### REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN

The Selectmen are pleased to report no major problems, and, indeed, significant accomplishments in several areas:

- -- Town expenses during these economic times remain essentially flat.
- -- Agreement is close with the State concerning the eventual maintenance of existing Route 9 after the bypass is completed and on terms much more favorable to the Town than were originally proposed by the State. We feel strongly that this will be in the long-term interest of the Town, and extend thanks to all those who have helped and will continue to assist in this effort.
- -- A 50% matching grant for energy conservation improvements to the Town Hall was obtained from the State, and work is underway at this writing. The efforts of Mary Davis in this matter are especially noted with thanks.

On a less happy note, your Selectmen are concerned by an apparent increase in the inclination by residents to attempt resolution of problems through litigation, rather than negotiation. Similarly, we note for the first time in many years what appears to the Selectmen to be efforts to evade, if not directly violate, the spirit of our zoning regulations. These tendencies, if continued, bode ill for the long-term health of the community. We hope all residents will join with us in renewed effort to resolve future differences of opinion rationally and cooperatively. The Selectmen, for their part, pledge to persist in this respect and look forward to another productive year for the Town.

As always, it is a great pleasure to note here the work of so many citizen volunteers, without whose work life in Nelson would be so much less rewarding. We note with appreciation the work of all the Town officers listed in the Report, as well as the many other residents who have contributed to the Town's well-being over the past year.

### TOWN WARRANT

TO THE INHABITANTS of the Town of Nelson, in the County of Cheshire, State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs: YOU ARE HEREBY NOTIFIED to meet in the Town Hall in said Nelson on Tuesday, the 9th day of March at 12:00 noon to act upon the following articles:

POLLS will open at 12:00 noon and close at 8:00 p.m. BUSINESS MEETING will start at 7:00 p.m.

### ARTICLES OF A GENERAL NATURE

- 1. To choose necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$80,400 to defray Town charges for the year ensuing. (The 1992 appropriation was \$82,960.)
- 3. To see if the Town, pursuant to RSA 33:7, will authorize the Selectmen to incur debt and issue notes in anticipation of taxes for the year 1993.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax liens for nonpayment of taxes and to convey title to properties deeded to the Town by the Tax Collector or otherwise. Such conveyance shall be by deed following either public auction or advertised sealed bid, or may be otherwise disposed of as justice may require, pursuant to RSA 80:80.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by Town meeting, money from State, Federal or other governmental units or private sources which may become available during the year, in accordance with RSA 31:95-b.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept, on behalf of the Town, gifts, legacies and devises made to the Town in trust for any public purpose, as permitted by RSA 31:19.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts of personal property which may be offered to the Town for any public purpose, pursuant to RSA 31:95-e. The acceptance shall not bind the Town to raise, appropriate or expend any public funds for the operation, maintenance, repair, or replacement of any such personal property.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate an amount not to exceed \$10,000 to move structures which may become available from the State.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,400 for the purchase of a photocopier.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1 to be added to the Revaluation Capital Reserve Fund. (No money was appropriated in 1992. The current fund balance is \$9,863.)
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,625 for the support of the Town Library. (The 1992 appropriation was \$8,552.)
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the number of Trustees of the Olivia Rodham Memorial Library to be elected by the Town to be reduced from three to two, with the number of permanent Trustees remaining at three.

- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,800 as its fair share of the operating costs of the Home Health Care and Community Services. (The 1992 appropriation was \$1,800.)
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$544 as its fair share of the operating costs of Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service. (The 1992 appropriation was \$535.)
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1 to be added to the Town Hall/Schoolhouse Capital Reserve Fund for the renovation or remodeling of the Town Hall or Old Brick Schoohouse, it being understood that no withdrawals may be made from the fund except by vote of the Town. (No money was appropriated in 1992. The current fund balance is \$41,745.)
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600 to pay for a survey of a former Town dump. It is the landowners' wish to separate this site from other land which they own by subdivision, whereupon they will convey the former dump site to the Town at no further cost.

## ARTICLES DEALING WITH PLANNING & ZONING

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$538 as the Town's share for membership in the Southwest Regional Planning Commission. (The 1992 appropriation was \$535.)

## ARTICLES DEALING WITH SERVICE AND PROTECTION

- 18. To see if the Town will vote by ballot to dissolve the Ashuelot Valley Refuse Disposal District (henceforth "the District", as organized under RSA Chapter 53-B), pursuant to the provisions of Article VI, Section 7 of the district agreement for the District and the provisions of the plan of dissolution approved by the district committee of the District, a copy of which plan of dissolution has been submitted by the District to the Town. Said plan is printed elsewhere in this Town Report. (A 2/3 majority vote is required to approve this article.)
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 as a subsidy for ambulance service for the ensuing year, it being understood that Townspeople will still be charged for individual calls. (The appropriation in 1992 was \$3,000.)
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 for the proper expenses of the Police Department. (The 1992 appropriation was \$2,500.)
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 for the Special Police Detail necessitated by construction of the Route 9 Bypass. This amount will be reimbursed by the general contractor.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 for the proper expenses of the Fire Department and Rescue Squad. (The 1992 appropriation was \$5,000.)
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 for the purchase of 500 feet of 4-inch diameter supply hose.
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for the purchase of a portable radio for the Fire Department and Rescue Squad. (The 1992 appropriation was \$2,000.)

- 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of new equipment for the Fire Department, it being understood that no withdrawals may be made from the fund except by vote of the Town and upon recommendation of the Fire Department. (The 1992 appropriation was \$5,000. The current fund balance is \$40,275.)
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund devoted to the repair, reconstruction or replacement of the Fire Station, it being understood that no withdrawals may be made from the fund except by vote of the Town and upon recommendation of the Fire Department. (In 1992, no money was appropriated. The current fund balance is \$4,558.)

