# TOWN MEETING WARRANT

## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

*To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:—*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall and Police Court Room, in the Town Building, on the 11th day of March next, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:—

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for the term of two years, one Selectman for the term of three years, a Town Treasurer, an Auditor, a Collector of Taxes, an Overseer of the Poor, an Agent to prosecute violations of the liquor law, three members of the Board of the Public Library, each for the term of three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds, a Constable and two Road Agents.

ARTICLE 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the laying out, construction and repairing of highways and bridges, for officers' salaries, for town officers' expenses, for town building maintenance, for election and registration expenses, for Memorial Day, for Municipal Court expenses, for the Police Department, for the health department, for vital statistics, for the Community House, for advertising purposes, for miscellaneous expenses, for street lighting, for band concerts, for cemeteries, for damages and legal expenses, for payment of the town debt and interest, for the Community Nurse, for the skating rink, and for all other town charges.

ARTICLE 3. To see what action the Town will take for the purpose of securing State Aid for construction of highways in this Town under the provisions of an act to provide State Aid and for expenditure of other public monies in the construction of highways throughout the State in accordance with Chapter 17 of the Laws of New Hampshire for 1935, or any amendments thereto, or an allotment for expenditure of funds upon its Town highways.



ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen of the Town to apply for, accept and use monies provided by the Federal Government, or State of New Hampshire, for public works, relief unemployment, or otherwise, and do all things required by the Federal Government, or State of New Hampshire, to obtain the same.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will authorize its Board of Selectmen to borrow monies, from time to time, for current indebtedness of the Town, for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1941, and to be paid therefrom.

ARTICLE 7. To see what action the Town will take about repairing or renewing the floor of the Knitting Mill Bridge, so-called, in Littleton Village.

ARTICLE 8. To see what action the Town will take about considering or adopting Chapter 69 of the Laws of 1929, known as the Town Manager Act.

ARTICLE 9. To see what action the Town will take about purchasing and paying for a fire pumper jointly with the Village District.

ARTICLE 10. To see what action the Town will take about rescinding the vote of the Town at its March meeting of 1930, under Article Seven of the Warrant, relating to the acquiring and providing for an aircraft field, and to further see what action it will take relative to acquiring and providing for an emergency landing or airfield in the Town.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$490.00 to the White Mountains Region Association, being one 1/100th of one percent of the town valuation, for the purpose of issuing and distributing printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, and otherwise calling attention to the resources and advantages

of the Town, in cooperation with the other 45 towns in the White Mountains Region.

ARTICLE 12. To see what action the Town will take upon the report of the Committee, appointed by the Board of Selectmen, under the vote of the Town at its annual meeting in 1940, upon protection of the farms on the Ammonoosuc River, below the village, from flood and other water damage.

ARTICLE 13. To see what action the Town will take upon the report of the Committee, appointed by the Board of Selectmen, under the vote of the Town at its annual meeting in 1940, to take care of the sewage in the Ammonoosuc River, particularly below the Cottage Street Bridge, provide additional fire protection from the River, and any other matter related thereto.

ARTICLE 14. To see what action the Town will take for the purpose of improving the highway conditions at the intersection of School and High Streets and to authorize the expenditure of public monies for that purpose.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the division of municipal accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

ARTICLE 16. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 17. To choose any other necessary Town officers for the year ensuing and to choose or elect any agents or committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under this warrant.

ARTICLE 18. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

*To the Water and Light Commissioners:*

In submitting this, my annual report, to you I feel that I should call your attention to a few things of the utmost importance that should be done if we are to continue to give satisfactory service to the Town:

1. Grounded system.
2. Revamp Lafayette Avenue Sub-station.
3. Build line to Patridge Lake and discontinue present sub-station for that line.
4. Build line from Bartlett's Corner, Mann's Hill, to a point near the residence of Mrs. Cochrane, about two (2) miles.
5. Repair both Apthorp and Oak Hill reservoirs.
6. Revise water meter rates.
7. Lower the commercial electric rate.

