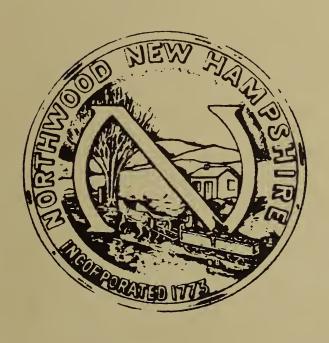

SUMMARY OF ACTION TAKEN ON ARTICLES IN

1987 TOWN WARRANT

Moderator Robert A. Johnson rapped the meeting to order at 9:08 A.M. at Coe-Brown Northwood Academy and began to read the warrant. John Lane moved to suspend the reading of Articles 1-26 as they will be read individually as each comes up. Charles Johnson seconded. Motion unanimously adopted by voice vote. Moderator Johnson finished reading the warrant. Before we start, the Moderator requested that no one speak a second time until everyone is heard and he prefers that no one speak more than twice unless to answer questions.

ARTICLE 1: Selectmen True W. Chesley asks to be recognized. He introduced the new police chief, George Frederick Jacobs, from Wyoming. He comes to us highly qualified. Mr. Jacobs spoke briefly saying he wants to meet everyone and that he will have an open door policy for his office. Now ARTICLE 1: Johnson, Chr. of Budget Comm. moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,292.50, and authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Account, established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, of the sum of \$2,292.50, plus all accumulated interest, for the purchase by the Conservation Commission of the State of N. H. land located on Route 4 at Northwood Lake. It shall be understood that should negotiations not be completed by December 31, 1987 for this purchase, that all available funds in the Revenue Sharing Account will be transferred to the Conservation Commission Fund for the future purchase of land, and the Revenue Sharing Account will be closed. Charles Frary seconds. Mr. Frary spoke about the article, saying Revenue Sharing Funds are for the purpose of doing something special for the Town. The Conservation Commission expects to buy this land and if there is money left over, it can be held and carried over to other years and be available at any time during those years. The Conservation Commission also needs money to possibly match State Trust Funds for Preservation of Lands. Mrs. Herron asks how many acres are in this land and the answer was 4.8 A. in two parcels. Mr. Herron asks if this is wet lands and cannot be built upon; why not let the abutters buy it and pay taxes Mr. Stanhope asks to move the question and Jean Lane Motion to stop debate is carried by voice vote. Main motion adopted by show of cards: 88 YES - 2 NO.

ARTICLE 2: Jean Johnson moved that the Town establish the position of full-time Road Agent. Charles Bailey seconded.

Mr. Tomasello asked why so little was spent last year for Road Agent and Robert Bailey said it was because one resigned and

the selectmen had to do the job in the interim. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 3: Jean Johnson moved that the Town authorize the Northwood Conservation Commission to retain any unexpended portion of its 1986 appropriation (79.72), said funds to be placed in the Northwood Conservation Fund in accordance with RSA 36:a-5 or take any other action relative thereto. George Stanhope seconded. Mrs. Herron fears this starts a bad precedent of leaving slush funds in other departments. Jean Johnson says this is the only department allowed by State law to keep its funds after a vote by the Town. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 4: Jean Johnson moved that the Town change the purpose of the Capital Reserve Fund established pursuant to Art. 20 of the Town Meeting of 1964, as the Jenness Pond Beach Fund, by Mary Pizutel, et al, to expend such sum as has accumulated in said fund towards the purchase by the Town of Northwood of the "Frog Pond", so called, from the Roman Catholic Diocese of Manchester, and for use in defraying the costs of maintaining said pond, or for use in erecting a memorial sign at the pond. W. E. Bryant, Jr. seconded. Allan Holmes is opposed as he feels the Church will give us the land for \$1.00. Joann Bailey says that the Auditors suggested that these small funds be used in a constructive way; and the original purpose of the fund for the beach at Jenness Pond can no longer be used as the Town lost that beach. Mr. Stanhope thinks we should first decide whether or not to buy the Frog Pond. Selectman Bailey says it is a shallow pond for skating and has a fire hydrant in it. J. Perry Richardson says it has always been used for skating and sees no reason why the Town should have to buy it. Lynda Weeks, Chr. of the Recreation Comm. says they want a skating facility and found the Catholic Church is not interested in renewing their 1 year contract and may consider fencing it off to avoid liability. William Johnson asked if there is a tentative agreement on the price. Lynda Weeks says there is a written agreement of \$1,000.00 which is less than the one of a year ago. There is \$1,173.00 in these trust funds. Mr. Maccord asks the size of the piece and whether it is all pond or some land. Mr. Chesley says it is 15 A. and the Church does own the land and the pond. Mr. Richardson says their only access to the pond is from Bow Lake Rd., so can't be used by anyone else. He sees no need to buy it. A show of cards vote was 68 YES and 52 NO, so the Moderator asked for a yes and no ballot. Motion was defeated: 87 YES - 71 NO. A 2/3 vote would have been required so there would have had to have been 105 YES to carry the motion.

ARTICLE 5: Joann Bailey moved to indefinitely postpone this article. Robert Herron seconded. He recommends that the Selectmen enter into serious negotiation for this land. The motion to indefinitely postpone was adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 6: Joann Bailey moved to indefinitely postpone this article. Robert Herron seconded. Theresa Herron spoke about who Bud Lovejoy was, and of his efforts for the Community Christmas parties, his efforts for band music in our town, and of his love of fellowship, and culture. If anything is to be done with that Trust Fund, these things should be considered. A clapping of hands ovation was given. Motion adopted by unanimous voice vote.

ARTICLE 7: Linda Schlieder moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,000.00 for a new police cruiser, and authorize the withdrawal of \$13,000.00 from the Highway Safety Capital Reserve Fund for this purpose, and authorize the disposal of the Pontiac Lemans Cruiser. Jean Johnson seconded. Richard Peterson wishes they would consider buying a Jeep. Chief Jacobs says we do need a 4-wheel drive vehicle, not a vehicle for SPEED but one that will get around on our back roads. Motion adopted by unanimous voice vote.

ARTICLE 8: William Calef moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,751.00 to complete construction and facilities at the new Narrows Fire Station and to accept from the Fire Dept. a donation of \$1,500.00 to be used for this purpose, and to withdraw all available monies, \$2,251.00 plus interest from the Fire Station Construction Capital Reserve Fund, to be used for this purpose. Linda Schlieder seconded. Mr. Calef explains that this is just a continuation of money not spent last year. Mr. Allan Holmes says he is donating the cost of his work. Chief Calef thanked him and said this means they can now do some needed landscaping there. Motion adopted by unanimous voice vote.

ARTICLE 9: Jean Johnson moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,700.00 for an income survey of the Gulch Mt. - Gulf Road area, and to receive from the N. H. Office of State Planning as a CDBG Feasibility Grant, the sum of \$5,700.00 for this purpose. George Stanhope seconded. Helen Johnson asked what an income survey was. Mr. Chesley says a team from Strafford Regional Planning will make a private survey and if the area meets an income criteria, the Town may apply for \$350,000.00 for help in building that road. Federal Law requires this survey in order to get Federal money. The survey would cover all of Gulf Road. Motion adopted by show of cards 91 YES - 45 NO.

ARTICLE 10: Robert Herron moved that the Town accept and expend for park benches for Lucas Pond Beach, the monies, in the amount of \$325.00, given in memory of Leon Boody, for improvements at Lucas Pond Beach, which monies are being held by the Town of Northwood as the Leon Boody Memorial Fund, pursuant to RSA 31:95-b. Theresa Herron seconded. Carol Gosselin fears the benches will be vandalized and would like to see the beach enlarged instead. Mr. Bailey says these will be concrete benches and the cost of enlarging the beach would be

much more than this Fund. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 11: Linda Schlieder moved to indefinitely postpone this article. Jean Lane seconded. Jean Johnson says it is in the Town Ordinances that it is the responsibility of the abutters to bring a Class VI road to Class V standards. Ellis Ring asked if people lived there before this ordinance. Answer: some. Linda Schlieder says people who built there did sign an agreement releasing the Town of obligation to take care of the road. Motion to indefinitely postpone was adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 12: Jeffrey Lalish moved that the Town reclassify a section of the Old Mountain Road, now classified as a Class 6 Highway Subject to Gates and Bars, to a Class 6 Highway Open to the General Public. That section of the road being from David and Althea Behm's driveway westerly to the Northwest corner of the Jeffrey Lalish property, where it meets the Northeast corner of the Town Parsonage Lot. The two landowners on the South side of the road will be responsible (Frenette and Lalish) for their respective portions of the Old Mt. Road. Michael Faiella seconded. Mr. Frary asked what the difference was in the two classifications. Mr. Chesley says that it lets the public go in at their own risk. Johnson asked if these two owners could improve the road either way. Answer was yes. Mr. Lalish is planning to build there and wanted to relieve the town of responsibility of taking care of the road. He thought the paper he signed for the Town did make him accept the liability also. After a short recess while Selectmen researched the liability laws, CH231:50 says the Town shall be relieved of all liability on roads subject to gates and bars. Evidently the Town would be liable regardless of the paper Mr. Lalish signed for the Town. Motion defeated by show of cards, 33 YES - 77 NO.