### ARTICLES DEALING WITH ROADS

- 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$122,000 for general highway expenses and labor in the maintenance of the Town's roads and bridges. (The 1992 appropriation was \$112,000 plus a separate \$10,000 article for gravel.)
- 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to be added to the Road Equipment Capital Reserve Fund. It is understood that no withdrawals may be made from this fund for the purchase of road equipment except by vote of the Town and upon recommendation of the Road Equipment Committee. (The 1992 appropriation was \$5,000. The current fund balance is \$49,232.)
- 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000 repair of bridges and box culverts.
- 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,000 for construction of a sand and salt shed.
- 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 for purchase of a hot water pressure washer.
- 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000 to upgrade Cabot Road.

## OTHER ARTICLES

33. To transact any other business or discuss other warrant proposals as may legally be brought before the meeting.

## Plan of Dissolution

The Ashuelot Valley Refuse Disposal District voted in the District Committee on December 8, 1992, to place on the ballot of member towns the question "Are you in favor of the dissolution of the 53-B District (the "Ashuelot Valley Refuse Disposal District")? A 2/3 majority of voters present and voting in a town shall be required in order to affirm dissolution, according to the District Agreement.

## Date of Dissolution

The District will be automatically dissolved upon the date of filing a sworn affidavit with the Secretary of State.

The following provisions are made in accordance with Article VI, Section 7B of the District Agreement, "Plan of Dissolution":

- 1. The assets of the District are fully described and valued in the attached financial statement, which shall be considered part of the Plan of Dissolution.
  - 2. The District has no known creditors or long-term obligations.
- 3. Assets of the District shall be distributed to current member municipalities by the percentage proportions shown on the attached statement, based on the 1990 census. The initial distribution shall be made as soon as possible after the date of dissolution, but shall not include the amount of \$27,500 approved as operating expenses for 1993-1996.
- 4. It is expected that the assets of the District will be adequate to discharge all obligations and that no additional payments will need to be made by current member municipalities.
- 5. There are no remaining liabilities or obligations to be assumed by current member municipalities.
- 6. Any amounts remaining 3 years after the date of dissolution, including unexpended reserve funds from the operating budget and any amounts collected in claims against former members by said date or thereafter shall be distributed by the same method as described in (3) above. No amount shall be reserved from distribution more than 3 years after the date of dissolution, except to the the limited extent necessary to complete outstanding legal proceedings or other statutory requirements, if any.

For a period of 3 years after the date of dissolution, the District shall continue as a body corporate for the sole purose of settling its financial affairs, and shall be authorized to elect officials and conduct meetings according to the District Agreement, except to the the limited extent necessary to complete outstanding legal proceedings or other statutory requirements, if any.





#### LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

1992 was a year of extending and improving services at the Olivia Rodham Memorial Library. The library became active in many of the services offered by the state library, including becoming part of NHAIS (New Hampshire automated information services). This service offers OCLC card cataloging for all books, and bibliographic database searches to meet the information needs of the community.

The traditional Monday afternoon story hour was offered every other week and organized by Denise Kearns. An average of eight children attended 21 story hours. The summer reading program, "Get that Reading Rhythm" attracted seven summer readers (Haley Witsell, Andrew Tuttle, Maya Trudelle, Ann Church, Christie Wilder, Molly Peery, and Angela Descoteaux), who read a total of 78 books. Also riddles were posted weekly and correct guesses by the contestant won a poster.

The trustees had five meetings in 1992; the main topic covered was updating the library policies. This has been a very involved process, but is nescessary to be eligible for grant funds.

Many thanks to Joan Warner who acted as the substitute librarian. Lindy Black, Bette Lenox, and Joanne Warner volunteered many hours and kept the library running smoothly; their efforts are greatly appreciated. Due to the skills and generosity of Rob Germeroth, the library now has an additional and much-needed shelf. Thanks to Andrew, John & Daniel Tuttle, Angela Descoteaux, and Rachel Kidd for all their help in circula-tion and their creativity on the bulletin boards. There was a total of 85 volunteer hours.

As always, the library as a whole extends its appreciation for all the donations for the Annual Book Sale in August. A special thanks to the Friends of the Library for their donation of money to buy new books. We are also grateful to all who have donated money toward the library addition. Many of these donations were in memory of Patty Packard.

The planning for this year includes warrant articles for two capital items which we feel we need. Our four-inch hose has been in service since the purchase of the pumper it's on, in 1970. It needs to be replaced. The other article pertains to purchase of another multi-channel protable radio. The units that were acquired last year have worked out very well and we would like to add one more unit. This should complete portable radio purchases for awhile, with the old units still in use by fire personnel at emergency scenes. The capabilities of your fire department will be enhanced by the addition of these new pieces of equipment.

Hopefully this year will see the return to funding our Capital Reserve Fund for new equipment to the appropriate levels. With the rebuilding of our pumper in 1990, the life expectancy of this piece of equipment was extended by ten years. By the year 2000, however, this unit will have seen 30 years of service to the Town and will need to be replaced. At present, replacement costs are in the range of \$80,000 - \$100,000. By the time we are ready to make such a purchase, it is expected that the cost will be at the \$100,000 end of this range. During the past 20 years, firefighting equipment has changed dramatically. As technology has advanced, our pumper has become increasingly outdated and we need to plan for its eventual replacement. Also, new standards for equipment have evolved, and we need to integrate these into our department with this next purchase.

This past year has seen the completion of an update to Nelson's Emergency Management Plan. This is being reviewed by the State and will soon be available at the Town Offices for anyone who cares to examine it. We added turnout gear for some new members, added some small equipment items, had some good hands-on training with volunteers from Stoddard when live burns were done at the former Miner residence on Route 9, and participated in Old Home Day activities. A recent inspection of the school has benefitted fire department personnel, as well. Calls as noted above in the log, have been comparable to other years. Both chimney fires and Mutual Aid support were up a little this year. We strongly recommend that all who heat their homes with wood have the chimneys inspected and cleaned frequently.

Again, as in previous years, I encourage interested persons to come and join the Fire Department. We always need new members. In this day and age, it is difficult to be a volunteer, but it benefits both the person and the Town. An active local Fire Department also helps keep your insurance rates lower.

I'd like to thank all the active members for their continued effort and support. Remember, to report a fire or other emergency, call 352-1100.

### FIRE PERMITS

As stated in New Hampshire state law (RSA 224:27B), "No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or burn or cause to be burned any material, except when the ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done."