It is not for me to tell you what to do. That is entirely for you to decide. I would be remiss in my duty as it is given to me to understand, however, if I did not advise you what in my judgment should be done.

Commenting on Article 7 above, it would seem reasonable that if a municipal plant pays as much in taxes as the private power companies pay, it would be sufficient. Practically all public plants are now paying approximately that amount. Many public plants go further and pay, as in our case, a much larger percentage of their earnings, thus using the earnings of their municipal plant to relieve the taxpayers of paying their taxes.

Such payments naturally result in keeping electric rates very high, and thus defeat the main purpose of public owner-

ship, which is to secure the widest possible use of electric power. I do not approve or support this practice because I believe it unfair to raid power and light funds to relieve the taxpayer at the expense of the rate payer.

We herewith submit the annual school report. The report includes treasurer's report for the fiscal year July 1, 1939 to June 30, 1940, with an itemized statement of expenditures for that year; the budget for the present school year and for the next year; statement of estimated receipts for these two years; and written reports by the superintendent of schools and by the headmaster of the high school.

## Superintendent's Report

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*To the School Board:*

I am pleased to submit the following report relative to your schools:

The enrollment of pupils, listed by grades, shows fewer pupils in the first two grades this year than for several years, and a consequently smaller total enrollment.

A comparison of figures shows this year's enrollment less than any since 1930. A few pupils will enter school during the remainder of the year but not enough to make the total equal the average of the past ten years. The enrollment in recent years has been as follows:

In last year's report the recommendation was made that one teacher be added to the high school staff in order to reduce the pupil load and properly care for the increased number of pupils. The recommendation was adopted. You have this



year twelve full time teachers besides the headmaster. The high school enrollment will be about the same as this year for the next three or four years unless affected by pupils leaving school to work in factories because of the rapidly expanding defense program. The present number of teachers in the high school building should be continued until the enrollment in high school grades is definitely less than this year.

The number of pupils in the Kilburn and Apthorp buildings is less than for several years. This smaller number of pupils in the primary grades makes possible more effective teaching. It does not make possible reduced costs except in the items of books and supplies used by pupils. The reduced number of pupils is not enough to permit the elimination of any teachers. It does in fact increase the cost of education per pupil.

As the town's population is about the same as a decade ago the percentage of pupils should be about the same. Probably the total enrollment this year is slightly less than the average of the next five years.

The health work of recent years has been continued during the past year. The following is copied from the report of Miss Bryant to the Community Nursing Association at its recent annual meeting:

"The annual school examinations were conducted by Dr. John M. Page in September and October. Public school pupils numbering 611 were examined and the following defects found: 118 teeth, 9 tonsils, 62 vision defects including cases needing lens change, 7 heart condition, 8 tuberculosis cases, 3 asthma, 183 underweights 10%, 2 crippled children.

"Corrections made from January to July through clinics and special treatment included 14 vision cases, 55 dental cases, 8 tuberculosis and 10 tonsil cases.

"Parochial school students examined were 236, and the defects found included 54 teeth, 6 tonsils, 20 vision, 3 heart condition, 1 asthma, 1 tuberculosis, 3 orthopedic, 85 underweights



10%. Corrections made from January to July included 15 dental cases, 6 vision and 4 tonsil cases.

“School children attended regular dental and eye clinics through the school year. The tonsil clinic was held at the hospital during the summer vacation. Milk was furnished to the grade schools—Kilburn, Parochial and Apthorp, at the morning recess, 75 half pints being distributed each day to those not receiving enough fresh milk at home. Hot lunches were served to those children coming from distances.

“Donations toward the milk fund have been made by the White Mountain Garden Club, \$100, and the Business and Professional Women’s Club, \$50.”

In addition to the general medical examination, the school physician makes special examination of all pupils participating in football and basketball. Through the cooperative effort of high school headmasters a group insurance plan has been developed whereby all pupils participating in school athletic contests, by payment of a small sum, have insurance protection against certain types of injuries.

Police Chief Gardner and his associates have continued to render the same valuable assistance to pupils in crossing streets at noon and at night as in past years. Pupil safety patrols have been organized at the Kilburn school to operate at the grounds and at the street intersections near the school buildings.