ARTICLE 13: Theresa Herron moved to indefinitely postpone this article. Gordon Smart seconded. Mr. Bailey says Chief Jacobs says he doesn't need this at this time. Motion to postpone passed by unanimous vote.

Recessed for lunch which was served by Coe-Brown Boosters Club.

Reconvened at 12:50 P.M. The Recreation Commission is asking everyone to please fill out an interest survey they have prepared.

ARTICLE 14: Jean Johnson moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$19,500.00 for the purchase of a new Highway Department truck and plow, and authorize the withdrawal of \$17,000.00 from the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund, and to raise by taxation \$2,500.00. It shall be understood that the present highway truck will be sold and the proceeds from the sale will be placed in the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund. W. E. Bryant, Jr. seconded. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 15: Theresa Herron moved that the Town authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell the Town Sander and to place the monies received from the sale in the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund. Charles Johnson seconded. Motion adopted by unanimous voice vote.

ARTICLE 16: Fire Chief Calef moved that the Town remove the street light presently at the old Narrows Fire Station, now owned by Herbert A. and Helen A. Sherman. George Stanhope seconded. Motion adopted by unanimous voice vote.

ARTICLE 17: Theresa Herron moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,770.00 for the purchase of a new 3M Reader-Printer. George Stanhope seconded. Mr. Tomasello asked the purpose and Mr. Chesley explained that all our deeds come in on microfilm and we need to replace our old outmoded present reader. Motion adopted by unanimous voice vote.

ARTICLE 18: Jean Johnson moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$103,357.00 for the reappraisal of all property in the Town of Northwood, and to authorize the withdrawal of all available funds including interest from the Reappraisal Capital Reserve Fund for this purpose. understood the reappraisal will begin in 1987. Robert Herron Mr. Chesley stated that \$49,711.00 is in the Reserve Fund now. The State of New Hampshire will do the reappraisal and they hope to begin in November of 1987. Senator Johnson asks about the need for reappraisal and Mr. Chesley says the last time property was examined was in 1975-76. New homes are more correctly appraised but many older homes have been renovated and are unfairly appraised. He further feels we need a part-time appraiser after the new appraisal is done, to keep our property values current. Mr. Lounsbury asks if anyone is ever fined for not having put improvements on their inventory. Answer: no. Mr. Lounsbury feels we ought to be made honest on our inventories. adopted by show of cards: 74 YES - 21 NO.

ARTICLE 19: Theresa Herron moved that the Town establish a trust fund to be called the Gladys Gardner Book Fund. The original principal amount to be \$1,075.00, which is the amount given by various townspeople in 1986 in memory of Gladys Gardner. All or part of the interest income to be used each year to purchase books for the Northwood libraries. The principal may be increased through the addition of other gifts. Charles Johnson seconded. Motion adopted by unanimous voice vote.

ARTICLE 20: Jean Johnson moved that the Town adopt the provisions of RSA 72:1-C which authorize any town or city to elect not to assess, levy and collect a resident tax. Theresa Herron seconded. Motion adopted by show of cards: 85 YES - 8 NO.

ARTICLE 21: Robert Herron moved to indefinitely postpone any action on this article. True Chesley seconded. George Stanhope says that under the Master Plan it is necessary to show we are attempting to control our problems and space is one of them. Linda Schlieder says there has been need yet proven about the need of more office space. Motion was adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 22: Fire Chief Calef moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$17,942.40 as the down payment on a new fire truck, to be delivered in 1987, and authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into a contract for said truck, with the payment of the balance of the purchase price, plus interest, to be made over a period of three years. cost of the truck, including interest at 6% shall be \$98,492.40. The payments for the ensuing years of 1988, 1989,1990, shall be \$26,850.00 each. It shall be understood that the 22 year old pumper shall be advertised for sale, and the proceeds of the sale shall be used towards the purchase price of the new truck. George Stanhope seconded. followed a long discussion of the reason for this motion instead of the one in the warrant. Selectman True Chesley questioned whether we should make the original motion as it was in the warrant and then make this as an amendment. Moderator Johnson felt as long as he hadn't entertained any motion as it was stated in the warrant and since this was germaine to the original subject of a new fire truck, that he was ruling that this motion would be in order. Chief Calef then went on to explain that they can get a new fire truck now for this lower price, instead of waiting a year and paying Linda Schlieder asks why we can get one so much cheaper and Chief Calef says they are stock trucks, with no fancy chrome or whistles, and that in another year Ford is discontinuing this chassis. When asked what was wrong with our pump now, he explained that the pump is a piston pump instead of a centrifugal. Piston pumps can be spoiled by rocks getting into them. Also the pumper needs new wiring. Paul Colby asked how much it would cost to fix the truck and Mr. Calef replied that he had no exact figure but several thousand dollars. Mr. Colby suggested that there are companies who would give estimates. Linda Schlieder asks about warranties. Chief said there would be a ten year warranty on the tank which would be galvanized steel.

Then the question came up about whether a three year contract would be legal for the Selectmen to sign. The answer was yes. Anne White asked if this new truck would be obsolete in a year. The answer was that neither the engine or chassis would be obsolete, just this combination wasn't being made again. Mr. Peterson asked whether this new truck might not save a life sometime and wouldn't that be reason enough to buy the truck. Mr. Calef says we should be proud of our 18 certified fire fighters. Earl Morse asked if the decision has been made yet about the brand to buy? The Chief says it stands between

Mr. Morse's company and another bidder. Mr. Morse suggests that the fact that he's a resident of Northwood for the past 6 years and has always been willing to come on numerous service calls perhaps should be considered in choosing the bidder. Mr. Calef says all things Mr. Morse says are being taken into consideration. Charles Bailey thinks we aren't being dealt with honestly and that there are many men who can work on that truck beside Mr. Sawyer in Epsom. Marilyn Metcalf speaks of the need to consider the elderly in our town who cannot afford to spend this much more in taxes for this truck.

Mr. Calef asks Mr. Morse to affirm that the parts for the old truck have to be custom made and perhaps that is why the parts have failed again. Theresa Herron makes the comment that we have to decide whether to put more money into the old truck or start a year ahead on a new truck for more efficiency. Then Moderator Robert Johnson again explained the parliamentary procedure, saying he wanted it crystal clear about the motion, and why he had allowed it to be stated as it was, feeling that it was germanine to the original warrant article. He asked if everyone agreed? There was no dissension so we proceeded to a Yes and No ballot, after he made it clear how you were to vote if you favored buying a new truck now or not. The motion was adopted by 95 YES - 50 NO.

ARTICLE 23: Robert Herron moved to indefinitely postpone. Jean Johnson seconded. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 24: Robert Herron moved that the Town authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the State, Federal, or another governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-b. Charles Johnson seconded. Motion adopted by unanimous voice vote.

ARTICLE 25: Charles Johnson moved that the Town authorize the Selectmen to convey property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's deed by public auction, or by advertised sealed bid, or in such other manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require. Jean Johnson seconded. Motion adopted by unanimous voice vote.

ARTICLE 26: Jean Johnson moved the the Town raise \$758,822.50 for the Budget as submitted by the Budget Committee. Linda Schlieder seconded. Robert Bailey amends this figure to \$780,822.50. Linda Schlieder seconds. He explains the increase of \$22,000.00 as follows: Remove \$7,000.00 from the third selectman's salary. Add \$3,000.00 to repairs for painting of the inside and out of the Town Hall. Add \$20,000.00 to winter maintenance to cover the deficit for this year's salting and plowing. Add \$6,000.00 to police officer's salaries; making a total increase of \$22,000.00 to proposed budget figure. Mr. Bailey explained that the increase in police salaries would allow full-time coverage from May on.

This amendment was adopted by voice vote.

Lynda Weeks moved an adjustment in the Recreation Budget, changing the salary line from \$18,900.00 to \$17,900.00 and adding \$1,000.00 to the line "Workshops". This would not change the total figure. Linda Kramas seconded. This amendment was adopted by a voice vote.

Gordon Smart asked why office salaries had increased so much and was it to match school office salaries? Mr. Bailey says the computer hasn't saved any money the first year as it requires a lot of work to get the information on the computer but we can look forward to salaries stabilizing next year. Main motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 27: True Chesley moved the Town authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. Jean Johnson seconds. Mr. Chesley says he accepts the blame for omitting this article in the warrant. The money for this is already in the budget but needs to be authorized. Motion adopted by unanimous voice vote. Motion was made to adjourn by Charles B. Johnson and seconded by George Rogers. Joann Bailey stood to thank all who volunteer so much of their time for our town and cities Lynda Weeks as an example, and incidentally wish Lynda a Happy Birthday today. Motion was adopted by voice vote and meeting adjourned at 3:35 P.M.

It might be noted that not only was our meeting finished in one day, but in a much earlier time than it has been done in a number of years. This clerk heard several people come up to the Moderator and compliment him on a job well done this year.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

May 22, 1987

Moderator Robert A. Johnson called the special meeting to order at 7:05 P.M. at the Northwood Town Hall, and read the two-article warrant. He then announced that only these two articles would be acted upon and no more.

