TOWN WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Deering in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Deering Town Hall in said Deering on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for highways and bridges for the ensuing year and if the same shall be divided for winter and summer roads.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for Blister Rust Control.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$550 (five hundred fifty dollars) to defray interest charges on long and short term notes.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to authorize its Board of Selectmen to deliver inventory blanks to residents when assessing.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise for Town Road Aid the sum of \$631.50, the state contributing \$2,736.15; or the town to raise for State Aid construction the sum of \$631.50 and the state to contribute \$1,262.00. (Only one of these available each year.)
- 8. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money on short term notes in anticipation of taxes.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,750.00 to cover long term notes. (One of \$1500 for tractor note; the other is for P.W.A. bond of \$250.)

- 10. To see if the town will appropriate the amount of either \$50 or \$100 for Old Home Day celebration.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the celebration of the anniversary of the ratification of the federal constitution by the state, June 21, 1938, said sum to be expended under the direction of the Selectmen.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$41.00 to the Monadnock Region Association.
- 13. To see if the town will appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to buy settees for the town hall.
- 14. To see if the town will take any action in regards to hiring all truck work done on town roads for the coming year.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the purchase of a new town truck or take any action in regards thereto.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the East Deering power line.
- 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting and raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the same.

RECORD OF TOWN MEETING

A legal meeting of the voters of the town of Deering held in the Town Hall at nine o'clock in the morning on March 9, 1937 was called to order by the moderator, Edward W. Colburn, who read the warrant. It was voted to keep the polls open until five o'clock and the articles after Article 1 were to be voted upon at eleven o'clock. The moderator read a letter from the State Employment Service.

Article 1

Proceeded to vote for all officers on Australian ballot.

Town Clerk

George F. Ellsworth had 35 votes.

William P. Wood had 95 votes and took oath of office as prescribed by law.

George W. Crosby had 61 votes.

Walter B. Dutton had 75 votes and took oath of office.

Ernest Johnson had 53 votes.

Herbert C. Spiller had 44 votes. Edward W. Colburn had 55 votes.

Ralph B. Adams had 57 votes—was elected. Charles Savage had 57 votes—was elected.

Arnold K. Ellsworth had 62 votes—was elected.

Article 2

Upon motion made by Chester P. McNally it was voted to raise \$2000 for town charges.

Article 3

Upon motion made by Chester P. McNally it was voted to vote on Article 9 before Article 3.

Article 9

Upon motion made by Chester P. McNally it was voted to accept first part of article to raise \$618.

Article 3

Upon motion made by Chester P. McNally it was voted to raise \$1200 for highways and bridges and \$1500 for winter roads.

Article 4

Upon motion made by Chester P. McNally it was voted to dismiss the article.

Article 5

Upon motion made by Harold Richardson it was voted to dismiss the article.

Article 6

Upon motion made by Chester P. McNally it was voted to raise \$650.

Article 7

Upon motion made by George F. Ellsworth it was voted that the selectmen deliver inventories.

Article 8

Motion was made by Charles Savage that the town pay 40 cents per hour. Motion lost. Upon motion made by Albert H. Brown it was voted that the wages be \$3 for an 8-hour day.

Article 10

Upon motion made by Albert A. Holden it was voted that the selectmen be authorized to borrow money in anticipation of taxes until the next town meeting.

Article 11

Upon motion made by Chester P. McNally it was voted to raise \$2250.

Article 12

Motion made by Chester M. Durrell to raise \$400 for

a period of five years. Seconded. Question. Motion by Chester P. McNally for a roll call on vote. Yes 71. No. 34.

Article 13

Upon motion made by Harold Taylor it was voted that the town repair water system. Upon motion made by Robert Lawson it was voted to raise \$150 for the water system.

Article 14

Upon motion made by Amasa Holden it was voted that the trustees of the trust funds be permitted to install toilets. Committee from town to work with trustees: Albert A. Holden, Chester P. McNally, Chester M. Durrell. Work to be done this year. Trustees will give up to \$300 for same.

Article 15

Upon motion made by Albert Brown it was voted to dismiss the article.

Article 16

Upon motion made by Marie H. Wells it was voted to raise \$50 for Old Home Day.