Burning may be done before 9 a.m. or after 5 p.m. If it is necessary to burn during the day for commercial purposes, a special permit is required from the state Forest Ranger. It is also possible to burn during the day if it is raining, however, a written permit is still required. Written permission is required if an individual wishes to burn on land belonging to someone else, as well. If individuals wish to burn in an incenerator, a seasonal permit may be issued, but the burning must still be done before 9 a.m. or after 5 p.m. In Nelson, there is no charge for these permits at this time.

### REPORT OF THE ROAD AGENT

It doesn't seem possible, but this is my 10th year as road agent, and I'm running for re-election to make it my 11th.

As you all remember, last year's mud season was one of the worst ever. The climatic conditions are ripe for dramatic mud again this year too, but we now have that new front-mounted rake to help out. The brush cutting done last year should also help to alleviate the mud situation. Brush cutting is fundamental to good road maintenance. Clear road shoulders improve visibility and therefore improve safety. Clear road shoulders also improve drainage, reducing washouts, improving sun penetration, drying out icy or muddy situations and giving us a place to push snow in winter.

For 1993, the road department has again drafted a budget that is very lean, and intended to be in line with the economic times. This year's basic highway operating budget is flat compared to last year's, if you add the gravel to it. If you add all the additional articles requested for 1993, the budget is 8% higher. The additional articles are brought before you for the following reasons:

The sand shed will be a time and labor saver for the town crew and will be designed to store the sanders indoors during the summer. The structure is also an effort on our part to be environmentally responsible by reducing salt runoff into the stream next to the town barn by containing the salt in a confined area. Also by storing the salted sand indoors, there will be less need (lesser amount) of salt to be added to the sand mix; less salt will therefore be put on the roads, causing less damage to the environment and less vehicle corrosion.

The bridge article is to continue maintenance on bridges and box culverts on Log Cabin Road and Granite Lake Road.

The hot water pressure washer is to keep our aged equipment in clean, working shape, and will also be used to thaw culverts in the winter.

The Cabot Road article is to upgrade this road from the Merricon Road to the Harrisville town line because the Cabot Road is open year round now.

The capital reserve fund request is reduced to \$5,000 again this year, instead of the \$10,000 which has historically been requested. This means we continue to fall behind in our long-term equipment plan. Although the need for more money is there, the reduction seems fiscally advisable at this time.

During the year we did body work to the 1978 International and painted the 1978 loader. We purchased a 5-ton Mack truck from Federal surplus for use as a dump truck and traded the F-600 dump truck to Sullivan for a truck with a dump body and snow fighting equipment on it that we will switch over to the Mack truck mentioned above.

On Murdough Hill we made more cold, mix-in-place asphalt for what is called a "drag shim", which is used to fill wheel ruts, large cracks and voids. This is a very cheap way to try to save what's left of the asphalt. I hope that those of you who saw us working noticed the cooperation of neighboring towns on this project. The assisting towns were Harrisville, Sullivan and Dublin. Nelson then reciprocated equal time and trucking for projects in those towns. Cooperative projects with other towns cost less because of the efficiency of increased manpower and equipment concentrating on a large-scale project such as this. Labor and trucking of neighboring towns is less expensive than contracting out the same level of effort from an independent contractor.

Below is a table showing the road maintenance equipment owned by the town.

On a bittersweet note, the Route 9 by-pass is under way. This may or may not bring more work to the Nelson road department in the form of usage of town roads for the Route 9 work in progress. Also, the selectmen, the Nelson Route 9 committee and I are still in talks with the state on their keeping the existing Route 9 as a state-maintained road.

Please exercise caution and discretion during severe storms. Manpower and equipment limitations prevent us from being everywhere at once. Your updates on road conditions are very welcome. If you discover a situation that needs attention, please call the Town Barn and leave a message, rather than assume we already know about it. After you've left a message, please be patient, as we may be in the midst of working on a worse problem somewhere else in town.

The working of the road department continues with great thanks to the help of Mike Tarr, Frank Ball and George Warner Jr.

Remember that there is winter sand available at the Town Barn for use by Nelson residents on their own personal driveways.

#### 1992 TOWN MEETING MINUTES

Moderator John Bradshaw called the meeting to order at 12:00 noon on March 10, 1992. It was a cold, foggy and misty day which continued into the evening. Moderator Bradshaw read Article 1: "To choose necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing." It was moved and seconded that the reading of the rest of the warrant be waived until the start of the business meeting. The motion was passed by voice vote. The polls were declared open and the voting began.

The business meeting was convened at 7:00 p.m. Moderator Bradshaw acknowledged that there were some announcements to be made prior to the start of the reading of the warrant.

Kathy Blaudschun wanted everyone to know that Nelson now has its own baseball field, on a piece of leased land from Steve and Deb Bosworth located behind the Town Barn. She thanked everyone who generously gave their time, donated their equipment, materials and monies to ready the playing field for the 1992 season. Moderator Bradshaw read the announcement that the NSS Baseball Assoc. will have registrations March 17, 1992 at the Nelson School from 6:30 to 8:00 p.m. Also, there will be a Dog and Cat Rabies Clinic on Saturday April 11, 1992 at the Town Hall from 9:00 a.m. to 12 noon. Distemper shots will also be available.

Selectman Ethan Tolman had some town updates. The first being, the State Department of Transportation will have a hearing on Thursday March 19, 1992 at 7:00 p.m. at the Town Hall. Some of their concerns that will be brought out are: the relocation of the State Barn and a small wetlands issue. The town has it own concerns some being: the access to Rt 9 for folks who live down near Walters' Farm and the unwillingness of the state to share in the cost of maintaining what will be the old Rt. 9. Selectman Tolman encouraged citizens to attend this meeting and support the town in their effort to negotiate with the state.

Other updates were: a review of the results of the School District Meeting held Friday March 6, 1992, and the Selectmen are still dealing with the Post Office situation, it has been a slow process.

