#### WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the inhabitants of the Town of Tilton, in the County of Belknap qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby, notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday the 13th day of March next at 10 o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Town Clerk and Town Treasurer for a term of one year, one Selectman for a term of three years, one Road Agent for the ensuing year, one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years, two Auditors for the ensuing year, and one member of the Park Commission for a term of two years.
- 2. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day expense.
- 3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of Cemeteries.
- 4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of Hospitals.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$108.51, to obtain Town Road Aid, the State to appropriate the sum of \$723.40.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for Civilian Defense.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the use of the Winnisquam Fire Department.
- 8. To see what action the Town will take in regard to care of trees and raise money for same.

- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for new equipment.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for oiling streets.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$416.55, which is 1/100 of 1% of the assessed valuation of the Town, to the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for use in controlling white pine Blister Rust, in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation Commission.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the Tilton-Northfield Recreation Council.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to set aside the sum of \$500.00 per year for the purchase and maintenance of a building for a Community Center.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to paint the Highway Department Garage.
- 16. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Christmas Lighting.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a Cruiser for the Police Department and appropriate money for the same.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a two-way radio for the Police Cruiser, and appropriate money for the same, provided the preceding article is voted.

- 19. To see if the Town will vote as follows: PARK-ING RULES AND REGULATIONS: Section 1. That it shall be illegal to park any vehicle on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday or Saturday between the hours of nine o'clock a.m. and six o'clock p.m., and Fridays nine o'clock a.m. and nine o'clock p.m., except on holidays for a period in excess of two hours on Main Street from Park Street to Mechanic Street. Section 2. Any person violating this ordinance relative to parking time limits shall be charged one dollar (\$1.00) for each such violation. Section 3. If a violator of the parking time limit fails to respond to a notice affixed to a vehicle by bringing such notice to a police station within a period of twenty-four hours, the police department shall send to the owner of the motor vehicle to which such notice was affixed a letter or card informing such violator of the violation with warning that in the event such letter or card is disregarded, the violator shall be subject to a fine of not more than ten dollars (\$10.00) and in the event said charge of one dollar is not paid within seven days such violator shall be summoned to appear in Municipal Court and if found guilty shall be fined not more than ten dollars (\$10.00). Section 4. Proof of ownership of any vehicle in violation of this chapter shall be prima facie evidence that such owner operated such vehicle in violation of this chapter or permitted said vehicle to be operated in violation of this chapter, and in all cases where the owner shall permit another to operate said vehicle, said owner may be charged for any violation of this chapter by such person.
- 20. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to request the State Tax Commission to revaluate all real estate property in the Town on the basis of true market value.
  - 21. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount

on early paid taxes as follows: two percent discount if Tax Bill is paid within thirty days from date of bill.

- 22. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any property acquired by Tax Deed.
- 23. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for all purposes for the year ensuing.
- 24. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the reports of its officers and agents.
- 25. To choose any other officers and agents for the ensuing year.
- 26. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 27. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The polls shall be closed not earlier than 6:00 o'clock in the evening. The business meeting will be held at 8:00 o'clock in the evening.

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### An Appeal from Your Forest Fire Warden

In these days of constantly rising taxes and wages, any unnecessary expense is an added burden on everyone's pocketbook — yours and mine. Forest fires cost money and damage our valuable woodlands. Lightning sets some forest fires, but we have no control of lightning. Children cause many fires. Ninety-eight percent of our forest fires result from human carelessness — our carelessness. This, we — you — and I can do something about.

When we require you to obtain a permit for out-of-doors burning or forbid you to burn on days of high fire danger or set up regulations — hours, etc., governing the use of the town dump we are simply protecting yours and the town's interests.

The ever present threat of forest fires is the concern of all of us; the responsibility for preventing them is ours and the costs of extinguishing are ours. We can do something about this problem, by being aware of and alert to the danger and by cooperating with your warden.

Do the things that are required of you —

- 1. Follow the warden's directions.
- 2. Secure the required burning permit.
- 3. Keep your fires under control.
- 4. Completely extinguish your fires before leaving them.
- 5. See that your children are properly cautioned.

