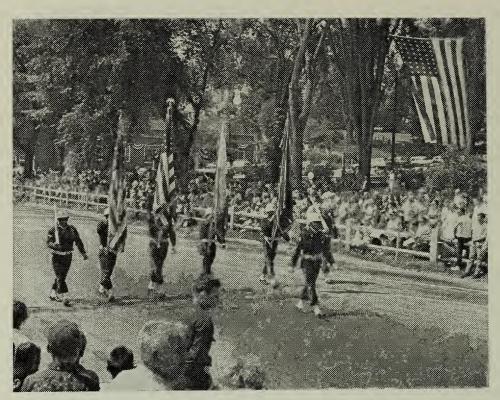

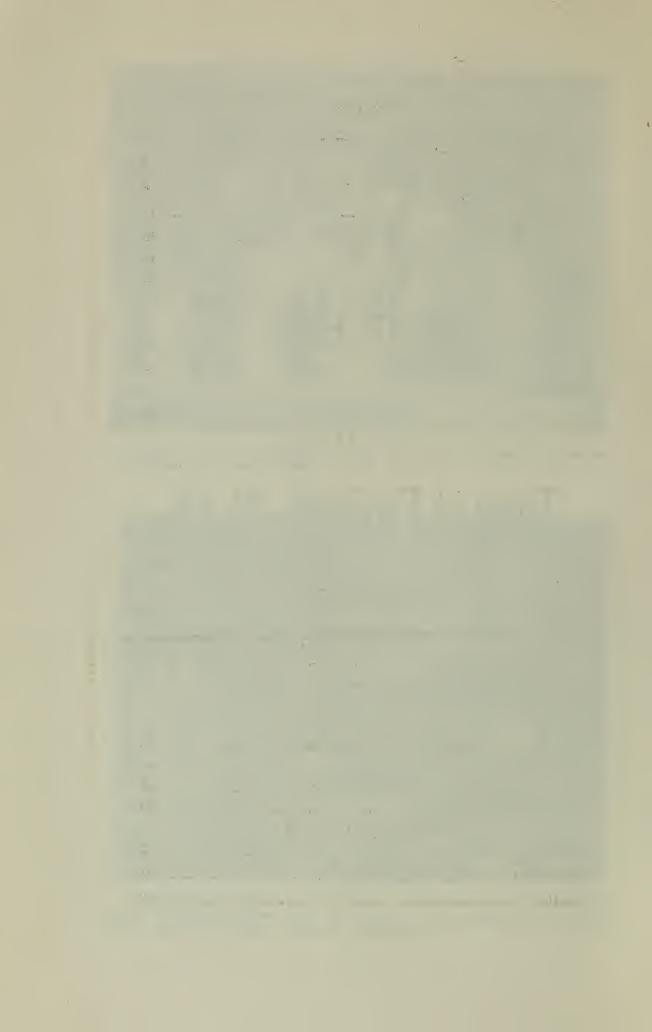

- 20. Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of 3 years. Luther J. Pollard
- 21. Moved and voted that the Selectmen be authorized to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and to pay the obligations of the Town.
- 22. Moved and voted to authorize the Selectmen to administer, lease, rent, sell and convey, or otherwise dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town by any Tax Collector's deed.
- 23. Moved and voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to be used by the Bi-Centennial Commission in anticipation of the 200th Anniversary Commemoration in July.
- 24. Moved and voted to raise the sum of \$100.00 for control of Pine Blister Rust.
- 25. Moved and voted to accept a deed from James F. Mayhew for a tract of land to be used as a public highway.
- 26. Vote **not** to amend Art. IIIA of the Zoning ordinance by striking out the sentence "No lot shall have less frontage on any street or way of less than 100 feet", and inserting in its place "No lot shall have a total area of less than 10,000 square feet."
- 27. Voted not to amend Art. IIIA by adding at its end the following sentence: "Any use that may be obnoxious or injurious by reason of the production or emission of odor, dust, smoke refuse matter, fumes, noises, vibration or similar conditions or that are dangerous to comfort, peace, enjoyment, health, or safety of the persons occupying this zone, or lending to its disturbance and annoyance, are prohibited".
- 28. Voted to amend Article IIIC by striking out the last sentence and inserting the following: Residential dwellings and accessory buildings in the civic zone shall be subject to the same

requirements as to distance from the traveled way and from property lines as in the single residence district."

