WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING, 1940 STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L.S.]

To the inhabitants of the Town of Wolfeboro qualified to vote in Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at Brewster Memorial Hall in said Town on the second Tuesday of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Town Clerk, two Auditors, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year, one Selectman for three years, one Library Trustee for one year, one Library Trustee for three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, Town Constable, and one Water Commissioner for three years.

ARTICLE 2. To elect one or more Highway Agents, or instruct the Selectmen to appoint one Highway Agent.

ARTICLE 3. To choose all other Town Officers and Agents.

ARTICLE 4. To bring in your votes for the Election of Delegates at Large, Alternate Delegates at Large, District Delegates and Alternate District Delegates to the National Conventions of the Democratic and Republican parties, to be held for the purpose of nominating party candidates for President and Vice-President of the United States.

ARTICLE 5. To hear the report of the Committee appointed to select a location for a park and take action regarding same.

ARTICLE 6. To see what action the Town will take relative to maintenance and operation of its sewage system and fix the annual rates for such service.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell any property taken by tax title or otherwise.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to adopt zoning regulations for zone two as per chapter 42 of the Public Laws, and amendments thereto, and receive and adopt the report of the zoning commission as to regulations for zone one.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to accept one or more parcels of land which may be deeded to the Town for the purpose of being developed as a landing field.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to place an option on any parcel or parcels of land which may be required for the development of a landing field, provided that a state or federal project for the development of such landing field is made available to the Town.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow a sum of money, not to exceed \$1,000.00, for the purpose of cooperating with the State, and, or the Federal Government on joint projects.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will approve and adopt the recommendations of the Budget Committee and raise and appropriate the various sums contained in their report for the purpose specified, which include the following special appropriations:





REPORT OF BUDGET COMMITTEE

To the Legal Voters of the Town of Wolfeboro:

Your budget committee has the honor to submit the following report and the budget for the Town of Wolfeboro, Wolfeboro Fire Precinct, Wolfeboro School District and the Wolfeboro Water Department for the fiscal year ending January 31, 1941.

Public Hearings

The budget committee held one hearing, notice of which was duly advertised in the Granite State News.

Town Debt

During the year 1939, there was paid \$12,222.57 on the principal of the Town debt. This leaves a balance at the present time of \$125,651.29. During the year 1940, there will be paid \$8,151.29 which will leave a balance of \$117,500.00 at the end of this fiscal year.

The State of New Hampshire Road Loan will be retired this year.

School Budget

The budget committee has studied each item of expenditure for our schools and feel that the school board is operating as economically as possible in maintaining schools of high standard which the public demands. The slight increase of \$713.00 is accounted for in the automatic salary increases of the younger teachers, and for insurance on school properties.

The budget committee carefully considered the installation of sprinklers in the Carpenter School, not only for the protection of the building but for the safety of the school children. The installing of sprinklers will reduce the cost of insurance more than 50%and over a period of time the saving on insurance premiums will pay for the installation. Therefore, the

committee recommends that the school board be instructed to install a sprinkler system in Carpenter School, to be paid for by serial notes, the first of which shall become payable in 1945. Interest on the note to be paid from savings on insurance premiums.

Water Department

The Water Commissioners should again be congratulated on the manner in which they operated the department. During the year they collected \$14,512.48 against a budget estimate of \$13,573.81. They completed the projects authorized at the last town meeting, within the budgeted amounts. At a special town meeting held during the summer it was voted to authorize the Water Commissioners to make extensions on Center Street which were done at a cost of \$1,802.30. They closed their books with a cash balance of \$1,748.16. During the year there was retired \$4,800.00 on the bonds leaving a balance of \$48,000.00. One series of the water bonds has been paid off, so that the retirement payments in the future will be \$3,000.00 per year instead of \$4,800.00. This year the amounts necessary for replacements of old lines and old hydrants will only amount to \$1,500.00. The budget committee recommends a further extension on Center Street, costing \$500.00.

Precinct

The Precinct Commissioners as usual operated their department within their budget. This year, however, in order to secure repossession of the two factory buildings, it was necessary to purchase material attached to the buildings, consisting of wiring, shafting and blower system from the lease holders for the sum of \$600.00. This amount will have to be added to their requests this year.

The commissioners have signed a lease with the New Hampshire Fibercraft Company of Center Ossipee,

who will occupy two floors of the Clark Building. In order to prepare the building for their occupancy, the budget committee recommends that the commissioners be authorized to borrow not exceeding \$1,000.00.

