REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD.

Another school year has drawn to a close. In the majority of instances everything has been moving along with little friction, and we think that the standard of scholarship will compare favorably with former years. We can safely say that in some schools the standard has been materially raised. The teachers that we have hired the past year with few exceptions have been bright wide-awake young ladies, ready and willing to work and keep up with the spirit of the times. Teaching is a profession for which intelligence and training are necessary. The work of education should no longer be left to inexperienced teachers destitute of any training. It is the same with teaching as with any other business or profession. The best is the cheapest. The teachers whom we would like to hire can get better prices in other places. Now and then we can secure a teacher whom we would like to keep, but in the majority of cases they are only waiting for a more favorable opening. How much better for the town if we could hire the best teachers and keep them with us longer. The changing of teacher each term is very injurious, for every teacher has a way of her own of instructing her pupils, and it takes several weeks for the scholars to get accustomed to her ways and modes of teaching, and on the other hand it takes considerable time for a new teacher to learn the requirements and ability of her scholars. The question has been asked us, Why not shorten the school year and thus hire better teachers? There are two objections to this plan. We could not compete with other towns as they offer longer periods for school work, and it is doubtful whether the efficiency obtained at the expense of shorter sessions is not more than offset by enforced long vacations and lost opportunities of continuing school work. The only change that has been made in text-books was the introduction of the New Practical Speller.

Several new maps have been purchased for the use of the schools.