- 29. Voted to amend Art. IIIA by adding at the end of the first paragraph: "No accessory building shall be built wholly or partially in the front yeard of any dweling. No addition to present building, nor any new accessory building, shall be erected closer than 15 feet from any property line."
- 30. Voted to amend the zoning ordinance by adding after Article XII, the following new Article XIII:

Uncompleted Structures or Fire Ruins

"No structure in the process of completion or demolition and no ruins from fire or other casualty shall be abandoned in a disorderly or hazardous state. Such structure shall be considered to have been abandoned when work to remedy the improper condition shall not have been initiated within six months after the occasion of the casualty, or if initiated work shall have been discontinued with owner's consent ninety or more consecutive days. Each day's abandonment shall be considered as a separate violation of the ordinance. The above periods of time may be extended by the Board of Adjustment, upon application of the owner, for good cause shown."

- 32. Authority for Selectmen to appoint a Highway Agent. Motion was lost.
- 33. Voted to adopt the Non-Partisan System for election of town officers according to N. H. Revised Statutes annotated Chapter 59, Section 73.

- 34. Voted that a committee consisting of the Selectmen and Budget Committee conduct an investigation relative to a new building or buildings for the storage and maintenance of town vehicles and equipment and a site for the location of same; that said Committee report its findings at a future meeting.

 Budget Committee conduct an investigation relative to a new building or buildings for the storage and maintenance of town vehicles and equipment and a site for the location of same; that said Committee report its findings at a future meeting.
- 35. Voted to take no action on traffic lights near intersection of north Main and High Streets until after the completion of Route 93 as recommended by an officer of the State Safety Department.
- 36. Voted to grant the New England Tel. & Tel. Co. a right-of-way to maintain its underground lines across the property of the Town known as Plymouth Airport.
- 37. Voted to raise and appropriate \$500.00 to defray the cost of erecting new street signs to be furnished to the town by the Plymouth Lions Club.
- 38. Voted \$1,500.00 for a new cell block in the County Court House and increase in police operating expense.
- 39. Voted \$3,854.00 for improvement of public way between Anderson's Bakery and Gadd Block and installation of area lights in back of business blocks.
- 40. Voted authorization to request the State Tax Commission to assist in property tax appraisal and valuation and appropriated \$5,000.00 for same.

41. Other Business:

Voted to authorize the Selectmen to sell or dispose of the Town Clerk's safe at Geyer's Drug Store, the buildings at the Town Dump and any highway equipment that has no trade-in value and enter the money in the Town's general fund.

Voted to authorize the Selectmen to continue study of Baker River Watershed Project; so called Site 12 and to report at the 1964 meeting.

Voted to discontinue the practice of printing the list of real estate description and valuation in the Town Report until after the new assessments have been completed.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Guy E. Speare Auditorium in said Plymouth on Tuesday, the tenth of March, 1964, polls to be open for voting on articles 1, 2, 3 and 4 at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon and to close not earlier than 6:00 o'clock in the afternoon, with action on the remaining articles to be taken commencing at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon.

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To choose two delegates to the State Constitutional Convention.
- 3. Shall the provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Statutes Annotated, relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in this City or Town.
- 4. Shall Sweepstakes tickets be sold in this City or Town.
- 5. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 6. To choose a Library Trustee for a term of three years.
- 7. To choose two Park Commissioners for terms of three years each.
- 8. To choose a Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years.
- 9. To choose two members of the Zoning Board of Adjustment, one to serve three years to complete the unexpired term of Leonard Sawyer and one to serve a term of five years.

- 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a police cruiser for the Police Department and appropriate the necessary funds for same.
- 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the costs of operating the Police Department during the ensuing year.
- 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Free Public Library.
- 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the maintenance and construction of highways.
- 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for sidewalks.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$543.52 for Town Maintenance in cooperation with the State.
- 16. To hear the report of the committee appointed to investigate the relocation of the town sheds and to take any action relative thereto.
- 17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of shade trees in the Town and for the control of pine blister rust.
- 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the Sceva Speare Memorial Hospital of Plymouth, New Hampshire.
- 19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Civil Defense.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to grant the New England Telephone and Telegraph Company a right-of-way to maintain its underground lines across the property of the Town known as Plymouth Airport an approximate distance of 2,498 feet, said right-of-way subject to the vote of the Town at its annual meeting.