ARTICLE 1: Fire Chief William Calef moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$89,712.00 for the purchase of a new fire truck, and authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow, pursuant to RSA 33:8 for the purchase of a long term note in the amount of \$71,769.00 for three years; and to further authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell the 22 year old pumper fire truck. Richard Clark seconded.

Chief Calef gave a short presentation stating the growth of the town in the last ten years, the number of calls responded to, have all grown significantly. From a population of 2100 in 1981 when they responded to 170 calls a year, to a population of over 2500 now and responding to 319 calls in 1986. Volunteers now have to be trained like city firemen. He then explained why we need three trucks. Engine #1 comes and puts the hose into the house. Engine #2 comes and sets up as a back-up or makes another entry into the house. Engine #3 has 2000 feet of hose to lay to a water supply and can furnish 1000 gallons of water per minute. We will be buying an average small town pumper at a cost less than the surrounding towns have just paid for theirs. The new truck will have a centrifugal pump instead of the old piston driven one which is hard to repair. The galvanized steel and aluminum body should make it last 20 years. The truck could be delivered by July of 1987. Mrs. Barbara Smart asked if this truck would be obsolete soon and the answer was NO. She also asked what the cost would be if waited for another year. Mr. Calef felt it would be over \$100,000.00. Richard Clark spoke as Civil Defense Director and urged the voters to vote YES.

A yes and no ballot was then held:

110 votes cast: 72 YES - 38 NO

Necessary for 2/3 vote would be 74, so motion was declared defeated.

ARTICLE 2: Arthur Slade moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,000.00 for an income survey and hydrological survey of the Village at Northwood Ridge Water District and accept from the State of New Hampshire Office of State Planning as a CDBG Feasibility Grant, the

sum of \$16,000.00 for this purpose as authorized by the Village at Northwood Ridge Water District. George Stanhope seconded. Mr. Nary asked if a 2/3 vote was necessary for this and the answer was NO. Moderator asked for a show of hands:

43 YES - 20 NO. Motion carried.

J. Perry Richardson moved we adjourn. Charles Johnson seconded. Meeting unanimously adjourned.

AUDITOR'S REPORT ON FINANCIAL PRESENTATION

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen Town of Northwood Northwood, New Hampshire

We have examined the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Northwood as of and for the year ended December 31, 1987, as listed in the table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1B, the general purpose financial state-ments referred to above do not include the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. The amount that should be recorded in the General Fixed Assets Account Group is not known.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts results in an incomplete presentation, as explained in the above paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the Town of Northwood at December 31, 1987, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole. The combining and individual fund financial statements listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Northwood. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

December 31, 1987

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following is a summary of significant accounting policies employed in the preparation of these financial statements.

A. Fund Accounting

The accounts of the Town are organized on the basis of funds or account groups, each of which is considered a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are accounted for with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, fund equity, revenues, and expenditures, as appropriate. Government resources are allocated to and accounted for in individual funds based upon the purposes for which they are to be spent and the means by which spending activities are controlled. The various funds are grouped by type in the financial statements. The following fund types and account groups are used by the Town.

GOVERNMENTAL FUNDS

General Fund - The General Fund is the general operating fund of the Town. All general tax revenues and other receipts that are allocated by law or contractual agreement to another fund are accounted for in this fund. From the fund are paid the general operating expenditures, the fixed charges, and the capital improvement costs that are not paid through other funds.

Special Revenue Funds - Special Revenue Funds are used to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources (other than expendable trust or major capital projects) requiring separate accounting because of legal or regulatory provisions or administrative action. Included in this fund type are the Federal Revenue Sharing, Conservation Commission, Special Trust Income, and Drug Enforcement Program Funds.

FIDUCIARY FUNDS

Trust and Agency Funds - Trust and Agency Funds are used to account for the assets held in trust or as an agent for others by the Town. The Nonexpendable and Expendable Trust Funds (which include Capital Reserve Funds) and the Water Precinct CDBG Funds are shown in this fund type.

B. Account Groups (Fixed Assets)

All governmental funds are accounted for on a spending or "financial flow" measurement focus. This means that only current assets and current liabilities are generally included on their balance sheets. Their reported fund

balance (net current assets) is considered a measure of "available spendable resources". Governmental fund operating statements present increases (revenues and other financing sources) and decreases (expenditures and other uses) in net current assets. Accordingly, they are said to present a summary of sources and uses of available spendable resources during the period.

General fixed assets have been acquired for general governmental purposes and have been recorded as expenditures in the fund making the expenditure. These expenditures are required to be capitalized at historical cost in a General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts for accountability purposes. In accordance with the practices followed by other municipal entities in the State, the Town does not maintain a record of its general fixed assets and accordingly, a statement of general fixed assets, required by generally accepted accounting principles, is not included in this financial report.

C. Basis of Accounting

The accounts of the General, Special Revenue, Expendable Trust, and Agency Funds are maintained and reported on the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under the modified accrual basis of accounting, sources of financial resources and assets are recognized when measurable and available to finance operations during the year. Uses of financial resources and liabilities are recognized when obligations are incurred from receipt of goods and services, when assessments are made by the State or, in the case of judgments and claims against the Town, when there is a probability that such judgments and claims will result in liabilities, the amounts of which can be reasonably estimated. Exceptions to this general rule include accumulated unpaid vacation and sick pay. All Nonexpendable Trust Funds are accounted for using the accrual basis of accounting.

D. Budgetary Accounting

General governmental revenues and expenditures accounted for in budgetary funds are controlled by a formal integrated budgetary accounting system in accordance with various legal requirements which govern the Town's operations. State Statutes require balanced budgets but provide for the use of beginning general fund unreserved fund balance to achieve that end. In 1987, the beginning fund balance was applied as follows:

E. Encumbrances

Encumbrance accounting, under which purchase orders, contracts, and continuing appropriations (certain projects and specific items not fully expended at year end) are recognized, is employed in the governmental funds. Encumbrances are not the equivalent of expenditures and are therefore reported as part of the fund balance at December 31, 1987 and are carried forward to supplement appropriations of the subsequent year.

The General Fund reserve for encumbrances at December 31, 1987 is detailed in Exhibit A-2 and totals \$130,590.

F. Cash and Investments

At year end, the carrying amount of the Town's deposits was \$1,184,546 and the bank balance was \$1,161,329. Of the bank balance, \$301,121 was covered by Federal depository insurance and \$860,208 was uninsured.

State Statutes authorize the Town to invest excess funds in the custody of the Treasurer, in obligations of the United States Government, in savings bank deposits of banks incorporated under the laws of the State of New Hampshire, or in certificates of deposit of banks incorporated under the laws of the State of New Hampshire, or in national banks located within this State or the State of Massachusetts. These financial statements report investments in certificates of deposit and savings bank deposits under the caption Cash and Equivalents.

The Town is further authorized to invest Trust Funds in obligations of political subdivisions and stocks and bonds, as they are legal for investment by New Hampshire savings banks. Capital Reserve Funds must be kept separate and not intermingled with Trust Funds. Capital Reserve Funds may be invested only in sanvings bank deposits of New Hampshire banks, or in United States or State of New Hampshire bonds or notes.

G. Accumulated Unpaid Vacation and Sick Pay

Accumulated unpaid vacation and sick pay is not accrued in the governmental funds using the modified accrual basis of accounting. Each permanent employee must take their annual vacation leave within the calendar year. Sick leave is granted at the rate of seven days per year. Accumulated sick leave is indeterminable.

H. Taxes Collected For Others

The property taxes collected by the Town include taxes

levied for the Northwood School District and Rockingham County, which are remitted to these governmental units as required by law. The ultimate responsibility for the collection of taxes rests with the Town.

I. Property Taxes

The National Council on Governmental Accounting, Interpretation 3, referring to property tax revenue recognition, requires disclosure of property taxes receivable, which are to be collected beyond a period of 60 days subsequent to year's end, are recognized on the balance sheet and not reserved. In accordance with the practice followed by other municipal entities in the State of New Hampshire, the Town of Northwood annually recognizes, without reserve, all taxes receivable at the end of the fiscal year. The Town feels this practice of accrual is justified, as it more appropriately matches the liability to the school district entity at December 31 with collections which are intended to finance these payments through June 30 of the following year.

Annually, the Town establishes and raises through taxation an amount for abatements and refunds of property and resident taxes, known as overlay. All abatements and refunds are charged to this account. The amount raised in 1987 was \$46,197 and expenditures amounted to \$92,593.

As prescribed by law, the tax collector sells at tax sale all uncollected property taxes in the following year after taxes are due. The purchaser at tax sale has a priority tax lien on these properties and accrues interest at 18% per annum. Delinquent taxpayers must redeem property from tax sale purchasers.

Property is sold to the party who will accept a lien for the least undivided interest in the property for payment of taxes and related costs due. If property is not redeemed within the two-year redemption period, the property is tax-deeded to the lien holder.

J. Interfund Transactions

During the course of normal operations, the Town has numerous transactions between funds, including expenditures and transfers of resources to provide services and fund capital outlay. The accompanying governmental and fiduciary fund financial statements reflect such transactions as transfers.

