## TOWN WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Salem, in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town house, in said town, on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at twelve (12:00) of the clock noon, to act upon the following subjects:

Art. 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 2. Shall the provisions of chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing of games of beano be adopted in this town?

Art 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for the same.

Art. 4. To see if the town will vote to raise any more money for the repairs of highways than the law requires.

Art. 5. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, comittees or officers heretofore chosen, and pass on any vote relating thereto.

Art. 6. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum

or sums not exceeding in the aggregate \$100,000 in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year, and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town negotiable notes therefore, said notes to be repaid during the current municipal year from taxes collected within the current municipal year.

Art. 7. To see what action the town will take relative to lighting the streets, and raise money for the same.

Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money not to exceed seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$7,500), for the purpose of providing police officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money not to exceed seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$7,500), for the maintenance of the fire department for the ensuing year.

Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), or any part thereof, for snow removal and general highway expenses for the year 1951.

Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of eight hundred nineteen dollars and seventy-six cents (\$819.76), and apply for State Aid for Class V Highways.

Art. 12. To see if the town will raise the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), or any part thereof, to provide a sinking fund for permanent improvements as provided in Chapter 160 of the Public



Acts of the 1943 Legislature. Said fund shall be invested by the Trustees of the Trust Fund until expended as provided in said Act. Said money shall be expended by the selectmen for any or all of the purposes named in the 1944 warrant.

Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200), or any part thereof, to maintain and improve the town Common and the Public Square near Pine Grove Cemetery.

Art. 14. To see what action the town will take relative to allowing a discount on taxes.

Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to purchase voting booths for the town hall and raise money for the same.

Art. 16. To see if the town will vote that the town appropriate no money for further water extensions but that all extensions be made from income of the water department. This article was authorized by a resolution passed at the 1950 town meeting.

Art. 17. By request of Library Trustees. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one thousand eight hundred dollars (\$1,800), or any part thereof, above the amount required by law, for the support of the Salem Free Public Library for the year 1951.

Art. 18. By request of Library Trustees. To see if the town will vote a sum of money not to exceed two hundred dollars (\$200) for the purpose of furnishing storm windows and for miscellaneous interior decorating and painting.

Art. 19. By request of Cemetery Trustees. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money not to exceed one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500), to be expended in the care of walks, drives and vacant lots in Pine Grove Cemetery.

Art. 20. By request of Ernest W. Young Post, American Legion, and Salem Memorial Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of four hundred and fifty dollars (\$450), or any part thereof, for use of the above Veteran's organizations, to be expended in the observance of Memorial Day in the year 1951.

Art. 21. By request of Joseph Martin and others. To see if the town will vote to gravel and tad the road leading from Liberty Street to the residence of Leo Dufault and raise money for the same.

Art. 22. By request of Henry Lacourse Jr. To see if the town will vote to gravel and tar from the Atkinson line at Providence Hill to the tar road near the residence of Ernest Dietel and raise money for the same.

Art. 23. By request of Wilfred Pare and others. To see if the town will vote to continue the gravel and tar road on Brookdale Road from the residence of Percy Powell to the No. 7 schoolhouse corner, so-called, or any part of this distance and raise money for the same.

Art. 24. By request of Martin McDonough. To see if the town will vote to accept Middle Street for a distance of two hundred feet from Central Street and repair with gravel and tar and raise money for the same.

Art. 25. By request of David Webb. To see if the town will vote to accept Merrill Avenue from where the tar road now ends to School Street and repair with gravel and tar and raise money for the same.

Art. 26. By request of Mr. and Mrs. William S. Kehoe and others. To see if the town will vote to gravel and tar Charles Street, extending approximately three hundred yards from Policy Street, and raise money for the same.

Art. 27. By request of Ernest B. Nyman To see if the town will vote to gravel and tar the road leading from the former N. 7 schoolhouse to Route 38, or any part of this distance, and raise money for the same.

Art. 28. By request of Arthur L. Cullen and others. To see if the town will vote to repair and widen the roadbet from Mosquito Corner to the corner near the old Cullen Farm and raise one thousand dollars (\$1,000), or any part thereof, for the same.

Art. 29. By request of Mr. and Mrs. William S. Kehoe and others. To see if the town will vote to accept Summit Street leading from Charles Street for a distance of approximately three hundred yards.

Art. 30. By request of Minott Brown and others. To see if the town will vote to accept Woodland Terrace leading from Policy Road to the old car line, a distance of approximately two hundred and fifty feet.

Art. 31. By request of Douglas Seed and others. To see if the town will vote to accept Ann Avenue from the corner of Seed Street northerly for a distance of two hundred feet.

Art. 32. By request of Henry Pendergast and others. To see if the town will vote to extend the water main from Cluff's Crossing to the residence of Henry J. Pendergast and raise money for the same.

Art. 33. By request of Francis Doggart and others. To see if the town will vote to extend the water main from the residence of Howard Butler on Lawrence Road to Foster's Corner, so-called, or any part of this distance and raise money for the same.

Art. 34. By request of John Belko and others. To see if the town will vote to install a six inch water main on Lawrence Road from Senter Street to the residence of M. Hagopian and thence from Senter Street to the residence of Peter Tusen and raise money for the same.

Art. 35. By request of A. Donigian and others. To see if the town will vote to extend the water main on Pelham Road from where it now ends to the Donigian residence, about one-half mile, and raise money for the same.

Art. 36. By request of Salvio Consentino. To see if the town will vote to install one fire hydrant in front of Rockingham Woodcraft on South Broadway and raise money for the same.

Art. 37. By request of Hiram P. Ayer, the Millville Associates and others. To see if the town will

vote to install street lights from Butler's four corners on Millville Street to and around Millville Lake and raise money for the same.

Art. 38. By request of Melvin F. Marsh. To see if the town will vote to install one street light on Marsh Avenue and one on Bodwell Avenue and raise money for the same.

Art. 39. By request of Carl Manor and others. To see if the town will vote to install four street lights on Pelham Road and raise money for the same.

Art. 40. By request of Howard C. Smith. To see if the town will vote to install one street light on Main Street opposite his residence and raise money for the same.

Art. 41. By request of Earl E. Gordon. To see if the town will vote to install one street light on Central Street and raise money for the same.

Art. 42. By request of George Longworth. To see if the town will vote to install one street light on Merrill Avenue near his residence and raise money for the same.

Art. 43. By request of Salvio Consentino. To see if the town will vote to install one street light in front of Rockingham Woodcraft on South Broadway and raise money for the same.