- 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to be used by the Park and Recreation Commission to establish, equip and maintain suitable places for playgrounds, including coasting and skating and conducting a system of public recreation.
- 22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate to purchase new equipment for the Highway Department and to raise the same by authorizing the Selectmen to borrow sums not in excess of the sum so appropriated through the issuance of serial notes or bonds of the Town.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, and pay the obligations of the Town.
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize prepayment of taxes in sums not less than \$10.00 or any sum divisible by \$10.00
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector to charge a penalty of 25c each for all poll taxes not paid by December 1st of each year.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell, convey or otherwise dispose of the Civil Defense Tower on land situated near the town sheds.
- 27. To see if the Town will vote to tear down and remove the dwelling house and connected buildings located on the Fox Pond property so called and raise and appropriate such sum as may be necessary therefor. (Petitioned)
- 28. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Thirteen Hundred and Ninety-Five Dollars (\$1,395.00) for easements and rights of way for development of recreational facilities at Site 12 of the Baker River Project of the United States Soil Conservation Service.
- 29. To see if the Town will empower the Selectmen to appoint a committee of five persons consisting of one Selectman, one Precinct Commissioner and

three members from the community to study and report to the 1965 Annual Town Meeting relative to adopting building regulations and the appointment of a building inspector pursuant to the provisions of R. S. A. Chapter 156 as amended.

- 30. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to resurface those portions of Main Street and Highland Street that lie outside the limits of the State Highway.
- 31. To see what action the Town will take with respect to adopting a resolution concerning the Livermore Falls Project as proposed by the United States Army Corps of Engineers and to see what sum, if any, the Town will vote to raise and appropriate in connection with such resolution.
- 32. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for band concerts during the summer of 1964 by the Plymouth Community Band.
- 33. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Memorial Day.
- 34. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for cemeteries.
- 35. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town.
- 36. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Nine Hundred Ninety Eight Dollars and Eighty Two Cents (\$2,998.82) to pay the unpaid balance due the State Tax Commission for assisting in the appraisal and valuation of all of the taxable property in the Town.
- 37. To see if the Town will vote to accept a deed from Frances W. Putnam, Harold G. and Ruth Sherburn Jr., Guy W. and Maxine Andrews and Richard Smith of the following described tract of land to be used as a public highway: Beginning at a concrete monument set in the ground at the southwest corner

of property of Frances W. Putnam. Thence running along the westerly boundary line of the land of Frances W. Putnam N. 46° 47'43"E 243.78' to a concrete monument set in the ground on the southerly side of Highland Street. Thence running along the southerly side of Highland Street N.39°29'53"W. 33.00' to a concrete monument set in the ground at the northeasterly corner of land of Harold G. and Ruth Sherburn Jr. Thence running along the land of Harold G. and Ruth Sherburn Jr. and land of Guy W. and Maxine Andrews S.46°47'43"W.243.50' more or less to a stone post set in a stone wall at the southeasterly corner of land of Guy W. and Maxine Andrews. Thence running S.39°42'52"E. 33.00' to the point of beginning.

- 38. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer, lease, rent, sell and convey or otheriwse dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town by any Tax Collector's Deed.
- 39. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to lease, rent, sell or convey or otherwise dispose of a certain parcel of land situated on the Bell Road, so-called in West Plymouth. Conveyed to the Town by Frank Smith by deed dated June 1924 and recorded in Grafton Registry of Deeds, book 579, page 275.

PLYMOUTH PUBLIC LIBRARY

ANNUAL REPORT—1963

To the Trustees of the Plymouth Public Library:

1963 has been a year of unusual activity in the library. In May we took orders for, and distributed with the help of a committee of townspeople, about 700 birch, maple and ash trees which were donated by the State Forestry Commission and planted by 170 families in commemoration of Plymouth's bicentennial year. On May 13th Mrs. Eva Speare spent the afternoon with us autographing copies of her book, Twenty Decades in Plymouth, N. H., for people who wished her to do so. During the bicentennial celebration on July 13th and 14th we had on view an exhibit of old books, Newspapers, manuscripts and pictures pertaining to the history of Plymouth. The Young Ladies Library Association served refreshments. One hundred and ten people signed the guest book.