K. Interfund Receivable and Payable Balances

NOTE 2 - DEFINED BENEFIT PENSION PLAN

Some Town of Northwood full-time Police Department employees participate in the New Hampshire Retirement System, a multiple-employer public employee retirement system. The payroll for employees covered by the system for the year ended December 31, 1987 was \$13,062; the Town's total payroll was \$201,334.

All Town full-time employees are eligible to participate in the system. Employees who retire before age 65 are entitled to a retirement benefit equal to approximately fifty percent of the employee's average final compensation. After attainment of age 65, the payment by the Retirement System is reduced by the amount of the individual's Social Security entitlement payments. The system also provides death and disability benefits which are established by State Statute.

Covered police employees are required by State Statute to contribute 9.3% of their salary to the plan. The Town is required by the same statute to contribute a percentage of the employee's salary, based on an actuarial valuation of the entire State plan performed June 30, 1983. These contributions represented 7.74% for police through June 30, 1987, and 4.8% thereafter. The contribution requirements for the year ended December 31, 1987 were \$1,913, which consisted of \$698 from the Town and \$1,215 from employees.

The "pension benefit obligation" is a standardized disclosure measure of the present value of pension benefits, adjusted for the effects of projected salary increases and step-rate benefits, estimated to be payable in the future as a result of employee service to date. The measure, which is the actuarial present value of credited projected benefits, is intended to help users assess the system's funding status on a goingconcern basis, assess progress made in accumulating sufficient assets to pay benefits when due, and make comparisons among retirement systems and employers. The State retirement system does not make separate measurements of assets and pension benefit obligations for individual employers. According to plan administrators, the pension benefit obligation at June 30, 1986 for the system as a whole, determined through an actuarial valuation performed as of June 30, 1985, was \$552,050,000. The system's net assets available for benefits

on that date (valued at market) were \$568,786,602, leaving no unfunded pension benefit obligation. The percentage that the Town of Northwood has in relation to the entire plan cannot be determined.

NOTE 3 - TRUST FUNDS

The principal amount of all Nonexpendable Trust Funds is restricted either by law or by terms of individual bequests in that only income earned may be expended. The Town's Nonexpendable and Expendable Trust Funds at December 31, 1987 are detailed as follows:

Selectmen's Report to the Town

The year 1987 brought many changes within the Town Offices with the installation of the new computer system. Hours of preparation work had to be performed in order to have the property assessment records made ready for entering into the system. This work was performed by the Selectmen and Office Staff, with the assistance of former Selectman Walter M. Crandall, Jr. and J. Perry Richardson. We wish to praise Marion Knox, Sandra Bailey, Marcia Severance and Judith Lounsbury for their efficient work. Out of 2547 parcels of property, which required an average of 25 entries per parcel, there were less than 100 corrections to be made when the first warrant was run. This work was done in addition to their regular work, and they worked many evenings and Saturdays to accomplish this task in time for the first billing of taxes in 1987. The Tax Collector's Office became involved with the computer at the time of the first billing. Business Management Systems is making some required changes in the tax program.

The work of setting up the accounts receivable and payable for the Bookkeeper and Treasurer was done mainly through volunteer work by Andy Turner and Marion Knox. They spent many long evening hours at Marion's home assigning numbers to the various accounts. We applaud them for their work, and thank Andy for his expert assistance and countless hours of donated time in setting up the several accounts, which made the system work so smoothly.

The Town Clerk's accounting system was easily adopted to the computer, and she has found no problems with her recordkeeping. The Supervisors of the Checklist have entered their checklist in the computer, and in less than an hour can now print an updated checklist.

In the Spring of 1987 the Board of Selectmen, after receiving confirmation from the N. H. Court System that the Police Commission article was not valid, proceeded to advertise and interview candidates for the position of Chief of Police. Before Town Meeting day the Board had hired George F. Jacobs as the Town's first full-time Chief of Police, replacing William L. Shafer III. Since that time they have worked closely with Chief Jacobs in the process of setting up that department and seeing that it is run in the proper manner. It is unfortunate that Mr. Shafer felt it necessary to bring the Town into Court in an attempt to retain his position as Chief of Police. To date this case is still pending, with a February date set for arbitration of the case.

During 1987 the Selectmen advertised for the position of Road Agent, following the untimely heart attack of George L. Smith (Jake). This position was finally filled late in September by the hiring of Gerald LaFreniere. Because of this situation much of the scheduled summer maintenance work was put on hold. However, Mr. LaFreniere is continuing to attempt to work at the cutting of brush whenever possible in order to bring the work load into focus.

Because the Town continues to grow, as is shown by the various department reports, the work in the Selectmen's Office also grows. The Town, at the time of the Fall tax bill, had 2547 parcels of taxable land. This is about 100 more than in 1986. The reassessment of the Town, which was scheduled for the Spring of 1987, was delayed by the State of New Hampshire because of the tremendous workload they were experiencing. It is scheduled to begin in November of this year, with the final assessment figures being ready for the Fall 1989 bills. By that time it is expected that Northwood will have an additional 100 parcels of taxable property. The Office Staff is continuing the preparation work for the reassessment by preparing an assessment card for each parcel of land, on which a sketch of the parcel is placed which coincides with the tax map information.

Selectman Chesley continues to update the tax maps, and has recently completed the updating of more than half the maps. It is anticipated that by June of 1988 the maps will all have been updated, and a complete set of mylars presented to the Rockingham County Registry of Deeds as a permanent record of the Town. This work is receiving priority in light of the town hall fire in Newmarket last fall, when it became apparent that certain information must be placed with the Registry of Deeds to ensure the availability of records in the event of a disaster.

Because of the Town's growth, the Planning Board requested office space for their secretary, and the Building Inspector also needed an area for meeting with the public. The only available space that could be used for these two departments was the Conference Room. In April of 1987 that room was set up to accommodate the Planning Board and Building Inspector, and at that time became unavailable for daytime meetings on certain days.

As the year progressed it became apparent that the use of the building by town groups during the business hours of the various Town departments, made for much confusion and many interruptions, and that the staff could not continue to accomplish their work effectively unless some of the outside use was curtailed.

At that time, the Town had received the return of the Community Hall from the VFW, who had been the holders of a long term lease from the Town for the sole use of the Community Hall. The VFW relinquished the lease, but asked for permission to hold their monthly meetings there until they found another location. Our very active Recreation Commission inspected the building and met with the Selectmen on several occasions to present their thoughts on restoring the building so it could be used by town groups, many of whom were using the Town Hall. The Commission received numerous donations of materials and labor for the needed work, and before the onset of winter were able to have the building jacked up and some of the electrical work accomplished. This work will be continued in the Spring, with the use of \$8,000.00 that was encumbered from the 1987 Parks and Playgrounds budget. The building will be heated, new toilet facilities and water supply installed, and with the help of many volunteers it is hoped that the building will be painted and ready for use before summer. Please donate your time to this worthwhile project.

The Board of Selectmen continues to meet on a weekly basis to conduct the business of the Town. Because of the increasing load of work it is suggested that you call for an appointment should you have business with the Board. This will enable the Board to be ready for your appointment, and will help them in assisting you with your problems.

During the budget meetings, held for the discussion of the 1988 budget, it was strongly indicated that the Townspeople do not wish the Selectmen's office to be open full-time, with the majority of the Board present. This matter is being discussed, and it is the Board's intent to try to honor the Town's wishes, by closing the office to the public two days per week; with the office staff working 5 days, and the Selectmen being present perhaps 3 days per week. This is a matter of great concern to the Selectmen, and they are attempting to reassign tasks to have the work accomplished without their being involved more than 3 days per week. It may mean additional part-time help in the Office Staff area to do this.

In looking towards the future, the Board can predict the need for additional space at the Town Hall for offices and for meetings. At this time there are 1600 registered voters, which means we will need an additional voting booth soon. There is no space for it under the present conditions. With the elimination of the conference room for meetings, there is only the Town Hall available, and at times there are two or more Town department meetings scheduled at the same time. Space is needed in the immediate future. Therefore, the Selectmen anticipate requesting funds be set aside next year in a capital reserve fund for future expansion of the Town Hall building. Our community is growing, and each new family brings additional work along with additional input into town affairs.

We welcome all those who have joined our community this past year, and we hope you will join in our town affairs, beginning with the School District Meeting on March 3 and Town Meeting on March 12th. Voice your opinion openly and bring to our personal attention anything that you feel you wish to be heard on. We need the public's input, knowledge and support. Your assistance will make our job easier, and more meaningful for the Town.

REPORT OF THE CEMETERY TRUSTEES

The Northwood Cemetery Trustees report a relatively uneventful year. Work at the various cemeteries was once again well done by Lawrence Elliott (Pine Grove) and Sherman and Diane Elliott (all other funded cemeteries).

Following a policy set several years ago, we try to do at least one project in addition to general maintenance. This year three problems were corrected. The railroad ties at roadside at Fairview were replaced with granite curbing. Fallen headstones were reset at the Cilley/Brown bury yard on Jenness Pond Road. An unsightly and dangerous old ash stump was removed at the Canterbury Road burying yard. The last two projects were all, or in part, accomplished because of the generosity of Douglas Briggs and David Ford.