### ARTICLES OF A GENERAL NATURE

- 2. "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$82,960 to defray Town charges for the year ensuing." It was moved and seconded that the article be adopted as read. Dave Bower asked about the amount of \$3000 for reappraisal. Selectman Tolman responded that this amount is for updating for new buildings or additions. Dave also asked about the plan to have the town reappraised over a 4 to 5 year period as discussed last year. Selectman Mednick explained that the plan mentioned last year didn't work out, they couldn't find anyone to do it in that manner. Maury Collins asked for an explanation about the increase in the town clerk/tax collector's salary. Selectman Mednick explained that in years past, the clerk and tax collector received an honarium plus fees, which by no means came to a reasonable hourly rate. This year we've gone to a payment of hourly rate, the fees which in the past have gone to the town clerk/tax collector, will now go to the town's general fund. The article passed by voice vote.
- 3. "To see if the Town, pursuant to RSA 33:7, will authorize the Selectmen to incur debt and issue notes in anticipation of taxes for the year 1992." It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. It passed by voice vote.
- 4. "To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax liens for nonpayment of taxes and to convey title to properties deeded to the Town by the

Tax Collector or otherwise. Such conveyance shall be by deed following either public auction or advertrised sealed bid, or may be otherwise disposed of as justice may require, pursuant to RSA 80:80." It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. The question was asked "was it available to the public to purchase these tax liens?" William Robertson, Tax Collector, answered that by State law, towns were allowed to do away with the tax sale. Now the town is the sole owner of these tax liens and gets the interest on them. The town voted and passed this about 4 years ago. The question was asked "who determines the interest rates?" The Selectmen responded that the rates are established by State law. The article passed by voice vote.

- 5. "To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by Town meeting, money from State, Federal or other governmental units or private sources which may become available during the year, in accordance with RSA 31:95-b." It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. It was passed by voice vote.
- 6. "To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept, on behalf of the Town, gifts, legacies and devises made to the Town in trust for any public purpose, as permitted by RSA 3:19." It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. It was passed by voice vote.
- 7. "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate no money to be added to the Revaluation Capital Reserve Fund." It was moved and seconded to pass over this article. The question was asked "why pass it over?" Selectman Tolman responded that this is to reduce town expenditures. It was passed over by voice vote.
- 8. "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,552 for the support of the Town Library." It was moved and seconded the article be accepted as read. It passed by voice vote.
- 9 "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,800 as the Town's share of the operating costs of the Home Health Care and Community Service." It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. It passed by voice vote.
- 10 "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$535 as its fair share of the operating costs of Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service." It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. It passed by voice vote.
- 11 "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1 to be added to the Town Hall/Schoolhouse Capital Reserve Fund for the renovation or remodeling of the Town Hall or Old Brick Schoolhouse, it being understood that no withdrawals may be made from the fund except by vote of the Town." It was moved and seconded that the article be passed over. It was passed over by voice vote.
- 12. "To see if the Town will authorize withdrawal of up to \$5,000 from the Town Hall/Schoolhouse Capital Reserve Fund for use as matching funds for a grant from the Governor's Energy Office to improve the energy efficiency of the Town Hall. In the event that no funds are available from the State, no withdrawal will be made." It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. The question was asked "what is this withdrawal about?" Selectman Tolman offered the explaination of the town making an application to the Governors Energy Office for a matching grant for energy related improvements to the building. The article passed by voice vote.

- 13. "To see if the Town will vote to empower the Selectmen to appoint the Road Agent annually." (by petition) It was moved and seconded to pass over this article. Maury Collins responded that he submitted this article. In his observation things haven't be working well between the Road Agent and the Road Equipment Committee recently; he had also heard rumors of some things allegedly done by the Road Agent which Maury felt were not appropriate. Frank Ball, a member of the Road Equipment Committee, said that he shared a good deal of time with Bud and he felt he had a good awareness of what was going on. Jim Jarvela stated that a town meeting is a clear demonstration of democracy, and if there is a problem with the Road Agent we have the power to vote the person out. The article was passed over by voice vote.
- 14. "To see if the Town will vote to appoint a volunteer committee to study the potential for recycling all types of trash generated in the Town of Nelson. This committee would report periodically to the Selectmen and would make a final recommendation by next year's town meeting." (by petition) It was moved and seconded to accept the article as read. The question was asked "who will appoint the committee?" The motion does not say. The Selectmen support the acticle if one was to be organized. The article passed by voice vote.

### ARTICLES DEALING WITH PLANNING & ZONING

15. "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$535 as the Town's share for membership in the Southwest Regional Planning Commission." It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. It passed by voice vote.

### ARTICLES DEALING WITH SERVICE AND PROTECTION

- 16. "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 as a subsidy for ambulance service for the ensuing year, it being understood that Townspeople will still be charged for individual calls." It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. Some discussion followed as to who covers Nelson. It was explained that the City of Keene Ambulance Service responds to calls in Nelson through Fire Mutual Aid. It passed by voice vote.
- 17. "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 for the proper expenses of the Police Department." It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. It passed by voice vote.
- 18. "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 for the proper expenses of the Fire Department and Rescue Squad." It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. It passed by voice vote.
- 19. "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum to \$2,000 for the purchase of portable radios for the Fire Department." It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. Fire Chief Lothrop explained that there is a need for multiple channel radios for the Road Agent, who is also a fireman, and for the Fire Warden. The article was passed by voice vote.
- 20. "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of new equipment for the Fire Department, it being understood that no withdrawals may be made from the fund except by vote of the Town and upon recommendation of the Fire Department." It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. It passed by voice vote.
- 21. "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund established in March 1988, to be devoted to the repair, reconstrucion or replacement of the Fire Station, it being

understood that no withdrawals may be made from the fund except by vote of the Town and upon recommedation of the Fire Department." It was moved to pass over and seconded. It was passed over by voice vote.

#### ARTICLES DEALING WITH ROADS

22. "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$116,000 for general highway expenses and labor in the maintenance of the roads and bridges." It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. Discussion followed in reference to the FICA costs relating to the budget. It was explained the reason for combining the labor and maintenace articles this year is to offer more flexiblity in the budget.