Everyone will benefit by it.

## REPORT OF THE TILTON-NORTHFIELD RECREATION COUNCIL

The sixth year of a recreation program has witnessed able handling by a director who grew up in Tilton, attended local schools and finds his occupation in Tilton, namely William Joscelyn, who took over the reins last March.

An average of 75 swims per day for 36 days were enjoyed last summer under the supervision of James Stone and Harold Harbour, with 65 youngsters completing their courses.

One hundred eighteen boys took part in Little League, minor league and Babe Ruth League baseball, the latter being new this year. Also new this year was girls' softball, which included 25 girls. The sponsors of the Little League teams were Arwood, Brown, Lions, Rotary and Stevens.

There are 50 skiers signed up for the skiing program. There are 160 registered at the Center, which covers general indoor activities, trampoline, and social activities.

Also new this year is a basketball team in the league sponsored by the YMCA in Laconia; 25 boys are included in this activity.

The purchase of a pump of our own, for which we are still raising funds, has helped to improve skating conditions and contributed to the phenomenal success of the first skating party, attended by 200 people, young and old.

The year's financial report indicates again that, although the two towns appropriate \$3,500, our expenses exceed that by at least \$1,000, which is usually made up by contributions. Each year, however, it has become increasingly difficult to collect the difference in the annual fund raising drive. This compels us to request

the full amount from the town, which is the proper source.

In order to prevent any program from dying on the vine, progress is necessary. Both the Recreation Program and the towns would benefit by the acquisition of a Community Center. Besides providing a place for an office for the director, a place to store equipment, meeting rooms for adult and student councils, room for varied activities at one time and indoor activities during the day, a Community Center would be available to all organizations for meetings, socials, etc. Hence, the request for the beginning of a fund for this purpose.

The Recreation Council wants to thank again all who have helped to make this program the success it is.

## REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE HALL MEMORIAL LIBRARY ASSOCIATION

Perhaps the most significant thing to report about the past year at the Hall Memorial Library is the obviously increased use being made of this facility. A check covering an hour-and-a-half period on a day that might be expected to be typical showed 80 children and five adults entering the building during that brief period. Another check made on a different day indicated that 430 of our books were in circulation at that moment. The trustees have been most gratified that the people of our community are using the Library in increased numbers.

It does, however, raise the question for us as to whether we should increase the hours during the week when the Library would be open.

Our book purchasing committee is meeting each month and trying desperately to keep the Library stocked with the best of modern fiction, non-fiction, and children's books.

We are most grateful to the New Hampshire State Library, which offers its facilities to supplement our resources. We are especially happy that their Bookmobile calls in our community every other month. Hundreds of books are put on our shelves from this source. We are also grateful to the State Library for its guidance, advice and its centralized purchasing department.

We are particularly anxious to express our gratitude to the Friends of the Library, an association formed three years ago to stimulate interest and better service in our Library.

The Tilton-Northfield Library Association holds its annual meeting on the first Thursday of May each year. The Trustees are: Dr. Joel E. Nordholm, Chairman; Richard P. Smart, Vice-Chairman; Mrs. Hazel Law-

Thirty-seven trips were made during the year with adults to local doctors.

A preschool child was taken to Laconia Eye Clinic. Another preschool to a child specialist at Laconia Clinic.

A Toxoid and Polio Clinic — ages 4 months through 7 years was held in October, November, and December. There were 42 Triple Toxoids, 55 Polio serum hypos and 32 vaccinations. The clinics were in cooperation with the State Board of Health, Dr. Grevior and Dr. Robinson, the attending physicians, and Mrs. Virginia Knowlton, R.N., the State Preschool Nurse. Assisting at the Clinics were Mrs. Mona Hill, R. N., Mrs. Willa Downar, R.N., Mrs. Lurline McCook, R.N., and Mrs. Marjorie Robert.

Mrs. Lurline McCook substituted for the month of August while the regular nurse was on vacation.

