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## GRANITE STATERS MORE CONCERNED ABOUT VOTER FRAUD IN U.S. THAN IN NH

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DURHAM, NH – A small majority of New Hampshire residents believe voter fraud is a serious problem in the country as a whole, but far fewer believe it is a serious problem in New Hampshire. While few think voter fraud is very significant and affects the outcomes of elections, a plurality think it is somewhat significant and could potentially affect election outcomes. The majority of Granite Staters support New Hampshire's new electoral law requiring documentation for those who register close to an election.

These findings are based on the latest **Granite State Poll\***, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Nine hundred and fifty-six (956) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed in English by landline and cellular telephone between October 26 and November 9, 2017. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 3.2 percent.

### Election Integrity in the U.S.

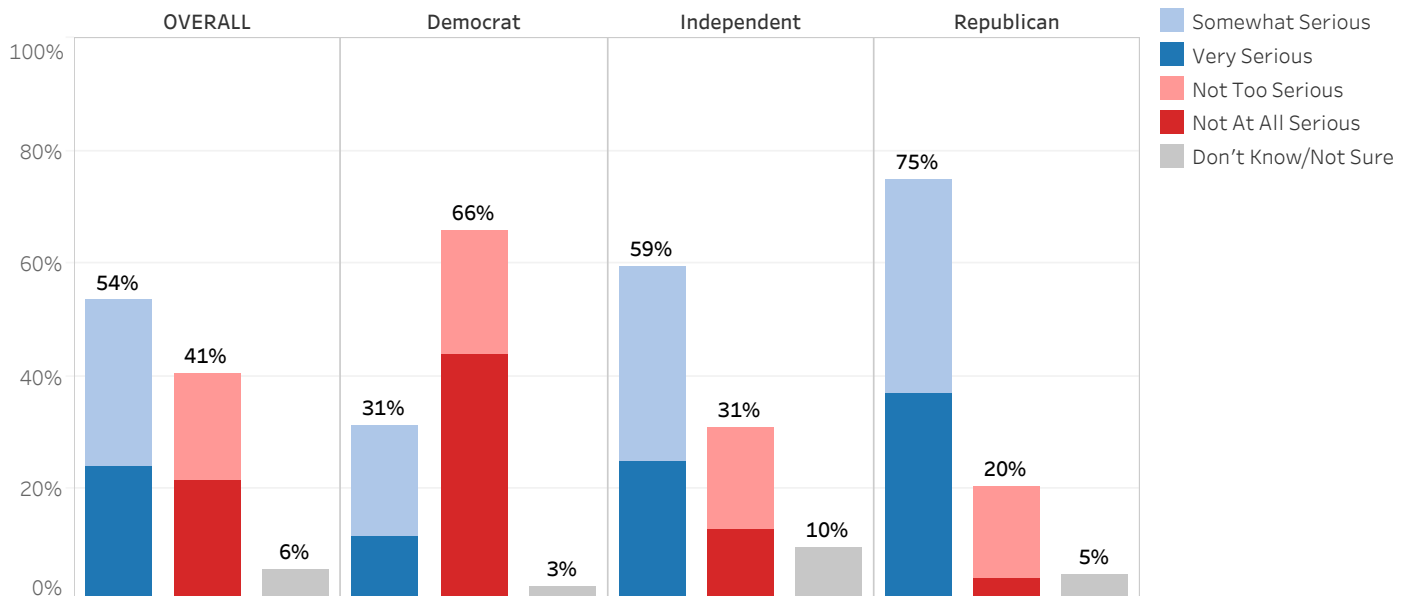
In the wake of the 2016 election, President Trump claimed there was considerable fraud in the election. Trump chartered a special commission to investigate the integrity of U.S. elections which convened in NH in September.

Just over half of Granite Staters (54%) believe voter fraud is a very serious (24%) or somewhat serious (29%) problem in the country as a whole, 41% believe it is not too serious (19%) or not at all serious (22%), and 6% don't know or are unsure.

Three-quarters of Republicans (75%) and 59% Independents believe voter fraud is a serious problem in the country but only 31% of Democrats agree.

Self-described conservatives, those who voted for Donald Trump or did not vote in 2016, those who watch Fox News, those with a high school education or less, and those who primarily get their national news through social media are most likely to say voter fraud is a very or somewhat serious problem in the country while those with a college degree or more education, self-described liberals, those who voted for Hillary Clinton in 2016, and those who primarily get their national news through newspapers are least likely to say so.