At this time the Selectmen asked for a brief recess. The Moderator took this time to close the polls at  $8:00~\mathrm{pm}$ 

Selectman Tolman read a recognition scroll from the grateful citizens of Nelson to William R. Robertson, retiring Tax Collector and former Auditor, Bookkeeper, Planning Board Chairman, and Treasurer. A standing ovation followed!

Moderator Bradshaw called the meeting back to order. Discussion of article 22 continued. Selectman Mednick made an amendment to article 22 " to change the sum from \$116,000 to \$112,000." An explanation was given that the FICA figures were calculated incorrectly, this amendment would make it correct. There was discussion on how the wages are recorded in the town report and how they could be made clearer. The amendment was seconded. The amendment was accepted by voice vote. The article passed by voice vote.

- 23. "To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to receive and appropriate the monies from the State Highway Black Grant. These monies will be used to offset road maintenace." It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. It passed by voice vote.
- 24. "To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$5000 to be added to the Equipment Capital Reserve Fund. It is understood that no withdrawals may be made from this fund for the purchase of road equipment except by vote of the Town and upon recommendation of the Road Equipment Committee." It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. It passed by voice vote.
- 25. "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$35,000 to process gravel in the Bosworth pit (behind Town Barn). This cost includes raw material, crushing and stockpiling of finished material on site." It was moved and seconded that the article be accepted as read. Frank Upton moved to amend the article to read: "To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to purchase gravel for Nelson Town Roads, quality and purchase of gravel to be decided by the Road Agent, Selectmen, and Road Committee." It was moved and seconded. Frank Upton commented that this leaves it open to get the best gravel for the best price. There was much discussion of the existence of the Road Committee versus the Road Equipment Committee. Road Agent French explained his research of the cost savings of processing gravel as compared to purchased gravel. Selectman Tolman moved to change the amendment to add the word "Equipment" in front of Committee. The amendment was moved and seconded. The amendment was accepted by voice vote. The article to be voted on will read "To see if the town will vote and raise the sum of \$10,000 to purchase gravel for Nelson Town Roads, quality and purchase of gravel to be decided by the Road Agent, Selectmen, and Road Equipment Committee." The article was passed by voice vote.
- 26. "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2400 for the purchase of a front-mounted road rake. Said money to be withdrawn from the

Equipment Capital Reserve Fund or general taxation, whichever manner the town prefers." The article was moved and seconded. Selectman Mednick amended the article to end after "Equipment Capital Reserve Fund." This amendment was seconded. The question was asked, was this article approved by the Road Equipment Committee? The answer was, when the article went on the warrant at Caucus, it was approved by the Road Equipment Committee. Road Agent French described the rake and its uses. He also made an amendment to the article to change the money to \$2000. The question was asked, why the change in price? Road Agent French replied "They're on sale." The amendment was seconded and passed by voice vote. The article will read "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2000 for the purchase of a front-mounted road rake. Said money to be withdrawn from the Equipment Capital Reserve Fund." article passed by voice vote.

27. "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2000 for an addition to the existing salt shed. The addition will be for salt storage; the present shed could then be used for storage of salt/sand mixture." The article was moved and seconded. Frank Upton moved to pass over this article. Moderator Bradshaw spoke that passing over the article is a negative motion and cannot be accepted. Road Agent French was asked if he supported the passing over of the article, he replied that he did for this year. Selectman Tolman stated that the Selectmen and Road Agent urged the voters to vote no on this article. The article was defeated by voice vote.

### OTHER ARTICLES

28. "To transact any other business or discuss other warrant proposals as may legally be brought before the meeting."

Win French suggested that the corner lot, beside the Town Hall, be named so that everyone would be calling it the same thing. After some discussion and suggestions of names it will be taken under advisement by the Selectmen to take the suggestion of naming this lot and bring it before the voters next Town Meeting.

Selectman Tolman acknowledged Walter Rohr as retiring Selectman. Walter may or may not be leaving us as Selectman, in that he is a write-in candidate. A presentation of a T-shirt was made to him. A loud round of applause followed.

Maury Collins stated that there are 2 motions involving the Town currently in Keene small claims court. Moderator Bradshaw responded that since there is litigation pending involving the Town, and since that litigation has been filed and turned over to the jurisdiction of the courts it is inappropriate for the Town to engage in discussion while that matter is pending in a court of law. Maury Collins aired his concerns about materials taken from road ditches along private property.

It was moved and seconded the meeting be adjourned at 9:15 p.m. Ballots for town offices were counted and any new officers present were sworn in.

To the inhabitants of the school district in the Town of Nelson qualified to vote in school affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Nelson Town Hall in said District on the 5th day of March, 1993, at 7:00 O'Clock in the afternoon to act upon the following warrant articles:

ARTICLE 1: To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 2: To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the statutory obligations of the District, or to take any other action in relation thereto.



# NELSON ANNUAL SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING March 6, 1992

The checklist was handed over to the clerk, and signed by the clerk and the supervisors of the checklist.

The polls were opened for persons wishing to vote for the officers listed by non-partisan ballot, as required by law, at 3:00 p.m. at the Nelson Town Hall by the moderator pro-tem, school district clerk, Beth Williams. Also included with the vote for officers was a vote as to changing the name of the Munsonville School to the Nelson School or keeping it the same.

The meeting was called to order by the moderator, Ethan Tolman, at 7:10 p.m. He announced that the polls would be open until approximately 8:00 p.m. for the voting of the officers. The moderator then explained the rules of the meeting and asked that the reading of the warrant be waived. It was so moved, seconded and passed by voice vote.

Ethan then introduced those guests present from SAU 29. They were: Phillip McCormack, Superintendent of Schools; Deane Haskell, Assistant Superintendent of Business; Bruce Thielen, Director of Special Education; Doug Hatfield, SAU 29 attorney; and Richard Pike.

The hall this evening had a few signs and placards held or posted around in anticipation of the expected controversial vote on Article 6.

