REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

As this is the first time Campton has employed a Superintendent of Schools, perhaps a few words on the subject will be of interest.

The towns of Campton, Rumney and Woodstock, having formed a supervisory district, each town pays its share of the Superintendent's salary, in proportion to the time spent in that town.

The net cost to this town (after the State has paid its half) amounts to \$250.00 per year.

The work of our Superintendent, Mr. Eugene Tuttle, has given entire satisfaction. Among the numerous things that he has done, is that of grading the schools, and having teachers follow a definite course of study.

By so doing, the children will be much better prepared to enter High schools or Academies, and will not be handicapped, as formerly, by insufficient preparation in some of their studies.

The school board has endeavored, as far as possible, to give each district thirty-three weeks of school, which I believe is more than in any previous year.

New seats have been installed in several of the school houses and a new floor laid in No. 8, and the Blair and Branch houses have been painted.

A good portion of the so-called "equalization fund" (\$172.48) was received by this town the past year.

This fund is apportioned to each town according to the per cent. of attendance, amount of money appropriated for school purposes, the disposition shown by a town to help itself, and progress made in school work and methods.

State Superintendent Morrison visited several of our

schools and stated that in his opinion they compared very favorably with any of the rural schools in the state.

As this is my last year on the School Board I thank you all for the courteous treatment that I have always received.