All who are aware of the worth and of the historic value of the various ornamentals gracing our cemeteries were saddened by the theft of two lovely pieces. We no longer have the urn at the "East End" honoring our Civil War veterans nor do we have a small gate at Harvey Lake.

Quite unbelievably, the "East End" was also the scene of a shoot-out on June 17th. Though the end of the story might easily have been tragic, only a tree was damaged.

Again this year interest income from perpetual care funds failed to meet the costs of caring for the cemeteries. We plan a fund drive and will be contacting all who have lots in a Northwood Cemetery. We thank you in advance for your generosity.

Sherman Elliott is in the process of doing a Northwood Cemetery Book. He asks anyone who has knowledge of private burying places previously unrecorded to contact him.

NORTHWOOD CONSERVATION COMMISSION

ANNUAL REPORT - 1987

The Conservation Commission has done the following during the year:

- Made new wetland and contour maps for use in checking prime wetland, which will be a top priority in the coming year.
- 2. Made several field trips to check on Town-owned lands.
- 3. Was involved locally with State Toxic Waste Disposal Program. Passed out flyers, put up signs and put notices in area newspapers.
- 4. Had Arbor Day Program; involved Brookside School with poster contest; had County Forester, Phil Auger, as speaker; planted lilacs and hawthorne tree at Bryant Library; presented participants with evergreen seedlings and Arbor Day pins donated by townspeople.
- 5. For Town Meeting set up display table with information on various Northwood Conservation Commission Projects.
- 6. Continued Youth Conservation Program.
- 7. Continued monitoring acid rainfall.
- 8. Members attended several Conservation Conferences including the Annual Workshop sponsored by the N. H. Association of Town Conservation Commissions.
- 9. One member each month attended Town Planning Board Meetings.
- 10. Was involved with Strafford Regional Planning Commission in working on the Town Master Plan.
- Started making an inventory of endangered plants in Northwood.
- 12. During the year, did conservation check on approximately eighteen dredge and fill permits, permit requests, and property complaints.
- 13. After almost four years of negotiations by the Commission, received notice that the State Department of Transportation has decided to give the deeds for two State-owned plots of land (near the Route 4-Route 107 State Boat Ramp) to the Town of Northwood for conservation purposes.

NORTHWOOD FIRE DEPARTMENT Annual Report to the Townspeople 1987

In 1987 the Northwood Fire Department and Rescue Squad responded to a total of 370 calls. Of the 370 calls, 247 calls occurred between the hours of 8 AM and 6 PM.

The Northwood Fire Department responded to a total of 265 calls which included 123 fires. The Northwood Rescue Squad responded to 178 calls, including 112 medical runs.

On 55 occasions both Departments responded together.

The New Hampshire State Fire Marshal's Office estimates that fires in Northwood caused \$314,900 in direct property losses in 1987.

During the month of January we sponsored a membership drive with the Rescue Squad. The Fire Department gained six new Firefighters, bringing the Fire Department back up to a roster of 25 volunteers. Of the twenty-five members, we now have fourteen State Certified Firefighters including four who are Career Level. We are very proud of the tremendous strides we have made in obtaining State Certification of Firefighters in the last seven years. As always, we encourage new members and will continue to improve training programs.

Once again, we are asking you to support the purchase of a new pumper to replace the out of service pumper at the Ridge Station. While our calls have risen nearly 200% in the last five years, we are now running with one less pumper than we did in 1982. This new pumper will bring your Fire Department back to the level of excellent fire protection that you and your families deserve.

In closing, I wish to once again thank the dedicated Officers and Firefighters of the Northwood Fire Department for their untiring devotion to providing the best fire protection available.

To the people of Northwood who have helped us over the past year "Thank You", your support is always appreciated.

Report of the Northwood Rescue Squad

1987

The Northwood Rescue Squad completed a very active year in 1987. We responded to over 200 calls for assistance, resulting in the rendering of care to 183 patients.

In terms of the severity of the need for medical assistance, 7 patients were in extremely critical condition, 49 were in critical condition, while 91 patients were in need of hospital level care, and 36 patients were treated at the scene and not transported. The majority of our patients were transported to Concord Hospital.

A review of the time spent on each run, from the time of the initial dispatch to the time that the ambulance is back in quarters and the crew can go home, revealed that 1,647 man-hours were given by the attendants in providing direct patient care. An additional 17,520 hours of on-call duty for rescue calls, 1,200 hours were devoted to training and continuing education of the Rescue Squad personnel, and 2,700 hours were given in support of those rendering direct patient care. This is above and beyond the call of duty to expect from so few dedicated EMT's.

While the number of man-hours spent on calls, training, and on-call coverage has increased putting the burden on the 6 or 8 active EMT's remaining. This translates to 1 licensed attendant for every 464 residents, a ratio which skyrockets during the summer months. Over 100 of this years calls occurred during weekday hours, a critical time where we cannot guarantee that anyone will be available to answer your call. In many instances, we have needed to call on mutual aid and Center Barnstead Ambulance because we did not have personnel available.

In September we contracted with Center Barnstead to do our transporting thru March 31, 1988. This contract is only temporary and will not be renewed. The weekday coverage is and has been a serious concern due to the lack of EMT's available to respond on a request for medical aid. Many times during the weekday hours there is "NO ONE AVAILABLE" to answer medical emergencies. As the number of active EMT's has decreased considerably in the past few years, the remaining members have spread themselves thin between job and family commitments, and rescue calls. This volunteer job offers no pay; strange hours; and regular interruptions from work, meals, and sleep. An average transport takes approximately 3 hours, or up to 4 hours on a serious accident call. This year there were many days that we had 2 or 3 calls in a day which is a real strain on the volunteer EMT's.

The Northwood Rescue Squad and Fire Department are requesting that the Town of Northwood support the hiring of 2 FULL-TIME FIREFIGHTER/EMT'S to provide the critical weekday coverage that the citizens of this town have come to expect. The Fire Department is also lacking in weekday personnel

available to respond to fire calls. These 2 full time employees will be handling all fire & rescue emergencies as well as fire inspections, maintenance, work details, school presentations, required reports, etc. They will be housed in the fire stations and will be on the scene of a medical or fire emergency within minutes of your call.

We are not recommending that the Town of Northwood enter into a contract with Center Barnstead Ambulance at an annual cost of \$24,325. They are covering a very large area to be depended on as your primary ambulance service. There are many times that they are unavailable because they are on calls in other towns or at a hospital too far away to respond to Northwood. The people of Northwood could wait up to an hour for medical aid if there are no volunteers in Northwood available to respond. This has been the situation on several calls for medical aid this year.

The Budget Committee has approved the expenditure of \$24,000.00 for the hiring of 2 full-time Firefighter/EMT's for 1988.

PLEASE SHOW YOUR CONTINUED SUPPORT BY VOTING YES FOR 2 FULLTIME FIREFIGHTER/EMT'S. The Rescue Squad has survived for 15 years on volunteers, but the time has come that we must have your support for weekday paid personnel. Please vote in support of this at the Annual Town Meeting on Saturday, March 12, 1988. Thank you for your continued support.

REPORT OF THE NORTHWOOD PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board began the year 1987 with a new secretary and established specific office hours for accepting applications and plans. Fifteen (15) subdivisions were approved during the year, three (3) being referred to the Board of Adjustment for specific variances, one of which was denied. A total of four (4) lot line adjustments were approved.

A total of sixteen (16) Site Plan Reviews were held and approved. Conceptual Approval was granted to two (2) condominium projects: one being sixty-four (64) units and the other thirty-two (32) units. Both of these projects will be phased over four (4) years and three (3) years, respectively.

The Planning Board amended the subdivision regulations early in the year to include "condominiums", and amended and approved a revised Master Plan, as well as new Site Plan Regulations in November of this year.

There are presently six (6) subdivisions and three (3) site plans pending action.

REPORT OF THE BUILDING INSPECTOR AND HEALTH OFFICER

This was my first full year as Building Inspector and Health Officer. Since I had been involved in the building field as a contractor, I have found my new job to be very interesting as well as a learning experience.

When I was initially hired as the Building Inspector, all that I was inspecting was insulation, smoke alarms and making sure that all buildings were at least 20' from all lot lines. Since then, we have undergone many changes, such as the checking of chimneys, electrical and plumbing installations, etc.

The Planning Board and I have adopted the BOCA Building Codes and hopefully, the people of the town will vote them in so that I will be able to check the structual part of a building. All of these codes are needed to protect against faulty building construction and to insure that when you, the townspeople, hire someone you get a safe building. SAFETY is our main concern. The majority of the builders that I have worked with in Northwood would not have to change what they are doing because I feel they are presently constructing safe, well built structures. At this time, I would like to thank all of the contractors and builders who have worked with me on many different problems throughout the year. Codes may seem to be a hindrance, but they have been instituted as a form of protection.

Because of the way I am paid, my service does not cost you, the taxpayer, anything unless you construct something and then I am paid a percentage of the building permit fee.

As the Health Officer, I am responsible for checking new septic systems, test pits and the reconstruction of old systems. This is to help protect against pollution of our rivers, lakes and streams. There are many other duties that fall under the jurisdiction of the Health Officer such as checking on Day Care Centers, the safety of public buildings, dredge and fill of our lakes and wet lands, and head lice, just to name a few.