It seems that the time has arrived when it becomes necessary in the best interests of fire protection for the town that a new hose truck be procured to take the place of the old model T Ford truck, which has outlived its usefulness, the cost of which, with 1,500 feet of new hose and other equipment, will be approximately \$4,500.00. The budget committee, therefore, in view of the fact that the Clark Shop notes will be retired this year, saving annually \$1,000.00, recommends that the commissioners be authorized to purchase this truck, and equipment on $2\frac{1}{4}$ % serial notes to be paid for over a period of five years.

Public Welfare

The cost of public welfare last year, owing to the fact that neither the state nor county contribute toward town cases, amounted to \$5,464.40. This year the overseers of the poor feel that as they anticipate less cases in 1940, they can supply the needs of our poor for \$4,500.00, which shows careful administration and the exercise of good judgment.

The old age assistance is increasing each year. The town has little control over these cases and pays only 25% of the total cost. Our anticipated share of the burden will increase from \$1,370.00 to \$1,500.00 this coming year.

Highways

The budget committee desires to compliment the highway agent, Leslie M. Chamberlain, on the consistent manner in which he lives within the budget, year after year, and also on the excellent condition of the highways under his care. This year there were many requests for funds to be expended on new construction for town streets and roads, all of which will have moneys laid out on them, either from direct budget appropriations, as specified in the budget recommendations, or from T. R. A. funds.

The budget committee is of the opinion that Factory Street should be rebuilt this year, such construction having been deferred for several years, due to the laying of the new sewers.

Sewers

The new sewer system has been constructed and the operation of the system is now in the hands of the Water Commissioners, who by an act of the 1939 Legislature, become water and sewer commissioners, there having been no experience as to the cost of operating the plant, nor knowledge of income that may be derived from the plant, the budget committee recommends that if during 1940 the actual necessary operating expenses exceed the income, the commissioners be authorized to borrow the excess amount from the Water Department funds, and that for 1941, an actual budget be set up for the Sewer Department.

Municipal Electric Department

The budget committee has no jurisdiction over the Electric Department as it is self-supporting, and its debts do not affect the town's debt limit, but are paid from income of the department and not by direct taxes.

We wish however, to call attention to the citizens of Wolfeboro, that we have one of the best electric power plants in New Hampshire, the only municipally owned plant that produces all of the electricity used in its town.

We enjoy one of the lowest rates in the state and our service is rated as among the best.

The plant does return to the tax payers a sizeable amount each year.

If Wolfeboro had to pay the average rate that towns pay in New Hampshire for street lighting, our bill for 115,940-K. W. H. @ .059 would be \$6,804.46, for which the Electric Department will charge the town \$1,000.00, showing a saving to the town of \$5,840.46.

The department also furnishes the several town departments electricity in the amount of \$342.33 per year, making a total saving to the town of \$6,182.79, which reduces the tax rate \$1.85 per thousand dollars.

Wolfeboro should be proud of its electric plant which is unique in New Hampshire.

The budget committee desires to compliment the commissioners on the efficient manner in which they are operating the plant, and urges the citizens to visit the power house on Factory Street.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN

To the Board of Trustees of the Wolfeboro Town Library:

Gentlemen:

The report of the librarian for the year ending February 1, 1940, is herewith presented.

It has been a busy year at the library, with but little slowing up of the work at any time. Formerly, June and September were regarded as dull months, but the summer group now seems to come earlier and remain later each year; hence the circulation has but little break from school year to summer work, and from summer work to school year again.

This is a time when people are reading much, and the system of inter-library loan is a great assistance to the small library which cannot purchase many books. Also a work which is wanted by but one person is better borrowed than purchased.

The State bookmobile in its monthly visits supplies books which are ephemeral in character, but which help to meet the demand for recreational reading.

The only station for books outside of the village is at the home of Mrs. Linley Moore at Pleasant Valley. Such a station could be placed in other villages if someone would assume the responsibility for the care of the books. With the present low postage rates on books, more could be loaned through the mails to persons unable to come to the library.

Through the efforts of Miss Maud Cate, the sum of \$55.00 which was left in the treasury of the Wolfeboro and Tuftonboro Alumni Association when it disbanded, has been turned over to the library as a permanent fund. This carries the name of the old academy.

*The circulation for the year has been 26,947 books and magazines, of these classes: fiction, 15,834, non-fiction 5,263, children's books 5,850. New borrower's cards issued, 371. Largest day's circulation, 208 books, smallest, 32.



Three First Aid classes were taught by Miss Virginia Marr.

A "Home Hygiene and Care of the Sick" course was given to an adult group by Miss Marr, and in December Miss Vivian LeMay started a class in Home Hygiene for the girls of Brewster Academy.

