(L. S.) To the Inhabitants of the Town of Springfield in the County of Sullivan in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Springfield on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To see if the town will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the budget committee.

3. To see what the town wishes to do about new road equipment providing appropriation is made in the budget.

4. To see what the town wishes to do about highway wages.

5. To see what the town wishes to do about selling or renting the old center schoolhouse to the Grange.

6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell tax acquired property.

7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money on the notes of the town in anticipation of taxes.

8. To see if the town will vote to allow a one and a half percent discount on taxes paid within thirty days after tax bill mailing date.

9. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to distribute resident inventory blanks not earlier than April 1st.

10. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

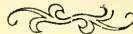

Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the Springfield School Board:

I submit herewith the annual report of the Superintendent of Schools.

The enrollment as of January 1, 1952 was 58, divided as follows: Primary room (Grades 1-4) 26; Upper grade room (Grades 5-8) 32. Mr. A. L. Juris replaced Mrs. Mabel Pillsbury as teacher in Grades 5-8. Mr. Juris was also appointed Principal of the building.

There are three pupils from Grafton attending Memorial School. Tuition has been set at \$160 per pupil for 1951-52 and \$175 per pupil for 1952-53.

During the summer, the two basement rooms were painted. The center plot of ground was graded and seeded. Under the direction of Mr. Juris, an outdoor basketball basket and a volley ball court have been set up. A thermostat was installed in the lunch room, correcting the heating problem in this room. The piano has been put in order and moved to the Primary room. Two teachers chairs were purchased.

Rising costs are reflected in the tuition charges for our high school students. Tuition rates are as follows:

The fall meeting of the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Regional Lunch Workers Association was held at the school.

Both teachers attended a 3-day Workshop in Art held at Newport on November 26-28. Various types of art materials were demonstrated with the emphasis on projects and activities that could be carried on in the class room to correlate art with the teaching of other subjects.

Financially, Springfield received a real blow under the terms of the new formula adopted by the 1951 General Court for the distribution of state aid. Whereas we had anticipated a loss of several thousand dollars over the \$4,551.35 received in

1950-51, the provisions of the new act whereby funds were distributed on the basis of "adjusted valuation" rather than "equalized valuation" coupled with the fact that the total amount available for the state as a whole was \$600,000 caused Springfield to receive only \$574.73 this year (1951-52). There is likely to be a further reduction next year, since the \$600,000 available for the state must be re-apportioned to take in a total state increase in enrollment. Actually Springfield's pupil enrollment is slightly less than a year ago. Both of these factors will serve to reduce next year's state aid allotment.

In conclusion, I wish to express my appreciation for the cooperation of the School Board, school staff, and citizens during the past year.
