**TOWN WARRANT**  
**March 5, 1974**  
**Polls will be open from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.**  
**THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE**

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Weare in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Weare School Gymnasium in said Town on Tuesday, the fifth day of March, next at 10 of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To see if the Town will proceed to elect delegates to the Constitutional convention in accord with L. 1973 - 326:1.

NOTE: In accordance with the vote of Town Meeting of March 6, 1973, Articles 3 through 39 will be taken up at an adjourned session of this meeting on March 7, 1974 at 7 p.m.

3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

- B. Town Officer's Expenses
- C. Elections and Registration
- D. Expense Town Hall and other Buildings
- E. Insurance
- F. Interest
- G. Forest Fires
- H. Health Department
- I. Vital Statistics
- J. Town Dump

- L. Public Welfare
- M. Old Age Assistance
- N. Damages and Legal Expenses
- O. Social Security
- P. Water Holes
- Q. Warning System (Red Network)

4. To make provisions for the collection of taxes.

5. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow on behalf of the Town in anticipation of taxes; said loans to be payable from taxes from the year of 1974 and to issue notes therefore in the name of the Town at such rate of interest and payable at such time and place within one year as the Selectmen may decide.

6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of highways and bridges and take any

other action in relation thereto.

7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the general expenses of the Highway Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,929.22 to be used with the sum of \$12,861.48 to be furnished by the State for Class IV and Class V construction, reconstruction and Betterment Aid or to take any other action in relation thereto.

9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for new equipment for the Highway Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Police Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

11. To see if the Town will vote to establish as an ordinance of the Town of Weare the following:

#### NOTICE OF BUILDING AND PERMIT ORDINANCE

Whereas, to secure the orderly development of the Town of Weare, and for the protection of the public health and safety, the following is hereby adopted as an ordinance in and for the Town of Weare.

No building shall be hereinafter constructed by any person or persons, unless said person or persons shall first file with the Selectmen a notice of intent to build said building, which notice shall contain the general specifications of the proposed building or new construction, its location and intended use, and such other information as the Selectmen may require, and upon the filing of such notice, obtain from the Selectmen a permit for such building.

Upon receipt of the notice by the Selectmen or any one of them, unless the Selectmen make a determination that said building is not in the public interest or in any way jeopardizes the public health or safety, they shall forthwith issue the permit to the person or persons filing the notice, which permit shall be visibly displayed by the person or persons at the site of said construction.

In the event the Selectmen shall make a determination that the proposed building is not in the public interest or in any way jeopardizes the public health or safety, they shall forthwith notify the applicant of such determination and their refusal to issue the permit and the applicant shall, upon request, be granted a hearing before the Board of Selectmen within 15 days from the notice of such refusal, and shall be entitled to all rights of appeal as set forth in New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 36, as if said Board of Selectmen were a Board of Adjustment.

It shall be unlawful for any person to commence construction of any building within the Town of Weare, without having first filed the notice as herein required and obtained the permit as hereinabove set forth. Any person who shall be found guilty of violation of this ordinance shall be fined not more than the maximum amount allowed by the Laws of the State of New Hampshire, and each day such violation shall continue shall be deemed a separate offense.

This ordinance shall take effect upon passage.

12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Fire Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries or to take any other action in relation thereto.

14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Band Concerts or to take any other action in relation thereto.

15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Public Library or to take any other action in relation thereto.

16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day or to take any other action in relation thereto.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the Water Safety Program or to take any other action in relation thereto.

18. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$381.00 for the Concord Hospital or to take any other action in relation thereto.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the Community Nursing Service or to take any other action in relation thereto.

20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, negotiate and do all other things necessary to obtain such Federal, State, or other assistance as may be available in the construction of a sewerage disposal system for the elementary school and the high school according to Phase One as described and recommended in the Engineering Report by Anderson-Nichols, and pass any vote relating thereto.

The above proposed article approved by the Conservation Commission, January 18, 1974.

21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the preparation of plans and specifications for a sewerage disposal system for the elementary school and the high school

according to Phase One as described and recommended in the Engineering Report by Anderson-Nichols, the Selectmen being authorized to arrange for such plans and specifications by that company and take any other action relating thereto.

The above proposed article approved by the Conservation Commission, January 18, 1974.

22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Conservation Commission to transmit the thanks and appreciation of the Town of Weare to the Ford Foundation for its grant of \$2,375 towards payment for the Engineering Report entitled "Report on Necessary Correction of Pollution by Adequate Collection and Treatment of Wastewater at Weare Center."

The above proposed article approved by the Conservation Commission, January 18, 1974.

23. To see whether or not the Town will vote to advise the Selectmen that certain abandoned roads or others not ordinarily maintained, as selected and determined upon recommendation by or consultation with the Fire Chief and Forest Fire Warden as strategic for fire fighting, should be cleared sufficiently to permit access by Fire apparatus.

The above proposed article approved by the Conservation Commission, January 18, 1974.

24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Conservation Commission, the whole or any part of money so appropriated to be placed in the Conservation Fund established by vote of Town Meeting 1971, to accumulate from year to year and money may be expended from said fund by the Conservation Commission for conservation purposes according to Chapter 36A, amended RSA.

The above proposed article approved by the Conservation Commission, January 18, 1974.

25. To see if the Town will vote to amend, effective upon passage, the ordinance regulating trailers by adding thereto the following sections:

1. Section No. B – In determining whether or not a variance shall be granted and before issuing a permit the Selectmen shall consider the effect of the proposed location on the general health and welfare of the town and the neighborhood, also the maintenance of the aesthetics in the neighborhood and the effect on land values of neighboring properties, also the hardship of the party petitioning for the variance.

2. Section No. D – Any person found guilty of violation of this ordinance shall be guilty of a violation and each day any person shall continue to violate the ordinance after notice shall be deemed a

separate violation. (By petition)

26. To see if the Town will vote to adopt as an ordinance for the Town of Weare, the following:

“Whereas it is in the best interest of the Town of Weare that up-to-date records be kept as to new residents and their address, and

Whereas changes in ownership of real estate are reported to the Town by the Registry of Deeds,

Now Therefore, any person who shall rent any quarters for residential purposes within the Town of Weare for a period in excess of thirty (30) days, between January 1st and December 31st of any year, shall report the name and address of the tenant or tenants to the Town Clerk on or before March of the next succeeding year. Any person who shall be found guilty of violating this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a violation.

This ordinance shall be effective upon passage.”

Or to take any other action in respect thereto. (By petition)

27. To see if the Town will vote to require any town agency to report to the Selectmen in writing for publication in Town Reports any donations received, or to take any other action in respect thereto. (By petition).

28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into agreements on behalf of the Town whereby tax relief is granted to a new industry located in the Town of Weare, employing not less than ten (10) persons, provided said agreement shall be for not more than five (5) years and shall not give more than seventy-five (75%) relief of taxes to be paid, the authority to continue until rescinded by vote of the Town, or to take any other action in respect thereto. (By petition)

29. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the purchase of a radar unit for the Police Department, or to take any other action in respect thereto. (By petition)

30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000.00 for the purpose of re-assessing real estate values within the Town; further to authorize the Selectmen to contract on behalf of the Town with the State of New Hampshire or other parties as they deem in the best interest of the Town to accomplish the job, or to take any other action with respect thereto. (By petition)

31. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the collection of real estate taxes on a bi-annual basis, the first payment to be due July 1st and to be one-half (½) of the preceeding years taxes, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (By petition)

32. To see if the Town will vote to promote sanitary waste disposal and to protect fresh water supplies by requiring that any building used for residential purposes and constructed, remodeled or enlarged

hereafter to provide four or more dwelling units shall be on a lot containing not less than two acres for each dwelling unit in the building. (By petition)

33. To see if the Town will vote to designate any of its roads as scenic roads under the provisions of RSA 253 as amended, each such road to be proposed at the meeting and voted upon separately. (By petition)

34. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate to erect a barrier and a gate to the Town Dump, or to take any action in relation thereto.

35. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a committee consisting of a member of the Planning Board, a member of the Conservation Commission, and three other citizens of Weare, to investigate and report to the Town a comprehensive plan for sanitary waste disposal.

36. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts, and/or Federal or State Aid in the name of the Town of Weare.

37. To see if the Town will direct the Selectmen to dismiss the present Civil Defense roster and, with the advice and assistance of the Fire and Police Chiefs and the Captain of the Rescue Squad, make new appointments to Civil Defense. (By petition)

38. To see if the Town will direct the Selectmen to appoint a committee authorized to establish names for all streets, roads and numbered route sections, and have on file at the Town Clerk's Office by September 1, 1974 a map indicating these names. (By petition)

39. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

## RECORD OF TOWN MEETING March 6, 1973

The annual Town Meeting of the Town of Weare was called to order at 10 a.m. by the Moderator, Gordon M. Tiffany. The Moderator announced the polls were open and Articles 1 and 2 of the Warrant were read.

Harold Thomson made a motion that the polls remain open until 8 p.m. Marjorie Eaton proposed an amendment to the motion to keep the polls open until 10 p.m. with the business session beginning at 8 p.m. as stated in an article passed at Town Meeting in 1958. The amendment was accepted by Mr. Thomson. The motion make a motion to adjourn the meeting at 7 p.m. until Thursday, March 8 at 7 p.m. He stated he would accept a motion to table his motion which would enable the business meeting to begin at 8 p.m. and continue until Mr. Wyrenbeck's motion was taken from the table at a later time in the evening. The meeting could then be adjourned until Thursday March 8 at 7 p.m. Marjorie Eaton moved to table Mr. Wyrenbeck's motion until a later time. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative. The meeting would reconvene for business at 8 p.m. with the polls staying open until 10 p.m.

Proceeding to ballot for Town and School District Officers and question (Article 2).

To see if the Town of Weare will vote to take action to have two sessions for the annual Town Meeting in the town, the first session for choice of Town Officers elected by an official ballot and other action required to be inserted on said official ballot and the second session, on a date set by the selectmen, for transaction of other business.

The article was accepted.

At 8 p.m. the meeting was called to order by the Moderator for the business session. The meeting was asked to stand to hear the names of town residents who had died since the last Town Meeting followed by one minute of silence. The pledge of allegiance to the flag was led by Vernon Wood.