At Thanksgiving the nurse distributed canned goods, nuts, jellies, fruits and fresh vegetables that were donated by the Sunday Schools of the Methodist and Congregational Churches.

The Rotary, Lions Club and the B. P. W. Clubs gave Christmas toys for the school and district nurse to distribute. The teachers of both schools gave money to be used for this purpose.

Dinners were given generously to appreciative families at Christmas Time. Giving of their time and money in this worthy project were the American Legion, the Elks, Odd Fellows and the Salvation Army, also the Future Homemakers who not only gave a generous supply of food products but also many toys to a large family in Northfield.

The Cub Scouts and the Brownie Troop each furnished a basket of canned goods, nuts and candy to be distributed.

In behalf of the District Nursing Association I thank the American Legion for the use of their hall for the use of the Fall Clinics.

At this time it is my opportunity and pleasure to sincerely thank the nursing association, the doctors, the town officials and the citizens of Tilton and Northfield for their fine cooperation, support and kindness shown me in the past year.

- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3a. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years to fill the vacancy arising from the expiration of the term of office of Dr. Archie Grevior.
- 3b. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years to fill the vacancy arising from the expiration of the term of office of William M. Lawrence.
  - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the

school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

# REPORT OF TILTON-NORTHFIELD SCHOOL BOARD

We were very pleased to work with the members of The Study Committee established by the March, 1960 school district meeting, including Richard A. Pucci, Chm., Dorothy A. Atherton, Sec., Dorothy N. Currier, Alfred A. Belair, Norman L. Wiggin, Michael Buczynski, Ernest J. Decato, Anthony G. Gekas.

The sub-committees of the Study Committee and School Board were:

School Building Committee: William Lawrence, Chm., Dorothy Atherton, Dorothy Currier, Alfred Belair, Richard Pucci and Anthony Gekas. School Curricula Committee: Michael Buczynski Chm., Norman Wiggin, Charles Dwinal, Phyllis Yudickey and Dorothy Buswell. Contracts & Finances Committee: Ernest Decato, Chm., Alexander MacGregor, Archie Grevior, M.D.

The Study Committee and the School Board held many meetings before a unanimous report of the joint group was presented to the voters two weeks previous to the vote on the bond issue Wednesday, June 7, 1961. The recommended bond issue was for \$415,000.00 to build an addition to Tilton-Northfield High School including two large industrial arts rooms, two science rooms, a library, a study hall-cafetorium, kitchen facilities, and ten new classrooms.

The joint committee held several meetings with the Sanbornton School Board concerning a contract to educate Sanbornton pupils, met with the Franklin Board concerning a cooperative district, held several meetings with representatives of the State Education Department concerning school needs, temporarily engaged Irving W. Hersey Associates of Durham, N. H. as Architect, met with the Principal and teachers of the high school with special emphasis on science, languages, social studies, mathematics, music, library and study hall

needs, school cafeteria, improvement of physical education facilities, a music room, a mechanical drawing-art room, and two rooms for industrial arts and agriculture.

The regular district meeting was adjourned to Wednesday, June 7, 1961 and after the presentation of sketches of the proposed building and general information, the voters by a resounding 116 to 7 vote, placed in operation a bond issue that will result in meeting the educational needs of Tilton-Northfield for at least ten years. The vote also clearly showed that the people wish to retain complete control of the schools in the hands of their chosen representatives rather than in a cooperative school district controlled by other communities.

The district meeting provided for a Building Committee of three, Richard A. Pucci, Brackett Hill and Ernest J. Decato to work with the School Board. The bonds were sold at an excellent rate and following many meetings, the General Contract was awarded to Winston P. Titus of Laconia. It is expected that the new addition will be in school operation in September, 1962.

We are making a study of the needs to extend the school grounds so that ample roadway and parking facilities are available, so school functions such as graduations, public meetings, music programs, civic and athletic events will not require interested citizens to park on dangerous highways far from the school.

