

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pittsburg, in the County of Coos, in the said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Pittsburg, on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To see if the town will vote to accept the budget and raise money for same.
- 2. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to distribute blank inventories at the time they examine and appraise the property to be taxed.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to observe Old Home Day and raise money for same.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to elect a committee or instruct the moderator to appoint a committee, to set the date and manage the Old Home Day observance.
- 6. To see what action the town will take in regard to a skating rink and raise money for same.
- 7. To see what action the town will take in regards to a suitable truck for the fire department to replace the 1933 Ford, and use the equipment off the old one, and raise money for same.

- 8. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 to the Colebrook and Conn. Lakes Chamber of Commerce for the purpose of issuing and distributing printed matter and otherwise advertising and publicizing the North Country Area in cooperation with immediately surrounding towns.
- 9. To see what action the town will take to relocate a new dump and raise money for same.
- 10. To see if the town will raise \$500.00 to be laid out on the River Road.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to appoint all necessary Town Officers, not listed under Article 12.
- 12. To bring your ballots for the election of one Selectman for three years, one Road Agent for the Middle District, one Road Agent for the Lower District, one Road Agent for the Lake District, Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, three Auditors, one Overseer of the Poor, and two Library Trustees.

Polls shall be opened at 10 A. M. and not closed before 6 P. M.

Superintendent's Report

To the School Board and the Citizens of the School District of Pittsburg:

Foreword

Regardless of what our thinking may be relative to where present day education is leading us, and of the extent to which the press, radio, and television have influenced it during the past several months, it is believed that one thing will be agreed upon, namely, that more time, space and expense has been devoted in focusing our attention upon public education then was ever before known. True, much that has been said has been questionable and even condemning in nature. Even in such instances, however, there has been, now and then, a ray of hope. Probably, the best example which could be cited in this respect is "Johnny's" growing up educationally, even though we were told he couldn't read. Now we hear more about him as "John" in high school who, in some miraculous manner, has picked up sufficient information along the way that he wants to shy away from Mathematics and Science.

To become really serious though, we are much concerned about the teaching of the three R's, especially Reading, in the elementary school. Likewise, we are equally concerned over the selection of the subjects. particularly those of a technical nature in high school. As has been alluded to above, apparently either nearly everything has been said that could be said about the need for more effective teaching in our grades, or something is definitely being done to improve the once claimed deplorable conditions. Indications to this effect are found in the switch in emphasis to more upon the professed need of greatly increased enrollments in the Mathematics and Science courses at the secondary school level. A goodly number of people believe this to be imperative, too, if we are to continue to enjoy our position of world leadership. Undoubtedly this is true to a certain extent. However, is there a danger here of vielding to technical hypnosis?

Although granted that the processes of physical research and the application of engineering methods enter into the solution of our present day problems in multitudinous ways, we have only to look about us to quickly sense that there are still problems of long standing yet to be solved. As a matter of fact, most of them would be just the same had the atom never been split. They require not so much a knowledge of the nature of matter as they do a clear mind, the power of logic analysis, wisdom born of experience, and an understanding of how to get along with others. Personnel relations between capital and labor, and international politics, provide good examples in this respect. The indications are that even though perhaps more attention should be given to specialized education, demands for the provision of a parallel in general education seem equally apparent. It is proven capacity to learn, rather than what has been learned, that really counts when one's formal education is completed, and he is out in the world on his own.

Teachers

Two new teachers have been employed since submitting our last report. Our Shop teacher, Raymond P. Stuart, who has had extensive experience as a millwright, carpenter and general machinist, much of the time in the capacity of foreman and as instructor, joined the faculty in the middle of last year. Principal Dana C. Moore, an experienced Mathematics and Science teacher, who began working with us in September, is a graduate of Springfield College and has been working upon his Master's Degree at Keene Teachers College.

With the continued teacher shortage becoming, if anything, progressively more serious each succeeding year, we are extremely fortunate to have the same experienced teachers in all the other positions in our school. In the high school, Grades 7-12, these teachers, with respective subjects taught, include, Mrs. Helen Barclay—English and French; Miss Lucy E. Mosher— Home Economics, also operates School Lunch Program; Raymond C. Smith—Social Studies, General Science and Athletics; and Mrs. May F. Thibeault—English, Mathematics, Social Studies and Typewriting. In the first six grades Mrs. Doris C. Fissette teaches Grades 5-6; Mrs. Junie S. Aldrich teaches Grades 3-4; and Mrs. Eva S. Scott teaches Grades 1-2.