The Moderator welcomed all visitors on behalf of the meeting but announced that only registered voters would be allowed to vote. All voters were asked to sit in the center of the auditorium.

The moderator read the following rules of order:

1. Members will address the chair or each other through the chair. There will be no running debate between members.

2. Members will stand and address the audience through the microphone. He will state name and address and use the microphone for his comments.

3. Members who rises first will be recognized. No one will be entitled to speak a second time on the same motion if there are other members who have not been recognized and heard.

4. Member may speak a third time if he has permission of the house.

5. Applause will be kept to a minimum.

Marjorie Eaton, Chairman of the Supervisors of the Checklist, announced that re-registration of voters, which is done every ten years, will be done during the summer. Notices will be posted and voters will be notified before any names are removed from the checklist.

The Moderator announced that the Planning Commission of N.H. had asked to make a documentary film of the Weare Town Meeting.

The meeting was asked at 10 a.m. if there were any objections and, there being none, permission had been granted and the filming was being done.

Volker Wyrenbeck, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, gave a State of the Town address. He received a round of applause at the conclusion.

A motion was made by Edward Gallagher that Mr. Wyrenbeck's speech be published in the Town Report for preservation for the future guidance of the town. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative. The State of the Town address is printed at the conclusion of this Record.

ARTICLE 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Finance Committee recommendation - \$41,050.00. Robert Munro, Chairman of the Finance Committee, moved this amount be accepted. The motion was seconded. Vernon Wood asked for a breakdown of the individual amounts. Mr. Wyrenbeck gave the breakdown as follows:

After some discussion, the vote was taken. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 4. To make provisions for the collection of taxes.

Robert Hyman moved that provision for the collection of taxes be left with the Selectmen. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow on behalf of the Town in anticipation of taxes; said loans to be payable from taxes from the year of 1973 and to issue notes therefore in the name of the Town at such rate of interest and payable at such time and place within one year as the Selectmen may decide.

John Knox moved the article be adopted as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of highways and bridges and take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation - \$35,000 to cover summer and winter roads. Robert Munro moved this amount be accepted and the motion was seconded. William Boisvert of Riverdale asked if there was money included in this amount for resurfacing River Road. Eldon Townes replied that there was money included for this. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the general expenses of the Highway Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation - \$12,000. Robert Munro moved this amount be accepted and the motion was seconded. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,932.80 to be used with the sum of \$12,885.30 to be furnished by the State for Class IV and Class V construction, reconstruction and Betterment Aid or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation - \$1,932.80. Robert Munro moved this amount be accepted and the motion was seconded. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for new equipment for the Highway Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee did not include any sum for this in their recommendations. Eldon Townes moved \$5,000 be appropriated for snow plow replacements. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to designate all roads in the Town, other than Class I and Class II highways, as scenic roads pursuant to RSA 253, as amended.

Robert Hyman moved that the article be dismissed. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative. The article was dismissed.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will designate Duck Pond Road as a scenic road under the provisions of RSA 235, as amended.

Ruth Jones of Duck Pond Road explained that scenic roads had been created to utilize natural and scenic surroundings providing the traveler with unique and beautiful scenery. Mrs. Jones made a motion to accept this article. The motion was seconded.

Gordon Brown asked for information on the amended statute. Mrs. Jones read from the state statute dealing with scenic roads.

The vote was no and the motion was lost.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to designate Mt. Dearborn Road from the Deering Road to Hodgdon Road a scenic road pursuant to RSA 253, as amended.

Neal Kurk told the meeting he had taken a petition to residents of Mt. Dearborn Road and that about 3/4 of the residents signed the petition to make Mt. Dearborn Road a scenic road. He moved the adoption of this article as read. The motion was seconded. The vote was no and the motion was lost.

Mr. Kurk asked for a division vote. The vote was as follows: Yes - 98, No - 132. The vote was no and the motion was lost.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to designate Saw Mill Road, so-called, from the Deering Road to Mt. Dearborn Road a scenic road pursuant to RSA 253, as amended.

Neal Kurk made a motion to adopt this article. The motion was seconded. Chester Rhodenizer asked if a special town meeting would be necessary if the Road Agent wanted to cut down a tree on a scenic road. Mr. Kurk stated a town meeting would not be necessary. There would be a public hearing before the Planning Board. Mr. Kurk then proposed an amendment to the article stating that the people who live on the road or who own property on the road shall pay any costs involved for a public hearing. The amendment was seconded. After some discussion the vote was taken. The vote was no and the amendment was lost.

The vote on Article 13 without the amendment was then ready to be taken. Eldon Townes, Road Agent, stated he would recommend that, if a scenic road is desired by the town, this road be made a scenic road. The vote on Article 13 was taken and the vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to designate Maplewold Road from Mt. William Pont to Mt. Dearborn Road a scenic road pursuant to RSA 253, as amended.

Neal Kurk moved that Article 14 be adopted as read. The motion was seconded. The vote was taken. The vote was no and the motion was lost.

ARTICLE 15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Police Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation - \$7,500. Robert Munro moved the adoption of this amount. The motion was seconded. Frederick Cleveland, Chief of Police, read the budget for the Police Department, which exceeded the previous year's budget by \$500. After considerable discussion, the vote was taken. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town of Weare will vote to adopt as an ordinance of the town the following: "No person shall allow their dog to run at large off the owner's premises unless the same is under their immediate control. Any person found in violation of this ordinance shall be fined not less than \$10.00 and not more than \$25.00", or to take any other action in relation thereto.

George Buxton moved the article be adopted as read. The motion was seconded. Volker Wyrenbeck stated that each year the Town spent money reimbursing owners of domestic animals for dog damage. He felt the Town needed this ordinance.

After some discussion, James Crawford moved to amend the article's second sentence to read: "Any person shall be fined not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$10.00 for the first offense, and not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$15.00 for any subsequent offense." The motion for the amendment was seconded. Following considerable discussion, a standing vote was taken on the amendment. The vote was: Yes - 55; No - 101. The amendment was lost.

The vote on Article 16 as read was taken by standing vote. The vote was: Yes - 135; No - 62. The article was adopted as read.

At 9:45 p.m. the meeting recessed until all present who had not voted had a chance to cast their ballot. At 10:00 p.m. the polls were closed and the meeting resumed.

ARTICLE 17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of a Police Cruiser, 40% of the cost to be furnished by the Federal Government under the National Highway Safety Act or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Robert Munro, Chairman of the Finance Committee, stated that the Committee has not received complete figures on this cruiser. However, since the Police Department had prepared figures at this time, he felt the figures should be considered.

Frederick Cleveland explained the necessity of having a police cruiser. He stated the cost of the cruiser is \$4,700. The Federal Government would pay \$1,880. He moved \$2,820.23 be appropriated

to purchase a new police cruiser. The motion was seconded. After lengthy discussion, the vote was taken. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of police radios for the Police Department, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Frederick Cleveland moved that the article be dismissed. The motion was seconded. The vote was to dismiss the article.

ARTICLE 19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Fire Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation — \$6,500. Robert Munro moved the adoption of this amount. The motion was seconded.

George Welch, Fire Chief, told the meeting that the old fire truck would not be sold but would be housed in the new fire station in the Lake Horace area. He explained the Fire Department budget and also, when requested, explained the new telephone alert system being installed.

The vote on the article was taken. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to accept and maintain as part of the Weare Fire Department the new fire house built by the people in the vicinity of Lake Horace.

Chester Colburn moved the article be adopted as read. The motion was seconded. Mr. Colburn stated there would be no cost to the town in accepting this building except the small cost of maintenance. Harold Thomson stated that the fire station is a beautiful job and made the following motion to amend the article: "provided, however, that the acceptance of said fire house be contingent on the receipt of a Warranty Deed for the piece of land on which it is situated of a size agreeable to the Selectmen". The motion to amend was seconded and Mr. Colburn stated the amendment was agreeable to him. Chief Welch told the meeting that the Board of Fire Wardens have agreed to accept this building as it was built in accordance to the State Board of Underwriters' regulations. The vote was taken on the article as amended. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation - \$1,400. Robert Munro moved the adoption of this amount. The motion was seconded. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to accept Pine Grove Cemetery as a part of the town cemetery system and the Pine Grove Cemetery Trust Funds to be added to the Town Cemetery Trust Funds or to take any other action in relation thereto.



Harold Thomson told the meeting that Pine Grove Cemetery is a corporation formed many years ago by a small group of men as an investment. He gave a short history of the corporation and stated that the members would like to give the Town the cemetery and add the Pine Grove Cemetery Trust Fund to the Town Trust Fund, with the agreement that the money could not be taken from the Trust Fund itself if the Town accepts the article. The corporation must have the assurance that the town will take the cemetery over before they can go further in legal proceedings to dissolve the corporation. Mr. Thomson moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded and the vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Band Concerts or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation - \$400. Robert Munro moved this amount be accepted the motion was seconded. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Public Library or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance committee recommendation - \$1,000. Robert Munro, Chairman of the Finance Committee, explained that there has been a carry-over in the previous year's budget which reduced the recommendation of the Finance Committee to \$1,000, and he moved the adoption of this amount. The motion was seconded. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 25. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation - \$300. Robert Munro moved the adoption of this amount. The motion was seconded and the vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the Water Safety Program or to take any other action relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation - \$200. for the continuance of the Water Safety Program. Robert Munro moved the adoption of this amount. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$383.00 for the Concord Hospital or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation - \$383. Robert Munro moved the adoption of this amount. The motion was seconded. David Souter told the meeting that the hospital Trustees had asked him to explain

what this money is for. The hospital provides a certain amount of free care. At the end of the year, the hospital asks the town to help pay for this free care. Last year the residents of Weare received about \$1,500 worth of free care. The hospital asks that the town pay \$383.—approximately 25% of the amount of care given. The vote was taken and was affirmative.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to encourage its women to be checked annually for cancer at a free clinic to be sponsored by the American Cancer Society each year.

Althea Nunn, Executive Secretary of the N. H. Division of the American Cancer Society made a motion to dismiss the article. The motion was seconded. Helen Kurk asked Mrs. Nunn to explain her reason for wanting the article dismissed. Mrs. Nunn stated that the Executive Vice President of the American Cancer Society felt this should not be brought up at town meeting. It is a personal matter that people should decide for themselves. Mrs. Kurk stated that the American Cancer Society will provide free clinics, films and lectures with professional people in attendance. She would like to know if it is worthwhile to spend her time in arranging this and whether the clinic would be taken advantage of if it is provided.

