TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Francestown, New Hampshire in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Francestown on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the budget as submitted by the Selectmen or make any alterations in the same and raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to finance the same as finally adopted.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred dollars (\$400.00) to improve by drainage and gravel, that portion of road starting at the Greenfield Road by the residence of Clarence Murdough past the playgrounds, or take any action relating thereto.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) to purchase a new truck chassis for the Fire Department, or take any action relating thereto.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) to be used to improve the playgrounds, or take any action relating thereto.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to rebuild the bridge on the Pleasant Pond Road, or take any action relating thereto.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to police and maintain safe bathing conditions at the beach at Scobie Pond, or take any action relating thereto.

9. To see if the Town will vote to relocate the Public Beach at Scobie Pond by accepting the gift of land by Henry Humphreys in exchange for present public right of way.

10. To see if the Town will vote to have the Selectmen appoint a committee of three members to make a study of the present and future cemetery needs, or take any action relating thereto.

11. To see if the Town will vote to close, subject to gates and bars, road No. 96 on town highway map, that portion of road from the north of Norton Brown's to the junction of the Lord Hill Road.

12. To see if the Town will vote to increase the Fire Insurance on town buildings, also to increase Liability Insurance to cover all town property, raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to pay for the same, or take any action relating thereto. 13. To see if the Town will vote to accept a new road and maintain the same, located on the property of William and Christie Nickerson, or take any action relating thereto.

14. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the old road past the residence of William and Christie Nickerson, if Article 13 is passed, or take any action relating thereto.

15. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to reserve from all available Summer Highway Funds, not less than \$1500. for road maintenance after September 1, inasmuch as they are responsible for the expenditure of money and the discharge of duties of the highway agent under the Rev. Laws of the State of New Hampshire Chapter 96, Section 9.

16. To see if the Town will vote to increase the pay of the salaried Town Officers by 20 per cent.

17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow a sufficient sum of money to pay current expenses in anticipation of taxes.

18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Advisory Committee to procure plans and recommendations for a town building to store town equipment, or take any action relating thereto.

19. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the Town the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old-Age and Survivors Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 234 of the Laws of 1951 and to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) to defray the town's share of the cost thereof.

20. If the foregoing article is adopted, to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to execute on behalf of the town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the town will designate the Town Treasurer as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.

21. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees, heretofore chosen and take action on same.

22. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual audit and examination of the accounts of the Town of Francestown for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1953, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Library Treasurer and Trustees of Trust Funds.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: Dec. 31, 1952-Dec. 31, 1953: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1952 and December 31, 1953, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$2,278.09 during the year 1953.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues:

(Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1953, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$1,558.34, less a net revenue surplus of \$1,147.58, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$410.76.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1953, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1953, is indicated in Exhibit F.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records.

Unredeemed Taxes-Prior Years:

As indicated by Exhibit G-2, Summary of Tax Sale Accounts, there are unredeemed taxes from tax sales on account of the levies of 1950 and prior years as follows:

Inasmuch as the two year redemption period has expired on the unredeemed taxes as above stated, it is recommended that tax deeds be given to the town by the Collector on the properties represented therein.

SCHOOL WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Francestown qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 5th day of March 1954 at eight o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

8. To see if the district will raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the purpose of constructing a walk across the land in front of the school building to the playground area and to the proposed bicycle area or take any action relating thereto.

9. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$365 for the purpose of constructing a 6-foot chain link fence separating the brook area from the playground area at the south end of the playground or take any action relating thereto.

10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1450 for the purpose of establishing a third classroom in the basement of the present building or take any action relating thereto.

11. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2778 for the purpose of employing a third teacher or take any action relating thereto.

12. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150 for the purpose of providing needed additional equipment for the third classroom or take any action relating thereto.

13. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD AND CITIZENS OF FRANCESTOWN:

I respectfully submit my seventh annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

STAFF CHANGES

Mr. Robert Morgan, graduate of Keene Teachers College in June 1953, was employed to fill the position of teaching Principal vacated by Mr. Robert Piper. Mr. Piper moved on to Milton, New Hampshire to become Principal of the Milton Elementary School.

Miss Sybil M. Beatham, School Nurse in several towns in Supervisory Union No. 63, has been employed to assume the duties of school nurse in Francestown, replacing Mrs. Louisa Murphy, who resigned from this position in June 1953.

INSTRUCTION

School opened this fall with an enrollment of sixty-eight pupils with 32 in grades 1-4, taught by Miss Hazel Clement and 36 in grades 5-8, taught by Mr. Morgan. Despite the fact that the rooms are crowded, very good work is being accomplished by the teachers. Proper attention is being given to the development of the fundamentals with as much attention devoted to individual problems as large classes and multiple graded rooms will permit.