From the above it will be seen that our Nursing Service is still carrying on—also, that we have fortunately escaped any epidemic the past year, and for this we are devoutly thankful.

Last spring in anticipation of a serious fire hazard, due to the hurricane, our Disaster Committee worked out plans with our local forest fire warden, whereby we would cooperate with him in the event of a serious forest fire. Very happily no such emergency arose.

In July we were fortunate in having with us Dr. Bryce A. Newbaker from National Headquarters, who gave us a two weeks' course for Lay Instructors in First Aid and Life Saving. He was an able instructor with a very pleasing personality, and his course was much enjoyed by the 19 people who completed it.

On August 5, we conducted our second annual Tag Day, under the chairmanship of "Steve" Corkum, assisted by Miss Marr and others. ALL the tags were sold, thanks to the enthusiastic efforts of a dozen of our bright young girls, and a substantial sum realized for our treasury.

On August 31, we lost our faithful and beloved Miss Marr, who resigned to spend a year in further Public Health study at Simmons College. She was one of five nurses out of several hundred applicants to receive a year's scholarship from the Isabel Hampton Robb Fund, established for further public health study. As this is awarded for "accomplishment, education and character," we are very proud that Miss Marr measured up to these requirements.

She was immediately succeeded by Miss Vivian Le-May, a Manchester girl, who has had splendid hospital and public health training and is, we feel, a worthy successor to Miss Marr. She appears to be fully living up to our nursing standards.

Our successful roll call in November was due to the splendid efforts of our efficient Roll Call Chairman, Earle L. Walsh, and his faithful canvassers. It is pleasant to note that National Headquarters has awarded its "Honor Certificate" to the Chapter for its Roll Call results.

Again we sponsored our Children's Christmas, and again we acknowledge our debt to Mrs. Hart and her young people of the DeMolay and Rainbow, for their faithful and devoted efforts. The community, too, helped materially to make this event a success.

A year ago our secretary, Mrs. McDonald, resigned, and Mrs. John F. Goodwin, Jr., was elected to the office. We welcome Mrs. Goodwin as an officer of the Chapter.

The above are only a few of the high-lights of the past year. We hope they may give our people a little idea of what we are trying to do in the community. Our sincere hope is that we may continue to merit and to receive the same cordial cooperation and support that has always been extended to us.

HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen: Town of Wolfeboro, N. H.

Gentlemen:

During the past year few important events in health matters have occurred. The routine duties of this office have been performed: inspection of the milk supply, samples being furnished for examination at the laboratory of hygiene at frequent intervals; the collection of samples of foods; and the recording of cases of contagious disease. There have been no epidemics of serious disease. In the late fall several cases of "intestinal grippe" developed; these, however, were mild in type and had no sequelae of importance. The vaccination law is complied with, through the cooperation of parents, and the continued efforts of the school nurse. The public health nursing service has done its usual amount of efficient and helpful work. Miss Virginia Marr resigned to take advanced training in public health supervision, but Miss Vivian LeMay, her successor, has rapidly assumed the duties of the position, maintaining the same high standard as her predecessors. In my opinion, only a physician who can survey the past can adequately assess the amount of help of a most sincere and valuable type, rendered by the health service. The public-spirited group of men and women who, year after year without remuneration, govern the nursing service, deserve and have the gratitude of all citizens of the town. It is only right that

our debt to Dr. Frederick E. Meader, Chairman for many years, should be noted.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PARKS AND PLAYGROUNDS COMMISSION

The Parks and Playgrounds Commission takes pleasure in reporting a successful year. The bathing beach was again ably handled under the direction of Robinson Swift. A shelter was moved to the beach property for the convenience of the life guard and although inadequate for the use of bathers, it was a start toward improving the property and served as a storage for first aid equipment and clothing. The bathing beach is becoming increasingly popular and steps should be taken to improve this property. Work has progressed on the ski slope. Trees have been removed and considerable grading has been done. With the removal of rocks and stumps, which should be done this year, the hill will be fast and safe. We are anxious to move the toboggan slide from its present location to a permanent place adjacent to the ski slope. This will be an added attraction which will meet with approval of many who enjoy the fast sport of tobogganing.

The skating rinks continue to be the most popular winter attraction we have to offer. Continued cold weather and excellent care have kept the rinks in first class condition and made skating available for ten weeks this winter. Our rinks have been used as a model by several surrounding towns and we have given helpful suggestions when we have been asked. Progress is being made in the location of the Edward Cate Park and the Committee hopes to be able to make a definite report at an early date.