Several persons have assisted during the past year and are scheduled to assist this year in the automobile drivers’ course, recommended by the State Motor Vehicle Department and the State Board of Education for prospective drivers.

The State Board of Education has recently purchased an audiometer to be used by the school systems of Coos and Grafton counties. This will make possible a more scientific testing of hearing of all pupils once in two or three years.

The pupils at the Apthorp school have an excellent playground and some playground equipment. The pupils at the Kilburn school have some playground equipment but a rather unsatisfactory playground. The high school pupils make good use of the gymnasium under the leadership of Miss Tewksbury and Mr. Sommers but have little opportunity for out-of-doors games. The high school has football, basketball, baseball, and winter sports teams in competition with other schools. The pupils participating in these sports have rather intensive training. A more general program in physical education for all of the pupils should be the aim in future planning.

Not much change in the program of studies in the elementary grades has been made in the past few years. Committees of the Educational Council of the State Teachers' Association are working with the State Board of Education in revising certain subjects in the elementary program. In your own schools some subjects have received more emphasis than formerly and many improved texts have been purchased. The emphasis placed on health and safety has been reported in previous years. This year some more attention is being given to civics, government and patriotism. The pupils in all grades from the second up have current events papers. These pupil newspapers are carefully written for the different grades with vocabulary of proper reading age, and content of national and world news. They should be a constructive aid in improving reading and in building citizenship.

During the past few years a special effort has been made to increase an interest in reading and to correlate reading with other school subjects. Several sets of readers of recent date are in use in the different grades. So-called science readers, health readers, safety readers, art stories, number stories, social science readers, and democracy readers have replaced some of the adventure and fairy stories of former years. The teachers in the elementary buildings are actively cooperating

in the selection of text books and in selecting a limited number of library or reference books.

Several years ago the practice in the teaching of spelling and handwriting was changed somewhat. New spelling books and penmanship pads or copy books were given to all pupils. Tests given since indicate definite improvement in spelling. Some improvement has been made in handwriting also.

In the high school several changes have been made in the program of studies, in an effort to provide more practical subject matter for a large number of pupils. A course in general science has replaced the one in physiography in grade nine, and a course in civics has replaced the one in history of civilization in grade nine. The science courses now are general science in grade nine, biology in grade ten, chemistry in grade eleven, and physics in grade twelve. The subjects offered in social science are civics in grade nine, world history in grade ten, economics in grade eleven, and sociology and United States Constitutional History in grade twelve.

This year the course in Modern European History is being given but will be included in the world history after this year. This year also a course in advanced general science is being given in grade twelve in place of the physics as there was no demand for physics and the most of the pupils had not taken the courses in mathematics prerequisite for a college preparatory course in physics. Large classes in the woodworking courses of grades nine and ten made necessary such grouping that teacher time did not permit the offering of woodworking in grade eleven. An advanced course in civics was offered to the boys in grades eleven and twelve who had taken two years of woodworking. I think these new courses are providing for the needs and the interests of the pupils better than the ones formerly given.

The practical arts courses are evidently popular with pupils and parents. Of the 94 pupils enrolled in grade nine 30 are in the home economics class, 35 are in the woodworking class,

and 27 are in the commercial group. All four years of the home economics subject matter in the senior high school are now on the Federal Vocational plan. Home economics is offered the seventh and eighth grade pupils in the high school building, in the Apthorp building, and in the St. Rose of Lima school. Two full time teachers are employed in this department. Both the sewing room and the kitchen are in use nearly every period of the day. These rooms are used for a lunch room for all pupils in the high school building who take their lunches to school. The department prepares hot soup and cocoa for all who take their lunch, in both the high school and Kilburn buildings.

The work in mechanic arts includes subject matter in woodworking only and this year extends only through grade ten. The courses in woodworking are offered to the boys in the same schools as those in home economics. One full time teacher is employed and one additional teacher four afternoons a week. The facilities of this department should be extended to include other than woodworking subjects and should be made available to pupils in the two last years of high school.