Other exhibits displayed during the year were books and pictures on Space, New Hampshire tourist attractions, Careers, France.

Volunteer helpers gave us 75 hours doing typing, filing, book repairing and processing books borrowed from the bookmobile. We are grateful, indeed, for this assistance.

The second grades visited us with their teachers and invited Miss Nims to visit them in return. She accepted their invitation. The fourth grade came with their teacher every Wednesday until June. Forty-four pupils in the eighth grade received instruction in the use of the library.

A Boy Scout did his community service to earn a merit badge by working eight hours for us, chiefly stamping our name as identification in books of the Youth Collection. Your Librarian acted as councilor for two Scouts earning their Reading Merit Badges.

The librarians attended a workshop at the State Library learning about the services which that library is prepared to give to us. I attended also a meeting to consider our responsibilities to students, and another about the co-operative book buying groups sponsored by the State Library. It was decided to join one of these groups so that we can order new books through the State Library at a greater discount than we can enjoy when buying individually.

The outstanding event of the year was the building of a 10' by 14' addition on the back of the library building containing a toilet, sink, coat closet, cupboards and shelves. The Young Ladies Library Association has donated this greatly needed improvement to the townspeople. It will somewhat relieve the crowded conditions in our little building when the painting is finished. It will make a splendid work room for cataloging, book repairing, and preparing refreshments for visiting groups. Cleaning materials and equipment, mailing materials, maps, posters can be stored there. Your librarians are happy to report that they expect to be able to serve the public more efficiently because of it.

The following is a list of activities conducted by the New Hampshire Division of Public Health-Public Health Nursing, for the town of Plymouth for 1963. Please have printed in your town report.

Chest Xray clinics have been held at the I. O. O. F. Hall in April and October, by the New Hampshire Tuberculosis and Health Association cooperating with New Hampshire Division of Public Health. These clinics serve the towns of Ashland, Campton, Holderness, Wentworth and Warren. A total of 189 chest Xrays were taken as follows—old cases 53—contacts of TB 31—Walk-ins 59—reactors 46. The nurse was assisted by members of Belknap-Merrimac Salon 8/40 and Durand-Haley Unit American Legion Auxiliary.

In May the nurse furnished vaccine and assisted at a Sabin Clinic at Dr. Kirk's office where about 145 individuals received Sabin Vaccine.

In October, due to the Polio Type 3 epidemic in Canada, pemission was obtained from Plymouth Medical Society to conduct another series of Sabin Clinics in Plymouth and surrounding towns. Clinics were conducted by the nurse as follows: School children—kindergarten through High School—at school. Adults and Preschools—Division of Public Health Office, Plymouth State College—vaccine available at College. Sprague Electric—vaccine furnished for their clinic.

The total number receiving vaccine was:

Type 1—50, Type 3-1007 (many were boosters) Type 2—683. The type 1 clinics will be held in early 1964 to complete the series. The Nurse was assisted at the school clinics by the School Nurse, Mrs. Thomas Morris, R. N., and members of the Home School Association, which also furnished supplies for giving school Sabin vaccine.

The nurse served on the Community Closet Committee during the year and helped with families as needed—also was on service committee of the Salvation Army, giving assistance as necessary. At Christmas time a list of children's names were submitted to the Plymouth Firemen's Operation Santa Claus project. She attended Health Meetings in the community as Cancer, Retarded Children's etc. Sabin vaccine has been supplied as requested.

Home visits have been made to mothers, infants and preschool children and arrangements made for medical care as necessary. Applications for care under New Hampshire Sight Conservation, Crippled Children's Services and Mental Health clinics as indicated.

My sincerest thanks to the Plymouth Medical Association, organizations assisting in program by workers or donating use of their halls, and to the Plymouth Record for excellent publicity. It was all greatly appreciated.

The information booth was open from Saturday, June 29, 1963 to and including Sunday, September 1, 1963 from 9:00 A. M. to 6:00 P. M. on weekdays and from 1:00 to 5:00 P. M. on Sundays.

A total of 5,559 cars containing 18,908 passengers were served by Miss Hazel Downing the attendant.

This was an increase of 4% in the number of cars and an increase of 12% in the number of people.