Article 17

Moved by J. W. Ellsworth to dismiss the article. Moved by C. P. McNally for selectmen to approve only bills from tax collectors of 1935 and 1936. It was voted to pass over Article 17.

Article 18

Upon motion made by Chester P. McNally it was voted that all future tax collector's salary be \$100 and the town to pay for necessary postage and printing.

Article 19

Dismissed by motion of A. A. Holden.

Article 20

Dismissed by motion of Mary B. Holden.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and the Citizens of the Deering School District:

The superintendent of schools submits this his third annual school report for your consideration.

SCHOOL ORGANIZATION

School Board: John Herrick, Chairman; Mrs. Minerva Jacques, Mrs. Jessie Colburn.

Superintendent of Schools: Vincent Gatto, Ed. M., Hillsboro, N. H.

Teacher School N. H. Approval Marie Johnson East Deering Certificate Mrs. Lena Crosby West Deering Certificate

The following pupils were graduated from the Deering public schools last June, 1937. East Deering: Rita Bissonnette, Jane Johnson. Pond school: Marie La-Bounty, Eva Putnam. There were not any from the West Deering school.

The following scholars deserve honorable mention for having maintained perfect attendance during the year 1936-1937 for the number of terms indicated. The year consists of thirty-six weeks, and is divided into four terms of nine weeks each. We also thank the children's parents for their cooperation.

East Deering School: Mary Ellinwood, one term: Barbara Michie, one term; Harold Titcomb, entire year.

Pond School: Donald Evans, two terms; Eleanor Gardner, two terms; Marie LaBounty, two terms; Virginia LaBounty, three terms; Gene Nally, two terms; Robert Putnam, one term; Harriett Richardson, two terms; Ian McLean, two terms; Eva Putnam, one term.

West Deering: Priscilla Clark, one term; Trobert Crosby, two terms; Robert McAlister, three terms; Irene McAlister, two terms; Anna Normandin, two terms; Omer Normandin, two terms; Louis Normandin, two terms;

Howard Kiblin, three terms; Edward Kiblin, three terms; Leo Tacey, one term; Janice Greene, one term.

GENERAL DISCUSSION

The Deering school district at the present time conducts two schools, the one at East Deering, and the one at West Deering. The former has an enrollment of twenty-three pupils, and the latter an enrollment of nineteen. The Pond school has been closed, and the children who formerly attended said school are now carried to the East Deering school. This practically means the cutting of our school costs by one third, with the exception of the expense involved in transportation. Not only have we cut down our school costs, but we have increased the efficiency of the schools. More can be accomplished at East Deering with a larger group of children to educate.

Fifteen children from the Manselville district attend Hillsborough Grammar school. This number plus those attending the two schools in Deering make a total enrollment in Deering of fifty-seven elementary school children. Thirteen boys and girls from Deering entered Hillsborough high school last fall. Considering both those who attend elementary and high school, we have in Deering a school population of seventy children. Over eighteen per cent of our school population attends high school. It is a credit to the town to have so many young people ambitious enough to continue their education in a secondary school. When we consider the high educational standards required by present-day life, this is at it should be.

Both from the superintendent's observations and tests given in the schools we know that our children are making good progress, according to their ability, and that their results compare well with those of the children of corresponding ages and grades in the state and the country.

It would be well to consider more sanitary toilets for the schools. At no great expense, modern sanitary toilets could be installed. Our present toilets do not appeal to the aesthetic sense of the children, and besides, they do not lead either to good morals or health.

A jacketed stove at East Deering would improve the heating system of the school. At present those near the stove are too warm, and the ones away from the source of heat suffer from the cold. If a jacketed stove cannot

be purchased, a jacket for the stove in use may be made

inexpensively by any good mechanic.

Improved desks and seats were secured in the fall for the East Deering school. These furnish each child with an individual desk, and a better adjusted seat. The same should be done for the school at West Deering. It does not lead to the best physical welfare of the children, when we force tall individuals to sit for five or six hours a day for eight years of their lives with a desk pressing on their knees, and the short ones with their feet dangling several inches above the floor level.

Thanks are due to the Hillsboro Special school district for having reduced the amount of the elementary school tuition, and for keeping down the high school tuition, when other towns with no better schools are boosting theirs. Our children are getting a type of education which could not be duplicated for the same amount of

money in the smaller school districts.