Art. 44. By request of David Hird. To see if the town will vote to accept one hundred dollars from David Hird as a perpetual fund, the interest

to be expended in the care of the David Hird lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.

Art. 45. By request of Frank Barker. To see if the town will vote to accept one hundred dollars from Frank Barker as a perpetual fund, the interest to be expended in the care of the Frank Barker lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.

Art. 46. By request of Mrs. Gertrude Roode. To see if the town will vote to accept one hundred dollars from Gertrude Roode as a perpetual fund, the interest to be expended in the care of the Gertrude Roode lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.

Art. 47. By request of Alice Merrill. To see if the town will vote to accept one hundred dollars from Alice Merrill as a perpetual fund, the interest to be expended in the care of the Alice Merrill lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.

### Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—

#### Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1949, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D) a net revenue surplus of \$7,606.81, less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$2,881.06, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$4,725.75.

#### Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1949, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance, as of August 31, 1950, is indicated in Exhibit M.

### AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries

in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks.

### GENERAL COMMENTS

#### Current Surplus—December 31, 1949:

A current surplus position was maintained by the Town during 1949. The balance sheet of December 31, 1949, (Exhibit A), discloses a current surplus of \$4,888.80, as compared to a current surplus of \$7,862.86 as of December 31, 1948. This is indicated as follows:

#### Uncollected Taxes—Previous Years:

Last year we commented on the fact that as of December 31, 1948, there were uncollected taxes on the tax warrants for the levies of 1938 to 1945, inclusive, amounting to \$2,932.50, which were still being carried as assets in the balance sheet. These consisted for the most part of poll taxes which apparently are uncollectible.

It is noted that during 1949 the only activity in these prior years' accounts consisted of collections amounting to \$10.00, leaving uncollected balances, as of December 31, 1949, totaling \$2,922.50. Inasmuch as the larger part of these taxes are probably uncollectible at the present time, it is again recommended that the lists be carefully gone over by the Board of Selectmen and Tax Collector and abatements made in all cases except where there appears to be a definite likelihood that the tax may still be collected. It is generally considered that poll taxes more than five years old have little chance of being collected and such taxes are usually abated.

To include a substantial amount of these uncollectible taxes as "assets" in the town balance sheet each year tends to give an inaccurate picture of the true financial condition of the Town.

Water Department:

A controlling record for accounts receivable of the Water Department was installed. This will contain a record of all charges and receipts thus setting up a control of accounts receivable throughout the year.

Conclusion:

The accounts and records of all town officials were found in good condition and the accounting procedure conformed to the uniform methods prescribed by this Division.

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual town report. This letter of transmittal should be included in its entirety but the inclusion of Exhibits is optional.

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the

district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate \$3,400.00 to be used toward necessary repairs and renovations in the heating system of the Woodbury High School.

10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate \$3,500.00 for grading and landscaping the grounds around the new Central School.

11. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate \$3,500.00 to build walls and cover the exit from the basement of the Memorial Auditorium-Gymnasium to the athletic field, and for grading surrounding areas.

12. To see if the district will elect to approve of the inclusion of its officers and employees (other than those eligible under the Teachers Retirement System) in the Employees' Retirement System of the State of New Hampshire, which system is provided for by Chapter 27-A of the Revised Laws, as inserted by Chapter 183 of the Laws of 1945, and as provided by Chapter 201 of Laws of 1945 and any subsequent amendments thereto.

13. If the district votes in the affirmative on the preceeding article, to see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$634.89 for the purpose of providing funds for the districts con-



tribution to said retirement system for the coming year.

14. At the request of the Salem Teachers' Association, to see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate \$200.00 for each of the Salem Teachers, for increased cost of living for the current school year (1950-51).

15. At the request of the three permanent (full-time) janitors, to see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate \$200.00 each, or any part thereof, for increased salary for the current school year (1950-51), at a total of \$6,450.00.

16. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate \$50.00 for a State Audit of the School District books.

17. To see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the district, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the Federal Works Agency, or other United States Government or State Agencies, or local or private agencies.

18. To transact any further business that may legally come before the meeting.

**1. Salaries of District Officers** Include salaries of the school board and other district officers, except truant officers. \$1329.00

**2. Superintendent's Salary (Local share)** Include the part of the superintendent's salary apportioned to the district and paid to the treasurer of the supervisory union. \$2221.80

**3. Tax for State Wide Supervision** Include the percapita tax for state wide supervision. \$1788.00

**4. Salaries of Other Administrative Personnel.** Include salaries or wages paid to clerks, stenographers, office assistants, telephone operators, etc., who assist the administrative officers. Include salary of both the truant officer and persons making the annual enumeration. \$1812.20

**5. Supplies and Other Expenses** Record expenditures for travel, telephone, and for supplies of materials used for administration as well as freight and cartage thereon. The usual supplies are ink, pencils, carbon paper, printed forms, vouchers, ledgers, and other materials which when once used are actually consumed, or do not usually last more than five years. \$1018.70

**6. Salaries of Teachers and Principals** Report the salaries of supervisors, headmasters, principals, teachers, librarians, visiting teachers, and all other workers who devote at least one half of their time

to instructional activities. Include supervisors of such subjects as art, manual arts, music, drawing, etc. \$91652.70

**7. Books and Other Instructional Aids** Record the cost of books furnished to pupils. Include the costs of purchasing films, film strips, pictures, charts, maps, phonograph records, sheet music, globes, small musical instruments, and other instructional aids that last more than two years. If a particular workbook is used as a textbook over a period of several years it should be considered a textbook for accounting purposes. \$2650.00

**8. Scholars' Supplies** Supplies are those items which when once used are actually or constructively consumed, including writing paper, drawing paper, blank books, workbooks, chalk, pencils, pens, fasteners, carbon paper, rubber stamps, typewriting supplies, newspapers and magazines, test tubes, litmus paper, polishing and abrading supplies, drugs, cleansers, food and laboratory supplies \$3300.00

**9. Salaries of Clerical Assistants** Record salaries of clerical assistants assigned to supervisors, principals, headmasters, and other instructional staffs. \$1000.00

**10. Other Instructional Expenses** Include expenditures for diplomas, commencement exercises, assembly speakers, repair and replacement of maps, reference books, flags, flag ropes, flag staffs, rentals of instructional materials, testing services, travel and telephone service. Freight and cartage on these materials should be included. 1330.70

**11. Salaries of Janitors** Include the salaries of janitors, engineers, and helpers involved in keeping the physical plant open and ready for use. This includes the **regular** work of cleaning, heating, cost of moving furniture performed by the janitors or their helpers. \$10000.00

**12. Fuel** Include fuel for heating as well as freight, cartage and other expenses of delivery. \$5500.00

**13. Water, Light, and Other Expenses** Include water, and light, power for the operation of ventilation equipment, but not for power for manual training departments. ## REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

To the Citizens of Salem:

Your school board herewith submits its annual report in regard to the condition and maintenance of our public schools. The financial statement will be found on other pages of this town report.