Cars were recorded from forty states, from six Canadian Provinces and seven foreign countries, viz. India, Panama, Morroco, Austria, Switzerland, Bermuda and England.

The building received a coat of piant just prior to the bi-centennial celebration.

The Chamber of Commerce wishes to thank the taxpayers of Plymouth for their support of the booth. It is exceedingly good advertising for the town to have a place where strangers can be welcomed and secure information not only about the town but the area and to obtain directions for traveling to distant points.

All of the money appropriated by the Town was spent for the salary of Miss Downing who continues to service the booth in a very efficient manner.

REPORT OF THE CIVIL DEFENSE DIRECTOR FOR 1963

During the past year funds raised by the town for civil defense were used to purchase a transmitterreceiver unit, presently installed in the Chief of Police's vehicle, connecting the local police and the state police. It is anticipated that this unit will be of great value in the everyday operation of the local department and can be of prime importance in the event of an emergency of a civil nature. It is estimated that the unit, on the basis of its use during the time it has been in use, will pay for itself as a result of the savings on telephone calls and time. In addition to the radio purchase, funds were used to purchase partial uniforms: for the auxiliary police unit. These men were very much in evidence during the Bicentennial Celebration handling traffic during all of the events of the weekend. During the year Classes have been held each Tuesday evening for auxiliary and regular police. These classes have been in pistol shooting and various phases of police work. It is hoped that during the coming year the auxiliary unit will be equipped to handle situations where they might be needed and that the unit will be enlarged to a strength of fifteen men.

The potential fallout shelters in the town which fitted the federal requirements were reexamined during the summer and have been accepted and marked as fallout shelters. At the present time requisitions have been made for shelter stocking and it is expected that the necessary equipment and stock for the shelters will be shipped to the shelters very soon. It might be pointed out that the stocking will involve no expense to the town. With the change in the telephone system in the town to dial additional equipment will become necessary for communications in the town. In the past the assistance of the local operators have made it unnecessary to have equipment for personal contact.

throughout the town. I, as director, will miss very much that communication link supplied by operators which, I feel, cannot be replaced by any mechanical device. In the budget for the coming year are communication items which must be purchased if the town is to maintain contact with local units during an emergency. It is planned that the equipment be made available for regular use so that the investment will be on a basis of immediate service rather than that of a potential emergency use.

REPORT OF PLYMOUTH PARK AND RECREATION COMMISSION

Plymouth, New Hampshire For the Year Ending December 31, 1963

Spring 1963 witnessed the completion of the bath house at the swimming area. This building increased the building assets of the town of Plymouth over \$10,000 and you are encouraged to visit the area to see what has been accomplished. Much is left to be done to provide safe recreation facilities for the youth of Plymouth and consideration should be given to a recreational building with a full time director.

The money raised by taxes was turned over by the Commissioners to the Park and Recreation Association. Their financial statement is submitted to let you know where money raised by taxes and contributions has been expended.

The Commissioners and the Association members worked together very closely during the year and without the Association's assistance the youth programs in the area would be seriously affected. Adults of the area are asked to offer their help to the Park and Recreation Association to assure continuance of the youth programs which are necessary. The skiing program was not held this past winter as no instructor was available nor was any voluntary help offered. The success of a youth program is generally proportionate to the voluntary help offered by the adults of a community.

Long range planning should be made as to the overall program and by what means it will be accomplished. Repairs are required on the dam at the swimming pool. This could run into a considerable amount of money and it may be more feasible to put in a large cement pool for our youth. Consolidation of recreational areas should be made to better utilize the instructors hired each summer, thus strengthening the summer program.

We hope that we have started constructive thinking and in so doing helped to create interest in the youth who are the responsibility of each adult of a community. A special vote of thanks is extended to the Commissioners whose terms will expire, Mrs. Rosamund Orr and Mr. Edward Desmond.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND YOUR DISTRICT CHIEF

During the past year New Hampshire faced the greatest forest fire threat to its woodlands in more than sixty years. The continued drought brought home to our citizens, as never before, the potential threat of destructive fires to their beautiful and valuable forests, homes and livelihood. In true American tradition of meeting a common threat by volunteer effort, this fire danger was minimized by active prevention, patrol and a relinquishing of personal rights for the common good. It was the greatest demonstration of public cooperation ever experienced by those responsible for local and state fire control. The ready forces of volunteer fire services kept the losses low. For their effort and public response the general fire service expresses its heartfelt thanks for a job well done.

