TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Atkinson, in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Grange Hall in said town on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all town officers that are voted for by ballot and major vote.

2. To choose all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year.

4. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for repairing town highways.

5. To see if the town will raise and appropriate in addition to the \$453.00 required by state law the further sum of \$226.50 in order to secure state aid of \$679.00 for State Aid Construction. One thousand dollars of this appropriation to be used to pay the third note falling due on loan used for permanent road construction on Main Street.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,800.00 for State Aid Maintenance of highways and thus receive \$2,700.00 from the State.

7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for snow pathing.

8. To see if the town will take any action in regard to Old Home Week and vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the same.

9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 and thus receive \$25.00 from the State for the purpose of completing the White Pine Blister Rust eradication project.

10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

12. To see if the town will authorize the Town Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen to hire such sums of money as the town may need in anticipation of taxes.

13. To see if the town will vote to renew the contract with the Atkinson Grange Hall Corporation for the leasing of Grange Hall for town purposes for the term of five years or any part thereof at a yearly rental of \$300.00. The said sum to be paid out of such monies raised and appropriated each year for town charges.

14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate above that required by law for the support of Kimball Public Library.

15. To see if the town will vote to change the time nominations for town officers shall be filed with the Town Clerk, to six days before elections.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for repairing West Side Avenue beginning near North End School.

17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for repairs on Academy Avenue.

18. To see what action the town will vote to take toward disposition of stone crusher and steam tractor and so instruct the selectmen.

19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for shrubs and trees for New Cemetery. The same to be expended under the direction of the Sexton and Selectmen.

20. To see if the town will vote to increase the price of cemetery lots for residents from \$2.00 to \$5.00 and for non-residents from \$10.00 to \$20.00.

21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money, not to exceed \$100.00, for purchase of materials and equipment for Automotive Chemical Fire Apparatus.

22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for advancing town interests. This money to be spent by a new committee of three members to try and determine the cause and remedy, if there be one, for the town's decline.

23. (By request.) To see if the town will vote to have all town accounts audited by the State Auditor or a Certified Public Accountant once every five years, beginning with the year ending January 31st, 1928. The expense to be taken from town charges.

24. (By request.) To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for special repairs on Poor's Hill Road.

25. (By request.) To see what action the town wishes to take in regard to the purchase of snow fence and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

26. (By petition of Harry B. Tuttle and 17 others.) To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for repairing highway known as Maple Avenue.

27. (By petition of Elmer E. Conley and 4 others.) To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to receive the like sum from the State to build tarvia treated gravel road from Albert Little Corner to the Salem Line by the residence of E. E. Conley.

28. To see if the town will vote to extend street lights from Page Brothers residence to the Hampstead town line and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

29. To hear the report of the committee appointed at the last town meeting to confer with officials of the Exeter and Hampton Electric Company relative to securing street lights from Page Brothers to Hampstead town line and pass any vote in relation thereto.

30. To hear the reports of town officers and committees, act on same and transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

BY-LAWS OF THE TOWN OF ATKINSON ADOPTED MARCH 9, 1926

(1). If any person or persons shall place, leave or cause to be left, in or near a highway, street, alley or public place, any garbage, tin cans, glassware or other refuse material, such person or persons shall be fined not exceeding \$10.00.

(2). Any person or persons running a public dance in Grange Hall or other public place in this town must obtain a permit to run such dance from the selectmen. Persons violating this by-law shall be fined not exceeding \$10.00.

REPORT OF WHITE PINE BLISTER

To the Chairman, Board of Selectmen,

Atkinson, N. H.

Dear Sir:----

In accordance with the terms of an agreement executed between the town of Atkinson, and the New Hampshire Forestry Commission, we are submitting a report of White Pine Blister Rust Control work performed in your town during 1927.

Last March, at their annual town meeting, 77 towns and cities appropriated \$28,800 for Blister Rust Control, in co-operation with the State Forestry Department. This was an indication that irrespective of other important public work, white pine growth is considered a valuable local asset and one worth protecting.