Last July the school board was stunned by the resignation of Superintendent L. Monroe Grandy. Although his contract had only recently been renewed the board could not stand in the way of his professional advancement and regretfully accepted his resignation.

The great drive and force of Mr. Grandy's personality played a very great part in the effort to secure our new school building and his experience and leadership proved a great help to the school committee and the building committee.

However we were fortunate in securing the services of Mr. Johnathan A. Osgood, formerly superintendent of schools in Somersworth, N. H., a man well schooled in the field of education. Mr. Osgood took over the reins at a very difficult time: only a month before schools were to open; a new 10 room building not completely finished; and a complicated transportation problem in a territory with which he was completely unfamiliar. These were only a few of the problems Mr. Osgood found himself confronted with. The board is pleased to report that he soon overcame the handicaps of a difficult situation and is doing a fine job.

Through the efforts of Mr. Earle Magoon, Mr. Ralph Call and Mrs. Jessie Soule, the Salvation

Army agreed to equip a dental office in the new Central School building. The room is completely equipped with a chair, an electric dental drill, lavatories and cabinets. If a plan can be worked out whereby a dentist could be induced to make periodic visits for dental examinations, the room will become a very valuable adjunct to the school system. We extend our grateful thanks to the Salvation Army and our three local representatives, Mr. Magoon, Mr. Call and Mrs. Soule.

Because of the great financial demands created by the new building program, the board allocated only a small amount of money for repairs to our school buildings this year. As a consequence some needed improvements had to be postponed. However we painted No. 1 school, two coats, and installed flush toilets and a new heating system in the annex. Some hottop was laid at No. 4 and No. 9 schools. Many desks were repaired and sanded and all adequate repairs were made.

Some of the most pressing improvements to be considered by the school board are as follows: Grading and hard surfacing the area around the new school; improving and bridging the runway from the shower room to the athletic field; hard-surfacing the play areas and approaches to the No. 1, No. 6, No. 4 and No. 9 schools; and finally, the renovation of the heating system in the high school.

The central heating plant in the new building has proved more than adequate to heat both buildings but the steam pipes and radiators in Woodbury high school are 25 years old and some of them may have to be replaced. The contract for heating did not cover any replacements in the high

school and as a consequence the proper controls were not installed. This has resulted in the unnecessary consumption of fuel and uncomfortable temperatures in some rooms in the high school.

The report of Superintendent Osgood and those of other department heads will cover more accurately than the board can, the actual administration and operation of the school system.

In closing we wish to extend our thanks to all who have shown such great interest in raising money to equip the cafeteria so that the school children could enjoy the benefits of the hot lunch program. To the teachers and other personnel for their loyal co-operation in all phases of school work. To the Parent-Teachers associations that are working for better conditions in the various schools, and to all who contributed in any way to the betterment of the school system.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Salem:

It is with pleasure that I submit my first Annual Report as Superintendent of your Schools.

In replacing Mr. L. Munro Grandy, who accepted the position of Superintendent of Schools in Dover, New Hampshire as of August 1950, after serving in that capacity in this area for a period of three years, it is heartening to note the tremendous educational strides which have been made in Salem and in Supervisory Union No. 55 during the past few years. Superintendent Grandy, the School Board and the citizens of Salem deserve much credit for the advances which were made to bring your schools nearer to the desired level of effectiveness.

### NEW CENTRAL ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

The most important improvement in physical facilities in Salem which has occurred since the construction of the Woodbury High School was the recently completed new Central Elementary School. During the evolution of the new building, the Building Committee composed of the School Board and the following appointees, Charles Seifert, Earl Magoon, Clarence Nutting, and James Sayer, employed the architectural services of Ashton, Huntress and Pratt, and prepared the necessary preliminary sketches and final detailed plans for the new building. The Maxam Company of Portsmouth was employed as general contractors, and actual excavation was started in the fall of 1949.

The modernistic building has resulted, together with the auditorium-gymnasium, dressing rooms, and showers at a cost to the taxpayers of \$225,000.00 in the form of a bond issue. In this building there is exemplified some of the most modern bilateral lighting, including the corridor sky-light, as well as newer methods of forced ventilation. The tie-in between the high school and the new building as far as heating is concerned should prove to be most efficient, as well as economical. The building was completed sufficiently for occupancy on September 6th, 1950. The following dedication program was presented on November 10, 1950.

As a result of a special Town Meeting which was held on January 31, 1950, the Veterans organizations have decided to provide and install collapsible bleachers in the new Auditorium, which has been named the Veterans Memorial Auditorium-Gymnasium.

This new building will certainly prove to be a monument in the minds and lives of many of the children who are presently enrolled as well as all those who will attend school in this most modern building, in the future.

## I. ENROLLMENT AND SCHOOL CENSUS

When schools opened in September 1950, the total registration exceeded the anticipated increase by 39 pupils, making a total of 939 pupils in Grades 1-12. At the High School there were 224 pupils in Grades 9-12, as compared to 200 in September 1949:

By occupying eight rooms of the new Central School in September, it was possible to close the No. 7 School and to discontinue the makeshift arrangements of using the Hose House, the Town Hall, and a room at the Methodist Church. All 7th and 8th grade pupils (a total of 156) were transferred from the Woodbury High School, the No. 8 and No. 9 Schools to four rooms in the new School. Transfers of younger children in September necessitated the use of four other rooms in the new School for grades 4 to 6. As a result of a Special School District Meeting, which was held in November, 1950, funds were provided for the employment of an additional 3rd grade teacher, which allowed for transferring 25 children from the overloaded 3rd grades in the No. 6 and No. 1 Schools, to the new School. The present (Jan. 20, 1951) enrollment in each of the Schools by grades is as follows:

## II. SCHOOL PERSONNEL:

The shortage of qualified teachers has not only continued, but has increased during the past months. To retain and secure well-qualified teachers, it will be necessary to continue to increase salaries and to improve working conditions. The new School has provided for more classrooms, and therefore for decreasing the number of children per room in the elementary grades. Where there were as many as 48 children per teacher in some instances last year, the largest number in any one room in the elementary is now 38. Authorities agree that 25 or 30 children is all that one teacher can work with to the greatest advantage. The high school teachers have assignments which make it necessary for them to teach 6 classes in succession in addition to 2 other assigned periods such as "activity" and study; 5 periods per day is the usual assignment for high school teachers in many schools.