A large number of pupils takes the course in bookkeeping in grade nine, and the course in bookkeeping and typewriting in grade ten. A smaller number continues the work in stenography and typewriting in grades eleven and twelve. Reports from employers of graduates placed in office positions indicate that efficient work is being done in this department.

The effective work that Mrs. Deveda Cushing has done for years as teacher and supervisor of music in the elementary grades and as teacher in the high school is definitely recognized this year. The prolonged illness and later resignation of Miss Clark has left this position vacant. The position will be filled as soon as possible. The teachers in the elementary grades are carrying on the work in music as well as they can. Nothing has been done in the high school building since Thanksgiving. The success of the high school chorus groups of past years



must not be allowed to disappear from the general program. The complete planning and supervision of music must be done by one well trained in this field of education.

Several changes have occurred in the teaching staff this year. During recent years relatively few changes each year have been necessary. The salary schedule for women teachers, to which I referred in last year's report, has doubtless been a factor in securing and retaining good teachers. It has been an encouragement for continued professional study. In view of the lengthened courses of study in the teachers' colleges some revisions should be made in this schedule. Some recognition of the need of professional study and credit for same beyond the present maximum requirements should be considered.

All of the teachers have had good training for the positions they hold. All are earnest in their efforts for improvement and are interested in the progress of their pupils. Ten of them attended summer school last year. The general level of instruction is high. The national defense program may interrupt the service of some during the next year. For the present school year deferment has been granted the men of eligible draft age.

Last summer the Kilburn and Apthorp buildings were painted on the outside. New tubes were placed in the boiler in the high school building. These jobs with necessary minor repairs make the expenditure for building improvements more than usual.

Next summer the classrooms and corridors in the high school building should be painted. Some improvements in the school grounds at Apthorp and at Kilburn should be made. The many small items of repair nature in the three buildings require the allotment of \$300.00 to \$500.00 each year. As has been previously reported the budget has listed \$2,000.00 for repairs, nearly every year. A study of school building maintenance has resulted in an estimate of one per cent of

valuation for proper upkeep. On this basis the sum of \$2,000.00 seems a conservative amount.

The last school year closed with a net deficit of \$2,068.79. The increased appropriation of last March was enough for the budget of the present year and for a definite reduction in the deficit. The present year will close with a deficit of about \$600.00 unless some unexpected expenditures are necessary before June 30. The budget presented to you for next year totals \$69,677.00. Adding to this a deficit of \$600.00 the total is \$70,277.00. The receipts expected from sources other than taxation amount to about \$4,000.00. The difference is \$66,277.00. If you desire to balance the books at the close of the next school year the appropriation should be \$66,000.00.

The table entitled "financial data" shows that the costs per pupil in the elementary schools and in the high school in Littleton were lower than the state median. It also shows that the cost per thousand dollars of equalized valuation in Littleton was less than the state median. The school district bonds are now reduced to \$40,000.00. These bonds are retired at the rate of \$8,000.00 each year. The high school building has been kept in good repair. The elementary buildings are in better repair than they were ten years ago.

Again, I wish to thank you for your very helpful consideration of all school problems.

## Headmaster's Report

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*To the Superintendent of Schools:*

An annual report such as this must from necessity deal largely with concrete and statistical facts which indicate the degree of physical progress or a lack of it. From their very nature, however, these facts are inadequate to measure those more important essentials of school life, namely: the influence of good teaching and leadership upon the character, civic and moral growth of the pupils. So as you read this, my third report to you, I feel that you must be as conscious as I am of these essentials and of the splendid manner in which these have been administered by our teachers.

### REGISTRATION

In this report of a year ago we estimated that the already record enrollment in the high school would be increased this current year by twenty-five to thirty pupils. Recommendations for increasing our facilities to meet this condition were made.

The current year came, and both the estimated increase in enrollment and the recommendations to meet it became facts. An additional home room was opened, new equipment was installed, and one more teacher was added to the staff. As a result we are administering our school with the largest enrollment in its history without any definite handicap due to overcrowded conditions.