ARTICLE I: "I move that the reports of agents, auditors, committees and officers of the District be received and accepted as printed in the annual report." Seconded. Passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE II: "I move that Article II be passed over". Seconded. Passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE III: "I move that Article III be adopted as printed in the warrant." Seconded. Ray Huber offered an amendment to strike out "... and accept and expend without further action by the School District ..." and insert after "during the fiscal year ..." "and apply such money to reduce the amount raised by taxes ...". Seconded. Discussion followed as to how this would limit the school district as to what they could use special monies for and if, therefore, some monies could not be accepted. Doug Hatfield, the attorney, explained that some money that is raised is earmarked for specific projects. The amendment was defeated by voice vote. No further discussion. Article passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE IV: "I move that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$60,000 to fund the anticipated deficit in the 1991-1992 budget." Seconded. John Wright, school board member, explained that this arose out of unpredictable costs -- in particular, out-of-district special education cases that came up with two students. He explained that we are ahead of ourselves on the regular budget. The deficit is strictly due to the out-of-district placements. Bruce Thielen explained the two cases and why they are so expensive, but that they really do need the placement for their special needs. He mentioned how there is a bill in the House that should help, if it passes. The deficit comes from the one case being more expensive than previously thought and the other came up mid year. Karen Tolman asked whether any of this is reimbursable by the State. John W. said yes, and that all that would be explained later. Question from the floor was asked, "Last year we had one. We now have two?" "Yes." More discussion ensued relative to the frustration we all have with the way special education is funded and that it is even considered "education". Medicaid is slowly picking up more and more of the bill. Frustration was expressed as to the extreme expense of the one case costing \$250,000 a year. Nelson has been sued in the past relative to not having a good program for this child. The new program has been guaranteed to work. In the end, a voice vote was taken and the article passed unanimously.

ARTICLE V: "I move that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,320 for the purpose of implementing a foreign language program." Seconded. Beth Williams presented an amended article to read, "... appropriate the sum of \$900...". Seconded. She explained that Packersfield Parent Advisory Committee had agreed to front \$420 of the money needed to help get this program started. Karen Tolman asked what language. Judi Lang answered that the language is French. Keene schools already have this as a mandatory class for their 5th and 6th graders. She also said they separated this from the general budget because it is a new program. The amendment passed by voice vote. The article passed unanimously.

ARTICLE VI: (1) "I move that the District raise and appropriate \$639,003 for the support of the schools and the payment of statutory obligations of the District, specifically excluding the out-of-district special education costs of \$209,347." Seconded. John Wright first explained the strategy of breaking out the budget part of the warrant into three parts. He explained the parts we do have control over and those we don't. We have the most control over the Munsonville School costs and the total Munsonville School budget is down 7 percent. We have minimal control over the Keene students' cost but that is down this year due to fewer students. The out-of-district special education costs we really have no control over and that cost, as 25 percent of our total budget, is up 283 percent. The cost of our share in SAU 29 is up 12 percent. Some detail of the Munsonville budget followed. At one point, Bill Riley offered the word "thus" to be included so that the article reads, "... specifically thus excluding the out-of-district...". The word was accepted by the author and, therefore, no vote. A written ballot was called for on the first part of the article. Judi Lang explained that we wanted written ballots for all three parts to have those solid records to take to the State. The article passed with 78 in favor and 5 opposed.

(2) "I move that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$73,870 to pay for Nelson's share of out-of-district special education costs of the Nelson School District." Seconded. John now explained Catastrophic Aid and how it relates to separating the special education part of the article. Basically, there is Nelson's share and there is the State's share which we pre-fund. Some explanation of the two programs was given. Most of the attending residents are aware of the SPED issue from the previous hearing, from last year, and from word getting around. Again, as in past years, frustration was expressed as to the extreme cost of these programs, how the programs are decided, and whether they'll do any good. The one most expensive student will be with us until age 21 at which time he goes into the Monadnock Developmental Services program. One of the main frustrations is as to what is really education and what is medical or custodial. Also, that this is something that just can't be planned for. The next part of the discussion moved to what happens when a town just can't afford it and also what will happen if we don't pay it. At this point, the SAU 29 lawyer, Doug Hatfield, spoke about the legal obligations and ramifications. In essence, the law requires that a town "must supply the services to allow this child to exist...". The program as is does not come about based on a town's ability to pay. It is the IEP team who decides the program. The educational part of the law comes from the federal level. Only the way it is funded comes more from the State. It was explained that if we vote "no" on the State's part, there could be some legal costs if we go past June 30 with this not resolved. In the meantime, the school board would try to negotiate with the State Board of Education. There would probably be a special school district meeting to try again to resolve the issue. Bill Riley, at this point, presented an explanation of the HB 1482 that is before the State now to put a cap on the amount a town has to pay for any one child in special education. The cap on the bill is 10 times the average state tuition. The formula is that the town pays three times the average state tuition and 20 percent of the rest up to 10 times as the cap; the State pays 80 percent. After the cap value, the State pays 100 percent. The other part of the bill states that towns would be able to raise, by bond, the portion that pre-funds the State. Whitney Fletcher asked if we are legally bound to borrow the money. The answer is no and Ethan offered that the selectmen probably wouldn't until the Department of Revenue came after us. Walter Rohr asked if we should band with other towns in similar situations, such as Westmoreland. John said that we certainly could share the legal costs that way. We are a

unique situation at the moment, though, and our voice may be louder standing alone in our extreme hardship. Phil McCormack offered that SAU 29 is working on their own level to bring attention to this and change the laws. Some people asked what the best way to vote was. Answers from the floor were that we vote "yes" on part 2 and "no" on part 3 in order to send a message to the State that we will not front their share. It was asked that we be able to vote for both together. Therefore, part 3 of the article was read.

(3) "I move that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$135,477 to pre-fund the share of the Nelson School District special education costs that are the responsibility of the State of New Hampshire." Seconded. There was no further discussion. The written ballots for both parts 2 and 3 were taken. The result was: on part 2, in favor of paying Nelson's share - 74; opposed - 6. For part 3, there were 79 votes opposed to pre-funding the State's portion and 1 in favor.

While the votes were being tallied, an award was given to Dot Warner for 25 years of driving the bus for Nelson kids. The kids had made cards, there were flowers and even a toy bus.

