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REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

To the Citizens of Antrim School District:

The School Board respectfully submits the following brief report for the year ending June 30, 1926:

During the summer vacation of 1925 we made some necessary repairs and improvements on the High School Building, including painting the outside. We asked for bids on the outside work and awarded the contract to G. A. Hulett for \$218.00, this being the lowest bid received. The Domestic Science room was enlarged and the walls and ceiling refinished. In the lower hall a new wash basin was installed and a new window put in over it, thereby making a much brighter and cleaner corner. The belfry was reshingled and parts of the roof repaired and two new sills put under the main building. The entire roof will have to be reshingled within two or three years.

Additional fire-extinguishers have been placed in each of the outside school-houses and also in the High School Building. The High School Building is now equipped with several fire extinguishers, a fire-escape and a safety fire lock on the front outside door, which would seem to offer a reasonable amount of protection to the scholars in case of fire. Following the discussion in the last school-meeting the amount of insurance now being carried on the High School Building was increased to \$20,000.00

The electric lights have been used for two years now and both scholars and teachers testify to the benefit re-

ceived from them. We paid for current used during the year just closed \$71.28.

The schools opened last fall with an entire new faculty in the High School, Mr. T. C. Chaffee Headmaster, Miss Ernestine Strehle and Miss Katherine Paul. Under Mr. Chaffee's leadership we believe that the school has achieved results that may well merit the commendation of our citizens. We wish to emphasize especially his development of prize-speaking, and anticipate further development along this line next year.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Antrim, N. H.

The report of the Superintendent of Schools for the year 1925-1926 is hereby presented:

This year saw an entirely new corps of teachers at the High School. Mr. Thomas C. Chaffee, a graduate of Brown University, with more than 20 years' teaching experience, was elected Headmaster. He came very well recommended by his former school officers, and by officers of the State Board of Education and has done especially good work. The other High School teachers, Miss Katherine L. Paul of the Domestic Science Department, this year's graduate from the Keene Normal School, and Miss Ernestine L. Strehle, this year's graduate from Radcliffe, although without teaching experience, have also done good work. Mrs. Jessie Black took charge of the eighth grade room, but resigned in April, and Miss Frances Sanborn, a Normal student, finished the year. Other teachers were the same as last year, Miss Charlotte Balch and Miss Bernice Buxton at the village, Miss Cuddihy at the Center, Miss Marjorie Dunton at the East School, and Mrs. Ruby T. Thayer at the North Branch. Miss Edith Messer was again the supervisor of Drawing for all schools.

Last year two of our teachers had certificates from the State Board, while this year this highest form of approval is held by six of them.

The amount paid in teachers' salaries has gradually increased during the past few years. In 1923-4 the teachers' payroll amounted to \$8895, last year it was \$9110 and this year \$9310, but the money so spent has surely been a wise investment.

The total enrollment 174, was composed of 90 boys and 84 girls. Of these the first grade had 15; 2nd, 16; 3rd, 20; 4th, 24; 5th, 13; 6th, 23; 7th, 15; 8th, 11; 9th, 16; 10th, 10; 11th, 9; 12th, 2.

It is pleasing to report continued improvement in punctuality on the part of the pupils. In 1923-4 there were 298 cases of tardiness, last year 176 cases, and this year 156 cases. The Center School had the poorest record with 52 cases or more than 2 per pupil. The North Branch and the Eighth grade at the Village each had more than one case per pupil, the other schools had less than one case of tardiness per pupil for the year. Miss Buxton's room had the best record with but 5 cases of tardiness for the whole year among 30 children.

Our school year is short enough at the best, so it is undesirable to lose many school days. In 1923-4 twelve school days were lost because of conventions, holidays, and bad weather, seven days were lost last year, and $5\frac{1}{2}$ this year. This continued improvement is gratifying because our school year is short without the loss of a day. According to the last biennial report of the State Board of Education 27 of our high schools had a 37 week year, 30 had a 38 week year and one had a 39 week year. 58 public high schools out of 148 in the state have a longer school year than ours, which is 36 weeks. I recommend the trial of a 37 week school year.

The attendance record continues to be good, as four of our schools had a better record than that of last year.

Teachers report 18 visits by school board members, 247 by parents and others, and 239 by the Superintendent. Remember that visitors are always welcome, and that a better idea may be had of the actual work of the school, if these visits are not limited to times of special celebrations.

It may be interesting to compare last year's report of the Medical Examiner, Dr. G. D. Tibbetts, with his report for this year.

- 10—To see how much money the Town will appropriate for Street Lighting for the ensuing year, or take any action thereon.
- 11—To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road from the Ricker Farm to Joseph V. Stone's or take any other action in relation thereto.
- 12—To see if the Town will appropriate money for the observance of the Sesqui-Centennial Celebration.
- 13—To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the purpose of continuing the control of White Pine Blister Rust, or take any action thereon.
- 14—To see how much money the Town will appropriate to repair the scenery in Town Hall, or take any action thereon.
- 15—To see how much money the Town will appropriate for the repair of sidewalks the year ensuing, or take any action thereon.
- 16—To see if the Town will vote to do away with that part of the old Keene Road which extends from the so-called Wilkins Road Westerly to where the new road now joins the original Keene Road, a distance of 425 ft.
- 17—To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum sufficient to provide for the suitable care and maintenance of Public Cemeteries within its confines, which are not otherwise provided for, as required by Chapter 55, Section 4 of the Public Statutes.
- 18—To see if the Town will vote to illuminate the front dial of the Town Clock and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$100.00, for the purchase and installation of a system.

- 19—To see if the Town will vote to wind and care for the Town Clock for twelve months and appropriate a sum of money, not to exceed \$50.00 for the same.
- 20—To see if the Town will vote to rebuild and construct a Concrete Bridge upon the site of a bridge located at the lower end of Elm Street over a brook running through Contoocook Manor, formerly known as Miller Farm; and to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 21—To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Branch Libraries at Clinton Village and North Branch, as they are unnecessary.
- 22—To see if the Town will vote to erect a suitable and safe railing on Keene Road, at the dangerous spot known as Cunningham's Corner and have warning signs put near the corner.
- 23—To see if the Town will vote to accept the offer made by Richard C. Goodell to present the Town, as a Sesqui-Centennial Gift, the Robert L. Shea Athletic Field and the William E. Cram Grove, upon the conditions imposed namely: that the names shall be perpetuated and that the Town shall keep the properties perpetually for free public use for Recreational and Educational purposes.
- 24—In view of the sharp curves and extreme narrowness of the Road as it passes between high banks at the first sharp curve each side of the home of Warren Wheeler, in the North part of the town, and the consequent danger to the Public from such conditions, it is earnestly requested that, at these two places, the Town widen the Road for the few feet necessary to enable two cars to pass each other in safety, and that there be appropriated at this meeting a sum of money sufficient for the purpose.
- 25—To hear reports of Committees, and act thereon.
- 26—To see how much money the Town will raise for statutory requirements and to carry the above Arti-

cles and the Appropriations of the School Meeting into effect.

27—To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.