The vote was taken. The vote was negative and the motion to dismiss the article was lost. A motion was made and seconded to adopt the article as read. The vote was affirmative.

The Moderator recognized Volker Wyrenbeck who made a motion to adjourn the meeting until March 8 at 7 p.m. The motion was seconded. The vote was affirmative and the meeting adjourned at 11:15 p.m.

The ballots were counted. The count was completed at 12:50 a.m.

On March, 1973 the meeting opened at 7:05 p.m. with a moment of silent prayer followed by the pledge of allegiance to the flag led by Vernon Wood. The Moderator expressed his appreciation for the understanding and cooperation at the meeting Tuesday. The Moderator repeated the rules of order. Mr. Douglas Hatfield, town counsel, was introduced.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for a Community Nursing Service or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation - \$1,500. Robert Munro moved the adoption of this amount. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of \$19,416.95 to pay the long-term notes on the fire truck purchased in 1972 in full or to take any other

action in relation thereto.

Harold Thomson explained that the town would save \$3,500 in interest over the next 7 years by using the Revenue Sharing money to pay for the fire truck. Mr. Thomson moved that \$19,416.95 of the Revenue Sharing Funds be withdrawn by the Selectmen from the Concord Savings Bank to pay this note. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$3,000.00 for new equipment in the town office and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Robert Munro, Chairman of the Finance Committee, stated that the Committee agrees with the request for \$3,000 for new equipment for the Town Office. Mr. Munro moved that the Selectmen be authorized to withdraw this amount from the Revenue Sharing Funds. The motion was seconded. After some discussion as to the equipment needed, the vote was taken. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 32. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$16,616.05 for restoration of the Weare Town Hall on a carry-over basis and maintenance and repair of the town office and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Robert Munro, Chairman of the Finance Committee, stated that this sum is the balance of the Revenue Sharing Funds. Mr. Munro made a motion to amend the article as follows: "To provide the Selectmen hold a hearing on the specific type of reconstruction and maintenance prior to the time any contract is given out or work done." The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

Edward Gallagher moved the article be amended as follows: That the Selectmen be directed to fulfill the purposes of this article as amended." The amendment was seconded and the vote was affirmative.

The vote on Article 32 as amended was taken and the vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 33. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the tramp house, so-called, presently located behind the Town Hall.

Wilfred Lahey moved that the tramp house be given to the Weare Senior Historical Society to be preserved for its historic value and interest and that permission be given for such re-location as acceptable to the Selectmen. The motion was seconded. It was called to the attention of the Moderator that the tramp house under this article was to be sold. The Moderator stated that, unless there is an objection, the

tramp house will be sold to the Weare Senior Historical Society for the sum of \$1.00. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town of Weare will vote to authorize the Selectmen to deed to Mr. and Mrs. Robert Pepin land taken from them by tax deed dated September 9, 1972 in consideration of payment of \$998.71 or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Walter P. J. Brennan stated that this decision should be made by the Selectmen under an article voted by the town in 1948.

The Moderator read Article 13, page 6 - Record of Town Meeting, March 9, 1948. He then read Chapter 80, section 42 of the RSA and called attention to the vote of 1948 in which the article stated that the ruling was to remain in effect until it was changed or rescinded at some town meeting. The Moderator ruled that the present article in the Town Warrant would be a modification in that respect, and that the Town Meeting does have the authority to vote upon this article.

After some discussion, Harold Hall moved the article be accepted as written. The motion was seconded. Mr. Wyrenbeck suggested that Mr. Pepin speak to the meeting. Mr. Pepin was asked if he had put an approved septic system on his property. Mr. Pepin replied that he had been refused by 2 or 3 individuals but that he would put the system in himself. The Moderator stated that he understood the answer to the question put to Mr. Pepin was "No".

A paper ballot was taken. The results of the vote: Yes - 103: No - 150. The article was not accepted.

ARTICLE 35. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the Conservation Commission, the whole or any part of money so appropriated to be placed in the Conservation Fund established by vote of Town meeting in 1971, to accumulate from year to year and money may be expended from said fund by the Conservation Commission for conservation purposes according to Chapter 36A, RSA.

Finance Committee recommendation - \$250.00. Robert Munro moved the adoption of this amount. The motion was seconded. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 36. To see whether or not the Town will adopt as an ordinance for the town of Weare, an ordinance entitled

"WASTE FROM  
ANY NEW HAMPSHIRE CITY OR TOWN  
OTHER THAN WEARE"

as recommended by the Conservation Commission:

1. Definition. "Waste matter" means garbage, refuse, solid or liquid waste, ashes, rubbish, industrial and commercial waste, and all other refuse of every description, whether loose, in containers, compacted, baled, bundled, or otherwise.

2. Prohibition. No municipality, person, firm, corporation or other legal entity shall deposit or cause or permit to be deposited, any waste matter as herein defined, in any structure or on any land within the Town of Weare or in the territorial waters of the Town of Weare, which waste matter originated in any New Hampshire city or town other than the Town of Weare.

This section shall not apply to the Weare town dump restricted to refuse from the Town of Weare only, by ordinance adopted March, 1972; and this section is not intended to prevent consideration by the Town of participation in regional disposal facilities according to state law.

3. Exception. Nothing herein shall prohibit the transportation of waste matter into the town for use as a raw material for the production of new commodities which are not waste matter as defined.

4. Penalty. Whoever shall violate the provisions of section 2 shall be liable to punishment by fine of not less than \$50.00 for each offense, to be enforced by complaint of one or more of the Selectmen, and each day that such waste is permitted to remain unlawfully in this Town shall constitute a separate offense.

Edward Gallagher, a member of the Conservation Commission moved that the article be adopted. The motion was seconded. Mr. Gallagher stated that the Conservation Commission recommended this article after considerable study. In 1971, the state legislature provided that no rubbish as described in this ordinance may be dumped in the State of New Hampshire which originated outside of the state. However, there is nothing to prevent Manchester, Nashua, Portsmouth, etc. from buying land in the Town of Weare or elsewhere to use for dumping their rubbish. For the protection of the town and residents, he recommended this ordinance be passed. Mr. Gallagher received a round of applause. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 37. To see if the Town will vote to amend the existing Dump Ordinance (Article 29, 1972 Town Meeting) by adding the following. . .and dumped from vehicles bearing an authorized Town of Weare Dump sticker which shall be issued to any resident upon payment of a fee to be determined by the Selectmen.

George Buxton, a member of the Weare Taxpayers Association, moved the adoption of this article at the request of the Association. The motion was seconded.

James Crawford made a motion to amend the article as follows: "that such fee would not exceed \$2.00." The motion was seconded. Some discussion followed and the vote on the amendment was negative.

George Buxton made a motion to amend the article as follows: "to include any person who owns property in the Town of Weare, including people who rent." There was some discussion concerning the charging

of a fee for the stickers. James B. Craig, Selectman, stated the Town of Weare is not a profit-making organization. Any charge for the town dump stickers would only be to cover the cost of printing.

The amendment of Mr. Buxton's was seconded and the vote affirmative.

An amendment was moved to omit the line relating to the payment of a fee. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

Grenville Clark moved for reconsideration of the amendment with the words changed to "any resident or taxpayer". The motion was seconded. The vote was negative.

Mr. Buxton amended his amendment to read: "any person who owns property in the Town of Weare, including non-resident taxpayers and including people who rent". The vote on the amendment was affirmative. The vote on Article 37 as amended was affirmative.

ARTICLE 38. To see if the Town will vote to direct the Selectmen to start work on the tax map required by RSA 31, as amended and raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 initially for this purpose, with any balance to be carried over to the following year.

Ruth Jones stated this article was sponsored by the Taxpayers Association. Mrs. Jones moved the article be adopted as read. The motion was seconded. Harold E. Thomson, Selectman, spoke on the value of having tax maps. Volker Wyrenbeck asked that townspeople who have their property surveyed could help the town by sending a copy of the survey to the Selectmen's office for the town records. The vote on the article was affirmative.

ARTICLE 39. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 for use by the Weare Planning Board. Portions of this sum being planned for ongoing programs, no fiscal year restrictions on the expenditure of them are included herein.

Finance Committee recommendation - \$450.00. Robert Munro, Chairman of the Finance Committee, moved this article be amended to read \$450.00. The Finance Committee requested the budget be reduced to \$450.00 because \$300.00 of the budget was for tax mapping, and \$1,000.00 was just appropriated for tax maps in Article 38. The motion was seconded. The vote on the amendment was affirmative. The vote on the article as amended was affirmative.

ARTICLE 40. To see if the Town will vote to express its option to establish the size of the Weare Planning Board to be five members.

James B. Craig stated there was no specification as to whether the Board would be 5 or 7 members. He moved to establish the size of the Planning Board to 5 members. The motion was seconded.

William Nunn made a motion to amend to read: "to see if the Town will vote to dismiss the present 5 members and appoint 5 new members who have not served in this capacity on the Planning Board

for the past 5 years. The amendment was seconded.

After lengthy discussion as to whether this amendment was permissible, the Moderator put the question of the amendment to the meeting. A vote was taken and the vote was that the amendment was out of order.

The Moderator returned to the original reading of Article 40. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 41. To see if the Town will vote to establish the Weare Planning Board as the Weare Board of Adjustment to act upon any and all matters that may require the services of a Board of Adjustment.

Robert Hyman moved the article be adopted as read. The motion was seconded. Donald Thomson cited Chapter 36:5 dealing with Planning Boards, which reads that no more than one appointed member may be a member of any other municipal board or commission.

J. L. Nicknair moved to amend the article to read “to see if the Town will vote to establish the Weare Board of Appeals to act upon any and all matters that may require the services of a Board of Appeals, which Board to be composed of 5 members. The motion was seconded.

Vernon Wood questioned whether a Board of Appeals could be established in this manner. The Moderator was advised by town counsel that this is entirely possible. Mr. Hatfield explained the duties of a Board of Appeals.

Mr. Hyman stated that if the amendment to the article would be withdrawn, he would then move that the article be dismissed. Mr. Nicknair declined to withdraw the amendment. The vote on the amendment was negative.