Many are the persons who do not realize that today, Blister Rust Control has assumed almost a work of National scope, for 17 states from Maine to California are engaged in the destruction of currant and gooseberry bushes, the plants which spread this fatal disease from infected to healthy pine trees.

More than 40 towns and cities in New Hampshire have carried on control measures until their pine areas have been covered the first time over. Many other communities are also working with this goal in view.

There is attached to this letter a financial report indicating the expenditures made in your town during 1927 in the eradication of currant and gooseberry bushes. Should there be any information of special interest to you which is not contained in this report, we shall be pleased to further advise you upon request.

We would also suggest that this report be read at Town Meeting and such sections as seem advisable included in the annual report of the town.



REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Atkinson:

It gives me pleasure to submit my first annual report of the Schools of Atkinson.

The school year begins July 1 and ends June 30. The year with which this report deals ended in June 1927, and as I took up the work in March my report will be limited in some respects. I have found the schools in very good condition and have tried to continue the work so well begun by your former Superintendent.

There were 90 different pupils enrolled in the schools last year. This is a gain of 15 over the year preceding. The attendance averaged 95.4 per cent of the membership. The average for the state for this period was 94.57. Eight pupils completed the work of the 8th grade in June.

No one realizes better than I that a Superintendent's first year in a district should be a time of getting acquainted, rather than a period of radical changes. With this in mind, I have tried to become familiar with matters pertaining to schools and to follow as closely as possible the plans already worked out.

Various standardized tests have been used to check school progress. These tests show that our schools as a whole are up to the standard attainment of schools in similar communities over the country.

The general aim of education is to train all children in those qualities of life and character

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and the

which will make them good and efficient citizens in the community, state and nation. The objectives of education in a democracy have been summarized by a committee of American teachers under seven headings:

- 1. Command of Fundamental Processes.
- 2. Health.
- 3. Worthy Home Membership.
- 4. Training for Vocation.
- 5. Training for Citizenship.
- 6. Worthy Use of Leisure.
- 7. Ethical Character.

The teachers have co-operated with the Superintendent in an attempt in unifying the work of our schools in accomplishing these objectives. It is our purpose to make our educational activities a means of achieving these purposes. For each individual pupil the work of education may be considered as directed toward developing purpose and personality for the good of the pupil and the society in which he lives. Thus we may hope that our school work will result in happy serviceable lives.

The supervisory activities of the Superintendent have been expended in classroom visits, followup interviews, personal conferences and frequent school inspections. The two most important steps in improving schools are to improve the teaching and increase the actual attendance.

A statement by our school nurse is printed with this report. Parents should take notice of reports sent home informing them of physical defects, and have these defects corrected. No pupil can do the mental work of the school properly, if physically handicapped.

Mrs. Eva Thompson is getting the usual fine

results in music supervision, and her report is included.

For the teachers, the School Board and myself, we express the common desire that a larger number of parents and friends visit the schools. If parents will come to see their children at work, what they are doing; what they are given to do with, and how their work is directed, it will give them first hand information concerning our schools.

In closing I wish to express my appreciation of the courtesy and co-operation of the School Board, the teachers and the community.

REPORT OF DIRECTOR OF MUSIC

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To the Superintendent and School Board of Atkinson:

I hereby submit the 1927 report of the work in music.

The text books are by Ginn & Co., a revised and greatly improved edition of the New Educational Music Course. Introductory music is used for Grades two and three, where the children begin to read notes and learn about key and time signatures. Intermediate music furnishes bright and instructive material for Grades five, six, seven and eight.

The songs in this book are written for one, two and three-part chorus work. Due to the fact that there are so few low voices in the grammar grades, we usually have to work on one and two-part music. This year is an exception and the three-part singing in every school is worthy of special mention. The upper grade children are working on a music memory test consisting of ten selections with the composer.

In April the boys and girls of the Center presented the operetta "Cinderella in Flowerland," before an audience that filled the hall and was generously appreciative of the young peoples' efforts.

The end of the year finds me, as always, grateful to the teachers, on whose assistance I rely to such a great extent. I wish to thank the Superintendent and School Board for their interest and cooperation.
