TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

L. S.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Croydon, in the County of Sullivan, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 8th day of March next, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon (the polls not to close earlier than 6 o'clock in the afternoon) to act upon the following subjects:

Art. 1. To choose 2 Selectmen, one for one year and one for three years, a Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, two Auditors, one Trustee of Library for three years, and all such other officers and agents as may be necessary for the transaction of the Town's business for the ensuing year.

Art. 2. To see if the Town will vote to authorize Selectmen to appoint one or more highway agents who perform their duties under the direction of the Selectmen.

Art. 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.

Art. 4. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for Class V roads, and raise and appropriate money for the same. Town to raise \$390.73 and State to give \$2,604.86.

Art. 5. To see if the Town will accept State Aid for Class V highway bridges, and raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be deemed necessary for that purpose.

Art. 6. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for highways and bridges and keeping the roads open during the winter.

Art. 7. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for maintaining Town dump.

Art. 8. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the General Expense of the Highway Department.

Art. 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate money for the construction of an enclosed porch at the Town Hall.

Art. 10. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of cutting brush on the roadsides of Town highways.

Art. 11. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the upkeep of cemeteries.

Art. 12. To see if the Town wishes to raise and appropriate \$500.00 for Capital Reserve Fund for acquisition of equipment.

Art. 13. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lighting and for lighting Town buildings.

Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire all necessary sums of money for its use during the year, in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40.00 for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, together with other Towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.

Art. 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for White Pine Blister Rust Control to be spent in co-operation with the State Forestry Department.

Art. 17. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 for road construction and/or to eliminate snow traps on Town Roads.

Art. 18. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for old age assistance.

Art. 19. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road between Fowles and Hartley residence approximately 1/4 mile long located east of Newport town line, running parallel with Croydon highway near Reed's Mill.

Art. 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise town officers' salaries.

Art. 21. To see if the Town will vote to erect a plaque commemorating the work done to the East Village cemetery by Mr. and Mrs. Henry Sawyer.

Art. 22. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Croydon:

I submit herewith the annual report of the Superintendent of schools.

ENROLLMENT

The enrollment as of January 1, 1955 was 67, divided as follows:

Flat School (Grades 1-4) 38

Village School (Grades 5-8) 29

The enrollment of 38 at the Flat School should be a cause of real alarm to the Town. It is impossible for one teacher to effectively handle such a large group, especially when that number is spread among four grades. The townspeople should be especially grateful to Mrs. Doris Kibbey for the fine job she is now doing with such a large group, and for her previous years of faithful service under very trying conditions. (The enrollment at the Flat School was increased by five pupils after the school year began when one family moved into the corner of Croydon, bordering on Springfield and Grantham. This has also created an emergency transportation problem as it has been necessary to set up a feeder bus route at a cost of four dollars per day to bring these five pupils to the Village School where they can pick up the regular school bus).

TUITION

The continued rise in school costs is reflected in the tuition charges for our high school students. Since there are seven members in the present Eighth Grade and only two graduating from High School this year, it has been necessary to increase the budget item for tuition by \$1075. This is a substantial amount—yet the amount spent by a town to provide a high school education for its young people is undoubtedly one of its best expenditures.

TRANSPORTATION

Mr. Lawrence Darling purchased an improved bus and is operating the school bus route in a very satisfactory manner.

SCHOOL HOUSING

Following the vote of the last District Meeting, the School Board appointed a School Study Committee to look into school facilities consisting of Frank McIntosh, Chairman, Mrs. Anna Leeman and Edward Benoit. To date the work of the Committee has centered around the following questions:

1. Are the present facilities satisfactory?
2. Can the present facilities be improved to be made satisfactory at a reasonable cost?
3. Is it feasible to consider combining with Grantham for the construction of a new building?
4. Is it feasible to consider building a new school (probably three rooms)?
5. Is it feasible to consider sending all or a part of the pupils to Newport Schools—if and when Newport had the necessary room?

It should be emphasized that at present any plan for school improvement is very much in the discussion stage. Few could question that the need for such improvement is urgent and critical. For the purpose solely of giving you an opportunity to think about possible school solutions during the next year, the following information is presented covering some material on Questions 4 and 5.

(Close Village School—send pupils in Grades 5 to 8 elsewhere).

If Croydon were to build a new 3-room school building, the cost is estimated at \$50,000.

With a new Building the cost of operation for fuel, lights, janitor, insurance etc., would certainly be increased over the present amount spent for these items.

If 3 classrooms were used, the salary of an additional teacher would be approximately \$3,000 more.

ADVANTAGES OF SENDING UPPER GRADES TO NEWPORT

1. Only pupils in a single grade in the room
2. Services of a Music Supervisor
3. Services of Rinehart Handwriting Supervisor
4. Physical education for students in Grades 7 and 8
5. Home Economics for girls, and Shop for boys in Grades 7 and 8
6. Hot Lunch Program available

It should be re-emphasized that Newport is not now able to receive any substantial number of elementary

tuition pupils. However, as we plan for the future, it seems best for Croydon to consider all the possibilities before attempting to decide how best to meet its school problem—both educationally and financially.

CONCLUSION

I have been officially connected with the Croydon School District since July 1, 1954. In these brief months I have become aware of some of the problems that have been a cause of great concern to many of you for a number of years. At the present time I cannot see any easy, inexpensive solution. However, as we look at the recent building programs of such communities as Springfield, Cornish, Unity, Sutton and the proposed plans of the Goshen-Lempster Cooperative District, no one should become unduly pessimistic. With a real interest and desire for improvement on the part of the majority, some solution will be forthcoming for the improvement of school facilities for the children of Croydon.