### Seriousness of Voter Fraud Problem in U.S.

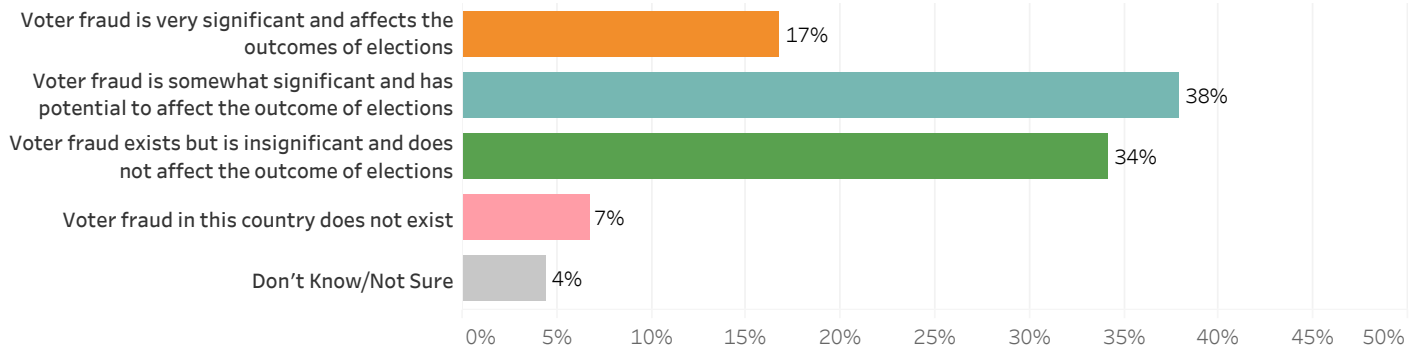

Seventeen percent of New Hampshire residents believe that voter fraud is very significant and affects the outcomes of elections, 38% say voter fraud is somewhat significant and has the potential to affect the outcome of elections, 34% say voter fraud exists but is insignificant and does not affect the outcome of elections, 7% say voter fraud in this country does not exist, and 4% don't know or are unsure.

Self-described conservatives and those who primarily get their national news through social media are most likely to say voter fraud is very significant and affects the outcomes of elections while those who voted for Hillary Clinton in 2016, self-described liberals, those who primarily get their national news through newspapers, and those who have completed postgraduate work are most likely to say voter fraud exists but is insignificant and does not affect the outcome of elections.