We appreciate that the building allows for expansion and new pupil seating will be purchased as needed. It is expected that the science facilities will be among the best in the state as far as practical education is concerned. The new shop facilities will bring an end to the old six years of woodshop previously in operation. Bids are now being requested for science equipment, mechanical drawing equipment, study hall tables, and industrial arts equipment.

We have purchased from the 1961-62 budget thirty-

five desks and chairs, two sewing machines, an office file, 100 folding chairs for the auditorium, five standard and two electric typewriters, four physical education mats, and seven modern woodworking benches for the shop. We were especially fortunate with our typewriter bids, since unusually low bids allowed us to purchase two additional machines with the money provided. We have also purchased a new baking oven for the Sanborn School Lunch Program.

We express our thanks especially to the Journal-Transcript for its continuous drive to provide scholar-ships for graduates of Franklin High and Tilton-North-field High.

The Women's Club of Tilton-Northfield again sponsored its annual Dental Clinic from funds received from its Outgrown Shop so that a countless number of our children receive dental examinations and dental work. They deserve our deepest appreciation.

We appreciate the annual scholarships to graduates of this area from the Benevolent Order of Elks. We especially thank the Tilton Rotary Club for its new cash scholarships to Tilton-Northfield High graduates. The Ladies Auxiliary of the American Legion is thanked for its new flag presented to our high school.

# REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Members of the School Board:

The Tilton-Northfield School Board continued to establish policies and maintain actions for the best interests of the two towns with the only criteria of "What is the best educational program we can provide for our children without an exorbitant tax rate."

The School Board did the following to improve standards and advance education:

- 1. Worked very cooperatively with the Study Committee on the problem of improving the curricula and the building plant and issued a unanimous joint report that received a 116 to 7 favorable vote from citizens for a \$415,000.00 addition to Tilton-Northfield High School.
- 2. Held over twenty-five extra meetings in addition to regular board meetings to confer with the Study Committee, interview architects, confer with the officials of the State Education Department, hear recommendations from the Principal and Teachers of the school, study educational possibilities with Sanbornton and Franklin, and take action on bids for school equipment and needs.
- 3. Established a new policy on school rings for Tilton-Northfield High School, with a five-year contract to a firm after bids which will result in a much lower price to pupils and prevent the loss of valuable school time conferring with salesmen.
- 4. Adopted a new marking system for Tilton-Northfield High School which uses letters and percentages on the permanent record cards, with complete teacher evaluations. This will help pupils seeking scholastic records with many teachers not available

- for completing credentials. It provides for pupils being divided into A, B, and C divisions based on ability with the curricula adapted to the educational ability of each division.
- 5. Offered the Sanbornton School Board the opportunity of sending Grades 7-12 pupils to Tilton, as requested by Sanbornton two years previously, on a contract basis. Sanbornton decided to meet its needs by a school addition.
- 6. Offered to exchange industrial arts pupils between Tilton-Northfield and Franklin High Schools, so that each community might offer certain courses without duplication of costly equipment.
- 7. Encouraged the Guidance Director to take pupils to college interviews and to follow all graduates in their early years of college.
- 8. Hear special reports from sub-committees of the Study Committee, given by Chairman Michael Buczynski of the School Curricula Committee, Chairman William Lawrence of the School Building Committee, and Chairman Ernest Decato of the Contracts and Finance Committee.
- 9. Received tangible recognition of the steady program for improvement of the school standards when it was announced through the State Education Department that the Class of 1960 at Tilton-Northfield High School sent 57 per cent of its graduates to four-year colleges, with the state average for that year only 27 per cent.
- 10. Authorized James Armstrong, Junior High Mathematics teacher, to serve on a State Committee rewriting the State Syllabus, with one week at Plymouth Teachers College for the work.
- 11. Authorized a Tests and Measurements Course at