Salem has been very fortunate to have filled the vacancies which occurred at the end of and since the past school year, with well-qualified teachers. The report of Principal Wendell V. Davis includes the changes which have occurred in the faculty of the Woodbury High School (Grades 7-12).

In the elementary grades, Mrs. Virginia Young replaced Marion Gordon in the 2nd grade at the No. 6 School. Mrs. Young received a Bachelor of Education degree at Keene Teachers College in 1949, and has had one year of successful experience in Nashua, N. H. Mrs. Gordon was transferred to the Grade 3 position to replace Caroline Canty, who in turn was transferred to the No. 1

School, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Miss Jean Collison. Mrs. Velma Smith of Salem was elected to replace Miss Mary Torosian in the Primary Grades at the No. 8 School. Mrs. Smith was graduated from Keene Teachers College and had taught in the public schools in Warner, N. H. To fill the position which was created in November by the addition of a 3rd grade in the new school, the School Board elected Mrs. Venita Johnson who received a Bachelor of Science degree at Gorham Maine State Teachers College in 1950.

The accomplish the necessary custodial work in the High School and in the new school, and to make minor repairs at various elementary schools, John Randall and Guy Beal, both of Salem, were employed to assist Arthur Morrill, who had served faithfully at the High School for a period of 12 years. It is anticipated that the custodial service at these two schools can be further extended during the summer months and thereby eliminate the necessity of much miscellaneous outside help. Mr. Randall has served as a driver of the additional school bus, which was necessary with the increased enrollment of this school year. Mr. Randall has recently resigned his position to accept defense employment in Laconia, and has been replaced by Richard Loeschner, who had served as custodian at the No. 9 School for several years.

With the employment of a new Music Supervisor by the other four districts of this Supervisory Union, it has been possible for Salem to have extended the services of Mrs. Eva W. Thompson, who had served all districts of this Union for 34 years. Mrs. Dorothea S. Roth continues as Art Supervisor for the Supervisory Union and works in the Salem

Schools approximately two days per week. Mrs. Jessie R. Soule, R. N., who has been working as School Nurse in this Supervisory Union for 11 years, continues to make the advantages of her years of experience in the communities available to our children; much of the work and value of the School Nurse is dependent upon her knowledge of the community and of the background of the children. Mrs. Blanche Turner continues as the Secretary and Clerk in the Office of the Superintendent. Because of her years of service in this position, and of her ability and willingness, she is of outstanding value in maintaining the efficiency of the work of the Salem school district as well as of the other districts in Supervisory Union No. 55.

The personnel of the School Lunch Program, which was inaugurated as a part of our total school program on January 2nd, 1951, includes Mrs. Rita Donahue, Mrs. May Hodge, and Mrs. Olive Taylor. The program is mentioned in more detail under the heading of section C. of "Curriculum and Teaching Aids."

### III. BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT:

The School Board has improved the physical condition of the buildings, as the past budgets have permitted.

Allowances have been made in the 1951-52 budget to replace one antiquated sewing machine, and to add a new one to our limited equipment in the Home Economics Department of the High School. It is also planned to replace several typewriters of 1938-39 manufacturing date. It is recommended that a system of typewriter replacement be planned

so that all machines are replaced by new ones every four years. This eliminates much of the expense of overhauling and repairing, and also provides modern equipment with which the students can work.

The High School building which is in good general repair should receive attention in the following areas:

A. Corridor walls and several classrooms need to be repainted.

B. Floors should be washed, sealed and waxed.

C. The heating system which has needed rather extensive repairs and replacements for some time should receive immediate replacements.

D. Artificial lighting in several areas should be improved.

E. In future budgets, finances should be provided so that the equipment in the Home Economics laboratory could be rearranged and improved to conform to modern standards. This project would involve rather extensive rearrangement and addition of sinks, stoves and other working areas; it is believed that very little attention has been given to this area of the high school since it was developed many years ago.

All of the elementary buildings, with the exception of the new Central School, are in

need of considerable minor repairs and expenditures. Modern adjustable seats and desks should be provided for the children when finances permit, and floors in all of the older buildings should be cleaned of the floor oil and treated with floor seal and wax. Several of the schoolroom floors—especially in the No. 6 and the No. 8 Schools—need repair and/or covering with some material such as asphalt tile. Artificial lighting should be improved in several areas.

#### IV. CURRICULUM & TEACHING AIDS

##### A. Instruction and Books

The basis of all of our teaching is Citizenship Training. Character education and the fundamentals are necessary parts of this training. Our curriculum has been set up and followed as suggested by our State Department of Education with allowances made so that teachers may vary their work according to their respective groups of children.

Methods of instruction are so designed by the various teachers as to allow to the greatest possible extent for individual differences; the pupil—teacher relationship throughout the school is excellent. An attempt is made in the upper elementary grades to assist pupils in deciding what educational program to follow after they complete the eighth grade work. Pupil self-evaluation and knowledge of occupations is an important phase in upper elementary grades.

New and modern textbooks and other teaching aids have been purchased as the budget has permitted, to replace those that have been worn and outdated. A great need for new books still exists. It has been impossible to replace all worn and dilapidated books, and keep up with modern texts without a continuity of a liberal budget for these materials each year. The numbers and condition of text books in Salem are below that in many New Hampshire communities.

Mental ability tests which have been given to the Salem children indicate that they are not below average in ability. Standardized achievement tests have indicated that all children have not achieved as much as their ability would permit. Lack of materials and overcrowding may have been partly responsible for this deficiency. It is believed that the continued use of up-to-date teaching materials by well trained and experienced teachers will help the Salem children to achieve as much as their ability permits.

The fullest development of a child's potentialities depends upon close cooperation between parents and teachers. They should have the same goals and understand each other's methods and plans for attaining them. Parents should recognize and encourage those experiences in the lives of children which occur outside the school room which tend to foster desirable physical, social, emotional, spiritual and mental growth. Such experiences, under the guidance of parents, supplement and extend the school experience.

## B. Industrial Arts

A recent National Education Association publication\* has stated that "In the United States of America, where our cherished system of free enterprise involves the right of every individual to work in an occupation of his own choosing, the program of vocational education in the public schools is a matter of great significance. It is, and must always be, an important and integral part of our school studies.