Then the school board presented a testimony of great service to Rick Church who had served on the school board for 8 years. The resolution was as follows:

### A RESOLUTION March 6, 1992

Whereas, Richard P. Church, Jr., served the School District of Nelson as a school board member for eight years and as its Chairman for three years; and,

Whereas, Richard P. Church, Jr., also served as Chairman of the New Hampshire School Administrative Unit 29 School Board for two years; and,

Whereas, Richard P. Church, Jr., has served on the Munsonville School Advisory Committee; and,

Whereas, Richard P. Church, Jr., faithfully attended the numerous meetings required of those roles: and,

Whereas, Richard P. Church, Jr., conducted school board meetings in a fair and open manner, and his knowledge of the Nelson School District budget was evident in the thoroughness of his presentations to the public; and,

Whereas, Richard P. Church, Jr., gave of his time and expertise in a manner truly reflecting his interest in the Town of Nelson, its children, and the future; and,

Whereas, Richard P. Church, Jr.'s commitment to the students of Nelson enabled him to meet the challenges of the everchanging educational community and the special needs of children; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, that the voters of the School District of Nelson recognize Richard P. Church, Jr.'s contribution to the children, the school, and the community by unanimously adopting this resolution as a lasting tribute to Richard P. Church, Jr., to be entered into the permanent records of the district.

Kathy Schillemat then thanked the town for a job well done on the playground.

ARTICLE VII: After the vote on Article VI was read, the moderator recognized Rick Church who had a resolution for the town to present to the State along with a petition.

"We, the citizens of the Nelson School District, support the budget as presented by the Nelson School Board and accept our obligations to all students within the Nelson School District. However, the requirement to advance the State's portion of these expenses as stated under the Catastrophic Aid Law represents extreme hardship on the 544 residents of our community. Therefore, we direct the school board to enter into negotiations with the State Department of Education and appropriate members of the legislative and executive branches to provide funding concurrent with the District's special education expenses under the State's Catastrophic Aid Law."

Seconded. Resolution passed with voice vote unanimously. Bob Lenox asked whether we should "resume" the meeting at a later date. Ethan said that it sends a stronger message to end the meeting now. There was no discussion on this point.

"I move that the meeting be adjourned." Seconded. Passed.

The ballots for the choice of school name were counted first and the result was: Nelson School - 58; Munsonville School - 25.

## TOWN OF NELSON SPECIAL SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING July 21, 1992

The meeting was called to order by the moderator, Ethan Tolman, at 7:00 p.m. The moderator then explained the rules of the meeting and then read the warrant.

Ethan then introduced those guests present from SAU 29. They were: Phillip McCormack, Superintendent of Schools; Deane Haskell, Assistant Superintendent of Business; Bruce Thielen, Director of Special Education; Doug Hatfield, SAU 29 attorney; and Rich Pike, Assistant Superintendent for the Towns.

ARTICLE I: "I move that the District raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Seventy-Four Thousand, Six Hundred Ninety-Five Dollars (\$174,695.00) representing the State share of estimated special education costs for the 1992-1993 school year and to authorize and empower the school board to borrow said sum pursuant to the provisions of R.S.A. 198:20-D as amended, effective July 1, 1992, upon terms and conditions as may be determined by the school board to be in the best interests of the District; and, further, to authorize the school board to execute such notes and related documentation as may be reasonably required to accomplish the borrowing; and to take any other action in relation thereto." John Wright explained how the vote happened in March and how, with the passing of the "Riley Bill", the amount the State must pay has increased and Nelson may now raise the money through "Revenue Anticipation Notes".

Rick Church asked if this meant that we are then actually \$30,000 ahead on our budget. The answer is yes. With the change in how the money gets raised, the amount Nelson needs to be responsible for has decreased. How does that change what was already appropriated in March? It doesn't change. We had voted "no" on the State's portion. This authorizes us to now raise that portion by bond. Our portion has been lowered due to the "Riley Bill" which will give us a \$30,000 surplus at the end of the year.

There was no further discussion and the article passed unanimously by voice vote.

ARTICLE II: To transact any other business. Judy Lang stood and gave thanks to everyone for the way this was all handled.

Judy Lang: "Tonight is a celebration for the Town of Nelson and ultimately all of our children. At our March School District meeting, you made it clear that our town could no longer shoulder the unfair burden of special education costs, and you made it clear that we needed a change -- we could not shoulder one-quarter of our budget for two of our children. Townsfolk went door to door with petitions demanding the State listen, and listen they did! Bill Riley, our representative, worked long and hard to have House Bill #1468 pass. Selectmen, citizens, admnistrators, the SAU and school board members stood and testified at various committees, wrote letters, made phone calls, posters, and from the long hours of listening to us trying to explain special education requirements, funding, and the law; and through the work of the Packersfield Community Advisory Committee, the SAU and our lawyer -- the State legislators listened and responded to you! Ultimately, I am convinced that it is each and every one of you that made it happen! Through it all, the educators have continued to provide each and every one of our children an education."

Ethan then gave thanks to Bill Riley for his part in getting the bill passed by the legislature. Bill Riley rose and gave thanks to Pat Bucelle, who was present, on her help with the wording of the bill, the many rewrites, and all her help on getting it through. There was a standing ovation for Pat.

There was no other business, Ethan adjourned the meeting at 7:15 p.m. In talking to Ethan afterwards, he says it almost beat the record for shortest school district meeting in Nelson. He remembers one in the past being only twelve minutes.

# **Administrative Report**

It gives me a great deal of pleasure to report on the status of the Nelson School. Based on my personal observations as well as a review of the parent survey results, a number of positive and productive things for students are happening at the school. Some of these include revision of curriculum to include integrated units of study; expansion of enrichment type activities; implementation of teaching strategies that are responsive to individual needs and abilities of students; and the utilization of technology to aid teachers' efforts to offer challenging and meaningful educational opportunities for children.

One of the most noteworthy things that is occurring at the school is the time and effort the teachers are putting forth to individualize their instruction. I observed students in all grades working individually, at their own pace on a variety of topics. Although this approach requires a great deal of coordination by the teacher, I think it provides an environment in which students are effectively challenged to perform at a level equal to their ability and are more highly motivated. This approach allows students to exceed initial expectations or requirements established by the teacher.