Mr. Hyman stood for the third time. Robert Munro moved to suspend the rules to permit the member to speak for a third time. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative. Mr. Hyman requested the Chair to permit him to withdraw the motion and ask for the dismissal of the article. The vote on dismissal was negative.

Eldon Townes moved to amend the article as follows: “to direct the Selectmen to appoint a Board of Appeals consisting of 5 persons.”

After lengthy discussion, John Trainor moved that the motion be tabled until the end of the meeting. The motion was seconded and the vote to table Article 41 was affirmative.

Jean-Louis Nicknair moved that debate be limited to 2 minutes to each speaker. The motion was seconded. The vote was manifestly yes by 2/3 of the meeting.

ARTICLE 42. To see if the Town will vote to establish as an ordinance of the Town of Weare the following:

#### YEAR-ROUND DWELLING MINIMUM

All year-round dwellings hereinafter constructed or located within the Town of Weare shall have a minimum of 420 square feet. When

such dwelling has more than 2 permanent occupants there shall be an additional minimum of 80 square feet for each additional permanent occupant.

Betty Hyman moved the article be adopted as read. The motion was seconded. The vote was negative.

ARTICLE 43. To see if the Town will vote to establish as an ordinance of the Town of Weare the following:

#### ROAD TURN-AROUND

Any dead-end road, regardless of classification or ownership, that is hereinafter constructed or extended and that serves two or more separate residences or mobile homes shall be equipped with a turn-around roadway at the closed end with a minimum radius of 75 feet maintained from the center to the outside of the right-of-way. Any private driveway that services an individual resident is exempted from this ordinance.

Lawrence McManus moved the article be adopted as read. The motion was seconded.

Eldon Townes moved to amend the article by substituting "30 foot radius" for "75 foot radius". The motion was seconded. A lengthy discussion followed. The vote on the amendment was negative.

The vote on the original article was negative.

ARTICLE 44. To see if the Town will vote to establish as an ordinance of the Town of Weare the following:

#### CONSTRUCTION PERMIT

##### 1. PURPOSE

A. In order to enable the proper listing of all improvements to Real Property in the Town Inventory, this Ordinance is hereby adopted for the Town of Weare: effective upon acceptance at Town Meeting.

B. The listing of any improvement to Real Property will permit the Board of Selectmen of the Town to properly assess such an improvement for tax purposes when appropriate.

C. The issuance of a Construction Permit will enable the enforcement of State Statutes and Town Ordinances relative to such improvements by Town Officials empowered to enforce the same.

##### 2. METHOD

A. Prior to the construction of any improvement to Real Property, except as excepted in this Ordinance, the owner, lessee or agent of either of the same shall make application in duplicate to the Board of Selectmen for a Construction Permit on the form available for this purpose from the Selectmen.

B. Using the legal description of the Real Property as the address, an abbreviated format sufficing; this form shall describe the planned improvement in plain language. Statements shall be included as to the dates of actions necessitated by State Statutes and any existing Town



Ordinances. (In example: Application for a septic system to the New Hampshire Board of Water Pollution Control – 1 July 1972; Percolation Test completed – 2 August 1972; state Board approval of percolation test and septic system installation – 12 August 1972). A \$5.00 filing fee shall accompany the application.

C. Upon receipt of an application, the Board of Selectmen shall verify the accuracy of the statements made on the application. In the event of ambiguities or incorrect data on the application, the Selectmen shall reject the application and return it to the submitter by ordinary mail, stating the reason(s) for the rejection and citing the steps needed to correct the application. The applicant may then submit a new application showing the correct data without any additional fee.

D. When an accurate application is received by the Selectmen, they will endorse the same with an approval, returning the original to the applicant by ordinary mail and retaining the second copy for town purposes. This endorsed application will constitute the Construction Permit. The Selectmen shall issue all approvals no later than 30 calendar days from receipt of the accurate application. Compliance with existing Statutes and Ordinances relevant to the application shall be prima facie evidence of entitlement of the applicant to a Construction Permit cannot otherwise be withheld.

### 3. EXEMPTIONS

A. Exempted from the provisions of this Ordinance are: Improvements with a value of less than \$100.00; except that an improvement cannot deliberately be broken down into small parts for the purpose of Ordinance contravention.

B. Further exempted are: repairs of any nature where the original configuration of the improvement has not changed. Included in these but not limiting them thereby, are; painting and decorating; re-roofing a building; replacing windows, floors, siding; re-arranging interior partitions or replacing doors.

C. Also exempted are: installation of fences; timbering operations; contouring farm land currently in use for that purpose or clearing streams and waterways.

D. Further exempted are any and all improvements that would not affect the assessed value of the Real Property for tax purposes when such an improvement is instituted.

E. Any improvement in existence or already started on the date of approval of this Ordinance is exempted as well.

### 4. COMPLIANCE

A. It shall be unlawful for any person to institute the construction of any Real Property improvement unless exempted as above, without first applying for and being issued a Construction Permit.

B. The applicant shall have 2 calendar years from date of approval

of the Construction Permit to complete the improvement shown within it. The applicant may renew the expiration date of the Construction Permit by application to the Selectmen. This may be done for one or more 2 year periods when completion within any 2 year period is impractical. The Selectmen shall renew such permits routinely. No additional fee shall be charged for this.

C. The applicant shall notify the Board of Selectmen of the completion of the construction. The Selectmen may inspect the improvement to verify its compliance with any applicable Statutes and Ordinances. Upon satisfaction that the improvement is in compliance with the application for the same, the Selectmen will endorse an approval in the appropriate part of the Permit. The entry of the improvement in the Town Inventory and/or the property card of the parcel of Real Property as of the approval date shall constitute the legal record of approval.

D. Any person who commences the physical construction of any improvement to Real Property, other than preliminary work such as surveying, building plot location, septic system percolation testing, or well location without first obtaining a Construction Permit shall be in violation of this Ordinance and shall be fined not more than \$50.00. Each day of active work on such an improvement without prior permit shall constitute a separate offense. No construction Permit shall subsequently be issued by the Board of Selectmen until the appropriate fines and subsequent costs are paid to the Town of Weare. (by petition)

Robert Munro moved the reading of the article be waived to save time. The motion was seconded. The Chair declared the vote was more than 2/3 in favor and dispensed with the reading of the article.

Robert Hyman moved the article be adopted as written . The motion was seconded. James Craig, Selectman, explained why this Construction Permit would be of value. The vote on the article was negative.

A division vote was called for. The vote was: Yes - 120; No - 138. The article was lost.

ARTICLE 45. To see if the Town will vote to establish as an ordinance of the Town of Weare the following:

#### SUB-DIVISION REGULATIONS

##### 1. PURPOSE

A. These sub-division regulations are established upon acceptance of them at Town Meeting of the Town of Weare so as to establish an orderly pattern for the growth of the Town of Weare through sound land use.

B. These regulations are not intended to be unduly restrictive to the establishment of any sub-division that will meet the requirement of rational growth for the Town of Weare on land that is suitable for the

intended purpose.

C. There are no rights, privileges or discretionary powers reserved by the Weare Planning Board except as stated herein and as stipulation in the New Hampshire Revised Statutes, as appropriate.

## 2. GENERAL

A. A sub-division is defined as any parcel of land that is divided into 2 or more adjoining pieces and offered for sale or lease.

B. The offering for sale of any individual piece of property, regardless of size and regardless that it may be part of a larger parcel, does not come within the scope or purpose of these regulations.

C. The state definition of Class V roads is, "Class V highways shall consist of all other traveled highways which the town has the duty to maintain regularly and shall be known as town roads." The minimum standards established for Class V roads that may be constructed in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance are as follows:

1. The deeded right-of-way shall have a minimum of 50 feet.

2. The maintained road surface shall have a minimum of 24 feet.

3. The maintained road surface shall be stabilized and maintained in such condition.

4. Adequate culverting shall be provided when the roadway covers any drainage course.

5. A minimum grade of 1% shall be maintained where practical to permit adequate drainage.

6. A maximum grade of 9% shall be maintained unless the topography precludes such a minimum from a practical point of view. The maximum grade shall not exceed 12% under any circumstances.

7. The maintained road surface shall be crowned  $\frac{1}{4}$  inch to the foot from the centerline of the road.

8. All curves shall be adequately banked for the radius of the curvature and the intended legal vehicular speed.

9. All curves shall have a minimum radius of 500 feet from the center to the outside of the right-of-way except when such a curve is a corner within the limits of the sub-division. In that event, the minimum radius shall be 75 feet from the center to the outside of the right-of-way.

10. All bridges, causeways and deep fills on such a road shall have adequate railings and supports

for the safety of the users of the roadway.

D. The state definition of Class VI roads is, "Class VI highways shall consist of all other existing public ways, and shall include all highways discontinued as open highways and made subject to gates and bars, and all highways which have not been maintained and repaired by the town in suitable condition for travel thereon for five successive years or more." The minimum standards established for Class VI roads

that may be constructed in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance are as follows:

1. The deeded or utilized right-of-way shall have a minimum of 50 feet.

2. The maintained road surface shall be stabilized and maintained in such condition with a minimum of 18 feet.

3. Adequate culverting shall be provided when the roadway covers any drainage course.

4. A minimum grade of 1% shall be maintained where practical to permit adequate drainage.

5. The maximum grade shall not exceed 12%.

6. The maintained road surface shall be crowned  $\frac{1}{4}$  inch to the foot from the centerline of the roadway.

7. All curves shall be adequately banked for the radius of curvature and the intended vehicular speed.

8. All curves shall have a minimum radius of 75 feet maintained from the center to the outside edge of the right-of-way.

9. Adequate railings and supports shall be provided at all points where needed for the safety of the users of the roadway.

E. All sub-dividers must obtain a surety bond from a bonding company licensed in New Hampshire to ensure their compliance with the provisions of this ordinance with respect to road construction. Upon acceptance of the completed roads by the Town, the sub-divider may apply to the Board of Selectmen for release from such a surety bond.