### CURRICULUM

There are two new courses added to the curriculum this year, one in ninth grade general science, and one in ninth grade civics. This latter course has been open to eleventh grade boys for this year only. As there are no pupils who need the twelfth grade course in college physics this year, a

more general course, science survey, is being given in its place. However, a course in college physics is planned for next year.

One course, physical geography, has been dropped and modern European history is being given this year for the last time.

Federal aid, which was first given the ninth and tenth grade courses in home economics two years ago, is extended this year to include the eleventh and twelfth grade courses. Federal aid extends the course requirements and places more emphasis upon home project work.

In my two previous reports I commended the fact that we have the "core curriculum." This I repeat, and I would emphasize the important responsibility of educational guidance that this type of curriculum places upon parents, pupils, and teachers alike. To help in meeting this responsibility a series of meetings was held last June with the eighth grades whose members were planning to enter our school. At these meetings various teachers described the work in their courses.

The subject selection blanks of all pupils were carefully studied and conferences with them and the parents were held whenever it was believed advisable. Due to absence from Littleton during the greater part of the summer, I was not able to make as many visits to homes as had been made the previous two summers. However, office conferences with parents and pupils, especially during the first two weeks in June, were greatly increased.

#### THE DAILY TIME-TABLE

The total length of the school day has not been increased, but the twenty-minute activity period of former years has been added to the time of the sixth period thus making a school day composed of four one hour periods and two forty minute periods instead of three periods of each. This change has greatly facilitated the scheduling of laboratory courses, and has made for greater economy of time generally.

Time for assemblies and class meetings is provided for by shortening or omitting a period on a rotating schedule.

#### THE TEACHING STAFF

Earlier in this report reference was made to the invaluable good that the increase of an additional member to our staff has done. Therefore it remains only for me at this time to pay a sincere tribute to the efficiency, co-operation and loyalty to duty which all members have manifested whether it be in the classroom, committee assignments, or extra-curricular activities.

#### APPROVAL AND CERTIFICATE PRIVILEGE

As in the past Littleton High School has full approval of the New Hampshire State Board of Education as well as the certificate privilege of the New England College Entrance Certificate Board. To my knowledge our school has never been refused the certificate privilege from any college from which it has requested the same.

#### SCHOLARSHIP

I believe that it is impossible to over-emphasize the importance of that type of scholarship that consistently keeps near to the pupil's ability. To accomplish this daily home study is essential. College grade work is 85 or above. Examples of keen disappointment and real sorrow are still numerous among those who realize too late that their plans and ambitions cannot be carried out because of a failure in this particular.

There has just come to my desk as I write a state report on the grade of college work done by graduates of New Hampshire approved schools who entered college for the first time in the fall of 1939 and remained throughout the academic year. There were 96 schools on the list, and I am pleased to write that our graduates made a record that placed us in the upper two-fifths in this classification.

#### ATTENDANCE

A high standard of regular and prompt attendance is of fundamental importance to a school. The following statistics

are taken from the 1939-1940 statistical report of the state report of education.

It is gratifying to see that our schools bettered the average of the state in both attendance and lack of tardinesses. In the latter particular we have been on the state's "Commendable List" for two consecutive years.

## ATHLETICS

Measured in terms of loyal support and financial accomplishment the current year is proving to be one of the most successful in recent years. The policies continue to be the same as outlined in my last report, and wholesome cooperation concerning them has made marked progress possible. These items are suggestive of this:

1. Membership in the Littleton High School Athletic Association has steadily increased as shown by the following tabulation:

2. The athletic budget of five hundred dollars (three hundred of which to be raised by membership within the student body, and two hundred dollars by season ticket support from without) was over-subscribed early in the year. Especially do we appreciate the fine work of the committee who had charge of the latter phase of the drive.

3. Under the direction of two teachers an efficient and loyal "pep squad" takes charge of the cheering sections at our athletic games.

4. There is a marked increase in the spirit of those who come out for the different sports.

5. The receipt of several valuable gifts for our athletic department is another indication of the genuine interest and support that we are receiving from Littleton citizens.