Vocational education is not limited merely to intensive technical training in order to create certain skills and technics needed in handling tools. It deals with varied aspects of the many problems of the worker in today's world. Its specific aim is to provide information, guidance, and training for entering upon and making satisfactory progress in some line of useful work. Its broader purpose is to educate persons who will understand and appreciate the dignity of work and the economic necessity in our way of life for work which brings satisfaction to the individual and which at the same time serves the needs of society and adds to its wealth.

Vocational education, including guidance, is concerned with assisting the individual:

To analyze his own interests, attitudes, and talents.

To secure and evaluate information about various occupations.

To exercise sound judgment in the choice of an occupation.

To develop required knowledge and skills for success in a chosen occupation.

To make the necessary adjustments to changing occupational requirements in order to become and continue to be a happy and productive worker who experiences the satisfaction of good workmanship.

To develop an enlightened and informed understanding of the relationship of his work to the obligations of citizenship in our democratic society."

\*"Our School Studies" 1948—National Education Association, Washington, D. C.

A program of vocational education should be integrated closely with our other school studies in the high school, and should include Trade and Industrial Education. This would include development of necessary manipulative and performance skills, technics, knowledges, related industrial information, safety and judgment for persons about to be or already employed in trade or industrial pursuits.

From studies that have been made in other schools, we may conclude that the industrial arts education as a part of the curriculum in the Woodbury High School would:

1. Tend to reduce the number of drop-outs from school.



2. Provide instruction which would be of interest and of more value to many boys who are not "academically minded" to the extent of aiming for a post-secondary and college education, and who will probably become involved with mechanical work of some kind upon separation from high school, by early leaving or by graduation.

### C. Health

Recognition that the health of the child determines his ability to deal with his school tasks, accounts for the increased emphasis on the subject of health; this is indicated in our school lunch program, physical education program including athletics and in the many miscellaneous but important duties as carried on by our school nurse.

### D. School Lunch Program

Without the wholehearted cooperation of all community groups, the School Lunch Program which is now operating in the new Central School Cafeteria, could not have become a reality. To date, a total of \$2410.80 has been raised or pledged toward paying the cost of equipping the kitchen and lunchroom. Without the efforts and consideration of various individuals in the community, we could not have procured the "home-made" tables, benches and cabinets, with the limited funds which were available. The whole project has been an example of excellent community cooperation.

At the present time, around 350 of the children attending the high school and the new school are enjoying a complete Federally Aided Lunch at a cost to the individual of only \$1.00 per week.

Lunches which are being served meet all Federal requirements for reimbursement (7c per meal for "type A" lunch) and include a minimum of 2 ounces of a high protein food, at least one slice of bread, two teaspoons of butter, a serving of fruit or vegetable, and one-half pint of milk. The School Lunch is an educational program as well as one which provides an excellent and well-prepared meal.

A financial statement of receipts and of the acquisition of kitchen and cafeteria equipment is shown below:

E. The Saturday morning physical education programs as carried on by Mr. James

O'Connor and Mr. Foster Ball, further our objectives in the area of health as well as to provide supervised recreation for those people who participate in the activities. This program is optional for all Salem boys in grades 5 to 8.

In order to provide dental assistance to those children who are in need of it, it is hoped that funds will be made available by community groups to finance dental clinics. The excellent health suite as provided in the new school and equipped by the local Chapter of the Salvation Army also provides a modern dental room with equipment necessary for all usual dental operations. The Salvation Army through the local Chairman Mr. Earl Magoon and his Committee composed of Mrs. Jessie R. Soule and Mr. Ralph Call deserve many thanks for these donations.

## V. FINANCES:

"The amount of money spent for education will be determined not only by the number of children served and the standard of service rendered, but also by the value of the dollar. As the present value of the dollar is comparatively low, current expenditures for education must be higher to buy a given program of education than the same program would have cost in 1939, for example.

The index of dollar value prepared by the U. S. Bureau of Labor Statistics shows that it takes about \$1.65 in 1950 to purchase what \$1 would have bought in 1939. A sound policy of financing education cannot ignore the

fluctuating buying power of money when the changes in dollar value are pronounced and long-continued. These changing values affect both capital outlay and the month by month operating costs of the school.”\*

Education is an investment, not an expense. In school administration, finances appear to be one of the most important items. At the present moment financial aid to school is one of the more important items being considered by both our State and Federal governments. Leading authorities agree that education is one of the most potent factors for our National Defense and therefore for the preservation of our Democracy.

The increased School Budget for 1951-52 as will be presented at the Annual School District Meeting in March, is a result of a great amount of study and thought. Every precaution has been taken to spend the money of the town wisely. Allowances have been made for 2 additional teachers in the High School (grades 7-12) to help to care for increased enrollments and to slightly lighten the load of the high school teachers.

## VI. IN-SERVICE TRAINING OF TEACHERS:

Teachers, as do members of other professions, need continuous in-service training in order that they may keep pace with the chang-

in and improved methods of teaching. Those people who were responsible for the programs that have been provided in this area during recent years deserve commendation.

During the past summer a three-week Workshop for teachers was carried on at the Hampstead Central School. This program stressed "The Language Arts" and practicicallly all elementary teachers in Supervisory Union No. 55 took advantage of the course as offered by various education experts under the direction and supervision of Ex-superintendent Grandy and of David Greenlaw, Principal of the Hampstead High and Elementary Schools.

During the current year, all teachers are availing themselves of the opportunity of reading "The Educator" (Journal of the New Hampshire State Teachers Association) and the National Education Association Journal, as well as many other professional publications which the schools provide and/or to which they personally subscribe.

All teachers attended the two-day Convention of the New Hampshire State Teachers Association in October 1950, and several representatives of the various schools have attended other professional conferences such as one that was sponsored by our State Department at the Phillips Exeter Academy on Guidance.

Just previous to the opening of schools last September, a two-day Workshop was held at

Salem for all teachers in this Supervisory Union on the subjects of Reading, Handwriting, and Guidance. Several teachers' meetings and or conferences have been held since September with various groups and individuals on follow-up work pertaining to the subjects of the summer and September Workshops, as well as on problems that arise in local situations.

Plans are under way to offer a course on the teaching of Science in the Elementary School. Present plans provide that the course be given in Salem by Dr. Clark Hubler of Wheelock College in Boston and that teachers working for degrees might secure two or three credits on a graduate as well as on an undergraduate level. It is anticipated that as many as 1-3 of the teachers in Supervisory Union No. 55 might avail themselves of this opportunity.