### 3. REGULATIONS

A. The Town of Weare has the responsibility to ensure fire and police protection to all inhabitants and property of the town. Therefore, to enable the town to perform these functions, all private roads planned for use in any sub-division shall meet the purposes of Class VI highways as defined by the State of New Hampshire, and be constructed in accordance with the minimum standards of construction established in this ordinance. It is clearly to be understood that any and all Class VI highway so constructed or utilized for any sub-division shall remain private roads with the maintenance, culverting, snow removal and resurfacing or restabilizing as required the responsibility of the owner of the roads so as to remain in accordance with the herein established standards of Class VI highways in order for the Town of Weare to have ingress and egress for purposes of fire protection and for police purposes.

B. Any roads that are constructed or altered with the intention of transferring title of same to the Town of Weare shall meet the purposes of Class V highways as defined by the State of New Hampshire. Any roads previously constructed as Class VI highways for private retention

in a sub-division, or prior ungraded roads must be upgraded to Class V status as established herein prior to offering the same to the Town of Weare for acceptance as Public Ways.

C. It will be the duty of the Town Road Agent to verify that any road meets the classification claimed by the sub-divider. In the event that road classification cannot amicably be agreed upon by the sub-divider and the Town Road Agent, the services of an appropriate competent individual in the New Hampshire Highway Department may be solicited to resolve the problem of road classification. The determination by such a State Employee will be final. Any costs incurred in such an adjudication will be met by the sub-divider.

D. Any dead-end road developed as part of a sub-division, regardless of its classification shall be equipped with a turn-around roadway at the closed end with a minimum radius of 75 feet maintained from the center to the outside edge of the right-of-way.

E. This ordinance refers only to roads that are developed as part of a sub-division. There is no intent to prevent any land owner or lessee from construction any kind of temporary or permanent road that he may desire for his own private purposes except as otherwise may be provided in law.

F. The problem of sanitary waste disposal and the obtaining of fresh water has been recognized by the state, and minimum standards and separation of these functions stipulated in the appropriate statutes. In order to prevent cross-pollution of adjoining properties in a sub-division, the minimum lot size of any parcel of land in a subdivision and suitable for sanitary waste disposal shall be one acre. Further, each parcel shall have a minimum road frontage of 100 feet, as measured in a straight line.

#### 4. PROCEDURES

A. Any individual who intends to sub-divide any land shall prepare a plat for the sub-division. This plat shall show the boundaries of the individual lots, any roads to be constructed annotated by classification, any ponds and permanent waterways within and also within 1000 feet of the planned sub-division and all of the other information required by the Register of Deeds of Hillsborough County. This plat may be a preliminary one and so-marked. If preliminary, two copies of the plat shall be submitted to the Weare Planning Board. If the plat meets the requirements of these regulations and all of the pertinent state statutes, the Weare Planning Board will annotate an approval on one copy of the plat and return it to the sub-divider within 30 days of its receipt by the board. Any minor revisions to the plat are discretionary with the sub-divider and need not be reported to the Weare Planning Board at this time.

B. The filing of a preliminary plat by a sub-divider is discretionary

on his part. Accordingly, a plat may be submitted to the Weare Planning Board as a final plat, although no preliminary plat was ever so-submitted. A final plat, whether an original submission, or whether a final version of a preliminary plat as revised, shall be prepared in accordance with the standards previously stated herein and shall be submitted to the Weare Planning Board in 3 copies. If this final plat meets the requirements of these regularions and all of the pertinent state statutes, the Weare Planning Board will annotate an approval on 2 copies of the same. One copy will be sent to the Register of Deeds of Hillsborough County for informational purposes only. The second copy will be returned to the originator within 30 days of its receipt by the Board. The developer may then submit this approved copy of the plat to the Register of Deeds of Hillsborough County for recording.

#### 5. ADJUSTMENTS & EXCEPTIONS

A. It is a possibility that the intended land use in a sub-division may fall within the spirit and intent of these regulations and yet fall short of meeting them. Further, strict conformity to these regulations could cause undue hardship or injustice to the established owner of the land.

B. In an event, such as above, the developer may prepare a preliminary plat of the intended sub-division and submit the same and all supporting documents at a public hearing that will be held by the Weare Planning Board sitting and acting as a Board of Adjustment as defined in the Statutes of the State of New Hampshire.

C. Within 30 days of such a hearing, the Weare Planning Board will publish its findings and decision to the request for exception.

D. All expenses, including advertising and publishing, connected with such a hearing shall be met by the petitioner.

#### 6. ENFORCEMENT

A. It shall be unlawful for any individual to offer for sale any parcel of land within an unapproved sub-division.

B. The fine for such an unlawful act shall not exceed \$500.00 for each violation.

C. The Weare Planning Board may not approve any subsequent plat submitted for approval until such assessed fine and any subsequent costs have been paid to the Town of Weare.

D. At the request of the Weare Planning Board, the Board of Selectmen shall expeditiously obtain an injunction to prevent a sub-divider from violating the provisions of this ordinance. The costs involved are to be borne by the sub-divider. (by petition)

James Craig moved the reading of the article in its entirety be waived to save time. The motion was seconded. The Chair declared the vote was more than 2/3 in favor and dispensed with the reading of the article.

Raymond Rogers moved the article be adopted as printed. The motion was seconded. A lengthy discussion followed. Many spoke in favor of the article. Volker Wyrenbeck told the meeting the town is under a siege of development. There are fourteen new sub-divisions with 226 saleable lots. Moved to amend the article, Section 3, part F to read "and suitable for sanitary waste disposal shall be two acres". The motion was seconded. Eldon Townes stated he would rather see 200 foot frontage rather than 100 foot frontage and moved to amend the article to read thus. Mr. Wyrenbeck stated he would accept this amendment to his amendment. The motion was seconded. The vote on the amended amendment was affirmative.

Lawrence McManus made a motion to delete Section 5, Parts B, C and D. The motion was seconded. After lengthy discussion, the Chair ruled that the amendment to delete sections B, D and D in Section 5 was in order.

Neal Kurk moved to amend the amendment by deleting the words "Weare Planning Board sitting and acting as a" and substituting "Weare" in Section 5 - B; by substituting "Weare Board of Adjustment" for "Weare Planning Board" in Section 5 - C; leave Section 5 - D as printed. The motion to amend was seconded. The vote on the amendment was affirmative. The vote on Article 45 as amended as affirmative.

The Chair stated a request for a secret ballot had been made. Three signers of the request asked to have the request for a secret ballot withdrawn.

David Schartner moved that we reconsider Article 45. The motion was seconded. The vote was taken and the Chair stated that there are more than 2/3 who do not wish to reconsider. The motion to reconsider was lost.

John Trainor moved to take Article 41 from the table. The Chair stated the situation. An amendment has been made and seconded to vote to direct the Board of Selectmen to appoint a Weare Board of Adjustment consisting of 5 members. The vote on the amendment was affirmative. The Chair stated that this amendment is a substitute for Article 41.

ARTICLE 46. To see if the Town will vote to establish as an ordinance of the Town of Weare the following:

#### BUILDING HEIGHT LIMITATION

All buildings hereinafter constructed, located or altered within the Town of Weare shall be limited to two stories and attic above ground level.

Volker Wyrenbeck moved this article be adopted as read. He advised that the Town would need a hook and ladder if building height went to higher than 2 floors and attic above the ground. The motion

was seconded. After a short discussion, the vote was taken on Article 46. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 47. To see if the Town will vote to establish as an ordinance of the Town of Weare the following:

#### MOBILE HOME INVENTORY

1. Mobile homes entering mobile home courts or parks shall be registered by the park owner with the Town Clerk within seven days of arrival in order to be properly entered on the town tax records.

2. Mobile home park owners shall supply a listing of all mobile homes and the owners of the same to the Town Clerk not later than 15 April each year as of 1 April of the same year.

A motion to adopt the article as read was made. The motion was seconded. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 48. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to re-appraise the Town.

Robert Munro moved to dismiss the article until after a tax map has been prepared. The motion was seconded. After considerable discussion, the vote was taken. The vote was affirmative and the article was dismissed.

ARTICLE 49. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and direct the Selectmen to appoint a standing committee to study the desirability of establishing one or more historic districts in the Town and to propose the establishment of specific districts, if found desirable, pursuant to RSA 31, at the 1974 town meeting, the committee to consist of one selectman, one historical society member, one junior historical society member, one conservation commission member, one planning board member and two members-at-large.

Gordon Ferguson moved that the article be adopted as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 50. To see if the Town will vote that any mobile home hereafter located or relocated in a mobile home park shall be at least 150 feet from any other mobile home in such park.

Volker Wyrenbeck moved that the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. There was lengthy discussion regarding the number of feet specified in the article. After three amendments had been made, the Moderator recessed the meeting for a short period to clarify the situation. When the meeting resumed, a motion was made to amend the article to read: "Any mobile home hereafter located or relocated in a mobile home park shall be at least 50 feet side to side and 100 feet back to back from any other mobile home in such park. An exception can be made by the Selectmen." The amendment was seconded and the vote on the amendment was affirmative. The vote was then taken on the amended article and the vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 51. To see if the Town will vote that, in order to protect



its inhabitants' safety and its own economic viability, all dwellings, including mobile homes, hereafter constructed, located or relocated within the Town shall be at least 500 feet from any other dwelling, except that to avoid excessive hardship to an individual the Selectmen may, after a public hearing, reduce such distance. Mobile homes located in authorized mobile home parks are excepted from this ordinance.

Volker Wyrenbeck moved the article be dismissed. The motion was seconded. The vote was affirmative and the article was dismissed.

ARTICLE 52. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Robert Munro moved that the Town vote to establish a Capital Budget Committee composed of five members for a term of 3 years to study the town's present and future building and equipment needs and to make its recommendations to the Town at a future Annual or Special Town Meeting. The motion was seconded. The vote was affirmative.

John Trainor moved to reconsider Article 37. There was no second.

It was moved and seconded to adjourn the meeting. The vote was affirmative and the meeting adjourned at 1:10 a.m.

Edward Gallagher asked the meeting for a rousing vote of applause for Gordon M. Tiffany, Moderator.

## STATE OF THE TOWN ADDRESS March 6, 1973

The Town of Weare is experiencing a growth pattern that is likely to double in the next five years. In 1972, the Selectmen assessed new properties in the amount of \$638,220 at 61%, or a little more than \$1,000,000 at 100%, a 6.9% increase over 1971. The 1971 increase was \$326,855, a 3.7% increase over 1970. In the preceding five year period from 1967 to 1972, there was a 24% increase of assessed valuation.

