

#### **TOWN WARRANT**

#### State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Orford, in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Orford, on Tuesday, the 8th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year. Also to choose one Selectman, one Trustee of Trust Funds, and one Library Trustee for the ensuing three years.

2. To hear the Budget of the Town and to raise and appropriate any money recommended therein or to pass any vote relative thereto.

3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to insure Town buildings.

5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of electric lights.

6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Orford Social Library and Orford Free Library.

7. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

8. To see if the Town will vote to dispense with the distribution of inventory blanks until the Selectmen appraise the property.

9. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the removal of snow and care of Town winter roads.

10. To elect one delegate to the State convention.

11. To see if the Town will accept State Aid for construction of Class II. road known as the Dame Hill Road, and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$1,122.00, or will accept State Aid for construction of Class V. roads, and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$441.20.

12. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell any real estate acquired by tax deed.

13. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the Fire Department equipment, and to raise and appropriate money for the same, or to take any vote relating thereto.

14. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Municipal Budget Act.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred twenty-five dollars for a suitable tablet bearing the name, date of erection, and other general information, to be placed on or near the Samuel Morey Memorial Bridge across the Connecticut River, between Orford, N. H., and Fairlee, Vt., said sum to be expended under the direction of the Selectmen and a committee to be appointed.

16. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the care of Orford Common, so called, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the control of Pine Blister Rust.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars for the celebration of the Anniversary of the Ratification of the Federal Constitution by the State, June 21, 1938, said sum to be expended under the direction of the Selectmen.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75.00 for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region. Said appropriation to be disbursed by the Selectmen.

20. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors or Committees heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto, and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Orford School Board and Citizens of the Orford School District:

I hereby submit my eighth report as Superintendent of Schools. The statistics for the year 1936-1937 follow this report.

Since my last report the high school building has been remodeled and enlarged. A careful reading of the Headmaster's detailed report shows clearly that the school is now adapted to the life of this area, while still furnishing preparation to those who plan to continue study beyond the secondary school. All students have four years of English and electives in social studies and mathematics. The school is by no means exclusively a vocational school. People of the district are already availing themselves of the facilities of milk testing at a cost charge only, and as time goes on it is expected that more and more people will receive benefit from the new plant.

The grammar and primary rooms are now modernized and very comfortable. In grades one and two both here and at Orfordville formal report cards were discontinued and a short note or personal call being substituted. Experience seems to show that parents in this way get a clearer picture of the progress of their children. At Orfordville both rooms are comfortably filled and the work motivating well. The Board plans to install new fixtures in the toilets, and shingle the entire building.

In planning for the addition to the Orford Street building it was necessary for the Board to purchase a small piece of land in the rear of the building, and this was done for the sum of one hundred dollars. The District bonded itself for 22,500.00 to pay for the addition, alterations and general improvements. The indebtedness takes the form of twenty eleven hundred and twenty-five dollar serial notes, running twenty years at  $3\frac{1}{2}$ interest. Assuming that the school holds its present enrollment it is reasonably expected the refunds from surplus of the operation of the school will considerably more than take care of the notes as they yearly mature.

#### HEADMASTER'S REPORT

To Supt. Allan M. McCurdy:

I herewith present my eleventh annual report of Orford High School.

When the time came for the opening of school last September everyone was anxious to return to the new Luilding. No one who had not been to school in the old building can appreciate what the new one has meant. The rooms are attractive in appearance and well lighted. Even on the coldest days of the winter all the rooms were well heated. They are large nough so that no class is really overcrowded, although extra desks did have to be put in the freshman room to accommodate the 32 pupils in that class. The main room is used for a home room for juniors and seniors and also for a study hall. When the assembly period is held, folding chairs are brought in to accommodate the other classes.

On the opening day of school, September 8th, 90 pupils were enrolled, distributed by classes as follows: Seniors 21, juniors 19, sophomores 19, freshmen 31. Since then five more have entered, and eight have left, which makes our present number 87. Some of those who left, moved away and some went to work.