## VII. COMMUNITY ORGANIZATIONS

Parent Teacher Associations have been organized at the No. 8 and the No. 1 Schools since last September, and it is hoped that they will continue to work for the betterment of education in their respective areas, as have the No. 4 and the No. 9 School Parent Teachers Associations since their organization. It is believed that such organizations at the No. 6 and and at the New Central School would prove to be of great value to those particular areas.

All organizations in Salem have contributed greatly to the general proficiency of

the Schools through excellent cooperation in all school activities and endeavors. The Veterans of Foreign Wars deserve special commendation. As does the No. 4 Parent Teacher Associations for their contribution to the program of free milk to needy children.

### VIII. RECOMMENDATIONS:

In conclusion, the following recommendations are offered for consideration:

1. That physical examinations by a Medical Doctor be given to each child at least three times during his twelve years of public education. (Many districts now give a physical examination to each child each year).
2. That the School District adopt a salary schedule for employees.
3. That the present program of improving physical facilities be followed and expanded to:
  - (a) Improve school playgrounds by leveling and resurfacing.
  - (b) Renew the outmoded unadjustable school furniture.
  - (c) Improve lighting fixtures in the buildings that are not now up to accepted standards.
4. That Vocational Education (Shop) be provided for boys in grades 7-12, to be comparable to Home Economics and Commerce as now offered to girls.

5. That consideration be given to offering a noon lunch to each child in all schools.
6. That physical education be provided to the children in all grades.
7. That kindergarten be provided for all 5 year old children.
8. That personnel be increased so that a specially trained person will be available to provide educational and vocational guidance to all children.
9. That a special or remedial teacher and/or a reading consultant be provided for all schools.

In closing, I quote from a recent Publication of the National Education Association.\*

Universal appreciation of education as an enrichment of the life of the individual, as a basic experience for all who hope to find the good life in a democratic society, is a goal toward which the American people are traveling and from which they will not be deterred. Those who make plans for tomorrow's schools may take this into account as a factor which not only has an important effect upon the size of our school population, but on which greatly increases interest in and support for education."

## REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

December 19, 1950

To Mr. Jonathan Osgood, Superintendent of Schools

I hereby submit my annual report as the principal of Woodbury High and Central Elementary Schools.

For the first time Woodbury High School now houses only grades 9 to 12. Grades 7 and 8 have moved into the new Central Building which now has grades 3 through 8. Both buildings are utilized by all students.

The new spacious auditorium—gymnasium is the assembly room for both schools as well as the audio-visual room for large groups. Junior High home economics classes are in Woodbury for serving and cooking while both schools use the new Central Cafeteria for hot lunches.

The name headmaster is now passe. The head of all high schools in New Hampshire is now called a secondary-school principal.

There have been some additions to the teaching staff during this past year. In the high school Mr. Robert Upham a graduate of Plymouth Teachers' College and who has just completed work for his master's degree at Columbia University is teaching senior English and Social Studies.

Mrs. Hortense Olson a graduate of Rivier College with a background of several years of successful

teaching is now in charge of the foreign language department.

Mrs. Dorothy Killam of Kingston, New Hampshire substituted for Mrs. Ann Emilio in Home Economics during her leave of absence from September to November 1, 1950.

Mr. Andrew Dupras a graduate of the Salem Teachers' College and who has recently been working toward a master's degree at Boston University is substituting for Mrs. Victor Nash in the commercial department. Mrs. Nash is on a leave of absence.

In the Junior High Mr. Robert Dolph with teaching experience in New Hampshire and Massachusetts is teaching Math and Science. Mr. Dolph is also experienced in the field of Industrial Arts.

Mrs. Joyce Strempe who graduated from Warburg College and has done graduate work at the Iowa State College is teaching English. Mrs. Strempe has been substituting this past year in the Salem School system.

Miss Margaret Flynn a graduate of Mount Saint Mary's College is teaching Social Studies.

The total enrollment for the year in both buildings has been 578 with the present enrollment at 533. Grades 7 through 12 have increased 26% over last year.

Most of the discharges are pupils who transferred to other schools because the family moved out of town. All of the race track pupils are included in this list.

There are 11 tuition pupils, 7 from Windham and 4 from Atkinson.

Of the twenty-nine graduates of the class of 1950 plus two post graduates:

- 4 entered the University of New Hampshire
- 1 entered Springfield College
- 2 entered Plymouth Teachers College
- 1 entered Lowell Teachers College
- 1 entered Gordon Theological School
- 5 entered McIntosh Business College
- 1 entered Nurses' Training School
- 2 entered the services
- 1 entered post-graduate



Most of the rest have entered the fields of industry.

Those who are continuing their formal education are doing creditable work and they reflect the serious effort of the school to give suitable training for those who are seeking post-secondary education. The school feels also that a very worthwhile program has been offered the girls who have graduated from the commercial and home economic courses. However, since education should be "for all American youth" we cannot avoid wondering if the boys of the class of 1950 who have not sought further education have received as complete a training as they should have had. Socially they are well adjusted but in the classroom shouldn't their training have been more functional? In short, wouldn't the boys have benefited more from instruction in the industrial arts? Furthermore would the boys who were in that class when it was grade nine and sometime within the next three years presumably completed their formal education have remained to graduate if Salem offered manual arts?

This year has seen no radical changes in the general policies of the administration of the school. We have tried to enrich our program started last year by the instigation of an activity period. We believe that the whole child must be educated as near as possible to life situations. Within this activity period, with its homeroom guidance, assemblies, clubs, physical education, art, music and fundamentals a child learns to accept responsibilities, learns how to get along with people, learn to express himself before groups, raises his horizons and acquires the poise that is so essential to success in life.

Our audio-visual program has been continued and expanded and many classes avail themselves of the increasing number of films available for schools. Some of these films are:

Film-strips were also used in classes.

Our driver education program has been expanded and we now have two qualified instructors, namely: Miss Manson and Mr. Peltonen. We feel that this course helps materially in promoting safety on the highways.

The guidance and testing program which has been so worthwhile and popular has been continued. The school has availed themselves of the Boston University Testing Service, the Metropolitan Achievement and Henmon—Nelson Intelligence tests. The results of these tests have helped tremendously in guiding the pupils in their choice of curriculum and in their post-graduate work.