For the past several years your School Board and Superintendent have been considering the advisability of employing a third teacher and setting up a third classroom so that the grade assignment for teachers could be reduced in order to provide an educational program that would be more efficient than the one we are presently operating. This development would provide the teacher with the time to more adequately provide for individual differences. Consequently, this year this problem is being brought to the attention of the voters to see what action they desire to take. A thorough study of the feasibility of transforming a portion of the Cafeteria into a classroom has been made and it appears that an adequate classroom could be provided at a comparatively small cost.

If three rooms are provided the breakdown of class assignments might be as follows for the several years under consideration:

I wish to commend Mrs. Caroline Lord, town librarian, for the excellent cooperation and assistance she has given the teachers and children, in developing fine reading interests and habits. Her sincere interest in children has made our library program very outstanding.

Miss Ethelyn Edwards, music teacher and supervisor, is continuing her fine work in developing music skills, interests, and an appreciation for good music.

The music in the Primary Room consists of the development of the singing voice, the feeling for beautiful music and the joy of singing beautiful songs. This is done through the use of their basic text, folk dancing and singing games. As much time as possible is spent in helping individuals, especially the younger children to develop a properly placed singing voice.

In the Upper Room, emphasis is placed in two-part work, teaching music facts and devoting time to the discussion of composers. The Song Flute program has been coming along well and has stimulated much interest in music.

The success of this part of the education of our children can be evaluated in terms of the fine comments made by parents and citizens about the programs that the children and teachers have presented to the public.

HEALTH SUPERVISION

We were exceedingly sorry to lose the fine services of Mrs. Louisa Murphy, as our school nurse. Her work was very thorough and her relationships with children, teachers and parents were conducive to fine cooperation. Her report reveals the details of her work.

We were fortunate in being able to obtain the services of Miss Sybil Beatham to carry on this phase of our educational program. Miss Beatham has many years of experience as a school nurse and is cognizant of the problems existent in the field of school nursing.

Dr. Louis Weiderhold, has done much, to insure good health in our children. His examinations are thorough and his advice is very helpful to all concerned with the healthy development of the school children.

SCHOOL GROUNDS

Our playground area continues to improve with each passing year. This past summer and fall more grading has been done in an attempt to level off those areas that in the past have been comparatively useless. However, the brook at the south end of the playground still poses quite a problem. As it presently exists, we are faced with a hazard that could result in serious injury to our little people. Water has the unusual ability of attracting little children. Consequently, quite a problem of supervision has developed in keeping the first and second graders from this area. Frequently, they return to the classroom after recesses and noon periods, wet and bruised despite the efforts of the teachers to keep them away from this area. Thus, we are recommending the installation of a chain link fence to close off this area. A special article in the warrant will call this problem to the attention of the voters.

The Francestown P. T. A. is to be commended for the fine support both physically and morally, that they have extended to the school. Our play area has been developed to its present state largely through their efforts, and the efforts of interested citizens, cooperating with the School Board. As the result of a request from them, a special article has been inserted in the warrant to provide for the construction of a sidewalk across the front of the school grounds, close to the building, to provide for a better approach to the playground and bicycle area. Each spring and fall, this area becomes a veritable sea of mud. Not only does this detract from the appearance of the grounds but it creates quite a cleaning problem in the school building as well as creating a hazardous situation for the little people.

SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM

Our school lunch program continues to be a successful venture under the capable management of Mrs. C. Gladys St. John, assisted by Mrs. Winnifred Hoyt who maintains the books. We are presently serving approximately 1025 meals per month. It will be noted that this program closed the year with a balance of \$349.55. For details of the program I refer you to the School Lunch Report.

IMPROVEMENTS TO BUILDINGS

This past summer we completed the paint program, that was laid out several years ago, by painting the entrance hall, and stair-well to the basement.

Upon the recommendation of the State Health Department bubblers were installed in the upper and lower grade rooms. This not only provides for a more sanitary drinking situation but from an administrative point of view, it lends itself to more efficient supervision. Our building is now in excellent condition and we should be able to keep it this way at a nominal cost.

The only area that needs attention this coming summer is the kitchen. A small sum is included in the budget to re-paint the kitchen and to install a ceiling over this area.

FINANCE

The total amount required to cover the School Board's Budget for 1954-55, exclusive of the passage of any of the special articles in the warrant, is \$22,686.39, a net increase of \$2,776.45 over that of last year. The largest increase \$2,445, is in the area of tuitions. Other areas that have decidedly smaller increases are teachers' salaries, teacher retirement, transportation, repairs and replacements and equipment. These total \$433.93. Decreases in other areas are responsible for the net increase mentioned above.

CONCLUSION

It has been a pleasure to work with the teachers, parents, the Francestown School Board and interested citizens in Francestown toward improved educational offerings for the children of Francestown. The teachers and I solicit and welcome your suggestions and help.