### Best Describes View of Voter Fraud in U.S.



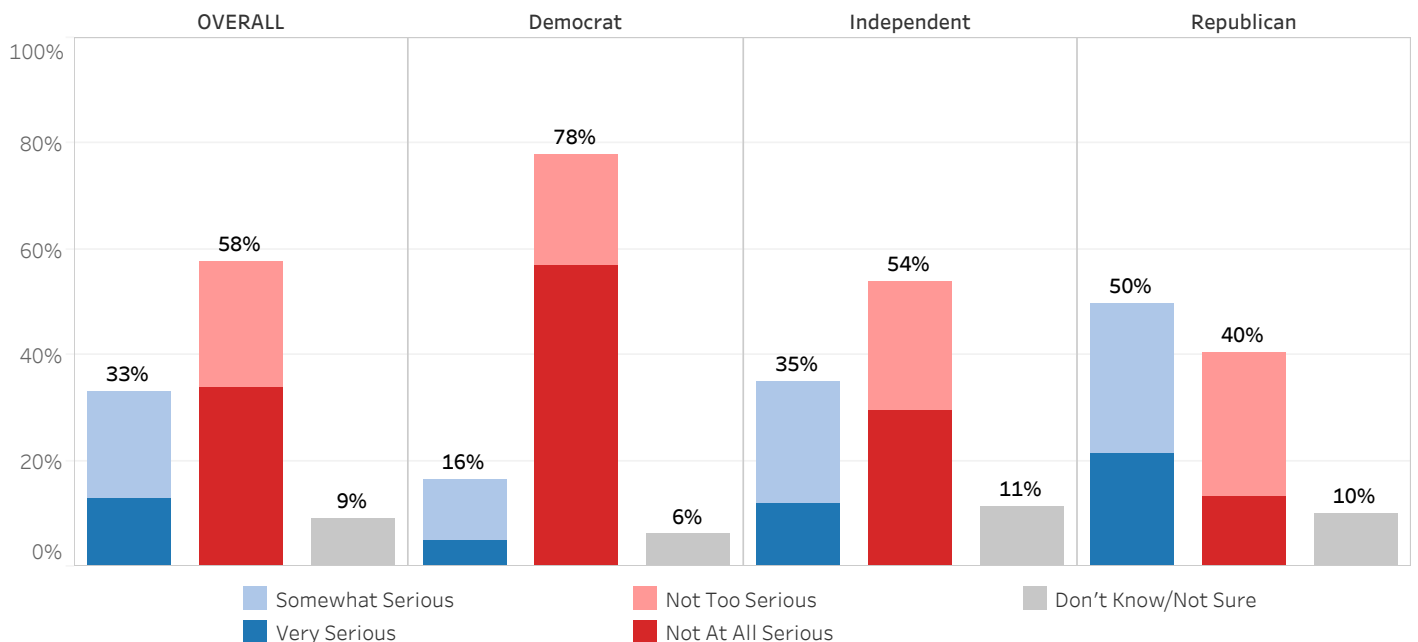
### Election Integrity in NH

Only a third Granite Staters (33%) believe voter fraud is a very serious (13%) or somewhat serious (20%) problem in New Hampshire, 58% believe it is not too serious (24%) or not at all serious (34%), and 9% don't know or are unsure.

Half of Republicans (50%) believe voter fraud is a serious problem in the state, but only 35% of Independents and 16% of Democrats agree.

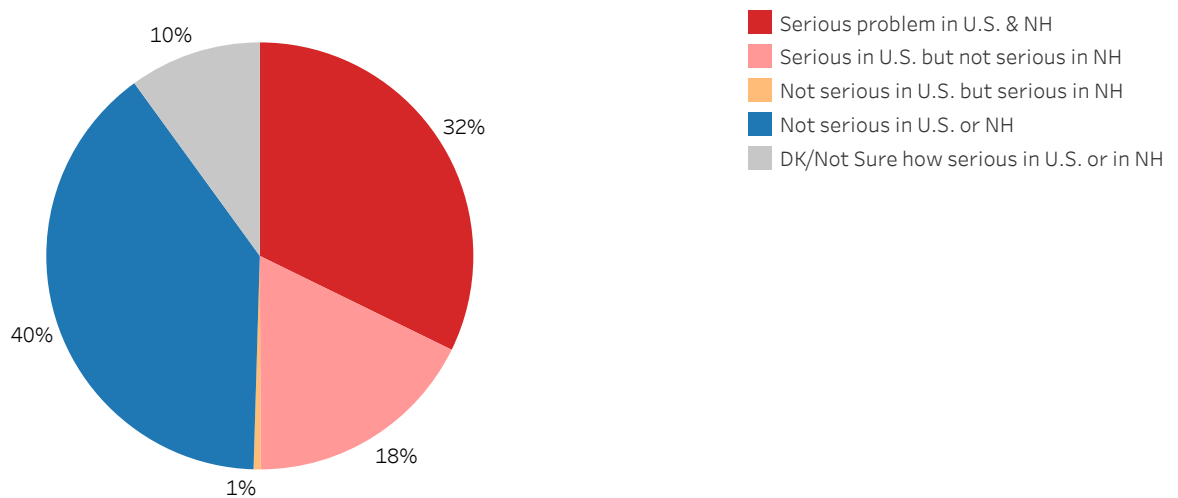
Self-described conservatives, those who voted for Donald Trump or did not vote in 2016, and those who watch Fox News are most likely to say voter fraud is a very or somewhat serious problem in the state while self-described liberals, those who have completed postgraduate work, those who voted for Hillary Clinton in 2016, and those who primarily get their national news from newspapers are least likely to say so.

Combining these two questions, 32% of Granite Staters believe voter fraud is a serious problem in the U.S. and in NH, 18% believe it is a serious problem in the country as a whole but not serious in NH, 1% say it is not serious in the U.S. but is a serious problem in NH, 40% say it is not serious in the U.S. or in NH, and 10% don't know or are unsure how serious of a problem it is either in the U.S. or in NH.

