#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Epsom in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Epsom on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same in accordance with House Bill No. 234 as passed by the Legislature of 1935 and as submitted by the Budget Committee.
- 3. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars for the observance of Memorial Day.
- 4. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars for the observance of Old Home Day.
- 5. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred dollars for White Pine Blister Rust control.
- 6. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred fifty-six dollars and forty-three cents for the construction of Class V Roads, T. R. A., so-called; the State to contribute two thousand two hundred twenty-five dollars and seventy-two cents.
- 7. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of eleven hundred one dollars for the construction of the Class Two road known as Short Falls Road; the State to contribute two thousand two hundred two dollars.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to renew the Bridge Note held by The Suncook Bank for the amount of sixteen hundred five dollars and sixteen cents.

- 9. To see if the town will vote to buy a snow plow to be used with a truck.
- 10. By petition: To see if the town will vote to discontinue the election of Road Agents by vote of the town, and have the Selectmen divide the town into not less than ten supervisory districts, appointing a Surveyor for each district. Said Surveyors to repair the roads in their districts with money appropriated for town road maintenance as apportioned to each Surveyor by the Selectmen.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount of two per cent on all property taxes paid previous to July 1, 1939
- 12. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes.
- 13. By request: To see if the town will authorize the Tax Collector (under Sec. 44, Chapter 66 P. L. of N. H.) to add to and collect the sum of twenty cents upon all poll taxes remaining unpaid September first following the date of assessment of said taxes. This article to remain in force unless rescinded at some future meeting.
- 14. To transact any other business that may legally be brought before said meeting.

### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

\_\_\_\_\_

To the School Board and Citizens of Epsom:

Under the recent reclassification of the grades, the work of the schools has been proceeding with increased satisfaction. The instruction is being carried on under the same group of teachers as last year. School property has been well maintained. Our elementary graduates are making good records in high school.

The deficiency appropriation asked for this year is due mostly to the making of necessary repairs and increased high school tuition due to pupils moving into town, together with a deficiency from the previous year due to a cut in the School Board's budget in the spring of 1937. If that budget had been passed as recommended, there would be a slight balance in prospect, instead of a deficit.

If one-room buildings are to be continued, I would recommend that the sheds at Short Falls and the Center, at least, be joined to the main building and new type septic toilets installed. This improvement is most urgent at Short Falls, where the children are of primary age.
