





COMMISSIONERS' REPORT.

To the Citizens of Sullivan County:

In accordance with the Public Statutes of the State of New Hampshire, the Commissioners of the County of Sullivan herewith present their annual report, together with the report of the Superintendent of the County Farm and House of Correction, Treasurer, Clerk of Superior Court, Sheriff, Jailor, Solicitor, Chaplain, Physician, and Auditors for the fiscal year ending Dec. 31, 1910.

The County Farm and House of Correction continue under the management of Mr. and Mrs. O. A. Putnam as Superintendent and Matron.

During the past season a new stock barn has been built at the farm 40 x 84 feet, with basement under the whole, with cement walls for foundations and slate roof. The main floor contains stables on either side, with box stalls and granary. The stables are equipped with 42 of the "Perfection Swing Stanchions," which is a great improvement over the former way of confining cattle.

¹⁴ One of the old barns has been removed to a suitable place west of the horse barn, and repaired and remodeled into a tool house and slaughter room, the latter being fitted up with modern conveniences for butchering.

While improvements have constantly been going on about the County buildings for the past six years, yet there are some things still needed to bring the same to a reasonable state of perfection at the farm, among which are the remodeling of the Superintendent's house, and the building of a new heating plant seperate from the main buildings, as recommended by the last report of the State Board of Charities and Corrections.

In conclusion, we desire to thank the Superintendent and Matron, and all employees at the County Farm for their cooperation and interest manifested in the discharge of our various duties. Also, to all other officers of the County and towns, with whom we have in any way had business relations.

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SOLICITOR'S REPORT.

During the year 1910, there were sixty-five criminal prosecutions disposed of as follows :—

Of the above number twenty-five were for various violations of the liquor laws, viz.: Eleven search warrants, nothing found; nine paid fine and costs, one bound over, three investigated under the statute, one discharged.

Fourteen complaints for larceny—two sent to industrial school, one non est, two discharged, four paid fine and costs, one money refunded, one bound over, three probation (juveniles.)

One (juvenile) breaking windows-probation.

Three searches for stolen goods-nothing found.

Two lascivious behavior—one discharged, one paid fine and costs.

Two raising cheque—two respondents non est, one recognized.

Two fornication-one respondent non est, one discharged.

Two cruelty to animals—one discharged, one (horse) reclaimed.

One breaking and entering-industrial school.

One non-support of minor.

Four assaults—one fine and costs, one 30 days, one discharged, one bound over.

One adultery-married.

One surety to keep the peace.

One vagrant beggar-30 days.

One stubborn child-industrial school.

One driving horse beyond point hired-30 days.

One false pretenses-respondent non est.

One non-support of family-went to work.

One slot Machine—fine and costs.

At the May term two indictments were found—one for raising cheque, filed, respondent non est; one for keeping for sale, subsequently paid fine and costs for first offense.

At the November term five indictments were found—one keeping for sale, fine and costs, 90 days in jail; one keeping for sale, fine and costs; one keeping for sale, nol prossed; one larceny, indictment filed, respondent non est; one malicious trespass, indictment filed.

The Grand Jury sat only one day at either the May or November term.

The foregoing crimes and offenses were committed in the towns of Claremont, Newport, Unity, Cornish, Charlestown, Washington, Plainfield, Sunapee and Langdon.

No civil suits in which the county is a party are pending, and no fines, costs or other moneys belonging to the county have been paid to me, as the statute provides.
