family doctor.

The work done in the schools the past year has been of good grade, and improvement has been constant. Much of the work done in the schools is of a type well worth the consideration of parents in community meetings. We hope that the schools will receive more attention of a critical and interested nature during the coming year, from parents of the town.

We recommend that the Hill school be remodeled in completing the plans of the past year, and that a chemical toilet be installed, saving the expense of remodeling the old outbuilding and giving the Hill school a modern and sanitary equipment.

The superintendent expresses with great pleasure his appreciation of the attitude of so progressive a school board as Langdon possesses, and desires to thank the Board for their cordial attitude and for the constant fund of excellent advice and sane judgment shown by them in times of critical interest. It is a pleasure to serve in Langdon, and

to watch the steady improvement of the schools which always directly reflect to the citizens the attitude of the Board.