- the High School for the upgrading of teacher preparation.
- 12. Approved the entrance of Diane Parks, a senior, in the Betty Crocker Homemaking Contest, where she finished in the first three for New Hampshire.
- 13. Accepted the gift of an executive desk from Alfred R. Belair, to be used in the Superintendent's Office.
- 14. Became the first school district in the state to offer a two weeks course by Professor Kenneth Marrer of Plymouth Teachers College in the use of the new Teaching Machines.
- 15. Authorized and provided a bus for seniors and juniors to visit the New Hampshire Legislature as guests of Representatives Herbert Howe of Tilton and Doris Thompson of Northfield.
- 16. Received notifications from Richard Incerto, Guidance Director, that the school had been honored by certain pupils receiving certificates for their outstanding records in the 1960 NATIONAL EDUCATION DEVELOPMENT TESTS. The winners were: (Juniors) Josephine Shepherd, Roy Wakefield, Elizabeth Jeffries and Joseph Matty. (Sophomores) Wayne Crowley and Robert Hewitt.
- 17. Approved annual Pre-School Registration in the American Legion Hall under the direction of Miss Helen Draper, Principal, and Kathleen Hewitt, School Nurse.
- 18. Held special bids for school wax, with interested companies each completing one room with its product, followed by trial and laboratory analysis. This resulted in a very low price for wax.
- 19. Approved a joint display of projects from the Vocational Arts Department at a local store, with ex-

hibits from the classes of Mrs. Lena McGuire, Home Economics Teacher, Mrs. Barbara Comee, Art Teacher, and Mr. George Phippard, Industrial Arts Teacher.

- 20. Maintained another very successful summer Playground Program under the direction of Mr. James Stone, Physical Education teacher, assisted by Miss Barbara Wheaton and Miss Cindy Emerson.
- 21. Especially proud of the achievement of Miss Josephine Shepherd, a junior at Tilton-Northfield High School, who won outstanding honors for her family, her school, and the school district by being one of the thirty girls to be chosen to attend St. Paul's Summer School, for pupils of very high scholarship.
- 22. Rejoiced with the Shepherd Family when Josephine Shepherd led all boys and girls attending the St. Paul's Summer Session with the highest mark in Calculus.
- 23. Held a public meeting on May 17 for all interested citizens to attend and hear explanations on the proposed building program.
- 24. Approved the first entrance of Tilton-Northfield High pupils in the State Industrial Arts competition, with pupils of Mr. George Phippard receiving many honors, including William Thompson, James Norris, Leo Barton, Stanley Whitcher, Ronald Rollins, George Daniels and John Dunlop.
- 25. Arranged for colored pictorials of the proposed new school to be mailed with the Study Committee and School Board report, to all voters.
- 26. Received a report from Guidance Director, Richard Incerto, that Patricia Patterson, a senior, had received a full scholarship tuition grant from the

- New England School of Accounting and Commerce at Manchester, with the highest honors over a field of 100 candidates.
- 27. Opened bonds on bids for the new school addition on June 13, 1961 with Hornblower & Weeks the low bidder at 3.75 with interest.
- 28. Established special Honors Courses at Tilton-Northfield High School, with the 1960 Division A pupils completing Algebra, Civics, and General Science Freshman subjects in the eighth grade. This will accelerate high school for many pupils with their taking special college credit courses in their senior year.
- 29. Voted to bar pupils from bringing cars to the high school, to conserve parking spaces for workers and teachers, and to improve scholarship.
- 30. Awarded the bid on the new school addition on September 13 to the low bidder, Winston P. Titus of Laconia.
- 31. Approved an Extension Course on Geology for teachers.
- 32. Elected Mr. Ephriam J. Bolduc as Clerk of the Works for the new school addition, to supervise from the interests of the school district the general construction and completion of specifications.
- 33. Accepted with extreme regret the request of Miss Anna Hussey for a leave of absence because of illness. She has been an excellent teacher for twenty-eight years in the Tilton-Northfield Schools.
- 34. Approved very successful Open Houses at the elementary and high schools.
- 35. Approved the addition of Creative Writing, a fourth year of French, Economics and Business

- Law, Electricity, and Mechanical Drawing to the 1962-1963 Program of Studies.
- 36. Completed the 1961-62 year with a balanced school budget.
- 37. Continued to purchase general school supplies, fuel, and equipment with competitive bids.