Prevention, however, is not just an activity for the bad fire years. It must be practiced until it becomes a part of our public conscience — a habit. Just plain carelessless with fire causes too many of our fires.

The following practices and suggestions will help:

- 1. Always have a permit for outdoor burning and burn within the terms of the permit and in a safe place. Burn late in the afternoon when the wind is down or on a rainy or damp days. Check your fire and if winds develop extinguish it promptly.
- 2. Carry your rubbish to the public dump it's safer. A neglected backyard incinerator causes many fires.
- 3. Never discard lighted cigarette or match. Make this a year round habit regardless of the safety of your surroundings.

4. Children caused fires are now a major concern. Keep matches away from them and teach them to respect fire and not make it a subject of play.

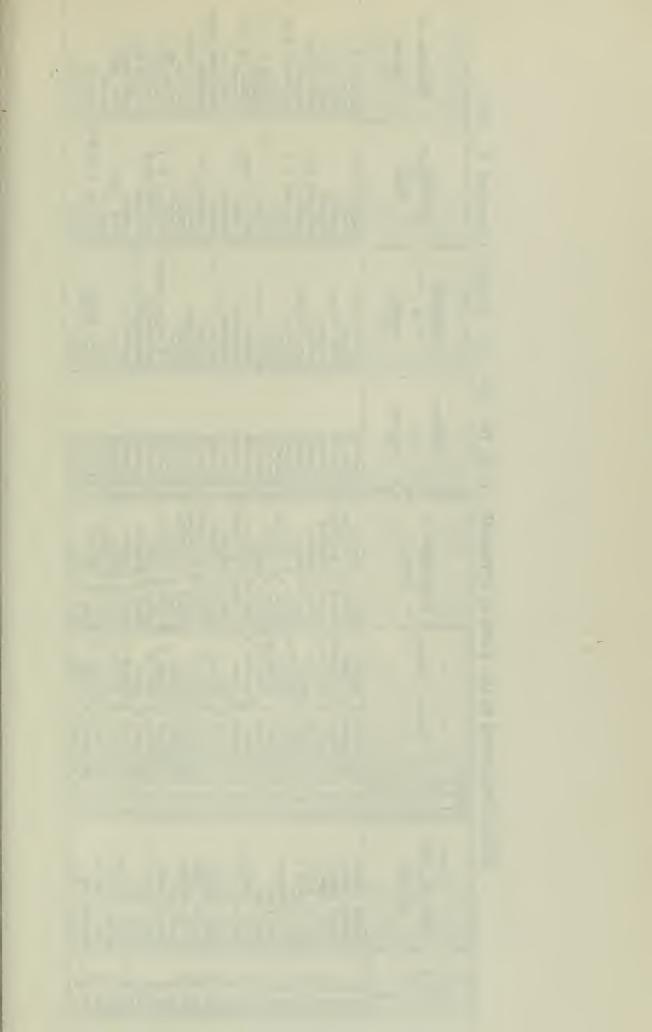

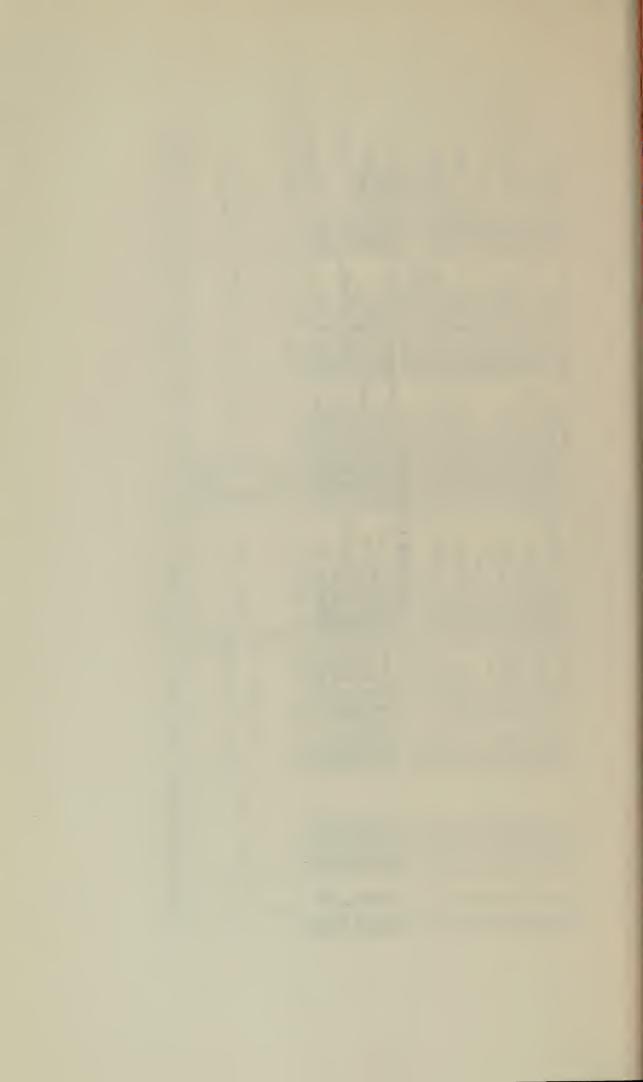

SUPERINTENDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT

Hereby submitted is my annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

This year I am going to deviate from former practices and report to you largely on the two major areas of school costs. These areas are Annual Costs and Capital Outlay.

The cooperative school warrant movement has not and can not be forgotten because, as I have mentioned previously, we are rapidly reaching the point where some type of school construction must be considered. The last Legislature passed laws which profoundly affect school consolidation and should make it easier to accomplish. In accordance with the law, an article in the warrant this year will ask for a committee of three persons —one of whom must be a school board member—to make a study. I would hope that such a committee would be appointed this year. To the best of my knowledge, most of the surrounding towns including Ashland, Campton, Rumney, Holderness and possibly others, are going to have the same article in their warrants. The other legislation that was passed makes it mandatory that so-called "Articles of Agreement" be drawn up with the consent of all parties making the study. Thus voters will be informed before any balloting is done, exactly under what conditions they are to become a part of the venture and to the best ability of the committee, what total costs will be. The law also established some incentive aid to accompany the legislation but then did not appropriate any money to implement it. Another new development which has nothing to do with the law but which should prove helpful is that a state-wide charity organization is willing to furnish necessary funds including a consultant to help with the study. If committees are appointed, in my opinion a rough timetable would be: Preliminary study and decisions this Spring; a concentrated study ending with recommendations beginning next Fall; and a possible vote early in 1965.