We plan to continue our career days, curriculum days and recruitment of teacher days which were so well received last year. Career days gave an opportunity for sixteen business men, all leaders in their respective fields, to come to Woodbury and pass along to the students ideas and suggestions that would prove helpful. Curriculum days were for the eighth graders who were given several talks by the heads of the departments in Woodbury acquainting them with each curriculum. Because of

this they chose their courses of study more intelligently. Recruitment of teachers was new and perhaps the first time such a program had been tried in New Hampshire. Twelve seniors, interested in teaching as a profession, were given the opportunity to visit the elementary schools and spend a few days with the teachers, assisting them, and getting some hard knowledge of the life of a teacher.

Our athletic program this year is in the capable hands of Mr. Earl W. Connor and Miss Waagen. Both the girls and boys are most fortunate to have such well-trained individuals to guide them in utilizing the games to the best advantage. We have continued the Junior High program for the younger boys as well as the detouring morning program. These latter programs train the youngsters in group behavior, good citizenship, skills and also keep them occupied. Since the inauguration of this program our truant officer has almost had to go out of business.

The senior play, THE MAD HATTERS, was well received this past fall and we are looking forward to the operetta and the dramatic contest in the spring. Several copies of the RAY have appeared and offer an excellent example of the need for teamwork if a project is to be successful. The student council is more active than ever this year and assumes responsibility in a commendable fashion. The choristers under the able direction of Mrs. Eva Thompson is becoming a "must" for all special affairs and its splendid reputation has become more than local.

Many local groups and individuals have shown their interest in our young people. The annual Booster Banquet was a real community success. Sponsored by The Salem Men's Club, The Salem Women's Club, The Salem Junior Women's Club, The Board of Trade, The American Legion, The Legion Auxiliary, The Veterans of Foreign Wars and their Auxiliary, it was one of the highlights in the life of the students.

The cooperation in regard to equipping the Central Cafeteria is a fine example of community endeavor. Thanks to all the organizations in Salem who have made it possible for such a fine hot lunch program. In addition to this, we have enjoyed the cooperation of many of the parents. However, all pupils should have teachers who have the cooperation of the home. Usually our most successful pupils are those where there has been close cooperation between the schools and the home. Don't wait for education week to come to school. A visit to school, a conference with the teacher and mutual understanding and admiration on the part of both will clear up most of the difficulties and misunderstandings. In this way the best interests of the children will be served, with proper counselling and understanding supplanting misplaced sympathy and coddling of the child.

A visit to our new Central School with its variety of colors will be most worthwhile. One should see especially the elementary classrooms with their variety of projects which have received many favorable comments.

In closing I wish to say, "thank you" to the teachers. I have found them to be very sincere and un-

derstanding in their work, and to them goes much of the credit for the good work being done. To you, and the Board of Education I also say, "thank you" for your whole-hearted cooperation and inestimable assistance. To the citizens of Salem, I also wish to express appreciation for their untiring efforts towards a better school system.

## REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF PHYSICAL EDUCATION

To Mr. Jonathan Osgood, Superintendent of Schools

I hereby respectfully submit my first annual report concerning physical education activities in the Salem schools.

### A. The Present Program

1. During the past school year ninety boys and girls, slightly less than 45% of the student body, participated in intercholastic athletics at Woodbury High School.

2. For those students not participating in interscholastic athletics one physical education period a week, (forty minutes) was provided in the spring and fall; and for the boys, interclass basketball was played during the winter months.

3. The Junior High Program consists of two periods of physical education each week of the school year for all boys and girls in grades seven and eight. Competition is also provided with other junior high school teams in basketball and baseball.

4. The Saturday morning program which is capably handled by Mr. O'Connor and Mr. Dolph has now been made available for all boys in grades 3-8. For grades 1-6 very little in the way of organized physical education has been made available.

### B. Recommendations

1. The desirability of physical education as a vital part of a well-rounded educational program

for all boys and girls is not questioned by educators today. Therefore, I recommend that the necessary steps be taken to provide all of the boys and girls in the Salem schools with a suitable physical education program. This would not mean the expenditure of huge sums of money for athletic equipment, but would require the use of a full time physical education director.

2. I also recommend for the 1951-1952 school year, that the Saturday morning physical education program be made available for all boys, grades 1-8 in the Salem schools. This will require extending the program into Saturday afternoon.

3. Two periods of physical education each week should also be provided for both the boys and girls of Woodbury High School.

4. Compulsory examinations, both physical and dental, should be provided for each student in the school system, with the physical education director providing corrective exercises.

During the month of December a telephone was installed at the No. 1 School.

## REPORT OF NO. 6 SCHOOL

In June at the close of the 1950 term the children of No. 6 School held a rally in honor of their patrol leaders. The school marched in a body to Consoli Hall. This is about the busiest intersection in Salem and both teachers and children have been grateful for his care.

This fall Mrs. Young's second grade had a most interesting and profitable experience building a small scale grocery store in a corner of their classroom. They made a trip to Mr. Guss Brown's Store to see how things were set up and then proceeded to outfit and use their own little store. Much valuable arithmetic reasoning was gained in a very pleasant way through this project.

At the present time Mrs. Young has a bird feeding station outside her classroom window and a record is being kept of the different birds seen visiting the station.

Mrs. Howlett and her Grade 1 children have placed their their Christmas tree in a spot near the feeding station and have tied food on its branches to try to attract more birds there.

In Grade 1 the children have also planted vegetable and flower seeds in plant pots so as to have a winter garden and watch how the seeds grow.

Mrs. Balinas in Grade 4 has a very active Dutch Unit in progress. Much reading and handwork has been done, some films have been shown and more will be shown on their arrival.

The children of Grade 3, Mrs. Gordon's Room, are working on a small concept of self government. With the class election of a President and a Vice President, much of the routine of handling the room and supplies can be done by the children, giving them a sense of responsibility and cooperation.

At present there is a new banner at No. 6 which is given to the room whose teacher can report the best citizens for the week. There has been much striving to get the banner and a great deal of satisfaction for the room which may hang it on the wall for a week.

Grades 4-6 are working on a Lumber Unit which will include a field trip to the Eagle Tribune Office to see the paper printed; several movies on forest life are to be shown by Mrs. Soule.

A Parent-Teachers Organization has been formed this fall and they are making plans for a profitable and pleasant year.

Due to the long distance some of the bus children come to school we think a hot lunch program would be appreciated.