**NH Voting Law Change**

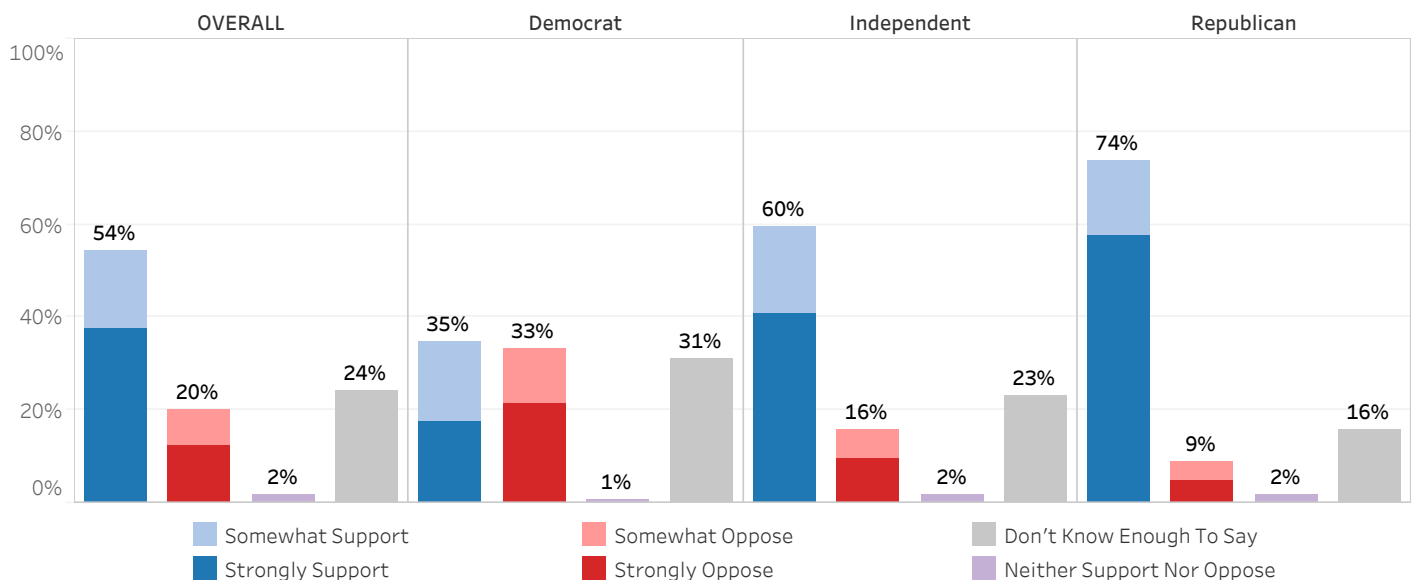
New Hampshire recently passed legislation that requires those who register to vote within 30 days of an election or on Election Day to show proof that they live in the community. If a person cannot provide documentation, they are allowed to vote but must fill out an affidavit swearing to their residency and must provide documentation soon thereafter. If the documentation is not provided, officials are empowered to investigate the individual's residency including visiting their residence.

Just over half (54%) of New Hampshire residents say they strongly support (38%) or somewhat support (17%) this legislation, 20% strongly oppose (12%) or somewhat oppose (8%) it, 2% say they neither support nor oppose it, and 24% don't know enough to say.

Nearly three-quarters (74%) of Republicans and 60% of Independents support this legislation but only 35% of Democrats agree.

Those who voted for Donald Trump or did not vote in 2016, self-described conservatives, those who watch Fox News, and Central/Lakes Region residents are most likely to support this legislation while those who have completed postgraduate work, those who primarily get their national news through newspapers, self-described liberals, and those who voted for Hillary Clinton in 2016 are least likely to support it.

### Granite State Poll Methodology

These findings are based on the latest Granite State Poll, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Nine hundred and fifty-six (956) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed in English by landline and cellular telephone between October 26 and November 9, 2017. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 3.2 percent. These MSE's have not been adjusted for design effect. The design effect for the survey is 1.3%.

The random sample used in the Granite State Poll was purchased from Marketing Systems Group (MSG), Horsham, PA. MSG screens each selected telephone number to eliminate non-working numbers, disconnected numbers, and business numbers to improve the efficiency of the sample, reducing the amount of time interviewers spend calling non-usable numbers.

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of adults and telephone lines within households. Additionally, data were weighted by respondent sex, age, education, and region of the state to targets from the most recent American Community Survey (ACS) conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response. Due to rounding, percentages may not sum to 100%. The number of respondents in each demographic below may not equal the number reported in cross-tabulation tables as some respondents choose not to answer some questions.