In the event the vote was successful, occupancy of a new plant would be in the Fall of 1966. Many people I have talked with think as I do that once Route 93 reaches Plymouth, it will not be very long before there is considerable impact on the population of this area.

It is no secret that the State Board of Education was interested in purchasing some of our school property including land and buildings to become at some future date part of Plymouth State College Campus. The University of New Hampshire Trustees, who under the new law replace the State Board as a governing body, have indicated a like interest. To that end, the school board has authorized the appraisal of all four buildings that make up the public school complex in town. The board will be able to report to you more intelligently at your annual meeting because by then they will have met with the Trustees to discuss this matter.

In preparation of the budget, I have done some research on costs of high school education in New Hampshire. I am firmly convinced that we offer quality education at one of the lowest per-pupil costs in the state. There are eighty-odd high schools in New Hampshire whose costs were reported last year. The per-pupil cost in Plymouth of \$413.92 was 18th from the bottom. High School cost figures for 4-year secondary schools went from a high of \$933.54 to a low of \$326.46. Most schools with costs lower than ours were from the larger cities where by sheer numbers alone, costs tend to go down. It is interesting to note that the nearest high school to us that has a lower per-pupil cost than ours is Inter-Lakes Cooperative with a \$406.39 cost per pupil.

Space in our system is rapidly becoming a problem as has been indicated in other reports. This year a supply storage room in the Vocational Building was made into a Kindergarten. The outlay of money was not great and it makes a place for them to meet but the location is not good. If we had had the expected enrollment in first grade this year, we would have had a real problem in finding an extra room. Ten years ago our auditorium-gymnasium was one of the best in the area and in this short space of time, it is now one of the poorest. These facts substantiate the statements made that somewhere, somehow we must expand.