School Nurse - Health

We are much pleased to have our school nursee, Mrs. Ethel S. Sturgis, with us again after recovering from an operation which confined her for several weeks in the hospital and at home. It is during such a prolonged period, when the schools are not served by the school nurse, that the great importance of the work done by her in helping the pupils maintain good health is more fully realized.

Although it was not possible to perform the customary routine health work while Mrs. Sturgis was away, thanks to the sponsorship of the Mohawk Parent Teacher Association and the excellent cooperation of many willing workers, much was accomplished to protect the physical well being of the people in this area. Two very successful polio clinics were conducted, one each in November and January for ages six months to twenty years inclusive, and a chest x-ray clinic was held in the latter month for all ages. It should be noted here, also, that in addition to the above clinics, Mrs. Sturgis had a very well attended pre-school one last spring, and that complete physical examinations were made of all Fourth Grade pupils shortly after the opening of school in September.

Enrollment and Attendance

The total enrollment continues to grow, as it is larger for the fourth successive year than it was the previous year. A comparison of the number of pupils enrolled in Grades 1-8 and 9-12 for this four year period, by beginning with the current year, shows respective counts of 91 and 61, 87 and 49, 97 and 40, 89 and 31. Although the number of high school tuition pupils from Clarksville has decreased from 7 to 6 since last year, the number of elementary tuition pupils from there has increased from 1 to 2 so that the total of 8 remains the same. The average percentage of attendance last year was 96.56 in Grades 1-6: 98.16 in Grades 7-8; and 96.39 in Grades 9-12. The average number of tardinesses per pupil for the same groups was .21, .21, and .31 respectively. The outstanding attendance record and small number of tardinesses for the entire school is commendable.

Notes on the Budget

The School Board's Budget for 1957-58 is \$69,350.00 of which \$58,130.00 is for operational expenses and \$11,220.00 for principal and interest payments on the bond issue to finance the construction and equipment of the new school building. The budget for the current year is \$67,086.00 of which \$53,621.00 and \$13,465.00 are for operating cost and bond and serial note obligations respectively. Since no state aid is anticipated, even with the likelihood that the General Court will increase general aid to local school districts from the state level, the estimated income is confined to a possible \$1,500.00 from tuition, which leaves a balance of \$67,850.00 to be raised by taxes by the town. Provision for salary advancements, higher costs of instructional materials, and the purchase of additional shop equipment explain, for the most part, the increase in the budget over that of the current year.

Building and Equipment

With the continued policy of keeping the building in an excellent state of maintenance, relatively little repair work has been necessary during the past year. The oil burner of the furnace was overhauled and the fuel pump was replaced with a new one. Such surfaces as needed it, both inside and outside, were touched-up with a coat of fresh paint. New bulletin boards put up on the walls over the wardrobes in the classrooms used by Grades 3-4 and Grades 5-6 provide valuable additional space for display purposes. And the installation of a fine large workbench across the south end of the Shop furnishes the additional bench room that is much needed for the various types of project work done in this department.

Thanks to the practice followed of keeping the school supplied with adequate equipment, only a few items have been needed since a year ago. Outside of wall maps, globe, and general shop supplies, purchases have been confined to a typewriter for the Commercial Room, letter file for the storage of supplementary material in the Social Studies room, and an extra motor for the furnace oil burner in case anything goes wrong with the one presently operating during the school year.

Miscellaneous

As has been stated previously, the fine musical performances turned in by the school band at various functions during the school year, at the school as well as outside, will illustrate what this organization contributes to the overall life in the community.

The large number of pupils taking advantage of the School Lunch Program indicates the popularity of this school function which plays a very important part in the building of school morale. The balanced meals contribute materially, also, to the good health and physical fitness of all who take part.

Legislation

Since the Governor is in agreement with the Commissioner in petitioning the Legislature for a substantial increase in general school aid for the next biennium, and the establishment of school building aid on a permanent basis, the outlook is promising for additional financial assistance from the state level to help pay the rapidly mounting costs of operating our schools. Other possible legislation which will be of vital concern to teachers, especially, will be the action taken by the Lawmakers in their consideration of the proposed conversion of the present Teacher Retirement System into one of combination with Social Security.

Conclusion

May I again express my sincere thanks to the members of the School Board, parents, teachers and citizens for all the help and co-operation received in our work together to provide good schools.