During this five year period, your tax rate at \$2.86 per \$100 in 1967 increased to \$4.30 per \$100 in 1972. A whopping 50% increase due largely to increases in the school budget, but without any new construction. The total school-town budget rose from \$227,325 in 1967 to \$404,710 in 1972, a 78% increase. The school budget alone rose from \$179,138 in 1967 to \$352,589 in 1972, a staggering 97%.

These figures indicate the start of a development pattern true in many communities but most important to us since we are the principals destined to finance the future of this important business, "The Town of Weare". Prudent government and efficient management will be useless without controlling dangerous growth patterns that could result from an open back door. Therefore, it is imperative to plan our future development of our real estate assets from which we finance our business from the source of taxes. No business can run successfully without building up its assets and collecting its receipts. Proper land management and future planning are most important to the success of this town's basic tax structure. You as taxpayers are all partners in the business, you all own a piece of the action whether you accept it or not.

Lack of planning encourages waste of land, water, forest and tax revenue. It also can possibly close forever the chance to realize this town's best growth potentials. Poor planning will destroy the farmer, whom we depend on for the essentials in life. He will be hard pressed to give up his assets for the pressure of higher taxes burdened upon him by higher costs of community services. The aged will lose their homes since pensions and savings don't increase as rapidly as town expenses. Has your savings or pension increased 50% as your tax rate has in the last five years?

You, as taxpayers, will not be able to determine your own futures because of new pressures brought in by possible unscrupulous development causing higher expenses from acceptance of new roads, added school populations, increased police and fire protection and a possible soaring welfare cost. Remember, it's a possibility that a new fifty-house development could bring a hundred voters to this town meeting and force the town to accept a system of roads that could

cause a great expense to the taxpayers from inferior construction and a minimum size.

The Constitution of the State of New Hampshire provides us with the power to protect our community as stated in the following excerpts:

ARTICLE 2. All men have certain natural and inherent rights among which are the enjoying and defending life and liberty, acquiring and possessing and protection property.

ARTICLE 3. When men enter into a state of society they surrender up some of their natural rights to that society in order to ensure the protection of others.

ARTICLE 12. Every member of the community has a right to be protected by it in the enjoyment of his life, liberty and property; he is therefore bound to contribute his share in the expense of such protection and to yield his personal service when necessary.

These articles stress the fact that the freedom we have is also the responsibility to defend and protect our assets.

New Hampshire has 234 municipalities. 1967 records indicated 107 municipalities had zoning ordinances, 95 building regulations and 89 subdivision regulations. 1972 records show that 145 municipalities have zoning, 145 subdivision regulations, and 106 building regulations. "Weare has none."

Do these figures indicate that 61% of New Hampshire communities knew what is about to happen? Are these 61% giving up their personal freedoms to benefit others? Are selfish eyes and personal ambitions to profit from others the target of that 61% or are they aimed into the remaining unprotected 39%. Remember, Weare is a part of that unprotected 39% waiting with open arms.

In 1972 alone, there were 14 subdivisions approved by the State in Weare resulting in 226 saleable lots. Water Pollution Control approvals doubled over 1971. New registered voters in 1972 numbered 132. Real Estate transfers increased from 119 in 1968 to 182 in 1972, a 53% gain in five years.

Mobile homes increased from 49 in 1968 to 160 in 1972, a 226% gain in four years. Due to the fact that out of the taxes assessed per dwelling, dollar for dollar the average house picks up 74% and the mobile home 26%. Is this beneficial to our tax structure? To pay the expenses of the town, do we desire more mobile homes at the average assessment of \$3,505, or is a house at the average assessment of \$9,992 more attractive? To pay the expenses of the town, do we desire some small light industry or commercial property that doesn't add to the tax burden but reduces it?

Whatever the best revenues are they should be included in a unique planning package that would keep our tax rate stable without being

detrimental to the environment and beauty of this community. Also, this future planning should set guidelines of lot size so that population density won't dictate undue expenses or hardship upon taxpayers not using services required by a select few, such as sewage disposal or public water systems.

It is time to face the facts, your individual freedom is endangered by the lack of proper protection to insure progressive growth and development. You, as taxpayers and voters, have the responsibility to determine the future of the Town of Weare. You can be the vital forces to prevent it from becoming a dumping ground for society. You can cause it to be a profitable business venture with personality. You will solely be responsible for its growth, good or bad. Other communities that can't unite and resolve their differences through their own discipline to form a respected environment will extend their blessings of praise and admiration to you.

Only you can make it fly.

**RECORD OF SPECIAL TOWN MEETING**  
**September 28, 1973**

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Gordon M. Tiffany at 7:38 p.m. A moment of silence, during which the Moderator asked that Sarah Buxton, oldest resident of the town who passed away recently, be remembered, was followed by the pledge of allegiance to the flag led by James B. Craig.

The Moderator recognized the work Harold E. Thomson, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, has done so that Weare is among one of the first towns in the State to act in regard to the flood emergency grants. The Moderator read the petition filed with and granted by Judge Waugh of the Superior Court giving permission to hold the Special Meeting. The Warrant was then read by the Moderator.

ARTICLE 1. To see if the Town will vote to apply for, receive and expend the sum of money allocated under the Federal Disaster Assistance Program in the amount of \$5,206.63 to repair the damage done to town roads by the heavy rains and floods during July and August of 1973 or to take any other action in relation thereto.

The Moderator explained that the Town has to indicate (1) that it wishes to apply for these funds, and (2) that the funds will be used as specified.

A motion was made by Harry Chase to adopt the article. The motion was seconded. Ruth Jones asked how the amount was arrived at. It was explained that Federal agents designated to administer the funds visited the town and looked at the road damage. The determination of the amount in Article 1 was by the Federal authorities. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to accept planned use report of Revenue Sharing Funds for the third (3rd) entitlement period from January 1, 1973 to June 30, 1973 as follows:

Public Safety	\$ 6,000.
Tax Maps and related expenses	10,000.
Public Transportation-General Expense-Highway	3,000.
Health Department	2,000.
Financial Administration	2,090.
Total	\$23,090.

or to take any other action in relation thereto.

The Moderator explained this was not to appropriate or increase funds that were already appropriated at the March Town Meeting.

Marjorie Eaton asked for an explanation of the term "public transportation". Selectman James Craig explained that the Highway Department would have to be listed under this category on the forms provided by the Federal Government.

Richard Hunter moved the article be adopted as read. The motion was seconded.

Ruth Jones asked for an explanation of "financial administration". The Selectmen explained that legal expenses, advertisement of legal notices in newspapers, clerical services, etc., could be included in this category of financial administration.

Harold Thomson told the meeting he hoped to be able to apply these amounts to the appropriations which were passed at the March town meeting for the several departments involved in order to keep the tax rate down for 1973. If the Tax Commission rules this cannot be done, the amounts would be applied toward 1974 appropriations. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 3. To transact any other business that may lawfully come before the meeting.

As there was no further business, the article was considered to be dismissed.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was made by Malcolm Purington. The motion was seconded and the meeting adjourned at 7:58 p.m.

# ANNUAL REPORT of the WEARE POLICE DEPARTMENT

The Weare Police Department received 1,210 calls during the past year; 615 of the calls were received on the Police line (529-2323), the remainder (595) were direct calls to the Chief and other officers. Calls handled covered a wide range of activities—information, assistance to stranded motorist, larceny, breaking and entering, missing persons, lost persons, assaults, assistance to other departments, auto accidents and a variety of other motor vehicle complaints making a total of 1,518 hours worked and 16,900 miles traveled.

Forty-three auto accidents were reported, which is one less than the number reported in 1972.

This department had 45 court cases in 1973. Juvenile complaints and larceny were some of the cases, but the majority consisted of motor vehicle violations.

This past year, we purchased our first Police cruiser. All our officers now have a plainly marked, fully equipped Police vehicle for patrolling and handling of complaints. We wish to extend our thanks and appreciation to the townspeople for providing this vehicle. We have had many compliments from other police agencies, and receive more respect from the general public.

Dog complaints were reduced by a large percentage due to the leash law passed at last year's town meeting, but there are still many dogs running at large. Once again, we ask the residents of Weare to please adhere to this town ordinance.

Once again, we have had a large number of breaks at summer camps and out-of-the-way summer homes. A large number of these breaks are not discovered for quite some time, thus making the apprehension more difficult of the persons responsible.

This coming year, we hope to establish weekday patrols as well as weekends, providing we have the necessary funds and have no difficulty obtaining gasoline.

This spring, the New Hampshire Police Standards and Training Council has scheduled a school for part-time police officers. It is my hope that all of our personnel will be able to attend. Hopefully, we will be able to make other arrangements with the New Hampshire State Police and Hillsborough County sheriff's Department for further training.

In closing, I would like to request all residents of Weare to please observe any unfamiliar vehicles or persons in their area and, if possible, to copy down the registration number and call this department at once! Thank you.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WEARE FIRE DEPARTMENT

Thirty-five alarms were answered during 1973, which is about average in Weare. Three building fires, 5 chimney fires, 2 defective stoves, 1 car fire, 1 electrical fire in a partition, 1 false alarm and 9 brush and grass fires.

There were 9 calls to the town dump due to dryness and the State ban which meant dump fires had to be controlled.

Home fire in Weare: The losses were quite large and covered by insurance. A fire in Deering was believed caused by a chimney fire earlier in the day. The total losses were very little with very little insurance.

Most of these fires were caused by carelessness in one form or another.

The brush and grass fires were somewhat higher due to the dryness of the season and one brush fire was of suspicious nature.

A number of Mutual Aid calls to other towns were answered.

The new Fire House at the Colburn Cottage area (Lakeview) with old Number 4 tanker proved very useful in two fires in that area with the complement of men in the area who take care of that Fire Station. As you recall, this new fire station was deeded to the Town of Weare at the last town meeting.

The Fire Department answered a few requests from organizations in the Town to talk on fire and rescue activities. The Fire and Rescue Department put on a demonstration at the elementary school for Fire Prevention Week in October.

The Weare Fire Department held several drills during the year. The Basic Fire Training Course was held every Wednesday night for three hours for a period of 2½ months and was well attended by the men of the Fire Department.

The men of the Weare Fire Department went to the Concord Fire Department for a Sunday fire drill and a basic course at the drill yard.