## REPORT OF THE NO. 9 SCHOOL

The following information is taken from a report sent in by Mary W. Foss, the head teacher at the No. 9 School: The school comprising grades one to six had as objectives, to challenge pupil's interest, to improve study habits and a goal for which to work. Grade three studied a unit on "How the Dairy Farmer Helps Us Get Food," and took a field trip to the State Line Dairy; in their art work they developed a dairy farm mural and constructed farm buildings and animals out of wood and clay.

In the grades 4, 5 and 6 rooms, the children made a permanent winter bouquet out of dried wild flowers, seed pods, cat-tails and grasses. These were painted and then taken home. A blackboard mural made by this group included ocean liners and tug-boats entering Liverpool; this was used as a setting for a dramatization "Cargoes from Abroad" presented by grades 5 and 6. Grade 5 activities in connection with the unit "Egypt-Land of Mystery" included molding clay mummies and cases, making miniature wooden shadoof and camel caravan, and relief maps made of sawdust, paste and paint. The fourth grade made picture portfolios of pictures drawn during imaginary visits to countries of faraway lands.

At Christmas time all grades made window decorations and gifts to take home; the Parent Teacher Association prepared and served luncheon at noon the day of the Christmas Program, and coca-cola was enjoyed by all through the kindness of Mr. Charles Seifert of the Coca-Cola company.

The No. 9 School is fortunate in having such an active Parent-Teacher Association; a few of their many undertakings during the past year included sponsoring an outing at Canobie Lake Park for the children, and a Halloween Party at White Bridge Inn Barn. They have donated to and/or supported the following projects : the child clinic, the Central Cafeteria Fund, the Savings Stamp Program, purchase of an electric stove for the use of the school, signs installed by the State Highway Department and many others. The school also received a memorial donation of a film-strip projector and a paper-cutter through the generosity of Mrs. Cox.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF ART

To Mr. Jonathan Osgood, Superintendent of Schools

I hereby submit my annual report of the art activities and instruction in Salem.

The art program of the past year has been one of steady progress. As well as the continuation of the fundamentals in lettering, color, and design, the individual needs of each teacher's program of study has been considered. Whenever possible, murals, units, and individual pictures were interwoven with their subjects. Along with seasonal decorations, the development of creative work in crayon, water color, poster paint, finger paint, animals made of starch, and weaving were done.

Some of the student's art material was selected and sent to the Director of Fine Arts in Concord, New Hampshire, to be used at meetings, and as a part of a traveling unit for the state.

In cooperation with the Music Supervisor during the trip to "Pops," the children were able to visit the Children's Museum in Jamaica Plains, Massachusetts. At the museum is a collection of art-material from all over the world at a child's level.

The activities at Woodbury High School in art this past year have been the painting of two "props" for the senior play. The illustrating of Christmas carols was displayed in the upstairs corridor, and the bulletin board was also decorated. Metallic snowflakes were cut and placed in the pane of glass of the classroom doors. In February



table decorations, candy containers, program covers, and large athletic figures were made for the athletic banquet. Posters were made to advertise the bicentennial anniversary.

The new mediums of linoleum block printing at high school level, and weaving on a cardboard loom were introduced.

In closing I wish to thank the teachers for their interest and cooperation.

It would be most helpful for each child attending school for the first time to bring a health certificate signed by a licensed physician and the certificate should describe the condition of the pupil when the examination was made.

A preschool clinic is held once a month at Dr. Wm. Greer's office, Main Street with Dr. Greer the

attending physician. Any child who cannot obtain a certificate from the family physician may do so by attending this clinic. The clinic is directed by Mrs. Ella Fowler, R. N. The State Board of Health Nurse and is sponsored by the Salem Women's Club.

First aid equipment is available at the Central School for treatment of emergencies in the Health Office at all times. First aid is limited to first treatment only, following which the pupil should be placed under the care of his parents, who are responsible for subsequent treatment.

In May the Tuberculosis Patch Test was given to eighty-one pupils. Individuals with a positive reaction were X-Rayed. No active cases of Tuberculosis were found.

Moving pictures, with both color and sound, were shown as an educational health program on Dental Health. Guidance and Obedience, Posture, Safety, Tuberculosis and Cancer, seemingly were much enjoyed by all students.

Since dental caries among school children outrank all other defects it is hoped that a dental clinic can be made available to all pupils that do not have regular dental care by their family dentist. We now have a Health Office with dental equipment where such a clinic could be held.

There is considerable interest in a program for application of Sodium Fluorine. To be most effective the Fluorine treatment should be applied when a child is 3 years old, and be repeated at 3-to-4 year intervals during the period his teeth are de-

veloping until he is about 13. However, Sodium Fluorine may be given to a child at any age.

One of the primary purposes of the school nursing services is to give individualized health instructions which will help pupils to understand their own health problems and to take an increasing responsibility for securing professional care and guidance.

Every effort has been made to obtain treatment for pupils with special health problems through the family physician when possible or a clinic.

What the best and wisest parent wants for his own child, that must the community want for all its children.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank the Salvation Army for the office equipment as well as its interest in the many welfare projects, also the Red Cross, the Women's Club and all cooperative individuals.

I hereby submit my annual report as Supervisor of music in the Salem schools.

A new course, *The American Singer*, published by the American Book Company is being used in all but three groups. The first grade book has many charming and worthwhile songs, which strongly appeal to the little people. Second graders have books in their hands for rote and note songs. The reading of music starts seriously in the third grade and is carried on step by step through grade six. The text books present each phase of music reading in an interesting manner.

The Junior High School students meet once a week for music. It would be an advantage if the boys and girls could have at least two such classes weekly. I would like a Glee Club for this group for those especially interested, but their schedule is so full, no time can be allotted at present.

There are three music classes at Woodbury High School; Girls' Glee Club, Boys' Glee Club and the Choristers. The Glee Clubs meet once a week during school time. The Choristers meet after school and I want to express my appreciation to them for the many hours they have spent rehearsing and their interest and earnest endeavor which have contributed so much to the success of the choir. During the past year the young singers have appeared at the Salem Women's Club, The Junior

Women's Club, Catholic Daughters, North Salem P. T. A., South Salem P. T. A. Commencement and at the dedication of the War Memorial Hall. They also sang in Lawrence at the Tuesday Sorosis, Baptist Woman's Club and at the General Hospital Nurses Alumni Association.

An operetta "Meet Arizona" is in preparation and will be presented by the music clubs in April. The elementary school children will give a variety entertainment on March 16th for the benefit of the school cafeteria. The affair will be held in Memorial Auditorium.

In closing I want to express my thanks to you for your interest and support and to the teachers for the hearty co-operation extended me throughout the year.