Two new curricula were added to our program this year, home economics and agriculture, both of which have proved to be of much interest and value to the pupils. In the home economics curriculum two courses are offered: One on "Foods" for freshmen and sophomores, and one on "Family Relations" for juniors and seniors.

The home economics room is well laid out and equipped for the work, in fact one of our visitors said it was better than some of the larger schools.

There are 16 girls in the class taking "Foods." Last fall they made pickles, jelly, and did some canning. They have planned menus, always keeping in mind food values. At Thanksgiving time they prepared appropriate menus and cooked holiday dishes. They have made breakfast and luncheon menus, prepared the dishes, and served one of each. In the fall when citizens and friends of the school were invited to inspect the building and listen to the program which had been prepared, the class served a luncheon of sandwiches and cocoa.

State Commissioner Pringle ordered two unfinished tables for the home economics room. The girls did an excellent job in putting on a filler, varnishing and waxing them.

The class studying "Family Relations" has 12 girls enrolled. The objectives of that class are as follows:

- 1. Wholesome family relationship.
- 2. The desire to become a well adjusted member in the family group and in the community.
- 3. Understanding of the vocational opportunities open to women.
- 4. Some knowledge of the principles of child care and training.
- 5. To stimulate an interest in the worthy use of leisure time.

The girls of both classes have home projects to do and report on.

The home economics classes are taught by a cadet from Keene Normal School, but at the present time Miss Ruth Ingraham, an experienced home economics teacher, is at the school as supervisor two weeks out of every month. The other two weeks she spends at the high school in Hampstead. She is well prepared for the work, and her supervision adds much to the value of the course. Mr. Paul Traver, the sub-master, is the teacher of the agricultural course, which has an enrollment of 33 boys. Mr. Traver is a graduate of the University of New Hampshire and he has had one year's experience in New York State. His interest both in the boys and in his work, his vision of what can be done, and his enthusiasm in carrying it out are making the agricultural course an outstanding one.

In the fall Mr. Traver took the boys to visit some farms that have thoroughbred herds of cattle to give them training in judging cattle. One week end he took them to the University of New Hampshire to a judging contest. A silver trophy was brought back by one team for the best poultry judging.

Before the ground froze, they started on the project of landscaping the school grounds. Mr. Snow loaned his tractor, which they used in levelling off and hauling the dirt to fill in depressions. They made a skating rink which is being used this winter by both the grades and high school, and which can be used in the spring for a tennis court.

They have built a green-house behind the school building. To do this they made an excavation and then constructed a cement foundation. The sloping roof is made of windows which were removed from the old school building.

One phase of work which the boys take up is milk testing. Mr. Traver has made a survey of the farms, giving the farmers the opportunity of having their milk tested for two cents a cow, a fee just sufficient to cover the actual cost.

At the present time the boys are working in the shop. They have repaired many of the old chairs, which had been discarded, so that they can now be used. They are also making articles of wood. They have cleaned and painted the tractor which they used in the fall. Now they are working on a gasoline engine which one of the boys brought in. They hope to repair it so it can be run again. The farmers have the privilege of sending in other engines for a similar purpose, the only charge being the actual cost of material used.

On December 21 a fathers' and sons' banquet was put on by the department at the school building. Desks were removed from the main room, and tables set up. The boys brought most of the supplies which were used. The tables were very prettily decorated by the girls of the home economics department. They also efficiently cooked and served the food. Speeches were made by Ralph Mack, Cecil Bean, Allen Young, and Raymond Gulick, Mr. Snow, Rev. C. C. Claris, Rev. C. A. Atkins, Supt. McCurdy, and Mr. Little, State Supervisor of Agriculture. The high school orchestra played.

Every effort is being made to make the course interesting and profitable to the boys and a service to the community.

Mrs. Christie Goodwin is giving her services to the high school orchestra. She meets with them an hour every Thursday. Under her efficient instruction they are making good progress.

The extra curricula activities consist of base ball, basket ball for both boys and girls, assembly programs put on by the several classes, and a play successfully put on by the seniors. In the spring a minstrel show will be given, the proceeds of which will be used for athletics.

While the enrollment this year has exceeded our expectations, we hope that next year it will be even more.