General maintenance was done to all Fire Department vehicles where the budget would allow. Painting and repairs were done where needed, driveways were paved and new batteries were purchased for Engine No. 2 and Engine No. 3. A new furnace was installed in Engine No. 3 Fire Station at Sugar Hill. The work was done by the men of the Fire Department at little or no cost to the Town of Weare.

Two new Scott air packs and extra air bottles were purchased plus a few net hats, coats, helmets and pairs of gloves and boots.

Wood stoves have been put into operation and the wood was cut by the men in the Town Forest. The use of the wood will relieve the consumption of oil due to the Energy Crisis.



Red Network calls in Weare for the year of 1973 numbered about 342. Rescue calls numbered 82, calls for Police on the Red Network numbered 100 plus. Calls for information, public service, Town Clerk and wrong numbers totaled 85. It might be well to note that false alarms are just as hazardous as if it were the real thing.

Many hours were put in by Rescue Squad members. Now, under new State laws, two licensed attendants shall be on rescue vehicles on every call. Drivers do not have to be licensed. There are 17 duly licensed men, as well as the Department and the vehicle. Every year on September 1, these licenses have to be procured. The cost is \$25.00 a year.

Several members of the Rescue Squad are taking a new course called Emergency Medical Technician Course which is being given at Henniker this Spring.

As a reminder, it is unlawful to burn without a permit from the Forest Fire Warden when the ground is not covered with snow.

As another note, State and Federal Laws that come under the duties of the Fire Department and the chief are as follows:

(1) No person shall use or allow to be used a portable wick type heater in any building which is used in whole or in part for human habitation. Whosoever violates the provisions of this section shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$100.00

(2) No person shall install or use in any building which is used in whole or in part for human habitation an unvented space heater which uses gas or oil as fuel. Whosoever violates any provision of this section shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$100.00.

(3) Whosoever desires to install any fuel oil burner shall first make application to the Chief of the Fire Department and obtain a permit therefore.

Upon receipt of an application for the installation of an oil burner, the Chief of the Fire Department shall grant a temporary permit authorizing such installation.

Upon completion of the installation, the temporary permit shall be cancelled, and provided that all rules contained in this regulation have been complied with, the Chief of the Fire Department shall issue a permit for the storage of oil and the operation of the equipment.

Remember, this is a State and Federal Law—it is not a Town Ordinance.

## REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

The New Hampshire Forest Fire Service is represented in every town, city or unorganized place in our State by the forest fire warden. Anyone wishing to kindle an outside fire when the ground is not covered with snow must first obtain the written permission of the fire warden. Except for cooking fires, no fire can be kindled between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. unless it is a commercial or industrial burn or it is raining. The fire warden is assisted in his work by the District Forest Fire Chief who works for the Department of Resources and Economic Development Forest Fire Service.

Fire prevention was, again this year, the most important part of the Forest Fire Warden's job. Fire statistics show the need with 72% of the fires caused by smoking, debris burning and children. Smokey the Bear is an important prevention tool but he still needs much help from the public. Parents should warn their children of the hazards of playing with matches. Children tend to forget that a lighted match held in their hand is a potential forest fire.

## REPORT OF THE HISTORIC DISTRICT COMMITTEE

RSA 31:89-a states: "The preservation of structures and places of historic and architectural value is hereby declared to be a public purpose. The heritage of the municipality will be safeguarded by (a) preserving a district in the municipality which reflects elements of its cultural, social, economic, political and architectural history; (b) conserving property values in such district; (c) fostering civic beauty; (d) strengthening the local economy; (e) promoting the use of an historic district for the education, pleasure and welfare of the citizens of the municipality."

The standing committee recognizes the desirability of establishing one or more Historic Districts in the Town of Weare pursuant to RSA 31:89. Nevertheless, the Committee feels that more community involvement—a wider range of opinion and comment by citizens of Weare—is also desirable. Naturally, each property owner in any proposed district would wish to be heard.

The Committee expects to have a proposal in the 1975 Town Warrant, and has informally discussed the following areas:

Weare Center, Quaker Street to Moody Pond; Mt. Dearborn Road; the Town Hall, Library and Stone Building; Reservoir Drive, Crosby's to Paige Hill; and the Breed homesteads, Memorial Drive and Duck Pond Road.

Further provisions of the statutes would provide for the establishment of a Commission to regulate the district according to specific rules and regulations adopted at Town Meeting.

The standing committee welcomes immediate reaction from voters of Weare. In this way, we may direct our activities in the coming year.

## REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION for 1973

The principal interest of the Conservation Commission in 1973 was the progress and completion of the Engineering study of the pollution problem at Weare Center. The report was completed in October 1973, approved by the Water Supply and Pollution Control Board and accepted by the Selectmen. The report confirms serious pollution of the swamp area adjoining the elementary school grounds south of the Fire Station and pollution of Moody Pond, a condition "extremely hazardous to health". The substance of the report and the need for immediate action will be presented to the Town Meeting March 1974. This engineering project was made possible by a financial grant obtained by the Conservation Commission from the Ford Foundation.

Application for permit for gravel removal was the subject of a public hearing by the Selectmen. Upon their receipt of required information and compliance by the applicant, permit was granted. This was the first action under the gravel ordinance prepared by the Conservation Commission and adopted by Town Meeting March 1972. Many towns in New Hampshire have requested copies of this ordinance.

By statute effective August 26, 1973, the Conservation Commission is given authority to intervene in presenting the town's interest in any application for dredging and filling surface waters or wetlands in the Town. Prior to this statute, the Water Resources Board could have granted permits for dredging and filling without attention to local interests or objections.

The only expenditures from the Conservation Fund in 1973 were \$50 to Piscataquog Watershed Association for water pollution testing of that river by high school students; and \$57 for leaflets about the Conservation Commission distributed at Town Meeting 1973. Balance in the Conservation Fund is reported elsewhere in this Town Report. The Conservation Fund is authorized for Conservation purposes and may be amplified by gifts, bequests, etc. There has been no charge to the Town for the services and administrative expenses of the Conservation Commission.

The so-called "energy crisis" has demonstrated how vital resources, without adequate control, can be abused. Similarly, natural resources of this town, without public interest and attention to their importance, can be lost or seriously damaged. The Town of Weare has assets that are everybody's job to protect.

## CHASE RECREATIONAL PARK Annual Report 1973

The Park opened May 26th and closed Oct. 15, 1973. Roy Johnson served as gate attendant and special park police, Bernard Phelps as park caretaker and special police on weekends. It can be stated that the Park was fully used when weather permitted. Among the various groups which used the Park Facilities without cost, were: swimming lessons (2 weeks) for approximately 150 children, 4 highly successful band concerts, Fourth of July Fireworks sponsored by the Fire Department, Camp Allen for handicapped children and the Weare Winter Wanderers.

Improvements made at the Park included the following: (1) a shelter constructed adjacent to the snack bar. (2) all buildings and several picnic tables stained with wood preservative. (3) sand bulldozed back to lake shores and sand and gravel put onto shores to expand swimming area and prevent erosion. (4) flags and buoys placed around swimming areas to prevent boat entrance. (5) wharfs and fireplaces repaired. (6) new asphalt pavement at entrance to Park. (7) flag erected last year and flag flown every day weather permitting. (8) latrines with electric lights and white toilet seats installed last year sanitized daily. (9) water at the beaches tested every two weeks at the laboratories of the Water Pollution Commission. All samples showed water to be safe for swimming. (10) water from Park hand pump tested and proved to be safe for drinking. (11) a soft drink dispenser installed in the snack bar. (12) Park grounds mowed and kept in a clean and orderly condition. (13) car sticker system for identification of Weare Taxpayers vehicles continued. Stickers were issued for all cars owned by Weare taxpayers. All such stickers were included in the season rate of \$1.00 per immediate family.

## WARRANT FOR SCHOOL MEETING March 6, 1974

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Weare qualified to vote in District Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Weare School Gymnasium in said District on the 6th of March, 1974 at 7:30 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

1. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.

2. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

3. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

4. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of constructing and equipping an addition to the Weare Central School, for constructing and equipping a new high school, and for the appropriate excavation and grading of the school grounds; and to determine whether such appropriation shall be raised by borrowing or otherwise; and to take any other action relating thereto.

5. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the District, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or United States.

6. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$35,000.00) to correct health and safety hazards in the elementary school and the high school as recommended by the School Board.

7. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) to be used for the purpose of hiring an architect or architectural firm to make preliminary plans and cost estimates for a new building program.

8. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed Thirty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$35,000.00) for the purchase of land and site preparation as may be approved by the School Board to enter into such contract as may be necessary to take title to said land.

9. To see what sum of money as previously voted the District may raise by issuance of serial notes upon terms and conditions as determined by the School Board to be in the best interests of the School District.

10. To see if the District will vote pursuant to RSA 31:105 to provide indemnification for District employees, school administrators, School Board members, District officers or agents from personal loss or expense including reasonable legal fees and costs, if any, arising out of any claim, demand, suit or judgment by reason of negligence or other act resulting in accidental injury to a person or accidental damage to property providing the indemnified person was at the time of the accident within the scope of his employment or office.

11. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of School District Officials and Agents, and for the payment of statutory and contractual obligations of the District, and to authorize the application of such sums as are estimated to be received from the State Foundation Aid together with other income, the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town.

12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

3. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

4. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the District, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or United States.

5. To see if the District will vote to appropriate a sum of money for constructing and originally equipping and furnishing an addition to the Weare Central School, and to determine whether such appropriation shall be raised by borrowing or otherwise.

6. To see if the District will vote to appropriate a sum of money for the purchase of portable classrooms and to determine whether such appropriation shall be raised by borrowing or otherwise.

7. To see if the District will vote to authorize the moderator to appoint a Building Committee composed of the School Board, one selectman, one member each of the Planning and Budget Boards, and three other Citizens, for the purpose of studying our future school construction needs and produce as a result a complete detailed plan of action to meet these requirements. This committee to be authorized by the District to engage the services of an architect to assist them in making a study and evaluation, and to determine the estimated date of need and cost of such construction. The resulting plan to be presented to the Citizens of the town for their approval at a special School District meeting to be called by the School Board, or at the next annual meeting.

8. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of Twelve Hundred Dollars (\$1,200.00) for developing a school building program, such appropriation to be available to the School Board and Building Committee.

9. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of a tract of land for a school site and authorize the School Board to complete the purchase of said property.

# RECORD OF SCHOOL MEETING

## Weare School District

March 1, 1973

The meeting was called to order by James Connor, Moderator, at 7:35 p.m. The Moderator then read the Warrant.

ARTICLE 1. It was moved by Raymond Rogers and duly seconded, to accept the salaries of the officers and agents of the District in the amount of \$455.00 as outlined in the budget. Vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 2. Joseph Lanctot stated that all reports were published in the Town Report and there were no further reports to be made.

ARTICLE 3. It was moved by Joseph Lanctot and seconded by Verna Martin, that the town auditors audit the School District Accounts. Motion passed.

ARTICLE 4. It was moved by Harry Chase and seconded by Joseph Souter, that this article be changed to read "To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the District, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire, United States or any other source".

Robert Hyman offered an amendment that "any grant which requires the use of additional School District funds for acceptance, shall first be approved at a School District meeting when any grant is in excess of \$10,000." Seconded by Mr. Delemater. Amendment was lost and Mr. Chase's motion carried.

Mrs. Neal Kurk moved that Article 6 be taken up before Article 5.

ARTICLE 6. Claire Hunter moved that Article 6 be dismissed. Seconded by Mrs. Neal Kurk. After much discussion of the advantages and disadvantages of portable classrooms, a head count was taken. Yes 58. No. 51. Article dismissed.

ARTICLE 5. It was moved by Neal Kurk and seconded by Mr. Nicknair "to see if the District will vote to authorize the design, construction and equipping and furnishing an addition to the Weare Central School and to appropriate a sum not to exceed \$99,000. for the afore-said purpose. Said sum to be in addition to any bond, investment, interest and other local, state or federal funds made available therefor, and to raise the same by issuance of bonds or serial notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act, Chapter 33 of the Revised Statutes annotated of N.H., as amended, and to authorize the Weare School Board to so issue and negotiate said bonds or notes in the name of or on the credit of the District, said Board to have discretionary powers described in Section 8 of said Chapter 33 in respect to said notes or bonds". Motion defeated.



10. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory and contractual obligations of the District, and to authorize the application of such sums as are estimated to be received from the State Foundation Aid together with other income, the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town.

11. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Amendment accepted and motion carried as follows—Article 7 “To see if the District will vote to authorize the Moderator to appoint a Building Committee composed of 1 School Board member, the High School Principal and 3 interested citizens for the purpose of studying our future school needs and produce as a result a complete detailed plan of action to meet these requirements. This committee to be authorized by the District to engage the services of an architect to assist them in making a study and evaluation, and to determine the estimated date of need and cost of such construction. Written reports of progress to be made on July 1, 1973, October 1, 1973 and February 1, 1974 published and made public. The resulting plan to be presented to the citizens of the town for their approval at a special School District Meeting to be called by the School Board, or at the next annual meeting.

ARTICLE 8. Moved by Joseph Lanctot and seconded by Elizabeth Straw to accept Article 8 as written. Amendment offered by Volker Wyrenbeck “Before the \$1,200 is expended, 80% of the School Board and Building Committee shall interview all interested architects”. Duly seconded. Amendment lost. Motion carried to raise and appropriate a sum of \$1,200 for developing a school building program, such appropriation to be available to the School Board and Building Committee.

ARTICLE 9. Joseph Lanctot moved that the District raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$16,000 for the purchase of a tract of land for a school site and authorize the School Board to complete the purchase of said property. Seconded by Elizabeth Straw. Motion carried.

ARTICLE 10. It was moved by Elizabeth Straw and duly seconded that the District raise and appropriate \$442,745.58 for the support of schools, for the payment of statutory and contractual obligations of the

District and to authorize the application of such sums as are estimated to be received from the State Foundation Aid together with other income, the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town.

An amendment was offered by Neal Kurk, seconded by Robert Hyman that an additional appropriation of \$11,500 be made to hire a Supervisory Assistant Principal for the Elementary School. After much discussion, the motion was lost - No. 53, Yes 23.

Another amendment was offered by Wendell Colburn and duly seconded to increase the total budget figure to \$448,669.58 in order to purchase 3 portable classrooms, the 2 we are now renting and an additional second-hand unit.

Neal Kurk offered an amendment, duly seconded, that the total budget figure read \$442,330.58. Motion lost.

Neal Kurk made a motion that the meeting be adjourned. Duly seconded. Motion lost.

Mr. Chase representing the Finance Committee, suggested a budget of \$402,871.73.

Mr. Colburn's amendment was accepted and the total amount to be raised under this Article is \$448,669.58. Motion carried - Yes 64, No. 19

All those present joined in a standing ovation for Mr. Peltonen, who is retiring, for his many years of service as Superintendent of Schools and for Elsie Purington, who is retiring, and who has served the District for many years as School Treasurer.

ARTICLE 11. There being no further business to transact, it was moved by Elizabeth Hyman and seconded by Joseph Lanctot that the meeting be adjourned. Motion carried.

I herewith submit my first annual report relative to the Weare Schools:

### ENROLLMENT

Facilities for these pupils, especially the Weare High School buildings, continue to adversely affect the range of program offered your youth and the quality of their participation in that program. Weare citizens are urged to review the high school program and facilities sketches developed by last years Advisory Committee for Weare High School. The more recent Weare School Building Committee, appointed by the Moderator for last year's annual School District Meeting, moved the former committee's work to the voters' decision on increased planning. Though, basically, their recommendations were voted down, review their architect's preliminary drawings, review their site recommendations, review the proposed high school program and be ready to reconsider potential solutions to the facilities' deficiencies with your fellow citizens.

### STAFF DEVELOPMENT "MASTER PLAN" PROGRESS

Weare citizens were alerted in last year's Annual Report that a change in certification procedures and requirements would become effective July 1, 1975. A key local part of that procedure is a growing local MASTER PLAN.

A 15-member Weare Staff Development Committee is compiling information and data needed to produce that MASTER PLAN for

professional improvement, a PLAN which must also be acceptable to the N.H. State Department of Education.

Sub-committees, through appropriate survey devices, are determining the system's educational needs and the staff's professional improvement desires. Data for formulating the 1st draft of the MASTER PLAN should be compiled by the end of the 1973-74 school year.

### INSTRUCTIONAL DEVELOPMENT INSTITUTE (IDI)

Five Weare staff members joined 38 other educators from S.U. No. 19 and 4 from the Concord School District in an IDI held at the new Media Center, Goffstown Jr.-Sr. High School, April 2-6, 1973. The Institute, a forty-hour, five-day validated training program, is designed to provide skills in applying a systematic approach toward developing practical solutions to learning and teaching problems.

Four leaders from the N.H. State Department of Education specially trained to conduct the structured, carefully programmed and highly media-supported sessions . . . there were four other institutes conducted in the State . . . helped the five Weare teachers search out alternative approaches to reading improvement for students grade 1 through 12.

All costs except one-half of the substitutes' pay were provided by a grant funded by the U.S. Office of Education as part of its National Special Media Institute Project.

### ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

I wish to extend my sincere appreciation for the aid and cooperation provided me by the principal, teachers, school board members and citizens of Weare as I have commenced my work as the Districts' Superintendent, a complex and demanding position requiring cooperative performance. Meeting the requirements of cooperative performance equally well have been personnel at the Supervisory Union Office: Howard Wagner, Assistant Superintendent of Schools; William Trotter, Business Administrator; and Mrs. Ruth Henk, Mrs. Florence Schricker, Mrs. Sally Austin and Mrs. Eleanor Duclos of the office staff.

## **WEARE ANNUAL SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICE REPORT**

Tuberculin tests were given to all but a few members of the school staff by Miss Constance Martin, R.N.

Physical examinations with blood tests and throat and stool cultures were given to the cafeteria workers.

A Health Careers Club was formed with freshmen high school girls making up the membership. Activities included field trips to the Elliot Hospital, the Easter Seal Rehabilitation Center, the Concord Hospital, and the New Hampshire Hospital. In-school discussions included various health problems and health careers. Membership, however, was small and the club was disbanded because of lack of support and interest before the end of the school year.

A nutrition workshop held in Goffstown which was sponsored by the National Dairy Council, was attended by some of the Grammar School teachers. As one result of the workshop, the Dairy Council supplied some beautiful materials suitable for use in teaching basic nutrition to first through third graders, and made material available for other grade levels. Some of this material was used in a beginning class with first graders.

A series of three immunization clinics was held at the Weare Grammar School as a result of the measles alert in New Hampshire. Measles, Rubella, DPT and Polio vaccines were offered. The clinic was conducted by Dr. Francis Brown, the State Board of Health and the School Health Service. Ninety-nine children received immunizations.

A dental Health Conference was conducted under the sponsorship of the Weare PTA by Mrs. Susan Dudley. Fifty-one children from first through sixth grades received care which included cleaning the teeth and the application of topical flouride.

A movie on menstruation was shown to fifth and sixth grade girls

and followed by questions and answers, and the distribution of appropriate literature.

Pre-school registration was held on May 23rd in conjunction with a pre-school vision and hearing screening program for four, five, and six year olds. The screening program was sponsored by the State Department of Health and conducted by volunteers from the PTA under the direction of Mrs. Natalie Smith, R.N.

We were also fortunate enough to obtain a dental hygienist from the State Dental Bureau who examined the preschoolers individually and discussed dental hygiene with them and their parents.

Thirty-six children were registered for first grade for September, 1973, and an additional seven children were screened for vision and hearing defects. Of the forty-four children screened, two children failed the vision screening and one failed the hearing screening. All have been referred for appropriate follow-up care.

Tuberculin tests were offered to all children who will be entering school in September 1973 to assist in the compliance with State law which now requires each child to have been tested for tuberculosis within a year prior to school entry. Heaf multiple puncture tests were given at the Weare School Health Office on June 23rd. Only twelve children took advantage of this clinic. None reported a positive reaction to the test.

A second date for pre-school registration was set for August.

An attempt to set up dates for physical examinations for students who will be taking athletics during next year, will be made in August.

The cooperation of teachers, parents, the school board and the Superintendent's office during this school year, has been greatly appreciated.