Our library has grown and many new volumes have been added from extra funds we have received from the state to buy books. Each year a small amount is reserved and turned over to the State Department of Education from funds derived when timber on national forest land is cut. This money goes back to high schools within the White Mountain National Forest district to help libraries. We have acquired in funds over the past two years more than fifteen hundred dollars for the purchase of new books.

Changes in the Junior High School staff this year included Mr. Lavacchia who replaced Mr. Fish as Social Studies teacher and Mrs. Hartman who replaced Mrs. Selby in the English Department. Mrs. Hartman and Mr. Lavacchia who also coach are both doing a good job teaching and coaching. Mr. Hamel, an extra teacher, was added to the Mathematics Department in the High School. He also is proving to be a fine teacher.

I appreciate the cooperation and help I have received from the School Board, the Principals and teachers the past year. As always, please feel free to contact me if I can help you in any way with problems of education.

Section 5, Chapter 243, Laws of 1953 of the State of New Hampshire, requires that school district annual reports show the total amount paid to the superintendent of schools as per the following quotations: "Reports. Each superintendent of a supervisory union shall annually prepare a report showing the total salary paid to the superintendent, which report shall show in detail the amount derived from the per capita tax and the amount paid directly by each school district in the union."

One-half of the supervisory union expenses is prorated among the several school districts of the union on the basis of adjusted valuation. One-half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the school for the previous school year ending June 30th. The Superintendent of Supervisory Union No. 48 during 1962-63 received a salary of \$9,250.00 which was made up as follows: \$4,250.00 paid from the per capita tax and \$5,000.00 prorated among the several school districts. Allowances of \$1,200.00 for travel within the union was also prorated as stated above.

To: The School Board, Superintendent of Schools, Parents and Citizens of Plymouth:

The elementary school now has a staff of fifteen full time teachers, and a full time principal. The following persons are members of the staff on a part time basis: French teacher, music supervisor, art supervisor, librarian and secretary.

Our French language program, which begins in the fourth grade, has been recognized as one of the most successful in New Hampshire and New England.

California Achievement Tests are given to all pupils from grades one through six. The results place the children of Plymouth approximately fifteen months above the national average.

This year, the fifth and sixth grades are having the opportunity to use the college art laboratory and the many facilities available.

The elementary school chorus now numbers fifty. Thirty-five children are involved with the learning and playing of musical instruments.

The fifth and sixth grades have been departmentalized in the areas of reading, arithmetic, science and social studies. This is being done to further meet the needs of the individual child.

Dental examinations for 51 pre-school children were done by Dr. E. B. Crowell on registration day in May. Mrs. Geraldine Titus, Red Cross Gray Lady, assisted on this day.

The American Legion Child Welfare Fund provided two prescriptions for a child.

The Crippled Children's Services obtained surgical treatment for one child at the Hitchcock Clinic.

With vaccine supplied by the N. H. Department of Health, the Home-Schools Association sponsored two Sabin polio vaccine clinics under the supervision of Lois Reed, R. N., Public Health Nurse. A total of 968 individuals received Types III and II vaccine at these clinics. Mrs. Elsie Letendre and Mrs. Phyllis Robertson, members of the sponsoring organization, assisted at the clinic.

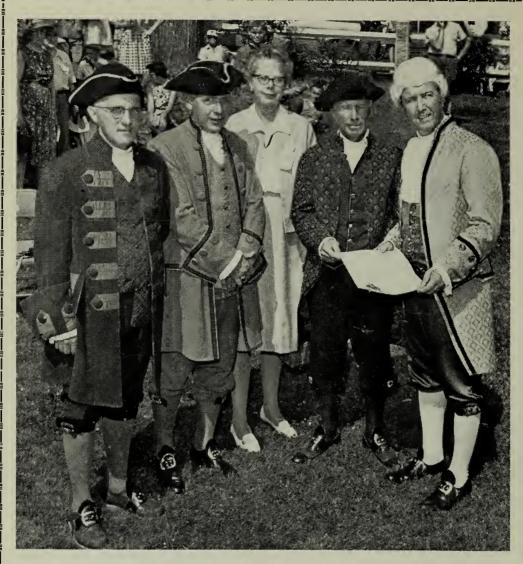