6. All our athletic teams are now under a system of student managership which is functioning in a manner that must result in building leadership and responsibility for those holding office.

7. By an almost unanimous vote of the athletic association, "Winter Sports" is now a major sport at our high school.

#### OTHER SCHOOL ORGANIZATIONS

One new organization, a science club, has been added to the list of pupil organizations recorded in this report a year ago. This club, under the leadership of Mr. Estabrook, is limited to members of the ninth grade. It meets once a week when a program of pupil suggested problems is carried out by the members.



Due to the resignation of Miss Clark we regret that the work of our several glee club and choral groups has been temporarily suspended.

#### NYA PROGRAM

The budget allotted to our school for the current year is \$468.00 which is an increase of \$36.00 over that of last year. Fifteen pupils have qualified for work under this program, and are receiving checks not exceeding the monthly maximum of \$6.00.

#### MISCELLANEOUS ACTIVITIES

The following activities have been important in our school life during the past year, and have brought credit to the ones responsible for them.

- The school census taken by the senior class
- The fourth annual Spring Festival Concert
- The annual North Country Orchestra Concert
- The Freshman Reception, sponsored by the seniors
- The senior play, "Young April"
- The football banquet given by the Littleton Rotary Club
- The Twelfth Night Party arranged by the freshmen
- The junior class Prom
- The Hallowe'en Party given by the sophomores
- The annual Stunt Night
- The publication of the Winter Sports Program.

The cooperative service bureau under the direction of Mr. Glazier has extended its scope of usefulness to the point where it is attracting inquiries from surrounding towns which are planning similar projects. A comprehensive survey of the last five classes to graduate from our school has been completed as a supplementary part of the work of this bureau. This survey gathered information concerning the location and employment of each graduate. Already it has been found an aid in advancement and replacement work.

A course in "Safety and the Automobile" is being given one period per week. The course is sponsored by the State Department of Education and the State Motor Vehicle Department, and is organized and directed in our school by Mr. Glazier. Twenty-six pupils are enrolled. A fine list of guest speakers and instructors have been secured from among the citizens of our town.

Instruction in the use of our public library has been given to several of our English classes by the town librarian.

Physical examination of all pupils has been completed by Dr. Page, assisted by Miss Bryant. Parents have been notified concerning the deficiencies found. A special examination has been given all those who took part in either football or basketball.

A motion picture program for the showing of educational films is being conducted under the supervision of Mr. Estabrook. The plan calls for two showings each week, one during the noon hour, and the other at the close of the afternoon session. Attendance is voluntary, but the large number of pupils who take advantage of the opportunity reflects both the popularity and worthwhileness of it.

As in the past years hot lunches are being served through the winter months under the auspices of the sophomore class in Foods and Nutrition. Two girls from this class have charge of it each week. The servings for the high school and the Kilburn school average 130 daily which is more than in previous years. About twenty free servings are furnished daily to those pupils who cannot afford to pay for them.

#### OCCASIONS OF SPECIAL INTEREST TO TOWNSPEOPLE

The activities of American Education Week in November, and Commencement in June are planned primarily for parents and friends.

The annual school exhibit, which is scheduled this year for May 4, has its sole objective as an effort to acquaint our townspeople with the work of their schools.

Both our regular and our special assemblies are open to all who are interested.

The foregoing are special occasions to which all are welcome. We urge you, however, to visit us at any time and see your school as it functions in its every day work..

#### AWARDS

On April 10, 1940, Mr. George H. Tilton generously added four more awards to the ten awards given the previous year. These were as follows:

1. Five dollars for the freshman who shows the greatest promise of becoming an outstanding all around senior.
2. Five dollars for the sophomore who has shown the most all around improvement in the second year.
3. Five dollars to a junior for excellence in English.
4. Five dollars to a senior for excellence in United States Constitutional History.

These fourteen George H. Tilton awards, the American Legion medal, the American Legion Auxiliary award of five dollars, the Scholarship Key for excellence in the commercial subjects, and the National Honor Society membership cards were awarded during the activities of commencement week.