I would also like to thank all of the knowledgeable people at the Town Hall such as the Selectmen, Office Staff and especially the Administrative Assistant who have all helped to make my new job and department run smoothly during this first year. They deserve a lot more credit than some people in this town have given them. My job would have been more difficult without them.

REPORT OF THE RECREATION COMMISSION

This year the Recreation Commission has expanded its existing programs, as well as started some new projects.

The town's four public beaches were all manned by beach attendants, whenever possible. We were unable to hire a lifeguard for the Northwood Beach. We found that all beaches were used by more residents, possibly due to fewer rainy days. Beach passes were once again required for beach use. Northwood residents obtained their passes (which were good for admittance to all four beaches) at no charge. Out-of-towners were able to purchase non-resident passes, which allowed them to use Mary Waldron and Lucas Pond beaches.

Park benches were purchased for Lucas Pond Beach from money given by the Leon Boody Memorial Fund. Sand was purchased for all beaches, with Northwood Beach receiving the most; because it had not received much over the past few years. Badly needed repairs were made to the Mary Waldron Beach boat ramp. The Committee passed new regulations requiring those who wish to launch their boats at Mary Waldron Beach to show the attendant a beach pass. Also, boat trailer parking is no longer allowed on the beach parking lot or on the road. Those regulations are helping to alleviate the parking and traffic problems in that area.

In order to make the swimming areas safe from boats and fishermen, we purchased some perimeter markers for Northwood Beach to separate the swimming area from other areas. Our plans for 1988 include purchasing these markers for Lucas Pond and Mary Waldron beaches, and extending the ones at Northwood Beach. We feel these measures are necessary to protect the swimmers at these beaches.

Every year the number of children who register for swimming lessons increases. This year about 120 children were taught swimming by Red Cross certified instructors at Northwood Beach. Parents and instructors found the two and one-half weeks of instruction very beneficial. Although we lacked the sufficient number of instructors to offer a swimming program for the very young children, we hope to include them next year.

Many volunteers worked very hard at making this year's Town Christmas Party a huge success. Many Northwood children and adults attended and participated in crafts and singing. We would like to thank all the people who assisted us in giving this festive community party.

Another successful children's summer program was held. The program grew to four mornings a week with Sports, Nature,

Arts and Crafts, and Drama activities. More than eighty (80) children participated. Because of many requests, we are planning to expand the hours of the program from four mornings to three mornings and one full day per week.

We have begun to have community programs and workshops. Adult co-ed volleyball has been held weekly since October. A large number of residents have become "regulars", while others come periodically for fun and exercise. January and February 1988 have brought co-ed basketball for high school aged students. We felt that we were not offering anything for this age group, so when the idea for weekly open basketball hours at the Ridge School was suggested to us, we decided to give it a try. Kids are now enjoying Friday nights with their friends getting basketball tips from John Augulewicz, a volunteer from Strafford.

Basketmaking and stenciling workshops were held this Fall, sponsored by the Recreation Department. Next year we are hoping to offer more adult workshops, as well as workshops for children.

We are most enthusiastic about the Community Building in the Narrows which we are trying to repair and open. This building was turned over to the Town this summer. The Recreation Commission would like to see it made available to all community groups, so has worked hard in soliciting donations from individuals and businesses. We have received tremendous support from people within and outside our community. About severty-five percent of the repairs have been donated. In the spring we would like to clean the inside and paint the outside of this building. A couple of people have offered to help, however, we need more community members to offer their time to accomplish these tasks. If you would like to help, please contact one of our members.

The Center Barnstead Fire Department is pleased to announce that we are now a paid, 24 hour a day ambulance service. In the past, we serviced your town midnight to 5:00 p.m. with a paid crew and volunteers covered 5:00 p.m. to midnight and all weekend. In order to provide 24 hour a day consistent coverage in times when volunteer departments are having manpower troubles, we have decided to pay all our ambulance attendants and have absorbed the costs by fund raising, donations and memorials. This has been a considerable expense and we have struggled for nine months but we have considered the public in our area as our responsibility and have "bitten the bullet".

The major budget increase this year is for paying what was once "volunteer time". This ensures the ambulance is available (if not otherwise committed) 24 hours a day with a fully trained and licensed duty crew.

The Center Barnstead Fire Department requests the town to raise and appropriate your town's share of the ambulance payroll budget of \$24,325.

LAMPREY HEALTH CARE

1987

Lamprey Health Care will mark seventeen years of providing services in 1988. Two medical offices, one in Newmarket and one in Raymond, provide general medical care, preventive health services, community outreach, social services and short term counseling with referral to mental health agencies. Services also offered by Lamprey Health Care include Senior Citizen Transportation and Information and Referral Services for Rockingham County.

Lamprey Health Care's medical team consists of six physicians: Sarah Oxnard, MD, Pediatrician; Cynthia Rasmussen, MD, Obstetrician-Gynecologist; and four Family Practitioners, Edward Benoit, MD; Karen Brainard, MD; Paul Friedrichs, MD; and our newest member, Micki Kantrowitz, MD. Also on staff at Lamprey Health Care are Michael Lewis, Certified Physician's Assistant; Barbara Janeway, Nurse Practitioner; Anne Fawcett, Nurse Practitioner; and John Mark Blowen, Nurse Practitioner. Registered and Licensed Practical Nurses round out the Medical Team.

The addition of physicians in recent years allows Lamprey Health Care to respond to the growing demand for services.

Under the direction of Dr. Rasmussen, Lamprey Health Care operates a prenatal program which includes prenatal, delivery and postpartum care along with nutritional counseling, prenatal and parenting classes and social services and/or referral.

Lamprey Health Care continues to operate the Senior Citizen Transportation Program. The transportation service enables senior citizens to remain independent, self-sufficient and active by providing the means to needed services, including medical, food shopping and recreational trips. Three of the five busses operated by Lamprey Health Care are equipped with hydraulic lifts to provide services to the handicapped. For further information, call 659-2424 or toll-free 1-800-582-7279.

Lamprey Health Care also operates the Rockingham County Info-Center which provides information and referral services to the residents of the county. Information is available to callers through a toll-free number on a wide range of subjects. The toll free number is 1-800-582-7214.

Tel-Med is a taped library of "non-diagnostic" health information designed to provide basic facts about certain diseases, conditions or health issues. The library contains 200 taped messages which are accessible 24 hours per day seven days a week by households with touch tone phones and Monday-Friday from 8 AM to 4 PM by households with rotary dial. The numbers to reach Tel-Med are 433-3232 and 433-3242 and 659-7514 and 659-7516. The Tel-Med program is funded by The Foundation for Seacoast Health of Portsmouth. Peters Executive Director The Directors of the Lamprey Regional Solid Waste Cooperative are pleased to continue to report that the incinerator/energy recovery plant located on the campus of the University of New Hampshire is operating on a continuous twenty-four hour, seven day a week schedule.

The day-to-day operation is carried out under the supervision of the Cooperative's Administrator, under the general supervisory control of the three member Operations Committee from the Joint Board of Directors. The plant personnel, in addition to the Administrator, includes two mechanics, a truck driver, two daily shifts of 12 hours each involving 8 persons plus daily clean-up crew, and the secretary. This organization operates the incinerator system, maintains records, and coordinates with the University's heating plant staff to monitor the boiler and steam production elements of the plant. The Cooperative's organization also handles the collection of refuse from the transfer stations of four communities, and handles the ash removal and its transfer to landfill sites.

The most pressing problem that faced the Cooperative this year was selecting and permitting an ash landfill for the residue from our incineration process. After looking at sites in all of the Cooperative's member communities, a site in Somersworth was selected with the approval of the Somersworth City Council with a few stipulations. The largest of which was that we conduct a test program to forecast the results of mixing the ash with Somersworth's sludge from its Waste Water Treatment plant.

The Cooperative entered into an agreement with the Environmental Research Group, which is affiliated with the University of New Hampshire, to perform such tests. The results have been excellent and could be considered a minor breakthrough in environmental engineering. Mixing the sewer sludge with the ash from the incinerator makes a much more environmentally sound product than either of the two elements by themself. The final report should be finished by the middle of January 1988 and a copy of the final report will be sent to each town in the Cooperative.

While the testing with the Environmental Research Group has been ongoing, the Cooperative has been proceeding with the permit process with the State of New Hampshire. To date some fifteen test borings have been made on the site, ninety-five percent of the hydrological work ahs been completed and one hundred percent of the design of the landfill for submittal to the State with the application has been completed. Hopefully by the time you read this, the State of New Hampshire will have issued the permit to construct

the facility.

The tipping fee this year will remain the same as last. One thing should be noted, last year (1986), the Cooperative processed 37,863 tons of rubbish from member communities and this year (1987) processed 39,883 tons for a 5.33% increase. The member communities are asked to examine methods of reducing their waste stream. As a side note, each person on the average generates about 3.0 lbs. of rubbish per day which equates to about eleven hundred pounds per year, so therefore if 100 people move into your community in one year, the communities rubbish bill is going to be \$2,225.00 higher based on this year's tipping fee of \$41.00 per ton.