A tool used by the teachers to aid their efforts to individualize instruction is the computer. Federal grant money (Chapter I and Chapter II) has been used to purchase computers that the teachers use to reinforce and supplement their classroom instruction. These computers have been particularly beneficial in the area of language arts (writing) and mathematics. I was particularly impressed watching a sixth grade student use the computer to edit an article she had written. She was preparing the article for possible publication.

As has become the norm, parental support and involvement in school-related activities has continued. This support and involvement are resources that teachers truly value. Its helps them with things such as the publication of students' writing, chaperoning field trips, library cataloging and organization, and the coordination of special activities. I trust this cooperation and support will continue. With it, the Nelson School will continue to improve.

Community involvement also led to the passage of legislation that has had a tremendous impact on districts throughout the state. Thanks to the efforts of a number of Nelson citizens, the State of New Hampshire passed a law (initiated by Representative William Riley, a Nelson resident) which significantly reduces the tax impact of catastrophic special education costs. The Nelson taxpayers have already seen, in this year's tax rate, the benefit of this piece of legislation.

Again this year I have sincerely enjoyed working closely with the staff at the Nelson School. I am impressed with the initiatives taken by the staff and their responsiveness to ideas or issues raised by community members. I am also very appreciative of the way in which the community has made me feel welcome. I am pleased to be a part of the Nelson School District and community.

### NELSON SCHOOL STAFF REPORT

The first year of a successful teacher-managed school provided a positive springboard for the 1992-1993 school year at Nelson. Additionally, we began the year with a new name: Nelson School.

Our current enrollment is 51 students with each of the three classrooms having a combination of two grades.

The all-school thematic unit this year was "Penguins and Polar Bears: A Study of the World's Polar Regions." The theme was reflected in the school's December concert through songs, dances and skits performed by the students.

Artist-in-Residence, Mary Alice Amidon, provided the students with a wonderful musical experience when she taught at the school in November and December. Students delighted in learning many new and exciting songs, dances and games with Ms. Amidon.

A new and successful project was the Nelson Book Fair held in November. The joint effort and enthusiasm of the staff and parents resulted in a profitable week for the school. The purchase of new library books was made possible through this fund-raiser.

Last year's pilot French program, which was funded by parents, was offered to all fifth and sixth grade students as a regular part of the school curriculum. It is now funded by the school budget.

The Nelson School staff continues striving to work in cooperation and friendship with the Nelson School community. Through these combined efforts, the Nelson School grows stronger and better able to meet the needs of the children academically, emotionally and socially. The staff remains enthusiastic and stimulated by the daily challenges of operating the Nelson School. We continue to grow and learn from our experiences.

### CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Over the past year, the Nelson School District has worked long and hard to positively "tackle" an issue that has had a major impact on our budget. Specifically, the spiraling cost of special education, state (and federal) governments' lack of funding, coupled with Nelson's unique special education costs resulted in our little town being the leader in the May passage of HB 1468 (Catastrophic Aid Bill) known as the "Riley Bill," after our own Bill Riley. Again, I thank you all for your patience and hard work -- appropriating \$174,695 of the state's share of estimated special education costs for the 1992-1993 school year has had a dramatic impact on our budget. State aid continues to be a major New Hampshire public education issue and the thought of decreasing any aid to balance the state's budget is ludicrous!

With the recent completion of our Nelson facility and some success in dealing with consuming special education funding, the board, staff and administrators have been concentrating on encouraging and improving quality education, policy making, and budget development. Hand-in-hand with Nelson citizens, we have been among the most active, statewide, in opposing the State Board of Education's plans to revise the Minimum Standards through petition drives, letter writing campaigns, public hearings and forums.

The support and encouragement of the shared management model continues to successfully demonstrate a teacher-managed school can and does work in the Nelson School. The true test of time has resulted in a more highly motivated staff team who has been able to make several significant changes in areas such as programs and community relations.

Our foreign language program and opportunities for instrumental music education have been exciting additions to our curriculum and keep us "in line" with the transition to Keene Middle School. The integrated student approach encourages "hands on" cooperative learning involving all grade levels and aspects of a topic. This year, our children "traveled" to the world's Polar Regions! These projects also help to develop environmental and cultural understanding, respect and responsibility in our young citizens. Our use of computer technology in the classroom has increased and this is an area that the Board continues to encourage expansion.

At Keene High School, a report presented to the Board in December states that Nelson students are "performing above the level of the general Keene High School population. The percentage of Nelson students on the honor roll was significantly higher and Nelson students did significantly better in English, social studies and science than the total student population." Of our eight 1992 graduates, two are employed and six are enrolled in college.

According to Dr. McCormack, Superintendent of Schools for S.A.U. 29, our Keene Middle School students are also performing well. Previously called the Keene Junior High School, the transition to the middle school concept "clusters" students into "small communities of learning that give each child the individual identity important to pre-adolescent development."

In June, the last Munsonville students graduated followed by the school's official name change to Nelson School in an unveiling of the sign donated by the Kingsbury family and friends. Our school was also presented a framed copy of the award given by American Wood Design in Washington, DC to architect Dan Scully for his design of the school building project. One of our own Munsonville graduates, Jason Walter, designed and constructed (with the help of younger Scouts) a delightful nature trail on our school property.

To protect our investment in land and building, the first annual building inspection was done thanks to Rob Germeroth. His report reads that the "Nelson School is in good shape with the new addition complete and a fresh coat of paint on the older portion." Two projects which were recommended to be targeted included window replacement in the oldest classroom (safety and ventilation concerns), and insulating crawl spaces underneath floors. Both are being addressed this school year. In the fall, work was also done on drainage and erosion problems in an effort to prevent further damage. We also have an eye towards completion of the far end playground area.

In our local school budget for the upcoming year, the Board has focused on "restoration," with particular attention to the textbooks and school supplies budget and maintaining competitive salary and benefits. A special kindergarten warrant article is sure to get folks thinking about public support of early childhood education. In looking to our future -- our children's future -- it is the Board's intention to continue quality education in a fiscally responsible manner. Our community has had a strong and meaningful involvement and we look forward to our annual March meeting.