Our school again enjoyed the privilege of choosing a representative for the Good Citizenship Pilgrimage conducted each February in this state by the Daughters of the American Revolution. This, as in previous years, was made possible through the courtesy of the Gunthwaite Chapter of Lisbon.

#### ACKNOWLEDGEMENT OF GIFTS

It is with sincere thanks and appreciation that we acknowledge the following gifts received during the year.

Athletic Department: Two all-steel backboards and baskets. Two footballs. Two referee's whistles.

English Department: Several novels, biographies, and books of travel for use in junior high school classes.

Science Department: Collection of moths and butterflies. Subscription to "American Forests."

#### ONE RECOMMENDATION

In observing the daily functioning of our school there seems to be one real need which in my opinion would be possible to meet next year. This is the establishment, or at least the beginning of a school library. Pupils are inconvenienced by not having general references and supplementary reading materials centralized where they can become easily available. This would be remedied to a large extent if a place accommodating from 15 to 20 pupils could be made available each period of the day. As soon as any decrease in enrollment occurs, it would seem possible that either the rear section of our study hall, Room 6, or Room 1 might be used. Either place could be remodeled into a small library with little additional equipment or expense. The administration of the library could be in the hands of student librarians supervised by a teacher committee. This system has proven satisfactory in schools of our size.

#### CONCLUSION

As I conclude I wish to extend my thanks and appreciation to all those individuals and organizations whose friendly counsel or loyal cooperation has made it possible to accomplish the things set forth in this report. It is a real pleasure to work and serve under such conditions.

*To the Board of Trustees of the Littleton Public Library, the annual report of the Librarian is herewith submitted:*

The figures which appear in the statistical report for the 51st year of the Littleton Public Library show a continuation of its good service to Littleton and vicinity. The total number of books borrowed maintained nearly the same level as in 1939. The usual activities of instruction in the use of the library to high school students, the periodic story hours, and the loan of classroom book collections to the Apthorp School were carried on as in previous years.

We have used the State Library frequently for books and information which our own collection did not supply. More and more people are also taking advantage of the opportunity to borrow fine phonograph records from the State Library collection.

During July and August an antiques exhibit was held in the upstairs rooms of the library in celebration of its fiftieth birthday. Many objects relating to Littleton history, the beginnings and progress of the community, were on display. Most interesting were the things loaned by Littleton residents. Some of these items were afterwards given to the library for its permanent collection. The showing was well attended and more than four hundred visitors signed the registration book. Other exhibits during the year were those of the Amherst Camera Club, the W. P. A. art project, and the Conway Public Library doll collection.

Most important from a professional standpoint was the establishment in August of the regional library headquarters in the basement room of the library with Miss Elizabeth Humphrey in charge. The bookmobile, one of the two operated by the New Hampshire Public Library Commission, serves Grafton and Coos counties using Littleton as a center. Our library gives light, heat and rent in exchange for the privilege of borrowing books and receiving professional advice.



A gift of \$5,000 was received from Charles Bingham, to be known as the Charles F. and Hattie Quimby Bingham Book Fund. This fine contribution will make possible the purchase of a good number of books hitherto not afforded by the library budget. To Mr. Bingham and to others who made gifts during the year we express thanks.

A weekly art class with instruction provided by St. Mary's School is being held on Thursday evenings at the library. Great interest is being shown by those townspeople who are taking advantage of the fine opportunity made possible by St. Mary's.

Improvement of the library building was continued with the sanding and refinishing of the floors in the main part of the building. A dozen much-needed new chairs for the adult reading room were purchased. The need for increased and improved shelving space in the stack room remains the greatest problem of the library as an adequate building. The desirability of a steel stack was presented in detail in last year's report, and when funds are available such an alteration should be made.

This annual report is of necessity brief. The present librarian has been at the library only two months of the year, hardly long enough for any new trends to have become clearly apparent to her. I leave the figures following to explain themselves, and close in the hope and belief that in the coming year the library will be able to continue its service to the satisfaction of the town.