Joint Board of Directors Lamprey Regional Solid Waste Cooperative

The Rockingham County Community Action Program, Inc. (RCCAP) is a private, non-profit anti-poverty agency which has served residents of Rockingham County since 1965. The Greater Raymond Community Action Center is an outreach office of RCCAP which serves fifteen (15) towns in the central part of the county, including the town of Northwood.

In the fifteen towns served by the Greater Raymond Community Action Center, well over 1,200 households are experiencing financial problems serious enough to leave them without the means to provide for basic necessities. Of these, nearly 40% are elderly individuals or couples living on fixed incomes. The remaining 60% include the disabled, the unemployed, the underemployed, single parent families and the working poor. Regardless of their particular situations, all of these people are forced to seek outside assistance to meet their most essential needs.

Community Action plays an important role in meeting these needs by offering direct service programs as well as the help and guidance of our agency's staff. Of the major direct service programs offered by Community Action, the following were provided to eligible residents of Northwood:

Seventy-three (73) households received Fuel Assistance, a program which provides a financial grant of up to \$500.00 to assist with energy-related expenses.

- One (1) home was weatherized through the Weatherization Program, which provides quality materials and labor to weatherize homes in order to reduce heating costs and conserve energy.
- One (1) household received the Supplemental Energy Program, which provides for the repair or replacement of furnaces and heating units and home repairs for low-income homeowners.

Forty-nine (49) children were provided meals from private family day care homes which participate in the Rockingham Family Day Care Program.

Five (5) women, infants and children received help through the WIC Program, which offers supplemental nutritious food and nutrition counseling to pregnant women, nursing mothers and children up to the age of five who are nutritionally at risk.

One hundred and sixty-three (163) food packets were provided through the Surplus Food Program, which distributes USDA surplus cheese, butter, flour, dry milk, cornmeal and rice.

In addition to these major programs, much of our staff time is devoted to working with people who come to us seeking help. During the past year, we received eighty-one (81) calls or visits from Northwood residents, many of which were crisis calls involving fuel or utility problems, the lack of food or clothing or general financial needs. By working closely together with local and state welfare administrators, fuel and utility companies, other human service agencies and interested clergy and civic groups, we are able to link those in need with the services available to them.

Since the services we offer greatly relieve the towns we serve from the full burden of providing for the needs of their low-income residents, we ask every community we serve to make a financial contribution to our agency based upon the level of service we have provided to its residents. The amount we request equals 3.5% of the total dollar value of services provided during the previous fiscal year, which means that we request \$3.50 for every \$100.00 we provide in direct services.

From September 1, 1986 through August 31, 1987, Community Action provided \$67,390 in services to Northwood residents. We are therefore requesting the Town of Northwood to contribute 3.5% of this amount, or \$2,359. The Town of Northwood has contributed to our agency for many years, and we extend our appreciation to you for your continued support.

RURAL DISTRICT HEALTH COUNCIL, INC.

ANNUAL REPORT - 1987

During the past year the Rural District Health Council has continued to provide Home Health Care for the sick and preventive medicine to the youth of today who will be healthier leaders tomorrow.

The agency continues to qualify as a certified Home Health Agency, providing your town with skilled nursing, physical therapy, occupational therapy, speech therapy, medical social worker, home health aide and homemakers; a comprehensive hospice program certified by Blue Cross and G. E. insurance. The staff has made to date 5,959 visits. A 24 hour answering service is available with a nurse on call 24 hours a day, 7 days a week with home visits made as indicated.

An elderly maintenance health program funded in part by the Division of Elderly and Adult Services and the Rural District Health Council has 239 patients enrolled in the program, which includes health counseling, blood pressure monitoring, diet teaching, and blood testing of diabetes. 550 visits have been provided with 267 influenza shots given.

The child health program has an enrollment of 461 children from ages 0-6 years. This includes physical examinations, immunizations, growth development and counseling. The program works closely with the school nurses. 31 school children received immunizations this year. There have been 783 children seen at clinic with 597 home visits made. The dental program, funded in part by the Bureau of Dental Health and the Rural District Health Council provided 186 children from the ages 3-6 years with cleaning and flouride treatment.

A bequest to the Council may be made to further the general purpose of the Rural District Health Council. In lieu of flowers a memorial donation may be made in memory of a loved one. The Board of Directors and staff would like to thank the families of the following for naming memorial contributions in their names.

Jean Johnson, Chairwoman of the Budget Committee, moved to recess this meeting until May 4, 1987 at 7:00 p.m. at the Northwood Elementary School. Seconded by George Stanhope. Mrs. Johnson explained due to the inconsistency of the School Budget, it was felt that a clearer understanding of the Budget was necessary. Senator William Johnson asked for a five minute recess before a vote was taken. A ballot vote was called for: YES - 75 and NO - 20. Motion was passed.

May 4, 1987 (Cont. of the March 2 recessed meeting)

There were 121 present. Guests were: Attorney Brad Kidder, Supt. Barry Clough, and Principal Tom Conway. A Moment of Silence in memory of Ronnie Post, who recently passed on, was asked for by Moderator Johnson.

ARTICLE 1: School Board Member, Richard Shaw moved that we accept this article as read. Seconded by James Colburn. Gordon Smart amended this article "Not to accept the report of the Auditors, the School Financial Report, or the Report of the S.A.U. #44." He felt there were inconsistencies in the Town Report. This was seconded by Paul Colby. A vote by show of hands was taken: YES - 48, NO - 5. Motion on the amendment was passed. A vote on the main article as amended was passed.

ARTICLE 2: To chose agents and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant. A motion was made by Dick Shaw and seconded by James Colburn, "To move that the School District vote to establish a School Building Needs Committee, to be appointed by the School Board, composed of not more than seven members to discharge to following functions:

- 1. To evaluate recent reports regarding school population growth, projections, and space recommendations for the School Board (Northwood School District).
- 2. To investigate all practical ways which the Northwood School District could provide the necessary classroom space for continuing quality education of our growing student population.

- 3. To consider possible approaches to school building construction that could provide the necessary education facilities to meet present and future requirements (for school), including consideration of various building sites.
- 4. To conduct a search for a minimum of twenty (20) acres of land to satisfy the future construction/space needs of the school district; said committee to report back to the School Board with purchase recommendations and further to authorize and direct the school board to acquire an option or options on a suitable parcel (s) of land in accord with terms and conditions which the school board deems necessary and appropriate prior to the Special School District meeting to be held no later than September 30, 1987.
- 5. To inquire in detail into forming a cooperative school district with the Town of Strafford and/or other adjacent towns, and to, fully evaluate the practicality of constructing a Junior High/Middle School facility for such a district.
- 6. To report their findings and recommendations to the Northwood School District at the earliest possible time.

Ken Curley amended to "delete not more than 7 members". Seconded by Bruce Farr. This was passed by a verbal vote.

ARTICLE 3: To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate seventy-five thousand, five hundred and eighteen dollars (\$75,518.00) to be received in State Foundation Aid (Augenblick Plan) monies during the 1987-88 fiscal year; said sum to be deposited in the School District Capital Reserve Fund established for the purpose of financing all or part of the cost of new construction for the School District in accordance with the provisions of RSA Ch-35. Jean Johnson moved that this article be accepted as read. Seconded by George Stanhope. Passed by a verbal vote.

ARTICLE 4: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) from the unencumbered balance at the end of the 1986-87 fiscal year. Said sum of money will be deposited in the School District Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of financing Capital Improvements as well as all or part of the cost of new construction for the School District in accordance with the provisions of RSA Ch-35. Bunny Behm moved that we indefinitely postpone this article. Seconded by George Stanhope. Passed by a verbal vote.

ARTICLE 5: To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) for a contingency fund as provided by N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated 198:4-6. Jean Johnson moved that we accept this article as read. Seconded by George Stanhope. Passed by a verbal vote.

To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate in addition to the original 1986-87 appropriation, a sum of \$38,573.00 to be made available to the School District prior to July 1, 1987, in order to meet unanticipated special education expenditures (deficit appropriation). Bunny Behm moved to amend the sum to read \$30,000.00. Seconded by James Colburn. stated that the School Board can absorb some of the expenses, which includes bottle water, but \$30,000.00 is more than they can absorb. Gordon Smart asked to "defeat" this motion. Attorney Brad Kidder explained Special Education expenses and that the towns are obligated to pay the necessary amount asked for. Moderator Johnson called for a vote by show of hands: YES - 24, NO - 42. Motion does not prevail.

ARTICLE 7: To see what sum of money the School District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, for capital construction, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the School District. Bunny Behm moved that we accept the School Board and Budget Committee's figure of \$2,096,598.00. This does not include \$30,000.00 from Robert Herron asked for an explanation of the Article 6. Bookkeeper's and Secretary's salary. Mrs. Behm explained the time and hours each one spent at their jobs, as well as job descriptions and their qualifications. Jean Johnson asked that we reduce the Secretary's salary from the asking amount of \$14,994.00 to \$10,318.00, a reduction of \$4,676.00, and that the Bookkeeper's salary from \$14,560.00, the asking amount, to \$10,000.00, a reduction of \$4,560.00. John Rule made this a motion and it was seconded by George Stanhope. A ballot vote was called for: YES - 46, NO - 32. A vote on the bottom line figure of \$2,087,362.00 was passed.

ARTICLE 8: To see if the School District will authorize the School Board to petition Rockingham County Superior Court for a special School District meeting in accord with RSA 197:3 to be held not later than 30 September 1987 for the purpose of acting on a proposed bond issue to provide new construction necessary to satisfy the overcrowded space needs of the School District. Dick Shaw moved to indefinitely postpone this article. Seconded by James Colburn. Passed by a verbal vote.

ARTICLE 9: To see if the School District will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive and expend, in the name of the district, such advances, Grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government and/no State agencies; private agencies and/or other sources in accordance with the provisions of RSA 198:20-b. Mr. Herron moved that we accept this article

as read. Seconded by Charles Johnson. Passed by a verbal vote.

ARTICLE 10: To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting. Mr. Herron made a motion that the Bookkeeper and records be moved to the same school building. This to be done within 90 days. Motion was defeated by a verbal vote.

Allen Holmes made a motion to "Put the School District on a cash basis. Authorize the School Board to keep books open 10 days after closing date to clear all bills and issue checks." Seconded by George Stanhope. Yes/No vote was taken by show of hands. YES - 47, NO - 5. Motion passed.

Jean Johnson moved that the following resolution be approved by this School District meeting: "That the Northwood School Board be extremely cautious in expenditures of discretionary line items, and to review closely the pattern of expenditures in all categories; That the Northwood School Board request of the Budget Committee and the Department of Education, additional funds for unexpected expenses, especially, increases in tuition and transportation; That the Northwood School Board is advised to be very aware that transfer of line items funds will not create a deficit in mandated expenses; That the Northwood School Board use the contingency fund as intended for unexpected expenses throughout the School year and not as a lump sum expenditure." Seconded by George Stanhope. Passed by a verbal vote.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:45 p.m.

We have examined the combined financial statements of the funds and account group as indexed, of the Northwood School District as of and for the fiscal year ended June 30,1987. As is the general practice with many New Hampshire municipalities, the Northwood School District has not maintained a record of its general fixed assets and accordingly, a statement of general fixed assets, required by generally accepted accounting principles, is not included in this financial report.

In our opinion, except that the omission of the financial statements described above results in an incomplete presentation, as explained in the preceding paragraph, the combined financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the Northwood School District as of June 30, 1987 and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the combined financial statements taken as a whole. The supporting schedules listed in the index are presented for the purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the combined financial statements of the Northwood School District. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the combined financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the combined financial statements taken as a whole.

As many seacoast communities, Northwood is experiencing rapid growth with the inevitable ramifications for the school system. In September of 1985, the enrollment in grades K-8 was 319 pupils. In September of 1986, this figure rose to 325 pupils and when school opened in September of 1987, the enrollment had increased to 375 pupils. Such rapid growth has pressed the current facility to maximum utilization.

Due to the growth Northwood is experiencing, I strongly recommend voter support for Article One of the District Warrant, which will provide for the construction of an addition and renovation of the Ridge School. Adequate space is absolutely essential to the development and maintenance of quality educational programs for children.

Northwood students continue to demonstrate fine progress in various subject matter areas as demonstrated by the results of the Science Research Associates and California Achievement tests. All categories of Reading, Science and Social Studies have shown very strong gains.

Major needs of the system as I see them continue to be as follows:

1) classroom space, 2) the need for an expanded library component, 3) emphasis on the development of thinking skills within the context of the regular school year curricula, and 4) increased focus on In-District Special Education programs.

The current Legislative session merits our attention with regard to at least one particular piece of legislation.

House Bill 645 would increase the State's portion of school construction costs from 30% to 40% and would decrease the vote total needed to pass a school construction bond issue from the current level of 66-2/3% to 51%. School Districts experiencing rapid growth would benefit greatly from this legislation. I strongly urge you to contact your representatives in support of this bill.

A stronger State role in education and more accountability at the local level is necessary if we are to retain the present level of decision-making as opposed to an increased Federal role. Present Federal budget decisions reflect a trend away from funding programs which are less accountable such as State block grants and toward increased funding for more accountable programs such as the National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) which analyzes student performance in specific subjects. Such experts as Dr. Porter from Harvard maintain that the local control of education associated with an earlier era in our nation's history is no longer sufficient for an economically interdependent world. If we are to prove such a thesis wrong, we must support our schools at the State and local level by providing clear leadership and adequate financial support.

The School Administrative Unit staff is prepared to assist the District with what I view to be an increased need to study the implications of regional growth and will continue to assist in such areas as curricula review and revision, staff selection and supervision, business management, transportation, special education and legal matters.

On behalf of the members of the School Administrative Unit #44 staff, I wish to thank the members of the School Board, and key community people for their untiring efforts and continued support on behalf of the children served by the District.

The enrollment projections for the Fall of 1988 are as follows: The big change will be involved with an incoming Kindergarten of 50 and a graduating class of 31. We are looking at a projected enrollment of 387 students without any growth. There will be a need for two additional classrooms for Grade 1 and Grade 7 will need an additional staff member.

Major Goals for 1987-88

- To continue to strive for an up-graded curriculum in the areas of Math and Language Art.
- 2) The addition of a Reading Co-ordinator to our program which will cut down the number of students in our Special Education Programs. This program is off to an excellent start. The introduction of a co-ordinated Reading Program highlighting the Whole Reading approach as well as continuing in our Basic Reading Series. This has improved the total concept of reading throughout the school.
- 3) Computing Education We have a number of our staff involved in a training program to better utilize computers in the school. Students at all levels have an opportunity to be actively involved in a computer program.
- 4) To continue to strive to challenge students who have exhibited exceptional ability at all grade levels.

Extra Curricular Activities

The School has continued to encourage students to become involved in our many after school activities. The school sponsors many athletic teams for all grade levels. The band program is off to a great start and the interest exhibited by the students has been encouraging. Students also are involved in the School Newspaper, Computers, Art Enrichment Groups, Science Clubs, and other opportunities are open to the students.

Areas of Concern

The on-going water problems at the school have to be a concern for the Community. The school is back using well water for cleaning and restroom use. Bottled water is used for drinking purposes as well as cooking needs. This problem is not going away and the Community needs to be prepared for any and all changes in the level of contamination at the well site. This situation can have an adverse effect on the education of the students if the school has to be delayed because of this problem.

The continuing problem with space is getting worse all the time. The number of students are constantly increasing and the facilities, particularly the restroom facilities, are becoming almost impossible to manage. Restrooms that were built for a maximum of 180 students are not sufficient to handle this present school population. The situation at the school has been an on-going problem for the past 15 years and if anything it has deteriorated.

I will be leaving my position in June having served as Principal of the Northwood Elementary School for the past 19 years. These have been very special years for me. I want to personally thank all of the parents and students for their cooperation and support during my tenure at Northwood.

In closing, I hope that the Town of Northwood will look hard at the present school plant and make some improvment for the benefit of the students and teachers at the school. The next few years will be crucial for the Town of Northwood as they evaulate the present school structure and make recommendations for impromements. The direction the Town takes depends on strong leadership. The Community needs to utilize all of the available resources at their disposal to solve these problems.

ANNUAL HEALTH SERVICES REPORT

SCHOOL YEAR 1987 - 1988

This has been a very busy year. Height, weight, vision and hearing examinations were given to 372 students before January 1, 1988. All transfer students are tested as they come into our school, and checked for head lice.

First aid and medications were rendered to approximately 507 students. This does not include faculty.

Sports examinations were done on 49 students by Dr. Lord.

We have not been able to find a dental hygienst this year so we will not be running a dental program. If there are any questions, please call Mrs. Sandra Appleton at 942-5488.

The fifth grade was checked for scoliosis this year, and will be followed until eighth grade. This screening is supported by the State, and is done once a year. If there are any questions, the student is re-screened in one month and a notice at that time is sent home.

Fifty-nine students were screened for kindergarten entrance to Northwood School in Spring of 1987.

Again this year we had trouble at the beginning of school with head lice. We had sixty cases. We had a lot of support and help from the State Department of Communicable Disease. Many thanks to Siegfried E. Thewke Ph.D. from The State Entomology Laboratory. Students will be checked on a weekly basis next school year, and notices will be sent to parents if any cases are found in your child's room. Many thanks for your support during this very hard time.

Student health records are kept on every child, and are considered confidential. Every child is required by the State to have:

DPT	4	separate dates
Polio	4	separate dates
Measles	1	date after 1 year
Rubella	1	date after 1 year
Mumps	1	date after 1 year

If your child has had an update during the year, please notify the school nurse so it can be added to your child's record. We are audited by the State Immunization Committee on a regular basis.

The sixth grade has been doing basic first aide for this year. They will receive a card when the course is finished.

First grade through fifth grade will be doing basic health issues included in our health guide. Eighth grade has done a unit on Aids. We have seen three movies and had Dr. David Brumbach talk to students in a discussion group. I hope the students have learned enough to make essential decisions during this class.

Many thanks to everyone that has made this school year a success.
